COVID Money Debacle

When the pandemic closed schools in March 2020 – abruptly ending classes and stranding children and working parents – leaders in Washington and Sacramento scrambled to provide relief.

The result was a series of stimulus measures that allocated \$33.5 billion in state and federal funds to California’s K-12 schools to address the devastation of the pandemic. It was a staggering amount of one-time funding for the state’s cash-strapped schools, equal to a third of all the money they got the year before the pandemic.

Imagine your boss giving you a check equal to four months of your

salary and telling you to spend it quickly or risk giving it back. For schools, this was money for things like laptops, air filters and mental health counselors – money to help kids.

But much of the funding has come with limited oversight and little transparency, according to a CalMatters investigation. No centralized state or federal database exists to show how schools have spent this money. And data from the districts’ quarterly spending reports provided to the state are so broad as to be virtually useless in tracking this COVID relief money.

Of the \$5.9 billion local education agencies have spent so far from the largest of the stimulus funds, more than a quarter went to a category for “other” expenses, according to the

state.

CalMatters spent three months examining school COVID relief spending across the state, reviewing thousands of pages of records obtained through more than 45 public records requests. That includes state spending reviews as well as accounting ledgers from two dozen school districts, including many of California’s biggest.

The records reveal pandemic winners – companies that reaped millions as overwhelmed districts, suddenly flush with cash, started writing checks. Some are established firms well-positioned to fill massive orders for goods.

Some districts refused to provide CalMatters records showing where

Grand Jury Releases New Status Review

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - When required to respond to a Sacramento County Grand Jury report showing a less than robust record of leadership at the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Grand Jury found that the Board of Supervisors has opted to dodge and deflect. But the Grand Jury’s deep concern, plainly stated in that February 2022 report, continues.

In the Grand Jury’s newly issued Status Review, it finds that the Board’s responses to the Grand Jury report reflect the Board’s continuing refusal to acknowledge or accept responsibility for any deficiencies of leadership, accountability or engagement at the outset of the 2020 countywide emergency.

The Grand Jury in its February 2022 report called out the Board for lack of oversight and leadership during the first five critical months of the COVID-19 pandemic. The Grand Jury conducted extensive research and interviews which found: 1) the Board of Supervisors handed off essential decision-making and CARES Act funding responsibility to its County Executive, or his designee; 2) the Board did not receive timely reports on allocation of CARES Act funds; 3) it failed to demand regular public updates on County pandemic activities; and 4) the Board failed to provide public forums to assess the vast array of needs and challenges faced by residents across Sacramento County.

The record of Board sessions speaks for itself: No actions were taken to publicly account for use of emergency funding, engaging with local residents and businesses, and even with its own agency heads, and is documented in the Grand Jury report.

It was this pattern of lack of leadership, engagement and oversight that was contained in the Grand Jury’s report, and the basis of its findings and recommendations. The Grand Jury found that in the Board’s response, it unfortunately cloaks itself in bureaucratic, misleading, and at times inaccurate statements.

The Board of Supervisors’ position that there is ‘nothing to see here’ reflects the precise leadership and accountability deficiencies outlined in the Report.

Sacramento County Recommended Budget Approved

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously on June 9 to approve the \$7.3 billion recommended budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-23.

“Sacramento County’s FY 2022-23 budget works to address many of the needs of our community and includes additional investments in programs and services related to homelessness, mental health, substance abuse and social services for some of the most vulnerable people among us, while maintaining vital and essential existing services,” said District Five Supervisor and Board Chair Don Nottoli.

The \$7.3 billion budget consists of \$2.8 billion in Enterprise and Special Revenue Fund appropriations (utility rates, fees and other dedicated revenue), \$3.5 billion in General Fund appropriations (\$936 million in discretionary resources, \$1.1 billion in restricted funds, and the remaining \$1.4 billion with Federal,

State and fee revenue dedicated to specific purposes), and \$1.1 billion in Restricted Funds.

“This approved budget reflects substantial investments in new and enhanced programs based on the Board’s priorities and a survey of Sacramento residents,” said County Executive Ann Edwards. “In addition to increased funding addressing homelessness, social services and improving the condition of County roads, we were able to set aside more money in the County’s ‘rainy day’ reserve funds.”

The recommended budget recognized new or enhanced areas of growth, including annual commitments of: Addressing Homelessness – \$5.3 million to fund new programs and services addressing homelessness in the County; Road Pavement Rehabilitation Projects – \$20 million in one-time Net County Cost transferred from the General Fund to the Roads Fund to fund pavement maintenance and rehabilitation on roads throughout the unincorporated County. Substance Use Disorder

Residential Treatment – \$10 million for the Department of Health Services to procure an additional 156 beds annually for substance use disorder residential treatment; Crisis Stabilization Units – \$5 million for the Department of Health Services to establish a pool for behavioral health crisis stabilization units, which is a service the County is required to provide to Medi-Cal beneficiaries; Mental Health Services Act Full Service Partnership – \$7.5 million in MHSA and Federal match for the Department of Health Services to procure Full Service Partnership programming as a requirement in fulfilling permanent supportive housing commitments; School-Based Mental Health Program – \$4.3 million of Medi-Cal funding for the Department of Health Services to provide increased support to the school-based mental health program, with a planned site expansion to 40 sites; Child, Family and Adult Services – \$19.1 million to support Child Family and Adult Services’ programs,

including \$5.4 million to provide enhanced security services at the Centralized Placement Support Unit; Afghan Refugee Assistance – \$3 million in Net County Cost for the Department of Human Assistance to provide services to support new Afghan arrivals in adjusting to their new environment.

During budget deliberations, the Board added additional items totaling \$2.6 million in appropriations, which included: \$1 million for additional scattered sites to house people experiencing homelessness; \$498,072 to provide a fourth staff position in Districts 1,3,4 and 5; \$450,000 for improvements at McFarland Ranch, American River Ranch and Dillard Ranch; \$167,881 to provide a position supporting homeless issues in District 2; \$150,000 to Visit Sacramento for a total annual contribution of \$500,000; \$106,690 to provide additional staffing for the Clerk of the Board’s Office; \$100,000 to the Mack Road Partnership to purchase

their money is going. That includes San Francisco Unified, which got more than \$186 million in federal stimulus funds.

Taken together, the reporting shows the differing decisions local leaders made trying to keep teachers, kids and their communities safe from a deadly disease while also addressing the learning loss and mental health impacts of prolonged social isolation. Some of those spending decisions were made behind closed doors and with little scrutiny, making it difficult for the public to determine whether districts used the money as effectively as possible or as lawmakers intended.

The stakes of such decisions could not be higher. The pandemic hurt California's kids. More than half the students who took the statewide standardized test last year scored below grade level for English Language Arts. Nearly two-thirds of those students tested below grade level for math. Attendance is down. And federal data shows the number of students considering suicide is up.

Local educational agencies still have billions of dollars of COVID relief left to spend. If they don't spend it by various deadlines, they may have to return it.

In a written statement to CalMatters, the state Department of Education said it is "encouraged by the impact that stimulus funding is having on the students and schools of California," and that overseeing the funds is a top priority.

"The department has a robust monitoring system to ensure that (agencies') expenditures are in accordance with all applicable federal and state requirements," according to the statement.

The state auditor's office criticized oversight in an October report, saying the state is not using the limited data it receives to identify abnormal spending patterns and scrutinize local educational agencies.

"The state Department of Education has not taken a very active role in managing how the money is being spent," said Kris Patel, supervising auditor who led the team behind the October report.

Patel said lack of oversight is particularly concerning as spending deadlines approach.

After the pandemic shut down the world, lawmakers in Washington, D.C., passed six major pieces of stimulus legislation worth more than \$5 trillion. The money was

spread across myriad programs including business loans, funds to government agencies and checks directly to citizens.

California got yet another infusion of cash when higher-than-expected tax revenue created a massive budget surplus – more relief for beleaguered local governments.

While much has been written about emergency spending at the state level, including fraud targeting the state's Employment Development Department, less is known about the money that poured into the nation's schools.

The federal stimulus measures created the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund and the Governor's Emergency Education Relief Fund – two large pots of money allocated to schools and state education departments in multiple rounds.

Ultimately, California public schools and charters got almost \$29 billion in federal stimulus money. Billions more came from state programs lawmakers in Sacramento created.

Each program has its own spending requirements and categories – steering money toward things like instructional materials, school breakfast programs, purchasing educational technology and implementing public health protocols.

But some of the spending categories are broad. There's money for principals "to address local needs," and a catchall category described in state records as "other activities

to continue school operations and employment of existing staff."

California has about a thousand public school districts and hundreds of public charter schools that received COVID relief funds.

To get a cross-section of the stimulus spending, CalMatters asked more than 30 school districts for their accounting ledgers. Those districts included the 20 biggest and 10 random agencies across a geographically and demographically diverse swath of the state.

San Juan Unified in the Sacramento region used funds to hire an instructional aide for every classroom in its early grades and a new teacher at every school. Such hiring has been difficult because of a widespread teacher shortage, but the stimulus has also allowed the district to pay hiring bonuses, said Melissa Bassanelli, the district's deputy superintendent of schools and student support.

One common area of spending was technology. Some districts spent heavily on laptops, hot spots and other hardware, as well as computer programs and support in order to make the switch to virtual schooling when buildings shut down.

Districts threw COVID relief money at a menu of technology firms offering services like remote tutoring, online assessments, cybersecurity and virtual lessons.

It wasn't just technology companies that reaped massive paydays from districts flush

with stimulus cash. Personal protective equipment vendors and businesses selling indoor air quality products got lots of deals. Firms touting COVID testing-related services also were in high demand.

Most districts and schools will face little scrutiny for their pandemic spending decisions, outside local administrative offices and boardrooms.

Yes, some funds do require a public spending plan. The state also required a special report on how districts are using their one-time funds.

"But it was a very, very general document," said Victor Leung, director of education equity for the ACLU of Southern California. "It was extremely unclear how those districts spent the money."

Such documents also aren't always easy for parents to find on district websites.

The state Education Department does review a selection of districts annually as part of the Federal Program Monitoring process. During such reviews, state evaluators look to make sure district policies are up to date and scrutinize a sampling of expenditures to make sure they're appropriate.

Last fiscal year, the department reviewed stimulus spending at 15 local educational agencies – less than a percent of the roughly 1,700 agencies that got stimulus funds. This year the department is reviewing 50.

Those reviews turned up numerous red flags. Six of the 15 reviews from last year had so-called "findings" while 19 of the 37 so far this year flagged potential problems. The issues range from poor recordkeeping, to outdated conflict-of-interest policies, to outright misspending.

Some districts were able to resolve findings simply by providing more information to the state.

The state Education Department, for example, last year ordered the Sacramento-based charter school St. HOPE Public School 7 to justify much of its stimulus spending. Among the questioned costs was \$11,000 the school spent on attorneys fees, records show.

In response to the findings, St. HOPE provided the state with accounting ledgers, invoices, written descriptions of spending and other records. The material showed, for example, the attorneys fees were for negotiations with the teachers' union regarding the return to school and therefore justified. ★

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The fifth season of Kings and Queens Rise Co-Ed Youth Sports and Mentoring League launches this week through a partnership among the Sacramento Kings and The Center at Sierra Health Foundation’s Build.Black. Coalition, Black Child Legacy Campaign and My Brother’s Keeper Sacramento programs.

Kings and Queens Rise provides young people opportunities to engage in intercommunity activities, which help prevent and interrupt violence. The program is a caring and safe environment where mentors teach community building and sportsmanship.

“We helped launch the Kings and Queens Rise program based on the idea that we all share a collective responsibility in creating safe and supportive environments for our youth,” said Sacramento Kings Chief Operating Officer Matina Kolokotronis. “Given the latest tragedies caused by gun violence and the compounded trauma, we know this work is more important than ever. We remain committed to providing youth with pathways for success and opportunities to build positive relationships.”

“Kings and Queens Rise is part of the growing network of community-led violence prevention programs throughout Sacramento. The league provides young people opportunities to build community among themselves, across neighborhoods and with trusted adult coaches and mentors,” said Chet P. Hewitt, president and CEO of Sierra Health Foundation and The Center, which

manages Kings and Queens Rise, Build.Black., the Black Child Legacy Campaign and My Brother’s Keeper Sacramento. “We’re proud to partner with the Sacramento Kings on these social and development experiences for youth that foster pride in themselves and their communities.”

Part of the Sacramento Kings Jr. Kings program, the eight-week basketball season will tip-off on June 25 and run until August 13. Eight teams composed of youth from 4th through 10th grade will participate, one from each of the following neighborhoods: Arden Arcade, Del Paso Heights-North Sacramento, Foothill Farms-North Highlands, Fruitridge-Stockton, Marina Vista, Meadowview, Oak Park and Valley Hi. Games and practices take place throughout North and South Sacramento in community locations. The season will culminate with a tournament hosted by the Kings.

Through the generosity of the The Rio Linda News, this column serves to provide an update about matters affecting the community of Rio Linda.

On June 9th, the Sacramento County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to approve the \$7.3 billion recommended budget for Fiscal Year 2022-2023. As all of this money comes from our tax dollars, I wanted to take this opportunity to provide you with some of the major takeaways from the adopted budget.

Anyone who has followed since I was first elected to the Board of Supervisors knows that I have been a routine advocate for building up our budget reserves. Sacramento County has consistently been operating with budget reserves significantly smaller than any county of similar size - and ever since I have been on the Board of Supervisors our reserves have represented less than 1% of our operating budget. I am extremely pleased to report that we made an enormous contribution to our reserves by putting in \$92 million, which brings the total discretionary reserves to \$208 million. This brings our discretionary reserves to about 6% of our operating budget, and while we still have room to build this higher (the recommended amount is ~17%), this is an enormous step in the right direction.

Like virtually everyone in the County, the current

state of homelessness in our community is constantly at the forefront of my mind. To that end, the County is investing a further \$5.3 million to fund new programs and services addressing homelessness in the County. We also are investing \$7.5 million (partly county funds, and partly a federal match) for the Department of Health Services to procure Full Service Partnership programming as a requirement in fulfilling permanent supportive housing commitments.

And we are putting in more money to try to solve the root causes of homelessness, by investing \$10 million for the Department of Health Services to procure an additional 156 beds annually for substance use disorder residential treatment. Further, we have dedicated \$5 million to fund solutions for homelessness on the American River Parkway.

Another major concern for me is the current failing state of our county roads, and while I have written several times in the past about why this is happening (in short, a severe reduction in state and federal funds), the County needs to step to the plate and get things back on the right track. In this budget cycle, we are putting in \$20 million to fund pavement maintenance and rehabilitation on roads, above what we already put in.

I know that most readers have eagerly been following the ongoing debate around law enforcement in the County. While many have called for the reduction or

elimination of funding for the Sheriff’s Department, the communication my office has constantly received from my constituents lead heavily towards providing the Sheriff with a necessary level of funding to be able to protect our community. As such, I am pleased to report that the budget provides the Sheriff with the level of funding that was requested, which is an increase both in budget, and in staff.

I don’t want to sit here and pretend that this is a perfect budget, because it’s not. The reality is that the County is going to be facing lean times in the years to come due to one time COVID funds from the federal government drying up. As I mentioned above, we still need to invest a significant more into reserves, and even though that’s not a particularly sexy thing to spend money on, anyone who has run a business or managed our own personal budget knows how important it is. Still, we were able to achieve much good - and I can honestly say that I am more proud of this budget than I have been since I have been your county supervisor.

California's Sham Budget and Unintended Consequences

The “law of unintended consequences” is a tenet of classic economics – essentially a warning that an action meant to have a positive effect can often bring a negative outcome.

The political version is an oft-voiced admonition: “What goes around comes around.”

The California Legislature’s frantic effort this week to approve a 2022-23 budget – or at least its unfinished version of the budget – exemplifies the principle.

For many decades, the state constitution has required the Legislature to pass a budget by June 15 but for many decades the requirement was routinely violated – sometimes for months.

During those decades, the budget required a two-thirds vote in the Legislature, which meant the minority party – usually Republicans – could hold up passage until its demands were met. The syndrome reached a climactic point in 2009 when one Republican state senator, Abel Maldonado, refused to vote for the budget until Democratic leaders agreed to place a measure on the ballot to change California’s primary election process to what’s called a “top-two” system.

Leaders of both parties despised the proposed new system, but Maldonado, with backing from then-Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger, held out until they agreed to his demand. The top-two proposal, in which all candidates appear on one ballot and the two top finishers face each other in the general election regardless of party, was approved by voters in 2010. Last week’s election was its latest employment.

Maldonado’s holdout had a consequence that neither he nor Schwarzenegger intended – motivating Democrats to make sure it never happened again. Their labor union allies spent millions of dollars to qualify and pass another measure in 2010, lowering the budget vote to a simple majority.

To make the measure more attractive to voters, its sponsors included a passage that said legislators would lose their pay if a budget was not enacted by June 15.

That proviso, however, had another unintended consequence a year later when Republican Schwarzenegger’s successor, Democrat Jerry Brown, and his fellow Democrats in the Legislature deadlocked over details of the state budget.

Brown vetoed the placeholder budget that the Democrats passed by the June 15 deadline, saying it was not balanced, and Controller John Chiang declared that since that left the state without a balanced budget, legislators would have their pay – about \$400 a day – suspended until there was one.

Chiang said the

Democratic budget was, by his reckoning, \$1.85 billion out of balance. “The numbers simply did not add up,” said Chiang, drawing the ire of his fellow Democrats, who sued, contending he had overstepped his authority.

Fundamentally, the courts later said, the Legislature is the sole judge of whether it has met the June 15 deadline. Consequently, the penalty for noncompliance that was ballyhooed to voters in 2010 is a fiction.

In subsequent years, the Legislature has always passed a budget by the June 15 deadline, sometimes a real one in agreement with the governor but often merely a placeholder.

The 1,000-page budget being passed this week is another sham, drafted largely in secret with minimal public exposure and many blanks to be filled in later. Democratic leaders and Gov. Gavin Newsom are still at odds on multi-billion-dollar issues, including the size and form of payments to Californians to offset inflation.

There’s also a big gap over how much of the state’s projected surplus to spend on permanent commitments, with Newsom’s Department of Finance warning that overspending could create problems in the future if, as many economists suspect, a recession is on the horizon.

That could be a truly important consequence of budgetary gamesmanship.

the South Sacramento Community Center property; \$75,000 to Splash for vernal pool education; \$25,000 for an additional \$5,000 in TOT District Funds for each District.

The Board also set aside \$5 million to fund the new American River Parkway Homeless Reserve.

“I’m grateful to my colleagues and staff for supporting my proposal to assist the American Parkway Foundation in their well-coordinated efforts to proactively assist those living in the Parkway so we can save the Parkway,” said District One Supervisor Phil Serna.

The numbers on the Recommended Budget will change between now and September, when the County receives new information, including the impact of the State Budget and updated revenue totals. The Final Budget will come back to the Board of Supervisors in September for review and adoption.

Defendant Convicted of Kidnapping, Three Sexual Assaults

Sac County DA News Release

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Manuel Sicario was convicted by a jury of kidnap for the purpose of rape, assault with the intent to commit rape, sexual battery, attempted sexual battery, annoying or molesting a child and indecent exposure.

The jury also found true allegations that Sicario kidnapped the victim; the victim was particularly vulnerable; Sicario's crimes were carried out with planning, sophistication, and professionalism; and Sicario engaged in a violent conduct that indicates a serious danger to society.

On August 10, 2019, the 15-year-old victim was at Sutter's Landing when Sicario walked up next to her and began to masturbate. As Sicario masturbated, he pulled the victim towards him. The victim was able to pull away from him and flee. She did not call the police. On August 18, 2019, the second victim was at Sutter's Landing when Sicario came near her and began to strip down to his underwear. The victim was so uncomfortable with Sicario's behavior that she took a video of him. When the victim turned her back on Sicario, he immediately jumped on her.

Sicario straddled the victim and tried to grope her. The victim was able to throw Sicario off of her, run away and call 911. The third victim was jogging on the bike path at Sutter's Landing when she encountered Sicario standing on the bike path. When she tried to pass him, Sicario grabbed her, dragged her down the bike path and took her under the I-80 overpass. Sicario threw the victim to the ground exposed himself. He then held one of the victim's hands down as he pulled her clothes to expose her body. The victim tried to fight off Sicario during the entire attack. When Sicario covered the victim's mouth to prevent her from screaming, the victim bit his hand so hard that he let her go for a minute. The victim ran away screaming for help. Law enforcement took the second victim's video of Sicario and released it to the public, resulting in numerous tips. The tips included the first victim reporting that she was assaulted by the suspect as well. Sicario was located in Tulare County and arrested on August 28, 2019.

Sicario faces a maximum sentence of 32 years to life in prison. Sentencing is set for July 6, 2022, at 1:30 p.m. in Department 10 before the Honorable Ernest Sawtelle. ★

Defendant Convicted of Charges Stemming from Domestic Violence Assault

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Michael Dwyer was convicted by a jury of kidnapping, kidnapping for carjacking, domestic violence, evading an officer with willful disregard, and making terrorist threats.

Dwyer and the victim were estranged. On July 15, 2016, the victim opened her garage door and Dwyer immediately rushed into the garage. Dwyer punched the victim in the head, took her phone, duct taped her mouth shut, and tied her hands with zip ties. He forced her back into her house and threatened to kill her, her children, and her parents. Dwyer then threw the victim in the trunk of her car and drove her to his residence. While tied up in the trunk, the victim pressed random buttons on her iWatch until she got a hold of someone who called 911. Officers were not able to find the victim since Dwyer had taken her to his residence. At the house, Dwyer forced the victim into his bathtub, tied her legs with zip ties, and water boarded her because he wanted her to

admit she was having an affair. He also showed her a curling iron and told her he would stick it inside of her and burn her. After begging Dwyer to loosen the ties on her hands, he cut the ties on her hands, but tied her to a chair. He then swallowed a cupful of pills. When Dwyer passed out, the victim was able to cut the zip ties off and get her phone before running out of the house. Officers saw the victim running down the street with no shoes and duct tape still around her neck. Before officers could get all the information from the victim, Dwyer pulled out of his garage in the victim's car and fled. Officers chased Dwyer who was speeding in excess of 100mph while running red lights and stop signs. The pursuit ended when Dwyer lost control of the victim's car. The Sacramento Police Department, Elk Grove Police Department and CHP all worked together to investigate this case.

Dwyer faces a maximum sentence of 18 years and 8 months to life in prison. Sentencing is set for July 6, 2022, at 1:30 p.m. in Department 20 before the Honorable Michael Sweet. ★

CHP Arrests Teen for Attempted Murder

Since the April 22 incident,

CHP investigators worked to identify the suspected shooter and his accomplice. On Tuesday, June 7, officers from the CHP's South Sacramento Area office conducted an operation in which the alleged shooter, 16-year-old Joesuff Cochrun, was located and taken into custody without incident. He was booked into the Sacramento Youth Detention

Facility on multiple felony charges, including attempted murder, conspiracy to commit armed robbery, and robbery.

An arrest warrant has been issued for a second suspect wanted in the shooting that occurred in the parking lot of the Employment Development Department at 2901 50th St. in Sacramento. 16-year-old

Larry Bernard Scott Jr., of Sacramento, is wanted on similar felony charges as the suspect in custody.

The involved vehicle, a gold 2000 Chevrolet Malibu, was located at a third residence in Sacramento and taken as evidence to be searched pursuant to a search warrant.

The incident remains under

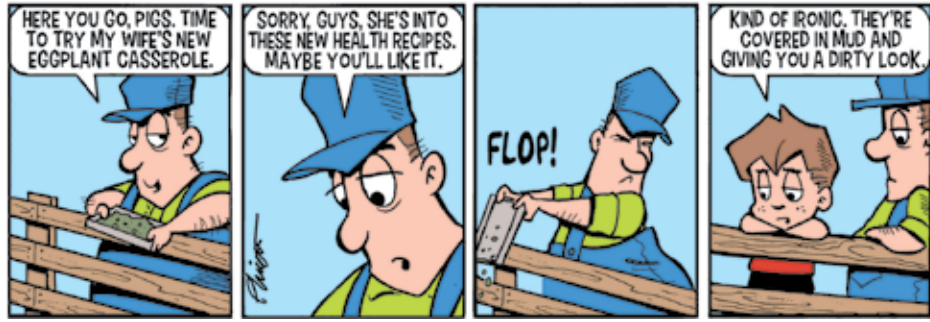

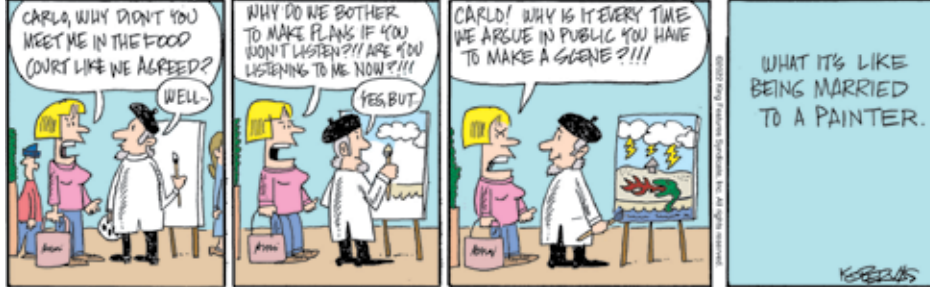

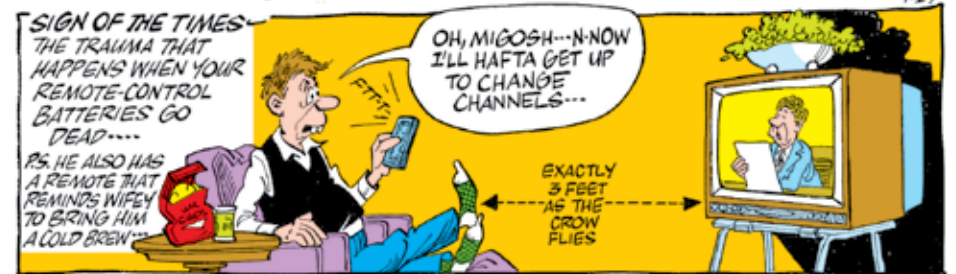

4th of July Reminder: Keep it Safe, Keep it Legal

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - With Independence Day coming up, please remember to know the risks of fireworks, only use legal fireworks and stay safe when using. If you see or suspect illegal firework usage, please report it! See reporting contact information below.

The County has teamed up with our cities, fire and law enforcement jurisdictions to educate our community members on how to celebrate safely, how to spot a safe and sane firework and how to report illegal fireworks usage. In addition, many jurisdictions are enforcing stricter penalties this year for illegal fireworks usage.

Sacramento County Board of Supervisors adopted a social host ordinance that levies fines, starting at \$1,000, against property owners that either use or allow use of illegal fireworks on their property, in addition to fines for use in places like the American River Parkway. Read more about the Social Host Ordinance.

Calls for service throughout the County increase dramatically on July 4, and emergency response resources are stretched extremely thin. During the holiday weekend, please use 9-1-1 for emergencies only – like an active fire or injury or immediate threat to persons or property. Each jurisdiction has provided an alternative method to report illegal fireworks sale and usage.

Together, we can ensure that Independence Day celebrations are fun,

Know the Risks

The unsafe use of fireworks can cause severe burns, amputations, blinding and even death; Damaging fires may occur when children use fireworks unsupervised by adults; Parents are responsible for any property damage or injuries caused by all fireworks.

Keep it Legal

All legal fireworks in California are called Safe and Sane Fireworks and must bear the State Fire Marshal's seal; Safe and Sane Fireworks may only be used and sold from noon June 28th through midnight on July 4th; Any firework that goes up in the air or explodes is illegal and dangerous.

Keep It Safe

Always have a bucket of water to dispose of fireworks and leave in the water overnight before disposing; Always have a hose connected to water available in case of fire; Do not use fireworks near dry grass or other flammable materials; Do not use fireworks while under a canopy, covered balcony, covered patio or under a tree or bushes.
