WEST SACRAMENTO (MPG) - In 2018 Aaron Laurel was appointed City Manager for West Sacramento and CEO of the Port of West Sacramento. Prior to being City Manager, Aaron served West Sacramento as Economic Development and Housing Director. The City of West Sacramento's website says that Aaron oversees investments in infrastructure and real estate, business attraction, affordable housing, and management of the port.

This Fourth of July, remember to celebrate responsibly. Protect your community by preventing fires and injuries caused by fireworks. Before you think about buying fireworks for your celebration, make sure they are permitted where you live. Fireworks purchased out-ofstate are illegal in California without a license. Why not let the experts handle the fireworks show? You can easily grab a blanket, head to local fireworks show, and find the perfect patch of lawn to kick back and enjoy.

"With fireworks causing over \$25 million dollars in property loss in 2022, preventing fires and injuries caused by fireworks begins with you" said Chief Daniel Berlant, Acting California State Fire Marshal. "Don't be the reason your Fourth of July holiday goes up in smoke". If Safe and Sane fireworks are legal in your area and you choose to use them, it's important that you follow these safety tips: Never use illegal fireworks; Make sure the firework has the State Fire Marshal "Safe and Sane" seal on it; Make sure the "Safe and Sane" firework is purchased from a licensed fireworks booth; Never allow young children to use or handle fireworks; Never use fireworks while impaired by drugs or alcohol; Never hold a lit firework in your hands; Never light fireworks indoors; Only use them away from people, houses, and flammable materials; Never point or throw fireworks at another person or animal; Do not try to re-light or handle malfunctioning fireworks; Soak both spent and unused fireworks in water for an extended time before discarding; Keep a bucket of water nearby to fully extinguish fireworks that don't go off or in case of fire. Questions Surround Port Land Deal

Continued from page 1 Seaway Property. The option lasts for three years and as long as Mark submits a planning application and design review package for the International Seaway property and submits construction documents for BioSpace at the Bridge District (a separate development) he gets an automatic two-year extension. The submissions do not have to be accepted by the City of West Sacramento or the Port.

Mark essentially has five years to purchase the Seaway property for \$5 per square foot. But he does not have to buy it all at once. If he buys at least 30.74 acres of the property within the five years, he will get another threeyear option to buy the remainder of the property for another \$50,000 down. This will happen again in the third and final option period.

After the 6th year (at the start of the second period) the price is finally raised to \$5.50 per square foot, per year. That's a good deal for land that should be sold at \$8 - \$9 per square foot. This is the kind of deal you would get if you were paying for the infrastructure in the development.

In this deal, the Port agrees to "assume financial responsibility for all cost of developing the project." Development costs include the design, permitting, financing and construction of all infrastructure and improvements within the property including utilities, storm drainage, lighting, sidewalks, landscaping, curbs, gutters, and streets for the project. When you are selling prime real estate for so far under market value, it's because the buyer will assume those costs. to step down from the Commission to offer up her seat, knowing that the benefit of having these gentlemen on the Commission would be immeasur-

In this deal, the seller's financial responsibility for infrastructure and improvements is up to \$8,000,000, which will be applied as credit to the purchase price for first phase purchase. This means that if the buyer spends \$6,700,000 or more on development, the purchase price will be \$0.00 for the land. In addition, if the first phase purchase price is less than \$8 million, the seller must deposit the remainder of the \$8 million in escrow. Therefore, they will owe him \$1.3 million, when they close the deal, in either money or additional land.

If the buyer (Mark) defaults during the contract period, the seller's only remedy will be the original \$50,000 deposit and the Port will not automatically get the land back but will have to buy the land back at the price of \$5.50 per square foot. That would be a \$669,517 profit for the buyer (minus the \$50K) if he defaults.

When the recent seat on the Port Commission came up, President of International Longshore and Warehouse Union Local 18 Tim Campbell applied for the position. In addition, President/ Owner of Capital Estates LLC, Rick Hart applied to be appointed when the last seat came up. However, the Port CEO fought both diligently. Mayor Martha Guerrero was even willing Commission to offer up her seat, knowing that the benefit of having these gentlemen on the Commission would be immeasurable. However, Aaron was strongly encouraging for the council to appoint a city council member for the next seat. Martha was outvoted with a three to two vote and except for County Supervisor Oscar Villegas, all seats on the Commission are now filled with City Council Members.

There are serious questions to be answered. Was this done so that the City Manager would have no resistance when he made deals like this? Did the council members realize what they were agreeing to? How was this presented to them? Why, when there was such a clear call by the public to appoint someone other than a city council member to the Port Commission, did it go unheard?

The question of whether the City of West Sacramento is working towards closing the port is a big and on-going question in the public. The ramifications of such a closure would be huge. Why would the CEO and the Port Commission, both of whom are supposed to be doing what is in the best interest of the port make a deal that clearly has no benefit to the port?

This newspaper welcomes any response from either the City of West Sacramento or the Port Commission to this article and we will gladly publish it for our readers and their right to know.

Yolo-Solano Air Quality Management District Awards \$517,725 for Clean Air Projects

DAVIS, CA (MPG) - At the June 14 meeting of the Yolo-Solano Air Quality Management District's (District) Board of Directors, the Board approved a total of \$517,725 in funding for 12 projects for the 2023 Clean Air Fund (CAF) Grant Program. The projects will be implemented over the next year in Yolo County and the northeastern portion of Solano County.

The annual CAF grant program provides funding to private businesses, nonprofit organizations, and public agencies for local projects that will reduce emissions from mobile sources of air pollution within the district. CAF grant funds are intended for the implementation of projects including the use of cleaner technologies, low-emission vehicles, alternative transportation, transit services, and public education.

Funding for the CAF Program is provided from a portion of annual Department of Motor Vehicles registration fees with additional funding for Solano County projects provided by AB 8 property tax proceeds. Since launching the program over 30 years ago, the District has awarded more than \$11 million.

The Board has appointed its Chair Elaine Yamaguchi to serve as Acting CEO. The position is unpaid, and the Board will be seeking a permanent CEO.

Under the Acting CEO's leadership, the 2023 Yolo

County Fair will be held from August 16 to August 20. Although the annual Opening Night Gala event is cancelled for this year, we plan for the Fair to provide all the fun we have enjoyed in the past. Our Fair continues to be the largest and oldest free gate fair in California.

The first Yolo County Fair was held in the late summer of 1893 with horse racing being the main event. The Fair continued for several years until pari-mutuel horse racing was outlawed. The Yolo County Fair was incorporated in 1935. Records indicate that the fair was expanded to include a horse show (1936) and industrial show (1937). The current 55-acre fairgrounds site, which was the former "Blowers Ranch," is located at 1250 E Gum Ave, Woodland, CA 95776.

The Board and Staff appreciate the community's support and look forward to seeing everyone at the Fair.


- The West Sacramento News Ledger received an email and phone calls inquiring about why the baseball fields at Memorial Park are padlocked shut. People in that neighborhood like to meet at the park with their dogs and children and go inside of the ball fields so that everyone can run free on the grass. People from the neighborhood say that they understand about dogs and that they clean up after their dogs.

"The dog park is okay, but there is no lawn. It's just dry and dusty" said Cari Hendrix, a member of the Memorial Park neighborhood. She said that the park was paid for with tax payer money, why can't the tax payers use the park? "The park is more than 50 percent closed off from the public," she said. In addition, Memorial Park is one of the only parks in West Sacramento with bathrooms, however, unless it is baseball season and there are scheduled games, the bathrooms are locked.

The News Ledger reached out to the City for answers and got the following response from City of West Sacramento's Public Information Officer, "We have a formal City administration policy relating to Memorial Park and its use. It's up to the discretion of Parks and Recreation Director to lock the baseball field during the off season, to prevent occurrences of vandalism and unauthorized use of the field."

We asked if there is a way to request that lawn be added to the dog park on Stone Blvd. and were told that one option would be to attend a City Council meeting and make the suggestion during the public comments segment at the beginning of the meeting. \star

California Farm Bureau Applauds Supreme Court WOTUS Decision

California Farm Bureau News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On May 25, 2023, California Farm Bureau President Jamie Johansson is applauding the U.S. Supreme Court's decision rejecting the Biden administration's Waters of the United States Rule.

"California Farm Bureau appreciates the Supreme Court's decision," Johansson said. "Our farmers and ranchers have faced years of confusion over what waters are regulated by the federal government. Today's decision brings greater clarity."

The court's ruling in Sackett v. Environmental Protection Agency reins in the EPA's authority under the Clean Water Act to regulate water bodies on private properties.

In a majority opinion, the court wrote that under the Biden administration's rule, landowners "potentially face severe criminal and civil penalties" even for accidentally discharging pollutants into navigable waters.

"Agriculture is intrinsically tied to the earth," Johansson said. "Our farmers and ranchers have a strong interest in effective, efficient and reasonable rules for the protection and management of the nation's water and land resources.'

Family Business? Keep it Professional

Dear Dave,

My father isn't involved with our family-owned business anymore, but he's still a one-third owner and insists on taking a salary. This situation has begun to cause problems for other members of the family, and I was wondering what your take is.

- Tracy

Dear Tracy,

If I understand correctly, three owners form the board, and you three direct the management and leadership of the company. That means if your dad gets outvoted on something, he must accept it because he's a minority owner. As an owner who is no longer actively involved in the company, he should be getting a distribution of the profits—not a salary.

Dave Ramsey Says

Specifically, one-third when the profits are distributed.

Let me give you a visual. Draw three concentric circles so that they all overlap in the center. It should look a bit like the Olympic symbol-a Venn diagram. In each circle, write "owner," "management and leadership" and "family." This is a standard family-business diagram. Most problems in family businesses come when someone forgets which circle they're in. You could be a member of the family but not have any ownership or be in leadership. You could be in leadership but not be part of the family or be an owner. You could also be a member of the family and be an owner but not work at the company. That would be your father.

I think you guys need to reset things in your business. It's time for the working owners to sit down with your father and have an adult conversation. The discussion should be professional and gentle and go something like: "Dad, we all set this up in the beginning. But we've made some mistakes. We shouldn't be paying a salary to people who don't work in the business. You've been repaid for your venture money, and from now on, you'll be getting a distribution of profits instead of a salary. We think this is fair and reasonable, but if you don't agree, we can discuss buying you out of your third of the company."

It sounds like things are already strained, but you've got to have a professional setup within the business. Do your best to be respectful and reasonable with your father. But you need to get this sorted out and agreed on before it causes any more hard feelings.

Agriculture and Business Coalition Opposes Water-Rights Bills

Critics of California's water-rights system are seeking to overhaul rules that date back to California's founding in 1850. Three water-rights bills are pending in the California Legislature that would expand the authority of the California State Water Resources Control Board. The bills are opposed by a large coalition that includes dozens of farm groups, water agencies and business groups. Kristopher Anderson of the Association of California Water Agencies said the bills "present a foundational change" for California's water rights system.

Wheat Farmers Reduce Acreage, but Expect to Send More Grain to Mills

Ample rain this year has allowed some California farmers to produce more wheat, even though statewide acreage dropped, with some fields lost to flooding amid the deluge last fall and winter. Farmers say prospects for the crop still appear positive even as prices have moderated from their all-time high in the spring of 2022 when the Russia-Ukraine war disrupted grain exports. Hard hit by drought in recent years, growers planted less wheat this year than in 2022. Yet they are now predicting that they will supply more of the crop to mills this year than last.

Phase Out of Diesel Trucks Worries Compost Dealers

New trucking rules may make deliveries of compost harder in the future, with major impacts for agriculture, particularly small organic farms. Compost is essential to organic farming. As California moves towards emission-free trucking, with bans on sales of new diesel trucks by 2036 and requirements for mostly zero-emission fleets by 2042, that will drive up costs of heavy cargos such as compost, operators say. Truck batteries, weighing up to 16,000 pounds, will significantly reduce shipping capacity. That will add to the primary cost of compost—transportation.

Researchers Get Funding to Breed Tasty Triticale for Baking Bread

Researchers at University of California, Davis, are working on creating new varieties of triticale that are good for bread-baking at commercial scale and offer more value for growers. Craft bakers love adding a little triticale to breads for its subtle blend of nutty and earthy flavors and its moist, slightly chewy texture. The Agriculture and Food Research Initiative has funded the research with a grant of \$800,000 over the next four years with the aim of developing new cultivars of bread-quality triticale as a higher-yield, lower-cost addition to wheat for baking.

UCSF Study Unpacks Root Causes of California's Homelessness Crisis

The timing could not have been better. A massive UC San

Francisco study of California's worst-in-the-nation homelessness crisis was released Tuesday as Gov. Gavin Newsom and legislative leaders were negotiating details of a new state budget, with homelessness spending as one of the knottiest issues.

The study bolsters previous research which concluded that California's chronic shortage of housing, which imposes crushing costs on low-income families, lies at the heart of the crisis.

About a third of California's 40 million people live in poverty or near-poverty, United Ways of California recently reported. Sudden illness, an accident, a layoff or an unexpected car repair bill can easily lead to unpaid rent, eviction and a lack of shelter.

Homelessness, the UCSF study found, often leads to or exacerbates – alcohol or drug dependence, mental health problems and violence, indicating that its victims need more than just roofs over their heads.

"Something goes wrong, and then everything else falls apart," the study's lead researcher, Dr. Margot Kushel, the director of the Benioff Homelessness and supports," which is what California newspapers.

told the New York Times. "Everything in their life gets worse when they lose their housing: their health, their mental health, their substance use.

"This is a problem of this toxic combination of deep poverty and high housing costs," Kushel added. "We're a state, like every state in this country, that has a lot of very poor people, and we just don't have the housing for them."

The study recommends a wide array of services and projects to help those experiencing chronic homelessness to get off the streets and protect others from the same fate.

It would seem to bolster the demands of city and county officials not only for additional billions of dollars to help homeless Californians escape their plight, but for a multi-year state commitment to provide continuity.

While Newsom has been willing to provide local governments with some funds, he's been highly critical of their homelessness efforts and so far unwilling to make long-term commitments.

That conflict was evident when the state seemingly had oodles of money, and has become even sharper now that Newsom and legislators must contend with deficits that could continue for the remainder of Newsom's governorship.

Interestingly, the Benioff study was requested by Dr. Mark Ghaly, Newsom's secretary of health and human services, who said, in a statement, "this study reinforces the importance of comprehensive and integrated

Housing Initiative at UCSF, local officials advocate in their demands for additional state aid.

The state plays only a tangential role in providing housing and social, medical, addiction and mental health services to those in squalid encampments that have become unwanted California symbols and fodder for political and media critics.

City governments are the main overseers of housing construction and joust with the state incessantly over zoning, building permits and other hurdles for projects to house low-income families and individuals - the ones most in peril of becoming homeless.

Meanwhile, county officials provide welfare, medical and mental health services with local, state and federal funds and often squabble with their city counterparts over how those programs are sited and administered in urban centers.

The Benioff study tells us that contrary to popular belief, those lacking shelter are overwhelmingly Californians, not migrants from other states, who largely remained in their communities after falling on hard times.

California's crisis will not be resolved without the "comprehensive and integrated" approach Ghaly advocates and that means state, county and municipal officialdom must set aside fingerpointing and blame-shifting to work cooperatively. Otherwise, we'll just waste billions of more dollars and the crisis will continue to worsen.

Social Security Matters



Working Widow Seeks to **Maximize Social Security Benefits**

Dear Rusty: I was widowed years ago and, when I approached age 60, I looked into Social Security survivor benefits based on my late husband's record. He started receiving Social Security shortly before he died at \$1,200 per month. My income at age 60 was \$42,000 and, since Social Security would keep \$1 for every \$2 above the limit (around \$15,000 at that time), I did not apply. Next year I will reach my full retirement age of $66\frac{1}{2}$, but I plan to work until I am 70. Will I be able to receive full survivor benefits next year if I continue to work? I plan to switch to my own Social Security benefit at age 70, which will be higher than my husband received. Since I am waiting to apply for survivor benefits, will there be an increase in the amount I receive? I am a municipal employee and when I retire, I will collect from the state retirement system. I paid into the state retirement system and also paid Social Security taxes, so will my state pension have any impact on my Social Security? Signed: Still Working

Dear Still Working: Congratulations on having an excellent strategy for maximizing your survivor benefit as well as your personal SS retirement benefit. Once you reach your full retirement age (FRA) next year, you are no longer subject to Social Security's "earnings test" and can collect Social Security benefits without those benefits being affected by your work earnings.

Your surviving spouse benefit will be more because you are waiting until your full retirement age to claim it. At your FRA you can claim your full survivor benefit from your deceased husband (without reduction) and collect only that while still allowing your personal SS retirement benefit to grow to maximum when you are 70. Then, at age 70, you can switch from your smaller survivor benefit to your maximum SS retirement benefit and collect that higher amount for the rest of your life. Essentially, your survivor benefit reaches maximum at your FRA and your personal SS retirement benefit reaches maximum at age 70.


Note that you should apply for your benefits a couple of months before you wish them to start. For example, if you reach your FRA in May of next year you can apply for your survivor benefit in February or March, specifying that you wish your

survivor benefit to begin in May 2024 at your full retirement age. Just be sure to emphasize that you are applying only for your survivor benefit and wish your personal SS retirement benefit to continue to grow by earning Delayed Retirement Credits (DRCs) until you are 70.

You cannot apply for your survivor benefit online, so you will need to call Social Security, at either the national number (1.800.772.1213) or your local Social Security office, to make an appointment to apply for your benefit as your husband's widow.

And to answer your last question, your state pension won't affect your monthly Social Security payments because you paid Social Security FICA payroll taxes from your municipal earnings.

"I teach vocals and performance, but they have to try out for the part. I try to get everyone to be able to have a solo at some point, but they have to earn it," said Miss Kim. It cost around \$187 month to be taught at this studio, but Miss Kim does her best to teach them not only vocals, but also sound, costumes, lighting, cues, and the lost list of other portions of performance that they need to know.

"In a small venue like the Black Box Theater, we don't really need the mics, but we still use them because I want the performers to get used to all aspects, so that when they move up and progress, they will already be comfortable with the equipment." The program was a great performance with the small fee of \$21 to get in.
