

Yolo County Awarded Grant to Reduce the Risk of Child Injury in Vehicles

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - The Yolo County Health and Human Services Agency (HHSA) has been awarded a \$226,000 single-year grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety to fund child passenger safety education and training programs. HHSA aims to reduce the risk of child injury while traveling in a vehicle and this grant will support local child passenger safety efforts and help ensure that infant and child safety seats (also known as car seats) are installed and used properly. According to the National

Highway Traffic Safety Administration, a correctly used car seat can reduce fatality risk by 71% for infants and 54% for toddlers in passenger vehicles.

Activities funded by this grant will run through September 2023 and include: Community education and car seat check events; Individual car seat checks (by appointment), Child safety seats at no-cost for families in need; Child Passenger Safety Technician training; Promotion of child safety seat recycling and the importance of discarding used and expired car seats, Partnering with local organizations on car seat

safety community outreach efforts in underserved communities.

"The goal of this program is to significantly reduce death and injury to children riding in cars and trucks," Yolo County Health Program Manager Steven Jensen said. "Eliminating the financial burden for low-income families helps every child in our community ride safely."

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - On Tuesday, December 13, the Yolo County Board of Education held its final meeting of 2022, with an agenda that included selecting new officers, administering the oath of office to new and returning trustees, and recognizing an outgoing trustee.

The meeting opened with the board recognizing Trustee Carol Souza Cole of Woodland, who declined to run for re-election after serving two terms in office.

Board of Supervisors Chair Angel Barajas presented Souza Cole with an honorary resolution on behalf of the board. In presenting the resolution, Barajas said, "[Souza Cole] is an amazing leader in Yolo County for our students, residents, schools, teachers, and staff. She is someone that is definitely a role model for me and many people in Yolo County."

Barajas and Souza Cole previously served together on the Woodland Joint Unified school board.

Souza Cole was first elected to the board in 2014 and then reelected in 2018. While on the board, she represented Trustee Area 5, which covers areas of Woodland, Esparto, Winters, and Knights Landing.

In her final comments, Souza Cole added, "Being part of this governance team has been so inspirational. I have worked with nine board members and two superintendents. The quality of leadership here on the Yolo County Board of Education is pretty much unmatched at this moment in time."

Souza Cole noted that while she declined to run for reelection to the board, she has not decided if she will fully retire from public service. Souza Cole said, "I may or might not be continuing in public service but for right now, I am stepping off of the

Souza Cole was also presented with honorary resolutions from Assemblymember Cecilia Aguiar-Curry, Senator Bill Dodd, and Congressman John Garamendi

The oath of office for current trustee Elizabeth Esquivel was administered in English by her husband, Nick Esquivel, and in Spanish by her mother, Obdulia Munguia. Earlier this year, Esquivel was appointed to a vacancy for Trustee Area 1, representing West Sacramento. In November, she was elected to a four-year term.

The oath of office for current trustee Melissa Moreno was administered by former Assemblymember Mariko Yamada. Moreno was first elected to the board in 2018 and represents Trustee Area 2, which covers west Davis and Winters. In November, Moreno was reelected to a four-year term.

The oath of office for current trustee Shelton Yip was administered by County Superintendent Garth Lewis. Yip was appointed to the seat in 2021 after the seat was vacated by former trustee Jerry Jimenez. In November, Yip was elected to a two-year term to complete the remaining term for Trustee Area 4, which covers central and south Davis.

The board will be joined by new trustee Armando Salud-Ambriz, who was elected to his first term in November. He will serve a four-year term representing Trustee Area 5, which covers Esparto, Woodland, and Knights Landing. His oath of office was administered in English by his sister, Janet Andrade, and in Spanish by his mother, Dioselina Ambriz de Salud.

Tuesday's meeting was also the board's annual organizational meeting. Trustee Tico Zendejas of Woodland was elected president. Zendejas has served on the board since 2019 when he was appointed to an open trustee seat. In 2020, he ran unopposed for the seat and was elected to a four-year term.

Trustee Shelton Yip of Davis was elected vice president. Yip was appointed to the board in 2021 and elected to a twoyear term in November. He previously served on the board from 2012-2020.

dedicated their time, energy, and resources to bring holiday cheer to the children and families. Without YCCA heroes like Sutter Health, this event would not be possible at such a large scale due to the growing need in our community."

The holiday toy distribution is also an opportunity to provide no-cost COVID and flu vaccines to the community. As cases of COVID and RSV continue to rise, the need for health education and vaccines is higher than ever. Many families served at this event don't have the option to visit a provider for their flu vaccine, thus leaving them more vulnerable to catching and spreading the virus. Killer of Woodland Teens Enrique Rios and Elijah Moore is Sentenced to 15 Years in Prison

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - On December 7, 2022, 26-year-old Knights Landing man, Jonathan Froste, was sentenced to 15 years to life by Yolo County Superior Court Judge David Rosenberg.

In May 2022, a Yolo County jury found co-defendants Chandale Shannon guilty of two counts of first-degree murder for victims Enrique Rios and Elijah Moore, and also kidnapping, and special circumstances of multiple murders and kidnapping during the course of a murder. Jesus Campos was convicted of second-degree murder of Enrique Rios, first degree murder of Elijah Moore, kidnapping, and special circumstances of multiple murders and kidnapping during the course of a murder.

The jury heard evidence that on October 17, 2016, 16-yearold Elijah Moore robbed David Froste, Chandale Shannon, and Jesus Campos of three ounces of marijuana. David Froste contacted his brother, Jonathan Froste, telling him about the robbery and indicated that he was going to get his gun from their mutual home in Knights Landing. Chandale Shannon and Jesus Campos heard the phone call, which was recorded on Jonathan Froste's cell phone, and later obtained by investigators.

After getting his gun, David Froste, Shannon, and Campos returned to Woodland and met with Jonathan Froste. David Froste informed the others he wanted to find Moore and exact revenge. Mr. Shannon suggested they reach out to Enrique Rios, age 16, who was a friend of Moore's. Knowing David Froste wanted to kill Moore, Shannon communicated with Rios, who, unaware of what Moore had

done, provided an address in Esparto.

Cell phone tower and location data showed David Froste, Shannon, and Campos traveled to Esparto and a witness saw Rios being picked up in a car matching the description of a vehicle owned by Shannon. Rios was friends with both Shannon and Campos but not David Froste. A short time later, David Froste, Shannon, and Campos turned off their phones. The following day, David Froste and Shannon told Jonathan Froste that Rios was taken to a secluded area near Knights Landing. Rios refused to call or provide a location for his friend Moore. David Froste shot and murdered Rios.

Several weeks later, on November 4, 2016, Campos, in a vehicle with David and Jonathan Froste, pointed out Moore who was leaving a barber shop near Main Street in Woodland. Moore was forced into the trunk of the vehicle. The three then traveled to pick up Shannon, who had the gun used to kill Rios. The four defendants traveled again to Knights Landing. Moore was forced out of the vehicle at gun point. Shannon initially had the firearm and held Moore at gunpoint. Moore was forced to the ground and his hands were zip tied behind his back. The four defendants marched Moore to a more secluded area. Moore's ankles were also bound at this point and David Froste and Campos left the group to obtain shovels, a pickaxe, gasoline, and bleach. Moore was told he was going to die.

Jonathan Froste and Shannon took turns holding the gun while Moore begged to call his mother and to let him go. Both requests were denied. When David Froste and Campos returned an hour later with the tools, David

Froste selected a baseball bat sized branch and violently struck Moore in the head. Jonathan Froste, Shannon, and Campos each took turns striking Moore in the head. David Froste then selected a large log and dropped it on Moore's head, crushing his skull. All four defendants then proceeded to dig a hole to bury Moore's body. Moore's body was placed in the hole and lit Moore's body on fire. The flames were too high and the four defendants doused the flames with dirt. Bleach was also poured on Moore's body.

After covering Moore's body with dirt and vegetation, the four defendants left, burned their own blood covered clothing, and threw the tools used to clean up into the river at the drawbridge in Knights Landing.

Shortly after each Rios and Moore went missing, their parents contacted law enforcement. This proved to be the beginning of a massive investigation. The Yolo County Sherriff's Department and Woodland Police Department began a comprehensive investigation that lasted until June of 2018. Numerous other agencies also assisted. Multiple search warrants obtaining cell tower records, Facebook records, and Google location data obtained thousands of pages of records. Detective Mat Jameson of the Woodland Police Department and Sgt. Lech Garcia of the Yolo County Sheriff's Office coordinated and led the investigation which involved numerous detectives, officers, and crime scene analysts from both the Woodland Police Department and the Yolo County Sheriff's Office.

Coordinated through the leadership of the Yolo County District Attorney's Office, numerous other agencies, both

law enforcement and civilian, assisted in providing thousands of hours to completing the investigation and preparing a compelling case against the perpetrators of these horrendous crimes. This process also included monumental efforts attempting to find the location of Moore and Rios' bodies. Those who provided assistance included the FBI, archeologists and anthropologists from Chico State University, Sutter County Sheriff's Office, numerous search and rescue volunteers, cadaver dogs, PG&E, the GIS office of Yolo County, and experts in ground radar and missing body location. All four murderers, David Froste, Jonathan Froste, Chandale Shannon, and Jesus Campos were arrested in June of 2018 after an extensive investigation.

Jonathan Froste, after his arrest in June of 2018, elected to cooperate with the Yolo County District Attorney's Office. He attempted to locate Moore and Rios' bodies. While ultimately unsuccessful, Jonathan Froste agreed to provide truthful information regarding the two murders and pled to second degree murder. He testified against his brother David Froste and against Shannon and Campos. He ultimately testified at the trial of his brother David Froste in the fall of 2018, and the trial of Chandale Shannon and Jesus Campos held in March-May of 2022.

Deputy District Attorneys Jay Linden and Kyle Hasapes organized the massive amount of evidence and records to prepare for the trial of David Froste, which took place in the Fall of 2018. David Froste was convicted and sentenced to Life without the Possibility of Parole. His conviction

was recently affirmed by the California Third District Court of Appeals.

With both Hasapes and Linden leaving the office, Deputy District Attorney David Wilson was assigned to prosecute and try Shannon and Campos. With the assistance of Detective Mat Jameson and Sgt. Lech Garcia, numerous witnesses and complex legal theories were presented during the trial. This included cell phone tower data, Google location data, Facebook records, and numerous witnesses in order to provide as much information as possible to the jury. The evidence presented clearly demonstrated that Shannon and Campos conspired with and aided David Froste in committing horrible crimes. After four weeks of trial, the jury returned the guilty verdicts.

During the sentencing hearing, numerous family members made victim impact statements on behalf of Enrique and Elijah. While appreciative of Jonathan Froste providing information regarding these horrific murders, the families of both victims spoke to how Jonathan Froste was still culpable and responsible in the acts that ultimately stole the lives of two young men. Several pleaded for Jonathan Froste to provide any additional information regarding the location of Enrique's and Elijah's bodies.

Judge Rosenberg then pronounced sentence. Judge Rosenberg stated that in his twenty years on the bench, this case represented some of the most heinous and evil acts he had ever seen. While Jonathan Froste ultimately came forward with information, he shared in the responsibility for the deaths of the two victims and needed to be held accountable.

Check some stress off your list this year by using the DMV's Online Services to take care of your DMV to-do list while you're getting your holiday shopping done.

- Q: I saw a DMV kiosk at my local grocery store. Can I use it if I can't make it to a DMV office before the holidays?
- A: Yes! If you are unable to make it to the DMV before the holiday season, you can use one of the hundreds of DMV kiosks located throughout the state to help complete your vehicle registration renewal, print registration tags instantly, submit proof of insurance, receive a driver or vehicle record, and more. Some are even open 24/7 and are located throughout communities in local grocery stores, libraries, and other convenient locations. To locate the DMV kiosk nearest to you, visit https://www.dmv.ca.gov/portal/locations/kiosks.
- Q: I will be moving next year, but I want to get my address updated on my driver's license before the holidays. Can I change my address online?
- **A**: Yes, you can update your new address online as long as you already have a valid California ID and your new residence is in the same state that you currently reside in. Before you begin, make sure you have:

Both your old and new addresses.

If changing the address for your vehicle or vessel, you will also need your most recent registration card and the address where your trailer coach or vessel is located (if applicable).

A MyDMV account which can be created online.

Once you have all those items handy, you can start the application process to update your address at dmv.ca.gov/online.

- Q: What if I have an urgent question regarding DMV services, but I don't have time to make it into an office before the holidays? Do I have any other options?
- **A**: Yes, a DMV virtual assistant is available 24/7 to help guide you and answer any questions about DMV services. Just click or tap the "Ask DMV" button in the bottom right corner of your screen. The DMV site also features a virtual field office allowing users to start transactions and upload any required documents, which are then reviewed by a DMV customer service agent before contacting you to finish the process.

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Social Security Matters Which California School

Retired Federal Employee Has Small Social Security Benefit

Dear Rusty: When I started getting Social Security at 62, I was told by the SS office I would get a smaller monthly amount because I worked for the Federal Government and received a Civil Service Retirement System (CSRS) pension. I paid into Social Security for about 20 years working outside the government, and I now receive only about \$280 a month in Social Security. It just seems like I should be getting more. How can I look into this matter that Social Security calls a "windfall?" Signed: Federal

Retiree Dear Federal Retiree: From what you've shared, you didn't contribute to Social Security while earning your CSRS pension, but you did contribute to SS while working elsewhere, thus earning a Social Security retirement benefit in addition to your CSRS pension. Those who receive a federal pension under the old Civil Service Retirement System (CSRS) are affected by Social Security's Windfall Elimination Provision (WEP), which reduces any Social Security benefit they become entitled to through other work outside the Federal government, and this is the reason your SS benefit is only \$280 per month. For clarity, federal employees who retire under the newer Federal Employee Retirement System (FERS) are not affected by WEP because they contribute to Social Security.

The formula for computing Social Security when WEP applies is rather complicated and depends on the number of years you contributed to Social Security from substantial earnings in the private sector. With 20 or fewer years contributing to SS you incur the maximum WEP penalty for your "eligibility year" (the year you turned 62), but with more than 20 years contributing to Social Security the WEP reduction is mitigated, and with 30 or more years contributing to SS, WEP no longer applies.

If you were receiving your CSRS pension when you claimed Social Security, your WEP-reduced SS benefit was computed at that time and has continued. But if you had additional years working and contributing to Social Security after you first claimed, it's possible that you now have more than 20 years contributing, in which case you may be entitled to a smaller WEP reduction and thus a higher Social Security benefit. The only way to find out if you're now entitled to a higher benefit due to additional years contributing is to call Social Security, either at your local office or at the national number (1.800.772.1213) and ask them to review your current benefit under WEP. If you now have more years contributing to Social Security

than you had when you first claimed, you may be entitled to a benefit increase.

Before calling SS, you may wish to first review your lifetime earnings record on file at Social Security and determine how many years of contributions from substantial SS earnings you actually have. You can get a copy of your lifetime SS earnings record from Social Security, most easily from your personal online "my Social Security" account. If you don't yet have an online account set up, you can easily do so at www. ssa.gov/myaccount. Then, you can review your lifetime SS-earnings against the chart at the following link which shows what your earnings must have been each year to count under WEP: www.ssa. gov/pubs/EN-05-10045.pdf.

So, to recap: if you continued to work after starting vour WEP-reduced Social Security benefits, you may be entitled to a smaller WEP reduction and thus a higher Social Security benefit now, but you will need to contact Social Security to evaluate your current status (and, if appropriate, increase your

Gov. Gavin Newsom is fond of characterizing his state as a national — or even global — model in all things good, from economic clout to fighting climate change.

One conspicuous absence on his list of California's virtues is its public education system, for good reason.

In statewide and nationwide tests of K-12 academic achievement, California lags badly behind. Learning is especially deficient among children from poor families, but even kids from affluent California families tend to lag behind those in other states.

To the extent that this educational crisis receives any attention in the state Capitol, the discussion is almost always confined to money, on the fanciful notion that spending more will automatically increase academic attainment.

One reason money doesn't solve the problem is that the state provides very little oversight on how the money is spent, including the extra funds that local school systems receive specifically to close the achievement gap. State education officials intervene only when local systems are flirting with insolvency.

Some school districts spend their money wisely and effectively and some don't and outcomes largely

hinge on the quality of their governance. Those with engaged and committed boards and administrators tend to have better outcomes than those with inconsistent, politics-driven and often chaotic governance.

Districts are Run Well?

That's why a massive effort to judge how well California's local school systems are structured and managed is welcome.

Arun Ramanathan, CEO of Pivot Learning, an Oakland-based non-profit organization that advises school systems on improving instruction, created a series of benchmarks to gauge how well school districts are prepared to embrace reforms. He also created a website that allows the public to view the results for every school district with at least 2,500 students.

"Despite billions in investment and decades of effort, new reform efforts rarely have intended impacts at the district, school and classroom level, and sustained improvement is rare," Ramanathan told EdSource, a website of education journalism. "There are rarely insights into why. The District Readiness Index resulted from that questioning."

The ratings cover five "domains" - community relations, finance, leadership, personnel policies and workplace conditions. Users can see how the districts score in each, with overall ratings designated by colors. Blue is the best, yellow is in the middle and orange is the worst.

The grading process resulted in about half of the 420 districts getting yellow grades and about 40% blue marks with roughly two dozen placed in the orange

category, meaning they have "few foundations" for achieving needed reforms.

Some of the state's largest districts are colored orange, including Los Angeles Unified, whose enrollment approaches 10% of the state's 6 million public school students.

It's not surprising that LA Unified, Oakland Unified, San Francisco Unified and Sacramento Unified received low marks because all have been in constant political turmoil and financial distress of their own making.

Three of the large districts - San Diego Unified, Elk Grove Unified and San Juan Unified - escaped the orange designation and are marked as yellow.

A few large districts achieved blue status for being well prepared, including Fresno Unified, Long Beach Unified and San Bernardino Unified. But most of the blue districts tend to be either in affluent suburbs – no surprise there – or in rural areas.

Most interestingly, the blue list includes a number of districts with large numbers of poor students, such as Brawley and Calexico in poverty stricken Imperial County.

The District Readiness Index provides new ammunition for the school reform movement in California, which seeks to elevate students' welfare over the petty politics, particularly in Los Angeles Unified and other large districts, that sabotage their educations.

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Survey Predicts 'Strong' 2022, 'Flat' 2023

Yolo Community Foundation News Release

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -The Yolo Donor Survey 2022, conducted by the Yolo Community Foundation, found that 2022 giving is likely to remain strong. It predicted that 2023 giving is likely to remain flat, but economic uncertainty is a cause for concern.

The Yolo Donor Survey was conducted by the Yolo Community Foundation in October/ November 2022. With 104 respondents from Yolo County, the survey results are not conclusive but provide useful insights.

Highlights include: 2022 giving remains strong: 55% of survey respondents reported that their 2022 giving will be about the same as 2021, while 25% said it is up, and 14% said it is down. Among major donors, 33% said 2022 giving will exceed 2021; none said it will fall. Year-end giving is likely to remain

flat to strong: 60% planned to give about the same in November and December 2022 as they gave at yearend 2021, 17% expected to give less, and 13% more. Among major donors, 17% expected to give more and none less. The biggest factor that impacted giving in 2022 was community need: 47% said this led them to give more. Economic factors decreased giving, but not substantially. Due to economic concerns and weakening giving by major donors, survey respondents, as a group, will likely maintain but not grow their giving in 2023. 21% of respondents expected to increase giving in 2023, 17% expected to decrease, and nearly half expected giving to remain flat. However, among major donors, none planned to increase giving. In 2023, economic factors will likely have a much bigger impact on giving: 25% of respondents reported that changes to their income are likely to drive their www.yolof.org.

giving down; 24% say the same for changes to their assets, 17% for stock market performance, and 33% for inflation. These figures suggest that, if economic conditions are worse than respondents anticipate, 2023 giving may weaken; of course, the reverse is also true. Survey respondents are strongly committed to Yolo-based nonprofit organizations: 46% give primarily to Yolo-based organizations. When considering whether and how much to give, respondents are especially focused on the organization's cause or mission, reputation, impact on the community, the anticipated impact of the donation on the nonprofit or program, and peer support. Respondents prefer to learn about prospective recipients from the organization's website, from a friend who is involved with the organization, and from

Dear Karla,

In their later years? I'm not trying to be mean, but they're already in their later years.

I'm really sorry you're in this situation. Even though you're in your 50s, he's still your dad, and I know this hurts your heart. It's probably even tougher to accept the fact that he's being manipulative. I mean, seriously. What dad calls up his daughter with the idea he's entitled to \$55,000 of her money and starts acting like a travel agent for guilt trips in the process? That's just wrong.

Look, if the relationship and the situation were different, we might have something to talk about. With your net worth, you're not going to miss \$55,000 out of \$2 to 3 million. In a good relationship, I'd help my mom or dad like that in a heartbeat –just to help them out because they're older. But this situation already is what it is. Something tells me this isn't the first time he's behaved in a manipulative way. And if you say yes to this, then I've got a feeling it isn't the first time

you've caved into him. I'm worried you won't be able to live with yourself if you do this, and that it may cause a big rift between you and your husband.

It's wrong of your dad to treat you this way and put you in this situation. If you want to tell him your money's tied up, which it is, or you just don't like the way it feels, that's fine. But my advice is to try to step back from the emotions and come to the realization in your own head that no is a complete answer.

You don't have an ethical or moral obligation to give manipulative people money just because they're related to you.

CHRISTMAS MAGIC ON TCM AND LIFETIME

Turner Classic Movies' Christmas marathon ends on Christmas Day with 1949's "Holiday Affair," which may not be seen as truly in the Christmas spirit as what one may find on the Hallmark Channel.

Interestingly enough, TCM announced its holiday marathon by noting that "Christmas movie," means different things to different people. After all, many argue that "Die Hard" is a Christmas movie, and throw in "Bad Santa" for good

According to TCM, the Christmas movie label is subject to personal definition because Christmas films have not historically comprised a distinct genre. For some fans, the mere appearance of the season onscreen, no matter how brief, will suffice for the holiday spirit.

Like that 1947 classic, "Holiday Affair" centers on a single working mother with a young child in Manhattan. Both films prominently incorporate department stores and their owners, and devote much time to their child characters.

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
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


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
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
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
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
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































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




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
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






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The Reason for the Season
