

City council approves special election for the vacant seat

The West Sacramento City Council unanimously approved a resolution calling for a special all-mail ballot election on August 31, 2021, and requesting Yolo County Elections to provide election services.

At its meeting on December 9, 2020, the City Council discussed options for filling the vacant Council seat that was created by former Councilmember Martha Guerrero's election to Mayor at the November 3, 2020 general election.

On January 7, the Council considered several options for filling the vacant seat, including 1. Conducting an application/appointment process with the subcommittee identifying finalists for consideration by the Council; conducting an application/appointment process with the subcommittee recommending an appointee for consideration by the Council;

calling for a special election to be held by all-mail balloting on August 31, 2021, either instead of or after unsuccessfully conducting an application/appointment process; calling for a special election by regular balloting to be held on November 2, 2021, either instead of or after unsuccessfully conducting an application/appointment process; making a direct appointment; the staff also noted that the Council could conduct other variations of an application/appointment process not listed above.

Councilmember Orozco proposed to appoint Dr. Dawnté Early, the Council candidate from the November 2020 election with the third-highest vote count. None of the motions were successful due to a lack of majority vote. After the item, direction was given to staff to prepare a resolution to call for

a special election by all-mail balloting on August 31, 2021, and to return to the Council at either this meeting or on February 3 for consideration of the resolution.

For cities of less than 100,000 in population, the State Elections Code provides that a Council vacancy may be filled by an all-mail ballot election on certain dates. The next eligible election date for this option is August 31, 2021.

Following the January 7 meeting, staff received an estimate of \$157,000 from the Yolo County Elections Division for the cost of conducting an all-mail ballot election on August 31, 2021. This estimate is within the range for election services quoted by staff in the last report, but higher than the anticipated cost of an all-mail ballot election (the range provided was between \$50,000-\$250,000).

Staff does not have an estimate for the cost of a regular election in November, but it is expected to be significantly higher than the cost for an all-mail ballot election. The cost of a special election would need to be fully covered by the City.

At the Jan. 20 City Council meeting, Council Member Quirina Orozco stated that her effort in her elected position has always been about giving a voice to the will of the greatest number of voters. She had voiced her support for Early's appointment. In a previously published letter to the editor, she stated the November General Election showed the courage of candidates who put their names on a ballot for City Council ran their campaigns, shared their visions, and were vetted, challenged, and considered by our citizens. Residents 65 and Older Added to Phase 1B of COVID-19 Vaccine Distribution Schedule but More Doses are Needed

As part of the State of California's revised plan to effectively and efficiently increase COVID-19 vaccine distribution, residents age 65 and older have been prioritized in Phase 1B Tier 1. Currently, Yolo County is in Phase 1A Tiers 2 and 3 and will likely move into Phase 1B in the coming weeks once additional doses are received from the State of California. However, Yolo County will run out of COVID-19 vaccine doses in the next week without more doses coming from the State.

The State may further revise its vaccine distribution guidelines and reprioritize groups in the future. The County understands that this may be confusing and asks that residents stay patient; the County is working as quickly as possible to meet the needs of residents while also adhering to changing and unpredictable State revisions and prioritization lists.

Multi County Entities (MCEs), such as Sutter Health, UC Davis Health, Dignity Health and Kaiser Permanente, are also assisting with administering the COVID-19 vaccine.

Free testing at Club West at Bryte Park

Free COVID-19 testing in West Sacramento is now available at Club West, 1125 Riverbank Rd on the north side of Bryte Park. The weekly schedule will be Monday - Thursday, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. through June.

Testing is open to anyone in the community regardless of documentation status. If residents do not have health insurance, the cost of the test will be covered by the state. If residents have health insurance, their provider will be billed with no out of pocket cost. Children under the age of 12 will not be tested at this location due to



health and safety reasons. Residents must wear a face covering to their appointment and practice social distancing. This location is not a drive-thru so residents will need to park their car and walk a short distance to the building.

Mom, watching for dad's car at end of day, admonished my pre-teen self: "Run upstairs

and put some clothes on. Your dad's home!" If I didn't, he'd roll his eyes and say. "It's a good thing we live on a farm. You act like you were born in a barn."

cine. The County currently anticipates that individuals 65 and older will be able to get their vaccines through their primary care provider if they are part of a large health care system, such as Kaiser Permanen-

te or Dignity Health. As soon as Phase 1A is complete, the County will be holding vaccination clinics for older residents who are not members of large health care systems or do not have medical insurance. The State also plans to launch a text-and-email notification system so Californians can keep track of when they’re

eligible to sign up for their shot.

Local residents who are in Phase 1B Tier 1, including those 65 and older, are recommended to fill out the vaccine availability form, which is available in English, Spanish and Russian, at: <http://bit.ly/VaccineAvailability>. The information that residents provide will help the County organize and schedule vaccine clinics accordingly. Yolo County will be sharing additional vaccine distribution information for Phase 1B once finalized.

“The County is working hard to secure the needed vaccine doses

from the State. However, the State’s expanded eligibility is incongruent with the current reality of extremely limited vaccine supply. When everybody is a priority, nobody is a priority. Pushing counties into Phase 1B and expanding Phase 1B Tier 1 to include everyone 65 and older at a time when Yolo County doesn’t even have enough vaccine to finish Phase 1A is creating unreasonable expectations among the public,” said Yolo County’s Public Health Officer Dr. Aimee Sison. “Yolo County is administering doses as quickly as possible. We

will begin vaccinating those 65 and older and others in Phase 1B as soon as we finish vaccinating the several thousand remaining health care workers prioritized in Phase 1A. When we do begin vaccinating in Phase 1B, we will have to sub-prioritize residents because there are tens of thousands of county residents who are 65 and older, and only a few hundred doses coming in each week from the State.”

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recently announced changes to its vaccine plan, encouraging states to expand

the pool of those eligible to receive the vaccine to individuals 65 and older. During the initial stages of vaccine distribution, priorities are set at the federal and state levels by the CDC and the California Department of Public Health.

Los Rios Colleges to Offer \$735,000 in Student Scholarships

The Los Rios colleges - American River College, Cosumnes River College, Folsom Lake College and Sacramento City College - are offering \$735,000 in scholarships to students in 2021, with the application period opening January 15.

There are over 480 different scholarships offered, with each one focused on a specific major, program of study or subject area. Stu-

"The majority of our students are low-income and eligible for less financial aid than students attending four-year institutions. Due to the high cost of living in the Sacramento region, most students work 20 to 40 hours per week just to make ends meet," King noted. "Scholarships bring higher

education into the reach of students for whom an education might not otherwise be attainable."

Many scholarships were established by generous donors who want to support students. This philanthropic support has a great impact on countless students each year.

wrote: “Fulfilling their civic duties, those West Sacramentans re-elected me, welcomed Norma Alcalá, and gave Dawnte Early-West over 8,100 votes, the 4th highest vote total in our city’s history. “Dawnte’s appointment would shatter a glass ceiling by bringing not only the first African-American woman to our council but one who is eminently qualified via her work in public health and equity research. I cannot fathom another time when Dawnte’s skills are more indispensable than now. But, ultimately, I favor Dawnte’s appointment because I cannot shake the words of civil rights titan, John Lewis, who said the vote is “the most powerful tool we have in a democratic society.”

At the Jan. 20 council meeting, Orozco said: “No one’s name we could throw out could support that Dr. Early had that matched the support that Alcalá had. Today, I heard the word democracy over and over again. And heard it with a hopeful tone. It’s the same democratic process I’d like to see in my mighty little city.”

Council Member Norma Alcalá supported an open application process, stating that when she was elected 8,212 people “put their faith” that she would do the right thing and follow the process and follow rules, but because of the im-

passee, the only solution she stated was to have a special election.

Emotions were high during the public comment section of the meeting, before the vote.

Here are some takeaway quotes:

Ryan Harrison noted that essentially there were two choices on the ballot for city council and what if there was a third, would the candidates have behaved differently? Would the voters have behaved differently? “I believe they would have,” he said. “I think there’s a logical inconsistency to say the will of the voters wanted Dawnte Early to be appointed even though that was not a consideration during the election. We need to recognize that. In the best case here, the solution would be to have the special election, understanding that it is costly and fiscally imprudent, but we should fall back on tradition, which is to hold that application process.”

LaMills Garrett Greater Sacramento NAACP called in his support for filling the vacant seat with Dr. Dawnte Early-West asking for the council to act with good governance one that is fair and equitable, financially responsible, and a model of inclusion. “On behalf of the Greater Sacramento NAACP, if we simply look at the qualifications, if we look at all things outside of race, Dr. Early clearly established herself as a clear candidate. And if we look at equity, please consider Dr. Early.

Norma Nelson asked, “What are you going to do when and if there’s a special election and Dr. Early-West still wins? You would have just wasted staff time, community time, and wasted taxpayer money. Not taking the opportunity to support the 8,123 votes that were cast for Dr. Early-West is basically discounting that many voters in West Sacramento. All of the representatives sitting on the city council have to represent all of West Sacramento. Given the fact that we just had an election. And that the voters have already spoken. She’s been vetted.”

Flojuane Cofer said the whole debate in regards to the appointment of Early to council could disparage a person new to this work – “a person who has values and morals and a track record of being spot-on when it comes to important issues.

“And, yet, this person is not even being dignified with basic meetings to have conversations with her simply because who she is perceived to be affiliated with. And I am hoping after the last four years of gaslighting and outright shame when it comes to the truth that we haven’t so far lost our way that we would ignore and not go down the rumor mill.”

In support of the special election, **Desiree Rojas** said she didn’t appreciate the divide between Black and Brown. “We have fought very hard for affirmative action and the opportunity. This has to do with

we had company, my mother made me. She washed. Grumbling mightily, I dried.

Aunt Mary (my father’s brother’s wife) on holidays helped clear the table. She was critical of this. “Carol doesn’t like doing dishes,” my mom would shrug. “Who does!?” snapped my Aunt Mary. (I never much liked Aunt Mary.) Mom told me what she said. I frowned. “Dad and Keith don’t help,” I pointed out. “They just watch **football**.”

All this came to mind when I read a plug for Melinda Gates’ updated book, *The Moment of Lift: How Empowering Women Changes the World*. She said, prior to her own enlightenment, her sons took out the trash. Her girls did dishes.

My mother knew it was easier to just do such chores herself than try to make me do them.

Which is not to say that I did nothing. If she wanted something fresh from dad’s garden for dinner, I trotted off to pick peas or corn. Dad had a big pile of cut firewood delivered. Without complaint, I stacked it neatly in the barn. Never complained about mucking my 4-H horse’s stall or hauling water to the barn. Or help

with the mowing. And pick cherries for mom’s pie.

She made all her pies from scratch. I have mom’s pie plate. I’ve yet to make a pie.

One year I told mom I wanted a model train for Christmas. Her response: “Girls don’t play with trains.” It shocked me. I’d never heard ‘girls don’t’ before. Allowed to be a tomboy; it hadn’t occurred to me there were things I couldn’t do.

In college in 1970, I decided I’d be a TV news reporter, even though I’d rarely to never seen a ‘girl’ reporter.

Getting my foot in the door. That, I knew, was everything.

So, I worked as a receptionist at a radio station and kept looking for my big break. I got it. Newsroom secretary at the NBC O&O (Owned and Operated station) in Cleveland. Its investigative reporter recommended me to a guy he’d worked with (“who you know”). The friend, a news director, hired me as a reporter/producer/weekend anchor.

Back when I was getting started, stories weren’t done on private family issues – such as ‘disciplining’ children, or anything involving animals.

I fought to do them. In that first job, I won a First Place

Community Service Award for my self-assigned child abuse series. A 4-year-old had been beaten to death by his step-dad. Later working in Chicago (WLS-TV), the Humane Society of the United States recognized me for my story on a dog shot by an arrow. Pennsylvania now has a Child Abuse Reporting Hotline.

The dog lived. His adopters named him ‘Bogie’ – my Chicago nickname.

A voice for the voiceless. That’s what I aim to be. Have I ‘changed the world’? I don’t know, but I’m still trying.

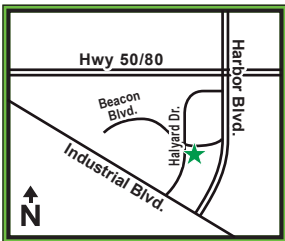
