## Quirina Orozco running for re-election

COVID-19 has kept the vast majority of people “locked up” for months. However, if you’ve lived in West Sacramento for longer than that, and have gone out into the community at all, chances are you’ve seen Quirina Orozco. Quirina is indeed a West Sac City Council Member. She has been for the last 4 years and is seeking re-election.

It’s also true that by being on the city council, she is aware of, and invited to events and grand openings all around town. Nine times out of ten, she is there. However, she’s not there just to look good or schmooze the public. She’s there because she truly loves her community and she wants to encourage everyone in it to succeed and to show them that they have her support. She is also always on the lookout for challenges that our community members are running into that may be holding them back from succeeding, to see what can be done to help.

When you speak to Quirina, she comes across as a very classy, professional person. She’s outgoing and friendly and seems to listen to people’s ideas and thoughts on whatever they are



talking to her about. She almost always does this with a smile on her face.

When I first met Quirina several years ago I thought that she was very sweet, but I tend to be a little cynical and assumed it was her “politician/be nice to the public” persona. But it didn’t take me long to see that she genuinely does care about what you have to say... no matter who you are or what your “stature” in the community is. She truly does believe that everyone has value, and she really wants anyone that may have forgotten that, to remember that they are important.

Quirina carries herself as a proud, accomplished woman. As she should. What a lot of people may not know is that she was

not born into a lot of money or a fancy neighborhood. She didn’t have a trust fund or college fund growing up. Quirina is an only child to a teenage mom, who grew up in South Sacramento. However, when Quirina was in high school, her guidance counselor called her out of class one day to ask her what her plans for the future were.

Quirina was a good student but at that time, she didn’t really have a plan for her future. College was certainly not something that she had thought was an option. Her counselor told her that he saw her as someone that could go far and do great things. While she sat there in his office, he helped her fill out applications to UC Berkeley and UC Davis. She was accepted. She chose Berkeley partly because it was a good school, but also because it allowed her to distance herself from the environment that was so rich with struggle and despair. While in college she joined a traditionally African American sorority, as the only Latina in the organization’s history.

Like many, Quirina faced challenges of all kinds. As a way to focus on her goals, she began making “to do” lists. They started small with things like “get a

job”. Then they grew. Once she got that job her list said: “become supervisor”. As her lists grew, her goals became bigger and more challenging. Soon, she wrote, “go to Harvard”. Originally she wrote it as a joke. But she left it there and soon it became a goal. She didn’t think it was really an option, until one day a friend told her of a program in Texas that if you passed the program you could go to Harvard. Suddenly Harvard might be an option, and eventually a reality. Quirina earned a Bachelor’s Degree at Berkeley in Social Welfare. She went on to earn a Master’s degree in Public Policy at Harvard. From there she went to work at the White House working to improve educational outcomes for underprivileged children. Then returned to California to work for Lt. Governor Cruz Bustamante’s staff on policies that created support of some of the state’s most vulnerable. Quirina felt she could still do more. She returned to UC Berkeley and got her Law degree. Her goal was to find justice and be a voice for those that needed her the most and felt they had no voice. Now she works for the Sacramento County District

## Yolo County Offers Free Flu Shots to Residents

Yolo County is hosting the following free Influenza (flu) vaccination clinics to help all residents and families ‘Fight the Flu’ this Fall:

- A drive-thru flu shot clinic will be held at West Sacramento City Hall on Oct. 10 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.
- A walk-in clinic will be held at Riverbank Elementary School, 1100 Carrie Street, West Sacramento from 4 to 7 p.m. on Oct. 15.
- A walk-in clinic will be held at Westfield Village Elementary School, 508 Poplar Avenue, West Sacramento from 4 to 7 p.m. on Oct. 20.

For the sites that are walk-in, residents can choose to reserve a flu shot by calling (530) 666-8552 or come without an appointment. The drive thru sites do not need an appointment. Residents ages 6 months and older are welcome at all sites. Additional sites will be added to the list once confirmed. The flu is a contagious respiratory illness that can cause mild to severe illness and can even result in hospitalization or death. Some people, such as older people, young children, and people with certain health conditions, are at high risk of serious flu complications. Common flu symptoms

## District Attorney’s DUI Program Receives \$200,000 Grant

The California Office of Traffic Safety (OTS) recently awarded Yolo County’s District Attorney’s Office \$200,000 for the continuation of its statewide recognized DUI program. The unit, which was formed in 2012, focuses on the prosecution and prevention of DUI cases as well as outreach, and law enforcement training. The program’s goal is to prevent impaired driving and reduce alcohol and drug-impaired traffic fatalities and injuries.

The Deputy District Attorneys that are assigned to the program prosecute the most serious and complex DUI cases, such as those involving injury and death, and those involving drug impairment. Deputy District Attorneys assigned to these cases handle them through all stages of the criminal process,

from the time of the arrest through sentencing, and focus closely on training law enforcement throughout California on DUI investigation. To date, close to 1,400 officers have been reached through DUI training by the Yolo County District Attorney’s OTS grant.

The program has also been very active in community outreach, including local high schools, youth programs, UC Davis programs, local Greek organizations, and the Yolo County Citizen’s Academy. During the last three years the OTS program has focused on educating youths on the dangers of DUI especially as it relates to drugs. While marijuana is now legal the program has made it a point to educate that marijuana causes impairment despite 34% of teenagers believing it is safe



to drive after smoking marijuana. Since beginning this program, the Yolo County District Attorney’s Office has reached nearly every high school in the area with live DUI trials that are conducted in front of the students.

“Yolo County, along with all of California, will face a unique time in its history with cannabis becoming more accessible through businesses this year,” emphasized District Attorney

Attorney's office, prosecuting sexual assault and child abuse cases.

Quirina is now married. Together they have 4 children between the ages of 8 and 16. Justice and civic duty are a driving force in this household, and its importance is instilled in their children.

Quirina is quick to give her husband Jose credit for a lot of the work she does. Quirina said, "I have the best husband in the freakin universe. I wouldn't be able to do any of

this if it weren't for him." Because of this, you will often see several, if not all, of the family members working with the food bank, Yolo County Children's Alliance, or other community assistance programs. Quirina and her family created West Sac Kids Give Back, a program that allows kids to collect and distribute school supplies for those kids who need them. The group also collects, assembles, and distributes care packs of personal toiletry supplies and other items for our unhoused neighbors during the holidays. "It's a way for our children to learn the importance of helping out their

community, and to see people as people, and not to look down on them because they might need help. We are all so close to being homeless. It is a topic that is close to home for me, and people don't realize how quickly things can change in your life, or how easy it is to find yourself in that situation. Then people quickly become invisible."

Quirina was involved with the West Sacramento community long before she became a city council member, but thought she could have a stronger voice if she

ing mosquito in addition to the one that infect us with West Nile Virus, and a case has been confirmed in Yolo. Isn't one virus enough? This new mosquito – small, black, bites during the day – carries, among others, the Zika virus.

Well, as perfectly awful dreadful terrifying and depressing as all that is, here's my #1 worldview: Don't waste today worrying about tomorrow. Yes, prepare, if you can, but focus on what makes you happy.

I know that helping someone else has always given me a lift. Having lost delivering Meals On Wheels and singing in the choir 'til there's a Covid 19 vaccine, I've turned to my computer. Posting lots of 'News You Can Use'-type updates to active fires; air quality (smoke); virus; stimulus check 2, etc. The posts are on my community service Facebook page: Bogart Communications, and other social media (Twitter and LinkedIn, mostly). On Twitter I try to post timely anything about evacuations and vaccine progress. The fire stuff is mostly local, like whether wind shifts will bring back the toxic smoke or send flames headed our way.

Here's a sobering statistic. California has more confirmed Covid 19 cases than many countries, and the U.S., as of this writing, still has the most cases in the world. The good news: statistically few people die from it. But possible lifetime health effects (such as brain injury) are also frightening. Speaking of

news you can use: People with O-type blood are less likely to catch Covid or have serious health consequences than are those with A or B.

When my neck starts to hurt from too much computer time, I turn my attention to the pets. Ricky (cat) and Nikky (dog) are consistently entertaining. With the smoke gone for a little while, I was walking Nikky at night without a mask. A chance to feel the night air on my face. Nice to look up and see moon and stars instead of haze. Haven't been out to the garden lately. With nothing to harvest, less need to water. I'll get the fall garden cleanup done when I'm not worried about mosquitos and feel more motivated.

Limited motivation is a symptom of depression. But getting two free aging Bearded Dragons to replace the two that died

shows that I'm hanging in there. 'Where there's life, there's hope,' and I'm alive; the animals are alive; I still see my hummingbird. She's alive. People I love and care about. They're alive. So, for the most part, I'm still happy, plus, I pray a lot, which gives me comfort.

Here's my advice.

Do whatever you can to get outside yourself. Shift your focus to something positive. Is there a cause you care about? Maybe you can do something online to help and remain safe from this wretched virus.

When you do have days that everything's

just too much, compounded by meanspirited political posturing in the leadup to November, take a break from news that is upsetting. Don't watch CNN or Fox, for instance. Seek out only that which soothes the spirit until you're feeling better.

# “Murders, Mysteries, and Misdemeanors in Northern California” history book now available

A new history book titled “Murders, Mysteries, and Misdemeanors in Northern California,” was released by Arcadia Publishing on Sept. 28, 2020.

From promotional materials on the new book reads the following:

Northern California has a fascinating criminal history. Some of America’s most infamous criminals and outlaws lived and died in the area, including John Paul Chase, partner of Public Enemy Number One, Lester “Baby Face Nelson” Gillis. Others have come from far afield to exploit the opportunities of Californian crime. Englishman Charles Boles, AKA “Black Bart the Poet,” was only one of many.

With crime, naturally, comes punishment. In 1937, the Folsom Five tried to escape, murdering Warden Clarence Larkin in the process. Instead of escaping Folsom, they entered California’s history as the first men to die in its new gas chamber the next year. The legendary Battle of Alcatraz ended in bloodshed and recriminations from prison staff and convicts alike, with accusations that staff needlessly endangered convicts’ lives and arranged the wrongful execution of convict Sam Shockley.

Northern California may not be as well-known for its crime as Southern California, but it’s a fascinating part of the Golden State’s history all the same.

Walsh took some time to answer questions about the book. **News-Ledger:** Tell us how this book stands out from other books on criminal history of California/Northern California?

**Walsh:** A lot of books focus on well-known cases already covered over and over again. Plenty of less-famous or even forgotten California cases are equally interesting and at least as historically significant.

**News-Ledger:** Tell us about some history that you feature that readers would be surprised to know about?

**Walsh:** 1909’s Santa Clara bank robbery was the world’s first using a getaway car, many people think that happened in Chantilly, France over two years later. The Bonnot Gang may have been first to use automatic pistols, but not to use a getaway car. After a decade in San Quentin Santa Clara robber Frank Smith also made a come-back, robbing California banks, payrolls and trains as Prohibition-era outlaw ‘Frank Ellis.’

**News-Ledger:** Tell us a Sacramento specific murder, mystery or misdemeanor that would surprise Sacramento locals.

**Walsh:** Juanita Spinelli was the very first woman to suffer the gas chamber so her execution in 1941 was a world first. Dumping murdered gang member Robert Sherrod’s body off the Freepoint Bridge was their downfall, it was easily-found and forensic evidence proved it wasn’t an accidental drowning. Thousands of Cal-

ifornians probably cross that bridge every day never knowing its place in Californian history.

**News-Ledger:** Why did you choose to write this book now?

**Walsh:** This book is the second of three. My first book covered New York, but California has so rich a criminal history that I split the original volume into two. The book on Southern California is in the works and will probably be out some time next year.

**Walsh:** What do you hope readers get out of it?

**News-Ledger:** I’d hope readers get something a little different than the usual fare. It would be nice to know I had sparked their interest in the more unusual California crimes and in history generally. Some of the cases caused lasting change in California, but remain almost forgotten.

**News-Ledger:** Tell us about your love of history, particularly criminal history. Tell us more (than what is on the book cover) about growing up in Dartmoor? What did you like about it? Tell us about your first memories of the famous prison there.

**Walsh:** Dartmoor is a beautiful place to live. I grew up with its wildlife and history, living in the same area Steven Spielberg used to film War Horse. The prison, which originally held Americans captured during the War of 1812, is part of that. My first memory of the prison is a convict escaping. Back then locals often locked their doors and windows, refusing to answer the

**News-Ledger:** Where do you live now?

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# Ask the DMV: What you need to know about accessing DMV services online

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the DMV is prioritizing customer and employee safety and increasing the number of transactions that can be completed without a visit to a DMV field office. The DMV has several channels to better serve customers, including self-service options online or at DMV kiosks, the ability to complete transactions online or over the phone with help from a DMV representative, or via a DMV business partner so that customers can "visit" the DMV by other means. The following questions address the most convenient ways to access DMV services and complete essential transactions without stepping foot in a field office.

**Q1:** My driver's license is expiring soon. Can I renew my license online?

**A:** Yes, you can renew your license online. Governor Gavin Newsom signed executive orders waiving in-person renewals for eligible driver's license and identification cardholders who had reached their maximum out-of-office renewals. With that waiver in effect for the length of California's State of Emergency, or until modified, nearly all California drivers younger than age 70 are eligible to renew their

license online or by mail. The DMV is providing an automatic one-year extension to drivers age 70 and older with a non-commercial driver's license with an expiration date between March 1 and December 31, 2020. The California Department of Motor Vehicles is encouraging eligible Californians to renew their driver's licenses online and avoid visiting DMV field offices at this time, even if their mailed renewal notice states an office visit is required. You can start the process by visiting [dmv.ca.gov](http://dmv.ca.gov) and clicking on "Driver License & ID Cards".

However, Californians applying for a REAL ID for the first time must visit a field office to complete their transaction. The DMV strongly encourages REAL ID applicants to fill out the online application, upload the required documents and bring their confirmation code with them before their office visit. To get started, please visit: [realid.dmv.ca.gov](http://realid.dmv.ca.gov).

**Q2:** I am a senior over the age of 70 with a driver's license that is about to expire. Does the DMV require in-person visits for customers over age 70, or can I renew my

license online like everyone else?

**A:** The California Department of Motor Vehicles is working hard to help Californians stay safe during the COVID-19 pandemic, and senior drivers are no exception.

The DMV is providing an automatic one-year extension to drivers age 70 and older with a non-commercial driver's license with an expiration date between March 1 and December 31, 2020. This action delays the requirement for many seniors to visit a DMV office during the COVID-19 pandemic. While the new extensions are automatic, drivers will not receive a new card or paper extension in the mail. As an option, drivers can request a free temporary paper extension online beginning July 15 through DMV's website, though it is not needed to drive. Californians with a suspended license are not eligible.

Drivers over the age of 70 can find information on DMV services, safety guidelines, and other resources by visiting [www.dmv.ca.gov/seniors](http://www.dmv.ca.gov/seniors).

**Q3:** How can I renew my expiring vehicle registration?

**A:** In an effort to keep customers and employees safe during the COVID-19 pandemic, the California Department

of Motor Vehicles is encouraging Californians to utilize online services for all vehicle registration renewals. Most online registration services are self-serve, meaning you can complete them on your own from start to finish. Others are "assisted", meaning they are done with help from a virtual DMV representative. Online registration is convenient and safe. Customers can avoid a trip to a DMV office by visiting [dmv.ca.gov](http://dmv.ca.gov) and clicking on "Vehicle Registration" at the top of the page.

Additionally, for even greater convenience, DMV customers can visit a DMV Now kiosk to complete their vehicle registration renewal instantly, including printing tags on the spot. With hundreds of locations throughout the state, customers can also use a DMV Now kiosk to submit proof of insurance, receive a driver or vehicle record, and much more. To locate a DMV Now kiosk nearest you, please visit: [www.cadmvnwkiiosk.com/kiosks](http://www.cadmvnwkiiosk.com/kiosks). Customers can also find DMV business partners, such as AAA and others, to complete selected transactions by visiting [dmv.ca.gov](http://dmv.ca.gov) and clicking on "Locations" to find nearby options.

Please note that some customers who opt to

renew their registration by mail may experience delays in receiving their valid registration card and sticker due to COVID-19 impacts on DMV mail sorting operations. Online and DMV Now kiosk registration renewals are not subject to any processing delays at this time.

**Q4:** I would prefer to visit the DMV in person, is that an option for me?

**A:** The health and safety of all customers and Californians is top priority for the DMV during the COVID-19 pandemic, and the DMV has reopened its field offices to assist customers with appointments and selected service needs that must be completed in a field office. The DMV is urging customers to use their expanded online services and DMV Now Kiosks to complete transactions, including driver's license and vehicle registration renewals.

There are hundreds of DMV Now kiosks locations throughout the state which can help customers complete their vehicle registration renewal, submit proof of insurance, receive a driver or vehicle record, and more. To locate a DMV Now kiosk

nearest you, please visit: [www.cadmvnwkiiosk.com/kiosks](http://www.cadmvnwkiiosk.com/kiosks). Customers can also find DMV business partners to complete selected transactions by visiting [dmv.ca.gov](http://dmv.ca.gov) and clicking on "Locations" to find nearby partners.

Customers who come into a DMV office during this time for service needs that must be completed in a DMV field office during the COVID-19 pandemic will find increased health and safety protocols, including the use of infrared thermometers to conduct temperature checks before scheduled appointments for customers, and before a shift starts for employees. Additionally, all employees and customers are required to wear a face covering while inside an office and during a behind-the-wheel drive test exam, and practice six feet of physical distancing. Customers should anticipate longer than usual wait times while these preventive measures are in place.

include, but are not limited to:

- Fever or feeling feverish/chills
- Cough and or sore throat

- Running or stuffy nose
- Muscle or body aches
- Headaches
- Fatigue (feeling very tired)

Some people may also experience vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in young children than in adults.

The best way to prevent the flu is by getting vaccinated each year and following these simple steps to keep you, your family and your co-workers flu-free:

- Wash hands often with soap and water
- Regularly clean high-touch surfaces such as countertops and door-knobs
- Avoid sharing cups, straws or anything that goes in the mouth
- Cover your nose and mouth when you cough and sneeze; promptly discard used facial tissues

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# Brewery once operated on current grounds of The Sacramento Bee

## Historic daily paper to relocate from that site

With the recent news that The Sacramento Bee will move from its longtime home at 21<sup>st</sup> and Q streets next summer, the timing is right for a history lesson on what previously stood at that site.

The Bee's announcement states that its relocation will decrease the size of its business site and its operating costs, to "better (suit) the needs of a digital news operation." The paper will be printed at a secondary location, outside of this publication's new office, and as part of the move, 199 full- and part-time print production workers will be laid off.

The Bee, which was founded in 1857, completed its move to its current site in 1952.

At that time, The Bee was one of the city's two major daily newspapers. The other publication, The Sacramento Union, was founded nearly six years earlier, and was once recognized as the "Oldest Daily in the West."

Because so many years have passed since The Bee moved from its previous headquarters at 911-915 7<sup>th</sup> St. to its present location, many Sacramentans today are unaware that the property where The Bee is located was home to one of the city's all-time famous institutions: the Buffalo Brewing Company.

Also known as the Buffalo Brewery, this business was organized in 1888 and marketed its first beer in 1890.

With its establishment, this business joined an already strong Sacramento brewery tradition.

An example of the production of local breweries prior to the opening of the Buffalo Brewery was recorded in the county assessment books for 1872.

This source notes that in that year, Sacramento had eight breweries that produced 252,000 gallons of beer.

Furthermore, according to the 1880 book, History of Sacramen-

to County, California, the area's eight breweries, in 1878, "made, in aggregate, 530,200 gallons of beer, and in 1879, 560,000 (gallons of beer)."

But it was not until the successful operation of the Buffalo Brewery that Sacramento gained the notoriety of being home to the largest brewery west of the Mississippi.

Buffalo Brewery was constructed at 1717 21<sup>st</sup> Street on the 320-foot by 320-foot city block bounded by 21<sup>st</sup>, 22<sup>nd</sup>, Q and R streets at a combined cost of about \$400,000, including machinery and equipment.

Construction on the brewery, which began in early 1889 under the supervision of building committee members, Herman H. Grau (who was also the brewery's founder), Louis Nicholas and Captain Frank Ruhstaller, was completed during the following year.

In being that this section of Sacramento was many years away from being built-out at that time, upon its completion, the large Buffalo Brewery structure could be seen from a considerable distance within the city.

The brewery was initially built to handle 60,000 barrels, with sufficient space to expand its production at a minimal cost.

Besides Grau, other original officers of the brewery were Adolph Heilbron, president; I.R. Watson, vice president; Fred Cox, treasurer; and William Emil Gerber, secretary.

Another person associated the Buffalo Brewery was former California Gov. Newton Booth (1825-1892), who was among the brewery's original board of directors.

Buffalo beer, which was initially sold in bottles and at various local businesses on draft, was known for its high level of quality. This beer was so popular that it was favorably known well beyond Sacramento.

During its pre-Prohibition days, the Buffalo

Brewery distributed its beer great distances.

In addition to shipping this beverage to other states and many parts of Northern California, including San Francisco, the brewery also sent its beer to the Hawaiian Islands, Alaska, Central America, and along the Mediterranean, Russia, Japan and China.

A summary about the brewery in an advertisement published in the Feb. 2, 1907 edition of The Sacramento Union includes the following words: "Sacramento boasts of many large manufacturing enterprises, but none are more in keeping with the general progress of this section than (the Buffalo Brewery). It is known by the excellence of its product. New Brew and Bohemian, its special brands, are known throughout the Pacific Coast."

The Buffalo Brewery was also among Sacramento's major employers.

The arrival of Prohibition put a halt to the brewery's real beer manufacturing, and the company continued to operate, opting to produce near beer.

Prior to Prohibition, locally brewed beer once averaged 4 percent alcohol, but it would eventually be lowered to less than a half-percent – or in other words, Prohibition era near beer.

The company continuously operated until May 1929.

In its Sept. 28, 1933 edition, The Bee reported that the Buffalo Brewing Company would once again begin manufacturing real beer on or before Dec. 1, 1933. The 18<sup>th</sup> Amendment was repealed on Dec. 5, 1933.

Following the \$1.5 million revamp of the old Buffalo Brewery facility and the return of its regular brewing operations, Buffalo beer made its comeback in April 1934, when it was placed on sale to the public.

It was also during the same year when Buffalo beer was first offered in cans.

At the time of the plant's return, the brewery's officers were Frank Joseph Ruhstaller, president and general manager; H. Bernard Drescher, vice president; Edward H. Gerber, secretary; and Charles J. Mathews, treasurer.

In 1942, the Buffalo Brewing Company announced that it sold its Buffalo and Gilt Edge names to the Grace Brothers Brewing Company of Santa Rosa.

Grace Brothers, which had been involved in a cooperative operation with the Buffalo Brewery since late January 1942, opt-

ed to not purchase the local brewery.

Two years later, Grace Brothers announced that it would reopen the old Buffalo Brewery plant at 21<sup>st</sup> and Q streets, with new equipment.

In January 1949, Eleanor McClatchy, then president of McClatchy Newspapers and the McClatchy Broadcasting Co., announced that the old Buffalo Brewery property had been purchased as the future location of The Bee.

The brewery buildings were demolished, followed by the construction of The Bee's buildings.

In the spring of 1952, all departments and offices of The Bee were functioning at the new site at 21<sup>st</sup> and Q streets.

became part of the council. She wanted to (and still wants to) advocate for those who feel they don't have a voice. She's not using it as a stepping stone to a political career, she's not doing it for the money (\$97 every two weeks), she does it because she wants West Sac to be a place of hope and opportunity.

Quirina said, "West Sac needs to be a safe place to jog or do something with your family. A place where small businesses can thrive. A place where someone can put their life savings on the line to follow their dream and open a business and the community support them."

Quirina said that when she first moved to West Sac, she was warned by friends about West Sac's old reputation. She told them that that's not the West Sac she sees. She sees a unique community that comes together, every time there is an opportunity to give. She was

told that there was a big difference between the North and South sides of town, but she doesn't even see the lines anymore, she sees one community.

Quirina is proud to have been a part in developing alternative mobility options such as VIA, working to promote affordable daycare and quality preschool, working on the Home Run program, being a part of the Kaboom Bryte Park, creating programs to help small businesses with challenges from COVID, and a long list of others.

Of all of the programs, plans, developments, challenges that Quirina has been involved in and is proud of, the one she is most proud of is the Downtown Streets Team program. Downtown Streets is a program that Quirina went to San Jose to learn about and in turn brought back to West Sac. It is a program that helps the homeless get back on their feet, one step at a time. Members of the teamwork to beautify our community by cleaning up the streets, picking up sharps etc. In exchange, they are given in-

centives like gift cards for food or towards a telephone or any number of other needs. There are requirements for the program. Once a team member, they are given a yellow shirt. They must keep track of that shirt, and wear it when they work their 4hr shift each week. Also, they must attend a meeting once a week that is a kind of support group. This meeting is designed to celebrate milestones. Some of those milestones may seem small to some, but the team members are reminded that as long as those milestones are positive, they are important. It truly helps to rebuild broken self-confidence. During these meetings, the team members also receive job listings, as well as assistance in getting a job. Quirina is very proud of this program, and knows the team members by name. She is so proud to be a part of helping our fellow community members that were once homeless, work towards and accomplish being self-sufficient. She is happy to give examples of several success stories this program is producing.

If re-elected, Quirina wants to see West Sac continue forward with programs to ensure the opportunity for our children to have quality programs and opportunities. She also wants to come up with programs and arrangements to assist small businesses and the rest of the community to recover from COVID.

She wants to find those cracks that our community members might be falling through, and fix them.

Quirina said, "I don't think we're all very different. I think we all have our own political issues and what-not, but I think ultimately we all just want to live a good life and to be happy. We all might have different ideas of how that could happen, but I just hope that I can contribute to making West Sacramento a place where people's dreams come true."

Jeff Reisig. "With an increasing number of DUIs nationwide over the last few years it is crucial that law enforcement agencies and District Attorney's offices dedicate resources toward protecting unsuspecting victims from the destruction that DUI drivers leave both physically and emotionally on their victims and the victims' families. Our OTS program allows us to be proactive in deterrence through education, but at the same time reactive through holding those accountable who break the law and put the public at risk."

Funding for the program comes from a grant by the California Office of Traffic Safety, through the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

- Bundled, no more than 50 lbs, and placed next your organics cart on collection day.

**LARGE BRANCHES, TREE TRUNKS & OTHER PRUNED MATERIALS: Collected at a scheduled residential bulky pickup (Call 866-844-1508 to schedule)**

- Up to six (6) feet long and two (2) feet in diameter.
- Any item cannot weigh more than 50 lbs.
- Two free bulky appointments available each year (July 1 - June 30).





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
