Bill Signed to Crack Down on Street Racing and Illegal Sideshows

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -On Monday, September 19, Gov. Gavin Newsom signed Assembly Bill (AB) 2000, which will prohibit street racing and sideshows from occurring in parking lots across the state.

The bipartisan measure, authored by Assemblymember Jesse Gabriel (D - Woodland Hills), aims to crack down on dangerous driving – including street racing, "sideshows," and street takeovers – which continue to cause injuries and fatalities across California.

"Far too frequently, street racing and illegal sideshows devastate families, harm innocent bystanders, and cut short young lives," said Assemblymember Jesse Gabriel. "Communities in the San Fernando Valley and across California are sick and tired of this reckless behavior. I'm grateful for Governor Newsom's leadership on cracking down on this dangerous activity and signing this commonsense measure that will save lives across our state." "AB 2000 will help us save lives and prevent further crashes and drivers going to prison for manslaughter," said Lili Trujillo, Founder and Executive Director of Street Racing Kills, a non-profit created in 2014 after Trujillo's 16-year-old daughter, Valentina, was killed in a street racing incident. "An exhibition of speed in a parking lot is way too common now and people are being hurt and killed, AB 2000 is definitely a great tool to help us save lives." "There are countless stories every week throughout California about illegal street races and dangerous sideshows shutting down streets, causing accidents, damaging neighborhoods, and endangering lives," said Assemblymember Vince Fong (R - Kern County), a joint author of the measure. "They are unpredictable, destructive, and can lead to senseless deaths that devastate families. AB 2000 is an important and needed step in cracking down on illegal sideshows to make our communities safer." Across the state, COVID-19 has caused a sharp rise in illegal street racing activity as drivers took advantage of roads emptied by stay-athome orders. Bill Signed to Crack Down on Street Racing and Illegal Sideshows

responded to more than 25,000 calls involving illegal street racing activity statewide, an alarming increase of more than 3,500 calls from the year before.

In Southern California, street racing and sideshows have become extremely popular. In August and October of 2021, respectively, a Calabasas teen was among three people killed by apparent street racers in a three-vehicle collision in Burbank caused by street racing, and a Woodland Hills woman was killed and seven others were injured after a driver lost control while racing. Just last week, police arrested three dozen people at several illegal street takeovers in and around Los Angeles and the San Fernando Valley.

Statewide law enforcement groups have identified driver's license suspensions as an effective tool for the deterrence of illegal street racing activity. Expanding on AB 3, which was signed into law last year, AB 2000 allows courts to issue a driver's license suspension for the exhibition of motor vehicle speed during a sideshow taking place in a parking lot – an area not currently covered under the law – and thereby helps to further deter individuals from engaging in these dangerous activities.

Assistance to the Homeless – A Caveat

Two articles on homelessness in the August 19 edition of The Rio Linda News support one another nicely. The first one titled, "Two Ordinances to Prohibit Camping Approved," outlines the substance of the two new ordinances and explains some of their legal consequences, while the second column by County supervisor Sue Frost gives her rationale in favor of these measures.

Growing up hitchhiking put me in many homeless encampments, known then as hobo jungles. Weeklong trips like from California to Alaska tested my survival skills and now I do have a degree of empathy for those who have moved from their home to their relatives' home to their friends' home to a day-by-day hotel (room) to a trailer with no wheels to a trailer with wheels to an automobile to a tent to a bus stop cover. This list is not comprehensive: the main thing missing is the key to the ordinances, the most controversial alternative—the mental health "assistance."

Most analysts will attribute the increase in the homeless population to the closing of the mental health institutions which had been the source of an incredible

misuse of governmental authority. Watch

"The Snakepit" (1948) to get a glimpse of the unimaginable conditions that actually existed in most of the mental health 'alternatives.' So the public forced the closing and the outlawing of involuntarily imprisoning people in one of these warehouses even if they were clearly nuts.

Not having any reason to do educate myself on this issue, I am unsure whether the words 'are a danger to self or others' can justify involuntarily keeping someone in a mental health facility against (his) will. But the gradual reformation of this type of mental health 'assistance' is precisely the thing that can make or break the potential good work that well-meaning ordinances such as these can supply.

Having seen our society with and without this ingredient for solving this huge problem, I personally support Supervisor Frost and these ordinances with the caveat that we have to be very careful not to repeat the horrors of history. A careful reading of this, i.e., frontal lobotomies, can help steer toward a middle route that protects society without destroying the individual who may not agree with your definition of 'help.'

H and K Family Farms was founded in 2013 by Maceo Hart-Kapic. It was originally located on the historical Gibson Ranch County Park and now is on three main farm sites. Maceo informed everyone that Gibson Ranch will have a pumpkin patch from October 1-31, 2022, on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

Also, there is an Oktoberfest car and boat show at Dry Creek Ranch House on October 1, 2022, from 9 am to 2 pm sponsored by the Rio Linda Elverta Lions Club.







The Utility of the Future Today

COVID-19 School Closures Undermined Learning

Whether California's schools should remain open or be closed was a hot issue when the COVID-19 pandemic was raging in 2020 and 2021.

Although medical authorities quickly concluded that children had a much smaller risk of being infected or experiencing severe effects if infected, California schools were mostly closed, in large measure because teachers and their powerful unions insisted on it.

With schools closed, local administrators scrambled Department of Education to provide on-line classes. what became known as "zoom school," but they allow comparisons with were poor substitutes for the real thing — especially for English-learner students and those from poor families.

Those children roughly 60% of the state's nearly 6 million public school students — were already trailing their more privileged contemporaries academically when the pandemic hit. The closures made it worse, for obvious reasons.

Affluent parents, particularly those who could easily work from home during the pandemic, made certain that their kids attended on-line classes, helped them with their school work, formed informal collaboration groups and/or hired tutors. Thus, the ill effects of closures were mitigated. And, of course, private schools, such as the one Gov. Gavin Newsom's kids attend, ers did not meet grade-level either remained open or minimized closures.

For months, politicians from Newsom downward quarreled over how the schools should function and angry parents formed the core of a movement to recall him from office. Newsom survived the recall, but the educations of millions of kids did not, as new data confirm.

While the state has not released 2022 academic test data that would pre-pandemic results, individual school districts are doing so and the numbers from the state's largest school district, Los Angeles Unified, are stunning.

About 72% of the district's students are not meeting state standards in math and 58% are behind in English, essentially wiping out five years of progress that it had recorded prior to the pandemic.

"The pandemic deeply Supt. Alberto Carvalho said. "Particularly kids who were prior to the pandemic, as we

While the district released gross data, it did not break down the test results by ethnic or economic subgroups. The Los Angeles Times, however, gleaned the detail from a school board document marked "not for public release."

Why the secrecy? Apparently, it was to mask the particularly disturbing data about Black and Latino kids.

"About 81% of 11th-gradstandards in math. About 83% of Black students, 78% of Latino students and 77% of economically disadvantaged students did not meet the math standards," the Times reported.

We won't know how the state as a whole fared until — and unless — the Department of Education finally releases 2022 complete "Smarter Balance" test results. But there's no reason to believe that what happened — or, more accurately, what didn't happen — in Los Angeles isn't also true of other systems, particularly those with large numbers of at-risk students.

The educational deprivation that California inflicted on its kids is not only shameful, but will reverberate for decades. Children who fail to master the basics of education in lower grades will be ill-prepared for high school and post-high school training and education. If they are not prepared to take their place in the work force, the state's economy will suffer.

Flood Insurance Industry Undergoing Massive Regulatory Change

In this age of extreme weather and worsening natural disasters, it is crucial that we refresh and modernize our approach to disaster mitigation and recovery. A good place to start would be floods, which cost our nation approximately \$17 billion in damages each year.

Californians who live in a 'mandatory' flood zone as defined by FEMA are required by lenders to obtain flood insurance before purchasing their home. Residents in such zones must acquire flood insurance as a condition of the home purchase, and they have historically purchased insurance from the federal government through the National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). Pending regulatory changes would allow private insurers to better compete with government insurance, but for the moment the NFIP enjoys an effective monopoly in mandatory zones. However, it's important to understand that damaging floods occur outside these 'mandatory' zones every year. Approximately 20% of NFIP claims, for example, come from flood events in FEMA's 'moderate' and 'low' risk zones, where residents are not required to purchase flood insurance. According to the NFIP's own flood calculator, just one inch of standing water due to flooding can cause \$25,000 dollars of damage to a home.

Consumers deserve choice, especially considering government-mandated changes to NFIP that will dramatically increase the cost of government flood insurance to cover program losses. How big a change? According to analysis by Redfin, 81% of the NFIP flood policyholders are seeing an increase in their premium as of April 1 of this year. In California, 79% of NFIP policyholders are now paying more for their government insurance. The NFIP price hike impacts all types of communities but is most pronounced in majority-Hispanic neighborhoods, where 84% of residents have seen their premiums increase.

The combination of under-insurance and price hikes raises troubling questions about our collective resilience to flood damage. According to the First

Street Foundation, our country's annual losses from flood – currently at \$17 billion – could grow to \$32 billion by the year 2051. Of course, this figure does not include the cumulative cost of tornadoes, hurricanes and other wind events, fires, and earthquakes. Over the past five years, the average annual cost for all natural disasters in the United States was \$51 billion. If policyholders facing premium hikes discontinue NFIP coverage, the costs of uninsured losses will be borne by American communities and threaten the ability of government entities at all levels to finance needed repairs and recovery efforts.

In short, we need to stop depending solely on government to restore our communities after disaster strikes. We envision a chain of community resilience where government, NGOs, community leaders and insurers work seamlessly to maximize available resources in support of Americans in need. A property that lacks adequate protection against flood or other events creates costs that are shifted to other links in the chain of resilience - government aid, or NGOs and philanthropies. In an era of tightening budgets and worsening weather, this is not sustainable.

The urgent order of business is to ensure that Californians are aware of their risk from flood damage and have multiple affordable options to protect their families. Private flood insurance is now an even more attractive alternative for California families and businesses, especially in an age of higher prices for everything from gasoline to housing. It's crucial that Californians educate themselves about their options and potential alternatives to the NFIP. Above all, it's crucial that vulnerable homes and businesses obtain coverage so that costs of recovery are not transferred to the federal government or to NGOs. The time to update our approach to disaster response is here, and we must seize the moment.





Rio Linda Crash Kills Unborn Baby, Leaves Six Injured

RIO LINDA, CA (MPG) - Six people were injured and a fetus was left dead on Friday night in Rio Linda following a vehicle crash, according to the North Sacramento California Highway Patrol.

Law enforcement officials

received calls around 9:11 p.m. on September 16 about a sideshow taking place. The location was in Sacramento County at the intersection of Elverta Road at Dutch Haven Boulevard, the CHP said.

At the behest of the CHP, Over 100 people attending the sideshow quickly dispersed after blocking the intersection.

The CHP attempted to conduct a traffic stop with a pregnant 17-year-old who was driving a Honda Accord with two adults and a juvenile as passengers.

According to the CHP, the Livermore native refused to stop, leading to the high-speed chase. An innocent bystander in a Honda Civic was driving eastbound through the Dry Creek

Road and Elkhorn Boulevard intersection when they collided with the Accord who ran a red light, causing the crash.

The 17-year-old driver, who was pregnant, suffered major injuries that killed the fetus. The three other passengers in the Accord were also taken to the hospital for medical treatment. One of the six victims was trapped in their vehicle and were extricated.

The east Bay Area driver was medically cleared and booked into the Sacramento County Juvenile Hall on multiple charges. According to police, drugs and alcohol were not present on the scene and do not appear to have factored in the collision.




