Persistently shrinking population and the reasons why

In 2021, it was big news — the "California exodus." Now, it just looks like the new trend: California's population is still shrinking.

According to the latest population estimates from the U.S. Census Bureau, California's total population declined by more than 500,000 between April 2020 and July 2022.

Put another way, 1 out of 100 people living in California at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic had, two years later, left the state — either by U-Haul or by hearse.

Where'd they all go? Some died, though there were far more births; Some left the country, though on net, more immigrants arrived; The major driving factor: Californians departing for other states.

Just counting out-of-staters coming in and Californians leaving, the state's population saw a 871,127 net decline. If you're wondering why the state lost a congressional seat at the beginning of this decade, this is why.

This isn't a national problem. It's a California, New York, Illinois and Louisiana problem. California is one of only 18 states that saw its numbers decline and had the fourth biggest drop as a share of its population.

Topping the list of rapid growers are other Western states that aren't on the pricey coast: Idaho, Montana and Utah.

That may be why Utah Gov. Spencer Cox recently pleaded with Californians to stay put rather than come as "refugees to Utah." UCLA economist Paul Ong was quoted: "While salaries in other regions and states are lower, the cost of housing is even lower."

But not all of California is shrinking at the same rate. And no surprise, housing seems to be the key explanation why. A San Francisco Chronicle analysis of local population changes

Sen. Dodd Legislation Enhances City Council Participation, Diversity

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - In an effort to boost participation and diversity on California city councils, Sen. Bill Dodd, D-Napa, introduced legislation on February 7, 2023 that would allow increases in city council pay caps for the first time in nearly four decades, bringing salaries more in line with the cost of living.

"City councilmembers make critical decisions for our communities, but it is a difficult job with long hours," Sen. Dodd said. "It's especially hard for working people and people from diverse or disadvantaged backgrounds to serve in local office while balancing jobs and family obligations. My proposal will improve diverse representation and increase access to elected office for all Californians by making it less of a financial challenge to serve." Currently, in general

law cities, city councils may vote to receive a limited salary, not to exceed caps based on population size provided in state law. However, the maximum amounts set by state law have not been increased since 1984, despite inflation of more than 300% during that time. Because of the disparity, people from diverse communities are discouraged to run for office. Others with fulltime jobs have been forced to resign their posts before their terms expire because they can't devote time to council service and supporting their families. A majority of cities in California are under 35,000 in population and presently capped at \$300 per month with minimal allowances for adjustment.

Sen. Dodd's proposal, Senate Bill 329, would address the inequity by allowing councils to adjust their maximum pay to reflect inflation as measured by the California Consumer Price Index. Any increases would require a majority vote of the city councils.

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Sons of Union Veterans Keep Civil War History Alive

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

The Sacramento membership of the non-profit Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War (SUVCW) is a fraternal, patriotic and educational organization to help keep the history of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) and its role in the history of California alive.

"We're actively looking for new members throughout California to consider joining us," said Steve Bogart, whose ancestor Sgt. George S. Rhoades, served in Company D, of the 44th Missouri Infantry.

Organized in the structure of a military camp, as the Union Army itself was during the Civil War, members of the General George Wright Camp 22 of the Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War meet on the first Friday of every month at Sam's Hofbrau Restaurant on 2500 Watt Avenue in Sacramento from 6:30 to 8 p.m.

Members and their guests are welcome to attend monthly meetings. Its organization follows the guidelines of the national SUVCW, with a Camp Commander, Senior Vice-Commander, Junior Vice-Commander, Secretary, and Treasurer, all of whom are elected annually by the Camp members. The camp serves Northern California, Sacramento, and the Central Valley region.

In addition to meeting socially, SUVCW members wear the blue dress enlisted and officer uniforms of the Grand Army of the Republic era as they participate in historical re-enactments within the state and perform official honors and ceremonies throughout the year.

Bogart acknowledges ancestors in his family who served opposing sides during the Civil War and has fulfilled the role of chaplain in both the Sons of Union and Sons of Confederate groups. He's a former member of the California State Military Museum in Old Sacramento and a recipient of the California Military History medal.

"I'm proud of their individual military service during the

Civil War, and I feel it's important to honor them and their legacy," he said

"Our Sacramento-based (SUV) group began in 1995," he said. "Many of our members can trace their ancestors to those served during the Civil War in Union volunteer infantry units from the states of Indiana, New York, Illinois, Pennsylvania and Massachusetts, just to name a few."

In the Sylvan Cemetery at 7401 Auburn Blvd in Citrus Heights, the resting place of almost 1,400 Veterans, has some of its earliest burials from survivors of the Civil War. Nine soldiers who came to the area after the Civil War ended and are buried there.

"SUV members have been involved in four gravesite dedications of Civil War soldiers at the Sylvan Cemetery in Citrus Heights where a memorial headstone was... placed on a soldier's grave where there was none, and a full civil memorial grave ceremony was then held," Bogart said.

"In doing so, our members honor the history and legacy of heroes who fought and worked to save the Union," he said.

A rifle color guard of the SUV has also fired at numerous annual Memorial Day and Veteran's Day ceremonies held there annually, he said.

The National Organization of the SUVCW now oversees the operation of 31 departments, each consisting of one or more states, along with a department-at-large, a national membership-at-large, and over 200 community-based camps.

In California, the history of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR) at Sutterville, in the Sacramento area is a fascinating one.

Sutterville, known as Sutter and Sutter City, was located on the Southern Pacific Railroad about 2.25 miles south-southwest of the city limits. Pioneer John A. Sutter had Lansford W. Hastings and John Bidwell lay out the town in 1844, south of his embarcadero on a low bluff overlooking the Sacramento River. When the town of Sacramento developed at Sutter's embarcadero, Sutterville fell into decline.

Its fortunes quickly changed

when Camp Union became California's most prominent provider of troops for camps in the West throughout the years of the Civil War.

A third of California's 15,000 volunteers who served in the GAR trained at Camp Union, located at Sutterville Road and Land Park Drive. The site has since been designated a state historical landmark.

Members of the 5th Infantry Regiment California Volunteers were organized at Camp Union on October 8, 1861, and trained by Brevet Brigadier General George W. Bowie for duty in Arizona, New Mexico, and Texas against the Confederate forces. The camp operated from 1861 until it was evacuated due to the flood waters from the Great Sacramento Flood of 1862.

The 5th Regiment joined the California Column and marched across southern New Mexico Territory to Texas. There it occupied Franklin, Texas until the regiment was mustered out in December of 1864.

Towards the end of the Civil

War, Camp Union became a discharge center for returning troops until the post was closed and abandoned in 1866.

In all, members of the 5th Regiment California Volunteer Infantry spent much of their time in service in the western United States, attached to the Department of the Pacific and Department of New Mexico.

Hereditary membership is available to a male descendant, 14 years of age (6 to 14 for Juniors), who descends from a soldier, sailor, Marine or member of the Revenue Cutter Service (or directly descend from a brother, sister, half-brother, or half-sister of such Soldier, etc.) who was regularly mustered and served honorably in, was honorably discharged from, or died in the service of, the Army, Navy, Marine Corps or Revenue Cutter Service of the United States of America or in such state regiments called to active service and was subject to the orders of United States general officers, between April 12, 1861 and April 9,1865.

"We're a very active group in California," Bogart said. "A number of men have also participated in the Civil War re-enactments both at Fort Point in San Francisco during Civil War Days and as Friends of Civil War Alcatraz in recognition of its defensive role during that war,"

Men with an interest in joining the SUVCW but who do not live in an area where an SUVCW Department or Camp exists, may join as "members-at-large," Bogart said.

Sen. Dodd Legislation Expands Popular Cocktails-to-Go Bill

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sen. Dodd, D-Napa, announced legislation on February 15, 2023 to expand his previous relief for struggling restaurants and bars by broadening provisions of his 2021 law allowing the sale and delivery of to-go cocktails.

"Allowing flexibility to sell to-go cocktails was a lifeline to restaurants and bars during the pandemic," Sen. Dodd said. "To keep up the momentum during the recovery, we must expand this successful provision in ways that will make sense and be beneficial to all. My new proposal gives a boost to these small businesses and our local economy, helping to keep doors open and people employed."

Two years ago, Gov. Gavin Newsom signed Sen. Dodd's Senate Bill 389, which allowed the sale of to-go alcoholic beverages as part of take-out restaurant food orders. It came as restaurants nationwide recovered from hundreds of billions of dollars in losses sustained because of lockdowns and social distancing requirements to stop the spread of coronavirus.

This year's bill, SB 495, expands the previous legislation in important ways, removing the meal requirement to increase options for consumers and business owners. It also extends the carry-out cocktail provision to bars, which also have been hard-hit by the pandemic. In addition, it allows for the delivery of to-go cocktails from both types of businesses. Finally, the bill increases oversight of alcohol delivery by Alcohol Beverage Control to prevent underage drinking.

'Sen. Dodd has stepped up once again for California's restaurant community at a time of when food costs, a labor shortage, mounting debt and supply chain delays are forcing restaurants to reduce operating hours, limit menu offerings or close altogether," said Matt Sutton, senior vice president of government affairs and public policy for the California Restaurant Association. "For his efforts we are incredibly grateful."

between 2010 and 2020 found that the fastest growing city in California was the East Bay bedroom community of Dublin, which permitted four-times as many new housing units per person as nearby San Francisco.

But as California lawmakers grapple with the housing and homelessness crisis, a familiar clash is emerging between state and local lawmakers.

Despite a no-nonsense warning from Attorney General Rob Bonta, elected officials in Huntington Beach are vowing to fight state mandates to permit more than 13,000 new units over the next decade. They also pledged to push forward a local ordinance to exempt the city from the "builder's remedy" — an untested state law that punishes cities that haven't met their state housing goals by allowing developers to build as many units as they like, so long as at least 20% are set aside for low-income residents.

In the well-to-do 'burbs of Silicon Valley, builder's remedy applications are beginning to pour in. But some cities are refusing applications outright, while others are charging five-figure processing

state-spanning lawsuit spree, asking courts to invalidate multiple cities' housing plans, paving the way for builder's remedy applications.


With hundreds of cities still deemed "out of compliance" with state housing requirements, the Department of Housing and Community Development set up a new web portal inviting Californians to "report potential violations of state housing law.'

Remember when San Francisco Sen. Scott Wiener introduced a bill earlier this week that would require any developer who wants to make use of a particular housing law to pay their workers unionlevel wages — but stopped short of forcing developers to hire union members?

In an ideological divide between the state building trades union and the carpenters, that put Wiener squarely with the carpenters.

The trades responded. They aren't impressed. Trades President Andrew Meredith, in a statement: "Proponents' attempts to paint this as an affordable housing play are disingenuous. This is clearly all about putting more money in developer pockets."

And in many places in California, high

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -The Yolo County Board of Supervisors is currently seeking applications for a vacancy on the Yolo County Planning Commission to fill an "at-large" position. The legal duties and responsibilities of the Planning Commission include:

1. Consider and recommend to the Board of Supervisors amendments to the County's General Plan and the other land use plans in the unincorporated parts of the County; 2. Consider and recommend amendments to the County zoning code; 3. Serve as the appellate body for discretionary staff deci-

use; 4. Review and act upon referrals or appeals from the Floodplain Administrator; 5. Act as the advisory agency on Tentative Subdivision and Parcel Maps; 6. Study Shows Zero Bail Policies Increased Crime in Every Category

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - In August of 2022, the Yolo County District Attorney published a study and associated analysis of the criminal re-offense rates of individuals released from jail on "Zero Bail" (also known as \$0 Bail) as a result of court mandates during the Covid crisis.

That previous study found that of the 595 individuals released on Zero Bail in Yolo County, 420 were rearrested (70.6%) and 123 (20% of the overall number or 29% of those rearrested) were arrested for a crime of violence. The crimes of violence included murder, attempted murder, kidnapping, robbery, carjacking, and domestic violence.

In an expanded study, just completed in February 2023, recidivism during an 18-month period was examined for a random sample of 100 arrested individuals who were released from jail on bail in 2018 or 2019, compared to a random sample of 100 arrested individuals who were released from jail on Zero Bail between

April 19, 2020, and May 31, 2021. Offender demographics and original offenses were similar for the comparison groups. Recidivism was counted if the individual was arrested anywhere within 18 months, for at least one new crime, after being previously released.

Key findings of this study include:

Individuals released on Zero Bail were subsequently rearrested for a total of 163% more crimes than individuals released on bail; Arrested individuals released on Zero Bail reoffended at an average rate that was 70% higher than arrestees who posted bail; The average recidivism rate for those released on Zero Bail was 78% over 18 months, while the average recidivism rate for those released on bail was only 46%; Individuals released on Zero Bail committed new felonies 90% more often than those who posted bail; Individuals released on Zero Bail committed new misdemeanors 123% more often than those who posted bail; Individuals released on Zero Bail were rearrested

for two or more new crimes 148% more often than those released on bail; Individuals released on Zero Bail committed new violent offenses 200% more often than those who posted bail.

District Attorney Jeff Reisig stated: "The results of this recent study on the actual impacts of zero bail policies clearly demonstrate that victimization dramatically increases, and public safety is significantly compromised, when bail is eliminated as a tool for use by the courts. A 163% increase in total crime and a 200% increase in violent crime by arrestees released on zero bail, when compared to those released by the courts on traditional bail, is the type of compelling data that should drive future discussion on any contemplated bail reform."

Social Security Matters

About Social Security's "First Year Rule"

Dear Rusty: I'm considering filing for my SS at age 64 in February, before my full retirement age of 66 years and 10 months. I'm working full time and would like to continue earning until I meet the \$21,240 limit for this year. When does the \$21,240 limit go into effect? Does it start after receiving my first SS benefit deposit? Or does Social Security go by my year-to-date earnings starting on January 1st?

If I file in February and it takes 90 days to receive my first SS deposit, and at that point my year-to-date earnings are \$18,500, can I continue to work until I earn the balance of the \$21,240 (\$2,740) and then stop working? Or do they only count the earnings after I receive the first benefit payment? I know that for anything earned over \$21,240 I'll need to repay \$1 for every \$2 over the limit. *Signed*: Ready to Retire

Dear Ready: Since you haven't yet reached your full retirement age (FRA), if you claim now and are working, things will work somewhat differently during your first year collecting benefits.

If you claim for your

benefits to start in February, only your earnings starting in February count toward the earnings limit. But during your first calendar year, once your benefits start, you'll be subject to a monthly earnings limit of \$1,770 and, if that is exceeded in any month (February -December), you won't be eligible for benefits for that month. That means that they could withhold your entire monthly amount for any 2023 month after January that exceeds the monthly limit. This is part of Social Security's "first year rule," which applies only during your first calendar year collecting. If, instead, you claim for your benefits to start in March, then the monthly limit will apply from March thru December. Remember, it's not when your payment is received that counts; it's when your benefits start (SS pays benefits in the month following the month earned). Beginning in 2024 only the

annual limit would apply. Nevertheless, the "first year rule" offers some latitude on your earnings. If the penalty for exceeding the annual earnings limit (\$21,240 for 2023) is less than the penalty which results from using the monthly limit, Social Security will use the annual limit and assess the smaller penalty amount. So, if your annual (full year) 2023 earnings are less than \$21,240, no penalty will be assessed, or if you only exceed the annual limit by a small amount, you'll be assessed a penalty of \$1 for every \$2 you are over the limit. But if your annual earnings are

substantially more than the 2023 limit, Social Security may deem you temporarily ineligible to get benefits. When you complete your application there will be a section asking you to tell them about this year's earnings as well as what you expect next year's earnings to be. From that they will decide whether you are currently eligible to collect benefits.

So, if your goal is to work only to the point that no penalty will be assessed, you can work until your 2023 earnings reach \$21,240 (whenever that is). Or you could work even a little bit longer and simply take the penalty (half of what you exceed the annual limit by), in which case SS will simply withhold future benefits for enough months for them to recover what is owed for exceeding the limit. But if you continue working full time and will substantially exceed the annual limit, it's likely Social Security will say you are temporarily ineligible to collect benefits (until your earnings are less or you reach your full retirement age when the earnings test no longer applies).

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
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Roll With It

We were wondering if we should withdraw the money and use it toward Baby Steps 1 and 2, or just leave it in there.

The best thing to do is roll the money over into an IRA. Otherwise you're going to be hit with a 10% penalty – plus your tax rate – and end up paying 30% to 40% of it to the government. That's kind of like asking, "Would it be a good idea to borrow \$3,200 at 30% interest to pay off debt?" Of course not! That would be a really dumb idea. And in a sense, that's what you'd be doing by just taking the money out of the TSP.

It's not a ton of money, but conceptually, I hate the idea of giving the government 30% to 40% of my money just to get my money out. So yeah, do some research, find a good investment professional

near you - one with the heart of a teacher – and roll it into an IRA.

Congratulations to you and your wife for deciding to take control of your money. And thank you for your service to our country, Todd. I hope this helped.

Board Brief: February 9, 2023 School Board Meeting

To keep our community up-to-date and informed of actions taken by the Washington Unified (WUSD) Board of Trustees, we will be regularly sharing board briefs. CELEBRATIONS

Assistant Superintendent Stan Mojsich - On behalf of the entire team at Washington Unified School District (WUSD), we would like to take this opportunity to share our sincerest appreciation for Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services Stanley Mojsich, and wish him all the best as he prepares to begin a new position outside the District.

PUBLIC HEARING & INFORMATION

High School Foreign Language Adoption - A public hearing was held for the purpose of adopting instructional materials for a new high school world language curriculum. On February 2, 2023, the WUSD Curriculum Council chose to move forward with the recommendation of the 9-12th grade world language teachers to proceed with "Carnegie Learning Language Solutions" as the new world language curriculum adoption beginning in the spring of the 2022-2023 school year for a total of six (6) years.

Strategic Plan Progress Report - Staff shared a mid-year progress report regarding the WUSD Strategic Plan highlighting key milestones on the work taking place throughout the first year of implementation of this plan.

Expanded Learning Opportunities
- Staff shared an update regarding the WUSD Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELO-P), which provides funding for afterschool and summer school enrichment programs for transitional kindergarten through sixth grade. "Expanded learning" means before school, after school, summer, or intersession learning programs that focus on developing the academic, social, emotional, and physical needs and interests of pupils through hands-on, engaging learning experiences.

ACTION & CONSENT

Purchase of Chromebooks - The Board of Trustees approved the purchase of 1,200 Chromebooks as part of the annual refresh cycle for students. The Chromebooks are for all third and eighth graders and will follow these students for five years. The five-year span marks the lifespan of the Chromebook, and will be decommissioned and sent for e-waste at the end of that time period.

AVID Renewal - The Board of Trustees approved the renewal agreement for the Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) Agreement with WUSD. The agreement is an annual commitment to continue for the district to continue its work on instructional strategies and professional learning to maintain the district-wide AVID program. This will continue to support a consistent and aligned educational pathway for all students. Bridgeway Island, Elkhorn Village, River City High School, Riverbank, Southport, Stonegate, Washington Middle College, Westfield Village, and Westmore Oaks will participate in the program to support students.

Safety & Security Assessment at Westfield - The Board of Trustees approved the agreement for Architectural Services with PBK Architects, Inc. to assess current safety and security measures at Westfield Village Elementary School and to assess the safety and security aspects in the design documents of the modernized campus.

Electronic Public Comments Discussion - The Board of Trustees discussed the option to modify the District's current public comment practice. Following the discussion, the Trustees approved the option to have pre-submitted public comments received by 12 p.m. on the day of board meeting, shared with the Board in advance of the meeting, and recorded in the approved minutes however, the pre-submitted comments will not be read out loud during the board meeting.

COVID-19 Effects on California Will Linger for Years

Gov. Gavin Newsom says California's COVID-19 state of emergency will end on Feb. 28, just four days shy of three years since he issued the first of countless orders he said were necessary to cope with the pandemic.

"Throughout the pandemic, we've been guided by the science and data - moving quickly and strategically to save lives," Newsom said in October announcing the February end date. "The state of emergency was an effective and necessary tool that we utilized to protect our state, and we wouldn't have gotten to this point without

The efficacy of Newsom's pandemic orders will be debated for years, particularly the shutdowns of schools and businesses and the billions of dollars in no-bid contracts his administration issued.

What cannot be debated, however, is that their impacts on millions of Californians will linger for years, decades or perhaps even generations.

Nearly 3 million Californians lost their jobs due to the shutdown orders. While the state has, on paper, recovered all of the jobs it lost, countless small businesses that shut their doors have not reopened.

With work-at-home the growing norm, restaurants most of the decline could newspapers.

and other businesses dependent on concentrated employment were clobbered. The downtowns of the state's larger cities – including the state capital, Sacramento were hollowed out and have not, in the main, recovered.

California's stark divide between haves and have-nots grew wider. Upper-income Californians could do their jobs from home but lower-income service workers simply lost their jobs. Some qualified for unemployment insurance, but a managerial meltdown at the state Employment Development Department delayed, sometimes for months, benefits for legitimate claimants while EDD handed out billions of dollars to fraudsters.

School shutdowns, and the fitful efforts to continue instruction via the internet, had a devastating effect on students, especially those from poor families which lacked technology and whose parents could not work from home. The "achievement gap" that has long plagued California's public school system widened even further, recent research has found.

Several new studies add even more evidence that the steps taken by the state to combat COVID-19 will have long-term negative impacts.

An analysis by The Associated Press, Stanford University's Big Local News project and Stanford education professor Thomas Dee determined that 234,000 students in 21 states vanished from public school enrollment rolls during the pandemic. More than half of them were in California.

Overall, in those states, enrollment dropped by about 700,000 students, but

be explained by enrollments in private schools, movements to other states or shifts to at-home instruction. Of the remaining 234,000 absences for which there was no explanation, researchers said, 152,000 were in California.


The Public Policy Institute of California crunched the numbers and discovered that not only did COVID-19 kill about 100,000 Californians but that the state's life expectancy, which had been tied for the nation's highest with Hawaii at 80.9 years, has dropped by two years – the first such decline since World War II.

PPIC found that the higher death rate has disproportionately affected non-white Californians, particularly Latino and Black residents. "Between 2019 and 2021, the death rate (deaths per 1,000 residents) increased 51% among Latinos, 31% among Blacks, 26% among Asian-Americans, and 17% among whites," the PPIC reported.

Finally, a new study UCLA Center for Health Policy Research found that Newsom's stay-at-home orders, affecting businesses, child care centers and school, created financial hardships that led to psychological distress and a sharp increase in turmoil and conflict, including domestic violence.

Some COVID-19 victims are experiencing long COVID, with lasting debilitative effects. California suffers from lingering effects as well.

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


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






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Financial Literacy Needs to be Taught in California Schools

With more and more of our children failing to meet basic math skills, it's unfortunate but not surprising that so many adults struggle with achieving financial freedom.

Late last year, California released statewide test scores that revealed only 33 percent of students were able to meet the state's math standards – a drop of seven percent from 2019. Some of those results are undoubtedly due to challenges associated with the pandemic. But the statistic on its own is cause for concern and action.

Adding financial literacy to the state's education curriculum could help improve those numbers as well as prepare our youth for the financial realities of adulthood.

Financial literacy is an individual's ability to understand and make informed decisions regarding their finances. This includes knowledge of basic financial concepts such as budgeting, saving, investing, and managing debt. In today's world, financial literacy is more important than ever. Here are a few reasons why California students would benefit from a financial literacy course:

Better Money Management: Financial literacy empowers individuals to manage their money effectively, enabling them to make informed decisions on spending, saving, and investing. It helps people understand the true cost of credit, set financial goals, and plan for future expenses.

We must support legislation at the national, state, and local level to teach financial literacy and encourage individuals to take an active interest in their finances.

Financial literacy is crucial for individuals to achieve financial stability and independence. It enables individuals to make informed decisions about their finances, protect themselves from financial scams, and plan for their future. Making financial literacy a priority will help ensure that individuals have the knowledge and skills they need to manage their finances effectively, and to achieve their financial goals, leading to a sense of financial freedom.


"Helping people improve their photography while having fun is one of my favorite things in life!" says Kemper.
