Resources for Homelessness and Prevention Available

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The increase in homelessness is not just noticeable, but a glaring concern to our communities. During the pandemic, people were let go from their jobs or even lost their businesses and did not even think that homelessness was going to happen...until it did. But, just what kind of numbers are we dealing with in California? "On any given night, the state has more than 160,000 homeless persons," says Jialu Streeter from the Stanford Institute for Economic Policy Research. You might be thinking, how can I prevent my family and I from going homeless? First,

look at your immediate needs. You can call 2-1-1 in Sacramento or (916) 498-1000 for outside the area and go to: https:// www.211sacramento. org/211/guided-search/ for information on over 1.600 services through the Sacramento Community Resource Directory. When you call, a caring special ist at Sacramento 211 will do a holistic evaluation of your situation and provide internal referrals to the agencies and organizations that are able to fulfill your immediate needs, whether to prevent homelessness or aid you while you are experiencing it. Your case management could involve: eviction prevention, housing subsidies, shelter, medical care, legal, elderly, veteran, financial assistance, transportation, food, etc... Some of the departments or organizations you could interact with would be the Sacramento County Department of Human Assistance https://ha.saccounty.gov/ Pages/default.aspx at (916) 874-3100 or the

officials for help. If your spouse is in the military reserves who abandoned you and your family, check out your congressman at: https://myreps.datamade.

us/ to locate your spouse and, in combination with family court, get help for spousal and child support. Third, trim your expenses as much as possible and find ways to help your budget, such as using the cash you get from a recycling center to pay your phone bill or instead of upgrading your cell phone, use it for years. Under the United States Code 42 USC 11302, being homeless does not always mean living on the street; it is someone that "lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime Continued on page 3

Failed Silicon Valley Bank, the Newsoms, and Connected Friends

The Silicon Valley Bank failure and shutdown is because of "idiot bank management under an incompetent board," according to Shark Tank star Kevin O'Leary.

"O'Leary joined Fox News hosts Bill Hemmer and Dana Perino on Tuesday to discuss the Silicon Valley Bank failure and the announcement that deposits would be protected," Mediaite reported. "President Joe Biden announced this week that people's 'deposits are safe.""

Defendants Convicted in No-Body Revenge Murder

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On March 17, 2023, Robert Manor and Victor Merle Gray were convicted by a jury of the first-degree murder of Raymond Wright, with the special circumstance that the murder was committed during the commission of a kidnapping. Manor and Gray were also convicted of kidnapping for ransom causing death.

In 2011, the victim was a DUI driver and caused a collision in which Robert Manor and his wife were seriously injured. The victim was prosecuted for felony DUI by the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office. The victim served his time and completed his probation. However, Manor held a grudge against the victim for years and put his plan for revenge into motion in 2018.

The victim was a resident of Rocklin, California. On January 11, 2018, the victim mysteriously

disappeared. Concerned family members checked the victim's Rocklin home and a shop he rented in Rio Linda. When the victim remained missing, the search extended statewide. On January 13, 2018, the victim's brother encountered a strange man inside the victim's home and called the police. The man ran out of the house, but a soda cup filled with a fresh drink was found in the kitchen. The straw from the cup was tested for DNA and uploaded to the CODIS database.

On January 27, 2018, Victor Gray was under the influence and led CHP on a high-speed chase. The chase ended in a crash, which caused injuries to innocent victims. Gray's van was towed from the scene. When the van was searched, a blood-soaked raincoat, the victim's wallet and other property belonging to the victim were found inside. Much of the property was charred and the blood on the raincoat matched the victim's DNA. Further investigation revealed a letter from Gray to Manor

complaining about not being paid for "delivering dude" and asked Manor to take care of the person "who hand delivered you your revenge." Other evidence also linked Manor to the revenge killing and the hiring of Gray to kidnap the victim from his shop in Rio Linda. The DNA uploaded to CODIS then returned a full profile match to Victor Gray, who was a prior felon.

Raymond Wright's body has never been found.

Manor and Gray both face a maximum sentence of life in prison without the possibility of parole. Sentencing is set for April 28, 2023, at 10:00 a.m. in Department 32 before the Honorable James Arguelles.

The investigation in this case was led by the Placer County District Attorney's Office, the Rocklin Police Department with the involvement of many other regional law enforcement agencies as well as the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office. \star

Biden's announcement also protected his own businesses in Silicon Valley Bank."CADE, Odette, and PlumpJack, three wineries owned by Newsom, are listed as clients of SVB on the bank's website. Newsom also maintained personal accounts at SVB for years, according to a longtime former employee of Newsom's who handled his finances, and who requested anonymity to avoid professional reprisal."

Newsom also neglected to say that he and the First Partner have even deeper ties with Silicon Valley Bank – Silicon Valley

Bank President of Capital John China gave \$100,000 "Behested" gift to the Newsom's nonprofit, California Partners Project, Open the Books discovered, the Globe reported.

Notably, a 2019 IRS Form 990 for Newsom's California Partner Project reports only \$50k in total gross receipts. This seems inaccurate given the new information of Newsom's behested payments. The Globe did not find any record of 2020-2021 IRS Form 990 filings on the IRS website, but did find IRS Form 990 filings with the California Office of the Attorney General Charities registry.

FBI, Sacramento PD Investigate Theft of Aircraft

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) Sacramento Field Office and Sacramento Police department are investigating the theft of an aircraft at Sacramento Executive Airport that caused damage to multiple aircraft at Sacramento Executive Airport on March 16, 2023. The FBI Evidence Response Team from the Sacramento Field Office are currently on scene collecting evidence.

During the early morning hours of March 15, 2023, Sacramento Police Department officers responded to the 6100 block of Freeport Blvd following reports of helicopters being broken into, including one that appeared to have been operated resulting in a collision. Upon arrival on scene Sacramento Executive Airport, officer located a helicopter that had been operated, and was involved in an incident that caused damage to multiple aircraft.

This investigation is ongoing, and the FBI and Sacramento Police Department continue to work collaboratively to investigate the incident and locate the subjects involved. Aging Workers Are in Demand; They Are Reliable, Mature and Professional

WASHINGTON, DC, (MPG) -It's a given that the state of the U.S. economy over the past several years has caused many elders in our population to go back to work or, for those who are already in the workplace, to keep their jobs as long as they can. The inflationary cycle triggered by the policies of the Biden administration didn't make it easy for older workers to make ends meet. The cost of living has increased considerably over the past two years. But, according to a survey conducted by the Transamerica Center for Retirement Studies, "almost half of Baby Boomer workers (49 percent) expect to or already are working past age 70 or do not plan to retire. Their reasons for doing so are almost as likely to be healthy aging-related (78 percent) as financial-related (82 percent)."

The first boomers, those of us born between 1946 and 1964, celebrated our 65th birthdays in 2011 but many of them opted to keep working. The online employment agency, Indeed, says these aging workers are in demand. It is estimated that the aging of the U.S. will continue for another four decades during which the numbers of the 65-year-old population will increase by more than 37 million, increasing from 46 million today to more than 98 million in 2060. The American Psychological Association reports that, going forward, "older adults will live longer than ever before: One out of every four 65-yearolds today will live past age 90. This demographic shift has moved the focus

providers and policymakers from how to extend the lifespan to ways to improve the quality of our later years. Staying healthy, active, and productive are admirable goals for our nation's older adults. However, society's view of 'old age' has not always kept up with the reality of being old in America. Many current beliefs about aging were based on information that is no longer valid given recent scientific advances."

The aging process is not kind to the elderly. Many of us will have memory issues, we might find some complex chores are harder than they used to be, and we might have difficulty staying focused. But the National Institute on Aging that o [NIA] tells us that "aging may also bring positive cognitive changes. For example, many studies have shown lder adults have more extensive vocabularies and greater knowledge of the depth of meaning of words than younger adults." However, the NIA also points out that "despite the changes in cognition that may come with age, older adults can still do many of the things they have enjoyed their whole lives. Research shows that older adults can still: learn new skills, form new memories, and Improve vocabulary and language skills."

Is Silicon Valley Bank's Failure An Omen For California?

It would be difficult to overstate Silicon Valley's financial importance to California.

The San Jose-centered high technology industry exploded four decades ago as California's manufacturing sector, which had boomed during and after World War II, was shrinking.

It became the state's single most powerful economic engine, creating products and services that transformed California and had immense global impact. A few days ago, Gov. Gavin Newsom described it the "tent pole for our economy" and for once he wasn't exaggerating.

As other economic sectors and other regions stagnated, Silicon Valley boomed. Without it, California could not have become the fifth – and very possibly the fourth – most powerful economy in the world.

Silicon Valley's mega-corporations, such as Apple, Google and Twitter, sucked in immense amounts of money from every corner of the globe - not only making investors very rich, but creating countless jobs and pumping hundreds of billions of dollars into the state treasury as high income tax rates tapped into the new wealth.

to wonder whether Silicon federal authorities arranged Valley has reached its peak.

Valley's corporations have to make full withdrawals. been laying off workers and venture capital activity has slowed. A few weeks ago, a local industry organization, Joint Venture Silicon runs. Valley, issued its annual report on the region's economy, stressing a transition from a cauldron of start-up companies to dominance by a few giants.

"Tech is going through a painful period," Russell Hancock, president of the organization said, adding hopefully that "there is no way to construe what is happening as a crisis" for the tech sector.

That was happening before Silicon Valley Bank, which was founded in 1983 as the region began to boom and rode the wave into becoming one of the nation's largest financial houses, suddenly collapsed last week.

The bank experienced a run from depositors and could not raise enough cash to meet demand. State and federal financial regulators quickly stepped in, shuttered the bank and began seeking a buyer. Its failure sent shockwaves through Silicon Valley because of the bank's prominent role in financing start-up companies and providing cash for payrolls and other expenses.

Relatively small depositors were covered by insurance, but hundreds of corporate customers had deposits over the \$250,000 insurance limit and suddenly were unable to make withdrawals.

The immediate crisis was newspapers.

Despite the emergency action, however, Silicon Valley Bank's failure is a serious blow to the tech industry because of its pivotal role in financing innovation as a direct lender, as a financial service provider and as a midwife for attracting venture capital.

Federal authorities are looking for a buyer to absorb Silicon Valley Bank, quite possibly one of the nation's larger banks. Even if a buyer emerges, however, the new owner would not have an intimate relationship to the region's yeasty culture of aggressive innovation.

The bank's owners prospered by deeply immersing themselves into that culture but that narrow focus made it vulnerable to outside economic factors. When the Federal Reserve System began raising interest rates to battle inflation, the bank's portfolio of bonds lost value. When the bank was forced to sell those devalued bonds to meet withdrawal demands from depositors, it went into a death spiral.

The question is whether the bank's failure is a harbinger of Silicon Valley's decline.

Back to the Future

1. Decide which person or family line you want to check out. Determine what you want to know about them. For example: Who was my great-grandfather? What did he do for a living? Did he fight in WW I? Was he an ironworker like me? Where in Italy was my great-grandmother born

2. Using a free digital resource like FamilySearch.org or a for-fee genealogy company, build a family tree and Include birth, death, and marriage dates and places for yourself, your spouse/partner, children, parents, grandparents etc.

3. Do a google search to find more information about the selected person of family line, such as probate records, land records, and newspaper articles. Chronicling-America is a free source

for historical information.

4. Organize the research documents you gathered in binders or computer folders by person.

5. Interview your relatives for family stories and more facts.

6. DNA test several relatives in the selected family line. You'll receive thousands of names of people who share common ancestors with your family. In addition, DNA testing will estimate where in the world your ancestors came from Kathy's "Family Harambee" How to discuss challenging Discoveries in your family tree and her "Finding Otho" books present critical information about this DNA topic.

7. Create a document on your computer for the manuscript if that's what your goal is. Format the pages to look like an outline of the book, e.g. title pages, table of contents, Chapter One etc.

8. Write your story or get someone to help you put it all together. If you want to publish it, you can always get a ghost writer to help you.

9. If you go the book route, get an editor and book cover creator. Your former high school English teacher is not necessarily a professional editor.

10. Print your manuscript, but remember you can self-publish it as a book or for a family keepsake for members of your immediate family.

Social Security Matters

How Do I Withdraw My **Application for Social Security?**

Dear Rusty: I will be 67 next month and reached my full retirement age in July 2022. My wife and I are discussing whether we should take Social Security now or wait until we are age 70 to get a higher benefit. I remember reading that you can start Social Security and, if not needed, pay it back within a year and then "reset" to get a higher benefit by waiting longer. Please describe the steps of this process to take now and repay the year's benefits if we do not need them. Signed: Uncertain

Dear Uncertain: Well,

to exercise the so-called "do over option" (which is essentially withdrawing your application for benefits), you need to contact Social Security (1.800.772.1213 or your local SS field office) and request that your application for benefits be withdrawn. You can also download and complete form SSA-521 and deliver the same to your local Social Security office. You can get that form at this link: www.


ssa.gov/forms/ssa-521. pdf.

This "do-over option" is only available within 12 months of the date you submit your application and can only be done once in your lifetime. If you use it, you will be required to repay Social Security for all payments made on your behalf, including not only your monthly payments but also any income taxes you had withheld, and any Medicare premiums which were withheld from your monthly payments (Social Security will inform you how much you must repay). Once the repayment is made, it will be as though you never applied for benefits, meaning your benefit amount will be higher when you later re-apply (which would also be the case if you simply didn't apply your benefit entitlement continues to grow until you claim, up to age 70 when your maximum SS benefit is attained). This process would be the same for both you and your wife.

However, I suggest you consider whether you really need to withdraw your application. Be aware that since you've already reached your full retirement age (FRA) you can claim now and, if you later decide you don't need the monthly SS money, you can simply temporarily suspend your benefit payments to avoid repaying Social Security everything

they've already paid to you and on your behalf (you don't need to formally withdraw your application). By simply suspending (and not withdrawing), your benefit amount will start growing again with each month your benefits are suspended (about .67% more for each month you do not get benefits) and you can keep everything you've already received to the point you suspend your payments. To suspend your payments just call Social Security at the number provided above and tell them you wish to suspend your benefits and grow your payment amount. While you can only use the withdrawal process once in your lifetime, you can temporarily suspend your benefit payments multiple times if necessary.

Loaning money to, or borrowing money from, relatives or friends often leads to bruised feelings. I'm sorry you're going through this, but I hope it will teach you and your folks a valuable lesson going forward. There's nothing wrong with giving money in a situation like this, as long as you're not enabling bad behavior by doing so. But a loan between friends or family is something I never recommend.

If they choose to hold a grudge there's really not a lot you can do, especially if you took longer than agreed upon to pay them back. It just takes more time with some people—and in some cases even parents-for those kinds of things to heal. You have to remember, in their minds there's an element of responsibility and trust involved here. But considering it's your mom and dad we're talking about, I'd say they'll lighten up and become a little easier to be

around with time.


Until that happens, though, maybe you could look for chances to mention your new approach to finances during conversations with them. Even something as simple as an off-hand remark about how much you were able to put into savings from your recent paychecks may encourage them to see things in a different light. 
