**WOODLAND, CA (MPG)** - The Yolo County CalFresh Healthy Living Team and CommuniCare invite Yolo County residents to Rethink Your Drink Day at CommuniCare health centers countywide on May 11. Rethink Your Drink Day is a part of a statewide movement to inspire Californians to "refresh better" by choosing water instead of sugary drinks.

Free infused waters will be available for sampling, along with recipes to make your own infused water and resource guides for tracking the amount of sugar in popular beverages. At these events, you will learn: How to make simple and healthy fruit and herb infused waters for different flavor cravings – herbal, sweet, tangy, and tropical; How to make an Origami Flavor Finder – a fun folded paper game for children that promotes naturally-flavored waters; How to use the Beverage Breakdown – a digital tool to help you determine how much added sugar is in your family's drinks and positive changes you can make to be healthier.

The free Rethink Your Drink Day events will take place outdoors in front of the lobbies, and all are welcome to attend one or more of the events at the following locations and times:

CommuniCare Salud Clinic in West Sacramento, from 9:30-11am; CommuniCare Davis Community Clinic in Davis, from 1-2:30 pm; Hansen Family Health Center in Woodland, from 3-4:30 pm.

The Rethink Your Drink Program is a public health initiative led by the California Department of Public Health and administered by local health departments. The program's primary goals are to educate Californians about healthy drink options, help identify drinks with added sugar, like soda and fruit juice, and make the link between consumption of sugar-sweetened drinks and health risks. In this way, the program hopes to shift consumption toward healthier and more affordable beverages like water.

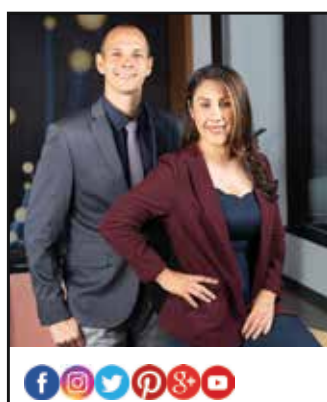

other conventional means of lifting the car. The quick-thinking officers located some 4x4 wood posts lying in a yard nearby. They used several of the posts and worked together to create a fulcrum point to raise the car from the front and side, just enough to allow two other good Samaritans to pull the man free. As the man was pulled free, one of the posts actually broke in half.

Once removed from under the car, the man slowly came back, only screaming at first. West Sacramento Fire Department arrived on scene and began to treat the man as he screamed in pain. The ambulance arrived and took the man to the hospital. By the time they were loading him up, the man was fully conscious. If it weren't for the quick thinking and ingenuity displayed by our officers, the man would likely have died. The shift Sergeant stated, "It was a truly humbling and proud moment to see these guys come together and save this man's life." For their heroic efforts we present these 4 Officers with the Lifesaving Medal.

### LIFE SAVING AWARD Mark Sawyer

While working in the office at the Rodeway, a program participant ran to the office to tell Mark that a visitor was non-responsive in the doorway. Mark immediately ran over as office staff called 9-1-1; he checked for a pulse but couldn't find one, the individual was however still warm. Noticing drug paraphernalia nearby, Mark deduced that there had likely been a drug overdose. He located at Narcan and delivered two doses with no response. He was able to request an additional Narcan and delivered two additional doses with slight movement after. He delivered a fifth dose of Narcan as paramedics arrived. Paramedics were able to deliver a sixth dose of Narcan which she responded to. Paramedics confirmed that she had in fact overdosed, and the Narcan she received saved her life. The individual has since made a full recovery. For your quick thinking and ingenuity, you are presented with the Life Saving Medal!

### LIFE SAVING AWARD Ofc. Cody Coulter, Ofc. Scott Farnsworth, Ofc. Jesus Gonzalez, Ofc. Seth Killion

On December 11th, 2021, Officers Coulter, Farnsworth, Killion, and Gonzalez were dispatched to a residence regarding a frantic woman who called 911 and screamed for help. Officers received further information that a vehicle had fallen off stands and trapped the owner who was working underneath the car. Officers Coulter, Farnsworth, Killion and Gonzalez all responded code-3 and arrived before fire and AMR personnel. When the Officers arrived on scene they could only see the person's feet and shins as his whole body was underneath the sedan. The man was no longer conscious and responding. His head was pinned under the exhaust and the car was on his chest.

## COMMANDING OFFICER'S CITATION K-9 Ofc. Matt Montez, Det. Nvard Avagyan

In February of 2021, Officer Matt Montez responded to a report of a battery. He contacted the victim who reported an extensive domestic violence situation to include strangulation, felony domestic violence, and credible death threats. Officer Montez established rapport with the victim and obtained a detailed initial statement, conducted extensive follow-up at the victim's residence and obtained photographs and evidence to include a spent cartridge casing. He also obtained an emergency protective order for the victim. Later, Officer Montez also worked with the victim to collect vital digital evidence in the case.

Detective Avagyan was later assigned the case to conduct follow-up as requested by the Yolo County District Attorney's Office. She obtained detailed witness statements from multiple different witnesses that provided substantial information relevant to the case. Detective Avagyan authored search warrants to obtain necessary evidence from cell phone involved in this case and conducted an analysis of the phones contents which revealed additional significant evidence.

Based on the extensive work conducted by Officer Montez and Detective Avagyan. The suspect received 25 years and 4 months in State Prison. Based on the hard

work of these two officers, this victim was protected and will remain safe, while the suspect remains in custody.

For their performance Officer Matt Montez and Detective Nvard Avagyan are awarded the Commanding Officer's Citation.

# Spare the Air Season Underway

**Sac Metro Air District News Release**

**SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG)** - The Sacramento Metropolitan Air Quality Management District (Sac Metro Air District) and the air districts of the Sacramento region launched the 28th annual Spare the Air season on Sunday, May 1.

The region's Spare the Air program runs each year from May 1 through Oct. 31, and a Spare the Air alert is issued when the Air Quality Index (AQI) for ground-level ozone pollution is forecast to meet or exceed 126, rendering air quality unhealthy for sensitive groups. Air pollution affects everyone. Even healthy people can experience health impacts from polluted air, including respiratory irritation or breathing difficulties during exercise or outdoor activities. In addition to its harmful health

effects, air pollution impacts businesses, the economy, and the environment.

Small changes can make a big difference in our community. During the past two years, the Sacramento region saw a vast improvement in air quality. Residents of Sacramento, Placer, Yolo, Solano, and El Dorado counties are encouraged to consider teleworking, taking transit, driving a low or zero emission vehicle, or using other active transportation options such as walking, biking, or riding a scooter when possible. By making individual efforts to reduce air pollution, we can come together as a community to make a much larger impact on air quality in our region and combat climate change.

Please follow these tips to continue to improve the region's air quality: Download the free

Sacramento Region Air Quality app to view daily air quality forecasts and real-time air pollution readings for Sacramento, Placer, Yolo-Solano and El Dorado counties. Drive less to help reduce vehicle emissions, especially on a Spare the Air Day.

Telework at least once per week, if possible. Use active transportation, such as riding a bike, walking, or taking a scooter for your errands, or as a way to commute to work. Take public transit or carpool to reduce the number of single-passenger vehicles on the road. Use a zero-emission hybrid or electric vehicle.

# Criminal Justice Partners Shine during 'Second Chance Month'

**WOODLAND, CA (MPG)** - At the May 4, 2021, Board of Supervisors meeting, Board Chair, Supervisor Jim Provenza delivered a Resolution declaring "Second Chance Month" in Yolo County. Supervisor Provenza hailed its justice partners and stated they "have made great strides in giving people in the criminal justice system a second chance." The Resolution recognized many programs offered in Yolo County offering individuals a second chance.

Yolo County followed President Joseph Biden, who proclaimed April "Second Chance Month." The Proclamation stated a need for America's criminal justice system to offer meaningful opportunities for redemption and rehabilitation. Biden stated, "It means providing quality job training and educational opportunities during incarceration to prepare individuals for the 21st Century economy. And it means reinvesting the savings from reduced incarceration into reentry programs and social services that prevent recidivism and leave us all better off."

"The criminal justice system in Yolo County is unique. When I talk with my colleagues across the state, they are amazed at the many programs we offer to give individuals in the system a second chance," said Board Chair, Supervisor Angel Barajas. "And it's not uncommon for their District Attorneys, Public Defenders, and Probation Chiefs to contact us to learn about our successes."

Yolo County's criminal justice partners have shined during this year's Second Chance Month. Interim County Administrator Chad Rinde shared praise for the collaborative relationship of the criminal justice partner agencies in Yolo County. "I am grateful for how the Public Defender, District Attorney, Probation Department, and Health and Human Services agency work together, collaborate on programs to best serve our community and resolve problems when they arrive. In other counties, these agencies adopt a preference of competing rather than collaborating, typically with poor outcomes. In Yolo, while there are challenge moments, they all share the same goal of keeping the public safe while also using the many tools at their disposal to give people a second chance."

The District Attorney's office has a Restorative Justice diversion program called the Restorative Justice Partnership (formerly Neighborhood Court), where misdemeanors and felonies are handled by volunteers and participants, and those arrested for crimes end up with no convictions and are given a second chance.

The Probation Department, in partnership with the District Attorney and Public Defender offices, provides a variety of youth diversion programs, including the RESTORE program, which focuses on

addressing racial disparities, minimizing the number of youth entering the juvenile justice system, and addressing the root causes of youths' behavior by increasing access to services for youth and their families, as well as Juvenile Review Boards for youth to engage in a restorative process determined by the community member board, to give them a second chance.

The District Attorney's office now views drug possession violations as a public health issue, rather than a public safety issue, and is working in partnership with the Yolo County Health and Human Services Agency to divert individuals into treatment.

The Public Defender, Probation Department, Health and Human Services Agency, District Attorney, and the Court have partnered and collaborated to give individuals suffering from serious mental illness and/or substance use disorders a second chance in Addiction Intervention Court, Mental Health Court, and the newly started Mental Health Diversion program by offering these individuals holistic treatment, rather than jail. Hundreds of individuals living with a substance use disorder and/or mental illness get second chances in Yolo County.

The Public Defender's office operates an innovative Record Mitigation and Community Reintegration Clinic, which provides legal representation to individuals seeking expungement and other post-conviction remedies to clear up criminal records after completion of probation or a custodial sentence, thereby removing barriers to economic stability and a return to crime. The District Attorney's office has partnered and collaborated with the Public Defender's office, as well as private attorneys, to modify older convictions suffered by non-citizens to avoid immigration consequences and possible deportation, thereby reducing the likelihood of deportation for these individuals.

The District Attorney and Public Defender offices have partnered and collaborated and utilized a new law, the first in the country, which allows prosecuting agencies to facilitate the release of incarcerated people where "further confinement is not in the interest of justice," and the Public Defender's office has been instrumental in helping facilitate the reduction of prison sentences so these individuals can have a second chance. On April 13, 2022, the District Attorney used this law the request that the judge modify the 15-year prison sentence of Kaitlin Vaughn. Vaughn was released on April 13, 2022, after serving five years of her sentence. Vaughn was the 11th person released early and the first female. On the day she was released, Vaughn told the judge, "I just wanted to say thank you for having me today and thank you for giving me a chance. It means the world to me, and I will not, I will not, I promise, I will not, let you down."

# California Comment on the Small-Business Inflation Are Exacerbating the Crisis

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - The release of a special survey on inflation conducted by the nation's largest and leading small-business association highlights a huge 'Made in California' problem, according to the state director for the association that conducted the sampling.

"Inflation is devastating small businesses across the nation, and energy prices are an outsized culprit," said John Kabateck, California state director for the National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB), which took the survey of its small-business-owning membership.

"Although there are many national factors contributing to soaring inflation rates, states can either help alleviate the problem or exacerbate it, and California is exacerbating the problem in a huge way with the energy policies it has put in place," said Kabateck.

Kabateck pointed to a

recent NFIB California podcast interview with Catherine Reheis-Boyd for some of the reasons why. On the podcast, the president and CEO of the Western States Petroleum Association says: "We can actually produce crude oil in a low carbon intensity way. Why would we not want to do that?" One reason we don't is California's singular way of having policies that not only harm its economy but also hamper its own environmental goals.

"We produce only 30% of the crude we need. Could we produce more? You bet we could produce more. If we don't produce more, it just means more foreign imports, which increases greenhouse gases, loses jobs, loses tax revenue for the state. There is no logical reason why you would not want to produce more crude oil in California versus importing it.

"Oil is not the enemy. Emissions are the enemy."

Selected Highlights from the Inflation Survey

More than half (62%) of small-business owners reported inflation having a substantial impact on their business; 31% said it was having a moderate impact.

Nearly all (99%) of small-business owners reported the recent increase in gas and fuel prices is having some degree of negative impact on their business.

More than three-quarters (77%) of small employers reported rising fuel costs (gasoline, diesel, fuel oil, etc.) was a substantial contributor to higher costs.

Eighty-six percent of small employers are increasing the price of the goods or services. Thirty-one percent of small employers are taking on debt to finance higher costs.

From Holly Wade, Executive Director of NFIB's Research Center

"Inflation is a new challenge for most small business owners. Inflation has reached levels not seen for the last 40 years and is dominating business decisions for small employers across the country. Small business owners have been adjusting business practices in order to compensate for inflation pressures resulting from supply chain disruptions, staffing shortages, and rising gas prices."

Starting immediately, you and your spouse or domestic partner are restrained from:

- removing the minor children of the parties from the state or applying for a new or replacement passport for those minor children without the prior written consent of the other party or an order of the court;
- cashing, borrowing against, canceling, transferring, disposing of, or changing the beneficiaries of any insurance or other coverage, including life, health automobile, and disability, held for the benefit of the parties and their minor children;
- transferring, encumbering, hypothecating, concealing, or in any way disposing of any property, real or personal, whether community, quasi-community, or separate, without the written consent of the other party or an order of the court, except in the usual course of business or for the necessities of life; and
- creating a nonprobate transfer or modifying a nonprobate transfer in a manner that affects the disposition of property subject to the transfer, without the written consent of the other party or an order of the court. # Investing in New KidsVaxGrant

**CDPH Press Release**

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - In an effort to expand COVID-19 vaccine access for youth, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) is offering \$10 million in grant funding through the newly launched KidsVaxGrant. This makes healthcare providers enrolled in the state's Vaccines for Children (VFC) program eligible to receive funding of up to \$25,000 per site to expand operating hours.

"Vaccines are the most powerful tool we have to protect our

children and our communities from the dangers of COVID-19," said Secretary of the California Health and Human Services Agency, Dr. Mark Ghaly. "This grant program will make COVID-19 vaccines more accessible to children and their families by recruiting new providers and supporting existing providers by expanding operating hours. As a father and a pediatrician, I assure you COVID-19 vaccines are safe and effective. Please make an appointment to get your family vaccinated today."

Since its inception in 1995, the

state's VFC Program has played an essential role in vaccinating youth by supplying providers with vaccines for children at no additional cost to parents or guardians who may be unable to afford them. The state aims to increase access to the COVID-19 vaccine by recruiting additional providers into the California COVID-19 Vaccination Program and by helping providers expand their operating hours to make vaccinations more convenient for families. Longer hours CDPH has contracted with Physicians for a Healthy California to

administer the KidsVaxGrant program statewide.

Newly enrolled VFC providers that are part of the California COVID-19 Vaccination Program could be eligible for \$10,000 in KidVaxGrant funds per site to establish COVID-19 vaccination services. VFC providers already enrolled are also eligible to apply and could be awarded \$15,000 grant per site. The deadline to apply is May 27, 2022.

To be considered, providers must expand their operating hours. Expanding the capacity of providers to open their doors

beyond normal business hours allows for additional vaccination options for working families. Operating hours must be increased by a minimum of 15 hours outside of standard operating hours during a 60-day period.

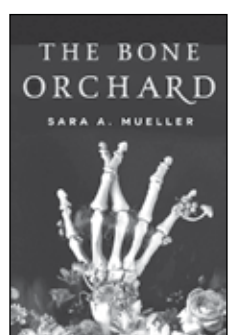
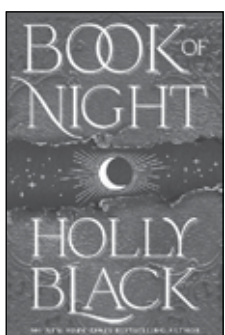

As a low-level con artist trying to change her life as a bartender, Charlie learned just enough art of manipulation to get by. Then a figure from her past returns, tearing everything apart. As Charlie's future straddles existent and non-existent, she will have to make some dark decisions to keep those she loves safe, which will ultimately throw her into a tumult uproar of murder, secrets, and hidden agenda's where everyone's sights are on controlling the shadows.

Holly Black takes readers on a dark, mysterious, and magical ride where innermost thoughts and fears are woven into a spine-tingling story. Black masterfully forces readers to imagine a world where shadows hold a unique power and influence and can be used to propel a person

into fame and fortune. Yet, these shadows also hide dark and gritty secrets, holding the key to your deepest desires, and for a fee, can be cosmetically altered, manipulated, changed, and even stolen. This chilling thought delivers the backdrop of a story bound to fly off bookstore shelves and keep readers afraid of the shadows that always lurk just out of reach.

### The Bone Orchard

by Sara A. Mueller; Tor Books

Charm spends her days confined in a garden of Orchard House, where trees are grown from bones, and the marrow holds the darkest of secrets. As the last necromancer, Charm tends the garden, as well as to the boneghosts that she grew from the orchard. As the madam of the house, Charm is also the mistress to the Emperor, and when she is called to his deathbed, Charm is finally given a chance at freedom, but at a cost. Now, Charm is charged with the heavy burden to uncover who is responsible for the murder of the Emperor she despises, or vengeance for herself and the ghosts she tends and lose her chance at freedom.

Sara Mueller delivers a powerful story built on beautiful worldbuilding and complex characters. With the heavy weight of multiple agendas combined with politics, mystery, and fantasy elements, *The Bone Orchard* delivers on all levels. While this story does depict many sensitive issues and triggers, this plot takes a powerful turn opening the door for reflection and discussion for any book club. ★

# Criminal Reform Bill

## Office of Yolo County District Attorney

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - On April 19, 2022, two significant criminal justice bills drafted by the Yolo County District Attorney passed the first hurdle on their way to becoming laws.

AB 2778 and AB 2418 both proposed groundbreaking changes to criminal justice and were scheduled for hearings in the California Assembly Public Safety Committee. AB 2778, authored by Assemblymember Kevin McCarty and co-sponsored, as well as drafted, by the Yolo County District Attorney and Attorney General Rob Bonta, seeks to require the California Department of Justice to establish and implement a "Race Blind Charging" system that all prosecutors must implement by January 2025. Specifically, the process would require a review of a case where the race of the suspect, victim, or witness has been removed. The Yolo County District Attorney launched its first-of-its-kind Race Blind Charging program on August 31, 2021. The Stanford Computational Policy Lab (SCPL) designed a computer program specifically for DA Reisig's office that automatically redacts information in police reports that identify an individual's race. Attorney General Bonta met with DA Reisig in January and the pair decided to seek an author in the legislature to take the program to all DAs in the state. On April 19th, the bill passed through Assembly Public Safety "on consent," which means no

opposition was voiced to the bill in that committee. AB 2418, authored by Assemblymember Ash Kalra, is co-sponsored, and was also drafted by the Yolo County District Attorney. In recent years, the Yolo County District Attorney's Office began publishing all of its prosecution data to constituents in the interests of transparency and to foster robust conversations regarding criminal justice reform. To that end, Yolo DA partnered with the non-profit Measures for Justice (MFJ) to develop an interactive "dashboard" populated with Yolo criminal justice data called Commons. This dashboard is the first in the nation where the data is independently verified by a third party - MFJ. Yolo DA has already used data from Commons to focus priorities and drive policy change. After a meeting with Attorney General Bonta, Assemblymember Kalra was contacted to author and carry a bill which would require prosecutors statewide, under the guidance of the Attorney General, to gather and provide multiple data points to the Attorney General concerning the prosecution of cases. At the hearing on Tuesday, DA Reisig and

Yoel Haile of the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) spoke in favor of the bill. The bill was sponsored by ACLU, Yolo County District Attorney, Prosecutor's Alliance and San Francisco County District Attorney. The bill was also supported by ACLU California Action, the California Public Defenders Association, and the Center on Juvenile and Criminal Justice. The bill passed through the committee with no opposition and five Aye votes.

Assemblymember Kalra thanked DA Reisig for his leadership, stating "this has already been a gamechanger." DA Reisig stressed the importance of the bill to criminal justice transparency. "Our data is the people's data. Publicizing this data, including the good, the bad, and the ugly, will foster the conversations necessary to tackle our most challenging criminal justice issues." In describing the drafting of the bill, DA Reisig said, "this has been such a fulfilling journey with input and support from the Attorney General, the ACLU, and the Public Defenders Association. I look forward to AB 2418 moving to the Assembly floor." ★

# Extreme Heat Action Plan Announced

Office of Gov. Gavin Newsom

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Amid intensifying climate impacts, Gov. Gavin Newsom announced Thursday, April 28 that the state has released an Extreme Heat Action Plan outlining a strategic and comprehensive set of state actions to adapt and strengthen resilience to extreme heat.

The announcement comes on the heels of a heat wave earlier this month in Long Beach that reached a high of 101°F, nine degrees hotter than the record high in April 2014.

“Extreme heat driven by climate change endangers the lives and livelihoods of Californians in every corner of our state, and threatens our vital natural systems,” said Governor Newsom. “The Extreme Heat Action Plan is a critical part of California’s commitment to strengthening community resilience and will guide partnerships and investments in equitable solutions to protect all Californians.”

Projections from the state’s best climate science forecast that all of California will be impacted in the years and decades to come by higher average temperatures and more frequent and life-threatening heat waves, impacting public health and safety, economic prosperity, and communities and natural systems – with profoundly disproportionate consequences for the most vulnerable Californians. Extreme heat ranks amongst the deadliest of all climate change hazards, with structural inequities playing a significant role in the capacity of individuals, workers, and communities to protect and adapt to its effects.

In partnership with the Legislature, Governor Newsom advanced an \$800 million package in last year’s budget to protect California’s communities from heat. The package includes \$300 million to support implementation of the Extreme Heat Action Plan

and numerous other investments that protect communities, the economy, and natural systems from extreme heat. The Governor is proposing to allocate this additional funding in the 2022-23 budget to support the implementation of the Extreme Heat Action Plan.

Governor Newsom has put forward a historic \$37.6 billion climate package – more than what most other countries are spending – to protect all Californians from the costs and impacts of climate change, while accelerating efforts to reduce the dependence on big polluters and fossil fuels.

With the launch of the Extreme Heat Action Plan, the Newsom Administration is announcing an all-of-government approach to address extreme heat across four action areas:

**Building Public Awareness and Notification:** The Administration will prioritize the needs of high-risk California communities most impacted by extreme heat by increasing access to timely and appropriate information and resources that can help them stay safer. The most impacted groups include people experiencing housing insecurity, outdoor workers, older adults, young children, and people with existing health conditions. Additionally, the public awareness effort includes actions to equip communities, governments, and tribes with easily accessible data.

**Strengthening Community Services and Response:** The burden of extreme heat falls disproportionately on rural and disadvantaged communities and California Native American tribes. The community services and response effort include a suite of actions that reduce heat exposure, build communities’ capacity to respond to heat events, support local climate adaptation planning and implementation, and advance heat illness prevention standards for indoor

and outdoor workers.

**Increasing Resilience of the Built Environment:** As temperatures increase and heat waves become more frequent and severe, the cascading impacts of extreme heat on infrastructure and the environment exacerbate risks to people, the economy, and the natural environment. The built environment track includes actions to protect critical energy, transportation, and other infrastructure, support heat-resilient communities through relevant regulations and codes, and scale weatherization and cooling technologies.

**Utilizing Nature-Based Solutions:** Nature-based solutions deliver multiple benefits, including addressing extreme heat by cooling communities, providing strategic shade, and regulating temperature of buildings and surfaces during extreme heat events. This track includes actions to promote nature-based solutions to reduce extreme heat risks, support nature’s ability to withstand and adapt to increasing temperatures and reduce heat risk to water supply and systems.

The content and organization of the plan was guided by extensive public input, including listening sessions and regional workshops, as well as consultations with California Native American tribes. Stakeholder input highlighted the need for the Extreme Heat Action Plan to drive coordination and collaboration across federal, regional, and local efforts, support localized action through funding and technical assistance, and maximize multi-benefit strategies that advance the state’s climate and public health goals.

Implementation progress of the Extreme Heat Action Plan will be tracked through the California Climate Adaptation Strategy’s annual reporting process to advance California’s all-of-government approach to climate adaptation. ★

**SACRAMENTO COUPLE CHARGED WITH ROBBERY, CRIMINAL THREATS AND RETAIL THEFT CRIMES THAT OCCURRED IN WEST SACRAMENTO** - On March 22, 2022, Sierra Stommel, age 36, and Allen Wright, age 28, were arraigned in Yolo County Superior

Court and pled not guilty on multiple charges including robbery and retail theft. Both are from Sacramento.

The two were arrested by the West Sacramento Police Department on March 17, 2022, on suspicion of robbery and criminal threats at a liquor store in West Sacramento. At the time of the arrest the pair were suspects in retail thefts from Lowe’s in West Sacramento occurring on December 27, 2021, and January 8, 2022. The Yolo County District Attorney’s Office filed a criminal complaint on March 21, 2022, alleging organized retail theft from both dates as well as robbery and two counts of criminal threats from the March 17, 2022, incident. Stommel was also charged with an enhancement for being armed with a deadly weapon during the commission of the robbery and threats, and Wright is further charged with an enhancement for a prior strike offense.

Stommel and Wright are scheduled for a Preliminary Hearing on April 6, 2022. Both remain in custody with bail set in the amount of \$60,000 for Stommel and \$100,000 for Wright. ★

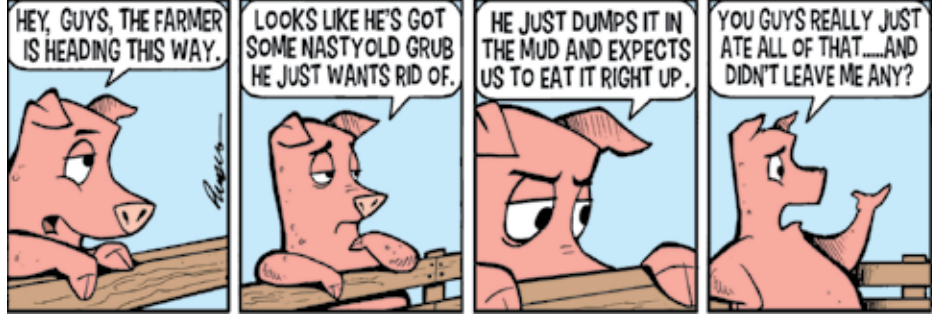

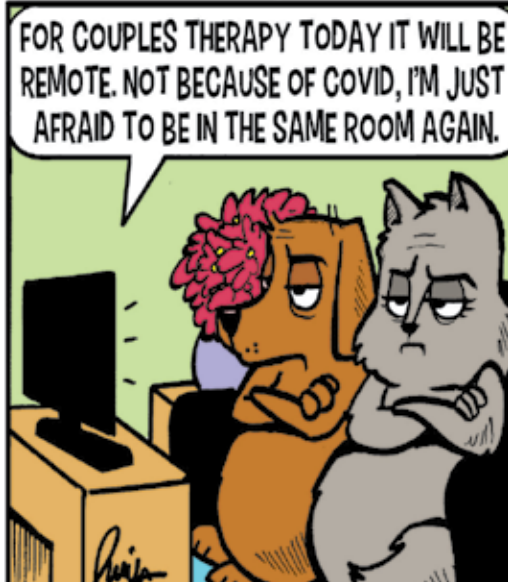

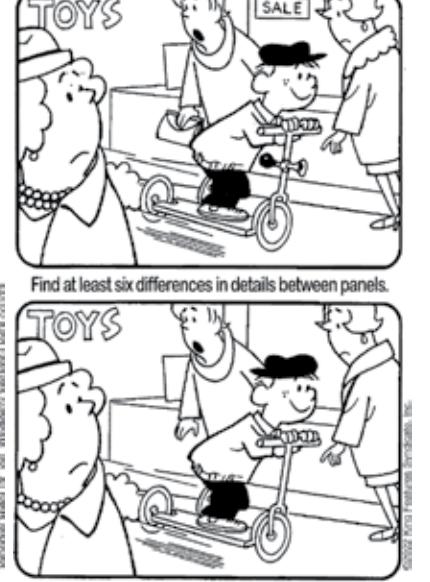
