RIO LINDA, CA (MPG) - Tonia Silva is a Rio Linda resident who purchased the office building, located at 825 M St. in Rio Linda, in the spring of this year. Tonia is a bookkeeper and tax preparer, and this building was going to be the new home of her business. Tonia says, “As soon as I purchased the property, I knew I wanted to use the property to support local businesses.”

After a long day of crunching numbers, Tonia said she likes to go home and craft with her kids as a way to unwind. She thought that her new office building would not only be a great place to help local businesses

with their accounting and tax needs, but it could also serve as a great place for local crafters, including herself and her kids, a place to market the items they’ve made.

A few months before Tonia bought her office building, her sister LeAnn started a soap making business called Renewal Soaps. It seems craft talent runs in the family. It made sense that the sisters should team up. Once you get a creative mind to create, it can become a whirlwind of ideas. It wasn’t long before the sisters began planning for the creation of the Rio Linda Crafts Fair.

LeAnn now carries a full line of locally made bath and body products that can be ordered online. LeAnn is

also the vendor coordinator for the first annual Rio Linda Crafts Fair. Even though it’s only the first year, over 40 vendors will be attending, with a wide variety of items. The ladies are doing their best to keep the vendors local (mostly Rio Linda and Elverta) crafters and businesses, although guests from anywhere are invited.

Just a few of the items that are scheduled to be available at this year’s fair include crocheted and knitted items, homemade peanut brittle, locally made beef jerky, personalized tumblers, t-shirts and handmade cards. Additional vendors include Pampered Chef, Pittador Brews,

Distracted Driving: Is It Worth It?

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Every year, thousands of people are seriously injured or killed statewide in vehicle crashes caused by distracted drivers. To combat this issue, the California Highway Patrol (CHP) received the Adult Distracted Drivers (ADD) XII grant to keep California roads safe through education and enforcement.

“Distracted driving is a serious issue that is 100 percent preventable,” said CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray. “We are encouraging drivers to make a conscious choice to not drive distracted. This simple decision can have a tremendous positive impact on the safety of California’s roadways.”

Drivers who choose to drive distracted exponentially increase the odds of being involved in a vehicle crash. According to data from the CHP’s Statewide Integrated Traffic Records System, in 2019 there were nearly 19,000 crashes where driver inattention played a role. Of the 9,371 drivers involved in a fatal or injury distracted driving crash that year, nearly 10 percent cited cell phone use as the source of inattention.

Though there are numerous distractions for a driver, cell phones are the most prevalent. Handheld cell phone use while driving is not only illegal in California, it is an unsafe activity behind the wheel. In California, drivers under the age of 18 are prohibited from using a cell phone while driving for any reason, including hands-free devices.

“Driving safely requires complete attention, so it is best to stay focused on the road. Distraction behind the wheel jeopardizes your safety, your passengers’ safety, and the well-being of those around you,” Commissioner Ray added.

Funds from the ADD grant will help support the CHP’s completion of at least 400 traffic safety presentations statewide and a minimum of 80 distracted driving enforcement operations between October 1, 2021, and September 30, 2022.

Funding for this program is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

The mission of the CHP is to provide the highest level of Safety, Service, and Security. ★

Robinson Wins MiLB’s Best Feel-Good Moment

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sacramento River Cats outfielder Drew Robinson’s final professional baseball game, and the moving standing ovation from fans, teammates, and opponents at Sutter Health Park, was a moment much larger than baseball, and won the MiLB Award for Best Feel-Good Moment of 2021.

With his family watching from the stands, players from both dugouts stepped out to applaud an emotional Robinson before his first at bat against the Round Rock Express on July 20.

The standing ovation celebrated an incredible comeback to the diamond that reached thousands on social media. Less than a year after losing his eye in an attempt to take his own life, Robinson returned to baseball, making the River Cats’ roster out of Spring Training.

He started for Sacramento on Opening Day against his hometown Las Vegas

Aviators. In his fourth game of the season, Robinson launched a towering home run and pointed to his family in the crowd as he touched home plate on May 11.

Robinson also earned the No. 1 spot on SportsCenter’s Top-10 Plays with a diving double-catch against Round Rock on July 19.

The inspirational Robinson has since transitioned into a role as a mental-health advocate with the San Francisco Giants.

The MiLB Awards highlight the best players, moments, and teams in Minor League Baseball each season, and are decided through voting on MiLB.com.

Legislation Honors SMUD as National Climate Leader

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California is the capital of innovation and a global leader in the fight against the climate crisis. Over the past five years, Californians have witnessed two of the hottest years on record and experienced devastating wildfires that affect the health, economy, and overall well-being of our communities. As state legislators, we set policy aimed to protect our great state, and it is imperative that we collaborate with and recognize community partners that take action to move the needle toward real, identifiable, and positive change. For these reasons, we proudly authored Senate Concurrent Resolution 51 – which passed with bipartisan support – recognizing SMUD for being the first large utility in the country to adopt a Zero Carbon Plan that will completely eliminate carbon from its electricity generation by 2030.

The Sacramento area is consistently ranked as one of the dirtiest air basins in the country, as shown by the recently released American Lung Association State of the Air Report. Our children are 22 percent more likely to develop asthma than those in the rest of the country. Consequently, these challenges impact our most vulnerable populations disproportionately. Our current reality is unacceptable, and the only way to safeguard our future for generations to come is to create carbon free solutions that foster healthy outcomes and create green jobs for the benefit of us all.

Right here in our own backyard, our community-owned, not-for-profit electric utility, SMUD, recently adopted a Zero Carbon Plan to eliminate all carbon emissions from electricity generation in our region by 2030. While that timeline sounds ambitious, SMUD’s track record of delivering on sustainable solutions and championing innovative action plans is exactly what is needed to create clean powered communities.

The SMUD Board of Directors has consistently championed green initiatives that support innovative solutions to renewable energy. Their leadership has achieved tangible results. For example, SMUD was the first utility to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions by nearly 50 percent from 1990 levels – the equivalent of removing 377,000 vehicles from the road. They’ve championed

clean cars and partnered to plant more than 600,000 shade trees. They helped usher in the solar industry and now with their Zero Carbon Plan, they are ushering a new era of innovation. Today, SMUD already delivers power that is 50 percent carbon free. With its Greenergy and SolarShares programs, SMUD provides many state owned and privately owned buildings with 100% clean, carbon-free electricity. In keeping with this tradition, their new Zero Carbon plan doubles down on these efforts and would power the Sacramento region with 100% renewable sources.

SMUD’s Zero Carbon Plan includes retiring carbon emitting natural gas plants and relies heavily on the electrification of the building and transportation sectors since these are two of the largest carbon emitting sectors in the State. For example, efforts include providing support for all-electric homes through customer incentives for rooftop solar and battery storage, electric vehicles, and by providing rebates to builders and homeowners for the installation of clean water heaters, HVAC systems, and cooktops.

In addition, SMUD has spearheaded and funded the California Mobility Center to bring emerging clean transportation options to the market. This innovation hub has brought federal funding to the Sacramento area and has successfully attracted startup companies in the field of clean mobility. The Center is providing the guidance, education and partnerships needed to bring these ideas to fruition, while simultaneously providing 8,500 new clean technology jobs.

SMUD’s comprehensive plan to reach zero carbon emissions by 2030 is one that relies on all the tools in our toolkit. It’s the most ambitious of any large utility in the nation and their commitment to our community and equity for all is one to be commended and recognized.

For these reasons, it was an honor and pleasure to come together in a bi-partisan and bi-cameral effort to recognize SMUD for leading the nation by example as it takes tangible steps to reduce the devastating effects of climate change and trailblazing the path forward for a more prosperous future.

SCDA Lauds House Passage of Infrastructure Bill

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The US House of Representatives passed the \$1.2 trillion Infrastructure Investments and Jobs Act bill package. Very preliminary estimates show that the formulaic components of the bill could provide the Sacramento County Department of Airports (SCDA) as much as \$14 million per year for five years.

Additionally, there is anticipated to be \$5 billion for airport terminal programs that will be awarded on a discretionary basis over five years. SCDA staff is working to identify eligible projects that would meet the timeframe for infrastructure funds being made available.

Once signed into law by President Biden, this once-in-a-generation investment will help to create quality jobs for Californians, support the modernization of key state infrastructure, improve our transportation systems and help fund the expansion of

zero-emission vehicle infrastructure.

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act will provide \$20 billion in crucial funding that airports can use to upgrade aging infrastructure and build needed capacity to serve recovering passenger levels. The bill also enhances low-interest financing options for airports through the Transportation and Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (TIFIA).

TIFIA provides credit assistance for qualified projects of regional and national significance. Many large-scale, surface transportation projects - highway, transit, railroad, intermodal freight, and port access - are eligible for assistance. Eligible applicants include state and local governments, transit agencies, railroad companies, special authorities, special districts, and private entities. The bill also provides \$5 billion to FAA for modification of existing air traffic control tower and towers.

“SCDA is thrilled with the passage of the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act,” said Cindy Nichol, Director of Airports for Sacramento County. “As SCDA looks to adapt to the future of air travel, the financial tools provided by the infrastructure bill will be important components of our efforts to put the people at the center of every trip, every experience, every day.”

“SCDA would like to thank Congressman John Garamendi for his support of TIFIA for airports, as well as the members of the greater Sacramento delegation who supported this legislation,” said Nichol.

2020 Farm Report: Wine Grapes Still Top Crop

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The value of Sacramento County crops dipped slightly last year, but agriculture continues to be an important player in the local economy. In 2020, the total cash value of all agricultural commodities was almost \$455 million, according to the 2020 Sacramento County Crop and Livestock Report.
Wine grapes once again took the lead as the highest-valued commodity, with a value of close to \$156 million. More than 34 reported varieties are grown on 36,000 acres in Sacramento County.
Milk and other dairy products remained the County's second-highest valued commodity at \$64 million, an increase in value of 25 percent over 2019. About 16,000 dairy cows live on 16 family-owned dairies in Sacramento County. The County is even home to a water buffalo dairy that provides milk products to a creamery in the Bay Area.

Every year, the value of specific commodities rises or falls based on weather, supply and demand, and market forces. Notable increases in 2020 included cherries, whose cash value is up 82 percent over 2019 due to favorable spring weather conditions. Oat hay is up 69 percent over last year, and almonds increased 61 percent in value over the previous year's crop.
The 2020 value of agricultural commodities decreased 1.2 percent in comparison to 2019. This represents gross returns and not actual net profits or losses, according to Sacramento County Agricultural Commissioner Chris Flores.
"Last year was fraught with challenges and yet the gross production value of agriculture in Sacramento County remained relatively stable," she said. "This is a testament to the resiliency and importance of this industry."
"We would like to honor and recognize our essential growers, ranchers, farmworkers and all others

supportive of agriculture, who continued to produce and provide agricultural commodities locally and to people around the world."

(1) Wine grapes; (2) Milk; (3) Poultry; (4) Nursery stock (ornamental trees and plants, Christmas trees and sod) (5) Pears; (6) Hay (alfalfa) (7) Aquaculture (bass, carp, catfish, crayfish, sturgeon and caviar) (8) Rice (9) Cattle and calves (10) Silage (corn grown to feed livestock)
The 2020 report includes a list of local Certified Farmer's Markets and a 2022 calendar with full-color illustrations.
Flores presented the report to the County Board of Supervisors on Nov. 2. ★

Today's Small Business Trends

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - From John Kabateck, California state director for the National Federation of Independent Business on today's release of NFIB's monthly Small Business Economic Trends (SBET) report, America's bellwether measurement of the Main Street economy.
I am glad the U.S. Labor Department is finding workers returning to the job, Main Street is still waiting. What stood out for me in this month's SBET is that small business owners expecting better business conditions over the next six months fell four points to a net negative 37%. This indicator has declined 17 points over the past three months to its lowest level since November 2012. Unfilled job openings,

supply chain disruptions, inflation, a Congress threatening more taxes add up to a bleak outlook for the nation's and California's leading job-creators.
From NFIB Chief Economist Bill Dunkelberg
Small business owners are attempting to take advantage of current economic growth but remain pessimistic about business conditions in the near future. One of the biggest problems for small businesses is the lack of workers for unfilled positions and inventory shortages, which will continue to be a problem during the holiday season.
Adding to the muddle, Washington is having trouble putting its economic policies into place. Spending and tax policies are still up in the air, while debt ceiling problems loom larger each day. The Federal Reserve is also scrambling to reset policies to deal with growth and inflation numbers it had not expected.
More comment is available on Page 3 of the NFIB Small Business Economic Trends report.
The NFIB Research

Center has collected Small Business Economic Trends data with quarterly surveys since the 4th quarter of 1973 and monthly surveys since 1986. Survey respondents are drawn from a random sample of NFIB's membership. The report is released on the second Tuesday of each month. Today's survey was conducted in October 2021. NFIB's SBET and Jobs Report are national snapshots not broken down by state.
The SBET's primary value is anticipating short-run fluctuations in economic activity. An additional value of the SBET is its measurement of small business activities and concerns over time. The benefit of a longitudinal data set offers an invaluable perspective on how policies and business cycles impact small businesses over time. The SBET is one of the few archival data sets on small business, particularly when research questions address business operations rather than opinions. Today, it's the largest, longest-running data set on small business economic conditions available.

Retirement Brings with It Extra Time

Singer Jim Croce longed to put time in a bottle.

Retirees aren’t always certain what it is they long to do with time, but one day they stop working and find they have a barrelful of it.

“People often are so focused on making sure they are financially ready to retire that they forget to plan for what they want to do in retirement,” says Patti Hart, co-author with her husband, Milledge, of *The Resolutionist: Welcome to the Anti-Retirement Movement*.

“And they may have more time to fill than they realize. Life expectancy has grown, and retirements that last 20 years, 30 years, or longer aren’t that unusual. So you have to start thinking, what will you do with your time? How do you envision your days playing out?”

For the Harts, the answers to those questions involve the “anti-retirement movement,” where retirement is more than a rocking chair on a front porch or endless hours of golf.

“We did leave our careers, but we would never call ourselves retired,” Milledge Hart says. “We are busier now than we’ve ever been. The difference is that we are busy doing what brings us joy rather than what advances our careers.”

But the transition isn’t always easy, which is why the Harts recommend finding efficient ways to manage that extra time the post-career years bring.

Patti Hart cautions that time management does not have to mean blocking out every minute.

“For most people, it is just setting goals and priorities, then making sure you plan for how you are going to accomplish them,” she says. “It is being productive with your time.”

To do that, the Harts suggest putting yourself into the mindset you had in your working years,

such as: **Use a calendar.** People in a corporate setting rely on calendars to manage their obligations and retirees can as well. “Too often people just think they will remember that they have yoga on Tuesday and Thursday, and volunteer at the animal shelter on Wednesday,” Patti Hart says. “But then they add a lunch here or a board meeting there and pretty soon find themselves scurrying from activity to activity.” Checking a calendar each day also let’s people know they may need to pull back if they are overcommitted, or they may need to find activities to add if too many empty hours are going to waste. **Make a to-do list.** A to-do list helps ensure nothing

gets forgotten. Just be flexible, Milledge Hart says, because the list is a tool to keep you on track, not a ball and chain to imprison you. “If you’d rather do something else today, feel free to move items to another time or just skip them altogether,” he says. “It’s your list so it’s your call.” **Treat everything like a business appointment.** The calendar and the to-do list can be filled with things that would never have made a business person’s schedule – but may now be high priority for you. “You can pencil in 30 minutes for meditation or an hour to begin reading a James Patterson novel,” Patti Hart says. “Maybe you want to block out Friday afternoon to experiment

with a new recipe. These are your preferred ‘appointments’ now and are equal in importance to board meetings or conference calls.” **Adapt your system as your needs change.** Some people begin retirement doing all the things they had been putting off, such as traveling or fishing more. “But that first burst of activity usually begins to wear, and you realize you want more from this stage of life,” Milledge Hart says. “At that point it makes sense to reevaluate your resources and goals. Be aware of how you feel about certain activities and be ready to drop some and pick up others as your time and interests change.”

“In the same way that making

good financial investments provides you with additional capital, investing your time wisely provides you with more time to do things you really want to do,” Patti Hart says. “And that will make your life so much better.”

California’s Messier, but Fairer, Redistricting Process

For many decades, the decennial chore of redrawing California’s congressional and legislative districts was relatively simple. Every 10 years, following the census, legislative and congressional leaders would hire some knowledgeable number-crunchers and privately divvy up the districts for purely political purposes. If one party controlled both the Legislature and the governorship, it would maximize its ability to remain in power. The maps that the dominant Democrats drew up after the 1980 census was the last time California saw a blatantly partisan gerrymander. Republicans howled and persuaded voters to overturn the plan via a referendum, but the state Supreme Court ordered that the rejected maps be used anyway for the 1982 elections, in which Democrats retained their control of the Legislature and the congressional delegation. Assembly Speaker Willie Brown publicly thanked “Sister Rose and the Supremes” for helping his party overcome the referendum, referring to Chief Justice Rose Bird. It fueled a successful drive to oust Bird and two other justices when they stood for re-election four years later. Get a veteran journalist’s take on what’s going on in

California with a weekly round-up of Dan’s column every Friday. After the 1982 election, Democrats enacted a slightly altered version of the gerrymander and then-Gov. Jerry Brown signed it just before leaving office. The congressional map was particularly slanted toward Democrats and its primary creator, San Francisco Congressman Phil Burton, laconically called it “my contribution to modern art.” Control of redistricting was the primary, if unspoken, issue of the 1990 campaign for governor and after Republican Pete Wilson won he vetoed a new set of maps drawn by Democrats, throwing the issue into the state Supreme Court. The court generated maps of its own that allowed the Republicans to make some gains in the 1992 and 1994 elections. Democrats once again controlled the Legislature and the governorship after the 2000 census, but a partisan gerrymander was blunted by other factors, including an implicit threat of intervention by the U.S. Department of Justice under President George W. Bush. The upshot was a bipartisan gerrymander aimed at protecting all incumbents and preserving the partisan status quo in both the Legislature and Congress, while ignoring dramatic demographic shifts, including a big surge in Latino population. Overt gerrymandering ended a decade later, after voters approved two initiatives – hated by leaders of both parties – to shift the decennial mapmaking to an independent commission that would ignore partisan considerations,

draw districts to follow, where possible, city and county boundaries and preserve “communities of interest.” On the whole, the commission was faithful to its mission, but nevertheless, Democrats made big gains in congressional and legislative seats – eventually winning three-fourths of both as GOP voter strength plummeted. With data from a new census – much delayed due to the COVID-19 pandemic – a new commission is working on new maps under a very tight deadline and it’s been a rather messy process – a “hot mess” in the recent words of one commission member. Drafts of the new maps were released last week and it’s apparent that they are likely to change quite a bit before the Dec. 27 deadline. That said, it’s obvious that Democrats will retain their overwhelming legislative and congressional supermajorities and could gain a few more seats simply because demographic trends continue to run their way. Most of the uncertainty is in the 52 congressional districts – one fewer than before due to California’s slow population growth. Democrats are struggling to retain their paper-thin control of Congress and a handful of toss-up seats in California could be the difference. However, until the final maps are filed, no one can truly predict who will survive and whose careers will end. The process is messier than before, but also fairer.
