WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The San Pedro Association celebrated its 100th anniversary, at 708 N. Hobson, on Saturday and Sunday with what has been come to be known as the "Portuguese picnic." It began Saturday afternoon when they had live music featuring a Bay area Portuguese Fada singer, Ramana Vieira. This band played traditional Portuguese music and later switching it to classic rock. Yolo-Solano Air Quality District Awards for Clean Air Projects

Yolo-Solano Air Quality Management District News Release

DAVIS, CA (MPG) - At the June 8 meeting of the Yolo-Solano Air Quality Management District's Board of Directors, the board approved a total of \$530,275 in funding for 10 Clean Air Fund (CAF) projects for the 2022/2023 grant cycle.

This annual grant program provides funding to private businesses, nonprofit organizations, and public agencies for local projects that will reduce emissions from mobile sources of air pollution within the district. The funds are intended for the purposes of implementing the use of cleaner technologies, low-emission vehicles, alternative transportation, transit services and public education.

Funding for the CAF Program comes from a portion of the annual Department of Motor Vehicles registration fee and additional funding for Solano County projects is provided by AB 8 property tax proceeds. Funding is awarded on a competitive basis for projects that aim to achieve the greatest amount of emission reductions for the money awarded, maximizing cost-effectiveness.

The Triple-A Yankees won the championship 7-6 in the sixth inning over the Triple-A Braves

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

Bryte and now known as West Sacramento.

The proclamation states that they paved the way for other Madeiran families to settle in the area, bringing with them their culture and religious traditions. The proclamation describes

a monument built on the island dedicated to world peace, after which the first Portuguese picnic was held at San Pedro Park where West Sacramento residents and residents from surrounding communities could celebrate.

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Understanding Pest Variability Key to Managing Pest Outbreaks

ANDALUSIA, ES (MPG) - Newly published research led by UC Davis ecologist Daniel Paredes suggests that pest abundances are less variable in diverse landscapes comprised of multiple crop types and patches of natural habitat.

"As a result, pest outbreaks are less likely in diverse landscapes," said Paredes, who analyzed a 13-year government database of diversified landscapes encompassing more than 1300 olive groves and vineyards in Spain. The database documented pests and pesticide applications.

The paper, "The Causes and Consequences of Pest Population Variability in Agricultural Landscapes," appears in the Ecological Society of America journal, Ecological Applications. Co-authors are UC Davis distinguished professor Jay Rosenheim of the Department of Entomology and Nematology, and Daniel Karp, associate professor, Department of Wildlife, Fish, and Conservation Biology. The research is online at https://bit.ly/3a64WRN.

Pest variability: an understudied but critical topic

Although population variability is often studied in natural systems, the need for long-term pest population data collected across many farms has largely prevented researchers from studying pest variability in agricultural systems, said Paredes, a postdoctoral fellow in the Karp lab.

"However, understanding variability in agriculture is key to understanding when pest outbreaks are likely to occur,' Paredes said. "Farmers are really risk averse, with fear of very rare but severe pest outbreaks driving their decisions. But huge datasets are needed to understand when outbreaks are likely to occur and better inform management."

"We found that more variable pest populations are more likely to downgrade crop quality and induce catastrophic damages," Paredes said. "For example, the likelihood that olive flies consume more than 20 percent of olive crops doubled when comparing the most versus the least volatile populations."

What causes a pest population to be variable?

Having shown that more pest-population variability is more likely to cause problems for farmers, the researchers then set out to discover what farmers could do to manage variability.

One key factor that emerged was the type of landscape the crops were grown in, specifically whether the landscape was dominated by vast fields of a single crop variety or more diversified. Pest populations were both more abundant and more variable in crop monocultures.

However, while landscape type influenced both pest population sizes and variability, this was not always the case for other variables. "This research shows that the factors that promote high overall mean pest density are not necessarily the same factors that promote high variability in pest density," Rosenheim said. "So, mean densities, which is what researchers have been studying for decades and decades, are only part of the story. Variation in density, and in particular unpredictable severe outbreaks, need to be studied separately."

The take-away message?

"In Spain, planting multiple crops and retaining natural habitats would help stably suppress pests and prevent outbreaks," said Paredes, a native of Spain who holds a doctorate in environmental sciences (2014) from the University of Granada. "Diversifying agricultural may be a win-win situation for conservation and farmers alike."

"Therefore, we encourage agricultural stakeholders to increase the complexity of the landscapes surrounding their farms through conserving/restoring natural habitat and/or diversifying crops," the researchers wrote in their abstract.

Tapping into other large datasets such as this one, will be key to understanding whether diversified landscapes also help mitigate pest variability and outbreaks in other areas, they said.

This project was funded by the National Science Foundation with funds from the Belmont Forum via the European Biodiversity Partnership: BiodivERsA. It was also supported by the USDA National Institute of Food and Agriculture.

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Supreme Court Gives Business a 'Tort Wars' Win

"Tort wars" is the term Capitol insiders apply to the perennial political conflict over the rules governing personal injury lawsuits.

Lawyers who file such suits seek to expand opportunities for litigation, often in concert with other interests, such as unions and environmental activists.

Business and employer groups and their insurers resist such expansion and occasionally propose ways to reduce exposure.

The conflict plays out in the Legislature, in the courts and in ballot measures with countless billions of dollars at stake in outcomes. Earlier this year, a 44-year-long dispute over medical malpractice compensation was resolved in a compromise that averted a ballot measure battle.

However, there are many other fronts in tort wars, including one that resulted in a U.S. Supreme Court ruling last week.

In 2003, just four days after California voters decided to remove him from office, then-Gov. Gray Davis handed personal injury lawyers and unions a major victory by signing legislation called the Private Attorneys General Act (PAGA). It enabled workers who had disputes

with their employers to file class action lawsuits even if they had signed pre-employment agreements to submit such disputes to arbitration.

Advocates said it was needed to protect workers' rights and make up for the state labor department's inability to keep up with disputes over wages and other working conditions. Business and employer groups said it gave greedy lawyers a license to demand big settlements of cases and earn big contingency fees.

Ultimately, business interests spent millions of dollars to qualify a ballot measure that would gut PAGA. The initiative petitions have been submitted for signature-counting, but probably too late for the 2022 ballot. Most likely it will go to voters in 2024.

Meanwhile, a case challenging PAGA's provisions has been winding through state and federal courts and the U.S. Supreme Court last week declared that some important features are void because they conflict with the Federal Arbitration Act, which encourages civil disputes to be arbitrated rather than litigated.

The case involved Viking River Cruises and one of its employees, former sales representative Angie Moriana. Essentially, the Supreme Court declared that California's Supreme Court had erred in a previous PAGA case and state courts had applied that erroneous decision, involving the division of complaints, to Moriana's case.

The decision was not unexpected, given the tenor of oral arguments, but surprisingly did not reflect the court's much-discussed 6-3 ideological split. The vote was 8-1 with only the court's most conservative member, Clarence Thomas, fully dissenting, saying state issues should be left to state legislatures and courts.

Predictably, even a Supreme Court decision does not end the battle over PAGA because it was decided on technical legal points rather than the broader issue.

Unions, lawyers and their political allies immediately pledged to write new legislation to get around the Supreme Court decree. Sen. Dave Cortese, a San Jose Democrat who chairs the state Senate's labor committee, said the ruling "has provided a roadmap as to how we can create for employees a new pathway to legal standing as well as safeguard the protections that state law puts in place for our workers."

Because the Supreme Court did not strike down all of PAGA, the business coalition backing the ballot measure, dubbed the California Fair Pay and Employer Accountability Act, pledged to continue its campaign. "Even with the SCOTUS ruling on Viking River Cruises, PAGA will still be an avenue for shakedown claims against businesses where trial attorneys take a huge portion of the recovery, leaving employees with a reduced amount," it said.

Social Security Matters

Will Claiming Early Affect My Wife's Survivor Benefit?

Dear Rusty: My wife will be turning 62 and eligible to collect Social Security this year. We realize it will be a reduced amount. I am 52 and have been the sole income earner for most of the last 20 years. We also have an adopted son who will be turning 14 this year. We realize he will receive a dependent benefit until he turns 18 and this may make the case for filing early. I am confused about widow benefits - will my wife's early filing affect her widow's benefit amount? Signed: Confused Husband

Confused D e a r Husband: When your wife claims her own SS retirement benefit (e.g., at 62) will have no effect on the benefit available to her as your widow. The only thing that would affect her survivor benefit as your

widow is her age when she claims it. Claimed before her FRA, her survivor benefit would be reduced, but claimed at or after her FRA, your wife's survivor benefit as your widow will be 100% of the amount you were receiving (or, if you are not yet collecting, the amount you were entitled to receive) at your death. Your wife would get that amount, instead of her smaller personal amount.

However, for your awareness, your wife's spousal benefit while you are both living (which she can claim when you start your own SS benefit) will be less than half of your FRA benefit amount because she claimed her own SS retirement benefit at age 62. The reason is that your wife's benefit as your spouse when you claim will consist of her own reduced SS retirement benefit, plus a spousal boost to bring her payment up to her spousal entitlement. Since her spousal boost will be added to her own reduced early benefit, her total payment as your spouse will be less than 50% of your FRA benefit amount.

If your wife claims her own SS retirement benefit at age 62, she can also

apply for your adopted minor son's benefits based on her personal lifetime work record. Although your wife's personal early benefit will be cut (by 30%) for claiming at age 62, your son's benefit as your wife's minor child will be based on your wife's full retirement age (FRA) benefit amount. Your son's benefit from your wife will be 50% of your wife's FRA amount (not her age 62 amount). As you know, your son will get that amount until he is 18 (or 19 if he is still in high school).

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'Speak on It,' Mike Brown is 'Here to Win'

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Hours after parading through the streets of San Francisco to celebrate the Golden State Warriors' fourth championship in eight years, Mike Brown was formally introduced Tuesday afternoon as the new coach of the Sacramento Kings.

Brown is the 20th head coach in Sacramento franchise history and the 12th since Rick Adelman departed the organization in 2006. Adelman is currently the only Sacramento coach to lead the team to a winning record. The Basketball Hall of Famer had a (.633) regular season winning percentage along with eight playoff appearances in eight years.

"I'm excited about being here," Brown said at his introductory press conference. "The fan base is tremendous. I remember back in the day, them damn cowbells just use to ring in my ear and use to drive me crazy. I hope we get back to that point because now I'd love to hear them cowbells every game.

"I'd be the first one raising the roof and telling everybody to get up and ring those things all day long. The fans, they're extremely passionate, they're knowledgeable and I'm just looking forward to being around them."

Brown has been as an NBA head coach on three separate occasions, with the Los Angeles Lakers (2011-12) and twice with the Cleveland Cavaliers (2005-10 & 13-14). In seven full seasons as the leading man, Brown has led his teams to the playoffs six times, without a single first round elimination. Brown was named the NBA Coach of the Year in 2009 after leading Cleveland to a 66-16 record and a trip to the Eastern Conference Finals.

"We conducted a very robust, thorough, comprehensive process and we wanted to ensure that we found the right coach," said Kings general manager Monte McNair. "We did a lot of research, and it came down to really three key things for us: experience, successful head coaching experience; relationships, the ability to build relationships across the organization; and leadership, as a head coach and leadership for everything that we're trying to do here."

During seven plus seasons as a head coach in the league, Brown has a winning record in both the regular season (.616) and playoffs (.566). The 52-year-old spent the last six seasons as an assistant coach with the Warriors, adding three rings to the one he earned as an assistant with the San Antonio Spurs in 2003.

"We gotta get one for the thumb, I only got four!" Brown said to a media member while pounding the table with a laugh and a smile.

Brown expressed three areas of focus as he enters his new role: 1. An alignment of trusts within the organization. 2. A set of values upheld by leadership. 3. An embracement of your role.

"I was brought here to bring some leadership in a lot of different areas," Brown said. "I've been with a lot of different teams in my 30 years, and I've experienced what I believe is something that can get organizations over the top, not just in one year, but year in and year out, and that's having a winning culture. Every organization out there in my opinion has a soul. A strong soul in my opinion equates to a winning culture."

It's well chronicled that the Kings' active playoff drought is the longest in NBA history at 16 seasons. Some new coaches may try and avoid questions about it, but not Brown.

"There ain't no elephant in the room, you can speak on it," Brown said. "We're going to embrace that. I'm not coming here to 'have fun and be excited enjoying the area.' I'm coming here to win!"

Sen. Dodd's To-Go Cocktails **Bill Approved by Senate**

The California Senate on May 26 approved legislation from Sen. Bill Dodd, D-Napa to boost his previous relief for struggling restaurants and bars by expanding provisions of his 2021 law allowing the sale and delivery of to-go cocktails.

"Our restaurants and bars were hit hard by the pandemic and allowing flexibility to sell to-go cocktails has been a lifeline," Sen. Dodd said. "To ensure a strong recovery and to answer consumer demand, we must expand this successful provision in ways that will make sense and will be beneficial to all. Thanks to my Senate colleagues for seeing the value in this proposal."

Last year, Gov. Gavin Newsom signed Sen. Dodd's Senate Bill 389, which allowed the sale of to-go alcoholic beverages as part of take-out restaurant food orders. It came

as restaurants nationwide recovered from hundreds of billions of dollars in losses sustained because of lockdowns and social distancing requirements to stop the spread of coronavirus.

This year's bill, SB 846, expands the previous legislation in important ways, removing the meal requirement to increase options for consumers and business owners. It also extends the carry-out cocktail provision to bars, which also have been hard-hit by the pandemic. In addition, it allows for the delivery of to-go cocktails from both types of businesses. Finally, the bill increases oversight of alcohol delivery by Alcohol Beverage Control to prevent underage drinking.

The City of West Sacramento receives an annual allocation of CDBG funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). CDBG funds must be used for projects that meet at least one of the three CDBG national objectives: 1) benefitting low- and moderate-income households or neighborhoods; 2) addressing slums or blight conditions; or 3) addressing an urgent need such as flood or earthquake damage. As a condition of the CDBG funds, the City is required to develop a Five-Year Consolidated Plan that contains the City's strategy for the use of CDBG funds. Additionally, the City must develop an Annual Action Plan outlining how CDBG funds will be used to meet goals set in the Consolidated Plan. The Five-Year Consolidated Plan covers the period of July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2026 and was approved by the City Council on April 21, 2021. The draft 2022 Annual Action Plan covers the second year of the five-year planning period.

The City of West Sacramento CDBG allocation for fiscal year 2022 was \$470,478, HUD released allocation amounts on May 13th , 2022. Additional resources for the 2022 Action Plan will include

\$100,000 in anticipated program income. Any increase or decrease in the 2022 allocation amount will be reflected in the proposed activity associated with Consolidated Plan Goal #3: Construct infrastructure improvements in low-income neighborhoods. The proposed CDBG activities for the 2022 Annual Action Plan do not include programs or projects that displace persons from their homes, businesses, or farms.

Recommended goals and amounts for the 2022 CDBG Annual Action Plan will be as follows:

- Consolidated Plan Goal #1: Address the supportive services needs of persons experiencing homelessness and those at risk of homelessness. (\$85,571);
- Consolidated Plan Goal #3: Construct infrastructure improvements in low-income neighborhoods (\$370,812);
- General administration and planning expenses shall not exceed 20% of the HUD allocation plus program income. (\$114,095).







Farm Bureau President Praises Signing of Ocean Shipping Reform Act

California Farm Bureau News Release

Johansson on Thursday,
June 16, applauded
President Joe Biden for
signing the bipartisan
Ocean Shipping Reform

Act into law.

Passed by the House of Representatives on Monday by a vote of 369-42, the measure seeks to address export backlogs and supply chain disruptions that have severely impacted agriculture.

"Today's signing by President Biden marks the first real regulatory effort to understand and correct the current bottleneck at our ports. The inability of agricultural producers and processors to efficiently export food products, which have been stranded at our ports to rot, has resulted in detention and demurrage fees at rates far surpassing global averages.

"These disruptions have severely impacted the lives and livelihoods of our farmers and ranchers. Last year, port congestion cost California farm producers \$2.1 billion in lost export income between May and September alone, and port problems continue.

"It is the California Farm Bureau's hope that the enactment of this bipartisan legislation reinstates fair trade practices for our farm producers. We look forward to quick action in coming weeks that brings greater transparency to fee charges and, in the coming year, redefines what it means for an

ocean shipper to decline an agricultural shipment. We urge the Federal Maritime Commission to employ tools under this act to ensure fair practices by ocean carriers and accelerated shipping for California's vast array of agricultural products.

"We appreciate the leadership of Reps. John Garamendi (D-CA) and Dusty Johnson (R-SD) for creating the original legislation in the House and working with Sens. Amy Klobuchar (D-MN) and John Thune (R-SD) to achieve final passage in both houses."

The California Farm Bureau works to protect family farms and ranches on behalf of nearly 31,000 members statewide and as part of a nationwide network of nearly 6 million Farm Bureau members.

"While our partners help connect them to housing, there are no other organizations in Yolo County to ensure they have the tools, appliances and furniture to safely live in their new independent living environment. Renters with no resources to properly care for their apartments are much more likely to be evicted or develop a poor rental history, and that risk is even higher as we battle a housing crisis in the greater Sacramento area. We are grateful to the Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation for helping set them up for success."

Make It Happen for Yolo County is a volunteer-run nonprofit that receives furniture donations from the community and purchases new appliances and household items to help transition age youth involved with the Yolo County child welfare, mental health and probation divisions, as well as the UC Davis Guardian Scholars program for students who have experienced foster care, and other nonprofits serving foster youth. Since its founding in 2014, Make It Happen for Yolo County has served 160 Yolo County transition age youth. To make a financial or furniture donation, visit MIHYolo.org.

"Each of these young people, many of whom have already been through so much, deserves the opportunity to realize their full potential," said the Tribal Council of the Yocha Dehe Wintun Nation. "We are pleased to help give them that opportunity."

Trucks are Awesome

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - People of all ages are fascinated by big trucks. From the red, shiny fire trucks to big green garbage trucks and work trucks that are loaded with equipment, people love to look at them and find out what they do. Arthur Turner Library, in West Sacramento hosted a "Truck-topia" this last Saturday so that kids of all ages could check out some of the local big trucks.

Held in the library parking lot, a rough count of 322 people came to check out the big trucks. They got to climb on them, sit inside, honk horns and play with equipment. The truck operators were close by to explain what the trucks were used for and how they worked.

As you walked in to the roped off area, the first thing you saw was the big, red, fire truck. West Sacramento Fire Fighters stood on each side of the truck with all of the doors open so that everyone

that is stored inside. They gave out fire hats to the kids and answered any

could see the equipment questions that anyone had about the truck or the job.

West Sac's Public Works department provided three people to check out and learn about. The first one was the Pipe Hunter. This

of their work trucks for truck has a hose that is placed down sewer pipes to unclog the pipes with pressurized water. Once

the clog is clear, they use a truck with a camera on it (that truck was not there) and look for any crack or breaks in the pipes.

The next truck was the Vac Con, a dirt vacuum or hydro-excavator. It is used when there is something like a broken pipe under the concrete or asphalt. The workers will jackhammer a hole above the broken pipe and the Vac Con is used to vacuum the dirt out between the surface and the broken pipe.

Next was the street sweeper. Kids were having a blast climbing into the truck and honking the horn before moving on to the next truck. On the other side of the parking lot, you could find a UPS truck, a Waste Management truck, a WSPD pick-up truck and the West Sac PD Community Outreach and Support Unit.
