New PEAS program creates partnership between local minority farmers and school districts

Last month, local nonprofit Yolo Farm to Fork secured a coveted Farm to School Incubator Grant from the California Department of Food & Agriculture. They were one of only 14 nonprofits statewide to be awarded. The \$250,000 grant will be used to create a unique new program, Partners in Education for Agriculture in Schools (PEAS). PEAS seeks to empower new minority farmers to deliver healthy, fresh produce to Food Services for student meals in Woodland Joint and Washington Unified school districts.

Participating farmers will contract 6-12 months in advance for the delivery of specific amounts of freshly harvested produce for meals and snacks paid for by the National School Lunch Program. Farmers may secure additional income by teaching their "climate smart" farming strategies to students in the school site edible gardens.

PEAS will focus on supporting new, small farms owned and managed by women, BI-POC, LGBTQ+, veterans, and immigrants. Dozens of such farms have been created



the past 5 years.

While many new small farms can't yet afford to be certified organic, the program will have a special emphasis on "climate smart" agricultural practices. "'Climate smart" essentially means sustainable and regenerative farming practices," explains

throughout Yolo County in Yolo Farm to Fork Executive Director Anya Perron-Burdick. "'Climate smart" agriculture helps mitigate climate change effects through practices like soil carbon sequestration and reducing greenhouse gas emissions."

OP-ED: The Yolo Way Meets the American Rescue Plan

You may have seen an internet meme that began as a March 2020 Graeme MacKay editorial cartoon. In one version, a "COVID" tsunami threatens a coastal city; behind it comes a larger "Recession" tsunami; behind it a "Climate Change" tsunami; and finally behind it a "Biodiversity Collapse"

Despite Yolo County's inland location, we need to take seriously the message of this cartoon—that our recovery from the pandemic must also be a response to the climate emergency.

It must also address deeply entrenched economic and social inequities causing these crises to strike some communities and demographics much harder than others.

One immediate way to do this is to use our American Rescue Plan funding to develop narratives, programs, and projects that do all three: repair damage from COVID-19, fight climate change, and follow the leadership of frontline and long-disadvantaged communities for whom these efforts have the highest stakes.

We can call our approach to these problems "The Yolo Way," by which we signal our local recognition of what Martin Luther King called "an inescapable network of mutuality" and our commitment to making that network more healthy, just, fair and sustainable.

The importance of outreach to, and leadership by, BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color), low-income communities, women, and frontline populations is illustrated by my personal story. My family comes from a long line of farmworkers.

My parents became farmworker advocates, my father organizing for the United Farm Workers in Coachella under his boss Cesar Chavez and my mother advising farmworkers of their housing rights at California Rural Legal Assistance. Through these means of empowerment, my parents helped their communities obtain better working conditions, better housing, and stronger protections of their human rights.

Here, in Yolo County where I have lived for two decades and am raising two sons, I continue the transformative work of grassroots organizing, pushing back against the disproportionate impacts of the pandemic, climate change, and intersecting inequities on frontline and vulnerable communities.

The American Res-Plan authorizes the expenditure of \$1.9 trillion in COVID-19 support to individuals and families, businesses, public health providers, and state, local, and tribal governments. The County of Yolo will likely receive \$42.7 million, its four incorporated cities \$40.9 million, and its public schools \$41.1 million. There is additional categorical funding for transportation agencies, capital projects, and disaster assistance. the funds will be available immediately; the other half in 2022; all funds are required to be spent by 2024.

The timeline for the County to create its expenditure plan is short,

with approval by the Board of Supervisors as soon as July. Community workshops are not scheduled until June, after internal and cross-agency consultations.

Those who have been most affected by the pandemic and by manifestations of climate change, such as wildfires and extreme weather events, must speak up now and make known our priorities for healthier people and a healthier environment. Below are some of those priorities, which are also consistent with the county's principles for selecting projects to

People-friendly and climate-friendly transportation. Public transportation took a significant hit in the pandemic, as people stopped riding due to the lockdown. The County of Yolo should partner with its four cities to create a substantially enlarged and improved bicycle infrastructure. Many parts of the county, rural and urban, need major safety and connectivity upgrades. Safe bike lockers are needed in apartment complexes, workplaces, commercial developments, and schools. Bike share systems, especially ones offering electric bicycles, are sorely needed. A strong bike culture would support numerous small businesses and many jobs not just in Davis but in our other cities. Complementing a robust countywide bike infrastructure should be abundant electric buses, including school buses, with myriad benefits for health, safety, and the climate.

Neighborhood-serving community gardens. Problems with food insecurity pre-existed the COVID-19 pandemic, as households-including families with kids, college students, and seniors on fixed incomes—were encountering increases in regular expenses, most notably in the cost

of housing, while in-

pace. Then as people lost jobs and income in the pandemic, food insecurity grew, as did lines at food banks. A network of community gardens serving city neighborhoods small towns would proless-advantaged households with greater food sovereignty and security. In addition to people raising food for themselves and neighbors, they could also be the basis for community tianguis, or open-air markets, where food could be sold, food-related classes could be held, and small food businesses could be established. Healthy foods and healthy, regenerative climate-friendly ways of growing it would be promoted. Yolo County, as well as its incorporated cities, could help acquire land, water, and equipment for these endeavors, and hire staff to launch this

program. Resilience hubs. Community centers traditionally offer a variety of services to local residents, designed with awareness of local cultures and languages. A resilience hub adds to this mix of programs those resources that will help neighborhoods cope successfully with the impacts of climate change. These might include classes on how to weatherize and de-carbonize your home; nurses on site to do health checks when the air is smoky from wildfires or the temperatures become threateningly high; and consultants who can help you solve problems with your bike, your digital technology, or your garden. Resilience hubs would also become shelters during emergencies when people had to leave their homes. Yolo County needs to create a network of resilience hubs across the unincorporated county and to coordinate with cities doing the same. In addition to suitable programming,

resilience hubs also need supplies and equipment for disaster preparedness. Photovoltaic panels and a battery storage system could allow them to function off the grid for several days. The American Rescue Plan could fund a model resilience hub as a demonstration project.

Climate-friendly landscapes and landscape practices. Local governments, including the county, should cooperate to review the landscaping of all their properties to identify opportunities to increase its carbon-sequestering capacity, in vegetation and in soil. Landscapes should be transitioned to native species suited to withstand hot, dry summer conditions. Collaborating with landscape maintenance workers, practices that do not require gas-powered equipment or fossil-fuel derived chemicals could be developed on these local public lands. Patwin native plant experts should be hired to participate in landscape transformation projects and related educational programming. Potential benefits include new jobs and the healthy air, water, and soil called for in the county's strategic and sustainability plans, as well as desirable in recovery from the COVID pandemic.

May is Mental Health Awareness Month

Yolo County Criminal Justice partners helping to decriminalize those who live with mental illness

Yolo County's Criminal Justice partners, which include the Probation Department, the Health and Human Services Agency (HHSA), Yolo County Superior Court, the Public Defender, and the District Attorney (DA), have been working diligently to decriminalize those with mental illness and substance use disorders, who often find themselves mired in the criminal justice system after committing crimes driven by their illness. Having a criminal record can impede a person's ability to get employment and housing and become productive members of society.

Programs that have received statewide attention are Yolo County's Mental Health Court (MHC) and Addiction Intervention Court (AIC) which involve a minimum 18-month court-based treatment and monitoring system for adult offenders with a serious mental illness and/or substance abuse disorders. MHC and AIC are programs designed to increase the treatment engagement of the participants while reducing arrests, hospitalizations, and jail time during and after their involvement and participation in the program. The County's criminal justice team provides participants with wrap-around treatment which includes a focus on mental health, substance abuse, housing, vocational and school, and physical health. The goal is to address the criminogenic factors and reduce recidivism. When participants are close to gradua-

tion, they participate in a Restorative Justice confer-

The most recent outcome measures for MHC that ended June 30, 2020 show impressive results. In 2020, 91 individuals were referred to the AIC and MCH programs though only 68 individuals can be enrolled in the AIC and MHC programs combined, at a given time. Many that get placed in the AIC program also suffer from mental illness. For those who enrolled, when comparing the 12 months prior to starting Mental Health Court to

the 12 months after Mental Health Court, there was a 69% decrease in arrests, a 48% decrease in jail bed days, a 100% decrease in local hospital bed days, and a 100% decrease in state hospital bed days.

"These numbers are impressive," said Chair of the Yolo County Board of Supervisors Jim Provenza. "The Yolo County team is dedicated but we know the hard work begins and ends with the participants."

Clients are referred to the programs mainly by the defense attorneys though the District Attorney has some ability to refer individuals.

No referral is ever denied though the treatment team (Probation department and HHSA) may find someone unsuitable for the program after an assessment. MHC participants must suffer from a serious mental illness, such as bipolar disorder, schizophrenia, or schizo-affective disorder. For those living with a less severe mental illness, there are other diversion options such as Mental Health Diversion Law, where individuals who commit crimes and who live with any mental illness are eligible. The DA can also place individuals into Neighbor-

hood Court with a managed mental health care component.

To support these efforts, the Yolo County team received a grant of \$747,280 from the Federal Bureau of Justice Assistance that allowed Mental Health Court participants to double from 15 to 30 and provided staff to support these additional participants. Additionally, this past year the team received a grant for \$1.1 million from the Department of State Hospitals that allows justice partners to divert some individuals, who are deemed incompetent or are at risk for being incompetent, from standing trial. This allows the team to treat these individuals within the County and avoid sending them to a State Hospital.

The MHC team presented at the annual CA Forensic Mental Health Association Conference in April 2021 and was awarded the Yolo County Spirit Award for Teamwork in 2019. Additionally, the team is excited to once again participate in the National Alliance on Mental Illness walk on May 22 in honor of Mental Health Awareness month.

Over 908 New Crimes Committed by Individuals Released on \$0 Bail

Nearly 42% of those released on \$0 Bail have been rearrested at least once

As a result of the Yolo County Superior Court's continued use of \$0 bail, over 908 new crimes have been committed as of April 21, 2021. In April of 2020, the California Judicial Council imposed the "\$0" Emergency Bail Schedule in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Although rescinded in June of 2020, the Yolo County Superior Court continues to use the Emergency Bail Schedule although the court recently indicated an intention to end the use of the Emergency Bail Schedule.

Since April 13, 2020, individuals released on \$0 bail have committed over 908 new crimes. Those new crimes include 387 felonies and 521 misdemeanors, including crimes such as Attempted Murder (2 new victims), Assault with a Deadly Weapon or Assault by Means of Force Likely to Produce Great Bodily Injury (21 new victims), Robbery (12 new victims), Burglary (52 new victims), felony domestic violence (14 new victims), possession of an assault weapon, gang crimes, and dozens of other new felony and misdemeanor crimes. Since the COVID 19 pandemic began, 522 individuals have been released a total 680 times on \$0 bail. Of those released

on \$0 bail, 41.6% have been rearrested at least one time.

Used throughout the vast majority of the pandemic, the Emergency Bail Schedule simply looks at the arresting offense and releases individuals on \$0 bail, even those on probation or parole, without conducting a risk assessment for dangerousness. Additionally, upon release on \$0 bail, offenders are given a court date 4-5 months in the future. This makes it nearly impossible to assess those individuals who are homeless, suffer from a substance use disorder, or from a serious mental illness in order to enroll them into one of the county's diversion programs such as mental health court or addiction intervention court. Additionally, each subsequent arrest moves the initial court dates further into

the future. In March, the Yolo County Superior Court indicated its intention to end its use of the Emergency Bail Schedule once a 2021 Felony and Misdemeanor Bail schedule is finalized. The judges in each county set bail schedules. The court distributed the proposed bail schedule to the criminal justice partners for input. If adopted, the proposed schedule will significantly reduce bail amounts to fractions of amounts

previously set in the current bail

For example, bail amounts for the crimes of possession of child pornography, felony driving under the influence, stalking and dissuading a witness will be reduced from \$50,000 to \$5,000.

Domestic violence and elder abuse may be reduced from \$50,000 to \$15,000 while a number of forcible sex crimes and child molestation crimes could be reduced from either \$250,000 or \$100,000 to \$50,000. Typically, to post bail an individual needs only to produce 10% of the bail amount upfront. The District Attorney's Office has submitted comments on two separate occasions raising concerns about the reduced amounts among other objections.

Since the beginning of the pandemic and the use of the \$0 bail schedule, one individual has been rearrested 19 times after a \$0 release. Another individual was rearrested 10 times after a \$0 release; one individual rearrested 9 times after a \$0 release; three individuals were rearrested 8 times after a \$0 release; eight individuals were rearrested 7 times after \$0 release; four individuals were rearrested six times after \$0 release, and nine individuals were rearrested 5 times after \$0 release.

The 2021 Yolo County Fair will not run as planned and will not be open to the public.

When discussing plans for the fair, CEO Vannucci, Fair Board & staff expressed concern for public health, as well as the financial impact of hosting a fair that would adhere to current safety protocols and the lasting impacts of the long-term sustainability of the event.

Although vaccination rates are improving significantly each day, California continues to fight the battle against COVID-19 including the new variants. Where we are today in this struggle makes it difficult to plan a large-scale entertainment event like the free gate Yolo County Fair, especially not knowing where we will be, or what Yolo County and the State of California will look like, in August.

In addition, the important safety practices that have been put in place to protect Californians, including indoor seating capacities, live events seating capacities, proof of testing or vaccines, and other restrictions may lead to attendance that is considerably lower than previous years. The financial implications of hosting a typical Yolo County Fair with the same overhead costs as previous years, but far less revenue, could be devastating to our association. In a typical year, the Yolo County Fair's budget is designed to break even or have a nominal profit. Holding a full fair this year would likely lead to significant financial loss.

While we wish we had the ability to see the future we do not. Taking all the above into consideration CEO Vannucci, the Board of Directors and fair staff feel that the best decision is to greatly limit the traditional aspects of the Yolo County Fair. While this is a difficult decision, we feel it is the best way to protect the long-term sustainability of the Yolo County Fair, as well as the safety of those involved.

The 2021 Yolo County Fair will be limited to FFA Market Animal exhibitors and their family members for a week-long event that will culminate with a Live Auction on Saturday August 21st.

We fully plan on bringing back the full Yolo County Fair in 2022, with its carnival rides, the 2-night demolition derby, the rodeo, entertainment, food vendors including local beer booths, livestock shows and all the homegrown exhibits you have come to expect.

Detailed plans for the FFA Market Animal Event are forthcoming on our website.

Stay tuned for news on our website about a Family Event Center coming to our grounds complete with Carnival Rides & Food July 29th to August 8th, plus a Virtual Stills Showcase where you can enter your arts, crafts, sewing & photography and just maybe a Summer Rodeo.

There used to be a beaver family. So many kinds of birds. I haven't been back there in a long, long time. Are lupine blooming now I wonder?

On Next Door recently, I read our area is having a 'Super Bloom' this year. Northern California wildflowers you may see in abundance include our state flower, the California Poppy, lupine of assorted colors (don't let your dog eat it. Some varieties are toxic, it seems, to everything but goats); wild geranium, mustard and much much more.

A simple local walk in an 'ungroomed' area might let you see some, but if you're up for a day trip that includes streams, pools and waterfalls, go to

North Table Mountain. Just past Oroville, the North Table Mountain Ecological Reserve is located in Butte County.

Open from dawn to dusk, The reserve's trails require a day pass if you're 16 or older, unless you have a valid hunting license. Organized youth groups, such as schools, and adults with them don't need a pass, but a permit is required. For more information, Google search Visiting North Table Mountain Ecological Reserve. Like the Yolo County Bypass Area, the reserve is managed by the California Dept. of Fish and Wildlife. The self-guided walks are free and you can bring your dog.

A little history: Table Mountain is made up of volcanic rock! And in many places, you can see it! Have to wonder how many ancient animals are trapped in as fossils. Fossils. Another fascinating topic! Be aware, though, that no collecting of any kind is allowed at Table Mountain – no rocks/ minerals, no plants, no artifacts, no fossils. Dogs have to be on-leash. Ten feet max, no

This is a huuuuge reserve: 3,300 acres, give or take. The



ancient lava flows resulted in an elevated mesa. From it, you can see wildflowers, waterfalls, lava outcrops, seasonal streams and vernal pools. Rare Northern Basal Flow Vernal Pools appear due to impermeable hardened lava. Usually, fissures in the lava (basalt) soak up winter rains. In the spring: voila, streams and waterfalls. These water sources ultimately

dry up. Only certain animals and plants have evolved to survive this habitat over time.

You'll also see cattle grazing. For safety, stay at least 300 feet away. Grazing cows help control invasive plant species and protect the reserve's spectacular array of wildflowers.

IF YOU GO: Here's a downside: There are no restrooms or trash

ic service involving the nose or face for which temporary removal of the face covering is necessary to perform the service,

Workers who wear respiratory protection,

or persons who are specifically exempted from wearing face coverings by other CDPH guid-

The following individuals are exempt from wearing face coverings at all

Persons younger than two years old. Very young children must not wear a face covering because of the risk of suffocation.

Persons with a medical condition, mental health condition, or disability that prevents wearing a face covering. This includes persons with a medical condition for whom wearing a face covering could obstruct breathing or who are unconscious, incapacitated, or otherwise unable to remove a face covering without assistance.*

Persons who are hearing impaired, or communicating with a person who is hearing impaired, where the ability to see the mouth is essential for communication.

Persons for whom wearing a face covering would create a risk to the person related to their work, as determined by local, state, or federal regulators or workplace safety guidelines.

*Note: Persons exempted from wearing a face covering due to a medical condition who are employed in a job involving regular contact with others must wear a non-restrictive alternative, such as a face shield with a drape on the bottom edge, as long as their condition permits it.

Continued from page 1 "grab and go" pick-ups forced us to provide "heat and serve" meals not in line with our nutritional values. It also presented serious barriers to scratch cooking." Pina hopes that by supplying the school cafeterias with fresh, local produce, PEAS will get students nutritionally back on track when they return to campus.

"PEAS is our way of combining community

partners' efforts to address community needs and turn them into community resources - much as our Growing Lunch program has done in the past four years," says Yolo Farm to Fork President Suzanne Falzone.
