### **New Child Safety Seat Program Grant**

California Highway Patrol News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Highway Patrol's (CHP) received the California Restraint Safety Education and Training (CARSEAT) V grant to support its ongoing effort to improve child passenger safety. The CHP will use the grant funds to conduct public awareness campaigns, training courses, and enhanced-enforcement patrols through September 30, 2022.

The CARSEAT V campaign will focus on reducing the number of children killed and injured in traffic crashes throughout California. To accomplish this goal, the CHP will offer educational seminars, new parent classes, and appointments at local Area offices for child safety seat inspections and assistance with installations. These efforts will highlight the importance of safety seats and seat belts and provide information on the proper installation of child passenger safety seats.

"We are raising public awareness of the dangers of traveling with children in a vehicle who are not securely buckled into the appropriate child passenger safety seat," CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray said. "As a parent or caregiver, it is your responsibility to protect these vulnerable passengers."

California law requires a child to be properly restrained in an appropriate child safety seat in the rear seat of a vehicle until they are at least 8 years old.

# Shooter Call Brings River Day of the Dead a Smash Hit City HS to Alert ... Twice

**WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)** - West Sacramento was called out to River City High School Wednesday, Oct 27, 2021, because the school received a call from an anonymous caller saying that someone was going to come and "shoot up the school". Luckily, Wednesdays in the Washington Unified School District are minimum days. The call came in at 12:30 pm. The school went into immediate lock down.

Police were on the scene within 15 minutes. Since it was close to regular dismissal time, the decision was made to just dismiss the students. They were informed of the situation and the student body quickly vacated the school grounds. Police methodically checked the entire school grounds. After a complete search, they deemed the school safe, cleared the scene and deemed the call unfounded.

On Thursday morning everyone returned to school in a normal fashion. Then RCHS parents received this message:

"Today, we are reaching out to inform you that River City High School (RCHS) is currently implementing a soft lockdown in response to a new anonymous call received this morning by staff alleging a shooting threat to the campus. This call is similar to the call received yesterday.

The West Sacramento Police Department (WSPD) was contacted immediately and is investigating the threat, which is unsubstantiated at this time. The soft lockdown is a precautionary measure in accordance with our school safety plan. This means that students and staff will remain in their first-period classrooms and locations, and movement throughout the campus is prohibited at this time until the WSPD has concluded its investigation and determined it is safe to do so.

PLEASE DO NOT GO TO THE CAMPUS. We will keep you updated with new information as we receive it. Please take some slight comfort in knowing that ALL our students are safe and know that we handle any threat against our school safety with the utmost urgency." The school and scene were cleared by the beginning of second period.

Within the last couple of weeks, calls just like the ones received at RCHS have been received at High Schools across the country. Should the callers be caught, they will face terrorist charges. To date, no arrest has been made on this incident.

There were giveaways of gift cards and Harvest Day tickets donated by the News Ledger.

Part of the cultural education included Aztec dancers, who reminded everyone that the community is one big family. It was wonderful to see our Sikh and Muslim brothers and sisters join the Aztec Dancers in a Unity Dance. Yolo GOP members made balloon animals. The Regional Water Authority had a prize wheel with great water safety and water conservation prizes. Latino author, Samuel Ortega, author of several books on the Mexican Revolution gave books away.

River City High School students provided entertainment and cultural education. The MEChA Club had a photo backdrop with photo opportunities with Catrinas. RCHS's Asian Club taught children how to make cultural lanterns to honor the beloved departed. High school leader, Aurora Alatorre, organized and led 14 high school young women dancing to La Llorona.

Everything at the festival was free. This included the 1000 street tacos and 800 cups of corn that were cooked and given away. Dotty and David from Supervisor Gary Sandy's Office were in charge of Piñatas. Maria Garcia was in charge of face masks and brought an ensemble of violinists and flutes, that were composed of Russian and Latino young musicians from Riverbank Elementary.



WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Most of us just tried to stay inside our homes the Sunday of the biggest storm this area has seen in a very long time. For those who like the rain, it was an amazing day. For those who don't like the rain, it was horrible. Either way, it was definitely wet! West Sacramento Public Works Department and the Parks Grounds crews were not at home safe, however.

These men and women were out all day Sunday and Monday keeping drains unclogged, marking roads that were flooded, and cleaning up debris. Public Works provided images of just a couple of areas where there were difficulties. This flood road was at Harbor Blvd. and Beacon Blvd. The tree branch in the tree occurred at Drew St. and Fourness Drive. Thankfully, nobody was hurt.

West Sacramento Police and Fire personnel were out there working hard as well. Fire Department Administrative Captain, Andy Moore, said "Starting on 10/24/21 at 00:00 to 10/25/21 at 0800 (32 hours) the department responded to 59 incidents. This year's average, before the storm,

was 29 incidents per day." They cannot give an exact breakdown of types of incidents, but said that crews responded to numerous vehicle accidents, medical emergencies, public assists, fire alarms and other

miscellaneous call types.

As stated by City of West Sacramento's Public Information Officer, Paul Hosley, "We appreciate their dedication to keeping our city safe". I'm confident in saying, we all agree!

is no pre-registration. It is a rain or shine event. You must wear a mask (even though it's outside) throughout the event.

In addition, you must show that you are a West Sacramento resident (only one proof per household needed). You can prove this by showing a driver's license, utility bill (or some other kind of printed mail, not handwritten personal mail), medi-cal card, etc. All West Sac residents are welcome. Sounds like there will be a crazy long line, huh. It will be!

Every family will receive a full-size turkey, fresh produce and dry goods to complete the meal. Staff will mark how many people are in your household during the registration portion of the process. If the family needs additional food, you can always call the resource center at 916-572-0560.

In addition to the meal, families with children will receive (if needed) blankets, kids coats (up to 3 per household), diapers, family resources including vendor giveaways and vaccine opportunities. There will be a Food Only section for those families

Every year this event gets bigger. However, the year-round demand for food assistance suggests that there will be a 50 percent increase in Holiday Meal Kits this year. Gathering, packaging and transporting these Holiday Meal Kits is more expensive this year than ever before. Yolo Food Bank still faces \$200,000 in expenses to fully fund Thanksgiving for these neighbors in need.

As you can imagine, YCCA is looking for individuals and businesses to help out. There are many ways you can do this. You can donate \$50 for each meal that you would like to or can purchase for someone. In addition you can donate stock. Both of these can be done at: Yolo Food Bank, 233 Herter Ave. Woodland CA 95776.



**CHATTANOOGA, TN (MPG)** - I cannot adequately describe my feelings as I entered the Chattanooga National Cemetery where I had come to pay my respects and dedicate this story to these veterans. It is located not too far from the heart of the city of Chattanooga, Tennessee. Visiting this cemetery, even if you had little or no understanding about the Civil War, you would come away with a new perspective on our nation's history, and aren't we supposed to have a grasp of history (both good and bad), before we are doomed to repeat it?

In 1863, General Order No. 296 was issued to create a national cemetery to commemorate the Battles of Chattanooga in November 1863. Major General George H. Thomas, known as "The Rock of Chickamauga," issued this order, but it was not until 1867 that the cemetery gained a national designation. In all, there are 155 national cemeteries in 42 states and Puerto Rico; to find out where they are in your travels, go to www.cem.va.gov, for more information.

Why should you visit the Chattanooga National Cemetery? When you arrive at the cemetery and proceed to the administrative building for information, you may talk with Kevin Ritchey of Facilities Maintenance, who has a wealth of knowledge about the park. Kevin is also a U.S. Army combat veteran. The cemetery has many qualified volunteers to answer your questions and offer directions (all the volunteers are veterans), so if you want to visit the grave of Desmond Doss (the subject of the movie Hacksaw Ridge), they can get you there. You can visit the grave of an individual who has the unique distinction of being the only person buried here from the American Revolution.

The Chattanooga National Cemetery is 120 acres in size, and there are more than 41,000 veterans and their dependents resting here. Some of the highlights of cemetery include the Memorial Circle of Honor that was established in 1992. You can easily recognize the location by the American flag sitting atop the hill where it is said that

General Ulysses S. Grant had his headquarters while the Battle of Chattanooga was fought nearby. The Circle honors those from our nation's conflicts, and organizations have erected memorials in recognition of the sacrifices that were made during the Vietnam War, Korean War, World War II and more.

The first thing you see when you arrive is the Andrew's Raiders Monument. This monument is in honor of those individuals who aided the Union in the Civil War. The individuals honored here are among the first recipients of the Medal of Honor, our nation's highest military tribute "for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty."

In addition to the individuals buried here from the Civil War, the cemetery also is the final resting place for German soldiers who were prisoners of war from World War I and World War II. Each November, the German government honors these soldiers with a laying of the wreath at the German monument.

The Chattanooga National Cemetery was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1996. As with historic places, one must take time to observe and "feel" the surroundings. For instance, every monument or memorial arch has a story, and usually there is an inscription, or plaque or headstone that tells why that warranted being placed in this cemetery of honor.

The Chattanooga National Cemetery is an inspirational place to visit. I found that there is so much more to discover through the veterans buried here. Charles H. Coolidge, who was one of the last surviving Medal of Honor recipients from World Warr II, is buried here. In fact, if you want to study up on Medal of Honor recipients, you can visit the Charles H. Coolidge National Medal of Honor Heritage Center right here in Chattanooga.

As I said, a visit to this cemetery is very enlightening and truly educational! The closest national cemetery we have to Sacramento is in Dixon at the Sacramento Valley National Cemetery. It is the seventh national cemetery built in California and the 124th in the national cemetery system. It's a visit worth the time. Thank you, veterans!  $\star$





I had a little of that experience too. Rick (my husband) and I were married about four months when he was deployed to Vietnam. It was a long time ago, but it still hits home every Veteran's Day. I can still feel the emotions he and felt as we said goodbye at the airport, not knowing if we would ever see each other again, hoping and praying that we would. It was not a popular war as if any war is, but this one was very difficult for those who returned and the names they were called. After several months, we met for R&R in Hawaii. The joy was there, but dread too, because he had to return to Vietnam after just a few days. But we were grateful.

Thank God my First Lieutenant returned to me with no injuries on the outside, but what about the inside? We never really talked about all that went on for quite a few years. I felt he would share when he was ready. Perhaps it was better that he was a little older...about 24...and he took on the job of looking after some of the Them ALL !!!

younger guys to keep them out of trouble. I remember the letters he sent, which I still cherish and the cassette tapes we sent back and forth just talking about stuff. I can still remember hearing the pouring monsoons in the background and how he tried to keep busy painting his room.


After Hawaii, it was some months before he came home. It was over the New Year holiday, and I can still feel the terror when I did not know where he was as Saigon was falling. I heard nothing for days and then the call came from him that he was in Seattle. I was at Indiana University working on my Phd, but no gift or degree could have given me such joy as when I heard his voice.

I can't even imagine what it would be like to have a chaplain and officer come to my door, or know that his wounds were so bad, he would never be whole again. But it's been 50 years and we are still together. Please think of those brave souls who do this job for us and bring them home safe! Thank you for your service! God Bless

#### Dear Crislyn,

My guess is the guy's not really bankrupt, but it sounds like he has some maturity and character issues that need to be addressed. I'm not saying things can't change, but this is not someone to move in with or consider marrying anytime soon. You two would have a hard time as husband and wife unless he makes some real course corrections in his attitudes about money and life.

For starters, he needs to get another job, sell the expensive car and find a cheaper place to live. Leaving one position for another is okay, but deciding you just don't like something and walking away from it without another job waiting - especially when you've got bills and a bunch of debt is just plain irresponsible.

Lots of people identify too strongly with what they drive or where they live. They come to believe those things are indications of their value or worth, and that's sad. It means something inside them is broken, and bankruptcy isn't going to fix that.

All this doesn't mean he isn't basically a decent guy, but it does mean he needs to get control of his finances – and that he's got some soul searching and growing up to do.

### **ANIMALS" ELICIT MYSTERY**

#### "LAST NIGHT IN SOHO" RATED R

A trippy homage to swinging '60s London and twisted tale of time-travel to a horrific nightmare, Edgar Wright's "Last Night in Soho" often seems like the polarized world of the dark side of sex and graphic violence that would be the hallmark of a David Lynch film.

As a country girl from Cornwall with dreams of becoming a fashion designer, Ellie (Thomasin McKenzie) is about to venture forth to the big city of London, leaving behind her doting grandmother (Rita Tushingham).

Orphaned at a young age, Ellie aspires

mark at the 2019 Venice Film Festival and is now making its way to limited theaters.

A blurb on the poster calls it "A French Fargo," which might be a stretch but for the film's quirkiness and the fact that a snowstorm in rural France reminds one of a cruel winter in North Dakota.

How do five characters on two continents factor into the death of one socialite woman in the highlands of southern France where one can drive for miles and see nothing but snowdrifts and occasional livestock?

For one thing, director Dominick Moll may have been inspired by Kurosawa's "Rashomon" in that the film's structure of adopting successive points of view creates mystery and suspense. In the press notes, the director disabuses that notion, observing that everything revolves around the mystery of Evelyne Ducat (Valeria Bruni Tedeschi) where "the points of view of his characters are incomplete, intertwined, and do not necessarily cover the same period." Switching viewpoints, "Only the Animals" reveals the secret connections between a reclusive farmer, an unfaithful husband and wife, a lovelorn waitress and an African internet scam artist, exposing a world of greed, lust, betrayal, and loneliness. The film opens in the shantytowns of Ivory Coast's capital city where Armand (Guy Roger N'drin), a young black man, is seen riding a scooter with a goat on his back. Your first thought is how does he figure in the story? From coastal Africa, we move quickly to a frigid winter in rural France where married social worker Alice (Laure Calamy) is having an affair with morose farmer Joseph (Damien Bonnard). Alice is the first to spot Evelyne's abandoned car on the side of a desolate road. The police question Joseph who claims to know nothing about the driver but why are strange things happening on his property?

The unsophisticated Ellie proves to be an outcast to the hip other girls at the fashion school. Her mean-girl roommate and the other party girls are so obnoxious that she leaves her dorm for a Soho rooming house run by Ms. Collins (Diana Rigg in her last movie role).

Any doubt that Ellie has ventured into the mid-1960s is dispelled when emerging onto a street where a movie theater's marquee hosts an oversized poster of Sean Connery as James Bond in "Thunderball."

As Sandie's carefree lifestyle in Soho looms large in Ellie's mind, the fashion student becomes so increasingly fixated on her alter ego's world that she dyes her hair blonde and dresses in vintage clothes.

At times it seems like Ellie is inhabiting Sandie's body, but soon recoils at the advances made by Sandie's pimp Jack (Matt Walsh), a slick scoundrel with an ugly streak of thuggish behavior. The glamorous world of Sandie is a total illusion.

"Last Night in Soho" is ultimately a psychological thriller that offers more style than substance, and that would not be so bad but for the increasingly repetitive nature of the horror elements of ghoulish men as disturbing visions.

On the other hand, while the Sixties nostalgia of great music and fashions delights, Anna Taylor-Joy brings the era so vividly to life that one wishes her screen time would have been even greater.







Ever notice that we treat our elected officials very kindly? We call them the recent laws from the State "Honorable." We stand when they walk in. We ask them to sit at the head table. We may curry favor with them for future gain. However, while we should absolutely treat people kindly and with respect, we may be planting the seeds of our own problems with this underlying deference!

Electeds begin to think "I'm all that, plus a bag of chips!" You see, they begin to believe their own public relations messaging. Within the State Capitol we call it "memberitis". Per Matthew 23:6, "They love the place of honor important seats in the synthey are "hot stuff", rather than simply as our elected employees – which is how we should treat them. Respectfully, honestly, but as our employees who we hold accountable as their employers.

The result of this favorable treatment is we have people running for office for all the wrong reasons! Not everyone, but many seek fame, ego, power, or privilege, rather than run as a public servant. me, "I'm not sure why." They know that it may be unlikely for them to win but simply running brings exposure and notoriety. It's almost a game.

Then, if elected, do they know why they are there? It's unlikely they have any grounding in constitutional responsibilities or even basic managerial skills. They pursue whatever their imaginations conceive and frequently have NO sense of priorities. ### Farmers Lose Two Skirmishes Celebrate Pioneer Day in Coloma in California Water War

The most important battleground in California's perpetual war over water is the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta.

Dozens of Northern California rivers and streams coalesce in the Sacramento and San Joaquin rivers, which join to form the Delta estuary and whose waters then flow into San Francisco Bay.

The state's massive water infrastructure was constructed on an assumption that water left to flow to the sea was wasted. The web of reservoirs and canals diverts river and Delta water to farms in the Sacramento and San Joaquin Valleys and domestic users as far south as San Diego.

However, in recent decades environmental groups and their allies, such as Indian tribes and fishermen, have demanded reductions in diversions, arguing that they severely damage habitat for fish, such as spawning salmon, and other wildlife.

The conflict has been played out in multiple arenas - the Legislature, Congress, federal and state regulatory agencies and the courts. It's been trench warfare with long periods of stalemate, occasional gains by one side or the other and periodic

attempts at armistice. A few years ago, the state Water Resources Control Board was poised to impose some limits on diversions that the agricultural industry saw as draconian particularly since the state Joaquin agencies could rewas also beginning to regulate farmers' ability to pump groundwater to fill gaps in surface water supplies.

Govs. Jerry Brown and Gavin Newsom wanted to head off a full-fledged legal showdown by urging "voluntary agreements" on river flows acceptable to both farm water agencies and the water board and negotiations have been underway for several years.

One such agreement affecting the Sacramento River and its tributaries appears headed for adoption, but this month, the draft of a second affecting the San Joaquin River hit a huge roadblock. In a letter to the river's major diverters, the Newsom administration rejected their proposal and said it would urge the water board to resume direct regulation of San Joaquin flows.

Environmental Protection Secretary Jared Blumenfeld and Natural Resources Secretary Wade Crowfoot told the San Joaquin districts that "at this point it is clear that despite considerable efforts, proposed voluntary actions by water agencies on the San Joaquin River tributaries have fallen short of needed flow and habitat improvements, and viable proposals are not being offered at this time."

The two administration officials added, "We will ask the State Water Board to resume all activities necessary to implement the flow objectives established by the

2018 Bay-Delta Plan for the Lower San Joaquin River and its three major tributaries, the Stanislaus, Tuolumne, and Merced rivers."

Although Blumenfeld and Crowfoot said the San enter the process "if they propose necessary levels of additional water flows and habitat," their rejection letter sets the stage for political and legal warfare. San Joaquin Valley farmers see the water board's pending actions as severely damaging their ability to continue operations.

Dave Eggerton, executive director of the Association of California Water Agencies called the administration letter "very concerning" because of the potential for all-out legal war.

However, as news of the letter spread in the water community, environmental groups celebrated. They had long viewed the "voluntary agreement" process as a tool to subvert stricter regulation necessary to protect habitat.

They scored another win last week when Fresno Superior Court Judge D. Tyler Tharpe refused to validate a very controversial water supply contract that the huge Westlands Water District obtained from the Trump administration. In his ruling, Tharpe cited procedural irregularities, including violation of state open meeting laws.

Thus, as drought grips California, the battles over the state's very limited supply of water seem destined to intensify.


# No Doubt: Seniors are Tough Old Birds

WASHINGTON, DC (MPG) - It's not easy getting old. When times are bad they're worse for the elderly and no better example is there than the times in which we've been living for the past twelve months or so - in the year of the COVID-19 pandemic. There's no doubt that the older you are the more physically vulnerable you can be to the coronavirus, but there's evidence that aging can also turn us into mentally tougher "old birds," as the saying goes, according to Rebecca Weber, CEO of the Association of Mature American Citizens [AMAC].

There was concern across the board when the pandemic got started that there would be a "mental health crisis" among the older population due to COVID based restrictions on contact with friends and family. But according to an article in JAMA, the Journal of the American Medical Association, there is "evidence suggesting that, counter to expectation, older adults as a group may be more resilient to the anxiety, depression, and stress-related mental health disorders characteristic of younger populations during the initial phase of the COVID-19 pandemic."

The article cites a study by the Centers for Disease Control that showed "933 participants aged 65 years or older reported significantly lower percentages of anxiety disorder (6.2%), depressive disorder (5.8%),



But that doesn't mean seniors are not lonely, says Weber. "How can you not be lonely when interpersonal relationships are suddenly curtailed. But it appears that the older you get the better able you are emotional problems." to cope psychologically with loneliness."

#### **Free Bagged Leaf Collection**

#### Make sure you are following these guidelines:

- Bagged leaves only.
- Individual bags may not weigh more than 50 pounds.
- Paper or ATSM D6400 rated compostable bags only.
- Place leaf bags next to your organics cart on collection day.
- Do not leave unbagged leaf piles in the street.

#### Leaf Bag Set-out Collection Schedule

Weekly pickup during leaf drop season (Nov. 1 - Jan. 31)

#### **Organics Cart Service**

#### **A Cleaner Solution**

Use your organics cart to dispose of organic waste and help keep West Sacramento storm drains free of leaves.

#### Weekly Organics Cart Guidelines:

- Ensure cart lids can close.
- Only place green waste, food scraps, and food-soiled paper in cart. Do not place food waste or food soiled paper in leaf bags.
- Excess branches and pruning no larger than three (3) feet long and two (2) inches in diameter, weighing no more than fifty (50) pounds may be tied in bundles and placed next to the organics cart.



No plastic, glass, metal, treated wood, rocks or dirt, hazardous or pet waste. No plastic or foil coated paper.
