Distracted **Driving: Is It** Worth It?

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Every year, thousands of people are seriously injured or killed statewide in vehicle crashes caused by distracted drivers. To combat this issue, the California Highway Patrol (CHP) received the Adult Distracted Drivers (ADD) XII grant to keep California roads safe through education and enforcement.

"Distracted driving is a serious issue that is 100 percent preventable," said CHP Commissioner Amanda Ray. "We are encouraging drivers to make a conscious choice to not drive distracted. This simple decision can have a tremendous positive impact on the safety of California's roadways."

Drivers who choose to drive distracted exponentially increase the odds of being involved in a vehicle crash. According to data from the CHP's Statewide Integrated Traffic Records System, in 2019 there were nearly 19,000 crashes where driver inattention played a role. Of the 9,371 drivers involved in a fatal or injury distracted driving crash that year, nearly 10

percent cited cell phone use as the source of inattention.

Though there are numerous distractions for a driver, cell phones are the most prevalent. Handheld cell phone use while driving is not only illegal in California, it is an unsafe activity behind the wheel. In California, drivers under the age of 18 are prohibited from using a cell phone while driving for any reason, including hands-free devices.

"Driving safely requires complete attention, so it is best to stay focused on the road. Distraction behind the wheel jeopardizes your safety, your passengers' safety, and the wellbeing of those around you," Commissioner Ray added.

Funds from the ADD grant will help support the CHP's completion of at least 400 traffic safety presentations statewide and a minimum of 80 distracted driving enforcement operations between October 1, 2021, and September 30, 2022.

Funding for this program is provided by a grant from the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - For many independent artists and makers, 2020 was a devastating blow because of all the COVID-19 related event closures.

Now there is a feeling of hope amongst many of these small businesses because they are able to once again participate in events like the Sacramento Harvest Festival, happening November 19-21 at Cal Expo.

"In 2020, we had a temporary rebrand to 'Harvest Market' which allowed us to operate under the same regulations that Farmer's Markets did," said Nancy Glenn, owner of the Harvest Festival Original Art and Craft Show. "We did unfortunately lose some exhibitors who couldn't weather the storm, but we are starting to see that many of our exhibitors are finally beginning to feel optimistic about the future."

The Harvest Festival is known as one of the West Coast's premier art and craft shows, and hundreds of artists depend on the annual show as a platform to sell their products. Many of the exhibitors don't have brick and mortar storefronts, and some don't even have websites.

"Our show was built on supporting the independent artist and small businessperson, so we are extremely glad to be able to continue that mission," said Glenn.

The festival says it is following all health guidelines set forth by the county and the state.

The Sacramento Harvest Festival boasts thousands of American handmade crafts, including original art, jewelry, pottery, clothing, specialty foods, home décor and much more. Throughout the weekend there will also be strolling entertainment, delicious festival foods, artist demonstrations and more.



The Teacher Shortage

Continued from page 1 having adequate support during these days has shown a negative impact on students' achievement. Substitute teachers maintain healthy and successful learning environments for students and provide teachers the time and energy they need to build their professional skills to best support students.

Full-time teachers could take advantage of professional learning, networking and collaboration opportunities. Most importantly, teachers felt secure and confident knowing students continued receiving a highquality education without skipping a beat.

California is investing in teachers this year but there needs to be more focus on substitutes as part of the solution.

To expand the pool of potential substitute teachers, state policymakers need to collaborate and reexamine CalSTRS existing policies that prevent retired teachers, under state and federal law, from

doing substitute teaching within their first six months of retirement. Retired teachers have experience leading students through their educational journeys and are familiar with the communities they served.

Having opportunities for retired teachers to temporarily work to continue helping local schools while solving a statewide shortage of teachers is a short-term solution, but one that is needed this school year.

Having the support of policymakers is only part of the solution. The support and involvement of all our communities is also important to make a difference; this is how you can help; Research requirements to be a substitute teacher and see if this is a good fit for you or someone you might know. This can be your way of giving back to your community and helping our next generation of young scholars; Call your local district and neighborhood schools and find out how you can provide

additional support on campuses. If not as a substitute, it's likely volunteers are needed; Attend career job fairs to learn more about what it takes to be an educator in today's world and how you can support districts who might need higher levels of support.

Recruiting and retaining enough substitute teachers to help solve the shortage won't be an easy task. This is a statewide problem that will be solved locally with the help of many people, people like you. Even if you've never worked in education, take a moment to learn more. What could be an occasional day of work for you could be what provides the consistency students in your town need to learn, grow and succeed.

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The holiday season is upon us, and with the excitement that comes with the holidays, many unexpectedly find themselves easy targets for criminal activity. Police Chief Robert Strange would like to remind the West Sacramento Community of some holiday safety tips to help you and your loved ones stay safe and have a joyful holiday season.

Shopping

Don't display large amounts of cash; Always walk and park in well-lit areas. Park close to the entrance of the store shopping center, if possible; Don't talk on a cell phone when walking through parking lots and streets. Your phone conversation is a distraction that makes you vulnerable. Keep your full attention on your surroundings. Also, your cell phone itself can be a tempting target to thieves; If you are ready to leave a shopping center and feel uneasy about entering the parking lot by yourself, stay inside and ask for a security escort; Don't fumble for car keys. Have them in your hand, ready to use when you reach the car; If you believe someone is following you, cross the street, switch directions, walk into a store or restaurant. If you are really scared, yell or make noise to attract attention. Don't be embarrassed. Your safety is more important.

Home and Delivered Packages

Always lock your doors and windows, even if you plan to be out for a short while; Leave lights turned on both inside and outside your residence after dark. Criminals don't like bright places; If you will be away from home for several days, make arrangements for someone to pick up your mail, newspapers and packages. An overstuffed mailbox, or items left for days at a time is a sure sign that no one is home, and burglars are tempted to check those spaces for holiday gifts; When returning home after a shopping trip, have the house keys

Safe exchange zones for online transactions

Much of holiday shopping is now happening online. If you need to meet in person to complete a transaction initiated online, use a safe exchange zone such as the one in front of the West Sacramento Police Department at 550 Jefferson Blvd. during daylight hours.

Some additional safety tips for completing online transactions:

Make sure the exchange takes place in a well-lit area that is heavily traveled; Ask for the identification of the other party. Take a picture of their identification and vehicle they are driving; Do not bring cash. Require payment using a cash transfer app; If something doesn't feel right or the other party is making you uncomfortable, do not continue with the transaction. Instead, go inside the police department and use the red phone to report any suspicious activity.

Your holiday trash says a lot about you

The boxes that your gifts come in say a lot about what is in your home. Descriptive packaging advertises to the world that we have a new computer, television, video players, games and other expensive electronic equipment.

Burglars are known to canvass neighborhoods looking for items of value and they need look no farther than the curbside on trash day to see what they can steal. Don't advertise to a thief what gift you received during the holiday. Instead break down those gift boxes, then place the pieces inside out, when possible, or place in a trash receptacle.

Vehicle Safety

Always lock your car, even if you are away for only a few moments; Do not leave valuables - gifts, cell phones, purse or clothing – in open view in your car. Take valuables with you, lock them in vour trunk, or cover them in an unobtrusive way. Thieves are doing their own form of window shopping; When you return to your vehicle after your shopping trip, lock your car door as soon as you get in.

Traffic Safety

The highest yearly volume of DUI related arrests, citations and accidents is between the day before Thanksgiving and New Year's Eve. During this time of celebrating and heavy alcohol consumption, 40 percent of traffic fatalities are caused by a drunk driver. Check Those Smoke Alarm Batteries

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - It's always surprising how many people aren't aware of the recommended your loved ones is why it is practice to change the batteries in your smoke alarm/ smoke detector each time that Daylight Savings Time begins and ends. Well, it's that time of year again. That's right, change the batteries twice a year and test them once a month! Does that seem excessive to you? Well, think about this, nobody ever plans on their house catching on fire. According to the National Fire Protection Association, in the year 2020, an estimated 379,500 residential structure fires caused 2,630 deaths and 11,900 civilian injuries. On top of that, 3 out of 5 home fire deaths took place in homes with no smoke alarm or a failed smoke alarm. Out of those that died when to make sure that they don't there was a working smoke alarm, 22% of them had been alerted by the alarm, but did not respond and 11% did not hear the alarm. By far, the most common reason for a failed smoke alarm is failed power to the device. Smoke alarms can be hard wired only, hard wired with a battery backup or battery only. In addition, there carbon monoxide detectors are alarms that respond to heat, respond to smoke, or an expiration date! Typically, house can be completely

respond to both. Regardless they are designed to have of the type that you have, it a 5-7-year life. To find out won't respond at all if it has no power supply.

Your life, and the lives of so important to change the batteries twice a year and check them monthly. The easiest way to remember, is to change them when you change your clocks. The only exception to this time frame is when your smoke alarm is powered by lithium batteries. Lithium batteries are known as 10-year batteries, but fire personnel suggest checking them every 6–7 years. Since having a working smoke detector more than doubles one's chance of surviving a fire, there are a couple of other important facts you should be aware of. Smoke detectors may not work properly if they are not clean. Clean your smoke detectors? That just means have paint in them, or sheetrock and that they are not caked with dust. In a kitchen, make sure that grease has not built up. The best way to keep them free of dust and debris is to periodically spray them with compressed air, like you would use on your computer.

when the expiration date is on your alarm, when you take it down to change the batteries, there should be a sticker with the date on it. Be sure to note if that date is the expiration or installation date. If there is not date, look up that model and figure out the expiration date, then mark the device.

Home fires usually start by cooking, faulty wiring/ appliances, smoking, chimney fires or something being too close to a heat source. With the holidays coming, and many people will be decorating with lights, if you plug something in and your lights flicker or dim, unplug what you plugged in and get your electrical checked by a professional. In only 3 ¹/₂ minutes, the heat from a house fire can reach over 1100 degrees Fahrenheit. In rooms that are not even on fire, the temperature can reach over 300 degrees. That is hot enough to kill the people in those rooms. In addition to the extreme heat, fire produces gases and fumes that make you sleepy, weak, and confused. You can't smell these fumes, so if you are asleep the smell won't wake you up, but a smoke alarm will.

Another thing to be aware of is that smoke detectors and have an expiration date! Yes,

These scams accounted for nearly 40% of all scams reported to BBB Scam Tracker in 2020, according to the 2020 BBB Scam Tracker Risk Report. Shortages are likely to make purchase scams even more common as desperate shoppers turn to shady websites in hopes of finding this year's must-have gift.





Here's What "Everyday Low Prices" **Can Teach Us About Health Care**

"Everyday low prices" are coming to health care. Walmart recently launched its own analog insulin, a synthetic form of the hormone that's genetically modified to be released rapidly or slowly, depending on a manufactured by pharmaceutical giant Novo Nordisk - but cost 75% less than brand-name analog insulin.

The deal stands out as proof that markets can deliver outcomes that work for producers and consumers alike - if we let them.

Generally speaking, the "market" for medicines is dysfunctional. It bears little resemblance to the markets for groceries or electronics, where consumers can compare prices and product reviews, shop around for the best deal, and purchase what they want.

Instead, patients typically pay for prescription percentage of a drug's nominal price – and their insurer pays the rest.

The exact co-pays and co-insurance are determined by entities called pharmacy benefit managers – middlemen hired by insurers to administer drug plans and negotiate drug prices with pharmaceutical companies.

Because PBMs decide which medicines are, and aren't, available through a given plan, they have immense leverage over pharmaceutical companies. Three PBMs handle more than 70 percent of prescriptions filled in the United States.

That leverage allows person's needs. It will be them to extract deep discounts from drug manufacturers. If drug makers want to have their products included on an insurer's formulary, they have to pay up. If they don't, the PBM will simply go with a drug maker that will.

In the market for insulin, PBMs routinely extract discounts exceeding 70%. They pocket some of that money and pass the bulk along to insurers.

Patients, meanwhile, pay a percentage of the insulin's full list price, which is many times higher than what the President, CEO, and PBM negotiated with the Thomas W. Smith Fellow manufacturer.

responsible for a co-pay increased 140%, from or co-insurance – a set about \$150 to more than \$350 per vial. But the amount of net revenue that Sanofi received, after paying discounts to insurers and PBMs, declined 41% during that time period.

> Those insurers and PBMs didn't share those rebates directly with the people buying insulin. Instead, consumers had to cover for co-pays and co-insurance based on the escalating list price.

A patient with a 25% co-insurance requirement on a \$350 drug got a bill for \$87.50 at the pharmacy. That co-pay is greater than Sanofi actually received in total.

By cutting out these middlemen and selling directly to retailers like Walmart, drug makers can maintain or even increase their profit margins. The retailers charge a small mark-up, just as they do for everything they sell.

And in this case, patients save money, too.

Middlemen siphon billions of dollars out of the healthcare system each year - while providing questionable value to consumers. As the deal between Walmart and Novo Nordisk shows, market principles offer a better way.

The DMV has answers! Changes to the deadline, limited-time fee waivers, and a simplified application process have all been recently announced. Read below for details on how to get your REAL ID.

Q: I Paid The Fee To Renew My Driver's License Online Last Year, But Offices Were Closed Due To COVID-19, So I Couldn't Get a REAL ID. Will I Have To Pay A Fee Again To Upgrade To The REAL ID This Year?

A: No! For a limited time, customers who have recently renewed a driver's license or identification card that is not federally compliant will be able to upgrade to a REAL ID for free! If you paid a fee to renew a driver's license or ID card between since March 2020, you will qualify but you must act now the free REAL ID upgrade is only available until the end of the year.

The DMV is offering this free upgrade as a part of their continual efforts to accommodate customers who faced barriers due to COVID-19. It's important that everyone who is eligible and wants one can get a REAL ID. In May 2023, anyone flying domestically, visiting a military base or other federal facility will need a form of federal ID, like a REAL ID, to do so.

Netflix is getting in on the action with its hybrid release of the comedy action film "Red Notice," which was released in theaters for one week prior to its debut on its streaming service.

With an all-star cast of Dwayne Johnson, Ryan Reynolds and the striking Israeli actress and model Gal Gadot ("Wonder Woman"), "Red Notice" probably benefits from the marketing tool of exposure on the big screen.

Netflix went big in other ways as well, staging a live premiere event at the L.A. Live event complex, which as recounted in "The Hollywood Reporter" trade publication "delivered a scene reminiscent of a major Hollywood award show."

"Red Notice" takes its title from an Interpol advisory to its member countries that a fugitive fleeing a country is internationally wanted for evading justice. This would apply to Ryan Reynolds' Nolan Booth, an international art thief trying to steal a historic golden egg.

As legend goes according to the film's fictional prologue, Cleopatra was gifted three Faberge-like golden eggs, of which two were discovered and the third missing one is the target of fortune hunters we've seen in films like "Indiana Jones" and "National Treasure."

A notorious criminal like Nolan Booth will spare no effort to steal a precious golden egg, and he manages to get caught after being tracked to Rome by none other than Dwight Johnson's FBI Agent John Hartley.

After Booth gets sent to an isolated Russian prison that feels like a Soviet gulag, Hartley himself ends up there as well subsequently getting framed for the heist by Gal Gadot's The Bishop, another art thief eager to piece together a three the children.

Another bad guy in the picture is the oddly-name Sotto Voce (Chris Diamantopoulus), a diminutive arms dealer whose fancy party is infiltrated by Booth and Hartley, and The Bishop shows up in a slinky red dress for a choreographed fight with them.

Sotto Voce is as about a ludicrous villain as you can imagine. For no apparent reason, other than maybe emulating Vladimir Putin, he takes his shirt off to reveal his tattooed torso while threatening Booth and Hartley still chained to a post after being tortured.

One obvious point about this comedic heist caper is that despite its not-so-disguised lifting of thematic elements other action films, the stellar cast of the three leading characters are the selling point to fun adventure.

Speaking of a copycat formula, a climactic scene involves an adventure into the Argentinian jungle in search of the missing egg hidden in an underground Nazi warehouse that reminds one of "Raiders of the Lost Ark."

"Red Notice," and this is not necessarily a bad thing, is running on its star power of charismatic actors doing their usual stuff. That would mean Ryan Reynolds' comic riffs, Dwayne Johnson's stoic intensity and Gal Gadot's sexy allure and streetwise toughness.

Something endearing about "Red Notice," with all of its hijinks and caustic banter, is that in spite of its huge budget there is no pretention of artistic merit. This is not an entertainment for high-brow critics. It's nothing more than just escapist fun.

Dare to view the closing moment of "Red Notice" and not think a sequel is either already in the works or the producers await a public clamoring for the next installment. The actors are certainly charismatic enough to warrant a return engagement.



Time to Punish Big Tech's IP Theft

Owners of the Apple Watch might be walking around with stolen goods strapped to their wrist. In a complaint filed with the U.S. International Trade Commission this summer, medical device firm Masimo Corporation accuses Apple of stealing patented technology for measuring blood oxygen levels and incorporating that tech into the popular smartwatch.

Masimo's claims aren't farfetched. For tech behemoths like Apple and Google, appropriating intellectual property (IP) is an all-too-common strategy for maintaining market dominance.

The public and shareholders need to hold these tech firms accountable. Cracking down on Big Tech's predatory IP violations is the only way to defend the rights of inventors and start-ups, while promoting market competition that benefits consumers.

In August, a trade judge ruled that Google violated five different patents owned by speaker-maker Sonos. The principle guiding such behavior is obvious: If you can't beat your smaller competitors, steal from them outright. Odds are, your victim won't have the time or the money to defend their right in court. But if they do, Big Tech will be ready with an army of top-tier lawvers.

Lately though, small companies have been calling their bluff - and winning in court. With losses in the hundreds of millions, it's hard to imagine how executives at these tech firms justify their decision to shareholders.

By denying inventors a chance and Apple are suppressing the competition that would otherwise

benefit consumers by driving that infringement entails signifidown prices.

Major tech firms counter these accusations by claiming that IP protections are too stringent, and that the patent holders are the ones engaging in anti-competitive behavior.

Such arguments are at best a distraction. At worst, these arguments are meant to fool the courts. The ability of a patent holder to seek licensing fees from others who want to use the technology is one of the primary benefits of a patent – and of a free market.

The real threat to competition technology companies must learn of Law.







American Innovators, not Regulators, Will Solve Climate Change

President Biden has pledged to cut America's greenhouse gas emissions in half by 2030. He intends to meet this ambitious target through a wave of new federal spending and government programs. Yet, our best hope for reducing carbon emissions isn't new government spending. It's a technological sea-change – one that can only come from the private sector.

Government is slowing progress against climate change by imposing regulations that prevent emissions-lowering technologies from reaching the market. If our leaders really want to save the planet, they need to get out of the way of entrepreneurs who can actually do so.

One would expect the government to embrace technology with the potential to cut carbon pollution. President Biden himself has promised to "spur American technological innovation" as part of his climate agenda.

Unfortunately, some of the most promising green-tech breakthroughs face severe headwinds as a result of misguided or antiquated federal policies.

One such technology – profiled in "They Say It Can't Be Done," a new documentary on the relationship between innovators and regulations – is an artificial tree developed by Arizona State University physicist and engineer Klaus Lackner. These manmade trees contain a special plastic resin that can absorb carbon dioxide and release it when submerged in water. They're 1,000 times more effective at taking in carbon dioxide from the air than natural trees. Once captured, this carbon dioxide can then be reclaimed and converted into fuel.

Lackner's design could be scaled to produce units that each remove a metric ton of carbon dioxide daily. The main stumbling block is the lack of clear regulations surrounding carbon capture technologies.

Until a uniform federal framework exists, the process of bringing this technology to market will remain impossibly complicated and fraught with risk. Or consider technologies that could reduce the need for large-scale livestock farming. Raising billions of chickens, pigs, and cattle requires vast amounts of water, feed, and land. The resulting carbon footprint is massive – about 7.1 gigatons of greenhouse gases a year.

Here too, new technologies could help reduce emissions. Researchers are designing cell-cultured meat produced in the lab rather than the feedlot. This lab-grown protein is safe, healthy, and far less carbonintensive than traditionally farmed meat.

One start-up that makes lab-grown meat, Eat Just Inc., has obtained approval to sell its cell-cultured chicken in Singapore. But it's still waiting on the green light from American regulators. According to the firm's founder, it could be another year – or more – before U.S. approval comes through.

For an industry as capital-intensive as cultured meat production, this sluggish approval process can make it impossible for a start-up to launch and get its products to market.

High-tech solutions like these are precisely what's required to protect our planet from the threat of climate change. While it's impossible to say whether lab-grown meat or artificial trees are the best solution, an accessible and level regulatory playing field allows the best innovations to thrive.

Too many Americans believe that when it comes to climate change, only the government is up to the task. The fact is, the main barrier to large-scale adoption of sustainable technologies isn't a lack of government involvement, but too much – or at least the wrong kind.

In order to make good on his promise to reduce the nation's carbon footprint, the president and his team will need to recognize how government obstructs the development and deployment of technology that can fulfill that promise.

A Confusing Array of Sports Social Security Matters Is Waiting until 70 Still the Best **Betting Measures** Plan to Maximize Social Security?

Memo to California voters: Prepare to be confused because you could be facing four competing ballot measures next year to legalize sports wagering.

Indian tribes that now have a monopoly on casino gambling in California, big on-line sports betting corporations, horse racing tracks, and local poker parlors are jousting for control of what could be countless billions of dollars in bets on sporting events.

Following a 2018 U.S. Supreme Court ruling that made sports betting legal, a number of other states have accepted it, and the major professional sports leagues, which condemned sports betting for decades, have struck deals with major online betting operations.

However, years of efforts in the California Legislature to fashion a system acceptable to all The legislative stalemate meant – as it often does in California – a shift to the alternative arena of ballot measures.

Major casino-owning tribes struck first with a measure that would extend their gambling monopoly to sports wagering, qualifying it for the 2022 ballot. In reaction, three other

initiatives are in the works, original tribal measure, each of which would benefit its sponsor in some way, but it's not certain that all will make the ballot. Although the election is a year away, the calendar for qualifying measures is fairly advanced and sponsors will have to hustle to make it - which means spending millions of dollars for professional signature-gathering

campaigns. The tribal measure already ticketed for the ballot would require sports wagers to be placed either in existing casinos or in locations owned by the tribes. It also would allow sports wagers at major horse racing tracks - an obvious ploy to dampen potential opposition - but would not allow on-line bets on sports events.

The measure, if passed, would block DraftKings and FanDuel, the two major on-line wagering outfits that yearn to operate in California. But it also includes a sly legal attack on the local poker parlors, which have long feuded with the casino tribes, and the cardrooms struck back with a measure of their own that would allow them to accept sports wagers.

Very quickly, DraftKings stakeholders fell short. and FanDuel pledged millions of dollars for a third measure that would allow them to operate in California and have drawn support from some big city mayors by promising that their proposal would provide money to deal with homelessness.

> Finally, three casinoowning tribes, two of which have backed the

are floating a fourth measure that would allow on-line betting controlled by the tribes. It's a hedge against the DraftKings-FanDuel measure because it assumes that given a choice between wagering on-line or driving to a casino to place a bet, betters would prefer the former.

Millions of dollars are already being spent by the sponsors of the four measures and they've commenced hostilities with dueling public relations campaigns in advance of what promises to be a tsunami of television and on-line advertising to persuade voters to choose one over the others.

It would surprise no one if hundreds of millions of dollars are spent on the campaigns next year, because the millions would be pocket lint compared to the billions of wagering dollars that would flow through the hands of whichever interests can claim legal authority.

That said, it's also possible that the campaigns will be short-circuited by a political deal. Those who sponsor ballot measures can remove them from the ballot if their demands are met by legislation.

Given the years of legislative stalemate on the issue, it's difficult to see the competing interests agreeing to divvy up the pie, but it's not an impossible resolution.

Dear Rusty: My wife started her Social Security at 62 in March 2017 and I filed a Restricted Application to collect a spouse benefit from her shortly thereafter. Our plan is for me to file for my own Social Security later this year when I turn 70. Then my wife will file for her spousal benefit from me. Our life expectancy is 93 & 96. Is this still the best plan for maximum payments? Signed: Planning Ahead

Dear Planning: Yes excellent strategy, and one which is no longer available to younger beneficiaries. The Restricted Application option you chose, to get only spouse benefits and let your own increase, was eliminated for anyone born after January 1, 1954.

When you turn 70, you will be eligible for your maximum SS retirement be automatically awarded benefit to start at that time. Social Security recommends that you apply about 3 months before you wish benefits to begin (you will specify on the appli-



benefits to start), so you can apply before your birthday if you like but just be sure to be explicit that your benefit-start-month is the month you turn 70. That way, you won't lose any of the Delayed Retirement Credits (DRCs) you've been accumulating since you reached your full retirement age (FRA) of 66. Your benefit at age 70 will be 32% more than it would have been at age 66.

Note that when you apply, Social Security will probably offer to pay you 6 months of retroactive benefits. Although that lump sum can be quite tempting, accepting it will also reduce your Social for information pur-Security benefit amount poses only and does not indeed. After you have submitted your application for Social Security retirement benefits your current spousal benefit will stop as soon as your higher benefit starts. After you apply for your age 70 benefit, your wife's spousal benefit will when your own benefit begins (automatic because she was born after January 1, 1954). For information, your wife's spousal benefit will be based upon your cation when you want full retirement age benefit

amount, not the increased amount you will receive because you delayed until age 70. You should also be aware that your wife's benefit as your spouse will be less than 50% of your FRA benefit amount because she claimed her own benefit at age 62 (claiming her own benefit early affects her spousal benefit amount).

Nevertheless, with a life expectancy in your 90s you have chosen an excellent strategy which will pay you the highest possible monthly amount and the most in lifetime cumulative benefits, while also providing the highest possible survivor benefit for your wife should you die first. Although waiting until age 70 to claim isn't the right decision for everyone, in your specific case I congratulate you for making a very wise choice.

Retirement Brings with It Extra Time

Singer Jim Croce longed to put time in a bottle.

Retirees aren't always certain what it is they long to do with time, but one day they stop working and find they have a barrelful of it.

"People often are so focused on making sure they are financially ready to retire that they forget to plan for what they want to do in retirement," says Patti Hart, coauthor with her husband, Milledge, of The Resolutionist: Welcome to the Anti-Retirement Movement.

"And they may have more time to fill than they realize. Life expectancy has grown, and retirements that last 20 years, 30 years, or longer aren't that unusual. So you have to start thinking, what will you do with your time? How do you envision your days playing out?"

For the Harts, the answers to those questions involve the "antiretirement movement," where retirement is more than a rocking chair on a front porch or endless hours of golf.

"We did leave our careers, but we would never call ourselves retired," Milledge Hart says. "We are busier now than we've ever been. The difference is that we are busy doing what brings us joy rather than what advances our careers."

But the transition isn't always easy, which is why the Harts recommend finding efficient ways to manage that extra time the postcareer years bring.

Patti Hart cautions that time management does not have to mean blocking out every minute.

"For most people, it is just setting goals and priorities, then making sure you plan for how you are going to accomplish them," she says. "It is being productive with your time."

To do that, the Harts suggest putting yourself into the mindset you had in your working years,

such as: Use a calendar. People in a corporate setting rely on calendars to manage their obligations and retirees can as well. "Too often people just think they will remember that they have yoga on Tuesday and Thursday, and volunteer at the animal shelter on Wednesday," Patti Hart says. "But then they add a lunch here or a board meeting there and pretty soon find themselves scurrying from activity to activity." Checking a calendar each day also let's people know they may need to pull back if they are overcommitted, or they may need to find activities to add if too many empty hours are going to waste. Make a to-do list. A to-do list helps ensure nothing

gets forgotten. Just be flexible, Milledge Hart says, because the list is a tool to keep you on track, not a ball and chain to imprison vou. "If you'd rather do something else today, feel free to move items to another time or just skip them altogether," he says. "It's your list so it's your call." Treat everything like a business appointment. The calendar and the to-do list can be filled with things that would never have made a business person's schedule – but may now be high priority for you. "You can pencil in 30 minutes for meditation or an hour to begin reading a James Patterson novel," Patti Hart says. "Maybe you want to block out Friday afternoon to experiment

with a new recipe. These are your preferred 'appointments' now and are equal in importance to board meetings or conference calls." Adapt your system as your needs change. Some people begin retirement doing all the things they had been putting off, such as traveling or fishing more. "But that first burst of activity usually begins to wear, and you realize you want more from this stage of life," Milledge Hart says. "At that point it makes sense to reevaluate your resources and goals. Be aware of how you feel about certain activities and be ready to drop some and pick up others as your time and interests change.'

"In the same way that making

good financial investments provides you with additional capital, investing your time wisely provides you with more time to do things you really want to do," Patti Hart says. " And that will make your life so much better."

Free Bagged Leaf Collection

Make sure you are following these guidelines:

- Bagged leaves only.
- Individual bags may not weigh more than 50 pounds.
- Paper or ATSM D6400 rated compostable bags only.
- Place leaf bags next to your organics cart on collection day.
- Do not leave unbagged leaf piles in the street.

Use your organics cart to dispose of organic waste and help keep West Sacramento storm drains free of leaves.

Weekly Organics Cart Guidelines:

- Ensure cart lids can close.
- Only place green waste, food scraps, and food-soiled paper in cart. Do not place food waste or food soiled paper in leaf bags.
- Excess branches and pruning no larger than three (3) feet long and two (2) inches in diameter, weighing no more than fifty (50) pounds may be tied in bundles and placed next to the organics cart.



No plastic, glass, metal, treated wood, rocks or dirt, hazardous or pet waste. No plastic or foil coated paper.
