They're Spending Your Money



"Simply without precedent." California's \$100 billion surplus: What to know about Newsom's spending plan. California State Capitol © Andreistanescu | Dreamstime.com

Gov. Gavin Newsom is a man of many superlatives, but even he seemed to struggle to adequately describe just how much extra cash the state of California will have to spend in the coming year's budget: \$97.5 billion.

Speaking for more than two hours in a press conference in Sacramento, Newsom unveiled his latest record spending proposal for the coming fiscal year. Riding a superheating economy and drawing disproportionately from the state's highest earners, the state is now projected to have a surplus bigger than California – or any state – has ever had, and significantly more than the \$76 billion that the governor predicted in January.

Roughly half of the surplus is required by law to be spent on education. That leaves "only" roughly \$49 billion in discretionary money, and the governor wants to reserve 99% of that for one-time spending: \$18.1 billion to provide financial relief for Californians buffeted by inflation, plus \$37 billion for infrastructure investments, including \$5.6 billion for education facility upgrades, and an extra \$2.3 billion for the ongoing fight against COVID-19.

A few of the other big numbers that Newsom mentioned: \$128.3 billion in education spending, from transitional kindergarten through high school, a record-breaking sum that works out to \$22,850 per student; Another \$23 billion will be parked into the state's rainy day fund, to be

drawn upon the next time the economy slows; \$2.5 billion for housing, including \$500 million to fund the conversion of vacant malls and storefronts into homes; An extra \$3.4 billion to pay down state employee retirement debt.

The massive windfall that the state is sitting on, coupled with the state's progressive tax system is a sign of "the concentration of wealth and success in the hands of a few that are enjoying abundance in historic and unprecedented ways," Newsom said. "I am proud of California's progressive tax system...and we're the beneficiary of that."

Now the ball is in the state Legislature's court as key lawmakers in the Assembly and the state Senate decide where they agree with the

Introduces Social Host Ordinance y Kim Nava,

Sac County

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Board of Supervisors, at its May 11 meeting, introduced an ordinance amending Sacramento County Code Chapter 4.54 to add host liability and penalties for violations of county code relating to fireworks. The ordinance will be continued to the May 24 Board meeting for adoption and will go into effect June 24, 2022.

Strategies to help address fireworks safety concerns in the past have focused on education and mitigation, including press releases, informational handouts and fireworks inspections.

Enforcement efforts have also included illegal fireworks buy-busts, confiscation and citations, arson investigations and proper disposal of illegal fireworks.

However, a public safety tool that has been increasingly used successfully in other jurisdictions is a "host ordinance" that places accountability for sales and/ or use of illegal fireworks on property owners.

"Host," as it relates to this ordinance, means a person who knowingly permits or allows fireworks to be lit, exploded or sold on private property owned or controlled by the person, and the person knows or reasonably should have known that the fireworks would have been lit, exploded or sold.

Amending Sacramento County Code Chapter 4.54 creates new host responsibilities that include liability and penalties with increased fines for violations of the county code relating to Fireworks and provides an additional tool for reducing harm caused by use of illegal fireworks. Penalties for violations are as follows:

\$1,000 for the first violation; \$2,500 for the second violation within one year of the first violation; \$5,000 for each additional violation within one year of the first violation; \$10,000 for each violation that occurs within the American River Parkway

The ordinance to add host liability for illegal fireworks allows fire, law enforcement (including park rangers) and code enforcement agencies to hold the owner or person in charge of real property or conducting an illegal fireworks event responsible for costs of response associated with the presence of emergency personnel, the discharge of illegal fireworks on private property

Clarification on the Safe Stay Site Presentation

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - At the May 11

CA (MPG) - At the May 11 Board of Supervisors meeting, county staff presented to the Supervisors a list of County-owned parcels that have been reviewed for potential viability to site Safe Stay or Safe Parking programs for persons experiencing homelessness. The presentation was for information only and at the request of supervisors at the Feb. 16 Board meeting to review County-owned land based on object criteria and bring the resulting list of appropriate sites back.

After receiving numerous calls from concerned constituents under the impression that these sites were already selected and moving forward, it is necessary to provide context around the presentation and the discussed sites. These misconceptions were further exacerbated by a story posted in the Sacramento

Bee on Monday, May 16 entitled "Sacramento County names potential sites for homeless shelters, from downtown to suburbs" – specifically the notion that the Carmichael location is somehow already in process – which it is not.

Background

During the Feb. 16, 2022, Board meeting, multiple Supervisors requested a report back on staff efforts to identify appropriate sites to expand sheltering opportunities for those experiencing unsheltered homelessness, including an assessment of County-owned land. Using objective criteria that looked at size of the parcel(s), access to utilities, and proximity to existing encampments and/or services, staff divided the 1,673 County owned parcels into three categories: not viable, potentially viable and viable. Only 16 were deemed 'viable' based on initial review; during the workshop, staff and the Board discussed the need to further refine potential sites based on surrounding uses and with extensive community input. The Board also asked for staff to continue to explore non-County owned land, including the purchase or lease of privately owned sites.

Any recommended site will include enough characteristics that staff believe they could support a viable Safe Stay or Safe Parking community.

Next Steps

Staff will continue to refine potential sites and bring any viable sites to the Board for review and direction prior to any commitments. Any site being considered will also include robust community engagement with the surrounding neighborhoods and business

owners prior to a final Board decision. Outreach will include community forums to answer questions and hear concerns as well as present plans for any particular site.

The Board also directed staff to continue to engage landowners that have viable private properties that may also be used for Safe Stay Communities to increase the options the county can consider.

As a reminder, the goal of these Safe Stay Communities is to reduce crime, trash, blight and human suffering. As case studies have shown time and time again through the Pallet model the county has extensively reviewed, when done right, these communities drastically improve the surrounding areas while also providing positive outcomes for homeless persons who reside there.

ALA Report Doesn't Tell the Full Story, Includes Misleading Data

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento Metropolitan Air Quality Management District, Yolo-Solano Air Quality Management District, Placer County Air Pollution Control District, Feather River Air Quality Management District, and El Dorado County Air Quality Management District have issued a joint response to the American Lung Association's recent release of its annual State of The Air Report and the Sacramento Bee's coverage of the report on April 22, 2022.

The Air Districts address the report's ranking of counties based on air quality data that is skewed by extreme but short-term wildfire data and the increasing international transport of pollution that raises background concentrations, resulting in a misleading picture of air pollution emissions in the Sacramento region. The Bee's article omitted these factors as well. While air quality and public health are absolutely impacted by wildfires, to assign an "F" grade without naming the reason doesn't tell the full story. It also unnecessarily undermines public confidence and denies true progress.

Response From the Air Districts of the Sacramento Region:

"Thanks to innovative projects and programs by Sacramento region air districts and their partners, air quality has improved significantly over the past several decades and will continue to get cleaner in the future. Despite the challenges of wildfire and increasing transport of pollution, coupled with sharp increases in population and vehicle miles traveled, the Sacramento region has made great strides in moving toward and meeting strict state and federal health-based air quality standards.

Although the counties in our region received poor rankings, these rankings are flawed and do not reflect the real, tangible improvements in air quality that have been made possible by the efforts of our districts and residents. While we value our partnership with the American Lung Association, we are extremely disappointed that the ALA report fails to recognize that the region currently meets federal health-based air quality standards for short-term particle pollution and is on track to meet similar standards for summertime ground-level ozone pollution within the next several years. That is no small feat and certainly worth a passing grade. We are equally disappointed that the Sacramento Bee article about the report did not acknowledge these factors or recognize the region's air quality accomplishments.

Our Districts are committed to combat ing climate change and improving air quality and public health outcomes for all residents, especially in our environmental justice communities. It is important for the ALA report to honestly reflect the significant challenges the region faces, while we continue to work together to find innovative new solutions to improve public health."

Historical Air Quality Data Shows Dramatic Air Quality Improvement in the Region

Between 2000-2022, the Sacramento Federal Nonattainment Area (SFNA) population grew 30.57% resulting in an increased number of vehicle registrations, and motor vehicles in the region. The SFNA is comprised of all of Sacramento and Yolo Counties, the eastern portion of Solano County, the southern portion of Sutter County, the western slopes of El Dorado and Placer Counties up to the Sierra crest and includes five local air districts.

Because cars, trucks and trains are the largest source of emissions in the region, Sacramento region air districts have developed creative and innovative strategies to ensure the region can continue to grow due to an increased population but at the same time reduce air pollution, combat climate change, stimulate economic prosperity and improve the quality of life for residents.

According to the state's historical data, the number of smoggy summer days that exceed the current 2015 ozone standard has declined from 81 days in 2000 to 47 days in 2020. Even with the 2020 data, which had high measurements due to summer wildfire smoke impacts, this shows a strong downward trend that is expected to continue over the next several years.

Innovative Air Pollution Reduction Strategies Are Making a Difference

Sacramento region air districts have implemented numerous successful and innovative programs within the region to reduce air pollution that impacts our health, environment, and local economy.

A few examples include: Infusing millions of dollars into the region each year to support and incentivize electric vehicle conversion and infrastructure builds for businesses, public agencies, school districts and residents. Requiring the use of the most stringent emission control equipment on major stationary sources, which means less pollution coming out of the stack. Working with both public land managers and private landowners on prescribed burn activities to reduce excess vegetation and restore fire resiliency to the land. On-going support for the utilization of forest woody biomass wastes to fuel electricity generation and reduce wildfire size, severity, and pollution.

Implementing mandatory or voluntary residential wood burning reduction programs. Creating clean, safe, and reliable transportation options by providing access to electric vehicles, carshare services, transit, and ride share for communities most in need in the region. Building out the region's zero and near zero emission infrastructure with the development of electric vehicle chargers, hydrogen fueling dispensers, and natural gas fueling stations.

Continued from page 1 governor and which priorities they want to haggle over before the June 15 deadline to pass a final, balanced budget for the fiscal year

that starts July 1. The "May revise" rollout is part of the annual call-and-response between the governor's office and the Legislature over how to spend your tax dollars. Each year, the governor sets the negotiations in motion in January with a preliminary budget proposal. This year, Newsom's proffer included a record surge in K-12 education spending, along with multi-billion dollar proposals to ramp up the state's wildfire prevention projects, convert more vacant hotels into housing for the homeless and open up Medi-Cal, the state's health insurance program for the poor, to all undocumented immigrants.

What a difference two years makes. In May 2020, with the state still weathering the first surge of COVID-19, the governor's Department of Finance projected a \$54 billion deficit and a year of Great Depression-level unemployment rates. Neither came to pass, just the opposite: Boosted by rosy economic conditions for the state's highest earners and a massive influx of cash from the federal government, state coffers have been overflowing for the last two years.

Still, Newsom and the Legislature's budget staff add a note of caution: The war in Ukraine, rising inflation and higher interest rates are increasing uncertainty. And capital gains as a percentage of personal income is the highest since 1999, just before the dot.com bust. The nonpartisan Legislative Analyst's Office also warned that a recession may be on the horizon within two years, and urged the governor and Legislature to add to reserves.

The Republican minority in the Legislature is so diminished that Democrats don't need their support to pass a budget. But that isn't stopping GOP lawmakers from weighing in, if only to provide voters with a clear contrast as Election Day approaches.

"Newsom specializes in grand announcements and flashy sounding proposals, but he rarely follows through with effective solutions that actually help California families," GOP Assembly leader James Gallagher from Chico said in a statement. "The Governor may not want to acknowledge it, but California is in crisis and his budget is unsustainable."

If the average Californian hears anything about the announcement it's probably this: The governor wants to send \$400 to most of the state's car owners.

That's been the governor's idea to help drivers bear the cost of historically elevated gas prices. In the face of pushback from environmentalists, he also wants to throw in \$750 million to entice transit agencies to make bus and rail travel free for three months. And lest he be accused to throwing money at those who don't need it, the proposal is limited to drivers whose cars are worth under an as-yet unspecified cap.

Despite all that, there's some distance between this proposal and the Legislature's, where Democratic leaders want to send cash rebates to Californians making less than \$250,000, car owners or not. And it's even further still

from the GOP plan, which is simply to suspend the state gas tax.

"I have all the confidence in the world we'll be able to square those modest differences and we'll come around to a number and a strategy that's in the best interests of Californians," Newsom said.

For his part, Newsom pointed out his gas rebate proposal includes \$750 million to encourage free public transportation for three months. It also includes \$2.7 billion to pay rental assistance to residents who had applied before March 31 (covering claims that the original federal funding did not), and \$1.4 billion in utility assistance.

Today's announcement also answered another big question left unaddressed by the January proposal: Will an obscure amendment inserted into the California Constitution in 1979 compel the state to reroute some of the state's extra cash back to taxpayers?

The answer, at least for now, appears to be no.

The constitutional provision in question, the Gann Limit, was approved by voters during the heyday of the state's conservative "tax revolt" and capped perperson state spending to its 1978 level, after adjusting for inflation. Anything left over has to be sent back to taxpayers and school districts. With the state's coffers as full as they are, the January budget blueprint projected that the state would breach the cap.

But with more spending on exempt types of expenditure, including infrastructure, the current plan is now \$2.6 billion below that ceiling. Newsom noted that he would support a proposal to put an amendment to voters to tweak or perhaps outright eliminate the Gann Limit, which he said is "long overdue."

Following a years-long trend, the governor also hints at the possibility of shuttering more state prisons. Though the state prison population has ticked up slightly since the early days of the pandemic, it still sits at a decade-long trough and is expected to continue trending down. Today's budget proposal notes that the state may be able to "close three additional state prisons by 2024-25."

With the state bracing for yet another season of extreme heat, wildfire and drought, Newsom's revised budget includes an additional \$8 billion to increase the reliability of the state's power grid and hasten the development of clean energy projects.

Newsom also acknowledged the stress that the state's never-ending wildfire season takes on fire crews by asking for \$233 million to bolster Cal Fire. The proposed budget adds an additional \$104 million to add 270 positions over four years, something the agency has been seeking for some time.

As drought deepens and spring brings increased water use in cities and towns, Newsom is asking for additional \$1.3 billion in drought and water resilience spending, up from \$750 million in his January plan. The total would add to last year's water and drought budget of \$5.2 billion over three years.

In total, the governor is proposing to spend an additional \$9.5 billion in climate investments over his January blueprint, bringing the total to \$32 billion. But for some advocates, that still isn't enough.

"It's disappointing to see the May Revision isn't putting much more of our budget surplus to work at the scale required to stop climate change from destroying the California we love," EnviroVoters head Mary Creasman said in a statement. The organization wants the state to invest an additional \$75 billion to fight climate change over the next five years.

The governor also did not budge on his timeline for expanding Medi-Cal for undocumented adults ages 26 to 49, despite calls to enact the changes sooner. His original expansion sets the start


date at the beginning of 2024 and calls for \$819 million next year and \$2.7 billion annually to support the expansion. The Senate budget plan proposed an additional \$1 billion next year to move the timeline up six months. The Medi-Cal expansion is a pivot from Newsom's earlier support of a contentious state-run, single-payer health system, which died without a vote earlier this year.

Newsom also proposed a whopping \$2 billion to fund the state's COVID-19 strategy known as the SMARTER plan. That includes \$530 million for testing and laboratory costs, \$158 million to implement the federal program for COVID-19 drugs, and \$468 million to support services for migrants at the Mexico border.

To address California's homelessness crisis, Newsom added \$700 million atop his originally proposed \$2 billion in January— and the whopping \$12 billion announced last year— to fund mainly interim solutions, such as tiny homes and encampment cleanups. Absent, however, was a long-term extension of the flexible grants included in last year's budget that local governments have been seeking.

One person's "flexible" is another's "unaccountable," Newsom said: "Understandably they want more funding, they want more predictability. But understandably as well, you, as taxpayers, are waiting for their plans."


Echoing his Republican challengers in the unsuccessful effort last year to remove him from office, Newsom cast some blame for the housing crisis on the state's premier environmental law—but proposed little in the way of change. Instead, he said he signed 17 CEQA reform bills and looks forward to working with legislators on more proposals that provide more certainty and more predictability to address housing affordability issues.

Newsom's Rosy Budget **Ignores Troubling Trends**

The truly astonishing tax revenue numbers cited by Gov. Gavin Newsom last week as he unveiled a revised state budget bring to mind an old adage: "The bigger they are, the harder they fall."

So much money is pouring into state coffers from personal and corporate income taxes and sales taxes that Newsom said the state will have nearly \$100 billion more than it needs to finance ongoing spending, twice as much as his original budget, proposed in January, estimated.

"You've never seen a number like this," Newsom told reporters.

True enough, and it poses a potential problem that could be just as monumental. Big budget surpluses generate big demands for new spending from the advocates of educational, social welfare and medical services. But if spent on new entitlements, they become liabilities when, inevitably, the economy cools and revenues decline.

Boom and bust budgets plagued the state for decades as personal income taxes became the largest revenue source with much of them coming from a relative few high-income taxpayers. Their incomes, largely from capital gains

on investments, were and incidentally) advocacy are more volatile than those of ordinary people and when they declined, it had a disproportionately heavy impact on the state's finances.

The revised California budget projects \$214.2 billion in direct general fund taxes, with personal income taxes supplying 64% of that. Roughly half of those income taxes come from the top 1% of taxpayers, fewer than 200,000 people in a state of nearly 40 million residents.

In introducing the revised budget, Newsom said he is 'very mindful" of potential volatility and is responding by putting more money into reserves and making very few new permanent and long-term spending commitments.

About half of the projected surplus must, by law, go to public education and expanding the "rainy day fund" and other reserves to nearly \$40 billion. That leaves an estimated \$49 billion of so-called "discretionary income" that could be spent on anything he and legislators want.

Newsom says his budget would devote 94% of that pot of money to onetime allocations or paying down debt to avoid longterm commitments that could backfire should the economy cool and revenues decline. "This is important," he said of that strategy.

Yes it is, because the advocates of expanded entitlements and their legislative allies contend that the surplus is a golden opportunity to fill gaps. Within minutes of Newsom's budget press conference (which was 132 minutes long, groups were expressing disappointment.

The question posed by the astonishingly high revenue numbers is whether the good times — at least the good times for high-income taxpayers — will continue.

As the budget revision was being finalized, the world, the nation and California were experiencing some troubling trends that Newsom acknowledged.

"This May revision reflects a significantly upgraded revenue forecast due to recent cash trends and improvement in key economic indicators," Newsom told the Legislature. "However, the forecast has become more uncertain given Russia's war on Ukraine, high rates of inflation, and anticipated actions by the Federal Reserve to raise interest rates. In addition, capital gains as a percent of the state's personal income are at levels last seen in 1999 – just before the dot-com bust. Furthermore, the May revision forecast was finalized before the recent declines in the stock market."

California is not an economic island and those potentially negative factors are beyond the state's control. However, the budget's very rosy revenue projections ignore them and assume that the golden geese, California's high-income taxpayers, will continue to prosper and continue laying golden eggs.

Married VS Domestic Partner with Employer Benefits and Delaying Medicare Part B

is different than most couples that I read about in your weekly Medicare column. I am finding out that my company's group health plan is not paying

for any Medicare Part B medical expense since my husband is really a domestic partner. We have been together for over 25 years, but never officially married. Richard is 72 and I am a 58-year-old female who now needs to learn the maze of Medicare

Richard has serious health issues with 2 stents in his heart and a recent back surgery, which is now costing us thousands of dollars because my company's group health plan is not paying for his doctor's care. Richard has never enrolled in Medicare Part B because I have always been the "working spouse." Now am discovering that the group health plan (the company's self-administered group health plan) does not recognize "domestic partners" as a married couple because

we do not have a marriage license Now, he needs to enroll in Medicare Part B, and with him being 72 if he does not do this correctly the penalty will be over 7 years. From what I have read in your articles, that this could be 70 or 80% penalty forever. The bottom line is,

we need HELP!! ~ Thank You, Gabby, Phoenix, AZ Gabby:

Enrolling in Medicare Part B needs to be a rush job! You are in the middle of the maze of Medicare and Richard needs Medicare Part B immediately!

This is a new Medicare question for the Toni Says® Medicare office. America needs to know the rules of Medicare regarding delaying Medicare Part B, when there is an unmarried domestic partner situation (same sex or opposite sex), and they receive health insurance through their partner's employer.

your domestic partner's Medicare Part B with your company's health insurance benefits administrator or HR department about what is in the insurance company's handbook regarding unmarried domestic spouse Medicare rules.

The size of the group may not make a difference. Whether there are less than or over 100 employees on your unmarried spouse's group health insurance plan, one should verify with HR or the insurance plan if you generally should not delay the non-working domestic partner's Medicare Part B. As I said earlier in this article, always consult with your benefits or HR department about the consequences that may arise when your domestic partner delays their Medicare Part B and if there could be a possibility of receiving a late Part B penalty, when they need to enroll in Medicare Part B at a later date.

I have written about the "Special Enrollment Period" and having the Social Security form titled CMS L-564 "Request for Employment Information" filled out by your HR or office manager. Richard could have his Medicare Part B with an effective date of the first of the next month.

Richard will need to take 2 Social Security forms, the CMS L-564 "Request for Employment Information" signed by the employer's HR department along with the CMS 40-B "Application for Medicare Part B" to his local Social Security office.

UC Davis Health Clears Way for Construction on Hospital of the Future

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - UC Davis Health started clearing the way today for what will be the region's most advanced hospital tower – the UC Davis Medical Center's

California Tower.

Crews started demolition of multiple temporary buildings on the site of the future tower. It's a necessary step to make the site ready for a California Tower groundbreaking in 2023 and open to patients in 2030.

The \$3.75 billion tower is a replacement for existing parts of the hospital that must be closed due to state seismic laws. Approved by the UC Board of Regents in January, the tower will be added to the eastern side of the existing UC Davis Medical Center. It will feature a 14-story hospital tower and five-story

pavilion, adding to a hospital complex that has been expanding eastward and serving the neighborhoods at this location for over 150 years.

"This project incorporates lessons from the pandemic and those lessons will help us to deliver superior care for Northern Californians for the next 50 years," said David Lubarsky, CEO of UC Davis Health. "The California Tower will triple our ICU capability, making half of our patient rooms ICU-ready. This investment will be a cornerstone in the critical care we provide our patients and the region moving forward."

The new additions reflect UC Davis Health's long-time commitment to education, research, patient care and community health. They complement the health system's mission of improving health for all.

The project is also the result of state seismic safety mandates, which put a deadline on hospitals to either upgrade their existing facilities or construct new buildings.

The California Tower adds to the Medical Center's existing University and Davis Towers and will add approximately one million square feet of additional space. It will include operating rooms, an imaging center, an expanded pharmacy, additional burn care units, and about 400 single-patient rooms. The new rooms will replace others being taken out of service in older parts of the building. With 646 beds currently, the UC Davis Medical Center will continue to be the largest hospital in the Sacramento area. It will have a total of 675-700 inpatient beds when the project is completed.

Under the baton of Interim Director Susan Hamre, the CPCB will perform its first public concert since Dec. 7, 2019. The band suspended operations in March 2020 but restarted rehearsals in March this year with a goal of playing a handful of concerts to celebrate its Silver Anniversary Season.

The one-hour, outdoor Memorial Day concert will honor the service of former U.S. armed forces personnel and those on active duty around the world today.

Just six days later, on Sunday, June 5, 2022, the band will perform another free, open to the public concert at 1 p.m. in Carmichael Park, 5750 Grant Ave., in Carmichael. That one-hour performance in the park amphitheater is part of

the Carmichael Park Community Band Festival, presented by the Sacramento Valley Symphonic Band Association. The June 4-5 extravaganza features 14 bands, performing hourly from noon to 7 p.m. both days.

The Veterans Community Center in Citrus Heights is a gathering place for veterans of all branches of the military. Veteran founders/owners Jim and Jeanne Rounsavell have encouraged past and present military personnel to share their experiences at the site, which was the Sylvan Schoolhouse in the early days of Citrus Heights. These adaptable rooms will easily convert into intensive-care-unit rooms with air isolation so that they could be used to care for patients of any level of hospitalization.

"As the COVID-19 pandemic has taught us, embracing the unexpected is a common theme in medicine," said Lubarsky. "Having the adaptability of patient rooms to meet a critical care surge means these new facilities will be

positioned to meet the region's needs for the next 50 years."

"This project will further harness the advantage of UC Davis Medical Center being one of Sacramento County's largest employers to increase community wealth-building and strengthen our surrounding neighborhoods," said Brad Simmons, chief administrator of UC Davis Medical Center. "This project will help improve health outcomes for area residents and ensure a robust health care safety net for historically marginalized populations, especially when it comes to

providing specialty care hospital services."

The California Tower project is expected to create hundreds of construction jobs and thousands of new health care positions for the surrounding community, a benefit of being home to an anchor institution like UC Davis Medical Center. Anchor institutions are placebased, mission-driven entities like universities and hospitals that leverage economic power alongside human and intellectual resources to improve the longterm health and social welfare of surrounding communities.
