WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The West Sacramento City Council, Community leaders, Sacramento Area Bike Advocates, West Sacramento Police Department Bike Patrol and Sacramento Area Council of Governments gathered on Thursday, May 5th to celebrate the official completion of the West Capitol Avenue Safety and Rehabilitation Project. Since May is Bike Month, the group demonstrated with a short bike ride

from West Sacramento City Hall to Joey Lopes Park where there was a short ribbon cutting ceremony.

During the ceremony an update on the Sycamore Bike Trail overcrossing was given. This project is set to start this summer and will provide a critical north-south route through the heart of the City of West Sacramento over Highway 50.

Initially built in the 1950s as part of the Lincoln Highway, West Capitol Avenue was in bad shape and unsafe with potholes and faded street and bike lane striping. The project

repaired three miles of deteriorating street pavement, enhanced safety by adding bright green separated bike lanes, installed and retrofitted existing mid-block crossing and added street lighting for safer pedestrian crossings.

The project also incorporated underground improvements, including installing and replacing existing water lines along the corridor, in addition to fiberoptic cabling to improve communications. ★



New Textile Reuse and Recycling Program

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) – The Yolo County Central Landfill, located at 44090 County Road 28H in Woodland, is now accepting textiles for reuse and recycling to meet SB 1383 Green House Gas (GHG) reduction targets.

Textiles include dry clothing, clean rags/towels, bed sheets, pillowcases, and sleeping bags. Unacceptable program products are textiles that are contaminated, wet or soiled, fabric scraps, area rugs, or pillows. However, all unacceptable items may be disposed of for a fee through the landfill scale house.

According to CalRecycle, textiles are the sixth most prevalent material type in the overall disposed waste stream in California landfills. Estimates show that 95% of this material is reusable or recyclable. CalRecycle has set an ambitious goal of 75% recycling, composting, or source reduction to help decrease California's reliance on landfills, and responsibly managing textile waste is essential to this effort. These goals led Yolo County to establish this new pilot program, in partnership with I Choose Life (ICL), where nearly 100% of textiles collected at the Yolo County Central Landfill textile drop-off location will get reused or recycled.

A waste hierarchy will be followed, starting with reuse through the resale process at the ICL thrift store in Woodland, California, accounting for approximately 45% of the textiles coming through the program. With roughly 30% of textiles being wiping cloth grade and 20% fiber/thread grade, the rest of the material is sorted, baled, and transported to Los Angeles to be further processed and recycled into area rugs. This pilot program allows for items that previously did not have a home (holey socks, ripped blouses, old bath towels, etc.) to be given new life.

Textiles can be dropped off during normal landfill hours, Monday-Saturday, from 6:30 a.m.-4 p.m., and on Sundays, from 8 a.m.-4 p.m.

CHP Welcomes New Canine Teams

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Highway Patrol (CHP) announced the graduation and deployment of nine new canine teams. After months of intensive training, the CHP certified its newest members during a ceremony at the CHP Academy's Canine Training Facility.

"These nine teams are joining an already astonishing unit that serves as a vital part of the Department in protecting the public,"

said CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray. "The canines have received hundreds of hours of intense training and are ready to serve and support the mission of the CHP."

The graduates consist of eight Patrol and Narcotics Detection Canine teams and one Patrol and Explosives Detection Canine team, all of which meet the guidelines set by the Commission on Peace Officer Standards and Training. The newest team members include two Belgian Malinois, two Dutch Shepherds, and five German

Shepherds. The CHP now has a total of 53 canine teams deployed throughout the state.

Each canine's partner, or handler, is an experienced CHP officer with anywhere from three to 15 years of experience. The officers represent the CHP's eight geographic regions of Northern, Valley, Golden Gate, Central, Southern, Border, Coastal, and Inland Division. Once deployed, the handlers will spend a minimum of eight hours every week training with their canines to ensure the

highest level of peak performance by creating scenarios similar to what is experienced out in the field.

The CHP uses its canines to perform a variety of tasks, including detecting human scent, contraband, and explosives. A canine team can improve the safety and effectiveness of officers as well as save time and money. The CHP canines are also used to assist allied agencies in apprehending criminals, detecting explosives or drugs, and in locating at-risk missing persons. ★



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District Attorney Elections Coming Soon

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Elections are right around the corner and the race getting the most attention is the race for Yolo County District Attorney.

Jeff Reisig is the current DA for Yolo County. He has been a lawyer for 26 years and 16 of those years have been as the DA for Yolo County.

One reason that Reisig is most known for in West Sacramento is the Broderick Boys injunction.

“You know, I didn’t make that injunction,” Reisig said. “That was done by a judge. On top of that, there were 150 residents that came and testified for that to pass. But it has been over for 10 years.”

According to Reisig, many people have thanked him for that injunction, saying it was a big part of keeping them out of prison. In addition, once that injunction passed, the number of men arrested in West Sacramento plummeted. Many believe it’s

one of the best things that ever happened to Broderick, many still hold ill feelings about the entire thing.

Numerous programs (many of them going regional or statewide) have been created or adopted under Reisig, in the fight for justice reform. Jeff Reisig was the first prosecutor in the nation to launch a third-party hosted data transparency portal in collaboration with the National Reform Measures for Justice and a diverse community group that he formed nearly a decade ago. This group, the Multi-Cultural Community Council, demonstrates that Reisig was already working on the issue of racism and reform before the uprising of communities after George Floyd was murdered.

By offering the data transparency portal, it provides nearly unrestricted community access to the criminal justice data from the DA’s office, a chance to interact with policy makers and media. The data available has allowed Reisig to construct significant policy changes to help mitigate against racial disparities in the criminal justice system.

Reisig has also designed and implemented the “Blind Race” program in which any information that can indicate race is redacted from the police report before it is handed over to the DA’s office. This could include name, eye color, address, or any number of

details that could identify the person’s race.

“I am very tough on violent crimes and will continue to be,” Reisig said. “But I am very compassionate and fair when it comes to things like mental illness or addiction.”

Reisig has established “Mental Health Diversion” (which helps reduce recidivism) and “Addiction Intervention Court” because he is looking at simple drug possession as a public health issue and not a public safety issue.

Some additional programs Reisig has implemented are Marijuana Conviction Relief, GLIDE exploring “service” paradigm, Restorative Justice Court (neighborhood court), Hear Us Yolo (helping victims), Citizen’s Academy and the FOCUS program (Focusing on Children Under Stress).

Reisig has been the first ever to use a method that checks DNA data bank with DOJ to successfully solve cold cases. He is aggressive prosecuting human Trafficking and fentanyl poisonings. He is also working diligently to get ghost guns off the street.

According to Reisig, the main reason he should win this race is experience. He oversees 7,000 cases per year, 2,000 of them being felonies.

“Cynthia Rodriguez has never prosecuted a criminal case and as chief law enforcement officer of the county, that is imperative,” Reisig said. The position is for chief law enforcement officer for the county.” ★

Big Day of Giving Raises over \$10,000

Zalayah. Shelby and her partner had been living with extended family to share the costs of living, as they were on the brink of facing homelessness with the shortage of affordable housing in our region. The home they were living in was crowded, which can oftentimes lead to high tempers and conflict.

Recently, our Healthy Families Yolo County staff (HFYC, home visiting program), received a call from Shelby saying her small family had been kicked out of the home, and urgently needed a place to stay, or they would be sleeping in their car with 8-month-old Zalayah. HFYC was able to mobilize and secure the family a night in a motel, while also completing a direct referral to YCCA’s homeless prevention team.

While our homeless prevention team worked in tandem with the HFYC team, Shelby and her family were able to come up with a plan. The swift teamwork of HFYC and their assistance made a critical difference in keeping the family safe and sheltered. In a short time, Shelby was able to transition into permanent housing with affordable rent. Had just one resource in this story not been available, the outcome would have been severely different.

As our Program Manager for HFYC, Lana Casper, speaks to, there are so many more families at risk for similar situations, and the need for flexible resources to meet those needs continues. These flexible resources come from days like Big Day of Giving. Your dollars can literally be the difference of Shelby and Zalayah’s night in a safe space.

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UC Davis Health Clears Way for Construction on Hospital of the Future

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - UC Davis Health started clearing the way today for what will be the region's most advanced hospital tower – the UC Davis Medical Center's California Tower.

Crews started demolition of multiple temporary buildings on the site of the future tower. It's a necessary step to make the site ready for a California Tower groundbreaking in 2023 and open to patients in 2030.

The \$3.75 billion tower is a replacement for existing parts of the hospital that must be closed due to state seismic laws. Approved by the UC Board of Regents in January, the tower will be added to the eastern side of the existing UC Davis Medical Center. It will feature a 14-story hospital tower and five-story pavilion, adding to a hospital complex that has been expanding eastward and serving the neighborhoods at this location for over 150 years.

"This project incorporates lessons from the pandemic and those lessons will help us to deliver superior care for Northern Californians for the next 50 years," said David Lubarsky, CEO of UC Davis Health. "The California Tower will triple our ICU capability, making half of our patient rooms ICU-ready. This investment will be a cornerstone in the critical care we provide our patients and the region moving forward."

The new additions reflect UC Davis Health's long-time commitment to education, research, patient care and community health. They complement the health system's mission of improving health for all. The project is also the result of state seismic safety mandates, which put a deadline on hospitals to either upgrade their existing facilities or construct new buildings.

The California Tower adds to the Medical Center's existing University and Davis Towers and will add approximately one million square feet of additional space. It will include operating rooms, an imaging center, an expanded pharmacy, additional burn care units, and about 400 single-patient rooms. The new rooms will replace others being taken out of service in older parts of the building. With 646 beds currently, the UC Davis Medical Center will continue to be the largest hospital in the Sacramento area. It will have a total of 675-700 inpatient beds when the project is completed.

More than 250 of the rooms are being designed for greater flexibility in the event of a patient surge such as during a pandemic, massive wildfire, radiation leak or other major event. These adaptable rooms will easily convert into intensive-care-unit rooms with air isolation so that they could be used to care for patients of any level of hospitalization.

"As the COVID-19 pandemic has taught us, embracing the unexpected is a common theme in medicine," said Lubarsky. "Having the adaptability of patient rooms to meet a critical care surge means these new facilities will be positioned to meet the region's needs for the next 50 years."

"This project will further harness the advantage of UC Davis Medical Center being one of Sacramento County's largest employers to increase community wealth-building and strengthen our surrounding neighborhoods," said Brad Simmons, chief administrator of UC Davis Medical Center. "This project will help improve health outcomes for area residents and ensure a robust health care safety net for historically marginalized populations, especially when it comes to providing specialty care hospital services."

The California Tower project is expected to create hundreds of construction jobs and thousands of new health care positions for the surrounding community, a benefit of being home to an anchor institution like UC Davis Medical Center. Anchor institutions are place-based, mission-driven entities like universities and hospitals that leverage economic power alongside human and intellectual resources to improve the long-term health and social welfare of surrounding communities. ★

Villar Wins PCL Player of the Week

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Sacramento River Cats infielder David Villar was named PCL Player of the Week after his impressive showing at the El Paso Chihuahuas from May 9-15.

The Giants' 11th round pick out of South Florida in 2018 went 8-for-20 (.400) with nine runs, two doubles, four home runs, 10 RBIs, five walks, and a 1.620 OPS in six games against the Chihuahuas.

Villar ignited the River Cats' 10-9 comeback victory on May 11 with a fifth-inning grand slam and a go-ahead 10th inning home run. He followed that up with home runs the next two days.

The award is Villar's first in his debut Triple-A season. The 25-year-old was

named an MiLB.com Organization All-Star and Team MVP for Double-A Richmond last year.

Villar leads the PCL with 12 home runs and his 36 RBIs are tied for the lead with El Paso infielder Aderlin Rodriguez. He also ranks inside the top-10 in the league with a .426 on-base percentage (sixth), .690 slugging percentage (third), 1.116 OPS (second), 19 walks, (sixth), and 27 runs (third).

This is the first weekly award for a River Cats player in 2022. They totaled five in 2021 with current River Cats outfielder Bryce Johnson (May 4-9) and infielder Jason Vosler (June 28-July 4) being two of the winners.

Fans can catch Villar and the River Cats for a 12-game homestand, starting on Tuesday, May 17 against the reigning PCL Champion Tacoma Rainiers. Tickets are available on rivercats.com. ★



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Guilty Verdicts in the Murders of Enrique Rios and Elijah Moore

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - On May 11, 2022, a Yolo County jury returned guilty verdicts in the case of People v. Chandale Shannon (age 25), of Winters and Jesus Campos (age 22), of Woodland, bringing a conclusion to six years of investigation and litigation.

The jury convicted Shannon of two counts of first-degree murder for victims Enrique Rios and Elijah Moore, and also kidnapping, and special circumstances of multiple murders and kidnapping during the course of a murder. Campos was convicted of second-degree murder of Enrique Rios, first degree murder of Elijah Moore, kidnapping, and special circumstances of multiple murders and kidnapping during the course of a murder. Both men face a potential sentence of up to life without the possibility of parole.

The jury heard evidence that on October 17, 2016, 16-year-old Elijah Moore robbed David Froste, Chandale Shannon, and Jesus Campos of three ounces of marijuana. David Froste contacted his brother, Jonathan Froste, telling him about the robbery and indicated that he was going to get his gun from their mutual home in Knights Landing. Chandale Shannon and Jesus Campos heard the phone call, which was recorded on Jonathan Froste's cell phone, and later obtained by investigators.

After getting his gun, David Froste, Shannon, and Campos returned to Woodland and met with Jonathan Froste. David Froste informed the others he wanted to find Moore and exact revenge. Mr. Shannon suggested they reach out to Enrique Rios, age 16, who was a friend of Moore's. Knowing David Froste wanted to kill Moore, Shannon communicated with Rios, who, unaware of what Moore had done, provided an address in Esparto.

Cell phone tower and location data showed David Froste, Shannon, and Campos traveled to Esparto and a witness saw Rios being picked up in a car matching the description of a vehicle owned by Shannon. Rios was friends with both Shannon and Campos but not David Froste. A short time later, David Froste, Shannon, and Campos turned off their phones. The following day, David Froste and Shannon told Jonathan Froste that Rios was taken to a secluded area near Knights Landing.

Rios refused to call or provide a location for his friend Moore. David Froste shot and murdered Rios.

Several weeks later on November 4, 2016, Campos, in a vehicle with David and Jonathan Froste, pointed out Moore who was leaving a barber shop near Main Street in Woodland. Moore was forced into the trunk of the vehicle. The three then traveled to pick up Shannon, who had the gun used to kill Rios. The four defendants traveled again to Knights Landing. Moore was forced out of the vehicle at gun point. Shannon initially had the firearm and held Moore at gunpoint. Moore was forced to the ground and his hands were zip tied behind his back. The four defendants marched Moore to a more secluded area. Moore's ankles were also bound at this point and David Froste and Campos left the group to obtain shovels, a pickaxe, gasoline, and bleach. Moore was told he was going to die.

Jonathan Froste and Shannon took turns holding the gun while Moore begged to call his mother and to let him go. Both requests were denied. When David Froste and Campos returned an hour later with the tools, David Froste selected a baseball bat sized branch and violently struck Moore in the head. Jonathan Froste, Shannon, and Campos each took turns striking Moore in the head. David Froste then selected a large log and dropped it on Moore's head, crushing his skull. All four defendants then proceeded to dig a hole to bury Moore's body. Moore's body was placed in the hole and lit Moore's body on fire. The flames were too high and the four defendants doused the flames with dirt. Bleach was also poured on Moore's body.

After covering Moore's body with dirt and vegetation, the four defendants left, burned their own blood covered clothing, and threw the tools used to clean up into the river at the drawbridge in Knights Landing.

Shortly after each Rios and Moore went missing, their parents contacted law enforcement. This proved to be the beginning of massive investigation. The Yolo County Sheriff's Department and Woodland Police Department began a comprehensive investigation that lasted until June of 2018. Numerous other agencies also assisted. Multiple search warrants obtaining cell tower records, Facebook records, and Google location data obtained thousands of pages of records. Detective Mat Jameson

of the Woodland Police Department and Sgt. Lech Garcia of the Yolo County Sheriff's Office coordinated and led the investigation which involved numerous detectives, officers, and crime scene analysts from both the Woodland Police Department and the Yolo County Sheriff's Office.

Those who provided assistance included the FBI, archeologists and anthropologists from Chico State University, Sutter County Sheriff's Office, numerous search and rescue volunteers, cadaver dogs, PG&E, the GIS office of Yolo County, and experts in ground radar and missing body location. All four murderers, David Froste, Jonathan Froste, Chandale Shannon, and Jesus Campos were arrested in June of 2018 after an extensive investigation.

Jonathan Froste elected to cooperate with the Yolo County District Attorney's Office. He attempted to locate Moore and Rios' bodies. While ultimately unsuccessful, Jonathan Froste agreed to provide truthful information regarding the two murders and pled to second degree murder. He testified against his brother David Froste and against Shannon and Campos. Jonathan Froste's sentencing is currently pending. He will be sentenced to 15-years-to-life in state prison.

District Attorneys Jay Linden and Kyle Hasapes organized the massive amount of evidence and records to prepare for the trial of David Froste, which took place in the Fall of 2018. David Froste was convicted and sentenced to Life without the Possibility of Parole. His conviction was recently affirmed by the California Third District Court of Appeals.

With both Mr. Hasapes and Mr. Linden leaving the office, Deputy District Attorney David Wilson was assigned to prosecute and try Shannon and Campos. With the assistance of Det. Mat Jameson and Sgt. Lech Garcia, numerous witnesses and complex legal theories were presented during the trial. This included cell phone tower data, Google location data, Facebook records, and numerous witnesses in order to provide as much information as possible to the jury. The evidence presented clearly demonstrated that Shannon and Campos conspired with and aided David Froste in committing horrible crimes. After four weeks of trial, the jury returned the guilty verdicts. ★

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Newsom’s Electric Car Nirvana Collides with Reality

Gov. Gavin Newsom and the California Air Resources Board publicly boasted last week about making great strides toward eliminating fossil fuels and their greenhouse gases.

The board released “a draft plan that, when final, will guide the state’s transition to a clean energy economy, drastically reduce the use of fossil fuels, achieve carbon neutrality by 2045 or sooner, and significantly clean the state’s air especially in disadvantaged communities disproportionately burdened by persistent pollution.”

Much of the plan is concentrated on transportation — particularly cars and trucks — which is the largest single emitter of carbon dioxide and other pollutants.

“That means rapidly moving to zero-emission transportation, electrifying the cars, buses, trains, and trucks that now constitute California’s single largest source of planet-warming pollution,” ARB said.

Newsom, meanwhile, crowed that with new state subsidies, sales of battery-powered zero-emission vehicles (ZEVs) have exceeded 16% of all new vehicle sales so far this year, more than double the proportion in 2020. He also noted that Californians make

half of nationwide purchases of electric vehicles.

“Our state is on the frontlines of extreme weather, and we’re taking aggressive steps to protect Californians from the costs of climate change — transitioning away from the big polluters fueling this crisis and towards clean energy,” Newsom said. “These incentives make it easier and cheaper to make that transition.”

This year’s increase in electric car sales was, no doubt, spurred in part by a steep hike in gasoline prices, as well as subsidies — which poses an interesting dichotomy. Newsom has decried those fuel price spikes and wants the state to offset them with payments to motorists, which would reduce some of their motivation to buy electric cars.

Moreover, were California to eventually ban sales of gasoline- and diesel-powered vehicles and go 100% ZEVs, as Newsom also advocates, charging their batteries would impose immense new burdens on an electric power grid that’s already strained to meet demand.

By happenstance, as Newsom and the air board were issuing their upbeat messages about the shift, a financial data website, Forbes Advisor, was revealing that California has one of the nation’s worst records on providing recharging sites for ZEV owners.

Its study, drawn from U.S. Department of Energy data and numbers from all 50 states, found that North Dakota is the nation’s most ZEV-friendly state with one charging station for every 3.18 electric vehicles.

Wyoming, Rhode Island,

Maine and West Virginia round out the top five.

And California? It has the fourth highest ratio, just one station for every 31.2 ZEVs. New Jersey is the least accommodating to ZEV owners, with one station for every 46.16 electric vehicles.

Okay, so California is lacking when it comes to infrastructure needed to support the ZEV nirvana that Newsom and the ARB envision, both in terms of electrical power supply and sites to connect that power to electric cars.

However, the situation may actually be worse.

Again by happenstance, last week brought us evidence that not only is California failing to provide enough ZEV charging stations, but those it does have often don’t work.

David Rempel, a retired professor of bioengineering from UC Berkeley, and a team of volunteers tested 181 public Bay Area charging stations with 657 plug-in kiosks and found 73% in working order but 23% had inoperable screens, payment failures or broken connector cables and in 5% cables were too short to reach vehicles recharging inlets.

California’s muchvaunted shift to electric cars may turn out to be one of the state government’s many high-concept programs that become managerial disasters, another Department of Motor Vehicles or Employment Development Department.

The Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC) Lead-Acid Battery Recycling Facility Investigation and Cleanup (LABRIC) Program hereby provides this Public Notice of the initiation of the investigation and site evaluation of the area at, and around, the former **C&S Battery and Lead Company (C&S Battery) at 860 Riske Lane, West Sacramento, CA 95691**. The DTSC LABRIC Program has determined that the area qualifies for investigation and site evaluation under the Lead-Acid Battery Recycling Act of 2016 (Act). C&S Battery is a “lead-acid battery recycling facility” as defined in the Act. Beginning in 1952, Morris P Kirk & Son, Inc., and later its subsidiary, Smelter Supply Co., operated at what is now the C&S Battery site. C&S Battery operated at this location from 1973 through 1978. 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River City baseball season ends with first round exit

Raiders bounced from D1 Playoffs by Vacaville

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The River City High School varsity baseball team lost to Vacaville on Tuesday, May 10, in the 2022 CIF Sac-Joaquin Section Division I Baseball Playoffs, subsequently ending the Raiders' season.

No. 8 seeded River City (21-7, 10-2 Metropolitan Conference) lost to the No. 9 Bulldogs (15-15, 8-7 Monticello Empire League) by a score of 8-2. The game was much closer than the final score entailed. Vacaville led 1-0 after six innings in what seemed to be a pitcher's duel initially.

However, in the top of the seventh inning, the Bulldogs pretty much ended the Raiders' hopes for a long postseason run by scoring seven times to take a commanding lead. River City responded with two runs in the bottom half of the inning, but it was not nearly enough as Vacaville won 8-2.

The Bulldogs were led to the win offensively by junior outfielder Lawrence Westbrook who recorded three hits, one run batted in and one run scored in four at bats. Fellow junior, first baseman Nathan Schnell, was the only other Vacaville player to record multiple hits as he had two. The Bulldogs out-hit the Raiders 11-6 and neither team committed an error. Vacaville senior pitcher Aidan


Russell earned the win by tossing five scoreless innings and allowing four hits and four walks while striking out two batters on 79 pitches. River City senior pitcher Freddy Rodriguez suffered the loss after pitching 6 2/3 innings and giving up nine hits, three earned runs, two hit batters, two walks and one stolen base allowed with 10 Ks on 111 pitches.

Junior J.J. Torrente was the only Raider to have multiple hits. The 5-foot-4 outfielder tallied two hits, one RBI, one stolen base, one sacrifice bunt and one walk in four plate appearances.

Vacaville was eliminated from the playoffs two days later in the quarterfinals following a 7-4 loss at No. 1 seed Franklin of Elk Grove.

One highlight from this season is from March 7 to April 22, the Raiders won 16 out of 18 games, including nine in a row from March 30 to April 22. River City's two losses came in non-league games against Rancho Cotate of Rohnert Park on March 12 and Rio Americano on March 29.

Six of the 17 River City players are seniors. The following players are in the Class of 2022 and will be graduating this month: Pitcher Justin Andreotti, catcher Lucca Talani, right-handed pitchers Rodriguez and Riley Stevens, shortstop Lance Sabatke and outfielder Diego Gonzales. ★



LAS VEGAS, NV (MPG) - Each April, football players from around the world have their dreams realized and shattered over the course of three stressful days known simply as the National Football League (NFL) Draft.

The 2022 NFL Draft was held April 28-30 in Las Vegas, Nevada as several Northern California hopefuls anxiously awaited through 262 picks for their names to be called. The Sacramento region only had one player fulfill his dream of hearing his name called this year. However, the Northern California region had six prominent players agree to terms on professional contracts as undrafted free agents.

Cornerback DaRon Bland out of Fresno State heard his name called on the draft's final day and was selected with the 167th pick by the Dallas Cowboys. Bland played high school football in Modesto at Central Catholic before committing to play collegiately for Sacramento State beginning in 2017. Bland recorded 92 tackles (26 assisted), three interceptions, two forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and one sack in 30 games played over three years with the Hornets.

Bland shined as a junior at Sac State, earning first team All-Big Sky Conference honors as a defensive back and the Hornets' Outstanding Defensive Back Award. Following the pinnacle of his Hornets career, Bland transferred south to Fresno State where his brother, Keane, previously had run track.

In one season with the Bulldogs, Bland had at least one tackle in every game and tallied 45 total (11 assisted) in 13

games which ranked fifth on the team, second among all defensive backs and first among all cornerbacks. Bland also had five pass break ups, two interceptions, one tackle for loss, one forced fumble and one quarterback hit.

The 6-foot-2 Modesto native's play on a bigger stage going from the NCAA Division I Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) to the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) impressed the Cowboys enough for them to spend a fifth-round pick on him rather than risk attempting to sign him as an undrafted free agent.

For those who are not fortunate enough to hear their names called, the final pick of the draft isn't necessarily the end of the road. Each year, many undrafted players are signed as free agents from teams around the NFL, Canadian Football League (CFL) and now even the recently resurrected United State Football League (USFL) immediately after the draft concludes.

One of the first NorCal natives to sign with an NFL team as an undrafted free agent was tight end Stone Smartt from Old Dominion University. The Sacramento native who played high school ball at Del Oro in Loomis agreed to a deal with the Los Angeles Chargers.

Smartt is a versatile player that offers L.A. flexibility, similar to New Orleans Saints' do-it-all Swiss army knife type player, Taysom Hill. The 6-foot-4 Smartt spent the first half of his college career as a quarterback before converting into a wide receiver. With his weight at 232 pounds and given height, Smartt could become a formidable tight end in the NFL.

The next tight end from Northern California to sign an

NFL contract was Tucker Fisk who played at Davis Senior High School before going on to play in the PAC-12 Conference at Stanford. Fisk, who split time in college between tight end, defensive end and special teams, reached an agreement with the Atlanta Falcons.

The 6-foot-4 Davis native could provide flexibility for Atlanta given his ability to play on all sides of the ball. Fisk earned the Jack Huston Award in 2021, which "goes to the player exemplifying aggressiveness, exceptional performance and unheralded efforts."

Tucker has followed the same path as his dad, Jason, who played football at Davis and Stanford before moving on to the NFL. Jason Fisk was a seventh-round pick of the Minnesota Vikings in the 1995 NFL Draft. The Davis native played defensive tackle for five teams during his 12-year career, recording 386 tackles, 19 sacks, four forced fumbles and three interceptions. Tucker will now attempt to top his father's accolades in the league.

Joining Fisk in Georgia was another Davis product, except this 309-pound rusher played collegiately for the Aggies. Bryce Rodgers was a defensive lineman at UC Davis for five seasons dating back to 2016, earning All-Big Sky second team honors during his senior season in 2021. Rodgers led the Aggies defensive linemen in tackles with 18 (10 assisted) while adding two sacks, two quarterback hurries, one forced fumble and one blocked kick.

Fisk and Rodgers may be teammates for the first time, but they may already have several mutual friends and acquaintances after each played football in Davis and Palo Alto. Fisk

started in Davis before moving to Palo Alto. Rodgers did the opposite growing up in East Palo Alto before migrating to Davis.

Rodgers was not the only former Aggie agreeing to terms with a National Football Conference (NFC) South division team, as punter Daniel Whelan signed with the Saints. Whelan currently holds the UC Davis record for longest punt average (44.01 yards) in a career and a single season average record (46.25) that he achieved in 2021.

The Irish All-American is "arguably the greatest punter in Aggie history," according to UC Davis Athletics. Whelan earned All-America first team honors from four organizations in 2021: Stats Perform, AFCA, HERO Sports and Phil Steele. The 6-foot-6 Irishman was also named to the All-Big Sky Conference first team and a finalist for FCS Punter of the Year after the shortened 2021 spring season.

Whelan will be competing with third-year punter Blake Gillikin for the starting job. Gilikin is ranked second all-time in career punting average (43.03) at Penn State. However, Whelan's average in college was nearly one full yard longer, which may have led to the Saints organization deciding to sign him.

Rodgers and Whelan were not the only former Aggies to agree to terms with a professional football team. Offensive lineman Kooper Richardson, who spent his first four collegiate seasons at UC Davis, signed with the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the CFL. Richardson was adaptable for the Aggies splitting time at tackle, guard and center.

Before coming to UC Davis,

Richardson played at Folsom High School for his dad, Kris, who was the Bulldogs' coach until 2019 when he became the assistant head coach and offensive line coach at Sac State. Richardson played two more seasons for the Aggies but ultimately deciding to transfer to Sac State to play for his dad again in his final year of eligibility. The 6-foot-5, 295-pound lineman earned All-Big Sky second team honors in 2021.

In a draft that was widely considered to be "weak" when it came to quarterbacks, Vacaville native Carson Strong expected to hear his name as one of the 262 called, but the moment never arrived. Strong, who attended Vacaville High School, was not drafted due to medical concerns over his knee according to the NFL Network. Strong agreed to terms with the Philadelphia Eagles who, if Strong stays healthy, could have gotten a steal of a prospect.

The 6-foot-4 Strong started for three seasons at the University of Nevada, Reno where he completed 852 of 1,252 (68%) attempts for 9,368 yards and 74 touchdowns in 31 total games. In 2021, Strong earned Mountain West Conference Offensive Player of the Year honors after tossing 366 of 523 (70%) passes for 4,175 yards and 36 touchdowns.

Two players from Sacramento to keep an eye on who were expecting to be signed but have not yet been are Grant Union High School alumni, center Orlando Umana and safety TieNeal Martin. Umana played collegiately at The University of Utah and Ole Miss. Martin began his college career at Yuba College before transferring to the University of Tulsa. ★

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
