## Sacramento Locals Prepare For Baseball's Biggest Stage

**SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)** - Despite the San Francisco Giants and Oakland Athletics missing the playoffs this season, Sacramentans still have a lot to look forward to with the 2022 World Series beginning this Friday, October 28.

Three Sacramento-area locals will be participating in this year's Fall Classic, with two on the field and one in the dugout. Philadelphia Phillies first baseman Rhys Hoskins stands on one side representing the 916. On the other side stands utility player Mauricio Dubón and manager Dusty Baker for the Houston Astros.

Hoskins has played for the Phillies his entire career since being drafted in the fifth round of the 2014 Major League Baseball (MLB) Draft out of Sacramento State. Before becoming a Hornet, Hoskins played locally at Jesuit High School in Carmichael. This is Hoskins' first playoffs and World Series appearances as Philadelphia snapped an 11-year postseason drought this year.

Baker is back for more after reaching the World Series with Houston last year. After playing 19 years in the big leagues, Baker is in his 25th year as an MLB manager. He led the Giants to the World Series in 2002 and now the Astros to back-to-back appearances in 2021 and 2022.

Baker holds the record for most wins among managers who have yet to win a World Series. He went to Del Campo High School in Fair Oaks and still has a Sacramento residence to this day. His son, Darren, played at Jesuit until 2017 and was drafted by the Washington Nationals in the 10th round of the 2021 MLB Draft.

Dubón has had two stints in Sacramento, both as an amateur and as a professional. After growing up in Honduras, Dubón moved to Sacramento as a 15-year-old to play baseball at Capital Christian High School in Rosemont. He was drafted in

## Who Let the Dogs Out? We Did.

**SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG)** - It was all fun and games for the dogs at Sacramento County's Bradshaw Animal Shelter last month.

The shelter was chosen to participate in three intensive, all-day training workshops with Dogs Playing for Life (DPFL), a 501c3 nonprofit organization rooted in a dog's natural instinct to play. The sessions, which taught staff how to conduct successful large-scale playgroups to increase dogs' adoption prospects as well as provide efficient and effective socialization and exercise, took place from Sept. 28 - 30, 2022. Over three days and a series of playgroups, more than 100 dogs ran,

wrestled and rolled around together.

The play model is part of an innovative approach to animal sheltering: one that aims to make a stay at the shelter more like a fun trip to summer camp and less

like time behind bars. DPFL furthered staff's expertise of dog behavior by teaching them how to assess nuances of play styles and body language in order to create dog playgroups that bring out the best in

animals while minimizing the risk of injury or spread of infection.

"A big misconception is that it's too risky to let dogs play or that shelter dogs have to be carefully

# Hornets Rally for 31-24 Overtime Win Over Montana

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - The Sacramento State football team scored the final 17 points of the game to defeat No. 7 Montana, 31-24, in overtime in front of 15,927 fans and a national television audience on Saturday night at Hornet Stadium.

The Hornets, who are ranked second in the FCS media poll and third in the coaches poll, are now 7-0 overall for the first time in school history and stand at 4-0 in the Big Sky Conference. Montana dropped to 5-2 overall and 2-2 in league play.

Sacramento State never led in regulation and took its first lead of the game in overtime when Asher O'Hara rushed for a 7-yard touchdown to punctuate a four-play series with all 25 yards coming on the ground.

Montana had an opportunity to match the score and began its series with a 2-yard rush up the middle. The Griz then attempted three consecutive passes, including a fourth-down pass into the end zone, but all three fell incomplete.

The Hornets forced overtime with two scores in the final six minutes. Kyle Sentkowski made a 27-yard field goal with 5:54 remaining to make it a one-possession game at 24-17. The Hornets then lined the ensuing kickoff off a Montana player and the loose ball was recovered by Sacramento State. The Hornets faced 4th-and-4 during the next series but kept the drive alive when Jared Gipson was able to get his toes down for a 26-yard reception before stepping out at the 4-yard line. One play later, O'Hara went around the right end for his first score of the night to tie the game, 24-24, with 3:39 showing.

The Griz picked up a first down on its next possession but were hurt by an offensive pass interference call on 3rd-and-7 which eventually forced the team to punt. Sacramento State drove

to the Montana 38 with one second remaining but opted against attempting a long field goal into the wind and instead threw a Hail Mary into the end zone which was intercepted.

Montana scored the game's first points with a 15-play, 88-yard drive which was capped by 2-yard rush from Marcus Knight. The Grizzlies converted all three of their third down attempts during the series and the score marked the first time the Hornets have trailed in the last 470 minutes; 31 seconds of regular season play.

Montana stretched its lead to 10-0 after recovering a Hornet fumble on their own side of the 50.

Sacramento State posted its first points of the game on the next drive as the team needed just three plays to cover 75 yards. Cameron Skattebo started the drive with a 39-yard run around the right end. Two plays later, Jake Dunniway stepped up in the pocket and connected with Marshel Martin for a 38-yard touchdown pass up the

middle of the field.

Montana had one final chance to add points at the end of the half but Caleb Nelson blocked a 39-yard field goal attempt as time expired. That effort followed a block by Marte Mapu on a 45-yard attempt early in the second quarter.

The slugfest continued into the third quarter where the only points of the period came after a lengthy review. A pass from Kris Brown to Aaron Fontes was originally ruled incomplete plus a late hit was called against the Griz which set up a 3rd-and-25. However, the play went to replay review and Fontes was ruled to get his left foot inside the end zone for a 16-yard touchdown.

Sacramento State needed just six seconds to score in the fourth quarter. Dunniway found Pierre Williams in stride for a 45-yard touchdown. That drive was aided by the late hit on the previous touchdown which was enforced on the kickoff and helped the

Hornets return the ball to their own 45 yard line.

Montana immediately responded with a 13-play drive which ended with a 2-yard touchdown rush from Nick Ostmo with 8:42 left in the game. The Griz picked up three first downs on third-down plays, including drawing a pass interference flag which brought the ball to the 3-yard line.

The game was billed as strength against strength as Sacramento State came in ranked fourth in total offense while Montana was third in total defense. The Hornets finished the game with 479 offensive yards, including 180 on the ground. While those numbers were below Sacramento State's season average, both were high allowed by the Griz this season.

Cameron Skattebo rushed for 111 yards and averaged 8.5 yards per carry to post his third consecutive 100-yard game and his fifth of the season. Skattebo's total was also a season high against Montana which had not allowed

any player to rush for more than 88 yards in a game this season.


Jake Dunniway was 19-of-36 for 284 yards and three touchdowns but also threw three interceptions. Asher O'Hara was 2-of-4 passes for 15 yards and added 56 rushing yards with two scores.

Marshel Martin caught six passes for 75 yards and a score while Gipson provided five catches for 66 yards.

The Hornet defense saw career highs by Brock Mather and Jett Stanley who tallied 13 and 10 tackles, respectively. Prince Washington, Marte Mapu, Armon Bailey and Killian Rosko each had nine stops.

Montana ran 24 more plays than Sacramento State (95-71) and dominated time of possession, holding the ball for 37:51.

Sacramento State will next host Idaho on Saturday, Oct. 29, at 6 p.m. for Homecoming. The Vandals improved to 5-2 overall and 4-0 in the Big Sky with a 56-21 win over Portland State. ★

"Our STARS volunteers play such an important role in helping kids get on track with reading, but they also become role models for the kids and help them build confidence," said Dr. Dawnté Early, president and CEO, United Way California Capital Region. "We know that if kids aren't reading at grade level by fourth grade, they will have a much harder time keeping up in all school subjects. We also know that education is a ladder out of poverty. Our STARS volunteers can truly change the course of a child's life." The local United Way has been helping children improve literacy for more than five years,

United Way's STARS uses the BookNook platform to virtually work through literacy curriculum with participants and build their vocabulary, fluency and comprehension skills through a variety of games, books and lessons provided in the online portal during the pandemic. Law enforcement has recently made the first significant rainbow fentanyl fake M30 pill seizure in the Sacramento region. These colorful fentanyl pills look exactly like Smarties candies, and they are designed to attract kids and teens. With Halloween coming up, DA Schubert urges parents, guardians, educators and community leaders to talk to kids and teens about the fentanyl epidemic, how they're being targeted with rainbow pills and how to avoid

becoming a victim of fentanyl poisoning. Quick facts include: Fentanyl is deadly: just a few grains can kill; Fentanyl is everywhere: fake pills, powders, party drugs, now rainbow pills disguised as candy; 99% of Oxycodone M30 pills seized and tested in Sacramento County contain fentanyl; It's virtually

impossible to tell if a pill, or any form of a drug, is fake and contains fentanyl; If a drug didn't come from a pharmacy, assume it contains fentanyl. More information on the fentanyl epidemic and resources to help prevent fentanyl deaths can be found at 1pillcankillsac.com. ★

# Who Let the Dogs Out? We Did.

taught how to socialize," said Lauren Revier, Program and Research Administrator for DPFL. "It's natural for dogs to interact and play, and when playgroups are approached thoughtfully, most dogs can participate and enjoy them." Dogs that have the most difficult time getting adopted stay in shelters the longest and are most at risk of developing behavioral issues due to prolonged shelter stress are generally those that aren't social with other dogs. Most adopters and rescue groups seek out dogs that play well with others since the majority of homes interested in fostering or adoption already have at least one dog at home. These playgroups can help the less social dogs develop the dog-to-dog skills they need to adopt and succeed in their new homes. "When you focus on meeting a dog's needs—their needs for mental enrichment, physical exercise and socialization—you see that many behavioral issues tend to disappear

or are greatly reduced," said Annette Bedsworth, Director of Bradshaw Animal Shelter. "Oftentimes, we can meet those needs through one simple thing: play. We're not only going to see major quality of life increases for our dogs by implementing more playgroups, but by making our shelter a place that prioritizes the opportunity for dogs to safely have fun and just be dogs, we're going to be able to save even more lives." Shelter staff plan to carry out what they learned from DPFL in ongoing future playgroups. In large municipal shelters like Bradshaw Animal Shelter, where the numbers often tip past 300 pets on site, it is a daily endeavor for shelter staff and volunteers to ensure every animal gets quality time outside of their kennels each day. Not only will the playgroups give dogs more time to run free, but they will enable staff and volunteers to spend individualized time with dogs that need it most, such as the ones that are extremely scared and shut down in the shelter environment. ★

# CHP Receives Grant to Increase Safety for Motorcyclists

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - The California Highway Patrol (CHP) will implement a yearlong federal grant to help save lives and reduce the risk associated with riding a motorcycle.

The goal of the Get Educated and Ride Safe (GEARS) V grant is to decrease the number of motorcycle-involved crashes and victims through education and enforcement efforts across California through September 30, 2023.

From October 1, 2020, to September 30, 2021, there were 7,078 motorcycle-involved crashes resulting in 354 deaths and 6,400 injuries within CHP jurisdiction, an increase of 3 percent over the previous 12 months.

"Motorcycle riders are statistically more likely to be injured or killed when involved in a crash," said CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray. "In an effort to ensure every motorist reaches their destination safely, the CHP will continue to use enforcement and

non-enforcement strategies, including education and community engagement, to target the leading causes of traffic deaths."

During the grant period, the CHP will participate in traffic safety education efforts, such as

"May is Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month." These campaigns will promote the use of U.S. Department of Transportation-compliant helmets for all riders and raise driver awareness of sharing the road with motorcyclists. The CHP will also increase enforcement in areas with a high number of motorcycle-involved crashes, which resulted from speed, improper turns, and driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs.

Funding for this program was provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

The mission of the CHP is to provide the highest level of Safety, Service, and Security. ★

# California May Reallocate Shrinking Water Supply

While it's not yet formal policy, those who manage California's vast water system are edging toward a historic reallocation of the state's shrinking supply that could have a life-altering impact on its largest-in-the-nation agricultural industry.

For many years, farmers have used about 80% of the water diverted from rivers for human use, with the rest going to urban areas for drinking, watering lawns, maintaining swimming pools, taking showers, cooking and commercial or industrial use.

Prolonged drought has compelled all users to make do with less. However, the biggest loser has been the environment — free flows to maintain habitat for fish and other aquatic species — which generally gets about 50% of the total flow.

In recent years, federal judges have ordered cuts in agricultural water diversions to enforce the Endangered Species Act and the state Water Resources Control Board has moved in the same direction on an emergency basis due to drought. However, environmental groups want permanent habitat-enhancing reductions.

Former Gov. Jerry Brown and his successor, Gavin Newsom, have sought "voluntary agreements" by

which agricultural water agencies would curtail diversions to maintain river flows, but results have been scanty at best.

Without such agreements, the water board could implement mandatory reductions, but they would be viewed by farmers as an assault on their historic water rights and probably trigger massive legal battles.

The key principle in these conflicts is that water belongs to the public as a whole and must be put to "beneficial use," as defined in a 1943 law that implemented a constitutional declaration passed by voters in 1928. The law commands authorities to prevent "waste or unreasonable use or unreasonable method of use of water..."

Environmentalists believe the constitution thus authorizes the state water board to curtail agricultural diversions for the protection of habitat, but the 1943 law also declares, "In the enactment of this code the Legislature does not intend thereby to effect any change in the law relating to water rights."

That obvious legal dichotomy is the crux of the situation.

Whether, indeed, the state water board is gearing up for a showdown over water rights, some of which stretch back to the 19th century, is the subject of much speculation in water circles.

Early this year, water board chairman Joaquin Esquivel told a gathering of water officials, "We know we have to change the system. Water rights can be there as a tool to be able to manage supplies through not just a drought but when

there is water again. Our water rights system can be there to facilitate decisions on projects and help us make decisions, or they can be a hindrance."

While the water rights issue percolates in Northern California, there's a similar conflict underway in Southern California over how much water the state diverts from a severely threatened Colorado River.

California is legally entitled to 4.4 million acre-feet per year, with the vast majority of that going to the Imperial Irrigation District and other agricultural users, but the Colorado's flow has dropped dramatically.

The federal government demands that California and other states that draw from the river, principally Nevada and Arizona, reduce diversions by 2-to-4 million acre-feet per year, and threatens to mandate cuts under the "beneficial use" doctrine if they cannot agree.

California has offered a 400,000 acre-foot reduction, only 9%, but that's not enough to satisfy the other states and the outcome is very much in doubt. Meanwhile, the feds are offering Colorado water users \$400 for every acre-foot of water they don't take.

Farmers' water rights are clearly not as sacrosanct as they once seemed to be, and as drought persists the stage is being set for a monumental reckoning of some kind.

# Spooky, Creepy and Tasty Too

Halloween straddles fall and winter... life and death. It's thought to have originated with the ancient Celtic festival of Samhain. People would light bonfires and wear costumes to ward off roaming ghosts. The Celts, who lived some 2,000 years ago in the area that is now Ireland, the United Kingdom, and Northern France celebrated the New Year on November 1. Then Halloween came to America, but extremely limited in colonial England because of the rigid Protestants. It was much more common in Maryland and the southern colonies. Today's tradition probably dates back to the early All Soul's Day parades in England. During the festivities, poor citizens would beg for food and families would give them pastries called "soul cakes" in return for their promise to pray for the family's dead relatives. The soul cake was encouraged by the church as a way to replace the ancient practice of leaving wine and food for roaming spirits. Merging different ethnic groups and Native American Indians gave America its own Halloween. The first ones were party-driven and public events to celebrate the harvest. Neighbors would share stories of the dead and tell fortunes. Colonial Halloween festivals added ghost stories and America began dressing in costumes and going house to house



asking for money for food. That's when "trick or treat" was born. Young women believed they could divine the name or appearance of their future husband by doing tricks with yarn, apple parings and mirrors. By the late 1800s, there was a move to mold Halloween into a holiday more about community and neighborly get-togethers than about ghosts, pranks and witchcraft.

Through the generosity of the *The Rio Linda News*, this column serves to provide an update about matters affecting the community of Rio Linda.

As I come to the close of my sixth year on the Board of Supervisors, I have seen many issues fall and rise in terms of importance for the residents of Sacramento County. For example, homelessness went from an issue that I barely ever received a phone call about when I first entered office, and transformed into one of the biggest issues on most people's minds. But one issue has remained troubling to Sacramento County residents since the day I entered office until now, and that is the deplorable condition of Sacramento County roads. I fully sympathize with these concerns because I am also upset. My house backs up to Madison avenue, and every single day that I leave my home I am driving on road conditions that are frankly embarrassing. And due to this, one of the primary questions I receive from people when I speak in my community meetings is "why can't you fix the roads in the County?" I wish it were that simple, because if it were I would have done it years ago. So I want to take this opportunity to explain why it's not so simple, and what we can do to change things. What many people do not understand is that the vast majority of funds that are spent on local roads are

from the state and federal government. Not only that, but many of these funds are competitive dollars, meaning we are only going to win those funds for major projects that have nothing to do with resurfacing, like the road widening happening right now on Hazel Avenue. So even if I wanted to prioritize local road resurfacings, the money Sacramento County could divert towards roads would be insignificantly small compared to what the state and federal government have the ability to do.

The problem Sacramento County is experiencing with our roads is not localized to just our county or even region. This is a problem afflicting the entire State of California, as of last count our state had over \$47.3 billion in road maintenance that has been postponed due to not having enough money for our roads, highways, and bridges (also called deferred maintenance). This enormous deferred maintenance bill would feel more understandable if California was broke, but at the same time we have this bill we are spending outrageous amounts of money on California High-Speed Rail (CAHSR), which in my opinion is only a fraction as important as having reliable roads. CAHSR has the potential to benefit a small fraction of the population, specifically those that would use it to commute. Meanwhile, roads are used by everyone, including passengers, freight, fire service, police service, etc. To top it off, the train doesn't even come close to Sacramento County, as the furthest north it goes is San Francisco.

When voters approved CAHSR in 2008, it was supposed to cost \$34 billion and be completed by 2020 connecting San Francisco to Los Angeles. Four years ago this price tag had risen to \$79 billion, earlier this year the 2022 draft business plan estimated it would cost \$105 billion, and just three months later the "final plan" raised the estimate to \$113 billion. And not only do these costs continue to rise, but there is still no certainty the complete project will ever get built. Just the Merced to Bakersfield section of the project (which is supposedly the "easiest" section to build) has an earliest competition date of 2029, but this is a date that just keeps getting extended, as four years ago that date was 2024.

Even if we let CAHSR continue to build the central valley line and we abandoned CAHSR after that, we would save enough money to pay for every cent of deferred maintenance for all roads, highways, and bridges in California. The California Legislature and the Governor have the capacity to fix our roads, they just need to change their priorities and focus on what California needs the most.
