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Snowpack Worsens

Sierra Snowpack Falls to Lowest Level in 7 Years

Seven years ago today, (April 1, 2015) during the height of the last drought, California Gov. Jerry Brown stood on the barren slopes of the Sierra Nevada, watching as engineers measured the worst snowpack in state history.

Today's snow measurements aren't quite so bleak, but they remain devastatingly low: The snowpack which provides a third of California's water supply — is 38% of average statewide. And at the same bonedry spot where Brown stood in 2015, at Phillips Station south of Lake Tahoe, state engineers today found

a shrinking patch of snow that contained only 4% of the location's average water content.

After the Sierra Nevada's driest January, February and March for more than a century, the scene painted a picture of a deepening drought.

"Today is actually very evocative of 2015," Karla Nemeth, director of the California Department of Water Resources said against a backdrop of brown grass at Phillips Station.

"You need no more evidence than standing here on this very dry landscape to understand some of the challenges we're facing here in California," Nemeth said.

Worse than last year, worse even than last month, this year's snowpack is the worst it's been in seven years and the sixth lowest April measurement in state history. It's not as bad as the last drought, however: The snowpack contains about eight times more water than in 2015.

The amount of snow in April is considered critical because it indicates how much water will be available through the summer. The snow, historically at its deepest in April, melts and flows into rivers, streams and reservoirs that serve much of the state.

K Street Shooting Leaves 6 Dead

Sacramento Police Department News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -The Sacramento Police Department is investigating a mass shooting that occurred in the area of 10th Street and K Street. On April 3, 2022, at approximately 2:00 a.m., Sacramento Police Department officers responded to the sounds of shots fired in the area of 10th Street and K Street. Upon arrival, officers located a large group of individuals as well as multiple gunshot victims. Officers began live-saving measures to multiple victims on scene. Despite these efforts, six victims were pronounced deceased at the scene. Twelve other

victims with varying degrees of injuries have also been located.

We are aware of a social media video that appears to show an altercation that preceded the shooting. We are currently working to determine what, if any, relation these events have to the shooting. Homicide detectives and crime scene investigators have responded to the scene and will be conducting a comprehensive investigation; gathering evidence, documenting the scene, and contacting involved individuals. During the preliminary phases of the investigation, at least one firearm has been recovered at the scene.

In the early stages of the investigation, all information remains preliminary and is subject to change. As we progress throughout the coming days, we will be releasing additional information as it becomes available.

Ukraine: A Cause Worth Fighting For

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

It was the day that changed their lives forever, February 24, 2022. Friends and relatives in Ukraine started calling. Facebook was full of reports of bombings. It was unreal.

The Ukrainian community in the Sacramento region is a closeknit group from all walks of life who work well with all people in their lives. It is estimated to be over 100,000 Ukrainians in the greater Sacramento region, many who came for their religious freedom.

Therefore, when the attack by Russia on their homeland began, it was a smooth transition, turning their attention from their everyday lives, to working together strategizing plans to get help as soon as possible to their families in the Ukraine. In the words of community leader Vlad Skots, "America/Ukraine we are one family we help each other,

businesses and others in the community were reaching out to see how they could come alongside their friends and co-workers who now needed their help.

The Ukrainian American (UA) House in Rancho Cordova is a "nonprofit focused on promoting business relations between Ukraine and the United States." It is now in the forefront of working to get aid to their family and

According to their website, "On February 26, a citywide interfaith prayer service for Ukraine was held at the Spring of Life Baptist Church, a Ukrainian church in Orangevale together with the UA House. It was opened by senior pastor of the church, Vadim Dashkevich. Together with pastors, priests, government officials, public officials, public figures and the Mayor of Sacramento, we prayed to our Lord for Ukraine." As Vlad said, "We rely on God for many things, but for others we must rely on ourselves. We

immigrated here and have successfully found the "American Dream" to be a reality is the Skots family. Stephan Skots, owner of USKO Ukrainian Realty in Sacramento, the oldest of 10 brothers, was the first to arrive. He came in 1997 at the age of 20 to escape Communism. He now has five daughters, the last three girls were born in the U.S. He employs 25 agents. He offers his office for regular fellowship breakfasts meetings for Ukrainian community leaders to continue keep up with the status of the war and their people's needs.

Four of his brothers from ages 19 to 24 followed him. Their parents, had connections in the U.S. and wanted them to come here for a good education. Stephan learned English at Adult School and opened a business. He brought his brothers here, sponsored and took care of them. He sent them to school and they worked together. The five remaining brothers are still in Ukraine with their parents.

Vlad Skots is Chairman and Co-founder of Ukrainian American House in Rancho Cordova and CEO of USKO Express, Inc, a national trucking

company founded in 2006.

Vlad grew up in a very small village in western Ukraine, the seventh of 10 brothers, no sisters. He came here in 2001, knowing no English. He attended school during the day, worked as a janitor, in construction and a truck driver. As a truck driver, driving through all 48 states in America and marveling at their beauty, he fell in love with the transportation business and started his own company." He now has 100 employees.

He appreciated that he, "as a simple guy who grew up in a small village and came here with only a high school diploma, without money, parents or language could build and operate a successful business.'

Two other organizations have been instrumental in bringing the Ukraine community together to help spearhead this daunting

Branch Manager Mikhail Tkach, Ukrainian Federal Credit Union in Citrus Heights, is helping with fundraising. They provide money grams and money transfers free of charge to credit union members.

Church in Sacramento is a mainstay of the Ukrainian community. With a congregation of over 1,000, the church and its pastor lead the Ukrainian community. All requests for help go through the team at the church.

According to Vlad Skot, the three things needed most are: 1) Prayer! "We pray about it all. God can help us the most"; 2) Funds to purchase medical supplies and for defense items which can be purchased locally; 3) "Contact your legislatures, raise your voice, they have a moral imperative to help Ukraine more than they are now". He sees more help from the public and businesses than the government.

Many have commented that from 1989 to today - before this war - a new generation has grown up in Ukraine. Their country is different than their parents' and grandparents', more developed, more open, with freedom of religion, freedom of politics, no fear of persecution. Only God knows how this will end.

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Free Compost Available at Yolo County Landfill

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) -The Yolo County Central Landfill, located at 44090 County Road 28H in Woodland, will offer free compost to all Yolo County residents - excluding businesses and landscapers from April 1 − 30. No

appointment is needed; however, we require proof of residency with a driver's license or utility bill. Hours of operation are Monday – Saturday, from 6:30 am to 4 pm, and on Sundays from 8 am - 4 pm.

Please bring a shovel and bags to load the compost yourself because loading equipment is not allowed. Customers needing a large quantity of compost may inquire about purchasing compost after this free event ends or by checking it with our front environment. administration office staff.

'This program helps the County reach its SB 1383 requirements, and it also supports our Sustainable Environment and Flourishing Agriculture strategic plan goals," said Board Chair, Supervisor Angel Barajas. "As residents and businesses in our County start segregating green waste and food waste from their trash, this shows the full circle of how and why these new regulations benefit our community."

The compost comes from the anaerobic composter cells that started operating at the Landfill in 2019. The composter has an annual capacity of 52,000 tons per year and uses anaerobic bacteria to decompose organic waste, a mixture of green waste and food waste, in a sealed

This decomposition process takes less than six months to complete and provides many benefits, including diverting organic waste from the Landfill, producing renewable energy, reducing water use and carbon emissions, and creating compost. The composting process achieves temperatures greater than 130° F and meets the requirements of Title 14 of the California Code of Regulations §17855, destroying pathogens and weed seeds.

United States Composting Council laboratory tested the compost, and the Organic Materials Review Institute certified it for use in certified organic production.

File Taxes Online for Free through United Way

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Local residents throughout the Sacramento region are still eligible to file their taxes online for free through United Way California Capital Region's Free Tax Prep program through April 18. Households that earned less than \$65,000 in 2021 can file for free and receive up to \$8,000 cash back from state and federal credits, including the federal and state Earned Income Tax Credits (EITC and CalEITC). The local United Way's Free Tax Prep program saves qualifying residents an average of \$200 in preparer fees. To learn more about the program or begin filing, visit YourFreeTaxPrep.org.

"Many families in our region have earned these tax credits, but often do not know they are eligible," said Dr. Dawnté Early, president and CEO, United Way California Capital Region. "These are important funds that local families can use to meet immediate needs and increase their household's financial stability. Our Free Tax Prep program is a key piece of United Way's work to help every family succeed so their community can too. That is square one for ending poverty in our region."

Households may be eligible for the CalEITC tax credit if the taxpayer is at least 18 years old and the household earned less than \$30,000 in 2021. Many CalEITC-eligible households are not legally required to file taxes due to low income, but if they file, they can claim state and federal credits.

Families that received advance payments of the Child Tax Credit must file a tax return and could be eligible for additional Child Tax Credit payments. ITIN holders also are eligible for some tax credits. Experts recommend everyone files as soon as possible, noting that many people do not realize that unemployment income is taxable.

In 2021, more than 4,000 households across the Sacramento region filed their taxes through United Way's Free Tax Prep program, claiming a total of more than \$7.5 million in credits and saving a total of \$885,000 in tax preparation fees.

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

the state's snow surveys and water supply forecasting section, held his hand at roughly shoulder height on a survey instrument. "On an average year, our feet should be right here where my hand is,"

As California's water officials discovered last year, climate change is upending their forecasts for how much melting snow the thirsty state can truly expect to refill its dwindling stores.

It's a dismal end to a water year that began with great promise, with early storms in October and December. By Jan. 1, the plush snowpack was 160% of average for that date statewide, and already a little over half the seasonal total.

"Our great snowpack — the water tower of the West and the world — was looking good. We had real high hopes," Benjamin Hatchett, an assistant research professor with the Western Regional Climate Center and Desert Research Institute, said in a recent drought presentation.

Typically, the snowpack would continue to build until April. But a record-dry January, February and March followed by unseasonably warm and dry conditions in March sapped the frozen stores, which by the end of the month were already melting at levels that would be expected in April or May.

Now, "we would consider this to be deep into snow drought," Hatchett said.

Reservoir storage statewide is about 70% of average — around half of total capacity, de Guzman said today.

Though state officials reported that early snowmelt has started to refill foothill reservoirs, the water level in massive Lake Shasta, critical to federal supplies for farms, people and endangered salmon, sits at less than half the average for this date. Lake Oroville is only slightly better, at 67% of its historic average.

From Andrew Schwartz's vantage point north of Lake Tahoe at the University of California, Berkeley's Central Sierra Snow Lab, it still looks wintry, with about three feet of snow, "plus or minus six inches," he said.

It's a far cry from the grassy field further south in the Sierra Nevada, where Brown stood for the survey seven years ago and where state officials found just traces of snow today.

"It's been a false sense of security when you come up here" to the snow lab, Schwartz said "Statewide as a whole, it's not looking great."

There could be a number of consequences to the early snowmelt, Schwartz said. It could result in more water loss as early snowmelt evaporates in reservoirs, disrupting the balance of mountain ecosystems and speeding the start of fire

"Without the snow, once things dry out, it's just going to be catastrophic again," Schwartz said.

Early snowmelt can also complicate reservoir operations if managers need to release water to preserve flood control space, said Nathan Patrick, a hydrologist with the federal California Nevada River Forecast Center.

California's water supply will be determined by how much snowmelt continues to flow into major reservoirs versus how much will seep into the soil or disappear into the air. Climate change is already transforming this pattern as the weather swings between extremes, and warmer temperatures suck moisture from the soil and melt snow earlier in the year.

"The next few weeks are really that critical period to actually watch how much of that runoff will actually make it down into those lakes," de Guzman said.

California's Department of Water Resources is working to overhaul its runoff forecast calculations, an effort that has grown increasingly urgent. Last year, the state's projections for runoff from the Sierra Nevada overshot reality by so much that water regulators were left scrambling to protect drinking water supplies and preserve enough water in storage.

Assemblymember Adam Gray, a Democrat from Merced, has called for a state audit of the calculations. "Has the state learned anything from this disaster?" he asked in a CalMatters op-ed.

This year, de Guzman and Patrick expect more of the snow to reach

The soils, for one thing, are wetter the result of powerful October storms that soaked the state. That means more of the snowmelt may flow into rivers and streams. Generally, Patrick said, "We expect it to be better this year."

Still, increased runoff can't make up for a paltry snowpack — particularly in the Northern Sierra. The snowpack there is the lowest in the state, just 28% the seasonal average, compared to 42% and 43% in the Central and Southern Sierra.

Patrick sees a trend emerging in the runoff and streamflow measurements over the past three years. "One after another have been below normal," he said.

"You can deal with one or two bad years, but when you start to get these compounding, three bad years ... it's hard to recover."

Couple Charged with Robbery, **Criminal Threats and Retail Theft**

Yolo County District Attorney Press Release

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - On March 22, 2022, Sierra Stommel, age 36, and Allen Wright, age 28, were arraigned in Yolo County Superior Court and pled not guilty on multiple charges including robbery and retail theft. Both are from Sacramento.

The two were arrested by the West Sacramento Police Department on March 17, 2022, on suspicion of robbery and criminal threats at a liquor store in West Sacramento. At the time of the arrest the pair were suspects in retail thefts from Lowe's in West Sacramento occurring on December 27, 2021, and January 8, 2022.

The Yolo County District Attorney's Office filed a criminal complaint on March 21, 2022, alleging organized retail theft from both dates as well as robbery and two counts of criminal threats from the March 17, 2022, incident. Stommel was also charged with an enhancement for being armed with a deadly weapon during the commission of the robbery and threats, and Wright is further charged with an enhancement for a prior strike

Stommel and Wright are scheduled for a Preliminary Hearing on April 6, 2022. Both remain in custody with bail set in the amount of \$60,000 for Stommel and \$100,000 for Wright.

Social Security Matters

Should I Claim Early Due to Social Security's Financial Condition?

Dear Rusty: I plan on retiring at 62, one year from now. I have been coached to (if financially possible) leave my Social Security earnings for my wife to collect in the future if I die, considering that she was a homemaker for the majority of her income earning years. My instinct is to get Social Security coming (I understand I'm settling for a lesser amount at age 62) as soon as possible considering the forecast of our government's inability to fund Social Security for the rest of my life. No one has a crystal ball, and no one knows what our government will or will not be able to fund even into next week, so we weigh what we know and see, and then decide. Is my question

clear? Signed: Skeptical Dear Skeptical: Well, your question is clear but contains two opposing factors - you say you wish to provide well for your wife if you die, but also say you wish to claim at age 62 because you're not confident that Social Security (SS) will be there in the future. Yet claiming at age 62 will mean the lowest possible survivor benefit for your wife because her benefit as your widow receiving at your death. I'll try to put all this into perspective for you.

Although Social Security is facing some future financial issues, it will never go bankrupt and be unable to pay benefits. The worst that could happen, if Congress takes no action beforehand, would be that benefits will be cut by about 22% if the SS Trust Fund is fully depleted in 2033 (right now, reserves in the Trust Fund are used to supplement SS expenses because SS revenue is currently less than program costs). If that happens, Social Security can only pay out as much as it brings in. But that almost certainly won't happen, because Congress won't permit it to. Congress already knows how to fix Social Security's financial issues – they just currently lack the political will and bipartisan spirit to implement the changes needed. But there's little doubt that they will fix the issue the-board benefit cut to over 65 million beneficiaries (because seniors vote). FYI, there was \$2.9 trillion in reserves in the Social Security Trust Fund at the

end of 2020. I don't recommend you make your Social Security claiming decision based on fear of the program going bankrupt – it won't. Even if Congress doesn't act and a benefit cut is imposed in 2033 (which is highly unlikely), a 22% cut to your age 62 benefit amount would be more painful than a 22% cut to your benefit at your full retirement age (FRA)

will be the amount you are which would be about 30% higher than your age 62 benefit amount. The longer you wait to claim, the higher your benefit, and your wife's survivor benefit, will be - even in the unlikely event of a later cut in benefits. Instead, I suggest you make your claiming decision based only upon your personal circumstances. If you wish to increase your wife's survivor benefit, then waiting longer to claim is the way to do that. If you retire from working at age 62, Social Security's earnings test won't apply to you (the earnings test limits how much you can earn while collecting early SS benefits), thus you can certainly claim at 62 if you so wish. But it's important to consider the consequences of claiming early (including a lower survivor benefit for your widow) and make a decision based on facts, not fear of Social Security going bankrupt - because it

Making the City's Plans Accurate

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The process of dividing our town into districts has begun. On February 2, the West Sacramento City Council decided to retain the current at-large election structure for Mayor and chose to divide the city into four districts for the election of each council member. There have already been several meetings to explain, and to begin the process of this re-districting. This is supposedly done so that all groups of people have a voice in the election process.

They are referred to as 'communities of interest'. The goal is to represent people in a certain geographical location that share common social and economic interests. Communities of interest include race/ethnicity, residents who share a common language, dog park people, educational opportunity, transportation method, land use, outdoor recreation, access to specific services and common circumstances. Examples of common circumstances include income, crime, traffic congestion, type of housing, urban or rural and physical proximity to landmarks such as freeways, lakes, rivers, parks, and schools. Other examples of communities of interest include people living near an industry where most people work, homeowners vs. renters, senior citizens communities and concentrations

of students. The City of West Sacramento has been using the 2020 Census information to determine these communities of interest and would also like for the residents to be involved. This way, they will have a more accurate representation of how to draw the district lines and will ensure the districts are balanced in

regard to population. The City Council wants to hear from you on how these lines should be drawn.

Information that the City Council is looking for includes: Does your community have a shared culture, characteristics or bond; Is your community geographic in nature and can it be mapped; and they would like you to describe your communities relationship with the city and how is it affected by policy decisions made by the city council. To answer these questions and provide this information to the city visit the city's website and click on 'City Transitions to District Elections.'

Here you will find an online document that you can fill out and submit to the city. The four questions include: What are the common interests in your community and describe how they are important; Explain the geographical location of your community of interest and what are the physical boundaries; What is the rationale for your community of interest to be used in the City Council redistricting process and to please describe how the issues before the city council have an impact on your community, and lastly What else would you like to tell them about your community? These worksheets are available in English, Spanish and Russian.

"More than a dozen West Sacramento residents attended a map making workshop at the Community Center to learn more about the City's transition from At-large to district elections. Printed maps showing 2020 Census data were passed out and City consultants from Redistricting Partners answered questions and provided tips about how to draw district boundaries on maps of the City. Aside from printed maps, residents were encouraged to create boundaries using an online tool found on the City's website: www.cityofwestsacramento.org.

The City Council will consider all map submissions before making a final decision on four new districts that will be in place for the November 2022 elections," reported the City in an email to this newspaper.

It's not too late to be involved. 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

'Job killer' List Tests Capitol's Ideological Bent

California is a deep blue state, markedly and proudly hewing to the left of the nation's political centerline.

California's Legislature, utterly dominated by Democrats, leans a little further to the port side of the political scale.

That said, there are ideological fault lines within unwilling, in an election the Democrats legislative supermajorities, some fairly obvious, others faint. Their existence explains why outcomes are not always as predictable as one might think, given one-party domination.

A prime example of that unpredictability is what happened, or didn't happen, on legislation to overhaul medical care by having the state assume total control over its provision - a long-standing holy grail for the Democratic Party's progressive activists.

The state Senate had passed a version of the single-payer legislation in a previous session, but it was bottled up in the Assembly. Last year, a new version, Assembly Bill 1400, moved fairly easily through Assembly committees to reach the floor, but when the Legislature reconvened in January, it ultimately died

'I don't believe it would have served the cause of getting single payer done by having the vote and having it go down in flames and further alienating members," the bill's author, San Jose Democrat Ash Kalra, told disappointed supporters later. He added that the measure, needing 41 votes to pass, was short by "double digits."

Gov. Gavin Newsom, who had been a strident advocate of single-payer health care while campaigning for the governorship, didn't make any effort to secure votes for it in the Assembly and most members were apparently year, to vote for something that would require an immense tax increase to implement.

The demise of AB 1400 was, among other things, another win for the California Chamber of Commerce's "job killer" list, an annual exercise by the state's business community to identify and block legislation that it considers to be the most onerous.

For a quarter-century, the list has served as a guide to the Capitol's ideological temperature because it generally includes the highest-priority legislation of those on the left, such as labor unions and environmental and consumer protection advocates.

Although the Legislature has trended to drift leftward since the list was first issued in 1997, the chamber and its allies have rung up an impressive kill ratio.

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Typically, several dozens bills are placed on the list and it's rare for more than one or two to be passed by the Legislature and signed by the governor.

In 2021, for instance, 25 bills were targeted, and just two made it to Newsom's desk. He vetoed one and signed the other, Senate Bill 62, which eliminates piece work payment for garment industry workers.

The chamber's 90%plus record in stopping bills it designates as "job killers" faces another test this year. It has issued a preliminary list of 11 bills with more to be added later.

The 2022 list includes a new "wealth tax" on the state's richest residents, a bill that would allow workers to refuse to perform their jobs if they feel unsafe and an extension of the California Environmental Quality Act's mitigation provisions to effects on disadvantaged communities.

The latter two, along with several others, would expand opportunities for lawsuits to enforce their provisions - thus renewing the annual jousting between business groups and personal injury attorneys over who can sue for what action, dubbed "tort

Fundamentally, the fate of bills on this year's list will be another indicator of just how far left the Legislature is willing to go.




What We Harvest

focus, as Yolo Food Bank prioritizes acquiring staff members with deep local expertise who are inspired by the new mission.'

"Aiding those who are struggling to meet their basic needs is an issue I have been committed to and have been passionate about throughout my life. 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


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
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






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Attending a River Cats Game?

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - As the weather begins to warm up, many Sacramentans are beginning to search for activities to do this summer.

One activity that could be fun for the whole family is going out to Sutter Health Park in West Sacramento for a River Cats game. The Triple-A affiliate of the San Francisco Giants kicked off a new season on Tuesday, April 5.

It has been a dramatic last three years for the River Cats organization. In 2019, the last "normal" Minor League Baseball (MiLB) season played before the COVID-19 pandemic, Sacramento stood atop the Triple-A world as champions.

Next in 2020, the River Cats were unable to immediately defend their crown as the entire 2020 MiLB season was cancelled because of the pandemic. Then in 2021, the minor leagues returned and Sacramento was unable to repeat as champions.

For fans who have been unable to attend a game since 2019, there are a few differences at the home of the River Cats, aside from the name of the venue shifting from Raley Field to Sutter Health Park.

"Definitely a lot has changed in the world

and over here at Sutter Apple Pay and Google Pay. Health Park (since 2019)," said Troy Loparco, Vice President of Ticket Sales & Marketing. "Some of the main things you would notice that would be different (is) we're doing mobile ticketing. So that's going to be in the parking lot as well as tickets are going to be all digital. We are a cashless facility as well. Our clear bag policy would be the other big change that we have."

Sutter Health Park will be accepting payments via debit and credit cards as well as mobile wallets like For those fans who are tech savvy, you can now order food on the MiLB at-bat app allowing yourself to order food from your seat before receiving an alert via text message letting you know that your order is ready.

For those who may be old school, preferring physical tickets and cash money, fear not as employees at Sutter Health Park are ready and willing to

"We do have mobile ticketing assistance," Loparco said. "As you're coming up, you'll see there's a mobile ticketing booth that we'll have out there if anybody does have any extra questions before they get to the ticket window or before they're coming into the stadium. So, we do have other avenues of help as well."

However, the mobile ticketing booth is not your only source of assistance when attending a River Cats game.

"Of course in advance if they ever wanted to email into tickets@rivercats.com or even call into our "HITS" line which is 916-371-HITS (4487) with any questions before they come out, we're always happy to help in advance to make it as smooth as possible," Loparco said. "And we're always going to be sending out 'know before you go' information as well."

When last season began, Sutter Health Park sold tickets in pods to follow local health guidance. Although, when the state of California reopened in June 2021, the ballpark followed suit opening back up to 100% attendance, as it will be for the 2022 season.

"We are an outdoor, open-air facility," Loparco said. "What we've been doing is just staying up to date and as accurate and timely with any CDC guidelines that we have in the state and county."

The River Cats have 25 fireworks nights planned on the 75-game 2022 home schedule. The first fireworks show will be on Friday, April 8, which is also Solon Bobblehead Giveaway night. The Solons were a minor league baseball team that played in Sacramento off and on from 1903 to 1976.

"Our main goal is to be the best facility to come have a family friendly time out here at the ballpark," Loparco said. "Come enjoy River Cats baseball and everything that we have going on in the community.

"I think after the last two years, people are really looking for a fun time to spend with their friends, their families, in a safe, fun, clean environment. I think that's what we provide out here at Sutter Health Park. As long as everybody comes out smiling, happy and ready to cheer on the River Cats, I think they'll be ready to go."

Will This be a Bounce Back Season?

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - There's just something special about night baseball.

The Sacramento River Cats, the Triple-A affiliate of the San Francisco Giants, opened the 2022 season Tuesday, April 5, under the lights at Sutter Health Park against the Sugar Land Space Cowboys.

For River Cats outfielder Bryce Johnson, when the sun goes down, he excels.

"Being able to play underneath the lights, I always love night games," Johnson said. "We just played all these spring games during the day. So being able to get underneath the lights and in front of everybody feels great. That's my favorite part about it is playing night baseball. There's nothing that beats it."

The switch-hitting outfielder said he had played in one Opening Day night game previously when he was with the Giants' Single-A affiliate, the San Jose Giants, in 2018.

Unsurprisingly, that happened to be one of his best games of the season.

From Single-A to the big leagues, players around Major League Baseball are happy to be back and that the MLB lockout is over.

"(I'm excited) just to be playing," said righthanded pitcher Sean Hjelle. "Obviously, we had the lockout and everything happen. We didn't know how long things would be delayed. It's just good to be playing and on time. I think minor leagues didn't lose any games so we're on time and it's just good to be back."

Many players like Hjelle didn't let the 99-day lockout affect their offseason preparation.

"You still had to take care of business and get your offseason workouts in because you never knew when it was going to happen and when it was going to end or what not," Hjelle said. "So, you just prepare for everything

starting on time and if it's delayed then you just go from there at that point."

One relatively fresh face for the River Cats is Ka'ai Tom who signed with the team before the conclusion of last season.

"I'm just very happy that San Francisco signed me at the end of the season last year," Tom said. "When I came over it was just a lot of fun. Everyone had good vibes and worked together. I'm just happy to be part

of this organization and being given an opportunity to hopefully make it to Oracle Park."

Tom achieved a lifelong goal at the beginning of the 2021 season, making his major league debut with the Oakland Athletics before eventually joining their rivals on the other side of the bay with a stop in Pittsburgh in between. The 5-foot-9 outfielder said spring training went "pretty good" and recognized his coaches for that.

"It's a credit to the coaching staff just being transparent," Tom said. "Letting you know what goals that they're expecting out of you. Asking our feedback and what we feel or anything. The transparency overall shows why we were successful last year as well and it's looking to be that way again."

The River Cats reached the pinnacle of Triple-A in 2019 when they won the championship. Then in 2020, the Minor League Baseball (MiLB) season was cancelled in its entirety due to the coronavirus pandemic. Finally, the River Cats were unable to defend their title in 2021.

Now in 2022, the team is poised for a bounce back

"We got some exciting players on this team," Johnson said. "Every night, every day, we're going to end up probably having someone doing something crazy, something pretty cool. So, I would say come out and check us out. "(It's) not going to be boring, I can tell you that."

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
