Afzili family released statement following arrest of Gabriel Poletti

Elk Grove man arrested on counts of murder and driving under the influence

On February 15, 2021 at approximately 11:32 p.m., West Sacramento Police were dispatched with West Sacramento Fire and AMR for a report of a two-vehicle head-on traffic collision near Jefferson Boulevard and Locks Drive.

Upon arrival, it was determined there were five patients, three adults and two children. One adult was pronounced deceased while on scene and a second was transported to the hospital where they were pronounced deceased. The two children riding with the deceased adults sustained minor to moderate injuries and were also transported to a nearby hospital. The adult driver of the second vehicle was admitted to an area hospital with serious injuries. The West Sacramento Police Department Traffic Unit is investigating this incident.

The surviving driver of this collision was identified as Gabriel Poletti, 27 years of age, of Elk Grove California. Information gathered through the investigation indicates Poletti may have been under the influence at the time of the collision. Poletti has a prior conviction for driving under the influence in 2016. On February 23, 2021, a felony no bail Ramey arrest warrant was issued for Poletti for two counts of 187 (a) P.C. Murder and two counts of 23153 (a) C.V.C. Driving under the influence causing injury. Poletti was arrested by the West Sacramento Police Department while at a family members res-



idence in Sacramento without incident.

After his arrest, the Afzili Family released the following statement: On the night of February 15, 2021, Rasul and Anila Afzili were traveling home from his mother's home after celebrating his birthday with family. They were tragically killed in a head-on collision on Jefferson Boulevard by a suspected impaired driver, leaving behind their two small children, Jannah (3 years old) and Azaan (7 months old). Also in the car, were their two small children. Jannah hospitalized and released with a broken femur and broken arm and Azaan has

been treated and released from the hospital.

"My family is relieved to hear that there has been an arrest made in this heinous crime. We are hoping that justice will prevail, so that our family will be at peace. We as a family unit are going to raise these

Officer involved shooting left one man dead near Walmart

On Thursday, Feb. 25, at about 3:45 p.m., West Sacramento Police responded to a call in the Walmart parking lot of a man with a knife. Officers arrived and contacted an involved vehicle. An officer involved shooting occurred and a man in his mid 20s was shot.

West Sacramento Fire Department and AMR were in the area following the initial call and attempted life saving measures. Shortly after, the subject was pronounced deceased. No other injuries are reported to officers or bystanders.

While this is an on-going investigation, as of press time, police said in a statement that the man was armed at the time of the shooting.

Pursuant to the Yolo County Officer Involved Shooting Fatal Incident Protocol, an independent investigation will be conducted by Woodland Police Department and the Yolo County District Attorney's Office.


Philip Jack Siters (77) of West Sacramento, California died February 20, 2021.







UC Davis Health ranks seventh in the nation for kidney transplants in 2020 World-class care close to home benefits patients, community

Despite a pandemic and nationwide Health team for all the precautions hospital capacity concerns, UC Davis Health's kidney transplant team was among the top 10 busiest kidney transplant centers in the U.S for 2020. The UC Davis kidney transplant team ranks No. 7 in the country for total volume of kidney transplants and No. 1 in California for total number of deceased donor kidney transplants.

By the end of last year, transplant center surgeons had performed 352 kidney transplants, which is the second-highest year on record since the program began in 1985. (The highest volume year was 2016 with the total number of kidneys transplanted at 402.) The 2020 numbers drove UC Davis Health to be in the top 10 in the nation in terms of the number of all kidney transplants, and third in the nation for number of deceased donor transplants.

Behind the statistics are people like 56-year-old Margaret Gladstein and Jeff Blumenthal, cousins who began their transplant journey last year. Gladstein suffers from polycystic kidney disease, an inherited disorder in which clusters of cysts form and cause kidneys to lose function over time.

"In October of 2019, I got the news that my creatinine levels went up and my kidney function went down. Even though you know it's coming, it was hard to hear," Gladstein said.

Creatinine is a chemical that indicates if your kidneys are working well. Gladstein desperately needed a new kidney, just as her brother and two aunts had before her. It was a well-known reality in her family circle.

"We were at a family function in Chicago about three years ago and I asked Margaret how her kidney was doing," recalled Blumenthal, who is five years Gladstein's senior. "I then said flippantly, When you need a transplant, give me a call!"

Gladstein did. And in August 2020, they began the process so Blumenthal could follow up on his offer to donate a kidney.

"At first I thought, if I don't do it someone else will," Blumenthal said. "But then I realized if everyone thought that way, then nobody would donate. And you do what you can to improve someone else's life."

The successful transplant surgery was Feb. 8 of this year. Both Gladstein and Blumenthal credit the UC Davis they took to keep them safe and healthy during the coronavirus pandemic.

"It has been a very tough year for everyone, particularly our patients in need of a transplant," said Richard Perez, chief of Transplant Surgery and medical director for the UC Davis Health Transplant Center. "Our transplant team has made many changes in our practice to make transplantation a safe option, even in the midst of the pandemic. It is very gratifying for all of us to have the opportunity to have a positive impact on the lives of our patients during these difficult times."

The UC Davis Transplant Center has consistently been among the nation's top programs in terms of kidney transplant volume. Outcomes for UC Davis kidney transplant patients also consistently meet or exceed the national average. That's why transplant team members are astounded when people in Sacramento don't know about the program.

"I'm stunned at the number of people who don't know we have a world-class transplant center in their backyard," said Melissa Bein, transplant center director. "Transplant is a multi-year process with many steps and lots of provider visits."

Bein said sometimes location is what makes the difference between people receiving care or not.

"It's amazing," Gladstein added. "Every time we go to an appointment, my husband and I talk about how fortunate we are to live a couple of miles away from this in our backyard. I feel very fortunate about that."

Gladstein and Blumenthal agree that despite the long process, the UC Davis Health team put their health and safety first to make the transplant a reality.

"Obviously, I've never donated a kidney before," Blumenthal said. "But I'd much rather have the experience of UC Davis Health than somebody who doesn't do as many of these. It's an honor to be able to do this."

An honor and a life-saving sacrifice.

"I'm incredibly grateful that he's willing to go through this," Gladstein added. "I'm amazed he was so committed to doing it in the midst of a pandemic. I hope his experience encourages others to do this as well. It really is the gift of life."

that extended from Canada south well into Mexico was the site of dramatic history as cattle were driven north through it from Texas to railroads in Kansas, and eventually to new pastures in Montana as described in Lonesome Dove. Much of what we know as the wild west took place there in the single 1870's decade from Wyatt Earp's taming Dodge City to Custer's defeat at the Little Big Horn. It's climatic monoclimax, of course, was grassland.

When Clements saw California's Central Valley, its plains reminded him so much of those in his Nebraska home state, he concluded it must have the same climate. Consequently, in his climatic climax map, that valley is colored the same yellow as the great plains. And since his theory demanded the same plants in the same climate, he found a few bunch grasses in California related to those in Nebraska and declared them the valley's original vegetation his theory demanded; even though John Muir 50 years earlier found the still largely undisturbed valley covered with spring and fall wildflowers and very little grass. Despite that, Clements' bunch grass theory was widely and dogmatically believed until quite recently.

Another plant ecologist W. S. Cooper knew the Central Valley's climate was nothing like Nebraska but still believed fervently in monoclimaxes. He decided California's unique climate deserved its own unique climax vegetation and found it in uniquely Californian chaparral shrublands. And good theorist that he was, Cooper believed chaparral had to be the monoclimax that covered all of California's distinctive climate zone including the Central Valley, even though no one who had actually been there had ever found anything like that. But

despite scant evidence for Clements' conclusion about central California and none for Cooper's, both had their advocates in academic plant ecology throughout the twentieth century since it often practiced what jurists call stare decisis, standing by what's decided.

Monoclimax was never accepted much in Europe or the rest of the world outside the United States and for good reason. For one, climate is among the least stable of environmental features; hardly one likely to drag vegetation on more stable things like rocks to a monoclimax. Still, it was significant 50 years ago at UC Davis when a young and soon to be great plant ecology professor Mike Barbour, who tragically passed away late last year, chose the text An Island Called California by an observant amateur Elna Bakker for his classes rather than one by an academic. Unobstructed by stare decisis Bakker described a previously unnoticed elephant in the room: California has no single "monoclimax" but is a mosaic of many kinds vegetation that shifts across landscapes as environmental conditions change.

The reason for this mosaic is quite simple but little discussed or noticed. In California's Mediterranean type climate rain falls when it's too cold for much plant growth so water is stored underground for a few months until temperatures warm. Those months cause underground conditions to be much more important here than east of the Rockies, where monoclimax theory was invented and rain falls when plants are ready to grow. The greater dependence of vegetation in California on its diverse soils and geology during the months they store water increases its botanical diversity and may even increase its resilience to climate change.

Dear Editor,

No one wants to be back in the classroom more than educators. I want to welcome every one of my students back to my classrooms in a way that keeps everyone safe: students, their families and staff.

As California continues to struggle to control the pandemic, which is still impacting many communities disproportionately, a phased-in approach that responds to local conditions and transmission rates has to be part of a responsible return to in-person instruction.

Any path to bringing students back to campuses will require implementing multi-layered mitigation strategies that consider community conditions and include robust cleaning and updated ventilation systems, asymptomatic testing of students and school employees, sixfeet social distancing and enforcement.

To reopen schools for instruction, in-person the state must ensure all employees required to report in person have been provided the opportunity to be vaccinated before students return to campus. The vaccine distribution should prioritize educators in schools already open and schools in communities with high transmission rates.

We must take a comprehensive and data-driven approach to reopening schools that includes addressing community spread. After all, no matter how safe of a bubble we put around our schools, the

students and staff inside go home at the end of the day. If mitigation efforts are inadequate in the community, the risk of it being brought back to school increases significantly.

Yolo County Returns to the Red Tier; **Restrictions Ease for Select Businesses**

On February 23, the State of California announced that Yolo County would move into the Substantial, or red, tier in the State's Blueprint for a Safer Economy (Blueprint) after meeting the red tier's metrics for two consecutive weeks. As a result, many local businesses and activities will either be allowed to expand capacity or resume operations.

Effective Wednesday, February 24, the following restrictions will apply while Yolo County is in the red tier:

- Fitness centers and gyms: open indoors with 10% max occupancy
- Gatherings: Indoor gatherings strongly discouraged but allowed with modifications; no more than 16 people from no more than 3 households
- Hotels and lodging: fitness centers can now open indoors with 10% max occupancy
- Movie theatres and family entertainment centers: open indoors with 25% max occupancy or 100 people, whichever is fewer
- Museums, zoos, and aquariums: open indoors with 25% max occupancy
- Personal care services (including tattoo parlors, piercing shops, electrolysis and body waxing): open indoors with modifications
- Places of worship: open indoors with 25% max occupancy or 100 people, whichever is fewer

The max occupancy percentage is based on the California Building and Fire Code that is displayed in every business and determines the maximum number of people, including staff and the public, permitted in a room at a time and able to escape safely in case of a fire.

The following industries were allowed to open indoors in the purple tier and may continue to stay open in the red tier: critical infrastructure, limited services, hair salons, barbershops and personal care services.

The following industries are only allowed to open outdoors with modifications, not indoors, while in the red tier: family entertainment centers, wineries, cardrooms, satellite wagering and professional sports with no live audiences.

The following industries must continue to stay closed in the red tier: bars and breweries where no meal is provided, live audience sports and amusement parks.

"Moving into the red tier is an indication that COVID-19 cases are declining, but it does not mean that coronavirus has gone away," said Yolo County Health Officer Dr. Aimee Sisson. "We cannot let down our guard. Reopening must be done cautiously to avoid a surge in cases. I urge residents to continue taking precautions to keep themselves, their loved ones, and the rest of the Yolo County community safe. Wearing masks, distancing, not gathering indoors, and getting vaccinated when it is your turn remain as important as ever." Yolo County was placed in the most restrictive Widespread, or purple tier on November 17 and stayed in the purple tier through the State's Stay Home order for the Greater Sacramento Region. The State's Blueprint tracks three metrics: the seven-day adjusted case rate, the seven-day testing positivity rate and the health equity metric. For the week ending February 22, Yolo County's rate for adjusted cases was 5.6, for testing positivity was 1.6% and for health equity was 5.2%. To move into the red or substantial tier, counties must meet a daily case

rate of between 4-7, a positivity rate of between 5-8% and a health equity rate of between 5.3-8% for two consecutive weeks while being in the purple tier for at least three weeks.

Yolo County must be in the red tier for at least three weeks and meet the Moderate, or orange, tier's metrics for two consecutive weeks, before officially moving into the orange tier. Counties can also move backward into more restrictive tiers if their metrics worsen for two consecutive weeks. Additionally, if a county's case rate and positivity rate fall into two different tiers, the county remains in the stricter tier.

"I am glad that we are finally able to re-enter the red tier," said Chair of the Yolo County Board of Supervisors Jim Provenza. "This will benefit gyms, restaurants, youth sports and many others. I would like to caution Yolo County residents to continue observing safe practices; such as distancing, wearing face covering and staying away from large gatherings; so that we can avoid another surge in cases and a possible return to the purple tier."

Everyone has a role to play in keeping our communities safe and healthy, including wearing a face covering, physical distancing and not gathering with others outside their household. Older adults and individuals with underlying medical conditions should continue to stay at home as much as possible. Lower spread of COVID-19 means that more businesses and industries can reopen and revitalize our local economy.

health exposure. Individuals already reporting to work on campuses were offered vaccines first, followed by those who are planning to return to campuses in the near future.

"I am really excited about our partnership with Dignity Health Woodland Clinic to quickly vaccinate education workers," said Yolo County Public Health Officer Dr. Aimee Sisson. "Getting students back to in-person learning has a myriad of health and educational benefits, and vaccinating school staff will support this group in feeling more comfortable returning to classrooms."

So far, Yolo County is surpassing Governor Newsom's goal announced last week that, beginning March 1, at least 10 percent of the state's vaccine supply would be prioritized for education workers. Yolo County is one of 35 counties actively vaccinating education workers. On February 16, Yolo County expanded eligibility to include all frontline workers in Phase 1b Tier 1 of the State of California's vaccine prioritization framework, which included individuals who work in education.

Yolo County will continue to prioritize vaccines for education workers in the following order:

- K-12 education workers already working on school campuses (public, private, and charter)
- Workers in afterschool programs on already working on K-12 campuses
- Workers in higher education already working on campuses
- K-12 education workers not working on school campuses but planning to return soon
- Workers in afterschool programs not yet working on K-12 campuses but planning to return soon
- Workers in higher education not yet working on campuses but planning to return soon

- Retail (including standalone grocers): open indoors with 50% max occupancy
- Restaurants open indoors with 25% max occupancy or 100 people, whichever is fewer; only members of same household may share a table
- K-12 Schools: May reopen after the County has been in the red tier for 5 consecutive days and must follow the State's Reopening Framework
- Shopping centers (including swap meets and indoor malls): open indoors with 50% max occupancy
- Youth sports: competitions between two teams are allowed for outdoor low- and moderate-contact sports according to the State's Youth Sports Guidance

Missed it this year? Audubon sponsors annually other "citizen" bird projects. Example: Its 2019 climate change report, Survival By Degrees, found that up to two-thirds of North American birds are vulnerable to extinction due to climate change. The Climate Watch project tests Audubon's climate models by having volunteers look for birds where the models predict they will be. Twice a year, volunteer birders across North America survey for one of 12 target species. Carol recently saw one of the 'targeted species' in Broderick – a Western Bluebird. Interested?
