

Get to know your police chief

The city of West Sacramen- to has recently named Rob- ert Strange as our new Police Chief.

Strange is not new to the administration of a police de- partment. He's not even new to the West Sacramento Police Department.

Strange has been the Interim Chief since Chief Tom Mc- Donald left the WSPD rough- ly a year and a half ago. Before being the Interim Chief, he held the position of WSPD Deputy Chief. His jobs before WSPD include working at the District Attorney's office, working at the Woodland Po- lice Department as a training officer, a crisis negotiator and a gang investigator. He has worked full-time for a while with the FBI's safe streets task force. He explained that he is interested in perusing justice and that has always been his goal.

In addition to all of his pre- vious experience in policing, let's remember that in the last year as Interim Police Chief, he was faced with leading and

caring for the department during the transfer to a new Mayor, COVID, the death of George Floyd and the riots, 2 officer-involved shootings, a man murdering a small child and then just a few hours later a fatal car wreck that left two children orphans.

He believes in the system. He is proud of the police de- partment, but is well aware that improvements can and should be made. He acknowl- edges that justice and a just outcome are not always the same thing and he wants his officers to embrace that. He respects the feelings, both good and bad, of the com- munity members and believes that all interaction with the public can be a learning expe- rience for all involved.

Also, he believes that the better we all understand each other through honesty and support, the better our com- munity will be.

"Just call me Rob... Chief is a title – although important in rank, structure and other for- malities, I'm just a guy who is lucky enough to have earned a leadership role with a great group of folks and in a great community," Strange said. "I don't mean to downplay the role... it's always an important role, maybe even more so now with policing in the cross hairs and understandably the focus of many".

He spoke about how justice is not the same thing to all people and people need to be aware of that. He continued talking about his beliefs that the restructuring of the prison system and the fact that during investigative work, a large part of it is eliminating people as a person of interest because they are not trying to put people into the justice system that don't belong there. "It's not all about convictions", he said.

Expanded Eligibility for Vaccines Starts April 1 and 15 but Supply Still Limited

Following the State of California's recent an- nouncement, Yolo Coun- ty will open COVID-19 vaccine eligibility to in- dividuals aged 50+ start- ing April 1 and individ- uals 16+ starting April 15. However supply of the COVID-19 vaccine is still extremely limited and the newly eligible population is large. As a result, not all eligible residents will be able to immediately schedule an appointment or get vac- cinated.

While vaccine eligi- bility has continued to expand over the last few months, the County's vaccine supply is allo- cated weekly by the Cal- ifornia Department of Public Health (CDPH) and doses still remain in- sufficient to vaccinate all eligible residents. There- fore, the County asks for the public's continued patience during this ex- panded vaccine rollout.

"We expect vaccine supply to increase signifi- cantly during April, but for those who become newly eligible on April 1st, supply will remain very limited" said Yolo County Health Officer Dr. Aimee Sisson. "Un- til we see an increase in supply, vaccine appoint- ments will continue to be difficult to come by."

Yolo County is work- ing diligently to ensure that all vaccine doses re- ceived from the State of California are adminis- tered fairly and efficient- ly and will continue to host vaccine clinics for those at the highest risk of exposure, serious com- plications, or death from COVID-19, such as the homeless, seniors 65+, ag workers, and others. Ad- ditionally, Yolo Coun- ty will continue to host public vaccine clinics where currently eligible residents will be able to

Yolo County Child Abuse Prevention Council launches new website

April is Child Abuse Prevention Month, and this April the Yolo County Child Abuse Prevention Council (CAPC), a program of the Yolo County Chil- dren's Alliance (YCCA), will be launching a new website: Strong Families Yolo at www.strongfam- iliesyolo.org.

Strong Families Yolo has hundreds of resour- ces and practical ideas for all people in our commu- nity – friends, educators, business owners, parents, persons of faith – to sup- port children and parents in Yolo County and help prevent child abuse and

neglect. This website also offers resources for par- ents or youth who are seeking help or support.

In 2019, the California Child Welfare Indicators Project (CCWIP) re- ported that 615 children in Yolo County were victims of abuse and/ or neglect. The CAPC believes it is likely that even more children have experienced abuse and/ or neglect in 2020 due to increased stress caused by the COVID-19 pan- demic. Yolo County has a collective responsibility to ensure that children in our community are safe and healthy, espe-

cially during challenging times.

"Preventing child abuse and neglect is a community issue, and we all have a responsibility to nurture and protect our children and help en- sure they become healthy and thriving adults," said Karleen Jakowski, the CAPC Chair. "This new resource will be inval- uable in helping our com- munity learn more about the signs of child abuse and neglect and will give children and adults more information and confi- dence to report concerns. Overall, this website will serve as a gateway to

critical information, re- sources, and support for those in our community who need it most."

By launching Strong Families Yolo the CAPC aims to educate the com- munity that everyone has a role to play in support- ing children and fami- lies and preventing child abuse and neglect.

Yolo County CAPC's mission is to eliminate child abuse and neglect and the adversity it caus- es by strengthening fami- lies and communities. The CAPC is composed of a community part- ner and representatives from the following agen-

Yolo County Library Eliminates Late Fees Starting April 1

In time for National Library Week which runs April 4-10, Yolo County Library is eliminating late fees for all patrons effective April 1.

Though items that are returned late will not accrue late fees, patrons are still expected to return library materials on time and will still be billed for lost or damaged items. The checkout period on items of three weeks will remain the same and reminders will still be sent

via email. Patrons will still be responsible for late fees accrued before April 1, 2021, but will have the opportunity to ‘Read-Off-Your-Fines’ during the Yolo County Library’s Summer Reading Program, which starts June 1.

“Late fees have a disproportionate impact on individuals, seniors and families who don’t have the financial resources to pay them, and this makes it harder to take full ad-

vantage of our services,” Yolo County Librarian and Chief Archivist Mark Fink said. “Consequently, we are excited to join libraries nationwide to remove this financial barrier and look forward to welcoming folks back into our branches.”

On March 9, the Yolo County Board of Supervisors voted unanimously to eliminate late fees for all patrons, thereby strengthening Yolo County Library’s commitment

to providing equitable access for all to its resources. Previously in January 2019, the Board of Supervisors also voted to end late fees for children’s accounts which resulted in increased borrowing by 28%.

“It’s about justice and justice can look different ways”. “The two main things that I want from my staff are connection and protection”, he said. He explained “I want the officers to make a real connection with the community. Really talk to them and find out what is going on in the neighborhood. And then protect them. Protection also looks different to different people. Figure out what that is and do everything possible to protect the people in this city”.

He said not all officers are so understanding or sympathetic and that some are much more aggressive. He explained that everybody has bad days. However, even if they just came from a horrible scene, they are expected to be professional. He emphasized how proud and impressed he is with the professionalism of WSPD officers, especially when they are responding to heart-breaking scenes like the fatal accident on Jefferson Boulevard. Strange

explained that our police department is full of men and women that work for this department because they love this city. However, he said that he welcomes anyone with concerns and says that all concerns will be investigated and used to teach officers how to do things better the next time a situation of that type arises. Strange said that he regularly tells his staff that the changes that the department has made in how they interact with the community, are working. “There is plenty of public safety work to go around. This is a great city and it is so much safer than it was 20 years ago. Though we don’t have the gang problems that we used to, we have to recognize that history. We still have gang elements in the city but I think we’ve learned better ways to approach it”.

When asked how he feels about people who stand up for their rights, or quote what their civil rights are in a situation, he responded

with, “I love it! I think it’s great that people know their rights. And I am not OK at all with people getting their civil rights stomped on...Policing used to be officers, almost solely, took it upon themselves to decide what was best for the community. I think what I want to see most are real, meaningful connections between us and the community... real relationships with the community. We’re not just a uniform, we’re people too. We don’t know what it’s like to live in your neighborhood”. He and his family do not live in West Sacramento, but they are nearby. It is for this reason that he feels he needs to pay even closer attention to what’s going on here and to get better information from his staff.

When asked what he plans on changing in the police department, he said that having a crisis counselor on staff has been wonderful. A second crisis counselor is starting soon. “The best thing about this is that they are actually able to follow up with people that need help. It’s wonderful. In the

past, we were only able to hand someone a list of phone numbers and it was left on them to get help for them. Now we are able to go back and help make these contacts as well as find out what other resources they may need”, Rob explained. I asked him if it were a perfect world and he had unlimited resources, what would he like to see in our police department. He said that he would like to see our officers get better technology. “It’s just tough to see a ten-minute traffic stop have twenty minutes worth of paperwork”, he said.

Strange wants the citizens of West Sacramento to know that they can trust that the West Sacramento Police Department is part of the community. The men and women on the force want to see the members of this community thrive, he said. They want to see people happy and caring. They want the citizens to feel comfortable coming up and saying “hi” and engage in conversation. And if you have a problem, there is an open door policy and your concerns will be addressed, he said.

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Presenting local hero:

Billie Hamilton, Raging Granny and climate activist

It is said that the eyes are the windows to the soul. If that is the case then Billie Hamilton's sparkling gray-blue eyes reveal a dedicated and delightful one.

Raging granny, retired educator, musician and citizen climate lobbyist, Billie is committed to her community, her country and her world. This 93-year-young woman's mind is sharp and focused, her spirit strong, and her actions clear-eyed and purposeful.

Billie enjoyed a 40-year career as a teacher in elementary and high school classrooms and is the mother of two educators, one here in Sacramento and the other in her home state of Indiana.

A 51-year resident of River Park, she has committed her life to causes she holds dear, informed by her membership in Quaker Meetings in New York, Michigan and Sacramento.

Over Billie's long life she has observed how the climate has changed, and as a result, for the last seven years, her activism has centered around Sacramento Citizens' Climate Lobby, the local chapter of an international non-profit, non-partisan grassroots advocacy organization dedicated to advancing national policies to address climate change solutions. As a Quaker, Billie appreciates the organization's focus on empowering individuals by educating members, neighbors

and elected officials to build relationships, and use patience, courtesy and non-partisan pressure to "build the political will for the climate solutions we all need."

Billie believes that the climate crisis solution of a carbon fee and dividend, favored by CCL (and thousands of economists and scientists), is the most efficient and equitable path forward.

This solution would place a price on carbon emissions and have the revenues generated by this pricing returned to citizens as a dividend - like the pandemic stimulus checks based on family income. This would rapidly reduce emissions and encourage innovation. The efficacy and fundamental fairness of this approach have great appeal to Billie, as it resonates with her Quaker values. To help realize this solution, Billie became more involved with CCL, starting as an active member and subsequently serving as Advisory Board member, treasurer, liaison and lobbyist to Doris Matsui's district office, and 3-time lobbyist on Capitol Hill.

Billie never expected to become a lobbyist in her 80s! But in the last Congress, Billie supported a bill that supported a price on carbon and rebates to citizens (HR 763, the Energy Innovation and Dividend Act). This bill garnered 86 co-sponsors, 26 from California including Congressman Ami Bera. Billie is proud that the bill got that



far and is hopeful for more action to create solutions to the climate crisis. Billie is happy to continue working with CCL to see this through.

While this focus on saving the planet is relatively new, Billie has been a life-long activist, notably with various Friends Committees that serve the causes of peace and justice. These include the American Friends Service Committee, Friends Committee on National Legislation, and the Friends Legislative Committee of California. A woman determined to "try to make the world a better place and particularly to help the poor and disenfranchised"; Billie joined vigils and marches in every city she lived in as an adult. A longtime member of the National Organization for Women Billie

greatly appreciates the many advancements in the rights and opportunities for women she has observed in her lifetime.

Activism has not been Billie's only passion. A talented musician, Billie plays the recorder and viola da gamba (this early stringed instrument, used in the Baroque era is like a cello but with more strings and frets like a guitar). Billie founded the Sacramento Recorder Society in 1987, a group that continues to this day. As an amateur, Billie performed with two different Baroque music groups at venues such as the Crocker Art Gallery and CSUS.

As befits a woman of her age and personality, Billie is also a member of the "Raging Grannies." This international social justice activist organiza-

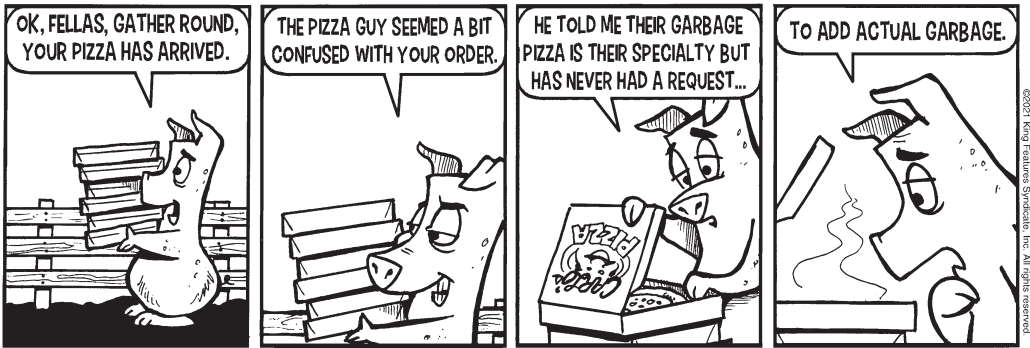

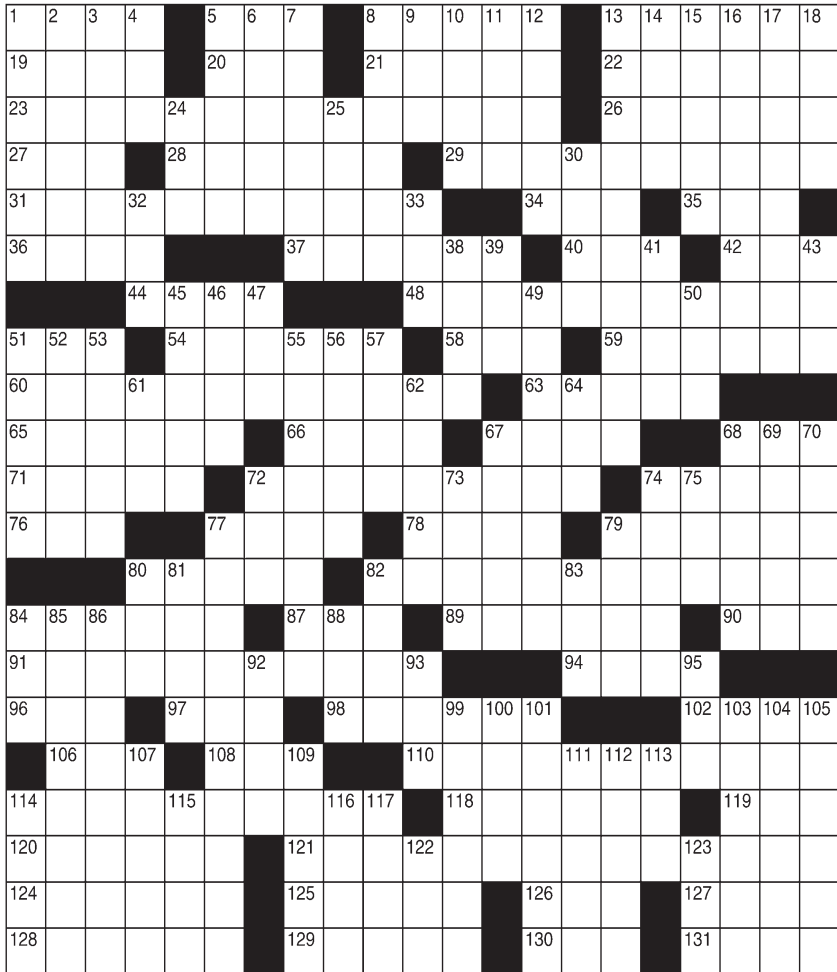

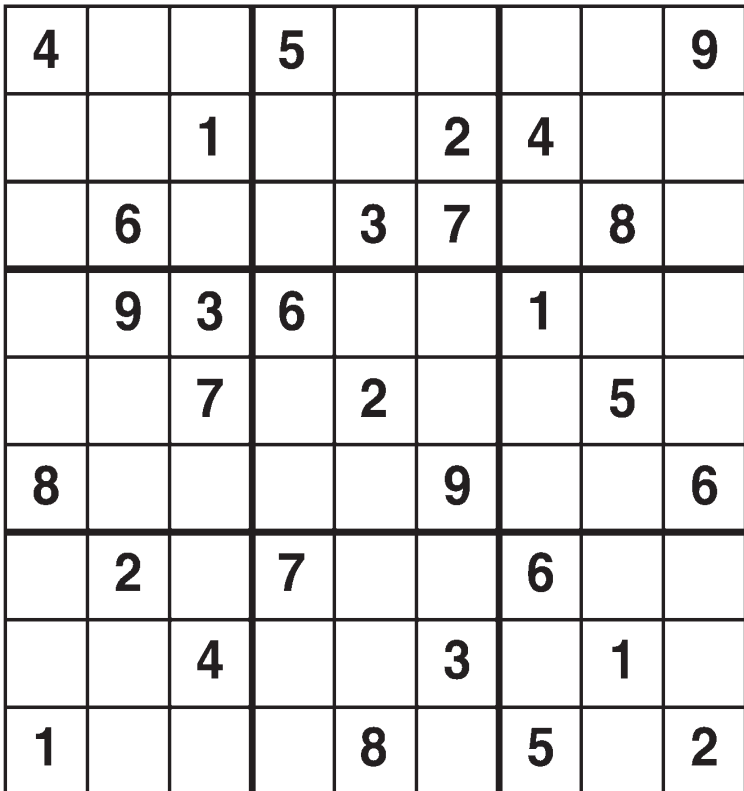

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Yolo County Landfill Offers Free Compost in April and May

During the months of April and May, the Yolo County Central Landfill, located at 44090 County Road 28H in Woodland, will be offering free compost to residents Monday – Saturday from 6:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. and on Sunday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.; no appointment is needed.

Upon entering the Central Landfill, residents must: show proof of residency such as a driver’s license or utility bill; wear a mask; bring their own bags and shovels; and observe all local mandated physical distancing measures while on site. Residents are expected to bag and load the compost themselves.

The compost comes from the anaerobic composter cells that started operating at the Landfill in 2019. The composter has an annual total capacity of 52,000 tons and uses anaerobic bacteria to decompose organic waste, a mixture of green and food waste, in a sealed environment. This decomposition process takes less than six months to complete and provides many benefits including: diverting organic waste from the landfill, producing renewable energy, reducing water use and carbon emissions, and creating compost at a lower capital and operational cost.

Yolo County Prosecutors attend Implicit Bias Training

On March 31, 2021, the Yolo County District Attorney’s hosted a mandatory human relations facilitated training for all Yolo County prosecutors. The main goal of the training was for prosecutors to develop a better understanding of how implicit bias can impact the prosecution of cases, as well as the role that implicit bias plays in daily life. Procedural justice was also a major focus. The training was facilitated by Josef Levy of Embassy Consulting Services, whose mission is to help build and maintain safe, respectful, and inclusive organizations and communities.

This was the second full day of Implicit Bias training offered to prosecutors at the Yolo County District Attorney’s Office. The Yolo County DA’s Office is the first District Attorney’s office in the state to require all prosecutors to attend implicit bias training. Additionally, in the winter of 2021, 70 District Attorney staff members voluntarily participated in a groundbreaking, six-week exploration of systemic racism and the prosecutor’s role in addressing it. This training was developed and hosted by a collaboration of criminal justice reform pioneers, including the Vera Institute of Justice, For the People, and the Public Rights Project. The training was supported by the Chan Zuckerberg Initiative.

Wednesday’s training covered the differences between stereotype, prejudice, discrimination, and oppression. Levy facilitated a discussion about walking on the “side of the fence” with “more advantages” or “fewer advantages,” as well as the role that empathy plays in working and interacting with people. Levy explained that “we all have biases and we are ‘wired’ that way.” Levy went on to say that the important thing is that we recognize our biases. He then discussed how biases can impact the criminal justice system and that implicit bias can impact the decisions of prosecutors at the various stages in a case, including charging, selecting a jury, plea bargaining, and sentencing. Deputy District Attorney Preston Schaub stated that “it’s important we all recognize our implicit bias, as we make decisions that will have a huge impact on so many people. We must take our time, deliberate, take a step back and check ourselves.” The outcome of these trainings will be evaluated to determine the long-term impact.

District Attorney Jeff Reisig said there is no training we offer that is more important than implicit bias training. “As prosecutors we make significant decisions and it is imperative we understand the role our biases play every day on the job,” said Reisig. “I’m so pleased our prosecutors are open-minded. They are very introspective, and they want do even better with the way in which they do their jobs and live their lives.

In June, 2021, the District Attorney’s office will be the second in the state to launch a “Blind Charging” program. DA staff has been working with Stanford University to develop computer code that will redact all information from police reports which identifies a suspect or victim’s race or ethnicity. The goal is to eliminate any implicit bias that could impact the decision of whether criminal charges will be filed. Reisig stated “I’m very excited to launch this program that we’ve been working on for over a year. I hope other offices across the state and country follow suit.”

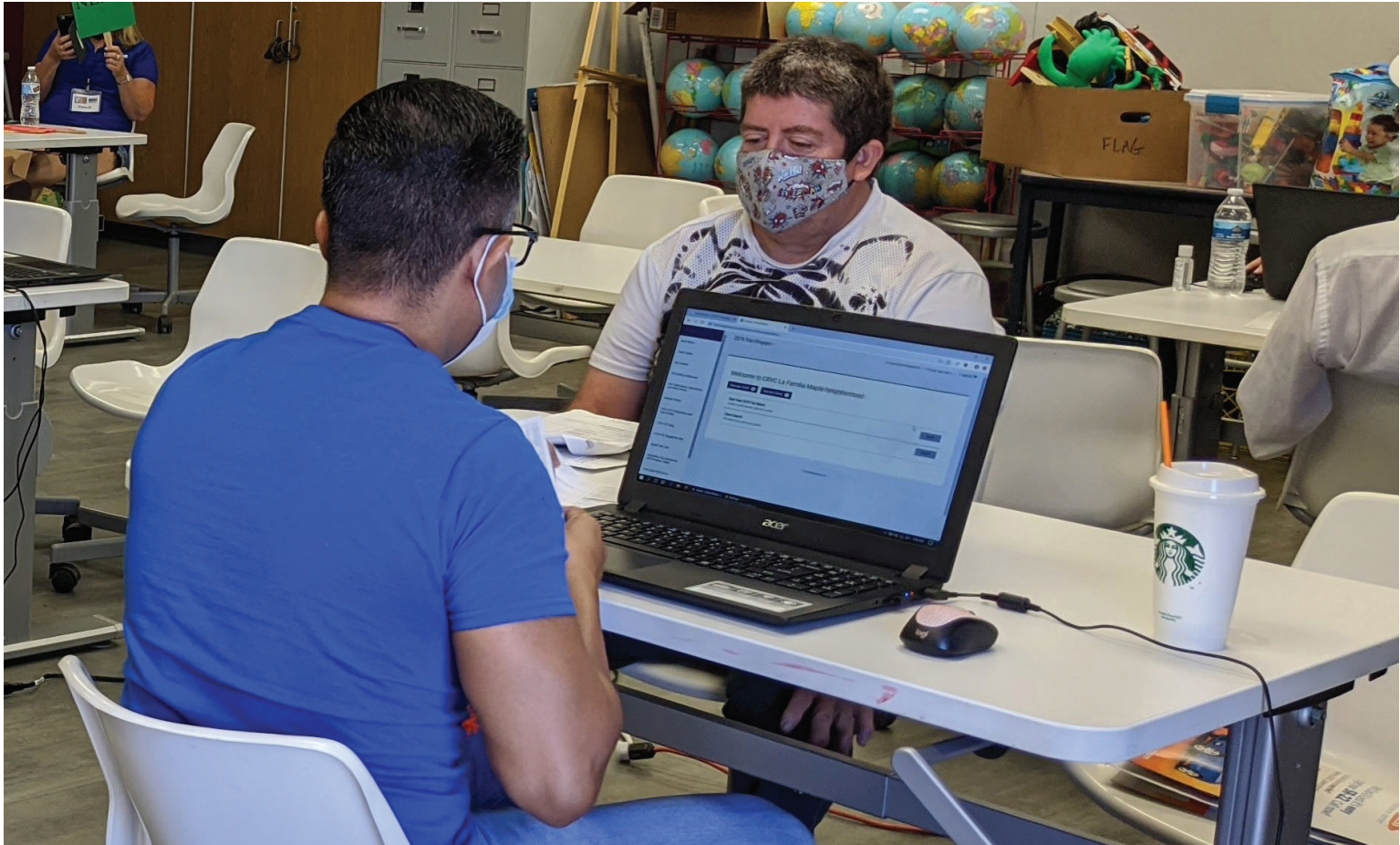
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United Way’s virtual free tax prep program shifts due to rise in demand, extended deadline

Qualifying residents can still receive free help applying for up to \$8,000 in tax credits

United Way California Capital Region is shifting its free tax help program from virtual one-on-one assistance to virtual group assistance and a do-it-yourself option, due to a rise in demand and the new filing deadline of May 17. Eligible households can now visit [YourFreeTaxPrep.org](#) to file their taxes online for free by themselves or to sign up for a free April 10 Zoom webinar where United Way’s IRS-certified volunteers will assist the group in filing their taxes online. Space is limited in the Zoom session, so eligible residents should sign up as soon as possible. United Way’s virtual one-on-one appointments are booked through the rest of tax season.

Households throughout the Sacramento region are eligible for free virtual help preparing taxes and claiming credits this year, saving an average of \$200 in preparer fees and earning up to \$8,000 in credits. More households are eligible to participate in United Way California Capital Region’s Free Tax Prep program this year, including those earning \$65,000 or less in 2020. Qualified households can prepare tax returns online for free and claim the maximum tax credits for which they are eligible, including the federal and state Earned Income Tax Credits (EITC and CalEITC). “After a year where many people lost employment and income, it’s more important than ever for households in our region to take advantage of this program that helps people save money on tax preparation fees and ensures they apply for the maximum refund and credits for which they are eligible,” said Stephanie Bray, president and CEO, United Way California Capital Region. “This program is an important way for our community to jumpstart the local economy in 2021, and it’s a key element of our Square One Project that provides resources for local families so their children can graduate from high school prepared to succeed in college or career.” This year, more people are eligible to receive the CalEITC and Young Child Tax Credit, including qualifying ITIN holders, after Governor Newsom signed Assembly Bill 1876. Households may be eligible for CalEITC



if the taxpayer is at least 18 years old and the household earned less than \$30,000 in 2020. Many CalEITC-eligible households are not legally required to file taxes due to low income; however, if they file, they can claim state and federal credits. Despite the deadline extension, experts recommend everyone files early, noting that many people do not realize that unemployment income may be taxable. Recent legislation exempts \$10,200 of unemployment income received in 2020 for individuals with less than \$150,000 of income. For those who have already filed, guidance will soon be provided by the IRS. Amended returns should not

be filed at this time for these adjustments. Filers also may qualify for the new Golden State Stimulus if they have filed their 2020 tax return and qualify for CalEITC or hold an ITIN and make less than \$75,000. Filers must be California residents when the payment is issued and cannot be claimed as dependants. United Way’s Free Tax Prep program was shifted online last year when the pandemic and stay-at-home order hit. Even with the pivot to virtual services, United Way’s Free Tax Prep volunteers filed 7,060 returns for the 2019 tax year and put \$10.5 million back in the pockets of local families through federal refunds.

For nearly 100 years, United Way California Capital Region has brought local people together to make community change happen. Today, the nonprofit is bringing people together across Amador, El Dorado, Sacramento, Placer and Yolo counties for its Square One Project, a 20-year promise to significantly increase the number of students in our region who graduate from high school ready for success in college and beyond. United Way believes ending poverty starts in school and is working to ensure kids meet important milestones and their families receive support and resources. sign up for a vaccine, though spots may get taken more quickly with the expanded eligibility.

Yolo County is working with local healthcare providers, community clinics, fire departments and others to vaccinate as many eligible residents and workers as possible, including redistributing County doses to these providers.

The vaccine is completely free regardless of having or not

having health care insurance and does not require eligibility verification. Yolo County recommends that residents look at multiple options for vaccine appointments, including checking with their health-care provider, local community clinics, MyTurn, or pharmacies.

“We are happy that people over the age of 50 will be eligible for vaccines on April 1 and that all those over the age of 16 will be eligible on April 15. However because the supply of vaccines is still too low to give shots to all willing

Yolo County residents, it is essential that we continue to wear masks, maintain physical distancing, and avoid gatherings with persons not in our households,” said Chair of the Yolo County Board of Supervisors Jim Provenza. “Yolo County staff and volunteers are getting shots into arms as fast as the vaccines arrive in our county. I am optimistic that our supply will increase soon so that we will be able to vaccinate all willing Yolo County residents.”

Residents should continue to follow public health

guidance even after they’ve been vaccinated, including wearing a face covering in public, practicing physical distancing, and avoiding gatherings when possible to continue to reduce the spread of COVID-19 in our community and especially when considering those who have not yet been vaccinated.

Over 831 New Crimes Committed by Individuals Released on \$0 Bail

As a result of Yolo County Superior Court’s continued use of \$0 bail, over 831 new crimes have been committed. In April of 2020, the California Judicial Council imposed the “\$0” Emergency Bail Schedule in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Although rescinded in June of 2020, the Yolo County Superior Court continues to use the Emergency Bail Schedule. The court recently indicated an intention to end the use of the Emergency Bail Schedule.

Since April 13, 2020, individuals released on \$0 bail have committed over 831 new crimes. Those new crimes include 350 felonies and 481 misdemeanors, including crimes such as Attempted Murder (2 new victims), Assault with a Deadly Weapon or Assault by Means of Force Likely to Product Great Bodily Injury (21 new victims), Robbery (12 new victims), Burglary (48 new victims), felony domestic violence (13 new victims), possession of an assault weapon, gang crimes, and dozens

of other new felony and misdemeanor crimes. Since the COVID 19 pandemic began, 522 individuals have been released a total 680 times on \$0 bail. Of those released on \$0 bail, 41.8% have been rearrested at least one time, the highest percentage thus far during the \$0 bail period. The Emergency Bail Schedule simply looks at the arresting offense and releases individuals on \$0 bail, even those on probation or parole, without conducting a risk assessment for dangerousness. Addition-

ally, upon release on \$0 bail, offenders are given a court date 4-5 months in the future. This makes it nearly impossible to assess those individuals who are homeless, suffer from a substance use disorder, or from a serious mental illness in order to enroll them into one of the county’s diversion programs such as mental health court or addiction intervention court.

Recently, the Yolo County Superior Court indicated it plans to stop its use of the Emergency Bail Schedule and issue a new 2021 Felony

and Misdemeanor Bail Schedule. As proposed, the Court’s bail schedule will significantly reduce bail amounts to fractions of amounts previously set.

For example, bail amounts for the crimes possession of child pornography, felony driving under the influence, stalking and dissuading a witness will be reduced from \$50,000 to \$5,000.

Domestic violence and elder abuse may be reduced from \$50,000 to \$15,000 while a number of forcible sex crimes and child molestation

crimes could be reduced from either \$250,000 or \$100,000 to \$50,000. Typically, to post bail an individual need only to produce 10% of the bail amount up front.

The continued use of the Emergency Bail Schedule and the creation of annual bail schedules are determined by the Yolo County Superior Court. Anyone with concerns about the ongoing use of the Emergency Bail Schedule or the Proposed bail schedule should contact the Yolo County Superior Court.
