Bryte Park Gets Funding

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -The City of West Sacramento's Parks and Recreation Department has received \$1.5 million dollars in funding that will help pay for improvements at Bryte Park, the City's busiest and most used outdoor recreation location.

The funding was secured by

Assemblyman Kevin McCarty and Senator Richard Pan in the state budget.

The two lawmakers presented a giant check to City leaders Sunday, September 19, 2021 during the Family Festival at Bryte Park.

In addition to necessary ADA upgrades, this funding will support other important improvements outlined in the Bryte Park master plan: The City's first all-weather sports field with lighting; Renovated tennis/pickleball courts available for

Yolo County Begins Administering Pfizer **Booster to Eligible Residents**

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - Yolo County will begin administering Pfizer booster doses after the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) authorized and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) recommended members of certain population groups receive a booster dose of the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine at least 6 months after receiving their second Pfizer dose. Booster doses are currently only available for those who received Pfizer vaccine. Residents who received the Moderna or Johnson & Johnson vaccines will have to wait for these boosters to authorized and made available.

A booster (third) dose is recommended for individuals in the following groups who completed their 2-dose primary series of Pfizer vaccine at least 6 months ago:

Age 65 years and older or residing in a longterm care facility, or age 50 through 64 years with underlying medical conditions.

Booster doses have also been authorized for those who completed their 2-dose series of Pfizer vaccine at least 6 months ago and are either age 18 through 64 with underlying medical conditions, or age 18 through 64 and at increased risk of COVID-19 exposure and

transmission because of occupational or institutional setting. There is less evidence to support the need for boosters in these groups, and individuals are encouraged to discuss with their health care provider whether they would benefit from a booster at this time. Occupations at increased risk for COVID-19 exposure and transmission include:

First responders (healthcare workers, firefighters, police, congregate care staff); Education staff (teachers, support staff, daycare workers); Food and agriculture workers; Manufacturing workers; Corrections workers; Postal workers; Public transit workers; Grocery store workers

"Pfizer boosters are now available, but there is no need for everybody to rush out to get a booster vaccine," said Yolo County Public Health Officer Dr. Aimee Sisson. "Two doses of the Pfizer vaccine still protect very well against severe disease, hospitalization, and death in most people. We have seen some drop in the protection against hospitalization in older adults over time, which is why we are recommending a booster for those over 65. While booster doses add protection for those already vaccinated, we are continuing our efforts to vaccinate the unvaccinated. Getting more people their first and second doses of vaccine is

Yolo County's Dedication to Legal Reform

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - As of January 1, 2018 the legislation of AB2942 became effective. This legislation gives prosecutors the authority to petition the court to reduce the state prison sentences that are no longer serving the interest of justice. Yolo County was one of the first counties in California to initiate a Resentencing Pilot Project. The Yolo County DA's Office partnered up with "For the People" and the UCD King Hall Law program to create a sentencing clinic course in which the students, under the direction of Professor Chin, assess individual cases to determine their eligibility for consideration of sentence reduction. Those cases found eligible are presented to the DA's office with the recommendation of consideration.

The DA's office then reviews the findings of the King Hall students and the DA's office investigates. The court has a "broad discretion" to grant a recall case upon receipt of those recommendations, as well as the discretion to resentence the defendant "as if he or she had not previously been sentenced." In addition, it reads the Court has authority to resentence "for any reason rationally related to lawful sentencing", not simply to correct a disparate (essentially different in kind; not allowing comparison) sentence.

The resentencing considers; (1) which term of imprisonment should be imposed (2) whether any enhancements charged should be stricken (3) for multiple charges, whether a sentence should be run consecutively or concurrently. If laws have since changed, they are taken into consideration. They cannot extend a defendant's sentence.

Because of the extensive time put into each recall case, and of course limited resources, only a small number of cases can be reviewed each year. "For the People" requested funding for the Resentencing Pilot Project as part of the 2021-2022 California state budget. Of the \$18 million allotted for this program, Yolo County DA's office will receive \$717,000 and the Public Continued on page 2

Defender's office will receive \$415,000. Of course, there are a lot of conditions that go with that money, but it's a start.

Yolo County District Attorney, Jeff Reisig said in part, "Public Safety is our main priority. However, if an individual has undergone rehabilitative efforts such that they no longer pose a threat to public safety, it is right and just to review that sentence", by today's standards. The pilot begins on September 1, 2021 and ends on September 1, 2024. The DA's office has already chosen 2 cases for recall sentencing (Joseph Sisneros and Jose Duran).

Summarizing the event that put him in prison, Joseph Sisneros was 19 years old when he spent the day fishing and drinking with four friends. Joseph and his friend were intoxicated and parked in Lowe's parking lot. They saw a man sitting in his car eating. They initiated an argument with the man resulting in Joseph reaching into the car and stealing the man's iPod. The group of teens began punching the man through the open car window, They demanded his keys and wallet. The man saw one of them

with a knife and complied. During the assault one of the teenagers yelled "Los Norstros!" in reference to the Nortenos

A Lowe's employee came out of the store and saw what was happening. He headed towards the assault, while calling the police. The group then assaulted the employee. Joseph was convicted in a jury trial and sentenced 22 years - life. From there Joseph turned his life around. Joseph presented the following records during the recall investigation (for the purpose of this article I will not list the examples of each of these catagories):

A) Limited Disciplinary record. B) Record of Rehabilitation that demonstrates suitability for resentencing. C) Circumstances have changed. He showed that if released HE WOULD HAVE: i Reliable housing, ii Addiction and recovery support; iii Access to transportation; iv Employment and financial support; v Significant community support.

Jose Duran's story is very similar to Joseph's story. Both men provided documentation showing why they were prepared to re-enter society successfully.

According to the Federal Communications Commission, 35 percent of adults who do not use broadband at home are older, poorer, less educated, more likely to be a racial or ethnic minority, and more likely to have a disability than those with a home connection. Yolo County Teacher of the Year

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) - On Monday, September 27, the Yolo County School Boards Association (YCSBA) announced its 2021-2022 Teacher of the Year. This year's honor goes to Betsy Erickson, a physical education teacher, assistant swim coach and AVID site coordinator at River City High School in West Sacramento. Erickson has worked for the Washington Unified School District since 1992.

Erickson was selected from among the teachers nominated from the five school districts in Yolo County and the Yolo County Office of Education. Her selection was announced at the annual 'Excellence in Education' awards ceremony on Monday evening.

In her nomination materials, school leaders credit Erickson with finding and creating opportunities for students to be physically active - both in and outside the classroom. During distance learning last year, she introduced yoga to her physical education classes. In 2020, she completed a fitness challenge to walk 2,020 miles by December 31, 2020 and invited her students and colleagues to join her.

Biden Proposal Could Benefit High-income Californians

Congress is tied up in knots over the scope and financing of President Joe Biden's \$3.5 trillion basket of enhanced social, educational and medical benefits.

Although Democrats control – on paper – both houses, their majorities are paper-thin and their leaders are being buffeted by competing demands from the White House, their party's left wing and moderates whose votes are needed for any final product.

As the nation's most populous state, California obviously has a major stake in what the ultimate package will contain, if there is one. But the state has another, less obvious stake in how it's financed because of something called SALT.

It stands for "state and local taxes" and four years ago, a Republicancontrolled Congress and GOP President Donald Trump, as part of a major tax overhaul, imposed a as Florida and Texas. \$10,000 limit on how much SALT could be deducted on personal income tax forms.

In a tradeoff, the 2017 tax legislation doubled the standard deduction. The two actions had the effect of increasing federal taxes on high-income residents

California while lowering Schumer of New York the federal bite on low- and middle-income taxpayers. A 2018 state study found that it cost high-income Californians an extra \$12 billion a year in federal

The Washington-based Tax Foundation, which analyzed federal income tax data from 2018 returns county-by-county, reported recently that the SALT limitation had its greatest impact on taxpayers in highincome counties in high-tax states such as California, New York, Maryland and Virginia.

In California, that meant San Francisco and other Bay Area communities such as Marin, San Mateo and Santa Clara counties. In Santa Clara, for instance, the average tax return with itemized deductions reported outlays of \$46,817.53 in state and local taxes, but could deduct just \$8,931.28 due to the SALT limit.

When the SALT limit was enacted, leaders of the most affected states howled, claiming that Republicans were punishing them because of their Democrat-leaning politics. New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo complained the loudest, worrying aloud that the SALT limit would encourage the rich to relocate to low-tax states such

There's no evidence, at least yet, of a massive outmigration of high-income Californians, although there have been specific moves, such as Tesla's Elon Musk to Texas, which has no journalist for nearly 60 income tax.

and House Speaker Nancy Pelosi of California have been trying ever since 2017 to undo the SALT limit, and California Gov. Gavin Newsom has publicly supported repeal. That's why California has a big stake in how Biden's "human infrastructure" package would be financed.

The White House wants an array of tax increases on corporations and highincome taxpayers and SALT ceiling foes see it has an opportunity to undo it.

But how? Politically, it's a tricky issue for Democrats, who want to change the limit without appearing to provide a windfall to the wealthy.

Putnam Wealth Management has published a monologue on the potential ways the SALT limit could be modified or repealed, one of which would place an income limit on restoring deductibility so that those with the highest incomes would not benefit. Other alternatives include doubling or tripling the limit or changing the Alternative Minimum Tax.

The situation is another reminder that there is no right or wrong when it comes to tax policy at any level of government. What is taxed – whether income, sales or property - and at what level are purely arbitrary decisions that reflect the politics of the moment, not the higher moral purpose that politicians often

The Zero-Based Budget

I have a good job and make pretty good money, but I'm tired of always worrying about my finances and being strapped for cash at the end of the month. I've heard you talk about getting out of debt and living on a zero-based budget, but what exactly is a zero-based budget?

- Edward

Dear Edward,

The concept of a zerobased budget is simple: income minus outgo equals zero. If you bring home \$4,000 a month, you want everything you spend, save, give and invest to equal \$4,000. That way, you know where every one of vour dollars is going. Not knowing where the money's going is what kills lots of people's financial dreams. They think they know how much they're spending and where it's

Dave Ramsey Says

Here's how you do it. List all your income sources for the month. Your income should include paychecks, small-business income, side jobs, residual income, child support and so on. If it's money that comes into your household's bank account, write it down and add it up.

Next, list every single expense you have each month. Rent, food, cable, phones and everything in between. Your expenses vary from one month to the next, and this is why you make a new budget each month. Your giving budget might be high in December when Christmas rolls around. The car budget will spike during months when you pay insurance or renew your tags. Focus on one month at a time.

Now, subtract your expenses from your income. Ideally, this number will be zero. It might take a few months of practice, so don't worry if it doesn't balance out immediately. If it doesn't, it just means you need to do something to bring one of the numbers up, the other one down –or both. If you're spending more than you make, you need going, but they really don't. to make some cuts in your

spending. If you need to generate more money, get a part-time job or sell a bunch of stuff.

The deal with a zerobased budget is this: every dollar must have a name. That means every dollar has a designated job to do. If you fill out every item in your budget and come out \$100 ahead – meaning you have nothing for that \$100 to do – you haven't finished your budget. You have to find a job for that \$100. It's your decision what it does, but if you don't give it a name and purpose, you'll end up blowing it and wondering where it went.

Renewed Tax Credit to Hire Workers Yolo County Begins Administering Pfizer

IRS Special **Announcement**

WASHINGTON - With many businesses facing a tight job market, the Internal Revenue Service reminds employers to check out a valuable tax credit available to them for hiring long-term unemployment recipients and other groups of workers facing significant barriers to employment.

Legislation enacted in December extended the WOTC through the end of 2025. This long-standing tax benefit encourages employers to hire workers certified as members of any of ten targeted groups facing barriers to employment. With millions of Americans out of work at one time or another since the pandemic began, the IRS noted that one of these targeted groups is long-term unemployment recipients who have been unemployed for at least 27 consecutive weeks and have received state or federal unemployment benefits during part or all of that time.

The other groups include certain veterans and recipients of various kinds of public assistance, among others. Specifically, the 10 groups are: Temporary Assistance

for Needy Families (TANF) recipients, Unemployed veterans, including disabled veterans, Formerly incarcerated individuals, Designated community residents living in Empowerment Zones or Rural Renewal Counties. Vocational rehabilitation referrals, Summer youth employees living in Empowerment Zones, Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) recipients, Supplemental Security Income (SSI) recipients, Long-term family assistance recipients, Longterm unemployment recipients.

To qualify for the credit, an employer must first request certification by submitting IRS Form 8850, Pre-screening Notice and Certification Request for the Work Opportunity Credit, to their state workforce agency (SWA). Do not submit this form to the IRS.

Normally, Form 8850 must be submitted to the SWA within 28 days after the eligible worker begins work. But under a special relief provision, a Nov. 8, 2021, submission deadline applies to two groups of new hires – qualified summer youth employees living in

Empowerment Zones and designated community residents living in Empowerment Zones.

To qualify for the Nov. 8 submission deadline, eligible employees must start work on or after Jan. 1, 2021, and before Oct. 9, 2021. Other requirements and further details can be found in Notice 2021-43 and the instructions (.pdf) to Form 8850.

Eligible businesses claim the WOTC on their federal income tax return. It is generally based on wages paid to eligible workers during the first year of employment.

The credit is first figured on Form 5884, Work Opportunity Credit, and then is claimed on Form 3800, General Business Credit.

Though the credit is not available to tax-exempt organizations for most groups of new hires, a special rule allows them to claim the WOTC for hiring qualified veterans. These organizations claim the credit against payroll taxes on Form 5884-C, Work Opportunity Credit for Qualified Tax Exempt Organizations.

Pfizer booster doses are available at several locations in Yolo County, including retail pharmacies (Costco, Walmart, Walgreens, Rite Aid, and CVS) and primary care provider offices and clinics. Yolo County offers doses for those without other access to booster vaccines. Appointments for booster doses can be scheduled using the State's MyTurn system. To receive

a booster dose at a Yolo County clinic, residents need to bring proof that they received two Pfizer doses at least 6 months before and are asked to bring their white paper vaccine card so that it can be updated. Individuals who are 65 or older or unable to leave their homes can have a booster vaccine delivered to them through Yolo County's call-toorder vaccine program. To schedule an appointment to have vaccine delivered, residents can call (530) 902-3230. To schedule an appointment in Spanish, call (530) 379-3465. To schedule an appointment in Russian, call (530) 902-0721. The program delivers vaccine between 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. and will con-

The Pfizer, Moderna, and Johnson & Johnson vaccines are highly effective at preventing infections, hospitalizations, and death resulting from COVID-19 infection. Residents 12 and older who are not vaccinated are strongly encouraged to get vaccinated as soon as possible. For more informa-

Society for the Blind in Sac Receives \$10K to Teach Braille

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Society for the Blind recently received \$10,000 from Golden 1 Credit Union to provide Braille literacy for children in Sacramento and across Northern California who are blind or have vision loss.

"Today, less than 10 percent of children with vision loss are literate," said Shari Roeseler, executive director, Society for the Blind. "They are not learning Braille and are unable to read, write and comprehend. By third grade they are significantly behind their sighted peers, and 50 percent of high school students who are blind drop out before graduating. Literacy is key to improving academic outcomes and pointing these children toward college and careers. We are grateful to Golden 1 Credit Union for helping us fill this gap so children with vision loss can be successful and independent when they grow up."

The grant will allow Society for the Blind to provide Braille literacy classes, instruction materials and training in assistive devices for up to 100 new children who are blind or have low vision in elementary through high schools across the region. Through Society for the Blind's After-School Academy for children from first grade through high school, students will learn Grade 1 Braille, including the alphabet, spelling, numbers, reading and writing. "CRY MACHO" A SENTIMENTAL JOURNEY FOR AN OLD COWBOY

A Film and TV Review by Tim Riley

"CRY MACHO" RATED PG-13

At the age of 91, Clint Eastwood is not just an institution but an actor and director, performing double duty in his latest film "Cry Macho," with an apparent desire to outlast all of his contemporaries.

We should not begrudge Eastwood's wish to keep working; instead, his work ethic is something to be admired. While he will never play Dirty Harry again, nor appear in a spaghetti western, his characters will likely be more like the ones in "Gran Torino" and "The Mule."

The artwork for the film's poster features an iconic pose of Eastwood that suggests a throwback to his early Westerns, but "Cry Macho" is not the story of a righteous gunslinger roaming the range.

"Cry Macho" is the right fit for him at this point in his career. Eastwood's Texas cowboy Mike Milo is a former rodeo star and has-been horse breeder who, in 1979, reluctantly takes an assignment from his old boss to venture south of the border.

Wealthy rancher Howard Polk (Dwight Yoakum), a year after firing Mike as his horse trainer, comes to him for the dubious task of retrieving his estranged teenage son Rafo (Eduardo Minett) from the care of his crazy Mexican ex-wife Leta (Fernanda Urrejola) in Mexico City.

While Mike has no particular fondness for his old boss, he feels obligated to return a favor to the person who gave him a job after a severe injury ended his riding career, which was followed by the loss of his wife

One senses that the long drive on the dusty roads all the way to Mexico City presages a rockier trip back home after arriving at the destination of Leta's mansion where the boy's decadent and alcoholic mother is protected by menacing bodyguards.

Leta warns that Rafo is a delinquent who has a passion for entering his prize fighter rooster named "Macho" in illegal cockfights. Rafo could be involved in other illicit affairs, but mama seems not to care.

When Mike resists a drunken advance in her bedroom, Leta is no longer hospitable, and at this point it's also fairly evident that she will become vengeful and task one of her henchmen in pursuit back to the border.

As the kid survives on the streets of the big city, Rafo is quickly found at a cockfight and proves reluctant at first to go with Mike to Texas until a tentative bond is formed with the promise of having his own horse on a ranch.

of transportation difficulties and pursuit by the federales and Leta's thug, the latter discovering that the aging Mike still has a nice right hook.

That the nonagenarian still has a few moves, as unlikely that may be in the romance department, becomes part of the story when Mike and Rafo stumble upon a desert small town where the cantina is run by the widowed Marta (Natalia Traven).

Enjoying the hospitality afforded by Marta, a woman about half the age of Mike who is also raising her orphaned granddaughters, the two travelers decide to hang around the village for a while, even camping out on the benches of a small church.

Perchance, Mike enjoys the flirtation that blossoms with the cantina owner. Other things bind him to the village. Mike finds purpose with helping a local to tame some wild horses, and pretty soon he becomes a Dr. Dolittle by helping others with their sick pets and farm animals.

The chemistry between the veteran cowboy and the kid may seem perfunctory but it revolves around the trust that comes from overcoming shared adversities on the road, and with Mike imparting occasional wisdom such as saying "the macho thing is overrated."

With Mike and Rafo spending so much time together, conversation turns to forming a bond where the two learn something from each other. When the kid claims Mexicans ride horses better than gringos, Mike quickly reminds him that he's half-gringo.

The heart of the film is most moving and satisfying during the sojourn in the small dusty town, where Mike connects easily with people who don't even speak English or when he communicates with one of Marta's deaf grandchildren through sign language.

Other than a thug trying to tangle with Mike or suspicious federales poking around, "Cry Macho" is devoid of gunfights, brawls, exciting car chases and other staples of an action film.

Clint Eastwood has directed a slowpaced trip through the picturesque desert terrain that would be fitting for a Western, but it's a sentimental journey of redemption and second chances for both the cowboy and the kid.

The wisdom of "Cry Macho" comes when Mike says to Rafo, "You think you have all the answers, but then you get older and realize you don't have any. By the time you figure it out, it's too late." What happens next is a journey through Let's hope it's not too late for Eastwood to





Social Security Matters

Is My COLA Increase Based on My Current SS Benefit?

Dear Rusty: I started collecting SS when I turned 70 to maximize my income. One factor that is never mentioned is that the annual cost of living increase appears to be based on the previous year's payment. I've talked to others who are about my age (77) and we talked about how much of an adder we will receive. Those who collected earlier always get much less than I do. So, it appears that the annual increase is based on previous year's payment and not on the original payment from when I started collecting, so it has a compounding impact. Frequently the increase received by those who collected early covers the Medicare increase plus a small adder, whereas I have been getting a much larger increase. Can you comment? Signed: Wondering

Dear Wondering: I'll be happy to clarify this for you. The annual Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) for next year is determined by comparing this year's Consumer Price Index for the 3rd quarter (July-September) to the same period last

year. If there is a difference (which there usually is), the percentage of difference becomes the COLA increase percentage for next year. The COLA is applied annually starting with everyone's December benefit (paid in January).

Everyone gets a dif-

ferent amount of COLA money because everyone's Social Security benefit payment is different. Your COLA dollar increase is more than most of your friends because you waited until you were 70 to claim and, thus, have a higher benefit. Your friends who claimed earlier will have a smaller benefit and therefore get a smaller dollar amount as a cost of living increase. COLA is a percentage increase and, since the 2021 COLA increase was 1.3%, applying that percentage to each person's SS benefit amount results in a different dollar increase for each. And you're correct; since the percentage of increase is applied to your current benefit amount and not your original benefit amount, COLA increases are, indeed, compounded.

To further complicate matters, Social Security's "hold harmless" provision sometimes results in beneficiaries paying less than the standard Medicare

premium amount. If someone is now paying less than the monthly Medicare premium (\$148.50 for Part B (outpatient services)), any COLA increase awarded is used to bring their Medicare Part B premium up to (or closer to) the standard premium for that year. That means that sometimes the full amount of COLA dollars aren't reflected in each person's net Social Security payment, further confusing people when they see that their total SS payment didn't increase by the announced COLA percentage.

So, as you can see there are reasons why everyone COLA looks different, but your basic point is correct - COLA is applied to your current SS benefit amount, not the SS benefit you were awarded when you claimed.

Resident Passes Away While Serving Sentence

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Long-time West Sacramento resident, 74-year-old Ronald J. Mehler, and the love of his life, Nellie, lived in his house on Beardsley Dr. for over 50 years. Many of his neighbors knew him pretty well due to the fact that they, too, have been in their homes for decades. According to neighbors, Ron was gruff and straight forward, some say grumpy. He wasn't known to put up with much from people that caused problems, but if he let you into his heart, it was a big one. Neighbors say that Ron was a veteran and a former West Sacramento firefighter (though neither one of these were able to be verified).

Life takes time and time takes a toll on our bodies. Over the years Ron developed Diabetes. He was nearly blind and was hard of hearing. His health was deteriorating. His wife Nellie also suffered from medical problems. Nellie had progressive dementia. Because of the dementia, and Ron's poor health, Nellie's sisters had Power of Attorney over Nellie and her care.

Nellie's sisters had moved Nellie out of her house to better care for her and filed for divorce. On October 10th, 2018, Nellie's sisters and Nellie showed up to Ron's to collect some of Nellie's things. While Nellie stayed in the backyard, her sisters began to pack things and take them out of the house. Nellie's sisters did not much like Ron.

While Ron sat in a chair, on the front lawn, unable to see what the women were taking out, Nellie's sisters continually made comments to Ron that they were going to take everything Ron had... including his house. The badgering continued

until Ron was so worried that he shot his sister-inlaw, 53-year-old Jennifer Meyers, dead. His plan was suicide by cop, but a neighbor came over and was able to calm Ron down.

Ron agreed that "once the cops got there he would put the gun down." WSPD arrived and took Ron and his neighbor into custody. They later released the neighbor. Ron was scheduled to go to trial on May 22, 2019, but before that time came Ron pled guilty to second degree murder. He was given a sentence of 21 years.

On August 20, 2021
Ron was scheduled to have a special health related parole hearing, but on August 12, 2021 the Yolo County District Attorney's office notifying them that the hearing was cancelled. Ronald James Mehler had passed away. His death was not criminal, and was not COVID related.
