Community Garden Now Bearing Fruit

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On the first week of May, Team Members at Downtown Streets Team (DST) in West Sacramento harvested their first batch of organic lettuce at the Mel Brookens Community Garden located in the backyard of the Roadway Inn.

The garden was started in January

of this year by Team Members of Downtown Streets Team, a nonprofit homeless advocacy organization whose mission is to build Teams that restore dignity, inspire hope, and provide a pathway to recover from homelessness. Teams are comprised of unhoused neighbors and those at risk of experiencing homelessness. Team Members receive case management and employment placement services from DST specialists

as well as non-cash incentives to pay for essentials like medicine, food, and transportation. DST Team Members are known for their volunteer cleanup of city streets and abandoned encampment sites; and in West Sacramento they also cultivate a garden.

The garden was named in memory of Mel Brookens, a founding Team Member and first Team Lead of the DST West Sacramento program,

Yolo County American Rescue Plan Mini Grants Approved

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - The Board of Supervisors allocated \$250,000 to develop mini grants to benefit the recovery of Yolo County's economy from the effects of the pandemic. These small grants provide a community benefit, serving nimble and transformative, community projects. Yolo County staff received 136 applications with over \$1.4 million in asks of the mini grants program. The County Board of Supervisors approved 56 successful awards, which represent projects that will be small but impactful. The full list of awarded applicants is available in the staff report and on the American Rescue Plan website.

"My colleagues and I were excited to receive and review a large number of diverse proposals for mini grants focusing on community level projects in each of our districts," said Board Chair, Supervisor Angel Barajas. "We look forward to seeing how these projects will help benefit Yolo County's overall social and economic recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic."

The Yolo Community Foundation assisted County staff in developing the process guided by the same federal eligibility criteria guiding the American Rescue Plan ("ARP"). Each supervisorial district ("District") had \$50,000 to award. The application process was open from February 4, 2022, to March 31, 2022. This program follows the approval of the ARP Expenditure Plan on September 28, 2021, which divided monies into categories, such as priority projects and strategic plan implementation. The total ARP Expenditure Plan includes just over \$42.8 million.

staff and project partners Wood Rodgers, Ghirardelli Associates, Teichert Construction, Caltrans and the Sacramento Area Council of Governments.

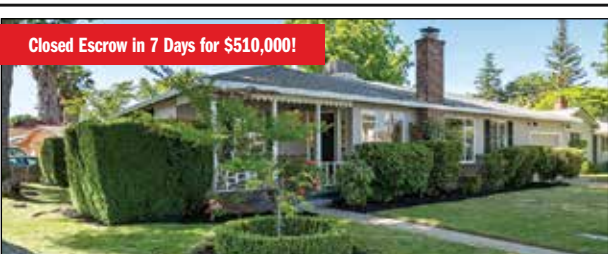

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Summer is here, and the bats are back! The maternity Mexican free-tailed bat colony under the I-80 Yolo Causeway is growing daily as they return from wherever they spent the winter. The bats return to the Causeway as the weather warms, crops grow and insect populations explode.

These amazing, winged wonders are mammals that fly. In late June each summer the females give birth to one pup. She nurses that pup for about 5 to 6 weeks and then it joins her as she flies throughout the Central Valley to consume

crop pests and mosquitos. There also are males that live in the Yolo Causeway bridge, but their groupings are smaller, so they are less noticeable.

Throughout the summer Yolo Basin Foundation offers opportunities to learn more about the bats. Registration is now open and some evenings have already sold out. This year the Bat Talk and Walk events are in a hybrid format. The Talk is virtual and the Walk is in-person. Live ambassador bats are present for up close viewing at both the Talk and the Walk.

Children who are interested in bats are encouraged to join Yolo Basin Foundation for a morning of “Bats and

Crafts.” They will meet live bats from our local area and have fun creating crafts and playing bat games. This special event is aimed at children, ages 3-8, especially those that are too young to stay up late to watch the bats fly. Parents must stay with their children.

County Releases Recommended Budget and Annual Report

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - On June 9, 2022, the Yolo County Administrator released the 2022-23 Recommended Budget and 2021-22 Annual Report. The Board of Supervisors will consider the recommended budget at a hearing on June 14, 2022, at 9 am. State law requires the Board of Supervisors to adopt a recommended budget as the County’s initial spending plan. The recommended budget serves as the County’s spending plan until September, when the Adopted budget is considered, incorporating changes to state funding and operating results from the current fiscal year.

The 2022-23 recommended budget includes total expenditures for \$667,609,455 with general purpose revenues of \$92,904,788 which represents an increase of \$4,793,859 (5.4%) from the 2021-22 adopted budget general purpose revenue. Capital expenditures are recommended at \$30,453,982. The Recommended Budget includes a total net decrease of 5.4 full-time equivalent (FTE) positions. It does so by adding 12.6 positions and refunding 1.0 position in key areas, reducing 7.0 positions, and unfunded and holding vacant 12.0 positions.

This Recommended Budget represents strong adherence to the Board’s Long-Term Financial Plan and provides for ongoing operations without requiring reductions in services. While the overall budget has grown, the 2022-23 Recommended Budget only provided for limited budget augmentations and deferred many for consideration in the September Adopted Budget, dependent on the financial outlook at that time.

Total unfunded liabilities continue to grow and be of concern. The pension liability of \$369,689,940 has continued to increase. This cost increase is due to changes in CalPERS’ assumed investment earnings and the phase in of a CalPERS change from a 30-year amortization to a 20-year amortization for payment of the unfunded liability. The retiree health liability continues to see reductions due to the ongoing efforts of the Board-approved prefunding plan, with the most recent 2020 actuarial study showing an unfunded

liability of \$65,180,000. This is down from \$153,091,000 in 2014, and an updated actuarial study will be completed for 2022. The road maintenance liability of \$477,000,000 has yet to be addressed. However, SB 1 has substantively strengthened road maintenance investment in the county, and the board has directed staff to explore possible additional revenue mechanisms.

“These continue to be unprecedented times for Yolo County. The pandemic generated significant economic disruption and initially created significant fiscal uncertainty. The subsequent recovery and significant economic stimulus have caused increasing cost inflation and workforce challenges that face the County along with the rest of the nation. The County budget thus strikes a measured tone recognizing that inflationary pressures are now creating a situation where larger forces such as the Federal Reserve are working to cool the economy through increased interest rates,” said Interim County Administrator Chad Rinde. “The County is susceptible to a downturn because it has a significant dependence on property and sales tax that are crucially linked to the broader economy, and the County’s cost structure is not always able to adapt quickly to changes. Thus, the County budget continues to invest strategically given that revenue is not growing in many areas at the same pace as costs and prepare for the next wave of economic challenges that will inevitably arise.”

Of note, the County has separately developed a plan for the \$42.8 million of American Rescue Plan (ARP) funds. That funding, to the extent it is unspent, will carry forward to the 2022-23 fiscal year, and the process will continue to allocate and make project level decisions for that significant funding to respond and recover from the COVID-19 pandemic. These funds are available for use and can be expended between March 2021 and December 2024.

Placer Native Among 5 Marines Killed in Aircraft Crash

Community Garden Now Bearing Fruit

GLAMIS, CA (MPG) - Five United States Marines tragically died in an aircraft crash Wednesday, June 8, in Glamis, California, during what was supposed to be a routine training session.

One of the five victims was identified as Capt. John J. Sax, 33, of Placer, California. The other four victims were: Cpl. Nathan E. Carlson, 21, of Winnebago, Illinois, a Tiltrotor Crew Chief. Capt. Nicholas P. Losapio, 31, of Rockingham, New Hampshire, an MV-22B Pilot. Cpl. Seth D. Rasmuson, 21, of Johnson, Wyoming, a Tiltrotor Crew Chief. Lance Cpl. Evan A. Strickland, 19, of Valencia, New Mexico, a Tiltrotor Crew Chief.

John Sax graduated from Granite Bay High School and went on to become a MV-22B Pilot for the Marines. John Sax is the son of West Sacramento native and five-time MLB All-Star, Steve Sax.

"It is with complete devastation that I announce that my precious son, Johnny, was one of the five US Marines that perished on Wednesday, June 8, in the Osprey Military crash near San Diego," Steve Sax said in a statement published Saturday by CBSLA-TV. "For those of you that knew Johnny, you saw his huge smile, bright light, his love for his family, the Marines, the joy of flying airplanes and defending our country!"

Steve Sax said when

his son John was a boy, he dreamed of being a pilot and would get distracted by planes flying overhead during his Little League baseball games.

"There was never any doubt from a young age that Johnny would be a pilot and his passion was to fly!" Steve Sax said in a statement. "This loss will change my life forever and is a loss to not only the Marines but this world!"

"It is with heavy hearts that we mourn the loss of five Marines from the Purple Fox family" said Lt. Col. John C. Miller, Commanding Officer of VMM-364, in a news release. "This is an extremely difficult time for VMM-364 and it is hard to express the impact that this loss has had on our squadron and its families.

"Our primary mission now is taking care of the family members of our fallen Marines and we respectfully request privacy for their families as they navigate this difficult time. We appreciate all the prayers and support from the strong extended Purple Fox family and want them to know that more

information will be forthcoming on how to help."

The five Marines were based at Marine Corps Air Station Camp Pendleton, CA, and were flying on a MV-22B Osprey aircraft at the time of the crash. All five were assigned to the Marine Medium Tiltrotor (VMM) Squadron 364, Marine Aircraft Group (MAG) 39, 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing (MAW), according to a news release from the Marines.

At the time of the mishap according to the Marines, the MV-22B Osprey and crew were conducting routine flight training and that the cause of the crash is under investigation. The crash occurred in Imperial County which is about 115 miles east of San Diego and about 50 miles from Yuma, Arizona.

John Sax served in the Marines for five years and eight months. He was awarded with the National Defense Service Medal, Global War on Terrorism Service Medal and Letter of Appreciation. John Sax is survived by his 20-month-old daughter and his wife Amber, who is pregnant with their second child. ★

which launched in 2018. The green thumb and organizing force behind the garden is current Team Member TeeJay who was recruited to DST by Brookens in 2018. Thanks to Brookens's intervention and DST, TeeJay moved indoors and is still on her recovery journey. She often claims DST has been her salvation and the garden is her sanctuary. She now leads a team of two to four DST Team Members in caring for the garden. For TeeJay, the Brookens Community Garden is a space of comfort and her legacy to the community. The site of the garden — the Roadway Inn — was converted from a motel to a residence for people experiencing homelessness under the California Homekey program in 2020. Its 40 rooms host 65 residents and since its conversion has supported 765 residents.

The lettuce harvested this week is destined for a salad to be served as a part of a free lunch provided by The West Sacramento Mercy Coalition, a local non-profit that provides life skills seminars along with free meals to the residents of

The Roadway Inn. The four raised beds of the garden are planted with cucumbers, tomatoes, peppers, cantaloupes, and other melons. Going forward, the garden's bounty will supplement The Roadway Inn's walk-up food service, which provides raw and prepared foods to the homeless community.

The Mel Brookens Community Garden, like all gardens, is a work in progress. For people interested in supporting this project, the garden is in need of mulch, trellis material, grill, and picnic tables and chairs.

Downtown Streets Team began in 2005 and currently operates in 16 cities in the Bay Area and Central California. The mission of DST is to build Teams that restore dignity, inspire hope, and provide a pathway to recover from homelessness. Teams are comprised of unhoused neighbors and those at risk of experiencing homelessness. Team Members receive access to case management, system navigation, and employment placement services from trained DST Case Managers and Employment Specialists. Team Members engaging in community beautification and clean-up projects challenge common negative perceptions of homelessness. Team members have removed more than 15 million gallons of debris from streets, parks and public spaces. Public Defender’s ‘For the Defenders of Tomorrow’ Event

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - The Yolo County Public Defender’s Office’s Racial Justice Committee announces the inaugural ‘For the Defenders of Tomorrow’ event on July 22, 2022. At this day-long event, Yolo County youths will be able to meet with Public Defender attorneys and staff to learn more about legal proceedings, advocacy, and public service. This opportunity is open to high school students or recent graduates, Brown Issues ambassadors, and gap-year or Woodland Community College students.

‘For the Defenders of Tomorrow’ participants will be introduced to different positions and teams at the Public Defender’s Office, including attorneys, paralegals, investigators, social workers, client advocates, and support staff who will share insight into their profession and how they came to it. In addition to observing in-person court

proceedings, participants will attend presentations such as “How to Become a Lawyer” and “Know Your Rights.” At the concluding panel discussion, participants will be highly encouraged to share their perspectives regarding how the Public Defender’s Office can improve its representation and better partner with Yolo County residents and communities.

“The idea for this event was born out of a meeting with Brown Issues Ambassadors after our office had a field trip to Taller Arte de Nuevo Amanecer (TANA) in Woodland,” remarks Chief Mitigation Specialist and Racial Justice Committee member Emily Kochly, “We recognize the need to not only foster an interest in the criminal legal system in our youth but also hear from them about what impacts they see the criminal legal system has on their community.”

Another member of the Racial Justice Committee, Deputy Public Defender James Bradford, credits

Brown Issues Ambassadors in the development of the For the Defenders of Tomorrow event. “The problems facing our communities of color are profound and persistent,” he explains, “The efforts of the Brown Issues Ambassadors to counter the dehumanizing aspects of the justice system and undo misconceptions that continue to pervade societal thinking about crime in these communities, especially amongst the youth, is nothing less than inspiring.”

Now, the Public Defender’s Office hopes to continue this important work through this inaugural event and, hopefully, inspire Yolo County youths to consider their role, as change-makers, in the criminal legal system.

Yolo County Justice Partners Apply for Grant Funding

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - The Yolo County District Attorney’s office, the Health and Human Services Agency (HHS), Public Defender, and Probation will seek state funding to add additional diversion options by developing and expanding the County’s current mental health and drug treatment programs.

There will be two projects proposed, one administered by the DA and the other by HHS. Funding received will be prioritized for involved treatment providers.

The State’s Grant Funding provides for Mental Health Services, Substance Use Disorder

Treatment, and Diversion Programs for People in the Criminal Justice System. The impactful and innovative Steps to Success program in Yolo County, which operated from 2018 to 2021, was also funded by this grant.

As part of the proposal process, the DA and partner agencies will hold public meetings to share project ideas and receive input from community members and consumers regarding areas of need and preferred approaches for addressing the issues of substance use and mental health. These meetings will be held virtually and will be open to the public. Dates and information on how to participate will be announced soon.

Additionally, members

will be solicited for a diverse Local Advisory Committee composed of various stakeholders, community partners, consumers, and other interested parties. This body will advise the Lead Agency on identifying and prioritizing needs, strategies, programs and/or services to address those needs, and development and ongoing implementation of the grant project. Committee meetings will be publicly announced and open to the public.

Voters in S.F. and L.A. Voice their Disgust

It may be tempting to make too much of what happened Tuesday in California’s two most prominent cities, San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Right-wing media are screaming that the overwhelming recall of San Francisco’s uber-progressive district attorney, Chesa Boudin, and businessman Rick Caruso’s top finish in a field of 12 candidates for mayor bodes well for a Republican comeback in this deep blue state.

That’s not going to happen.

However, it’s also tempting to make too little of Tuesday’s voting patterns in those two cities. Progressives rationalize Boudin’s ouster and Caruso’s strong finish as attempts by the Trumpian right to seize control. In fact Boudin tried, and failed, to make that case to his city’s voters.

Rather, both outcomes reflect legitimate concerns by voters, including those who consider themselves to be left-of-center Democrats, that the quality of life in both cities has deteriorated and that their elected leaders have failed to recognize and confront that fact.

Deterioration is especially stark in San Francisco with rampant drug use that

is taking a heavy toll on human life, squalid camps of the homeless dominating city sidewalks and a wave of burglaries and smash-and-grab robberies that goes unpunished.

Writer Nellie Bowles vividly captures the San Francisco crisis and why ordinarily progressive San Franciscans became disgusted in a lengthy article that Atlantic magazine published today.

“They did it because (Boudin) didn’t seem to care that he was making the citizens of our city miserable in service of an ideology that made sense everywhere but in reality,” Bowles wrote. “It’s not just about Boudin, though. There is a sense that, on everything from housing to schools, San Francisco has lost the plot – that progressive leaders here have been LARPing left-wing values instead of working to create a livable city. And many San Franciscans have had enough.”

Bowles noted that Boudin’s recall was foretold by the recall of San Francisco school board members who were preoccupied with symbolic acts of political correctness, such as changing the names on school buildings while ignoring the effects of school closures due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

“I used to tell myself that San Francisco’s politics were wacky but the city was trying – really trying – to be good,” she wrote. “But the reality is that with the smartest minds and so much money and the very best of intentions, San Francisco became a cruel city. It became so dogmatically progressive that maintaining

the purity of the politics required accepting – or at least ignoring – devastating results.”

Boudin himself came close to acknowledging why he lost, albeit with a tinge of rationalization, telling the San Francisco Chronicle, “Voters were not given an opportunity to choose between criminal justice reform and something else. They were given an opportunity to voice their frustrations and their outrage and they took that opportunity.”

What about Los Angeles?

It has suffered from the same chronic problems that plague San Francisco and a political leadership that has been equally ineffective in dealing with them. Caruso, a very wealthy shopping center developer, tapped into widespread frustration, particularly about crime, in a deluge of self-financed media ads.

Los Angeles’ notoriously low voter turnout also helped Caruso garner more than 40% of Tuesday’s vote, topping Congresswoman Karen Bass, the candidate of the city’s Democratic leadership, by several points.

However, with neither getting a majority, they are headed for a runoff in the November election, when turnout will be higher. That will be a truer test of whether Angelenos are ready for the change that Republican-turned-Democrat Caruso promises but Bass and her supporters shouldn’t ignore the quality-of-life backlash.

In addition, Yolo County Library provides TumbleBook Library for all Yolo County public schools. In Tumblebook Library, kids can safely browse and read books by their favorite authors. All books are instantly available, with no need to place a hold or check out. Schools can provide

Tumblebook Library on their own website.

Patrons of all ages can access Yolo County Library's wide selection of popular digital eBooks and eAudiobooks for free using the Libby app. Yolo County Library's robust collection offers eBooks and eAudiobooks, including bestsellers and new releases. Libby can be used on any major device or computer, including Apple, Android, Chromebook, and "send to Kindle" (U.S. only).

The Sora app is available for Washington Unified School District and Winters Joint Unified School District students to download through the Apple App Store and Google Play Store, and on Chromebooks that support the Google Play Store. It is also available for use in web browsers at <https://soraapp.com> on any computer.

Yolo BDOG Nonprofits Raise 22% More in 2022

Yolo Community Foundation News Release

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On May 5, the Big Day of Giving, Yolo County-based nonprofits had a very big day, raising \$1.83 million. The Big Day of Giving (BDOG) is a region-wide giving event, hosted by the Sacramento Region Community Foundation; more than 700 nonprofits from the Metro Sacramento region participated, including 103 based in Yolo County.

This Big Day of Giving, the 103 Yolo County-based nonprofits participating raised \$1.83 million, a 22% increase over the \$1.5 million raised by the 98 Yolo-based participants in 2021. Donors living in Yolo County made over 7,300 credit card donations, with an average donation of \$125 and a median donation of \$50. (All figures are preliminary, as the BDOG data continues to be analyzed.)

Yolo Food Bank topped the region wide BDOG leaderboard. Its executive director, Michael Bisch, emphasized the importance role BDOG plays in building a regional culture of philanthropy that benefits all local nonprofits: “Yolo Food Bank is humbled by the outpouring of support to charitable causes throughout the region from compassionate donors during this record-breaking Big Day of Giving. This outcome offers a tremendous opportunity to reframe the way we all

view philanthropy – the pie just got larger for everyone.”

Jayne Williams is executive director of All Leaders Must Serve, a Woodland-based nonprofit that works on job readiness with youth ages 15-25. She emphasized the important role that matching gifts can play in a BDOG campaign; more than a third of Yolo County participants had matching gifts this year. Said Williams, “This was our first year where a supporter offered a match. We set our goal higher than usual and got there - but it was the match that ignited the enthusiasm and confidence of our Board and staff.”

Several local nonprofits participated in BDOG for the first time in 2022, including the West Sacramento Foundation, an all-volunteer organization that makes grants to small nonprofits serving West Sacramento. Board member Chris White spoke about the organization’s experience: “As a first-time participant in Big Day of Giving...and a small group of volunteers...we benefited from the training, mentorship, and toolkits that helped us to be successful. Dividing tasks and responsibilities helped us to hit all the Big DOG milestones and to surpass our \$22,500 goal. The funds fill our grant pool and will help dozens of nonprofits fulfill their goals.”

The Yolo Community Foundation (YCF) worked to engage local donors to support local nonprofits on

BDOG, as part of its mission to inspire and support giving and provide philanthropic leadership in Yolo County. According to YCF executive director Jessica Hubbard, “Two years into the pandemic, Yolo nonprofits remains hard at work. In light of stock market declines, inflation, and ongoing COVID waves, they need our support now more than ever, so they can continue to serve our neighbors most in need. WINTERS, CA (MPG) - On June 4th, 66 volunteers picked up 353 pounds of trash and recyclables as part of a clean-up at Lake Berryessa to celebrate World Environment Day.

Community members were excited to do their part to clean up the lake, which is the seventh largest reservoir in California. It is a critical source of irrigation water for growers in the region and a major source of drinking water.

Volunteers gathered at Lake Solano County Park afterwards for a picnic lunch. Other activities at the park included making wildflower seed packets to take home for planting and taking photos with Bilgee, a costumed mascot that looks like a used oil-absorbent pillow that boaters use to prevent oil from leaking into the lake.

World Environment Day, led by the United Nations Environment Programme since 1973, is held every year to build global and political awareness of environmental issues while supporting individual and community projects around the world.

Solano Resource Conservation District hosted this World Environment Day event, with generous support from Anheuser-Busch in Fairfield, the Bureau of Reclamation, Lake Berryessa Watershed Partnership, River Network, Solano County Department of Resource Management, Solano County Water Agency, and Volunteer Solano. Additional support for this year’s event was provided by Solano County Parks and 95.3 KUIIC.

City Enacts Stage 2 Water Shortage Restrictions

City of West Sacramento

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On May 24th, 2022, the State Water Resources Control Board adopted Emergency Regulation 2022-0018, directing all water agencies to enact Stage 2 Water Shortage Contingency Plans on June 10th, 2022, in response to the ongoing drought.

As required by this regulation, and as authorized by West Sacramento’s Urban Water Management Plan, the City is declaring a Stage 2 Water Shortage while asking for up to 20% mandatory reduction of water use in the City. Customers are requested to take the following steps to reduce consumption which includes only watering three days per week.

Exemptions for drip irrigation, container plants and new landscapes; No watering between 10:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.; Fix leaks or faulty sprinklers within 7 days; Sweep sidewalks and driveways instead of using a hose; Restaurants should serve water only upon request; Use a pool cover.

How is the City helping?

Free Water Wise House Calls to help you find leaks and set your sprinkler timer; Smart Controller Rebate, to replace your timer with one that does the scheduling for you; Free Water Portal to view your usage and sign-up for leak alerts

Take Care of Your DMV Business the Safest and Fastest Way: ONLINE

Ask the DMV – REAL ID federal enforcement date is one year away. Apply online to get a REAL ID now!

The REAL ID federal enforcement date is just one year away, beat the rush! Starting May 3, 2023, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security will require a valid passport or other federally approved identification, like a REAL ID driver's license or identification card, to board flights within the United States and access secure federal facilities like military bases. Start your online application today and get REAL ID ready in three simple steps:

1. Gather your identification documents
2. Complete your online application and upload your documents
3. Visit the DMV office to complete your REAL ID application

Visit dmv.ca.gov/realid for a complete list of acceptable documents and to begin your online application.

Q: What type of documents are required to apply for my REAL ID?

A: One original or certified proof of identity and two different printed proofs of California residency are required.

One original or certified proof of identity.*
Examples: valid passport, birth certificate, valid permanent resident card.

*If your name on your proof of identity is different from the name on your other documents you will need a legal name change document (Examples: marriage certificate, adoption papers)

Two different printed proofs of California residency
• Examples: utility bill, bank statement, insurance documents, tax return, rental or lease agreement, school documents

Q: Do I have to wait for my current license or ID to expire before I get a REAL ID?

A: No, you can apply for the REAL ID before your current driver license or ID expires! Be aware that your new REAL ID will hold the same expiration date as your current driver license or ID. Keep in mind that as the enforcement date gets closer, wait times are estimated to get longer. Don't delay and apply today to beat the rush!
