Every February, in honor of Black History Month, the Sacramento Kings award their Dream All Star Award to selected Black community leaders that are making a positive impact in the Sacramento region. The Sacramento Kings are very committed to using their NBA status to influence social and systemic change to address institutional racism.

This year, two West Sacramento residents were among those awarded: Dr. Dawnte' Early, West Sacramento Councilwoman & CEO of the United Way, California and Jeneba Lahai, Executive Director of Yolo County Children's Alliance (YCCA), each received their crown when they were honored at Golden 1 Center. Both of these ladies stand out, as they impact lives in our region every day.

"I don't really look at myself like that. I just want to help people," Jeneba said. "I had heard that I was nominated, but I just kept working. I don't come alone. I come as a team. I have amazing

people on my team." The YCCA provides wrap around and direct services to anyone who qualifies and needs their help. They do their best to accommodate any ethnicity, with as little struggle as possible (like language barrier).

Jeneba was born in Liberia. When she was 7 years old, a civil war was taking place and the government was being overthrown. Jeneba said that in the middle of the night, her mom woke her up, took her by the hand, and with only what they could carry, they walked to freedom.

"It took forever. It was so far! I kept telling my mom to just leave Continued on page 3

Democrats Kill Proposal to Lower **Gas Prices**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)

- On Monday, March 14, Assembly Democrats killed a Republican proposal to immediately bring down the price of gas by suspending California's 51-cent-per-gallon gas tax. California drivers face the highest gas prices in the country, and at \$5.74 per gallon; fuel costs here are \$1.41 per gallon above the national average.

"Capitol Democrats had the chance to provide struggling Californians with immediate relief at the gas pump. They refused," said Assemblyman James Gallagher (Yuba City). "High gas prices and inflation are devastating California families, but Capitol Democrats' only solution seems to be 'buy a Tesla."

During the Assembly floor session, Republicans moved to advance AB 1638, which would suspend California's state gas tax for six months, and backfill the revenue from the state's budget surplus, which could exceed \$69 billion. The motion was killed on a 18-40 vote, with all Republicans voting to suspend the tax. Not a single Democrat voted for the effort.

On Prop 47:

California communities are under assault by a rise in crime that's hitting neighborhoods throughout our state.

Thieves walk into stores, fill up their backpacks and stroll out without a care in the world. Organized rings of thieves are committing brazen smash-and-grabs. Open air drug use and fentanyl overdoses are common on our streets at high-end retail boutiques. Soft-on-crime policies have failed Californians.

Proposition 47 is a huge culprit, reducing penalties for many crimes to a slap on the wrist. Now, a majority of Californians support bringing back more serious consequences for people who break the law.

Californians deserve to live in communities safe from violent crime and rampant theft. That is why I teamed up with Assemblymember Kevin Kiley and a dozen other legislators to introduce AB 1599 that would repeal Proposition 47 and rein in California's crime wave.

Home Run workforce development programs include a paid summer internship program for qualified high school students and a digital micro-credential program designed to foster the soft skills needed in virtually every industry, such as professional communication, teamwork, and initiative. Interns' wages and all insurance costs are paid by the City.

Your business can both support and benefit from the Home Run. By offering a summer internship you can help a local high school student gain valuable skills and work

experience. That young person then joins a pipeline of skilled entry-level employees for local businesses—including yours.

Home Run interns must be at least 16 and must meet certain academic requirements to be eligible for the program. All interns come from the Washington Unified School District. Interns receive soft skills training be- fore and

It's official: Sacramento's Jimmy Fremgen Challenges Matsui

Jimmy Fremgen for Congress

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On Friday, March 11, Jimmy Fremgen, a local teacher and former staffer for Congressman Elijah E. Cummings released the following statement following formally filing papers for candidacy for United States House of Representatives in the Seventh Congressional District of California:

When we elect the same politicians, we get the same results. At a time when Americans are more dissatisfied with the direction of the country than ever before, it's time for new energy. I've worked in Congress—including for Rep. Matsui—I know what we should expect from our representatives, and what we're getting isn't enough.

The Sacramento Bee calls me an underdog because I'm focused on fighting for real people instead of courting big corporate donors, but I'm running because I saw working people struggle during the pandemic while big business flourished. While walking through my Midtown neighborhood, I often talk to struggling small-business owners, renters that worry about having a place to live next month, people experiencing homelessness desperate for a leg up, and others. I'm fighting for them.

We can't wait for change any longer. I have seen the consequences of inaction: I graduated college with student debt during the Great Recession, lost my job and business in the pandemic, and witnessed endless war, school shootings, and climate change.

As a member of Congress, I'll demand accountability from opioid companies for the toll they've wrecked on our community instead of taking \$125,000 in campaign donations from them as Rep. Matsui has. Voters deserve to be represented by someone who will work for them, not the corporate PACs that want to build an oligarchy in the United States.

As Senior Policy Advisor for the House Oversight and Government Reform Committee, I held government and corporations accountable for fraud and abuse against taxpayers. If I were in Congress right now, I'd demand

hearings into price gouging by big business that has people in our region struggling to pay for daily essentials while corporate profits rise.

When elected, I will pursue policies to end homelessness, promote universal healthcare, fight climate change, protect taxpayers from greedy corporations, and obtain federal money for our recovery from the pandemic. I will change the way we are represented by being accessible to our community. My office will be located in a high need community, and I will hold monthly town halls, visit a classroom once a day, and host at least four community workshops per year to provide direct support on housing, healthcare, homelessness, and education.

Congressman Cummings taught me that to be an effective public servant, you need to hear directly from the people you work for, by being present and accessible. I look forward to showing our community what we can have when their representative lives here, not in Washington.

About Jimmy:

Jimmy Fremgen, age 33, is a local teacher, bartender, and heart disease survivor living in Sacramento. As a certificated-substitute teacher at Lerov Greene Academy, he has seen students struggle with the trauma of gun violence and the pandemic. He is a graduate of Moms Demand Action Against Gun Violence's "Demand a Seat" candidate training program. He is the Chair of the Board of Directors for the United CORE Alliance, a Sacramento-based non-profit that serves disadvantaged communities affected by the War on Drugs and advises All My Friend's Get Fed, where he helped create a jobs pipeline to the Sacramento hospitality industry for people experiencing homelessness.

Fremgen was the principal California State Assembly committee staffer on Cannabis policy from 2016-2019 and specialized in education equity, gun violence prevention, veterans' issues, foreign affairs, and worked on the House floor debate for the Iran Nuclear Agreement while serving on the staff of Congressman Elijah Cummings.

me here because I was too tired to walk anymore," Jeneba said. She explained that many families were leaving their children on the road when they couldn't keep up, but not her mom. Jeneba's mom tied a cloth around her waist and then around Jeneba's waist, and she basically drug Jeneba behind her.

"I'm not leaving you behind!" her Mother told her. "It's what they are going through in the Ukraine, right now", Jeneba said. Finally, Jeneba and her mom made it to a refugee camp. They lived in that camp for a couple of years, until they were finally able to move in with her Uncle, in Sierra Leone, West Africa. Jeneba and her Mother lived there until Jeneba's Mom decided that she didn't want Jeneba's education to stop. It took a long time (about two years), but eventually they got the paperwork (VISA etc.) for Jeneba to move to America where her dad lived. She was 12 years old.

Jeneba emigrated from Sierra Leone, West Africa and grew up in America. Because of the experiences that Jeneba has gone through in her life, she has always known that she wanted to help people.

Jeneba graduated from Sacramento State and began helping people right away as manager of one of Sacramento's Birth and Beyond Family Resource Centers. She then joined the YCCA team, working under Katie Villegas. Jeneba and Katie, with the rest of the team, made remarkable growth of the agency and programs. When Katie retired, Jeneba took over as Executive Director and the agency continues to thrive as they continue to develop programs to meet the needs of the community.

Jeneba also serves as board chair of Yolo County's Homeless and Poverty Action Coalition, member of the Yolo County Health Council, member of the Yolo County's Head-Start policy council and a board member of the West Sacramento Housing Development Corporation. In addition, she was named one of "40 under 40" from the Sacramento

When you tell Jeneba what an amazing job she is doing, she is always quick to say, "I have a staff that does so much amazing work. My staff members have gone through something themselves, so they know the struggles that our community faces, and they know the feelings that go along with them. It's because of this that the staff members each genuinely want to help the community without any judgement.'

If you are unaware of all of the programs that YCCA provides, you should check them out. They offer help in multiple languages. WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Penny Rod and Bait is a family-owned business that has actually been in West Sacramento since 1984. According to Kou Yang, a member of that family, the business used to be located at the end of West Capitol Ave. but due to the deterioration of the building and plans the city had, the city moved them to the current location of 1301 Merkley Ave. They are kind of across the street from the library. They've been in this location for about 8 years, but they are pretty tucked away.

At Penny's they carry live bait, including night crawlers, mini crawlers, red worms,

blood worms, pile worms, ghost shrimp, medium, large and jumbo minnows, and wax worms. They carry some tackle for ocean fishing but primarily for fresh water. They also carry a variety of smaller fish, or trade bait, such as marcel and sardines to be used for bait.

At Penny's, you can buy your hunting and fishing licenses as well as land passes. They can tell you places in every direction where you can fish. They have the equipment and the knowledge to introduce a beginner to fishing, or talk fish stories with someone that's been fishing for years. If you like to fish, or have a fisherman in your group of loved ones, stop in. Fishing gear always makes great gifts!

Olivia Prior has always been a quiet girl, ignored and even feared by the other girls of Merilance School for Girls, but that is exactly how she wanted it. Merilance, while called a school, was more of a dreary orphanage blanketed in a sea of grey for those with no place to go. Olivia was no exception, her only possession was her mother's green journal that housed rambling lines of madness and mystery, but those lines were the ones that gave her peace and purpose.

Then one day, a letter arrives, inviting Olivia to Gallant, promising a welcoming family and a place to call home. However, when Olivia arrives, she realizes that Gallant is anything but welcoming. Gallant may stand majestic at the end of a stone drive, but inside houses, deadly secrets, and the ghoulish visions she thought she left behind, haunt every shadow-drawn hallway. Even though no one knew of her existence and her cousin repels at the mere sight of her, for some odd reason, Olivia feels as if she is home. Then one night, at precisely the right moment, Olivia passes through the

Now that she has passed beyond the wall, Olivia quickly learns the truth of her family, the manor, and the one who wants her there, leaving Olivia to decide on which side she truly belongs.

In a story that hovers in that delicate place between life and death. shadow and light, and longing to belong, Gallant stands tall. Dark,

harrowing, and beautiful, this story takes readers out of this world and places them in a world that poses questions without giving them direct answers. These answers are meant to ponder long after turning the page. A strong, independent main character that is also mute lends to the overall power of this story, allowing readers to see within the mind of a girl who is unable to freely comminute with the world around her or even call out for help.

Victoria Schwab has the ability to hold a reader's heart in her hands while retreating into the shadows allowing us to dwell within the delicate place of the in-between. While we will never be the same once we have touched the shadows. we will enter back into the light stronger for knowing what lies in the darkness of our fears.

Paired with stunning illustrations by Manuel Sumberac, Gallant reads like a haunting melody. While the story of Gallant will remain with its readers, it also will leave them desperately anticipating the next story. Will you be willing to step through the threshold of Gallant?



"More Tax Please?"



Commentary by Bruce Lee

Local government is jiggling your front door handle ... "Anyone home? It's election year. We want more taxes please." Yes, they are knocking and soon many tax measures will be proposed.

And, here's an old proposal in new clothes! A 40 year, transportation half percent sales tax hike for Sacramento County. First proposed in 2016 and voted down; then resurfaced in 2020 to be pulled off the ballot at the last moment when the Sacramento Transportation Authority realized it would again miss the two-thirds threshold for passage.

Here's the twist ... rather than local government proposing a special use tax again (requiring a 2/3 majority vote); let's con the voters into taxing themselves! Let's use the "citizen initiative" process to put the tax on the ballot, which now only requires a simple majority vote due to a recent array of court decisions.

In 1978 California voters, through the historic Proposition 13, established that the state legislature approve tax increases with a two-thirds vote require-In 1996 this was ment. strengthened by Proposition 218 requiring local tax increases to have voter approval – a simple majority for general fund revenue, and two-thirds for special purpose taxes.

Then a 2017 California Supreme Court opinion commented, "(W)e will not lightly apply such restrictions on local governments to voter initiatives." And, the race was on! A possible loophole was found for special interests to get past the two-thirds vote requirement! In 2018 two San Francisco test cases popped up – both taxes placed on the ballot by citizen initiative – one taxed business for homeless issues and one taxed commercial property for childcare and early education. Both failed to receive two-third approval, the early education passed by only 50.87%.

Both taxes were challenged in court, where a local judge and San Francisco appellate court upheld the taxes as valid since placed on the ballot by initiative. Interestingly, test cases in an Oakland parcel tax for education and a Fresno sales tax for parks were voided by local judges citing the two-thirds approval requirement. Then in June 2020, the California Supreme Court refused to hear an appeal of the San Francisco taxes - thereby allowing the appellate court decision stand.

Now, any special interest group with some cash – such as

public employee unions - can push taxes that benefit themselves. If I can convince the bare majority to tax others for some "feel good" topic, then I'm the winner and feel no pain. Taxing commercial buildings for early childhood education has no relationship. I can tax business or the perceived wealthy to "save the whales" (or whatever issue has the emotional attention of the majority). All I have to do is pay enough signature gathers in front of Wal-Mart, and viola – I have a tax proposal.

Now, if this was truly a "citizen" initiative, getting all those initiative signatures to qualify is difficult. But, a special interest group with millions in the bank, that's easy stuff!

Back to the just announced county-wide "citizen" initiative for the half-percent, 40 year tax coming to a Wal-Mart near you; it's sponsored by "A Committee for a Better Sacramento". Wow, that sounds wonderful. And, it's lead by the "California Alliance for Jobs", who championed Senate Bill 1 increasing gasoline sales tax under Governor Jerry Brown. Per state filings, in January they had \$4.4 million on hand - plenty to qualify a "citizen" initiative. But, believe me, people don't donate \$4.4 million for feel-good rainbows. They are investing \$4.4 million to get a return on the back-end. Follow the money! For example, developers will profit from the long-desired connector between Highway 99 and 50.

Newsom Paints Rosy Picture, Ignores Big Issues

California is a shining example of economic and social progress, a beacon to rest of the world.

true because Gov. Gavin Newsom said it Tuesday in his fourth State of the State address, declaring, "now, in the midst of so much turmoil with stacking stresses and dramatic social and economic change, California is doing what we have done for generations, lighting out the territory ahead of the rest, expanding the horizon of what's possible."

California Way" and said it "means rejecting old binaries and finding new solutions to big problems

However, Newsom ignored many "big problems" as he portrayed a state on the cutting edge of virtually everything positive.

By any measure, the state has an immense shortage of housing that has driven costs through the roof and given California the nation's highest poverty rate. But neither the housing crisis nor the poverty rate crossed his lips.

Instead, Newsom portrayed the economy in the rosiest terms, saying, "When it comes to the economy, California is unmatched.

"We dominate in research, innovation, entrepreneurialism, venture capital — and remain the world's fifth largest economy. Our GDP growth has consistently outpaced not only the rest of the counthe rest of the nation and the try — but most other large, western democra-Doubt it? It must be cies. Nearly a million new jobs in the last 12 months. In December alone, 25% of America's jobs were created right here in California. More new business starts during the worst of the pandemic than Texas and Florida combined."

Sounds great, right? But Newsom avoided the fact that California has the nation's highest unemployment rate at 6.5%, nearly He called it "The three percentage points higher than the national rate and three times as high as some states.

How about education?

"I'm talking about a real transformation of our public education system, like we're doing right here in California," Newsom claimed. "By creating choices — real choices — for parents and unprecedented support for their kids."

What about the devastation that COVID-19 visited upon the state's nearly six million public school students, and the widening "achievement gap" between poor students and their more advantaged classmates? What about California's chronically poor perfor-

Newsom bragged about

the state's leading role in reducing greenhouse gases and reducing the dominance of hydrocarbons in transportation and utilities.

"At a time when we've been heating up and burning up, one thing we cannot do is repeat the mistakes of the past," Newsom said. "Embracing polluters. Drilling even more oil, which only leads to even more extreme weather, more extreme drought, more wildfire."


However, he said nothing about California's looming shortage of electrical power, already evident on hot summer days. Nor has he spelled out how the economic impacts of the conversion to an all-electric society will be alleviated.

Newsom did mention crime, at least in passing, but offered faint solace to victims of the state's rising crime rates, particularly the wave of homicide in the major cities.

"Our approach is to be neither indifferent to the realities of the present day, nor revert to heavy-handed policies that have marked the failures of the past," Newsom said, citing more money for both law enforcement and "new programs to tackle the root causes of crime, doubling down on proven violence prevention programs."

Bottom line: As a State of State speech, it was shockingly deficient. It sounded more like a kickoff to his re-election campaign.







Historic Sac State Turnaround Ends in First Round of Big Sky Tournament

BOISE, ID (MPG) - This isn't Mark Campbell's first rebuilding project.

The Hornets' (14-16, 10-11 Big Sky Conference) first-year head coach has been involved with rebuilding a women's college basketball program twice before, at Oregon State and then the University of Oregon, eventually leading both teams to the Final Four.

Which is why it should come as no surprise that in Campbell's first season at Sacramento State, his team improved by 11 games, elevating their win total from three to 14 in just one season. Additionally, 14-16 is the best first year record that Campbell has been a part of in a rebuilding project.

Before Campbell and his staff came to town, the Hornets had not won 14 games in a season for six years. The turnaround of the 2021-22 Sac State women's basketball team now ranks as the fourth largest in Big Sky history.

Sac State's impressive run came to an end Monday, March 7 in Boise, Idaho as the seventh seeded Hornets were defeated in the first round of the Big Sky Tournament by the tenth seeded Weber State Wildcats (11-19, 7-14) by a final score of 74-64.

The start of the game Monday could not have gone any better if you were rooting for the Hornets, as they got out

to an 11-2 lead after four minutes of action. The Wildcats began to chip away at the deficit, but Sac State led by six after one quarter, 20-14. The first period ended up being the only quarter the Hornets won all night.

Weber State edged Sac State in second quarter scoring 13-12 but trailed by five entering the locker room at halftime 32-27.

"In the first half, we shot ourselves in the foot," Campbell said. "We played incredible defense, made them miss. I think in the first half they had 17 offensive rebounds. If you finish those possessions, the game wouldn't have

been a five-point game at In a high scoring final halftime. In minutes of action, the

"Unfortunately, we played good enough defense in the first half and couldn't finish the possessions. We gave them hope and gave them life."

The Hornets extended their lead to seven just over a minute into the second half at 38-31. Then the Wildcats went on an 18-6 run over the final eight plus minutes of the third quarter to take a five-point lead into the fourth period.

Weber State outscored Sac State by 10 in the third quarter, 22-12, which ultimately ended up being the difference in the game. 10 minutes of action, the Wildcats kept control, outscoring the Hornets 25-20.

"At the end of the day, they scored 47 points in the second half," Campbell said. "We couldn't guard them in the second half and that's kind of been our Achilles heel. How far we went was always going to be dictated on how well we could defend and rebound and tonight we didn't do it well enough."

Big Sky Newcomer of the Year Isnelle Natabou got into foul trouble early in the game limiting her impact against Weber State. The sophomore center played 24 minutes, scoring 10 points on 5-of-6 from the field and grabbing six rebounds (three offensive).

(three offensive).

"I have struggled with early fouls in the game during (the) whole season and I'm very foul-prone," Natabou said. "It really helped me when my teammates and coach told me that I have to calm down. Because I know the rules, I know what I should be doing."

Without Natabou, the Hornets struggled on the boards being outre-bounded 38 to 25. 18 of those rebounds came on the offensive glass for the Wildcats, leading to 21

second chance points. In a game they lost by 10, Sac State was outscored by 12 in second chance points.

Big Sky Most Valuable Player of the Year Lianna Tillman led all scorers with a game-high 23 points on 10-of-25 field goal attempts and four assists. The Sac State graduate transfer was a perfect 3-of-3 from the free-throw line but missed all seven 3-point tries in her final collegiate appearance.

"For Lianna to have the season that she had, you guys it's truly remarkable," Campbell said. "The only player in all of college basketball that had numbers similar to her is Caitlin Clark at Iowa who might be the National Player of the Year."

Weber State senior guard Aloma Solovi had a team-high 20 points, six assists and two steals. Junior forward Daryn Hickok followed closely behind for the Wildcats with 19 points on 4-of-6 from the field and a stellar 11-of-12 from the charity stripe. By herself, Hickok made one more free throw than the entire Hornets team.

Both teams had four starters score in double figures.

"It's painful anytime your season comes to an end," Campbell said. "I'm just incredibly proud of this group and what they accomplished in our staff's first year. They just laid an incredible foundation that we'll be able to build upon."
