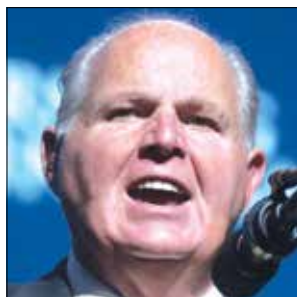

A Chip off the Old Block

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Staged in Carmichael, Sacramento Fine Arts Center's annual Magnum Opus exhibition featured 70 artists and works ranging from watercolors to a three-dimensional city-scape. Stacey Gregory's "Tech... tech... tech... Boom," an urban diorama in mixed media, won Best of Show

for the Salinas artist.

Exhibiting for the first time in the international show's 32 years, Rio Linda sculptor Stephen Bouska won praise from judge Steve Memering. Bouska fashioned friend Alexis Pavlantos' portrait from Tuscan marble that was quarried where Michaelangelo procured stone. "It's sculpted from a block that came to the States in the 1980s," said Bouska (38). "The original piece weighed

about 2000 pounds. I guess you could call this bust a chip of the old block."

A stonemason by day, Bouska gained sculpting skills at the Academy of Art University in San Francisco. He has worked all over the world and his "personal masterpiece," a life-size female nude called Tullee, won Best of Show in a San Francisco exhibition. This piece is now on loan to USA's biggest figurative sculpture

Specialty Team Deployment of Body-Worn Cameras Announced

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Sheriff's Office is pleased to announce that effective February 15, 2021, the specialized units of Gangs, Homeless Outreach and North Problem Oriented Policing (POP) will be equipped with body worn cameras. After a process that started with field-testing cameras in 2017, and officially requesting funding for body cams in 2018, our body worn program has finally begun. This pilot program approach allows the sheriff's office to study and evaluate the effectiveness, as well as the technology, data storage and best practices.

The Sacramento County Sheriff's Office is committed to an ongoing partnership with our community to provide the highest level of service based on trust and transparency. In addition to our in-car camera systems which have been utilized for over a decade, the implementation of the body worn cameras will allow deputies to document incidents and interactions and obtain evidence during investigations. In terms of evidence collection, body worn cameras and in-car cameras provide an invaluable record of statements, physical evidence, and timeline of events during crimes in progress and other critical incidents.

Additionally, the sheriff's office will be able to review the video footage to debrief critical incidents and use the camera footage as a training tool to keep officers well trained and prepared. We embrace this valuable tool and are proud of our deputies' professionalism as they provide service to the Sacramento County Community.

We are on track for a full deployment of body worn cameras by June 2021. The agency wide distribution of body-worn cameras for deputies will enhance safety, increase accountability, reduce County liability and advance prosecution. ★

Curbside Collection Rates Increase on March 1

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - A rate increase will take effect March 1 for residents of the unincorporated county who receive curbside garbage, recycling, and green waste service.

Rates will increase by \$5 per month for the 30-gallon, 60-gallon, and 90-gallon garbage cart sizes. The standard level of service includes one garbage cart (size chosen by the customer), one recycling cart, and one green waste cart. An additional increase of \$5 per month will take effect Jan. 1, 2022.

The increase – the first in 10 years – was approved on Jan. 12 by the County Board of Supervisors and will only partially offset the increased cost to collect and process residential recycling and green waste material that is collected curbside.

The table below provides a breakdown of the approved rates:

The price for a 30 gallon Garbage Cart is currently \$19.95 but will be \$24.95 effective March 1, 2021. An additional increase of \$5 per month will take effect Jan. 1, 2022 projected to be \$29.95.

The price for a 60 gallon Garbage Cart is currently \$23.55 but will be \$28.55 effective March 1, 2021. An additional increase of

\$5 per month will take effect Jan. 1, 2022 projected to be \$33.55.

The price for a 90 gallon Garbage Cart is currently \$30.76 but will be \$35.76 effective March 1, 2021. An additional increase of \$5 per month will take effect Jan. 1, 2022 projected to be \$40.76.

The Board of Supervisors also doubled the monthly rebate amount available to eligible low-income customers through

the Solid Waste Lifeline Rate Assistance Program. Effective March 1, the rebate amount will increase from \$5 per month to \$10 per month.

Is Buying a Second Home on Your 2021 To-Do List?

Owning a second home can provide retirees – or even younger families – a mountain retreat or a house at the beach for those family vacations or quick weekend getaways.

But if buying a second home is on your list of New Year’s resolutions for 2021, be sure to consider all the upsides and downsides before committing, says Patrick Rush (www.patrickrushfta.com), CEO of Triad Financial Advisors and the ForbesBooks author of Gain Big and Give Back: Financial Planning with Intention.

“Many retirees end up regretting it,” Rush says. “They feel they are forced to go to that second home every weekend just because they spent so much on it. A vacation property or second home can certainly provide a lot of joy, but it rarely works out financially.” That doesn’t stop people from buying them, though.

The National Association of Home Builders estimates that Americans own about 7.4 million second homes, which is about 5.6 percent of the total housing stock.

“People tend to purchase a second home either as a rental property or a vacation home, which they might also rent for part of the year,” Rush says. “But unless you’re in a hot real estate market, the return on investment usually isn’t worth the hassle. There are better ways of growing your money.”

Rush says a few things to know about investing in a second home include: **Real estate doesn’t automatically mean easy money.** People mistakenly believe real estate provides a guaranteed return, but that’s not always true. Rush recalls one client who, over Rush’s vehement objections, withdrew all of his retirement money to build an expensive second home. The client was certain the house would pay off, but he eventually was forced to sell it for half his investment. **Consider the overall impact on your life.** Most people don’t have endless streams of money, even if they have done well for themselves financially. So, a splurge in one area often requires a sacrifice in another. “If you want the second home, then perhaps an Alaskan cruise

won’t be in the budget,” Rush says. “It comes down to what your priorities are.” **Upkeep can become overwhelming.** People tend to overlook the ancillary costs that make owning a second home expensive, Rush says. Take those into consideration as you make your decision. “Property taxes, homeowners association dues, insurance, and maintenance start to add up,” he says. “Renting the house out when you aren’t using it does provide an income stream, but managing the property and dealing with tenants is a hassle. You can hire a property manager, but that has its own disadvantages.” **Renting can work just as well.** While it might feel exhilarating to own a mountain home in North Carolina or a Pacific Ocean beach house, Rush says another option is simply to rent a place for a week or a weekend whenever you’re in need of a getaway. None of this means a second home is always a mistake, Rush says.

One client whose parents died and left her a generous inheritance wanted to invest the money in a beach home. Rush warned her of the potential pitfalls. She agreed it might not be the best financial decision, but when she and her sister were growing up, their parents took them every summer to Sunset Beach on the North Carolina coast. She wanted to continue that tradition for her children, her sister, and her sister’s children.

“It was a reminder that it’s not always about the numbers,” Rush says. “You have to weigh the return on investment against the emotional benefit. Financially, it wasn’t the best choice, but to her, it meant so much more. It was about keeping her parents’ memories alive. Some things truly matter more than money.”

Surge in Sacramento-Area New Home Sales Were the Highest in 16 Years

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - A total of 729 new homes were sold during January in the greater Sacramento region, the highest number since 2005, the North State BIA reported.

Mike LaFortune, senior development director for Easton Development and the BIA’s 2021 Chairman, said January was the eighth month in a row with sales higher than the previous year and shows demand for new homes in the region remains unabated.

“Sacramento-area residents are taking advantage of extremely low interest rates and new home designs that meet the needs for working at home and online learning, and we also continue to see a steady stream of prospective buyers coming from the Bay Area as more companies are committing to allowing

employees to work from home,” LaFortune said. “As more new designs hit the market to meet those needs even better, we expect the strong new home market will continue for some time.”


But while new floorplans are being offered, the number of new homes actually being built remains well below current demand, let alone the number needed to begin attacking the shortfall in new homes that the region has experienced for many years, warned Michael Strech, the BIA’s President & CEO.

“While single-family construction ramped up in December across our region, for the year housing starts were actually slightly lower than in 2019 with 7,328 permits issued, according to the just-released report from the Construction Industry Research Board. That’s just slightly higher than the number of new homes sold during the

year,” Strech said.

“In the long run, to meet the need for housing and maintain affordability we will need to continue a steady pace of building, which will require cooperation from our local officials to approve new communities and issue building permits. Fortunately, most local officials understand the need for more housing but it’s an issue we will be watching closely in the years to come.”

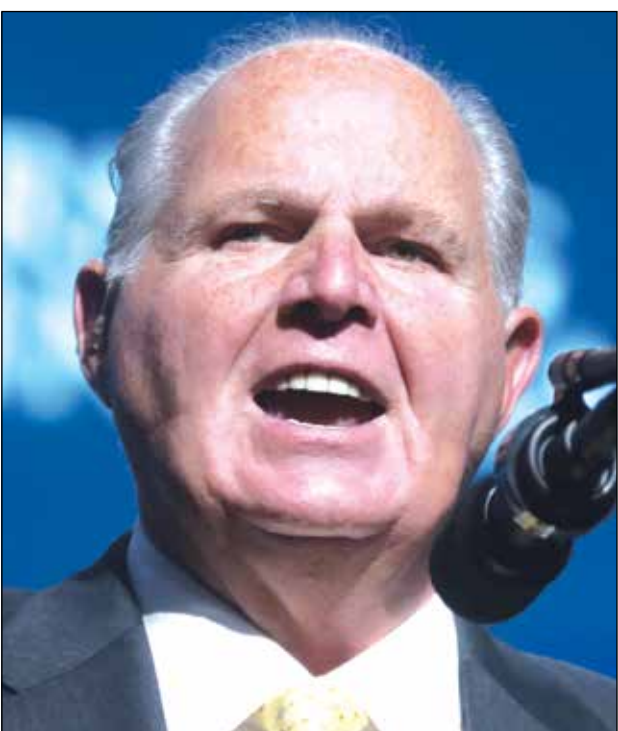
That voice was the voice of Rush Limbaugh.

Wounded Heroes Documentary Brings Hope to Our Military, First Responders, and Everyone Battling Post Traumatic Stress

CHICAGO, IL (MPG) - New film shines a light on bold new alternative non-drug treatments and programs that heal the wounds of PTS

In the Wounded Heroes Documentary due out March 5th, 2021, PTS sufferers are finally getting their voices heard as they speak out about their mistreatment by the healthcare system, the medications that are making them worse, and the amazing new proven therapies that are giving them back their lives.

An alarming statistic by the Department of Veterans Affairs report anywhere from 17 to 22 veteran suicides every single day.

Many feel it does not need to be that way.

After learning about this statistic and the serious side effects of overmedicating veterans, California filmmaker, Michael Gier, went on a mission to find successful alternative non-drug treatments that restore lives from the destruction of PTS.

“Post-Traumatic Stress among our veterans is a serious problem,” said Gier. “Most are given prescription medications, or drug cocktails as many call them, some of these prescriptions are black labeled with serious side effects.”

Gier, who traveled all over the country interviewing veterans, military brass, politicians, doctors, and other experts, said many veterans feel medication is just a band-aid over a wound that will never heal.

“Our veterans deserve so

much more than just a band-aid and that is what inspired me to create this film,” said Gier.

Wounded Heroes Documentary is a 3-year passion project, funded primarily by Michael Gier and his wife Terri Gier, and features life changing options that give those suffering from PTS hope, potentially saving lives.

“These men and women served our country for years and the best we can do is give them drugs; some as many as eighteen different prescriptions, forty pills a day?!” said Gier. “I knew there had to be better options.”

In the film, Gier interviews health care professionals who are using alternative therapies that have been successfully proven to dramatically decrease their patients' medication or help them become completely PTS prescription free.

Gier said by creating the film he wanted to bring as much awareness as possible about these life changing treatments and that everyone suffering from PTS needed to know there were other options out there for them.

“These aren’t just therapies that can help our soldiers and veterans,” said

Gier. “Firefighters, police officers, and first responders all deal with PTS, and even more people from all walks of life are being affected by Covid-19. These can benefit them too.”

Veterans reported the alternative treatments helped change their lives significantly for the better and went from contemplating suicide to finding happiness and gratitude in their daily lives.

Dr. Shauna Springer, Ph.D., known as “Doc Springer” in the military community, is one of the nation's leading experts on trauma, military transition, and close relationships. She has become a trusted Doc to

countless warfighters across the country and has gained the respect of warriors of all ranks. Her unique role has given her a deep understanding of warrior culture, and the warfighter.

Dr. Springer is a proud advocate of the film.

“The feeling that Post-Traumatic Stress is a “life sentence” is killing warriors – and people across America. Many have given up, but they need to know that there is life beyond trauma – not just survival, but a good life – a connected, emotionally fulfilling life. Wounded Heroes presents this life changing story of hope,” said Dr. Springer.

The Wounded Heroes Documentary will be available for streaming across multiple platforms including Amazon, iTunes, Google, and more starting March 5th, 2021.

expo, at Brookgreen Gardens (South Carolina). He chiseled the Alexis bust during more than 100 hours of studio labor. “It’s hard and dirty work,” observed the sculptor. “You can injure yourself with flying chips and when you start with a 180-pound marble block, you really must to be able to lift.”

Putting a \$1745 price tag on the bust, he did not expect it to sell in Carmichael. “The cost is a big commitment for an exhibition like this,” Bouska considered. “I like to sell my work, but exposure’s just as valuable. I’m also quite happy to take Alexis home with me.”

Rio Linda Man in Solo Vehicle Fatal Collision

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - On February 18, 2021, at approximately 8:40 AM, North Sacramento CHP Area units were dispatched to a call of

a collision that occurred on westbound I-80 on the Longview Drive off-ramp. Upon arrival on scene, units discovered that a dark blue Chevrolet Silverado had struck the guardrail and overhead sign pole on the Longview Drive off-ramp. Officers have determined that the 82-year-old male driver from Rio Linda had (for unknown reasons) lost control of the Silverado while taking the Longview Drive off-ramp and subsequently struck the guardrail and overhead sign pole. The driver was pronounced deceased at the scene and

the cause of the collision is still under investigation. Currently, it is unknown whether drugs and/or alcohol were contributing factors to the collision. Any persons who may have witnessed this collision or who can provide any additional information should call Officer A.J. Through the generosity of the The Rio Linda News, this column serves to provide an update about matters affecting the community of Rio Linda.

You may have seen on the news or outside your car window as you drive through town that a movement is growing in California. There is increasing support for the simple notion that children in California need to get outside and play. Since the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, children have been denied access to youth sports, physical education classes, and even playgrounds. Like many drastic steps taken in the early days of the pandemic when much was unknown about the virus, such actions seemed like acceptable, short-term precautions. It is not March 2020 anymore. We have more information on which to make decisions about our citizenry's health and safety. The time has long passed for children to get back in the game.

All priorities being about protecting health right now; physical activity for our youth is becoming more important than ever. That simple notion is defensible with the common knowledge we know to be true that kids need exercise to protect their physical health. Cardiovascular health, body composition, strength, coordination are all things that are put at risk if children are not getting enough physical activity. Virtual learning is challenging enough, but I think we can agree that

physical education has its own unique difficulties. Does the child live in a home with a large yard? Near a safe park? Does the child have access to an outdoor gym or online fitness class? Children with access to some or all the above may be having an easier time getting the exercise they need than children who do not. That is why the decision to restrict physical activities for youth so stringently is not only an issue of health but also an issue of equity.

Then there is the importance of mental health. I have spoken before of the dangers of focusing too closely on one health crisis at the expense of creating others. Everyone receives mental benefits from exercise, none more so than children. Exercise is an excellent way to cope with stress, socialize with friends, and build confidence. There are also the benefits of participating in team sports like learning how to work together, responsibility, communication. Stripping away these critical outlets and opportunities for children is depriving them of some of the most important aspects of being a kid while preparing for a stable future. For some children, sports could determine their entire future as a pathway to college or even professional sports opportunities. State officials may consider what type of future California children will have with so much critical development time spent looking at a computer screen in isolation.

California stands among only around a dozen or so states holding on to the practice of restricting youth sports to such an extreme level. It is unnecessary. Models for the safe continuation of youth sports exist across the country, and in every regard, they are successful. We know

now that a lack of exercise has devastating effects on physical and mental health. We know that transmission among athletes is significantly lower than other forms of social contact. It is difficult to understand any reasoning at this point to keep kids from having adequate access to sports and exercise.

As I said, I do not want us to focus so narrowly on one threat to health that we become blind to others. The reality of children struggling more with mental health than ever before is beyond anecdotal. Studies and stories of increases in depression, eating disorders, anxiety, and suicidal tendencies are right there for all to see. Children need to get off of Zoom and on the field to be protected from these avoidable conditions. The future of our children is not something to think about tomorrow but today. For the sake of comprehensive well-being, California officials need to get together, listen to the pleas of desperate children and parents, and the research piling up from entities interested only in the facts. When the reality that has been created is looked at through a pragmatic lens, it is clear the need exists for our children and our state to let them play.



Prosecutors Feud over Criminal Sentencing Laws

The starkest aspect to California’s evolution from a relatively conservative state into a blue bastion has been an evolving attitude toward crime and punishment.

In the 1980s and 1990s, California became a national leader in increasing penalties for crimes large and small, symbolized by a three-strikes-and-you’re-out law calling for life imprisonment of repeat offenders. Not surprisingly, despite construction of many new prisons, they became horrendously overcrowded with inmates.

However, as California made its almost 180-degree political turn to the left over the last couple of decades, attitudes about crime also evolved, culminating in legislative acts, ballot measures and administrative policies that repealed or softened the state’s sentencing laws. The number of felons locked up in state prisons has dropped by at least one-third in recent years.

That said, what supporters call “criminal justice reform” is not universally accepted. Some law enforcement officials believe it’s gone too far and has contributed to recent upticks in violent crime — a conflict now rippling through the state’s local district attorneys.

In 2020, George Gascón,

who had been district attorney of San Francisco, challenged and defeated Los Angeles District Attorney Jackie Lacey and immediately issued new operational rules that downplayed punishment.

He prohibited his deputies from seeking the death penalty, prosecuting juveniles as adults, attending parole hearings or seeking “enhancements” that increase a defendant’s prison term. The union representing those deputies sued, alleging that Gascón was ordering them to violate criminal laws, and won an initial judgement.

What really blew up the conflict politically was support from the California District Attorneys Association (CDAA) for the union position. In its supporting brief, the District Attorneys said Gascón’s orders meant that “the voices of victims fall silent and the might of the state has failed its most vulnerable.”

Last week, Gascón resigned from the organization with a two-page letter that he posted on Twitter, accusing the association of being racially insensitive, closed-minded about criminal justice reform and even corrupt.

“CDAA continues to be a member organization solely for those willing to toe the ‘tough on crime’ line,” Gascón wrote. “For the rest of us, it is a place that fails to support us, our communities, or the pursuit of justice.”

Gascón and several other like-minded district attorneys have founded their own group, the Prosecutors Alliance of California, to push for criminal justice reforms. It includes Gascón, San Joaquin County’s Tori

Salazar, Chesa Boudin of San Francisco and Contra Costa County’s Diana Becton.

Gascón’s election and the burgeoning conflict with more traditional prosecutors is part of a larger phenomenon — a nationwide effort by left-of-center organizations to change criminal justice policies one election at a time.

Billionaire businessman George Soros is a major figure in the campaign, having donated millions of dollars to reform-minded candidates. The movement has scored some victories, such as Gascón’s election, and also suffered some losses, such as a failed challenge to Sacramento County District Attorney Anne Marie Schubert.

The conflict also colors Gov. Gavin Newsom’s selection of a replacement for Attorney General Xavier Becerra if he is confirmed as the federal health and human services secretary.

Newsom seemingly supports the criminal justice reform movement. He sponsored a ballot measure to make marijuana legal, has sped up reductions in prison populations and declared a moratorium on executions.

He could appoint a new Attorney General sympathetic to the Gascón-led faction, such as Oakland Assemblyman Rob Bonta, but such a move would carry some political risk. Were Newsom to face a recall election this year, as seems likely, opposition from police and prosecutors could be a critical factor.

Defendant Sentenced for First-Degree Murder in Rio Linda Shooting

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - The Honorable Sharon Lueras sentenced Joshua Imber to 53 years to life in prison. On November 5, 2020, a jury convicted Imber of the first-degree murder of Charles Dynes, and further found that Imber discharged a firearm causing the victim’s

death. On October 23, 2020, Imber pled guilty to being a felon in possession of a firearm. The Court also found that Imber has a prior 2000 strike conviction for reckless discharge of a firearm.

On September 27, 2017, Joshua Imber told his ex-girlfriend that he was contemplating suicide and made a remark about shooting her new boyfriend, Mr. Dynes. Shortly thereafter,

Imber went to his ex-girlfriend’s house with a loaded .22 caliber handgun. Imber encountered Mr. Dynes in the driveway of his ex-girlfriend’s home and shot seven rounds at him. Mr. Dynes was struck multiple times, including a fatal wound to his head. Imber fled the scene, but was arrested the next morning in Corning, California. The murder weapon was found in Imber’s car. ★

Solo Vehicle Fatal Collision on Garden Highway

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On February 17, 2021, at approximately 8:55 PM, North Sacramento CHP Area units were dispatched to a call of a collision that occurred on eastbound Garden Highway west of Powerline Road. Upon arrival on scene, units discovered that a white Honda Accord had struck a utility pole just off the north road edge of Garden Highway. Officers have determined that the 26-year-old male driver from Sacramento had (for unknown reasons) lost control of the Honda while traveling in the eastbound

lane of Garden Highway and subsequently struck the utility pole. The driver was pronounced deceased at the scene and the cause of the collision is still under investigation. Currently, it is unknown whether drugs and/or alcohol were contributing factors to the collision.

“Still Working” . . . Magic Words for Enrolling in Medicare Part B Correctly!!

Hello Toni:

I am losing the battle with Social Security about me and my wife enrolling in Medicare Part B since I am losing my group benefits effective March 31. I took early retirement in April 30,2020 when COVID-19 problems started and both me and my wife have been under company group health benefits. I now find out that I had to be an active employee to enroll in Medicare Part B without receiving a penalty. No one ever told me this. Please explain what Medicare rule I am not following.

I do not have good news for you because you have missed your window to enroll in Medicare Part B after you retired April 30, 2020 which is over the 8-month Medicare Special Enrollment Period time limit.

You or your spouse are “still working” are magic words when it comes to enrolling past 65 and losing your and/or your spouse’s company benefits. The Medicare and You Handbook discusses under the title of “Should I enroll in Part B” about delaying Medicare Part B when you are leaving your or your spouse’s group benefits and “that you can sign up for Part B anytime during the 8-month period that begins the month after the employment ends or the coverage ends, whichever happens first.”

Vic, you have waited too long to apply. During a Medicare consultation at the Toni Says® office, whether just laid off or retiring, we stress the value of getting Part B for the first time and that Medicare Part B needs to be enrolled in prior to either enrolling in COBRA or retirement group benefits.

You need to contact your local Social Security office to enroll in Medicare Part B with CMS form 40-B with Medicare Part B beginning July 1 due to General Enrollment Period rules not April 1st which is date you want but do not qualify due to Medicare enrollment rules.

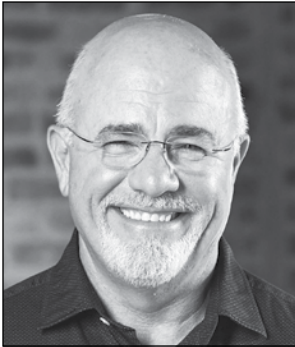
Below are Medicare Enrollment Periods:

- **General Enrollment Period:** January 1-March 31 when one who has not enrolled in Part B and now can enroll in Medicare Part B. WILL receive a Part B penalty. Part B will begin July1.
- **Special Enrollment Period:** Enroll after 65 when delaying Medicare Part B due to working full time with company benefits. This is an 8-month window of signing up for Part B without receiving a Part B penalty. (Need CMS form L-564 Request for Employment Information form signed by HR returned to Social Security with CMS form 40-B Application for Part B)
- **Medicare Initial Enrollment Period:** Begins 3 months before turning 65, the month one turns 65and 3 months after one turn 65.

largest using the debt snowball method. Then, Baby Step 3 is where you go back and grow your emergency fund to a full three to six months of living expenses.

With all this in mind, let’s call getting ready to buy a home Baby Step 3b. Save up for a down payment of at least 20 percent to avoid PMI (private mortgage insurance). Also, make sure any mortgage loan is a 15-year, fixed rate loan, where the payments are no more than 25 percent of your monthly take-home pay.

Doing it this way may delay your dream of being a homeowner for a while, but it will help ensure your new home is a blessing and not a financial curse!

Planning for Future Purchases

Dear Dave,

How far in advance do you recommend figuring future purchases into your budget? – Robbie

Dear Robbie,

I recommend starting to put money aside, and including it in your budget as soon as you know the need for an item is a real possibility. Waiting until things go wrong or something breaks down will leave you in a real mess, more times than not.

For example, if you’re pretty sure you’ll need another vehicle in a year or two, the smart thing is to start putting money aside now. Do some research on prices, then do the math to see how much you’ll need to set aside each month.

And remember, it’s a whole lot easier to save money when you don’t have things like credit card payments and other debt hanging around your neck. That’s one of the big reasons I want to help people learn to live debt-free!

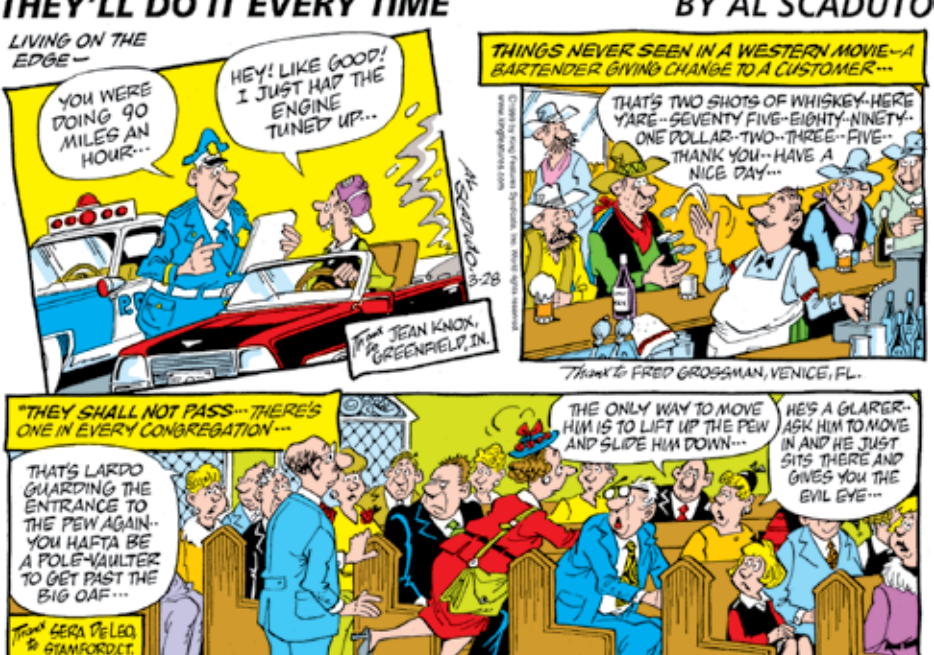

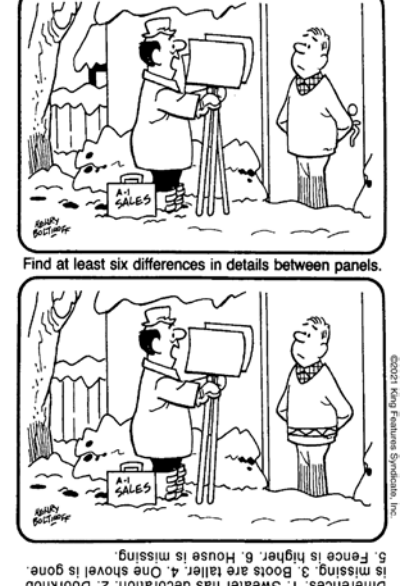
