Ami Bera Takes a Ride on SacRT

SACRAMENTO COUNTY. **CA (MPG)** - Congressman

Ami Bera, M.D. (CA-07) recently took public transportation to the grand opening of the Rancho Cordova Youth Center

down the road to the center

located at 10455 Investment Circle.

"I thought it was great," Bera said about his ride to the RCYC opening. "If we're thinking about how we want to live here and move around our region, we're building this light rail infrastructure and now we've got that solution that gets you that last mile. It all worked very seamlessly."

SmaRT Ride was launched by SacRT in January 2020 and is powered by software from Via, the global leader in TransitTech. Riders who don't have smartphones can book a ride by calling (916) 556-0100, with wheelchair-accessible vehicles

available upon request.

"We want folks to use public transportation," Bera explained Thursday. "But often if you live a mile away from the light rail [or] bus station, that becomes a challenge. Well SmaRT Ride solves that last mile issue. It allows you to get home from the light rail station or call a shared ride to get to the light rail station.

"It really is a real smart solution to solving that, to get more folks to use public transportation."

Funding for SmaRT Ride is provided by Measure A and a \$12 million grant from the Sacramento Transportation Authority, with a goal of expanding into new communities throughout the region.

According to Rep. Bera's office, the purpose of taking SacRT to the event was to "demonstrate the best of Sacramento County and what is possible when local, state and federal resources are directed towards improving the lives of families and children in the region."

Bera has represented California's 7th Congressional District in the United States House of Representatives since 2013. He is currently up for reelection against Republican candidate Tamika Hamilton. Bera is the leading vote-getter thus far, but the race is still too close to call.

Throughout his career, Lutz has developed and implemented a variety of health programs and services, including behavioral health, human services, public health, primary health Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) look-alike clinics, inmate medical and behavioral health services, and homeless initiative services and housing, among others. He also has extensive experience collaborating and partnering with external stakeholders and community partners to advance health services and shared initiatives.

Lutz has a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology and a Master of **Business Administration** from California State University, Fresno. He also has certificates in Intermediate and Advanced Government Accounting, Advanced Financial Reporting, and Best Practices and Effective Budget Preparation from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA), as well as Driving Government Performance from Harvard University. He is also a Credentialed California County Senior Executive from the California State Association of Counties (CSAC).

City Year Sacramento, an education nonprofit that recruits young adults for a year of service in public schools, is pleased to announce that Macey Amissah-McKinney has been selected as the organization's new executive director.

"Macey embodies the spirit of City Year's principles, her life of service to others demonstrates an indispensable commitment to Sacramento's youth and that of the greater community," said Beth Broome, Senior Advisor to the Provost for STEM Strategy at UC Davis and recent Board Chair of City Year Sacramento. "The Board is very confident in Macey's leadership and

looks forward to working with her as an Executive Director who will continue to advance the momentum and impact of City Year Sacramento for years to come."

Macey was first introduced to national service in college while serving as a tutor for high school youth in South Central Los Angeles as an AmeriCorps member with the Children, Youth, and Family Collaborative. After graduating from the University of Southern California, she relocated to Sacramento, CA to join City Year Sacramento as a founding corps member in 2012. After serving two years in the Corps, Macey transitioned to the staff team as an Impact Manager, coaching and developing a team of 19 AmeriCorps members to deliver targeted intervention support and whole school initiatives focused on student engagement. Since then, Macey has taken on several roles including Learning & Development Manager, AmeriCorps Compliance Manager, Impact Director, and most recently Managing Director of Impact before being announced as Executive Director.

"I am honored to have the opportunity to lead City Year Sacramento and lead a talented team of professionals dedicated to advancing equitable outcomes for youth in the Sacramento region," said Amissah-McKinney. "City Year is poised to expand our work in Sacramento, and I look forward to partnering with our community and school district, so together we can support more students to acquire critical skills and engage more deeply with their learning."

This year, 30 City Year Sacramento AmeriCorps members will serve fulltime in 6 of the city's schools, reaching more than 3,200 students each day. During their year of service, AmeriCorps members serve as student success coaches - tutors, mentors and role models - preparing students with the skills, relationships and learning environments they need to succeed in school and in life. Nationally, schools that partner with City Year are two-to-three times more likely to improve on math and English assessments than similar schools without City Year. Last year, 90% of students felt that their City Year AmeriCorps member taught them how to self-advocate and ask for help when they needed it critical skills for life and workforce success.

President Robert S. Nelsen **Announces His Retirement**

President Robert S. Nelsen, who for the past seven years has overseen Sacramento State's historic student achievement and

shepherded the University through unprecedented challenges, will retire in July, he announced Wednesday, November 2.

Nelsen will be remembered for his dedication to student success, his efforts to raise the University's profile in the region, his commitment to diversity and inclusion, and a deep love for what he warmly called the Hornet Family, among other notable accomplishments.

Whether delivering a speech, shoveling dirt to break ground for a new campus building, or attending an athletic event, Nelsen has been widely admired for performing his duties with unbridled enthusiasm and a gentle sense of humor. His declaration "Sac State is No. 1! Stingers Up!" – often made with his wife, Jody, by his side – has become his signature valediction.

"Sacramento State will always be in my heart," Nelsen said, adding some flavor from his Texas roots. "I wish I could be president forever, but I know the time is right for me to hang 'em up."

Nelsen, 70, became Sacramento State's eighth permanent president on July 1, 2015, succeeding Alexander Gonzalez, who retired after 12 years of leading the University. Prior to arriving in Sacramento, Nelsen spent the better part of three decades in the University of Texas system.

He was president of UT-Pan American from 2010 to 2014 and served as special advisor to UT's executive vice chancellor for academic affairs. His career also includes service as a professor of English, a vice provost, and a director of creative writing.

Nelsen earned his bachelor's and master's degrees and his doctorate from the University of Chicago's Committee on Social

Arriving at Sac State, he said a primary goal was to improve graduation and retention rates, and success followed. Under his leadership, the University has seen a 187% increase in the number of students who graduate within four years. Sac State's performance in the CSU's Graduation 2025 initiative is among the best in the system.

With Nelsen's oversight, the University surpassed its On The Rise fundraising goals, raising \$239 million in its first comprehensive campaign. He celebrated completion of major campus projects, including the funding, construction and 2019 opening of the Ernest E. Tschannen Science Complex, and the Planetarium next to it. Nelsen also was instrumental in the creation of Sac State's Antiracism and Inclusive Campus Plan, which is guiding the University toward its goal of creating a campus culture that is fair and welcoming to all.

The gains have occurred even as Sac State was forced to adjust to the devastating impacts of a global pandemic, which in March 2020 sent students, faculty, and staff members home to study, teach, and work. The campus quickly pivoted to online learning, and notably, the University's enrollment and graduation rates held steady. About 31,000 students returned to campus in the fall, and the University maintains a COVID-19 positivity rate of less than 1%.

CSU Interim Chancellor Jolene Koester called Nelsen "a brilliant, compassionate and student-focused leader who has successfully guided Sacramento State through a period of remarkable growth and transformation."

"Sac State's student body is larger and more dynamically diverse than ever before," Koester said. "Most important, the University has made extraordinary progress in helping that talented

Koester noted that Nelsen's efforts to identify new and innovative ways to provide access and opportunity for area students led to a significant expansion of Sac State's footprint, including the establishment of Sacramento State Downtown and planned construction of the Sacramento State Placer Center.

"Sacramento State is an exemplar of community engagement and partnership and, under President Nelsen's leadership, has solidified its position as a vital anchor institution for the region while enhancing its statewide and national reputation," she said.

"I congratulate President Nelsen on these achievements and on a shining legacy that will span generations."

Nelsen said he is proud of Sac State's progress and grateful for the dedication of the city's residents and leaders, but is reluctant to take full credit.

"These accomplishments would have been impossible without the faculty, staff, students, and community members who have poured their hearts into this work," he said.

"It is time for Jody and me to move on so that the University can continue to move forward. All good things must come to an end. The future is bright, and I know that Sacramento State will continue to be on the rise."

Jody Nelsen, a constant presence at her husband's side during his tenure at Sac State, said his decision to retire was a difficult one.

"But I'm looking forward to our next chapter," she said.

"We have loved our time here. A huge thank you to everyone in our Sac State family for all their support over the years. My heart is filled with gratitude."

The CSU will launch a national search to identify Nelsen's successor. Koester, along with the chair of the CSU Board of Trustees, Wenda Fong, will select a committee comprised of campus and other stakeholders who will seek campus and community input on the selection of Sac State's next

Grant Bolsters CHP's Focus on Sideshows and Street Racing

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Illegal sideshows, takeovers, and street racing remain a major cause of death and injury on California roadways.

The California Highway Patrol (CHP) recently received a federal grant that will support the state's redoubled efforts to crack down on reckless driving behaviors that continue to wreak havoc throughout the state.

Building on the \$5.5 million in the 2022-23 state budget for the CHP to implement the Campaign to Eliminate Street Racing and Sideshows (C.E.S.R.S.), the \$1.5 million Sideshow, Takeover, Racing, Education, and Enforcement Taskforce (STREET) grant will help efforts to decrease the number of fatal and injury traffic crashes attributed to illegal sideshows, takeovers, and street racing.

In 2019-2020, speed was a factor in approximately 40 percent of all fatal and injury crashes in California. In years 2020-2021, preliminary data reflects the number of people killed in crashes caused by reckless driving increased 21 percent from the previous period. The CHP continues to receive a high number of reports on sideshows and street racing and the negative consequences associated with such careless exploits.

"Reckless driving behaviors are a

significant threat to all who use California's roadways," said CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray. "The STREET grant will provide for a focused education and enforcement campaign, targeting aggressive driving behaviors, street racing, and sideshow activities."

During the past two years, California has seen significant increases in the number of incidents from unsafe driving behaviors, including motorists exceeding 100 mph on state highways, illicit street racing and sideshow activities, and speed-related crashes.

To address the issue, from January 1, 2021, to September 30, 2022, the CHP conducted enhanced speed enforcement operations on state routes that have seen an increase in speed-related issues. During this period, the CHP issued 40,593 citations to motorists exceeding 100 mph. CHP also collaborated with allied law enforcement agencies, leading to

the creation of street racing and sideshow task forces and social media campaigns posting the dangers associated with high speed, aggressive driving behaviors, and street racing.

The STREET grant allows for a comparable campaign starting this month through September 30, 2023. Funding for the STREET program is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

As an added deterrent, Governor Gavin Newsom recently signed Assembly Bill 2000 (Gabriel), making it illegal for a person to participate and/or engage in a motor vehicle speed contest or in an exhibition of speed in an off-street parking facility. The measure goes into effect on January 1, 2023.

Partnership to Accelerate Decarbonization **Set for Long-duration Energy**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - ESS Inc. ("ESS") (NYSE:GWH), a leading manufacturer of long-duration iron flow batteries for commercial and utility-scale energy storage applications, and the Sacramento Municipal Utility District (SMUD), the nation's sixth-largest, community-owned, notfor-profit electric service provider, announced an agreement to provide up to 200 megawatts (MW) / 2 gigawatt-hours (GWh) of ESS' environmentally safe and sustainable long duration energy storage solutions.

The agreement calls for ESS to deliver a mix of its Energy WarehouseTM and Energy CenterTM long-duration energy storage (LDES) solutions for integration with the SMUD electric grid beginning in 2023. SMUD will deploy the LDES systems in support of its 2030 Zero Carbon Plan which aims to reduce thermal generation, maximize local solar generation, provide neighborhood resiliency, and increase social justice and equity. LDES is a key component in SMUD's decarbonization plan, without compromising reliability or low electricity rates.

"SMUD is striving for a clean energy future that increases grid resiliency,

supports under-resourced communities and maximizes local economic development," said Paul Lau, CEO and general manager of SMUD. "Long-duration battery technologies move SMUD's 2030 Zero Carbon Plan forward by expanding our dispatchable renewable energy resources and opening doors to innovation, job training and development opportunities in the green energy sectors."

As part of this multiyear agreement, ESS intends to set up facilities for battery system assembly, operations and maintenance support and project delivery in Sacramento, creating local, high paying jobs. In addition, SMUD and ESS plan to establish a Center of Excellence to expand the workforce and knowledge base for LDES technology in partnership with higher education institutions. The Center will provide advanced LDES technical training, creating a statewide skilled talent pool to help build and maintain California's fast-growing long-duration energy storage resources.

"SMUD is a pioneering and progressive public utility that puts its words into meaningful action in particular its pursuit of a decarbonized grid that will build resiliency,

enhance job opportunities, and provide benefits for all customers," said Eric Dresselhuys, CEO of ESS. "Our agreement will be a critical component of SMUD's Zero Carbon Plan. We're pleased to partner with SMUD in realizing their 2030 Plan."

SMUD's ambitious goals are ahead of California's statewide zero-carbon target of 2045, which is the most advanced in the country. The addition of 200 MW / 2 GWh of storage, when coupled with renewable energy sources, is equivalent to removing 284,000 metric tons of CO2 emissions per year and will provide enough energy to power 60,000 homes for 10 hours.

ESS iron flow technology provides cost-effective long-duration energy storage and is ideal for applications that require from 4-12 hours of flexible energy capacity. ESS systems provide resilient, sustainable energy storage well-suited for multiple use cases including utility-scale renewable energy installations, remote solar + storage microgrids, grid load-shifting and peak shaving, and other ancillary grid services. ESS technology is safe, nontoxic and has a 25-year lifespan without capacity

Lopez Named to USL First Team

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On November 1, the USL Championship announced the 2022 All-League teams, honoring the best players across the league for the season. Republic FC midfielder Rodrigo Lopez was named to the All-League First Team alongside ten other top performers from seven other clubs.

"RoRo played the best soccer of his career last season as club captain," said Republic FC President and General Manager Todd Dunivant. "He was an integral part of our collective success in league, cup and post-season play helping us reach new heights this

Lopez appeared in 25 of 34 regular season matches for Sacramento, while starting each contest in the club's run to the U.S. Open Cup Final. He finished 2022 with 1,894 minutes in league play, and captained Sacramento in each of his 21 starts on the season. In regular season play, he finished tied for the team lead in goals with seven – and added another in the playoffs.

He led in team assists with eight during the regular season – his second-highest total for a season in his professional career. He finished the regular season with 59 chances created, good for 10th in the league and 3rd in the Western Conference.

He delivered for his club in critical moments all season long. On opening night against El Paso Locomotive FC, he scored the club's first goal of the year from the penalty spot, then a critical equalizer just before halftime. On June 25, just four days after

netting the opening score against LA Galaxy in the U.S. Open Cup, he came off the bench and assisted the first of two goals from Maalique Foster in a come-from behind win over Monterey Bay F.C. He helped the club to results in two home rivalry matches against Oakland Roots, assisting a last-second equalizer on July 9 to secure a 3-3 draw and the winner in the club's match with the Bay Area side on August 27. In the regular season finale against San Diego Loyal SC, he netted the winning score just two minutes in, threading a shot from the left just inside the post.

Lopez's play was also recognized leaguewide throughout the campaign. He was named the league's Player of the Month for August after netting one goal and tallying a league-leading four assists in four contests and earning Player of the Week Honors in Week 22. He was named to the USL Championship Team of the Week six times, earning a spot on the league's Best XI four times and tallying two selections to Team of the Week Bench.

This is Lopez's second career All-League First Team selection, and his third All-League selection in USL Championship. He previously earned First Team distinction following the club's inaugural 2014 season. In 2015, he was honored on the USL All-League Second team. He is one of three Republic FC players all-time to earn the honor; defender Nemanja Vukovic was named to the All-League First Team alongside Lopez in 2014 and midfielder Danny Barrera was named to the league's top squad in 2016.

DWR Symposium Highlights the Need to Prepare for Flooding

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -With California in extreme drought and facing ongoing extreme climate events, the Department of Water Resources (DWR) gathered scientists, water policy experts, and members of communities impacted by drought and floods for a conversation about building climate resiliency, including in the state's water and flood management systems.

More than 500 people from around the world attended the symposium, which was conducted virtually and in person. As highlighted in Governor Newsom's "Water Supply Strategy for a Hotter, Drier Future," California is experiencing large swings between drought and flood, and due to climate change those swings could become more severe, which will require new strategies and partnerships represented by panelists and speaker.

"Being prepared has always been a core goal of DWR, and our need to meet that goal has never been more important," said DWR Director Karla Nemeth. "We must take action to reduce both the risk and the consequences of flooding by using nature-based solutions, sophisticated weather forecasting and reservoir operations, and other innovative strategies."

After a keynote address and presentation from F. Martin Ralph, Ph.D., Director, Center for Western Weather and Water Extremes, and Daniel Swain, Ph.D., Climate Scientist, Institute of the Environment and Sustainability, University of California, Los Angeles, DWR led three panel discussions on the climate events and how California is responding.

Deputy Director for Hutchinson, Recharge Special Initiatives, moderated a panel on the impacts that climate extremes are having on California communities and was joined by: Rey Leon, Mayor of the City of Huron; Justine Massey, Policy Manager and Attorney, Community Water Center; Ivan Senock, Tribal Historic Preservation Officer and Cultural Resources Director, Buena Vista Rancheria of Me-Wuk Indians; Mark Strudley, Ph.D., Executive Director, Pajaro Regional Flood

Management Agency. Communities impacted by severe drought and flooding are key partners to make sure assistance for climate resilience reaches Californians who need it the most. DWR has recently awarded \$50.4 million in flood risk protection funding for communities who are at high risk of severe flooding. DWR's Small Community Drought Relief Program has also awarded \$190 million for small communities facing water supply challenges because of the current drought.

State Climatologist Dr. Mike Anderson also discussed current efforts to use the latest scientific tools and research to adapt water management tools to our hotter and drier climate using Forecast Informed Reservoir Operations (FIRO), and was joined by:

Michael Dettinger, Ph.D., Center for Weather Western and Water Extremes, Scripps Institution of Oceanography; Joe Forbis, Chief, Water Management, Sacramento District, U.S. Army

challenges of extreme Corps of Engineers; John James, Director of Natural Resource Planning, Yuba Bianca Sievers, DWR Water Agency; Adam Planning Manager, Orange County Water District.

As climate extremes continue to impact the state, DWR has prioritized projects and partnerships between public and private sector organizations that can simultaneously address water supply, habitat and ecosystem restoration and flood protection. DWR Deputy Director of Integrated Watershed Management Kris Tjernell discussed these efforts with:

Jane Dolan, President, Central Valley Flood Protection Board; Chris Elias, Executive Director, San Joaquin Area Flood Control Agency; Alicia Kirchner, Chief of the Sacramento District Planning Division, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers; John Cain, Senior Director of Conservation, River Partners; Gary Lippner, DWR Deputy Director of Flood Management and Dam Safety.

The Central Valley Flood Protection Board will soon adopt the 2022 Update to the Central Valley Flood Protection Plan (CVFPP), California's strategic blueprint to improve flood risk management in the Central Valley. This year's update to the plan, which is updated every 5 years, has utilized recent climate research discussed in today's event for its flood risk projections. California Flood Preparedness Week is October 22 through October 29, and it is crucial for all Californians to prepare for flooding, even during drought conditions, as extreme climate conditions mean flooding can happen at any time.

Agencies Pledge to Conserve Additional Water

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California water agencies that rely on Colorado River supplies have stepped up to propose reducing their water usage by up to 400,000 acrefeet each year beginning in 2023 through 2026 to protect storage in Lake Mead and help stabilize the Colorado River reservoir system.

In a letter to the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation and the U.S. Department of the Interior, four water agencies and the Colorado River Board of California volunteered to conserve water - totaling 1.6 million acre-feet over that four-year period - that otherwise would be used by California communities and farms to help stabilize low reservoirs amid unprecedented drought conditions across the Colorado River basin.

"Given dire drought conditions across the region and dangerously low reservoir levels, we firmly believe that all water users within the Basin must take immediate voluntary actions to stabilize water supplies in the Basin's major reservoirs," the letter stated.

The agencies – Metropolitan Water District of Southern California, Imperial Irrigation District, Coachella Valley Water District and Palo Verde Irrigation District said they would need to utilize funding opportunities provided by the federal Inflation Reduction Act and other federal programs to enable this voluntary conservation. They also said the voluntary conservation actions were dependent on a clear federal commitment to contribute to efforts to stabilize the Salton Sea, which is receding due to reduced inflows from existing water conservation actions in Imperial Valley and will further shrink as additional water is conserved in the region.

California has invested billions of dollars in urban and agricultural water conservation across Southern California through programs that reach virtually every Colorado River water user in the state. Since 2003, these conservation efforts have resulted in over 13 million acre-feet of Colorado River water being conserved and transferred to other water users in Southern California.

"California has long been a leader in water conservation within the Colorado River Basin, including through the nation's largest agricultural to urban water conservation and transfer program, the Quantification Settlement Agreement, and through billions of dollars in investments in agricultural and urban water conservation,"

the letter stated. "In fact, through a variety of activities, California's water agencies have voluntarily conserved nearly 2 million acre-feet of water supplies in Lake Mead since 2007 that has added more than twenty feet to Lake Mead elevations and aided other Lower Basin water users from experiencing previously agreed upon shortage reductions that would have otherwise occurred as early as 2015."

The letter noted that while a broader multi-state agreement to conserve water has not yet been reached, the California agencies are prepared to take voluntary action now - contingent on federal funding and commitments on the Salton Sea - to conserve water in coming months.

"California water agencies are stepping up in a big way with this proposal," explained California Natural Resources Secretary Wade Crowfoot. "Everyone in the basin agrees that extraordinary measures are needed to prevent the system from collapsing. But to date, months of negotiations have yielded no concrete action. Simply put, we can't wait any longer to act and are therefore stepping up to leave more water in the reservoirs. We hope water users across the basin will follow suit."

"The effects of climate-driven extremes are being felt across the West," said California Department of Water Resources Director Karla Nemeth. "The time to adapt is now, and California is aggressively moving to transform the way we use and manage water so we can thrive in a hotter, drier future."

In August, the Newsom Administration outlined actions it will take to help restore, recycle, de-salt and conserve water it will need to keep up with the impacts of climate change. "California's Water Supply Strategy, Adapting to a Hotter, Drier Future" calls for investing in new sources of water supply, accelerating projects and modernizing how the state manages water through new technology.

This year's state budget includes \$3.6 billion over four years for immediate drought support and long-term water resilience, including relief to hard-hit communities, water conservation and environmental protection for fish and wildlife. Including allocations made in the 2021 Budget, a total of \$8.7 billion has been dedicated to support drought resilience and response, enabling emergency drought response, improving water conservation to stretch water supplies, and supporting scores of local drought resilience projects.

Could the Ocean Slake California's Thirst?

"Water, water, every where, And all the boards did shrink; Water, water, every where, Nor any drop to drink."

Coleridge penned those words in his 1798 poem, "The Rime of the Ancient Mariner," to describe the plight of becalmed sailors who could die of thirst while surrounded by limitless expanses of undrinkable seawater.

In a way, it also describes California's plight. Despite its 3,427 miles of Pacific Ocean coastline, including bays, inlets and tidal marshes, the state has an ever-widening gap between its demand for water and its supply.

Naturally, there has been a decades-long debate over whether the state should tap into that endless supply of seawater to bridge the gap, emulating other arid and semi-arid societies, particularly in Australia and the Mideast.

From a technical standpoint, it's a no-brainer. Desalination plants, including a few already operating in California, do exactly what they are supposed to do — strip the salt from seawater, converting it into freshwater suitable for drinking or any other purpose. The barriers to

nation plants along the coast are economic, environmental and political.

oodles of electrical power to pump in the seawater, push it through filters that remove the salt and then return the uber-salty brine waste either to the sea or into another process.

A massive desal program would place a new burden on a power grid that already struggles to keep up with demand on very hot days as it evolves from Poet Samuel Taylor natural gas-fired power plants to renewable sources such as wind and solar. Desal's power demand also contributes heavily to the bottom line costs of producing water, making it more expensive, at least so far, than water from other sources.

> Finally, environmental groups have generally opposed desal projects on assertions that pumping seawater into the plants and returning brine to the sea run the risk of damaging delicate marine ecosystems. But the groups have another, unspoken reason for opposition. Restricted water supplies have been used as a tool to oppose new residential development and increasing water supply undercuts that political tool.

> In combination, all of those points were cited in the California Coastal Commission's rejection of a much-debated desal project at Huntington Beach in Orange County earlier this year. The plant would have been a near-clone of a desal facility in Carlsbad, further south along the coast.

building dozens of desali- to be a death knell for the expansion of desalination in California — something that Gov. Gavin Newsom's Such plants require administration envisions in its overall plan for closing the demand/supply gap as climate change and semi-perpetual drought diminish traditional supplies from winter rains and snowfall.

However, last month the Coastal Commission approved another Orange County desal project, one that would use somewhat different technology to pump in seawater and dilute the leftover brine before returning it to the sea.

Environmental groups gave their blessing to the Dana Point project, which made a big difference in the Coastal Commission's attitude, as is the fact that it's only one-tenth the size of the Huntington Beach project and would serve purely local customers of the South Coast Water District.

The approval was an indication that desalination could, as the state's water plan envisions, play a significant role in California's water future, which will be much different than its abundant past.

That said, desal probably wouldn't be the silver bullet of limitless supply that some have hoped it would be. It would be more of a reliability factor, something that Californians could depend on working when traditional supplies fall short.





every house that's up for sale. Now, are the buyers and the market as active and frenzied as they were several months ago? No. But you have to remember, the last couple of years have been crazy-strange times for the housing market.

I've been in the real estate business since 1978, and I've never seen anything like it. Usually, it takes about 90 days to sell a house. You'll get some offers, and none of them will be at full price, but everyone will have time to think about things. But in any economy, my advice to you would be don't buy another house until yours has sold. California Invests Nearly \$3 Billion for Transportation Improvements

Caltrans News Release

SANTA BARBARA, CA (MPG) - The California Transportation Commission (CTC) has allocated nearly \$3 billion for projects to repair and improve transportation infrastructure throughout the state. The allocation includes more than \$452 million in funding from the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021 (IIJA) and more than \$123 million in funding from Senate Bill (SB) 1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017.

"This allocation - which includes a significant federal investment – allows Caltrans and our local partners to continue building the equitable, sustainable, and safe transportation system on which future generations will depend," said Caltrans Director Tony Tavares.

Projects approved include:

\$3.5 million in federal IIJA funding for a City of Rancho Cordova project for roadway, sidewalk, curb ramp, bike lane and traffic signal improvements on Mather Field Road between Folsom Boulevard International Drive;

\$2 million in State Highway Operational and Protection Program (SHOPP) funds for project development and right of way costs for intersection

and safety improvements at Live Oak Boulevard/Encinal Road and State Route 99 in the Lomo Crossing area in Sutter

\$520,000 in SHOPP funds to develop a safety project for a new traffic signal at the intersection of State Route 32 and County Road P near Orland, Glenn County.

The CTC allocated more than \$2.1 billion to Caltrans' Division of Local Assistance in its annual federal fiscal year investment. These local assistance funds are used by more than 600 cities, counties and regional agencies throughout California to build and improve roads, bridges, tunnels and other transportation infrastructure, and for projects that enhance safety and help protect the environment. Annually, more than 1,200 new projects are authorized through the Local Assistance Program.

SB 1 provides \$5 billion in transportation funding annually that is shared equally between the state and local agencies. Road projects progress through construction phases more quickly based on the availability of SB 1 funds, including projects that are partially funded by SB 1. 



Sac State blows past Portland State, 45-17, to improve to 10-0

HILLSBORO, OR (MPG) - The No. 2 ranked Sacramento State football team remained unbeaten, earned its school-record 10th regular season victory and dominated Portland State in a 45-17 win at Hillsboro Stadium on a cold Friday

The Hornets are now 10-0 overall and 7-0 in the Big Sky Conference. The 10 wins breaks the school regular season record of nine which came in 2019 and 2021. It also equals the best win total for any season, matching the effort of the 1988 team which ended the year 10-3 with the help of two NCAA Div. II playoff wins.

Sacramento State has now won 18 consecutive Big Sky games which is the second longest streak in league history. The team has also won 14 straight road games against FCS teams, and 10 road games against all opponents — the longest streak in FBS or FCS.

The game had a wild start with three combined fumbles, two plays of at least 30 yards, and a touchdown in the first six minutes. The Vikings took the opening kickoff and picked up 33 yards on their first play of the game. The team then coughed it up on the next play and the ball was recovered by Brock Mather.

Sacramento State quickly gained 44 yards on a pass from Asher O'Hara to Pierre Williams to get inside the 10-yard line. Facing 3rd-and-goal, Asher O'Hara tried to spin his way into the end zone but had the ball knocked loose and recovered by PSU for a touchback.

Two plays later, Portland

State attempted a trick play with a double reverse which was bobbled on the toss and recovered by Killian Rosko inside the 20. Sacramento State finally broke through with a 5-yard pass from O'Hara to Williams to give the Hornets a 7-0 lead.

The Hornets added to their lead early in the second quarter with a 41-yard field goal from Kyle Sentkowski. The Hornets brought the ball to the 11-yard line during the drive but were driven back to the 23 following a sack on third down. A strong headwind was no challenge for Sentkowski who made his 12th consecutive field goal this year.

The lead continued to grow with a 7-play, 80-yard

drive which resulted in a touchdown with 7:49 left in the second quarter. The big play during the drive was a 41-yard rush from Cameron Skattebo and the drive ended with a 4-yard pass from Jake Dunniway to Pierre Williams for the score. The score marked, surprisingly, just the second multi-touchdown game of Williams' brilliant career. The second score moved him into a tie with Marshel Martin for third place in school history with 21 receiving TDs.

After a three-and-out from the defense, the offense kept rolling with a 5-play, 73-yard drive which ended with a 39-yard TD run from O'Hara for his longest rush of the season. The touchdown also extended O'Hara's streak to all 10 games of this season and 12 straight games dating back to last year.

Sacramento State needed just three plays to score on the first series of the second half. The drive was setup by a 38-yard kickoff return from Elijah Tao-Tolliver. Jake Dunniway then found Williams for a 51-yard gain which pushed the receiver over the century mark. Marcus Fulcher then cut back to his left for a 4-yard score just 70 seconds into the half.

Portland State started the second half with senior Nathan West at quarterback. The Vikings ran on the first 11 plays of the drive and were able to bring the ball into the red zone before

settling for a 32-yard field goal from Gianni Smith for the team's first points.

Sacramento State answered with another quick touchdown drive. After Skattebo went over 100 yards during the series, Fulcher took an option toss from O'Hara and eluded defenders for a 35-yard score.

The fourth quarter had another wild stretch. The Hornets first stopped Portland State inside the 1-yard line on fourth down. The offense moved the ball out of the shadow of its own goalpost but fumbled. That turnover set up a 36-yard touchdown rush from Quincy Craig for Portland State's first touchdown.

The Viks then attempted


an onsides kick which was picked cleanly by Martin who returned it 45 yards for a touchdown.

Sacramento State finished the game with 451 yards on just 56 plays for an average of 8.1 yards per play. The team rushed for 237 yards and threw for 214.

The quarterback tandem of Dunniway and O'Hara combined to complete 15-of-21 passes with each throwing a touchdown without an interception.

Sacramento State's final regular season game will come on Nov. 19 in the Causeway Classic against UC Davis at 2 p.m. The Hornets can clinch at least a share of the Big Sky title with a win.
