Grants Aiming to Help

California to give \$2,500 training grant to workers who lost jobs during pandemic

Living through a pandemic stinks, but for Diana McLaughlin, early 2020 was especially bad: A divorce in February 2020, societal shut-down in March, and as part of the COVID-19 economic

fallout, she lost her job in April of that year, returning to full-time work only 18 months later. California lawmakers had economically distressed folks like McLaughlin in mind when last year they approved half a billion dollars on education grants worth

\$2,500 to help workers displaced by the pandemic acquire new job-related skills. McLaughlin is among the first 3,000 or so recipients of this grant, adult learners who were issued checks in a pilot program this spring and summer. Now the state is opening the grant to a wide range of adults with low incomes who lost their jobs or saw their hours severely cut during the pandemic. Half of the grant funds are reserved for displaced workers with children under 18. Officials expect to reach 190,000 people with this money, called the Golden

State Education and Training Grant Program. Among the few stipulations to receive the grant, applicants must fill out a short application that takes about 10 minutes to complete and attest that they lost a job or hours after March 4 2020, when Gov. Gavin Newsom declared a state of emergency. Applicants also must affirm that they weren't enrolled in an educational or job-training program when they lost their jobs. There's an income threshold as well. Part of what makes the application quick to complete is how little it

Board Revises Approved FY 2022-23 Budget

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors voted on September 7, 2022, to revise the Approved Budget for the 2022-23 fiscal year.

The Approved Budget in June totaled \$7.3 billion. With the completion of the County's FY 2022-23 year-end financial closing activities and updated information, an increase of \$540 million was proposed, bringing the Budget Recommended for Adoption to \$7.9 billion in appropriations. The increase includes a \$228 million increase in General Fund appropriations, and a \$313 million increase in appropriations in other funds.

The increase in General Fund appropriations included \$19 million of additional investments in new or enhanced programs, including addressing critical needs related to homelessness and behavioral health.

Among other additional allocations, the Board set aside \$5 million for a pilot project aimed at utilizing property tax rebates for participating multi-family landlords to provide housing at below-market rates.

According to First District Supervisor Phil Serna, who proposed the idea, "It would work much the same as Williamson Act Contracts except that instead of providing a property tax break to farmers who conserve agricultural acreage, the purpose here would be to provide a valuable tax incentive to property owners who agree to offer rental units at affordable rates."

Serna continued by stating, "As far as we know, this idea has not been tried before, but given the dearth of affordable housing, it is incumbent on us to try new, creative ways to keep our constituents from spiraling into the depths of homeless."

The proposal means county executive staff will work in the coming months to design the mechanics of the proposal and deploy it with the intent of assessing its efficacy so that it might be considered for expansion at a later date.

The Board of Supervisors approved the following additional costs, totaling \$10 million:

\$5 million to establish a reserve for an Affordable Housing Incentive Pilot Program; \$3 million to the Neighborhood Revitalization Fund for a Neighborhood Improvement Initiative,

FBI Field Office Warns of Scammers Posing as FBI Agents

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Federal Bureau of Investigation Sacramento Field Office (FBI Sacramento) is cautioning the public to be wary of any unsolicited call, especially if the caller claims to be from the FBI. “Nothing sends a person into a panic like a call from law enforcement, especially when the call informs them that they have been a victim of a crime or may be wanted for a crime,” explained Acting Special Agent in Charge Dennis Guertin. “Sadly, that response is something scammers are leveraging with increased frequency, so it is important to educate the public about what to look out for.” Scammers are sophisticated and any unsolicited call, text or email can be a path for a scammer to attempt to gain your trust and separate you from your hard-earned money. To ensure your security and safety: Never click on links contained in unsolicited emails or texts. The links may route you to fake websites or deploy malicious software on your phone or computer; Never trust the caller ID number; the displayed telephone number can be manipulated with software; Never be afraid to hang up on an unsolicited caller; Always consider sending unsolicited

phone calls to voicemail. Most scam call centers will not leave a message; Always check the email address of seemingly official communications and feel free to reach out to your bank or credit card company directly by calling the telephone number on the back of your card to verify if the email is legitimate. Some scammers impersonate FBI agents over the phone. “The public should not be afraid to hang up on an alleged agent. An authentic FBI agent will find other ways to contact you, if necessary,” said Guertin. An official FBI special agent will never provide you with a badge number or telephone number to attempt to verify their identity without additional verification. Instead, they will direct you to the official FBI website www.FBI.gov to locate the local field office’s telephone number and encourage you to make a call. FBI will never call or email you to do any of the following: Make demands for money, wire transfers, gift cards, or bitcoin; Coordinate financial transactions of any kind; Threaten arrest. Reporting scams is an important step to protect yourself and others from victimization. All scams can be reported online on the FBI Internet Crime Complaint Center website, www.ic3.gov, or call your local FBI field office. ★

FEMA Fire Management Assistance Granted for the Mosquito Fire

OAKLAND, CA (MPG) - The Federal Emergency Management Agency’s (FEMA) regional administrator authorized the use of federal funds to assist the state of California in combatting the Mosquito Fire burning in Placer and El

Dorado counties. On Sept. 9, the state of California submitted a request for a Fire Management Assistance Grant (FMAG). At the time of the request, the fire threatened approximately 3,600 homes in and around Foresthill, CA. The fire also threatened a high school, middle school,

elementary school, Placer County Community Center, a Placer County Sheriff substation, Cal Fire Station 11, two hydro power plants, Foresthill Water Treatment Plant, Foresthill Fire Protection District, Sugar Pine Dam and Reservoir, and two public radio towers for fire and law

enforcement communications. FMAGs provide federal funding for up to 75 percent of eligible firefighting costs. The Disaster Relief Fund provides allowances for FMAGs through FEMA to assist in fighting fires that threaten to become a greater incident. Eligible costs covered by

FMAGs can include expenses for field camps, equipment use, materials, supplies and mobilization, and demobilization activities attributed to fighting the fire. For more information on FMAGs, visit fema.gov/assistance/public/fire-management-assistance. ★

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - September is National Preparedness Month and the Sacramento County Office of Emergency Services (SacOES) would like to remind residents about the importance of being prepared for the various disasters and emergencies that could happen at any time.

The theme of the 2022 National Preparedness Month is “A Lasting Legacy,” highlighting the fact that the life you’ve built is worth protecting, and you should prepare for disasters to create a lasting legacy for yourself and your family.

“National Preparedness Month is a great time to talk with your loved ones about the types of disasters and emergencies we might face, and start making a plan to prepare for these different scenarios,” said

Mary Jo Flynn-Nevins, Sacramento County Chief of Emergency Services. “You can set yourself up for success by preparing for disasters before they happen.”

A few important things to consider during an emergency:

Think about kids: Prepare your kids for disasters and emergencies. Take time to make a plan and have conversations about preparedness. Help them know how to stay safe and navigate potentially scary situations.

Think about your emergency kit: An emergency kit should have everything you need to survive for several days. Keeping your kit stocked with necessities like food water, and medical care can make the difference in the face of a disaster. Consider unique needs of your family. Include supplies that might be needed by pets, older adults, and those with

disabilities in the event of an emergency.

Think about your disaster plans: Disasters can happen anywhere, any time. That’s why it’s important you’re prepared. Do you have a plan for yourself, your pets, and your family? Consider the specific needs you might have in an emergency.

Think about your pets: Add these items in your emergency bag in case you need to evacuate with your four-legged buddies: A selfie with them in case you get separated; Medicine & grooming items; Collar with an ID & a leash.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sacramento nonprofit Women’s Empowerment invites community members to attend its 21st annual gala at 6pm on Sept. 29 at the California Railroad Museum. Guests will gather in person at the Brighter Futures Gala for the first time since 2019 to raise funds for Sacramento women and children experiencing homelessness and celebrate the accomplishments of program graduates. The event will include dinner, presentations by program graduates, a live auction, award ceremony and more.

The annual gala is the organization’s largest fundraiser of the year, raising a fifth of the group’s budget to empower women experiencing homelessness to secure employment and safe homes for their families. “As we step back in time at the historic Railroad Museum, we will honor the resilient women who have graduated from our programs, and celebrate the beautiful, bright futures ahead for the women and children we look forward to serving who have yet to overcome homelessness,” said Lisa Culp, executive director, Women’s Empowerment. “We are excited to come together once again with our steadfast community here in Sacramento to ensure that more women can rise from

homelessness in the face of a prolonged pandemic and housing crisis. We will need everyone working together in the months and years ahead so women have the resources to secure good jobs and safe homes for their families.”

To ensure safety of guests and graduates, proof will be required of either Covid vaccination or a negative Covid test within 48 hours. The venue is well ventilated with high ceilings and outdoor spaces.

Women’s Empowerment is a Sacramento nonprofit providing an eight-week employment-readiness and empowerment program, paid job training, childcare and support services so women and their children can break the cycle of homelessness. Women’s Empowerment offers the most comprehensive job-readiness program in the Sacramento area designed specifically for women experiencing homelessness and their children. On average, 70% of women in the program find housing during the ongoing housing crisis. Last year, 142 job placements were achieved by Women’s Empowerment graduates. Since its founding in 2001, the award-winning organization has graduated 1,752 women and their 3,879 children. Women’s Empowerment is funded through private donations from the community and grants. Black And White

No way! Absolutely not! Not ever! Is that what you say when Labor Day passes and one should never wear white after Labor Day? There's even a commercial running these days with a man sitting on a beach pondering why he can't wear white after Labor Day. How about you? Well, there is a story behind why you're supposed to follow this rule. So let's check it out before you go eyeing your closet and trying to figure out how to phase the white out of your wardrobe. I did a little research and googled the why. So what are the origins behind it? It's not very exciting, but here goes.

Back in the day, it was established by the so-called "new rich" to distinguish old-money families from the newfound millions. They used fashion rules that only those who were "in" would know about. So, in addition to the white rule, they included wearing the correct sleeve length for certain events and, of course, only wearing white in the summertime. Eventually, when Labor Day became a federal holiday in 1894, the holiday became a natural end point for summer and wearing white. I guess they never thought about the super-hot days that can extend into September like we've had. The tradition persisted in England throughout medieval times, when women were expected to wear black caps and veils when their husbands passed away! Yet, in much of Europe, widows in the deepest mourning period wore WHITE, a tradition held on in Spain through most of the 1500s. French queens prior to the Revolution also wore white while in mourning. Kings and queens from 1393 in France to 1993 in Belgium wore white. Personally, I don't like wearing black. I love to celebrate the life of the deceased with perhaps their favorite colors when they lived.

How about this. Yellow has long been a color of mourning in Egypt. Red is a common funeral color in Ghana. The Catholic Church introduced the use of purple in many countries influenced by the religion. Let's just remember the loved one. Color doesn't tell THEIR story, and that's what we want to remember! So color your own life!

Newsom Feels the Heat on Farm Labor Measure

Gov. Gavin Newsom will soon write a new chapter in California's decades-long conflict over the unionization of workers in the state's huge agricultural industry – and what he does could affect his obvious quest to become a national political figure.

Assembly Bill 2183, a measure that would make it easier for the much-troubled United Farm Workers Union to organize farmers' employees is sitting on his desk, passed by overwhelming margins by Newsom's fellow Democrats in the Legislature.

The union's drive for using a card check process or mailed ballots took on urgency when the U.S. Supreme Court declared in 2020 that it had no right to enter farmers' property to talk with their workers, exacerbating the UFW's chronic inability to make significant organizational inroads.

That failure, union leaders say, is due to farmers' undermining organizational elections, which now are conducted by secret ballot. However, the UFW has also suffered from its own organization shortcomings as journalist Miriam Pawel chronicled in her authoritative book, "The Union of Their Dreams."

Newsom vetoed an earlier version of the bill last year, saying, it "contains various inconsistencies and procedural issues related to the collection and review of ballot cards," and adding, "Significant changes to California's well-defined agricultural labor laws must be carefully crafted to ensure that both agricultural workers' intent to be represented and the right to collectively bargain is protected, and the state can faithfully enforce those fundamental rights."

This year's version contained some changes that the UFW and its allies hoped would placate Newsom, but just before final votes last month, Newsom once again indicated his opposition. "We cannot support an untested mail-in election process that lacks critical provisions to protect the integrity of the election," Newsom spokesperson Erin Mellon said.

Newsom's unusual preemptive declaration may have been an indirect request that the Legislature not send him a second measure, but it didn't deter legislators from acting with 55 votes in the Assembly and 26 in the Senate.

If anything, it spurred the UFW to redouble its public campaign, including a highly publicized week-long march to the Capitol from Delano, site of a 1965 grape worker strike that led to formation of the UFW and in 1975 to passage of the state's Agricultural Labor Relations Act.

The UFW also formally joined the California Labor Federation after former Assemblywoman Lorena

Gonzalez took the umbrella organization's helm and obtained expressions of support from national political figures such as House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and, this week, President Joe Biden.

"In the state with the largest population of farmworkers, the least we owe them is an easier path to make a free and fair choice to organize a union," Biden said on Labor Day.

All of this puts Newsom in a political pickle.

If he signs the bill, he will not only be reversing himself on a high-profile issue – never good optics for an ambitious politician – but could be providing critics with ammunition should he someday be seeking presidential votes in agricultural states that are critical in White House contests, such as Iowa, Ohio and Florida.

However, if he vetoes the measure, it could make it much more difficult for him to gain support in the Democratic Party's progressive/activist wing, to which unionization of workers in agriculture and other low-wage industries is a holy grail. Delores Huerta, the UFW's most revered figure, has predicted that Newsom would sign the bill because he'll want union support for a presidential campaign.

A veto would also mean that he would probably see another UFW bill next year and every other year of his governorship.

asks. Unlike other grant applications for college, this one is self-reported and self-certified, wrote Judith Gutierrez, spokesperson for the state financial aid agency running the grant, in an email. “We are not requesting any documentation,” she added.
McLaughlin wasted no time once she received her grant in June, 2022. After taking courses part-time at American River College, a community college in Sacramento, since October of 2020, she decided to go full-time to pursue her first ever-degree this fall and chose accounting as her major.
The \$2,500 is paying for her textbooks, software required for schoolwork and other supplies – anything remaining she’s putting in a personal education account. Though she receives tuition waivers as part of a state financial aid program and additional dollars through the Cal Grant, the Golden State grant gives her extra confidence that she can afford an education while earning around \$38,000 a year.
“I spend my lunch break doing schoolwork,” she said. After returning from the office, she takes her associate degree courses online. McLaughlin’s younger son is a virtual charter school student,

so the two complete their homework side by side.
“I feel that it’s showing him how important an education is and to never give up because here I am, 47, and in college,” she said.
At first blush the Golden State Education and Training grant, which will last through 2024 and is funded mostly through one-time federal stimulus funds, is yet another example of the state’s growing effort to lower the cost of college for adults and bring more Californians into college classrooms.
In the past two years, public funding grew by nearly 50% for the California Student Aid Commission, which oversees most of the higher-education grant aid to students, to nearly \$3.6 billion. That growth includes more tuition and cash support for community college students, middle-class students at the University of California and California State University, students formerly in foster care, students raising children and the Golden State training grant, among others.
But the Golden State grant’s eligibility rules start where other state and federal grants drop off, extending cash assistance to would-be students who otherwise wouldn’t be eligible for traditional college financial aid.
The Golden State grant

can cover education programs that are shorter than about four months – something the federal Pell and state Cal Grant do not. Students receiving the Golden State grant may also use the money for extension and so-called noncredit programs, such as English-as-a-second-language courses, bicycle repair and various landscaping certificates. There’s no minimum program length for this grant – and because state dollars cover some of the grant costs – undocumented students are also eligible for the \$2,500. Anyone getting the grant needs to already know which training program they plan to pursue.
So that displaced workers with no ties to a college also apply, the Student Aid Commission is working with regional workforce boards, The California Workforce Development Board and other agencies to get the word out about the grant, said Jake Brymner, director of governmental relations for the Student Aid Commission.
Grant recipients can also use the funds if they enroll in certain workforce training and apprenticeship programs unaffiliated with colleges or universities. The Student Aid Commission is reviewing which workforce training programs

are eligible and will soon add those to the approved list on the grant application. Students will only be able to use their grants at California public colleges, universities and these approved workforce training programs.
During the pilot when only public colleges and universities were eligible, 84% of the grant applicants sought educations at community colleges, data from the Student Aid Commission shows.
“This specific grant has great potential,” said Daisy Gonzales, interim chancellor of the California Community Colleges. “What it does is it provides an entry point to our colleges for students that may not know about us.” Students with no exposure to community colleges can gain access to food pantries and coordinators who are familiar with other state and local social services for which students could qualify.
She’s also hopeful the grant may help to recover some of the colossal enrollment loss the system suffered in the past two years.
Even if grant recipients qualify for free tuition, especially at community colleges where nearly half of learners attend for free, they can use the money to cover gas, housing, food and other expenses. It’s

an added perk for learners who had no spare dollars to afford an internet connection or other expenses associated with attaining a degree.
Muideen Olawoyin was one class away from earning an associate degree in human services, a stepping stone toward social work. But a series of bad breaks and a long-term injury left him cash-dry.
“I (couldn’t) even afford internet then, it was so hard,” he said. When he picked up the Golden State check from his school, Cosumnes River College, he was able to get back online, enroll in that final course and earn his degree this summer.
The average income of the roughly 3,000 grant recipients was about \$22,000 when they first applied, according to California Student Aid Commission data provided to CalMatters.
Not all training and education programs are made equal, however. Some research shows that shorter-term college certificates – like the kind in which students with this grant can enroll – have a mixed record of boosting the earning power of graduates.
Overall, these certificates lead to higher wages, but noncredit programs are less remunerative than traditional for-credit

certificates. Still, associate degrees and bachelor’s degrees lead to even higher wage gains for graduates, according to a 2020 Urban Institute study. Meanwhile, a fifth of certificate programs at public colleges and universities lead to lower wages than what workers with high school diplomas earn, a Hechinger Report analysis of national data showed.
California’s foray into funding short-term credentials could inform the national conversation on whether to permit federal grant aid to pay for educations that are shorter than four months. For a few years now advocates have been trying to introduce “short-term” Pell grants, but the idea hasn’t won over enough lawmakers yet.
None of the four Golden State training grant recipients CalMatters spoke with were pursuing short-term credentials – all wanted an associate degree. McLaughlin, who now works as an accountant for a fencing company, is dreaming bigger.
Her goal is to transfer to Sacramento State to earn a bachelor’s – something her current employer encouraged her to pursue.
“I want people to know you’re never too old for school,” McLaughlin said. “And to never stop trying to reach your goals.” ★
