

## **Rescinds COVID Order**

**Yolo County** Special Release

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) -

The Yolo County Public Health Officer has rescinded the Mass Quarantine Order (PDF). Effective immediately, persons who have been in close contact with someone infected with COVID-19 and have no symptoms are no longer required to quarantine after their exposure, regardless of their vaccination status, unless they live or work in a high-risk setting. The change in local requirements comes one day after the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) ended its quarantine recommendation for the general public. Exposed persons should still get tested for COVID-19 3-5 days after an exposure and wear a mask around others for 10 days, but can continue to work, go to school, and participate in normal activities as long as they have no symptoms.

Quarantine restricts the movement of individuals who came in close contact with someone who tested positive. The Mass Isolation Order (PDF) remains in effect for persons who have tested positive.

"I am rescinding the local Quarantine Order in order to reduce confusion created by having different guidance at the local and State levels," said Public Health Officer Dr. Aimee Sisson. "The change recognizes that COVID-19 pandemic continues to evolve, with transmission levels decreasing and safe, effective vaccines available."

As the incubation period of circulating variants of the SARS-CoV-2 virus has grown shorter (now averaging 2-3 days), quarantine has become less useful. with many exposed persons receiving notification of an exposure after their incubation period ended.

CDPH quarantine instructions continue to recommend quarantine for employee and resident close contacts in certain high-risk settings where transmission risk is high and the populations served are at increased risk of severe COVID-19 disease. These settings include homeless and emergency shelters, healthcare settings, correctional facilities, and long-term care facilities.

# Health Week Focused on Equity and Investments

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California's local public health officials, county governments, frontline workers, and community advocates marked National Public Health Week on April 4th to April 10th with a call to action, urging Governor Newsom and the State Legislature to support their Public Health Equity Readiness and Opportunity (PublicHERO) Initiative.

Sponsored by the California Can't Wait Coalition (CACantWait), the PublicHERO Initiative builds on their budget proposal from last year that the Governor proposed for investments as part of this year's budget: \$300M in ongoing annual investment to rebuild our decimated public health workforce and infrastructure.

The PublicHERO Initiative targets new, one-time investments to develop the future public health lab directors, epidemiologists, microbiologists, nurses, and public health professionals needed to address health inequities and protect Californians from rising rates of STDs, diabetes, tuberculosis, and chronic diseases.

"While public health has long operated out of sight, COVID-19 has demonstrated that functions like epidemiology, disease investigation, vaccinations and outreach to underserved communities are what keeps our communities in times of crisis," said Michelle Gibbons, Executive Director of the County Health Executives Association of California.

"We have all learned an unfortunate lesson: a decade and more of disinvestment in our core public health services left too many lives exposed to COVID-19. California must rebuild our pipeline of public health workers to be ready for the next crisis - whether from another COVID-19 variant or other serious threats like the rapid spread of STDs, rising rates of syphilis, or health risks from diabetes and other chronic diseases," said Gibbons.

National Public Health Week was an

annual celebration of the life-saving role local public health plays in local communities. Last year, CACantWait and legislative champions negotiated an agreement to fund public health \$300M annually as part of this year's budget. Governor Newsom upheld that promise as part of his proposed state budget, but CACantWait and legislative leaders continue to call for additional one-time investments to shore up their workforce to be prepared for the next public health crisis.

"We don't know precisely when the next crisis will strike, which is why we continue to urge support for our PublicHERO Initiative so local public health departments have the highly educated, skilled and trained workers ready to respond, whether it comes in the form of flood, earthquake, bioterrorism or the extremeweather driven by climate change," said Gibbons.

In an opinion piece published in *CalMatters* and the *San Jose Mercury News*, Senator Dr. Richard Pan and Assembly Member Cecilia Aguiar-Curry echoed their calls for PublicHERO investments, writing:

"There are jurisdictions with shuttered public health laboratories, closed for want of being able to hire a skilled lab director. Our corps of public health nurses – certified registered nurses who go into communities to promote health and prevent disease and disability – has been dangerously thinned. Epidemiologists who investigate patterns and causes of disease are unavailable," wrote Senator Dr. Richard Pan and Assembly Member Cecilia Aguiar-Curry.

The County Health Executives Association of California is a statewide organization of county and city Health Department and Agency Directors, who are responsible for the administration, oversight, and delivery of a broad range of local public health and indigent health care services. Members represent a variety of administrative and health professional disciplines.

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - In recognition of National Farm Workers Day, Yolo County and CommuniCare Health Center's Mobile Medicine Team announce their commitment to providing much needed access to healthcare to migrant farmworkers and seasonal agricultural workers. Services at migrant work centers countywide will begin on April 12 and go through November 1, 2022.

The team will visit farmworkers in Davis on the second Tuesday of the month, Madison on the third Tuesday of the month, and Dixon on the fourth Tuesday of the month. Clinics will be held from 4 to 8 pm, with a one-hour break for mass.

"Farmworkers are a key and critical part of our local ag economy. We are observing National Farm Worker Day by celebrating our mobile medicine program that serves the health needs of our local farmworker community. It is a perfect complement to our continuing efforts to maintain and improve migrant housing centers in Yolo and Solano counties," Chairman, Yolo County Housing Authority, Supervisor Gary Sandy. "Farmworkers labor very hard, under the most challenging of circumstances, to provide food for our tables. Our ongoing efforts to improve their healthcare and housing are vitally important to serving this vital population responsibly and humanely."

Migrant and seasonal agricultural workers are at especially high risk for health

issues due to the physically demanding and intensive nature of their work. They are susceptible to heat-related illnesses, infectious diseases due to substandard living conditions, respiratory issues via exposure to pesticides and chemicals, and injuries from machinery, livestock or pests.

Additionally, migrant workers and their families can experience mental health challenges or addiction, which can be influenced by the cumulative effect of constant relocation, poverty, and stress. Establishing and keeping healthcare providers, staying consistent with treatment plans and keeping track of health records is also difficult given the migratory culture of this population.

"By meeting farm workers where they work and live, the Mobile Medicine Team brings equity in accessing healthcare services that may not otherwise be sought," Program Coordinator Anisa Vallejo. "It is through years of hard work and collaboration that we're able to get to this point and we are grateful for our partners who believed in the same idea of serving the County's seasonal migrant workers community."

CommuniCare Health Center's Mobile Medicine Team offers some solutions in the face of these challenges. As both a Federally Qualified Health Center and Migrant Health Center, CommuniCare Health Centers has provided services to migrant farmworkers in Yolo County for decades. The addition of the Mobile Medicine Team reduces barriers to assessing health care, such as lack of transportation or fear of using healthcare due to immigration status.

Staff includes a medical team that provides treatment for chronic disease, acute conditions, wounds, and other health related issues. In addition, a dental team provides dental services, a behavioral health team of clinicians, peer advocates, and Promotores that offer support for substance use disorder, mental health services, educational information, and resources.

The Mobile Medicine Team services are possible through community benefit investments from Sutter Health, Dignity Health, and the Woodland Clinic Medical Group. HHSA is providing the equipment and the new outfitted van. CommuniCare Health Centers are providing staffing and operational support. Over \$1 million has been invested in caring for Yolo County's most vulnerable residents.

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# **Governor's Executive Order Changes Groundwater Well Permit Process**

Yolo County Release

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On March 28, 2022, Governor Newsom issued a new Executive Order (EO N-7-22) to address drought conditions, following the driest first three months of a calendar year in the state's recorded history. The EO is effective immediately and orders various state agencies to consider new regulations for various components of the state's drought response. The EO also contains a new regulation that changes the process for the County's issuance of permits for new agricultural groundwater wells. The EO excludes domestic wells, which typically serve single-family homes.

high-priority groundwater basin, with the Executive Order creating a new review process for the issuance of permits for wells in medium and high-priority groundwater basins. Thus, Counties may not issue a permit for new agricultural groundwater well or alteration of an existing agricultural well without a written verification from the affected Groundwater Sustainability Agency (e.g., the Yolo Subbasin Groundwater Sustainability Agency). The written verification must attest that the proposed groundwater well is both (1) not likely to interfere with the production and functioning of existing nearby wells and

Yolo County is a (2) not likely to cause subsidence, i.e., the caving or sinking of land that lowers the ground surface elevation.

The County's Division of Environmental Health is working with the Yolo Subbasin Groundwater Sustainability Agency to establish and implement a review process that is compliant with the Executive Order. As a result, expect to be a temporary 15- to 30-day delay in the processing and issuance of agricultural groundwater well permits. Additional updates will be provided as needed.

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Cache Creek Canyon Regional Park is located approximately 6 miles north of the town of Rumsey along State Highway 16, providing over 600 acres of natural wilderness. The Regional Park is divided into three use areas: the Cache Creek Upper Park Site, the Cache Creek Middle Campground Park Site, and the Cache Creek Lower Park Site. The three park use areas offer a range of activities such as white-water rafting, rural hiking, kayaking, fishing, and nature walks.

Starting Friday, April 1st, 2022, Cache Creek Canyon Regional Park reopens all its 45 campground sites and 4 group sites. Back in April of 2020, when the Yolo County Shelter in Place Order came out, all Yolo County parks closed. Despite parks reopening in May of 2020, Cache Creek Campground remained closed. With high restrictions, the campground reopened some of its sites in late June of 2020.

In August of 2020, the campground had to, once again, fully shut down, due to the LNU fires, and it remained closed until late September of 2020. But then closed for the season only a few days later.

For the camping season of 2021, Cache Creek Campground opened its doors, but once again with limited sites, no group sites and high restrictions.

Today, Supervisor Barajas, residents, & county staff helped open the doors to the 2022 camping season that will be open from April 1st to October 10th with no restrictions

## McCarty's Drug Treatment Bill **Passes Health Committee**

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) -On March 29, 2022, California Assembly Member Kevin McCarty's drug treatment bill passed through the Assembly Health Committee with no opposition votes.

McCarty authored AB 1928 in partnership with Yolo County District Attorney Jeff Reisig and Yolo County Supervisor Gary Sandy. AB 1928 would allow the counties of Yolo, Santa Clara, and San Joaquin to develop a secured treatment facility for individuals who are criminally justice involved and who live with substance use disorders. Those eligible for the treatment program would include people who have committed drug motivated felonies that, absent this program, would result in them serving time in jail or prison. Those who commit misdemeanors, simple drug possession, sex offenses, and strike offenses would not be eligible. Those eligible would be assessed by treatment providers who would determine the level and length of treatment. Individuals found suitable for the program would be given a choice of serving their sentence in prison or entering the secured facility where they would receive treatment to help them get well. Once they successfully complete the treatment program, they would move to a residential treatment facility or receive intensive outpatient treatment. The treatment plan for each individual would be based on the assessment and recommendation of the treatment providers. After completing the program, the current charges and prior drug convictions would be dismissed and expunged from their record so they can get a fresh start.

McCarty introduced the bill concept and then introduced Yolo County Chief Deputy District Attorney Jonathan Raven as a witness testifying in favor of the bill. Raven gave an example of someone who might benefit from this program.

"A 40-year-old is convicted of felony commercial burglary. He also is addicted to heroin. He committed the crime to

feed his drug habit. He's been to prison four times and three years ago was convicted of assault causing great bodily injury," said Raven. "Throughout his life, he's never gotten the necessary help to

get well. Hope CA would give him an alternative to state prison."

Gary Burt also testified in support of the bill. Burt is "Case Manager -Emerging Scholars," which is an equity program for formerly incarcerated and system impacted students. Burt told committee members, "With AB1928 I understand the concerns, however from my perspective this pilot program gives individuals the opportunity to work on their underlying substance abuse issues while also giving these individuals a new start in life by expunging their record "

There were a number of individuals representing various organizations who spoke in opposition to the bill. The roll call vote was taken, and the bill passed through on an 11-0 vote. McCarty stated, "I realize the Governor vetoed this Bill in the last session, but I'm glad to see his position has evolved with his CARE Court program that is now a bill in the Senate." The next stop for AB 1928 is the Senate Public Committee where the bill will be heard. Yolo County Supervisor Sandy stated he was pleased to see the Bill moving forward. "The population we are looking at is ill and suffers from serious drug addictions. But they also are committing significant crimes in our communities which must be addressed. We need to try something new and this bill will give those who would be spending time in jail or prison a choice and opportunity to get the help they need in a secure facility. It's the humane way to treat them."

- Sacramento State's student-run online radio station KSSU celebrated 30 years of broadcasting to the campus community and beyond on April 8 in the University Union.

KSSU has served as a radio industry training ground and student sounding board since it launched on the airwaves in 1991. More than 3,000 Sac State students have worked at the station.

It now is heard via the internet from its studio on the first floor of the University Union. Each semester about 40 student volunteers, not all looking for broadcasting careers, learn a wide range of skills related to broadcasting, advertising, engineering, programming, journalism, and other fields.

"This is our audio sandbox," said KSSU advisor Aaron Wall, student

services coordinator for Associated Students Inc. "Students play music that they love and talk about topics that interest them."

## About the Earnings Test and Taxation of Social Security Benefits

Dear Rusty: I'm 63, married, and we file a joint tax return. If I claim Social Security now and keep working and earn \$7,000 more per year than the annual limit of \$19,560, I know I'd have benefits withheld at the rate of \$1 for every \$2 over the limit (\$3,500). But if I were to contribute \$7,000 to a conventional (not Roth) IRA and take the deduction. would this reduce my earned income and eliminate the SS benefit withholding? And will such an IRA deduction help avoid taxation of my SS benefits if I am above the \$32,000 taxation threshold for married - filing jointly? I'm trying to figure how much I can afford to earn while collecting Social Security benefits. Signed:

Searching for Ways D e a r Searching: Contributions to an IRA will not reduce the income tax liability on your Social Security benefits. Taxation of Social Security benefits is determined using something known as Modified Adjusted Gross Income (MAGI), which is your normal AGI

on your tax return, plus times during the year you 50% of the SS benefits you received during the tax year, plus any other non-taxable income you had (which would include contributions to your IRA). As you know, MAGI over \$32,000 will cause 50% of your SS benefits received during the tax year to become taxable, but MAGI over \$44,000 will up that percentage to as much as 85% of SS benefits received during the tax year (taxed at your normal IRS

For the Social Security earnings limit, which applies to anyone collecting early benefits, your gross income from working is what counts so contributing to an IRA won't reduce the amount you exceed the limit by they will use your gross W2 amount, not the Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) from your tax return. FYI, the 2022 annual

earnings limit is \$19,560 and if that is exceeded, you'll pay the penalty (\$1 for every \$2 over). But claiming mid-year you'll also be subject to a 2022 monthly limit of \$1630 and, if that is exceeded, you aren't entitled to SS benefits for that month (the monthly limit will only apply for the remaining months of 2022). What will happen is SS will compute the penalty both ways and see which is greater the one for exceeding the annual limit or the one for exceeding the monthly limit - and they will assess whichever penalty is smaller. As you may know, the earnings limit goes up by about 2.5

reach your full retirement age (FRA) and goes away entirely starting in the month you attain FRA.

But there's something to be aware of also: If you have benefits withheld because you exceeded the earnings limit, when you reach your full retirement age you will be given time credit for the months benefits were withheld, meaning that they will increase your FRA benefit amount according to the number of months you didn't get benefits before that. So, at least theoretically, you can eventually recover the benefits withheld for exceeding the earnings limit by getting a higher benefit payment starting at vour full retirement age. But income tax on SS benefits is different – there is no age cap for assessing federal income tax on your Social

## **COVID-T Variant Looks Deadly** to California Freedom

A dangerous strain of COVID is ripping through the California legislature. This new variant, COVID-T, for Totalitarian, threatens to sacrifice every, last, tiny shred of medical freedom in California on the altar of utopian "safetyism" and make the California U-Haul shortages of the past seem like quaint

memories. COVID is no longer a crisis. This is good news! Nearly 75-percent of eligible Californians are fully vaccinated, a number that doesn't include those partially vaccinated or who have natural immunity acquired through infection. Deaths are, mercifully, at a trickle. We should be celebrating the manageable threat that now confronts us.

But the COVID-T proves that the panic and fear that characterized the early, unchecked era of the pandemic are still surging in the legislature.

Even as the futility of masking and shutdowns become evident in reflection, California legislators have introduced a number of hyper-controlling, uber-safety bills aimed at forcing left-wing vaccine orthodoxy onto everyone.

Assembly Bill (AB) 1993 (Wicks) Employers must get proof of vaccine before hiring a new employee or face a fine;

Here's a sampling:

**AB** 1797 (Weber) - Creates a vaccine registry, which could be used to deny services to the unvaccinated;

- Senate Bill (SB) 866 (Wiener) - Lets 12-year-old children consent to vaccines even against the wishes of their parents;
- **SB 871 (Pan)** Lets schools ban students who are not COVID vaccinated;
- AB 2098 (Low) -Disciplines doctors for spreading COVID "misinformation." Think of all the official announcements and guidance that have since proven wrong! This is an astonishing assault on free speech.
- SB 1464 (Pan) -Mandates Sheriffs enforce state vaccine orders and withholds state funds from counties that don't enforce.

There are others. These bills aim to deny livelihoods, education, and shut down debate surrounding COVID treatment and policy. Here's hoping they don't try to cut off banking and travel to the unvaccinated but this collection of bills shows an unlimited appetite for punishing people into compliance.

I'm sure the bills authors would scream "I follow the science!" The problem is, science isn't policy. It is an input to policy. Policies are an expression of values, not equations. I'm sure science would show that high-speed impacts are deadlier than low-speed impacts, but that doesn't tell us the speed limit.

Like COVID, car accidents are "transmissible" to other people. But, even with "the science" and the risk to others, we don't have turtle crawls on our highways. Why? Because all policies involve tradeoffs and there are competing values in the world. name just two, are often ignored in Sacramento but they should be balanced against other needs and desires in crafting laws

and regulations.

This is a point lost on legislators who want to cut off the world to those who don't line up for the vaccine, even if they have natural immunity to COVD from prior infection. The 100% safety COVID Puritans who imagine zero-COVID fueled by unquestioning obedience forget the experiences of the past two years. They forget the millions of closed businesses, the lonely elderly who died without the comfort of their families, or the masked and isolated children whose educations and mental health were sacrificed to zero COVID.

A legislature that facilitates heroin use and lets mentally ill homeless terrorize innocents on the streets seems a little selective in the dangers they want to police. COVID has been granted its own risk category, superior to all others. It makes no sense.

California is turning into the least hospitable place to live in the country. People are fleeing this state in such numbers that U-Haul actually ran out of trucks to service the exodus earlier this year. But that outmigration will be tiny compared to the people flocking to freer states to avoid the life-controlling COVID-T.

You should control your medical decisions, not legislators who might be wearing masks alone in their cars but not at sporting events or restaurants. Don't ever let them take your freedom.

YOLO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Throughout Child Abuse Prevention Month, the Child Abuse Prevention Council (CAPC), Yolo County Children's Alliance (YCCA), and partners are raising awareness about nurturing resilience in youth and their families in the region. The CAPC partnered with local schools to showcase art created by youth to illustrate what a 'Strong Family' means to them. This artwork will be displayed at the Yolo County Public Administration building throughout the month of April and will be shared across partner organizations' social media channels.

"During Child Abuse Prevention Month, we are reminded of how we all play a critical role in empowering and strengthening our youth," said Chief Robert Strange, West Sacramento Chief of Police. "The effects of the pandemic are often talked about in the sense of 'food and housing insecurity and job loss' but we need to remember that our youth, who we as a community are responsible for setting up for success, have been detrimentally impacted by a major lack of support. As a community, it's our responsibility to make sure these youth and their families have the tools to take care of themselves, and in turn take care of each other."

Everyone can play a role in preventing child abuse and neglect, starting with strengthening families by connecting them with information and resources. 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## \$34.7 Million Awarded for Local Transportation Projects

Caltrans News Release

**SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - Caltrans announced it is awarding \$34.7 million in state and federal funds to cities, counties, tribes and transit agencies throughout California - including \$25 million funded by Senate Bill (SB) 1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017 – to plan sustainable transportation projects that reduce greenhouse gas emissions, improve the state highway system, enhance access to safe walkways and bike paths, and increase natural disaster preparedness.

"These grants are funding the planning for sustainable and more resilient transportation projects that will prepare the state for rising sea levels, wildfires and other climate related impacts," said Caltrans Interim Director Steven Keck. "By collaborating with local communities, we are working together to achieve both our climate goals and an equitable transportation infrastructure for people who rely on transit and intercity bus service."

In total, Caltrans will allocate: \$18.4 million in Sustainable

Communities Competitive and Technical Grants to 57 local, regional, tribal and transit agencies for climate change adaptation, transportation and land use planning, and natural disaster preparedness. This includes more than \$4.5 million to fund planning for 14 projects that improve safety and access for people who walk and

\$3.8 million in federally funded Strategic Partnership Grants to 10 projects that will plan for zero-emission medium- and heavyduty vehicles, sustainable goods movement, wildlife connectivity, intercity bus systems and other sustainability initiatives;

\$12.5 million - all from SB 1 - in Sustainable Communities Formula Grants to metropolitan planning organizations to further regional transportation plans and sustainable community strategies. This grant will be awarded later this spring.

Caltrans awards transportation planning grants each year through a competitive process to encourage local and regional projects. Applications are evaluated on how goals by identifying and addressing statewide, interregional, or regional transportation deficiencies on the highway system.

SB 1 provides \$5 billion in transportation funding annually split between the state and local agencies. Road projects progress through construction phases more quickly based on the availability of SB 1 funds, including projects that are partially funded by SB 1.

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## California's Gun Restrictions are a Failure

Inevitably, last weekend's horrendous fusillade of bullets on a downtown Sacramento street that left six people dead and at least a dozen wounded generated demands for new gun controls in state that already has the firearms laws.

However, if anything, what happened just two blocks from the state Capitol underscores the folly of believing that "gun violence" can be meaningfully reduced by trying to choke off the supply of firearms – any more than the prohibition of liquor or the war on drugs succeeded.

The state's gun laws have hassled law-abiding hunters and gun hobbyists and some are in danger of being declared unconstitutional. However, Californians already own more than 20 million rifles, shotguns and handguns and are buying hundreds of thousands more each year.

Nor have these laws prevented the lawless from obtaining weapons via theft, smuggling from manufacture of untraceable "ghost guns." Indeed, state restrictions have made the black market even more lucrative, mirroring the

Initial evidence indicates that those who fired more than 100 rounds in a street crowded with bar and nightclub patrons probably were violating one or more gun laws. The two brothers that police arrested and are suspected of involvement in the mass shooting were charged with illegal possession of weapons - one for possession of an illegal fully automatic firearm.

So why, if California's much-vaunted gun control laws have failed to choke off the supply of legal and illegal weapons, do politination's most restrictive cians continue to claim that enacting even more will have an effect?

Some may believe it, the evidence notwithstanding, while others want to appear to be doing something about a problem because they don't have any other answers. And those who propose and enact new gun laws are often woefully ignorant about guns or even existing laws.

In the aftermath of the shooting, Sacramento Mayor Darrell Steinberg lamented to a radio interviewer about California's difficulty in reducing the number of guns, saying, "You just have to go to a gun show in Reno to buy an assault weapon without a background check and come right back to California."

Advocates of more laws often cite a "gun other states or the illicit show loophole" but it's a myth. Under federal law, one must be a resident of Nevada and undergo a federal background check to legally buy a gun in Reno.

Moreover, while California professes to have banned "assault weapons," the state's definition of them involves cosmetic features, rather than their lethality. Perfectly legal semi-automatic rifles that lack those features are available for sale everywhere in the state.

The newest effort at gun control in California, backed by Gov. Gavin Newsom, would authorize personal lawsuits against the manufacturers and sellers of illegal assault rifles or ghost guns, mirroring a new Texas law allowing suits against those who perform abortions.

The legislation, Senate Bill 1327, is just a stunt - one of Newsom's periodic jabs at a rival state. Those who could be sued under the bill are already committing criminal acts in California and a federal law prohibits suits against manufacturers of legal firearms, including the "assault weapons" that California and a few other states purport – but fail – to outlaw.

The bottom line is this: Actor Alec Baldwin's claims notwithstanding, guns don't fire on their own. Someone must accidentally or purposely pull the trigger and that should be the focus of efforts to reduce violence - such as more vigorous enforcement of laws banning gun possession by felons and those under court order.





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
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## Local Stars Shine at 45th Optimist Game

Representing Woodland on the girl's small school South Team were guards Marina Montez and Alex Romero. The South Team pulled away in the fourth quarter, winning 73-52. Isabella Felix from Liberty Ranch was named the team's most outstanding player.

The second game was also contested between small schools, this time on the boy's side. The South Team prevailed for the second straight game, defeating the North Team 99-78. Point guard Drew Fischer from Liberty Ranch was named the South Team's most outstanding player.
