HERITAGE OAKS HOSPITAL NAMES NEW CEO

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Department of Airports, which operates Sacramento International Airport (SMF), announced on February 1, SMForward, a \$1.3 billion expansion project that will reshape the Airport to accommodate projected passenger growth over the next seven years.

SMForward is embarking on a transformative journey, with the launch of six ambitious projects in 2024, including the construction of a stunning \$140 million pedestrian walkway. This state-of-the-art walkway will seamlessly connect Terminal B to Concourse B, empowering passengers with the flexibility to choose between a leisurely walk to their gate or utilizing the Airport's efficient train system. Additional SMForward projects include expansions to both Terminal A and Concourse B, which will add gates and new amenities; a new Terminal B parking garage; and a consolidated ground transportation center that will centralize taxi, rideshare, and off-site shuttle providers into a single area that is walkable from both terminals. SMForward is expected to conclude in late 2027 with the completion of a new \$400 million consolidated rental car facility, allowing passengers access to the

Airport's rental car providers without the need to ride a shuttle bus.

SMForward is a major milestone for Sacramento, representing the largest construction program in the airport's history. This ambitious project is not just an expansion, but a complete transformation of the airport experience for the people of Sacramento and its visitors. The project will bring about significant improvements and upgrades that will enhance the convenience, comfort, and accessibility of the airport for all.

"The airport experience is the first impression many people see when they arrive in Northern California - and the last as they leave," said Cindy Nichol, Director of Sacramento County Department of Airports. "SMForward will change the airport's skyline, but it also sets the stage for the airport's growth and our region's as a whole."

the burden of financing will not fall on the local taxpayers.

"Over the next five years, this transformation will create worldclass facilities that will enhance our customer's travel experience while improving crucial infrastructure to meet our growth," said Nichol. "Our airfield has plenty of capacity, but our parking, concourses, and roadways have several choke points. SMForward will address these issues and create an airport ready to serve the modern passenger."

SMForward comes as air travel demand in the Greater Sacramento region continues to exceed peer airports in the region after unprecedented impacts from the COVID-19 pandemic. In 2022, SMF nearly returned to pre-pandemic levels with six consecutive years of yearover-year record-breaking passenger growth through 2019. Forecasts show steady passenger growth averaging 4.3 percent annually through 2041, underscoring the need for expansion. "With record numbers of people traveling through SMF and the region's growing economy that continues to create new opportunities, Sacramento International Airport is at a crucial intersection," said Sacramento County Supervisor Phil Serna, "It is critical to invest in our aviation infrastructure to ensure we can meet the needs of residents and Continued on page 3

SMFoward creates jobs and economic opportunities for local businesses and serves as a catalyst for further development in the region. The project will help Sacramento to be more competitive as a destination, attract more visitors and businesses, and ultimately contribute to the growth of the region.

SMForward is a visionary project that will be financed through a combination of federal and state grants, municipal bonds issued by the airport, and user fees. This means that are dedicated to reducing waste, increasing recycling and advocating for an equitable, circular economy.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The California Department of Housing a n d Community Development (HCD) announced on Friday, February 3, 2023, that Sacramento County has earned the state's Prohousing Designation.

Sacramento County, along with Placer County and the City of El Cerrito, joins seven other jurisdictions recognized for a commitment to policies that increase housing supply such as accelerating production, promoting equitable and sustainable zoning and land use, reducing development costs and providing financial

subsidies. Sacramento County is also now eligible for the Prohousing Incentive Pilot (PIP) Program that rewards Prohousing communities for such commitments.

To earn the Prohousing Designation, cities and counties must demonstrate they are promoting climate-smart housing in a variety of ways, including but not limited to streamlining multifamily housing development, up-zoning in places near jobs and transit to reduce emissions, and creating more affordable homes in places that historically or currently exclude households earning lower incomes and households of color.

Sons of Union Veterans Keep Civil War History Alive

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -The Sacramento membership of the non-profit Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) is a fraternal, patriotic and educational organization to help keep the history of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) and its role in the history of California alive.

'We're actively looking for new members throughout California to consider joining us," said Steve Bogart, whose ancestor Sgt. George S. Rhoades, served in Company D, of the 44th Missouri Infantry.

Organized in the structure of a military camp, as the Union Army itself was during the Civil War, members of the General George Wright Camp 22 of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War meet on the first Friday of every month at Sam's Hofbrau Restaurant on 2500 Watt Avenue in Sacramento from 6:30 to 8 p.m.

Members and their guests are welcome to attend monthly meetings. Its organization follows the guidelines of the national SUVCW, with a Camp Commander, Senior Vice-Commander, Junior Vice-Commander, Secretary, and Treasurer, all of whom are elected annually by the Camp members. The camp serves Northern California, Sacramento, and the Central Valley region.

In addition to meeting socially, SUVCW members wear the blue dress enlisted and officer uniforms of the Grand Army of the Republic era as they participate in historical re-enactments within the state and perform official honors and ceremonies throughout the year.

Bogart acknowledges ancestors in his family who served opposing sides during the Civil War and has fulfilled the role of chaplain in both the Sons of Union and Sons of Confederate groups. He's a former member of the California State Military Museum in Old Sacramento and a recipient of the California Military History medal.

"I'm proud of their individual military service during the

Civil War, and I feel it's important to honor them and their legacy," he said.

"Our Sacramento-based (SUV) group began in 1995," he said. 'Many of our members can trace their ancestors to those served during the Civil War in Union volunteer infantry units from the states of Indiana, New York, Illinois, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts, just to name a few."

In the Sylvan Cemetery at 7401 Auburn Blvd in Citrus Heights, the resting place of almost 1,400 Veterans, has some of its earliest burials from survivors of the Civil War. Nine soldiers who came to the area after the Civil War ended and are buried there.

"SUV members have been involved in four gravesite dedications of Civil War soldiers at the Sylvan Cemetery in Citrus Heights where a memorial headstone was... placed on a soldier's grave where there was none, and a full civil memorial grave ceremony was then held," Bogart said.

"In doing so, our members honor the history and legacy of heroes who fought and worked to

save the Union," he said.

A rifle color guard of the SUV has also fired at numerous annual Memorial Day and Veteran's Day ceremonies held there annually, he said.

The National Organization of the SUVCW now oversees the operation of 31 departments, each consisting of one or more states, along with a department-at-large, a national membership-at-large, and over 200 community-based camps.

In California, the history of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) at Sutterville, in the Sacramento area is a fascinating one.

Sutterville, known as Sutter and Sutter City, was located on the Southern Pacific Railroad about 2.25 miles south-southwest of the city limits. Pioneer John A. Sutter had Lansford W. Hastings and John Bidwell lay out the town in 1844, south of his embarcadero on a low bluff overlooking the Sacramento River. When the town of Sacramento developed at Sutter's embarcadero, Sutterville fell into decline.

Its fortunes quickly changed

when Camp Union became California's most prominent provider of troops for camps in the West throughout the years of the Civil War.

A third of California's 15,000 volunteers who served in the GAR trained at Camp Union, located at Sutterville Road and Land Park Drive. The site has since been designated a state historical landmark.

Members of the 5th Infantry **Regiment California Volunteers** were organized at Camp Union on October 8, 1861, and trained by Brevet Brigadier General George W. Bowie for duty in Arizona, New Mexico, and Texas against the Confederate forces. The camp operated from 1861 until it was evacuated due to the flood waters from the Great Sacramento Flood of 1862.

The 5th Regiment joined the California Column and marched across southern New Mexico Territory to Texas. There it occupied Franklin, Texas until the regiment was mustered out in December of 1864.

Towards the end of the Civil

War, Camp Union became a discharge center for returning troops until the post was closed and abandoned in 1866.

In all, members of the 5th Regiment California Volunteer Infantry spent much of their time in service in the western United States, attached to the Department of the Pacific and Department of New Mexico.

Hereditary membership is available to a male descendant, 14 years of age (6 to 14 for Juniors), who descends from a soldier, sailor, Marine or member of the Revenue Cutter Service (or directly descend from a brother, sister, half-brother, or half-sister of such Soldier, etc.) who was regularly mustered and served honorably in, was honorably discharged from, or died in the service of, the Army, Navy, Marine Corps or Revenue Cutter Service of the United States of America or in such state regiments called to active service and was subject to the orders of United States general officers, between April 12, 1861 and April 9,1865.

"We're a very active group in California," Bogart said. "A number of men have also participated in the Civil War re-enactments both at Fort Point in San Francisco during Civil War Days and as Friends of Civil War Alcatraz in recognition of its defensive role during that war,"

Men with an interest in joining the SUVCW but who do not live in an area where an SUVCW Department or Camp exists, may join as "members-at-large," Bogart said.



application highlights include the modification of development standards and other applicable zoning provisions to promote greater development intensity. In addition, the county provides impact fee reductions for residential development and permits "missing middle" housing in typically lower-density, single-family residential zones. Lastly, the county uses holistic planning strategies in an effort to reduce vehicle miles traveled and greenhouse gas emissions.

"The Planning and Environmental Review Division has been hard at work updating its Zoning Code to allow for streamlined residential development," said Troy Givans, Sacramento County Community Development Director. "These updates have allowed for an expedited permitting process, which we believe will accelerate housing development in the unincorporated County."

"The County offers a one-stop shop for fee deferral/waivers for County of Sacramento, Sacramento Area Sewer District, Sacramento Regional County Sanitation District, and Sacramento County Water Agency impact fees on regulated affordable residential projects to allow for streamlined fee deferral/ waiver process. In addition, the County's participation in Statewide Community Infrastructure Program (SCIP) provides additional financing tools to ease development impact fees for public infrastructure needed for residential projects."

The State of California budget for the fiscal year 2019-20 established the Prohousing Designation Program as part of a spectrum of support, incentive and accountability measures to help meet California's housing goals. Increasing the availability of housing statewide is critical to bettering the quality of life of all Californians and to ending homelessness. Communities that earn the Prohousing Designation receive incentives in the form of additional points and/or other preferences in the scoring of competitive housing, community development and infrastructure funding programs administered by HCD.

Prohousing jurisdictions are also eligible for community development resources through the new PIP Program. The competitive program has \$25.7 million in additional flexible funding available to help accelerate housing production and expand the preservation of affordable housing

It's flowers, candy, a special dinner and that's Valentine's Day, right? But have you ever thought about how Valentine's Day came about? Let's explore. First of all you need to know the history is kind of murky. Here are some surprising facts. The St. Valentine who inspired the holiday may have been two different men. Originally recognized by the Roman Catholic Church, St Valentine is known to be a real person who died in A.D. 270. One account from the 1400s describes Valentine as a temple priest who was beheaded near Rome by the emperor Claudius II for helping Christian couples wed. A different account claims Valentine was the Bishop of Terni, also martyred on the outskirts of Rome. In all, there are about a dozen St. Valentines, plus a pope. The saint we celebrate is known officially as St. Valentine of Rome. Because "Valentinus" from the Latin word for worthy, strong or powerful, it was a popular moniker as several martyrs over the centuries have carried this name. You can find Valentine's skull in Rome. The flower-adorned skull is on display in the Basilica of Santa Maria in Cosmedin, Rome. In the early 1800s, the excavation of a catacomb

near Rome yielded skeletal remains now associated with St. Valentine. Did you know that English poet Geoffrey Chaucer may have invented St. Valentine's Day? The medieval poet often took liberties with history, placing his poetic characters into fictitious

historical context that he represented as real. No record exists of romantic celebrations on Valentine's Day prior to a poem he wrote around 1375. In his work "Parliament of Foules," he links a tradition of courtly love with the celebration of St. Valentine's feast day-an association that didn't exist until after his poem received widespread attention. And here's a good one. You can celebrate Valentine's Day several times a vear. Because of the abundance of St. Valentines on the Roman roster. you can choose to celebrate Viterbo on November 3. Maybe you might want to get a jump on the traditional day by feting St. Valentine of Raetia on January 7. Women might choose to honor the only female St Valentine (Valentina) a virgin martyred in Palestine on July 25, A. D. 308. Take your choice! But commercialization came about in the 1840s. It took off in the U.S. as increased paper production and printing presses lowered costs and increased the pre-printed cards featuring fancy lace etc. As for the candy, flowers and special dinners, commerce catches on as always. But always remember what the day is about...caring and sharing and not how much you spend. I know, stop laughing!

Heritage Oaks Hospital 'Day of Reckoning'

As all parents or adults, we have daily needs, grocery, shelter, transportation, repair bills, electricity to keep the lights on plus a host of other things. And occasionally you feel the desire to splurge, maybe a weekend getaway. Maybe we spend more than we can afford, but there's always the credit card!

Eventually the debt builds grows, the budget stretches, and you make "interest only" payments occasionally; but even minimum payments on the credit card, at 8-18% interest, the amount owed balloons! But it's okay. That hoped for wage increase in six months will ease the burden. However, you know that you can't continue this way and that eventually your debtors will require a "day of reckoning." You pray that your lenders will simply forget about you!

Teaching personal finance at the university, I've seen it all, families struggling financially, having autos repossessed, inability to afford a home, debt burdens, and bankruptcy. They muse, "If only I had learned to live on a budget." In fact, all states in the USA (except Vermont) require a balanced budget! California, the sixth largest nation-state in the world, has a yearly balanced budget! (Though having worked for the Governor's Department of Finance, sometimes the revenues might be bit overestimated, and expenses underestimated, but still basically balanced.)

Hopefully you're aware that the United States has no requirement to balance its budget. But are you aware that the debt of the national government is your debt? As the citizen owners of our government, we are also going into debt. And are you aware of just how much debt the USA has?

USA debt has dramatically increased in the past 30 years and is currently \$30.2 trillion (\$30,200,000,000,000) and rising! Your individual fair share is \$90.853!! And we, our children, and grandchildren will be paying for that bill! Now, suddenly it's not just a big number about a distant government, it's about YOU!

And this, \$30.2 trillion does NOT reflect our unfunded liabilities that exceed \$100 trillion, and that in less than ten years our interest on the debt will be \$1 trillion a year (that's interest only!)

At this moment, Medicare will be insolvent by 2026 and Social Security by 2030.

Again, this is a MASSIVE burden upon future generations, unless you think the USA government is somehow exempt from the basic rules of finance.

If you and I spent money so recklessly, you know that our "house of cards" would soon come tumbling down. Perhaps those from whom we (the US government) have borrowed won't want their money back? Perhaps they'll say, "Aw, shucks USA, that's alright, you don't have to pay me back?" Maybe. But then, again, some of us may still believe in the "tooth fairy."

The immediate result of this debt is slower growth: compromised national security in an already very dangerous world; more of a gap between the haves and have not's; increasing taxes from Washington; and the federal government will cut spending only to give more unfunded mandates to the states. Ultimately, taxpayers and the states will bear the burden.

Just as a lender looks at your financial ability to pay for a loan, or debt to income ratio, we can look at the financial stability of the USA by comparing our debt to our "gross domestic product or GDP" (the total of goods and services created by the US economy annually). It should normally be 30-40%. Today it's 129% and growing. Is the day of reckoning upon us?

We'll look at this debt ratio; our history of debt; who's responsible; and solutions in upcoming columns. Check out.

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - On Jan. 30, 2023, SAFE Credit Union awarded Sacramento Cottage Housing Inc. a \$5,000 grant to fund new educational courses for its formerly homeless clients to learn important life and financial skills.

The grant was awarded through the credit union's Community Sustainability Grant Program, which provides funds to Sacramento region nonprofits with programs that support education, healthcare, and veterans. To engage the community and our members in our corporate giving initiatives, SAFE invited the community in December to determine the two grant recipients offering education programs that address inequities. Voters chose Sacramento Cottage Housing Inc. and the Construction Industry Education Foundation to each receive \$5,000 grants.

Based in Sacramento, Cottage Housing works to lift unhoused people into independence and self-sufficiency. They provide

shelter, security and programs to families and individuals to help them focus on personal and professional development to gain confidence. At the heart of their program are two communities: Serna Village in North Highlands and Quinn Cottages near downtown Sacramento.

Part of their program includes Life Skill Development classes that provide applicable lessons on parenting, healthy eating, budgeting, and employment skills. SAFE's grant will go to create a new course on independent living skills and a second course of the residents' choosing.

The courses are designed in part to provide knowledge and skills needed for the residents to move forward on a more solid financial footing.

"I think financial freedom for our participants is giving them all the tools they need so they can live a life where they won't have debt, can make purchases and know how they're spending their money,"

Hunt says. "And to be able to do the things they want and to teach those tools to their children."

The grant to Cottage Housing was one of eight totaling \$95,000 awarded to nonprofits from SAFE in 2022.

"Our Community Sustainability Grant Program provides funding to programs that seek to make our communities economically stronger by giving people the tools and resources they need to live fulfilling, healthy lives," says SAFE Community Impact Manager Amanda Merz. "Cottage Housing is providing essential work to address the causal roots of homelessness in our community through programs that truly work. SAFE is honored to help fund new courses that will directly help residents gain the confidence and knowledge they need to lead lives full of promise and hope."

Newsom Shuns Blame for California's Unseemly Issues

Gov. Gavin Newsom's obvious efforts to raise his national profile have taken two forms - touting California as a societal model and criticizing red states such as Florida and Texas for their supposed shortcomings.

Increasingly, Newsom employs a third tactic - shifting blame for California's less seemly aspects.

That tendency is particularly evident in something that Californians rate as one of their top concerns - its worstin-the-nation incidence of homelessness, manifested in thousands of squalid encampments in the state's cities.

While running for governor in 2018, Newsom promised to appoint a cabinet-level official to concentrate on homelessness but later, when reporters pressed him, responded, "You want to know who's the homeless czar?" Newsom. "I'm the homeless czar in the state of California."

Despite that self-appointed role, as homelessness continued to grow, officially approaching 200,000 people but probably much higher, Newsom began shunning responsibility.

Last year, he blamed local officials for a lack of effective action, at one point suspending state funds. He later restored the money but continued to castigate them.

"If we can't clean up the

encampments and address what's happening chronically on our streets, I'm going to be hard-pressed to make a case to the Legislature to provide them one dollar more," Newsom said as he introduced a new state budget in January.

Another example of Newsom's fingerpointing occurred last week as a congressional committee dominated by Republicans delved into why states - particularly California - handed out billions of dollars in unemployment insurance benefits to fraudsters.

The state auditor had issued a report citing the Employment Development Department's "poor planning and ineffective management" for shortcomings in handling unemployment insurance claims. But the current EDD director, Nancy Farias, sent the committee a four-page letter blaming Donald Trump's administration for as much as \$30 billion in fraudulent payments.

"Unfortunately, the Trump Administration expressed no interest in establishing (a) coordinated national response when these (emergency pandemic unemployment) programs were initiated in 2020, leaving states to fend for themselves against a clear pattern of sophisticated, international criminal syndicates at work," Farias' letter, which no doubt was approved by the governor's office, said.

A third example of blameshifting also popped up last week when Fresno County Smittcamp cited Newsom's support for lenient prison policies that allowed the alleged killer of Selma policeman Gonzalo Carrasco to be released after serving just six months of a 64-month sentence for a previous crime.

"Today, Governor Gavin Newsom, and every legislator in the state of California who supports this over-reaching phenomenon they try to disguise as legitimate criminal justice reform, has the blood of this officer on their hands," Smittcamp said.

"The governor and his political allies who continue the quest to close state prisons are increasing the incidents of violence to everyone who lives in, or visits, the state of California," Smittcamp continued. "No city or county is safe from the wrath of this misguided thinking, and this mismanaged prison system."

Newsom quickly fired back, referring to the plea bargain that Smittcamp's office accepted: "She should blame herself. I've been listening to this for years from her. She has the prosecutorial discretion. Ask her what she did in terms of prosecuting that case."

Smittcamp persisted, saying, "Governor Newsom continues to demonstrate his ignorance and lack of understanding of how the criminal justice system works. His arrogant and defensive response is proof positive that he is attempting to deflect responsibility for his failed policies."

It is outrageous that the alleged killer, a self-proclaimed gang member with an extensive criminal record, was released after just six months. And it does exemplify the uber-lenient penal policies California has adopted in District Attorney Lisa recent years, begun by former Gov. Jerry Brown and continued by Newsom.

California Climate Credit Approved for High Winter Bills

OAKLAND, CA (MPG) - Residential customers will automatically receive the California Climate Credit earlier than usual this year. The California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) approved distributing the credit as soon as possible, instead of the annual April timeframe. The Climate Credit is part of California's efforts to fight climate change. Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) is pleased to administer the credit to help reduce customer energy bills. This credit will help offset higher than normal natural gas and electricity bills, which have been increasing due to higher demand and tighter natural gas supplies, especially on the West Coast.

For natural gas residential customers, the credit will be \$52.78, and for electric residential customers, the credit will be \$38.39. Customers who receive both services will receive a total credit of \$91.17.

"PG&E recognizes our responsibility to serve our customers safely and reliably while keeping their energy bills as low as possible. With the price PG&E pays for natural gas rising this year, this credit is great news for PG&E customers, who are likely noticing higher than average bills," said Vincent Davis, PG&E's Vice President of Customer Operations and Enablement.

California requires power plants, natural gas providers and other large industries that emit greenhouse gases to buy carbon pollution permits from auctions managed by the California Air Resources Board. The California Climate Credit is

Customers do not need to do anything to receive the credit, it will automatically appear as an adjustment on a customer's bill under the Adjustments Section on the Detailed Charges page.

sound a lot harder than it really is. They key is making and living on a budget, and that's not rocket science. It's a simple, written planning process where you give a name and a job to every dollar you make before the month begins.

Food, shelter, clothing, transportation and utilities are necessities, so they come first. After that, make sure you're current on your debts. Once all that is out of the way, put every spare dollar you can into your emergency fund. If you do this with a sense of urgency, and limit spending to necessities, you'll be surprised by how fast it will happen. And you'll love the newfound sense of security.

The truth is you really need a starter emergency fund of \$1,000 if you're at a point in life where student loans and other debts are in the picture. That may seem like an impossible goal right now, but it should be your first priority. And a written, monthly budget will go a long way toward helping you achieve that goal.

You can do this, Jonas!.



What Are 'Red Flag' Laws and How Can They Prevent Gun Violence?

California's red flag law, which allows people to obtain gun violence restraining orders (GVROs), went into effect seven years ago. Since then, GVROs have been credited with deterring at least 58 potential mass shootings and other types of gun violence in California, including suicides. Currently, 19 states and the District of Columbia have red flag laws, also known as extreme risk protection order laws.

But what are they, and how do they work?

"Red flag laws are a tool law enforcement and others can use when somebody is clearly at high risk of doing something with a firearm, but they can't be arrested because no crime has been committed and they don't appear to need a mental health hold or qualify for one," Amy Barnhorst said.

Barnhorst is a psychiatrist at UC Davis Health and an expert on violence prevention. She is vice chair of Community Mental Health and the director of the BulletPoints Project, which teaches clinicians how to prevent firearm violence. She remembers the days before California's red flag law. "When somebody was making threats about hurting people at their school or even threats of suicide, there wasn't much that could be done," Barnhorst said. "Red flag laws have changed that. With the law, there is something that can be done about people who are making threats or have concerning behaviors."

Obtaining a gun violence restraining order

Gun-related deaths remain high in the U.S. The Gun Violence Archive, which tracks firearm violence in the U.S., reports 648 mass shootings, 20,176 homicides, and 24,090 suicides in 2022.

about 80% of cases, people who commit mass shootings or suicide make their intentions known in advance to family members or friends or via social media. "It's really important that if you are concerned about a student in your school, or you're a concerned parent, teacher, employer, or somebody who's worried about someone, know there is a way to intervene and reduce the risk. But you need to tell someone, such as law enforcement, who can act," Barnhorst said.

to the Speak for Safety website. It can help walk you through how to pursue a gun violence restraining order," Barnhorst said. The website has different tabs you can select for your relationship to the person at risk, such as employer or co-worker, family or household member, law enforcement or teacher or school employee.

The California Courts website also has information in English and Spanish about how to obtain a GVRO.

"In many cases, law enforcement can get an emergency GVRO on the scene, and they can remove any firearms from the person at risk at that time," Barnhorst said. "If the judge determines that the person is at risk, the judge can continue the prohibition. The guns will continue to be kept away for the duration of the order, which can be renewed after a year or longer in some cases."

Barnhorst explains there is due process during all stages of the legal procedures. "People who have had their firearms removed can appear in court to give their side. If the judge determines they are not a danger, the prohibition can be lifted, and the firearms returned," Barnhorst said. She notes GVROs are civil court actions. They don't involve the criminal courts, and they don't become part of a person's criminal record.

Most people don't know about GVROs

Despite the potential to reduce mass shootings and suicides, the use of GVROs in California has been limited. One of the biggest barriers appears to be the lack of awareness about them. A recent survey found that nearly two-thirds of the respondents did not know about GVROs, although 70% said they would consider using one in a high-risk situation.

"The GVRO law empowers people to play a role in preventing firearm violence among friends, family members, co-workers and classmates by providing a tool to remove firearms from crisis situations," said Veronica Pear, an assistant professor at the Violence Prevention Research Program at UC Davis. Pear studies violence prevention and has published numerous studies about the efficacy of red flag laws. "However, the law can only save lives if it is used, and for that reason, education is key," Pear said.
