Free COVID-19 Testing Sites Offered in West Sacramento in October

Residents can receive free Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) testing during the month of October at Elica Health Center, 1276 Halyard Drive, West Sacramento between the hours of 8 a.m. and noon on the following dates: Friday, Oct. 2; Monday, Oct. 5; Wednesday, Oct. 7; Friday, Oct. 9; Monday, Oct. 12; Wednesday, Oct. 14; Friday, Oct. 16; Monday, Oct. 19; Wednesday, Oct. 21; Friday, Oct. 23; Monday, Oct. 26; Wednesday, Oct. 28; Friday, Oct. 30.

In addition to this testing site, the State of California's OptumServe site will be providing residents with addi-COVID-19 testing

when their site moves to Club West, located at 1125 Riverbank Road in West Sacramento, from October 6 – 31. Testing at the OptumServe site is free and open to all California residents, regardless of documentation status, and is by appointment only Tuesdays Saturdays from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. All ages are welcome. If residents do not have health insurance, the cost of the test will be covered by the state. If residents have health insurance, their provider will be billed with no out of pocket cost to the resident. To schedule an appointment, call: (888) 634-1123 or go online at: https://lhi.care/covidtesting.

Participants of these testing s must be residents of Yolo County and will need to bring a document displaying their name and address, such as a driver's license, ID card, utility bill, or piece of mail. All ages are accepted. Spanish translation will be available at most, if not all, of the sites. There may be some delays in getting testing results. Registration is recommended in order to speed up the process but is not required and does not guarantee a test. When residents register online, they will not be able to select a time slot and will not receive a confirmation of receipt. Register at: https://www.avellinocoronatest.com/patient.

At both the State's Optum-Serve and Yolo County's testing sites, residents must wear a face covering and practice social distancing. None of these sites are drive-thru, so residents will need to park their car and walk a short distance to the testing building. Police reform in West Sacramento: What is planned and what is wanted

Police reform is currently the talk of the nation. It is a complex situation with no simple solutions. Many of the citizens of this country don't care about that. They want changes and they want them now. And since it's an election year, politicians are scrambling to get something in place that will show forward movement to the satisfaction of the public/voters.

Those who are in office, are in a time crunch to initiate a change that can immediately be seen and very little sympathy for the announcement of "future" plans. Those running for office have the time to expand their thoughts and plans to what is being put into play right now.

As for the community -- they just want change. It is a very complex issue though.

The term "Defund the Police" is used a lot.

In a Zoom meeting held on September 24th, Yolo County Public Defender Tracie Olson said that the term "Defund Police" does not mean abolish the police department. What it means is "putting in place resources that lead to the best outcome possible."

In other words, if someone is having a mental health crisis, then you send out someone trained to handle that issue. However, who is trained to determine what a mental health crisis is? Will that become the job of the dispatcher? What will be the criteria for him/her be to determine if it is a mental health call? And will the mental health workers send on these calls be trained in physical restraint or other skills that the police have and are often the reason the police are called to a scene to begin with? Often that person was violent, or there was fear of violence. That is why the police were called. Also, will mental health workers be available 24/7

After retirement, she spent much time with husband Joe helping with the Escapees at their campground in Coarsegold, California prior to doing a great deal of RVing around the United States and





Wildfire Control with Cows?

First off, if you're standing behind a cow and it lifts its tail, don't light a match. Cows expel a lot of methane. That's a scientific fact. Methane, a highly flammable greenhouse gas, contributes to climate change. Serious science recommends we all become vegetar-

Beef cattle can find a new career controlling wildfires. However, cows don't just eat dry grass. Their sharp hooves tear up the tundra. With insufficient grass roots to keep soil in place, a bare slope is prone to mudslides.

Also, cows also are highly skilled at getting out, unless you use electric fence and run it on a generator in case of power failure. Still, a windblown branch could fall on it and short it out. Imagine encountering a herd of errant cows when you're driving on I-80

And then there's this: Consider small boys who ignore signs that say 'Stay Out of Fenced Area.' I once covered a story about a park in Sunol that did/does use free range cows to 'control' wildfire-prone vegetation.

Now, suppose Covid 19 gets in there, too. Or you, who dislike vaccinations as well as masks, don't get vaccinated for the flu and get pneumonia.

Flu season's right around the corner.

I think about all the ash still trapped in low spots on my car. And in crevasses on trees. On leaves and roofs. In gutters. Ready to be blown back into the air with the least breeze. I put my mask back on.

With so many wildfires still burning in California, who knows where the wind may

I don't want to die from suffocation. It's how my mom died. Intubated for pneumonia, her eyes were panicked when the tube was reshe couldn't breathe. At all. To reduce her need for oxygen, she was paralyzed. I hope someone told her why she couldn't move. They'd weaned her partway off the ventilator when an accident occurred. Someone forgot to put the hydration monitor on her ear.



Her strong heart pumped the excess liquid back into her lungs. And that was it. My mother slowly drowned. The ventilator was turned back up to 100 percent. Her lungs, weakened from the pneumonia, couldn't take the increased pressure. It blew out the lining of her lungs.

Mom lasted a day before the remaining oxygen in her blood was gone. One by one, her organs died. That strong heart was the last to go.

Will having tiny toxic smoke particles in your lungs compromise your long-term health? What do firefighters' families say? For me, 'moderate' air quality isn't good enough. Until, consistently, we're told our air is at least as good, I'll wear a mask -- even when I get the



A preconstruction conference will be convened after the Contractor has delivered the necessary bonds, insurance certificates, and signed agreement in proper form as required in the invitation to bid, Bid proposal, and general conditions of these specifications. Prior to any work, the Contractor shall provide the Engineer with a list of key personnel assigned to the project and the telephone numbers where they may be reached at any time. The list shall be made available in sufficient copies and presented at the preconstruction conference.

9. Award: The award shall be

9. Award: The award shall be made to the lowest responsible Bidder whose proposal complies with the specified requirements. The award of the Contract will be made by the West Sacramento City Council, and the Contractor shall execute the Contract within ten (10) days after it has received the Contract from the City. The City reserves the right to waive any irregularity in the proposals. No Bid may be withdrawn for a period of sixty (60) days after the opening

of bids.

10. Rejection of Bids: The City reserves the right to reject any and all bids, or to waive immaterial irregularities in any bid. Any Bid not conforming to the intent and purpose of the Contract Documents may be rejected. The City reserves the right to make all awards in the best interest of the City.

11. Disqualification of Bidder: If there is a reason to believe that collusion exists among any Bidders, none of the bids of the participants in such collusion will be considered and the City may likewise elect to reject all bids received.

12. Relief of Bidder: Attention is

directed to the provisions of Public Contracts Code section 5101 and the following, concerning relief of Bidders and in particular to the requirements therein that if the Bidder claims a mistake was made in its bid, the Bidder shall give the City written notice, within five (5) days after the opening of bids of the alleged mistake, specifying in the notice, in detail, how the mistake occurred.

13. Wage Rates: Bidders are hereby notified that the California Department of Industrial Relations has determined the general prevailing rate of wages for each craft, classification, or type of worker needed to execute the work. Copies of the current schedules for prevailing wages are on file in the City's office, and the contents of those schedules are included herein as if set forth in full.


It shall be mandatory for the Contractor and any Subcontractor under it to pay not less than the said specified rates to laborers and workmen employed by them in the execution of the Contract.





Coping with COVID fatigue 2.0:

Tips for processing wildfires, smoke, blackouts and more Psychologist offers emotional triage for COVID fatigue – the disaster version

It just keeps getting worse. While the world fights COVID-19, California and the West are on fire and smoke often turns the sky a chilling, glowing red. People are forced indoors. We're facing blackouts, heat waves, windstorms and evacuations. Plus, flu season waits at our door.

How does anyone cope? You'd like to step outside and scream, but you might choke on smoke or spread the coronavirus without your mask.

"We may feel like the world is broken," said Kaye Hermanson, UC Davis Health clinical psychologist in the Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation. "Or that we're in a horror movie. The world is just piling on."

So how do we shore up our mental well-being as we face down the multiplying stresses of natural disasters, social and racial pain, economic fear and COVID-19, the worst pandemic in a century?

One start is to remember that we're all feeling the strain. "What we're dealing with now was unfathomable to us nine months ago," Hermanson said. "Who isn't feeling some level of helplessness or exhaustion?"

Where is the stress and COVID fatigue coming from? Every direction

It helps to remember that people experience two kinds of stress that affect our mental well-being and physical health - intense stress and prolonged stress. "We've been feeling both for months," Hermanson said.

And there is research that defines the stages of communal reactions to the stress from disasters. Right after a disaster, we tend to bond as a commu-

nity with a sort of heroic spirit. Think back to the first weeks of the stay-at-home orders when everyone waved to everyone.

"The heat and fires and smoke are not just new disasters, they've taken away some of our coping mechanisms ... It feels like we keep coming up with coping solutions, then something shuts the door on them."

Eventually, we get exhausted and wonder if things will ever get better. That's the disillusionment stage, when the heroism is replaced by frustration. That defines a lot of reactions around Memorial Day, when people just bailed on COVID-19 cautions. The predictable result was a surge in cases and the renewal of our coronavirus restrictions.

"That made it hard for some people to cope, because it felt like there was no end in sight," Hermanson said. "Now, the heat and fires and smoke are not just new disasters, they've taken away some of our coping mechanisms when we feel like we can't be outdoors. We can't go for a walk. We can't sit with a friend in our yard. There is so much we can't do."

This piling on can lead to what she called a "learned helplessness" and depression. "It feels like we keep coming up with coping solutions, then something shuts the door on them," Hermanson said. "You try and you try and you try, but nothing seems to give you the relief you're looking for."

There's one more reason the stress is piling up. Blame it on the calendar.

"With each season, there's another new loss," she said. "Summer is ending and we're feeling like we never got to decompress. Now school has started, with all the anxiety that's bringing. Next, here come the holidays. I was in the store thinking, 'What's going to happen to Halloween?" (For the record, Los Angeles County cancelled it with a Trick-or-Treat ban. More are likely to follow.)

COVID fatigue 2.0 triage

"With everything people are facing now, sometimes the best strategy is to just do the little things you need to do to survive," Hermanson said. "When we feel like there is so much we can't do, we have to shift our focus to what we can do."

Some of her suggestions:

- Take it day by day, or moment by moment: "Don't look too far down the road," she said. "Realize you will have good days and bad days, or good moments and bad moments. Realize these things can come in waves. It's OK to say, 'Right now, it's bad.' Just hang in there and ask, 'What can I do to help feel better, or less bad?"
- Be compassionate with yourself: Don't expect perfection and don't wallow in mistakes or missed chances. "Nobody prepared us for this," Hermanson said. "There wasn't a class in high school called How to Get Through a Pandemic. We're all making this is up as we go along."
- Be creative about finding things to look forward to: It could be a walk (when the smoke clears), or finding repeats of a TV series you love, or, as in Hermanson's case, gathering a group of friends for a Zoom trivia night. "We write down our answers then show them. There's a certain amount of honesty involved," she said. "We have to remember the purpose is to have fun, not to win."

Find reasons to laugh: "There is a healthy physical reaction to laughing," Hermanson said. "If nothing else works, put on your favorite comedy.'

- **Exercise**: "It's still the No. 1 best thing we can do for coping," she said. "It releases endorphins and gets some of the adrenaline out when the frustration builds up. Just go for a walk, if you can. If the smoke is bad, exercise indoors. Pull up a yoga or workout video. It helps so much."
- Look back, but carefully: "Don't think all the way back to last summer and those weeks you spent at the lake," Hermanson said. "But think about the past few months. We've really come a good distance. If you had told me in March what we were about to go through, it would have felt overwhelming. But think about how far we've come. Look at all the things we've managed. Look at how resilient we're becoming."

COVID fatigue 2.0 recovery - talk with someone

The barrage of stresses on top of the pandemic can make people feel helpless if they don't use coping tech-

"Just saying it out loud is important," Hermanson said. "Find the right places and times, but do it."

Talking with family or a friend can be a big help. And sometimes people would like something more and want to talk with a trained counselor.

"Getting started with counseling can feel daunting or even more stressful," she said. So, her advice is to drop into a virtual group session.

"You can just listen and get a sense that you aren't alone," Hermanson said. "Or you can speak up when you're comfort-

A number of organizations offer group sessions for their employees, including UC Davis Health through its Academic Staff and Assistance Program. Some public sites with groups or referrals include the U.S. Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration and the Sacramento branch of the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill.

COVID fatigue 2.0 recovery cut back or avoid social me-

Seriously. Psychologists have said for years that seeing the fantastic adventures of other people can make us depressed about our seemingly simple lives. In this era of COVID-19 and piled-on disasters, social media can also prompt new layers of anger, resentment and stress.

"If we see someone out at a party not wearing a mask, it makes us angry, and maybe even jealous," Hermanson said. "Or we can get caught up trading posts with angry people who are just trying to get a reaction. Instead, try using your social media just to connect with friends, and avoid surfing and finding posts that will make you miserable. Who needs that?"

COVID fatigue 2.0 recovery - bring back the communal

As we get stressed and emotionally exhausted, it can be harder to be compassionate toward others. But research shows that helping anoth-



er person has a good impact on our own mental well-being.

"Sometimes, we can help ourselves as much as we help someone else," Hermanson said. "It makes us feel good about ourselves and it reminds us that we aren't helpless in the world. There are things we can do"

"If you had told me in March what we were about to go through, it would have felt overwhelming. But think about how far we've come. Look at all the things we've managed. Look at how resilient we're becoming."

We can also try to rekindle the pandemic's early-stage communal bonding. "Start by being the one to wave," she said. "I find I'm constantly smiling at people and wondering why no one smiles back. It's because they can't see me smile through my mask, so I have to remember to be more demonstrative."

It's also possible fewer people wave now because seeing everyone in masks makes the world feel impersonal, the way it feels when we're driving.

"So maybe make that a small project," Hermanson said. "Just keep waving to people. Maybe we'll all feel better"

Try to stay positive

"I've been telling myself that we've been given a lot of opportunities to build resilience, and we will be incredibly resilient when we come out of this," Hermanson said. "I know there will still be days when we pull the covers up over our heads, but there will also be days when we'll laugh with our friends."

What follows is a Q and A with Event Director Kim Parrino.

VCN: Is this the first time Fleet Feet has hosted these events?

Parrino: We put together a Downtown and Midtown mural tour for the first time last August during Wide Open Walls.

VCN: What inspired Fleet Feet to hold these mural tours?

Parrino: We had such a fun time guiding the tours last year we wanted to do it again this year. In fact we expanded and added new murals to both our midtown and downtown tours.

Some of the new murals are from the 2020 Wide Open Walls event.

There are so many murals in midtown especially along alley ways and the tops of buildings that we were investigating and learning about that we wanted to share these with the folks that took our tours.

We also love all the mural work around the R Street Corridor so we created a third area to tour the murals in that area. Downtown, we've expanded into Improv Alley which has several new murals for 2020.

VCN: How did Fleet Feet decide which murals to feature during this

Parrino: We discovered last year that the people taking our tours could comfortably walk about 3 miles so we used that as our starting point and developed routes within that distance.

VCN: Tell us about the tour guide's interest and knowledge of the murals.

Parrino: We have several guides to support the tours that we offer. They can share the background of the artist say if they are local or have come to Sacramento from out of the country. Our guides can share the title of the artwork and any symbolism the artist is trying to convey. We have also studied what medium the artist is working in. Much of the artwork in Sacramento is done using spray paint however there are some murals that are quite detailed and the artists have gone in and painted with brushes. We've had the opportunity to talk with many of the muralists as their artworks are "in

progress" so we find out

some wonderful backstory information not only about the mural but also about the artists themselves. This kind of personal information really makes the tours come to life.

VCN: Do you have a favorite Sacramento mural? If so, which one and why?

Parrino: This is really difficult to answer because there are so many incredible murals in Sacramento. One of my favorites is a mural that is currently in progress by Shonna McDaniels. Ms. McDaniels is also the founder of the Sojourner Truth African Heritage Museum here in Sacramento. She is a local muralist from Sacramento. I have been watching the progress over the past several days as she sketched out the wall that her mural is on. As the piece progressed I realized she designed the mural and brought in several other artist of varying ages to assist her. She brought in some young budding artists that were so proud to collaborate on this piece.

The title of the mural is: A Seat At The Table. The mural features a Black Southern Belle. The mural is a metaphor for being able to make a difference. It represents power, success, and empowerment.

After some conversations with the artist, she shared that "A Black Southern Belle is well defined as a hard-working woman, who holds value to what she is set out to be. She set out to build relationships among women who want

the same thing: achievements and happiness. The essence of a Black Southern Belle is all about community, and a community of women that lead each other to prosperity and fruition."

This is a very powerful piece. I hope that many people can now come by 1403-19th Street to view

VCN: Will it be featured on this tour?

Parrino: Absolutely-we actually re-routed our midtown tour so we could include this spectacular mural.

VCN: Does Fleet Feet do these types of walking/tour events regularlv?

Parrino: This is the second year we have put these tours together. The response has been so positive that we will be offering the tours through October this year.

VCN: Is there anything else you'd like to add?

Parrino: If anyone is interested in taking the tours they can check out the tour availability at this link: https://raceroster.com/events/2020/33998/wall-to-wall



tion's difference in its power output is to avoid nighttime interference with other stations that broadcast on 1430 AM in different cities.

It was on May 23, 1963 at 6 a.m. that KJAY made history by making its on-air debut.

Originally a sunrise to sunset operation, the station began broadcasting from a then-new unit of the Sacramento Inn at 1431 Arden Way.

At the time of KJAY's beginnings, Gamble also owned KJOY in Stockton and KLAN in Hanford and Lemoore. He previously owned three other California radio stations: KCMJ in Palm Springs, KJAX in Santa Rosa, and KWIP in Merced.

The first general manager of KJAY was Jack Blake, and Ross McCarthy served as that station's first sales manager.

KJAY's ownership changed during its first year of opera-

On Nov. 29, 1963, only four months after moving to the Arden area with his family, Gamble died of a heart attack at the age of 46. He had been involved in the broadcasting industry since 1950.

Control of the station's license was transferred to Gamble's estate in January 1964.

About three months later, McCarthy was named the station's manager, and he continued to supervise the sales department.

KJAY President Ort J. Lofthus announced in May 1964 that KJAY was sold for \$350,000 to Robert Walker Dumm, former owner of Sacramento radio station, KROY.

Around the time of that transfer, Robert told The Sacramento Bee that his son, John Rick Dumm, would also be associated with him in KJAY's proprietorship and operation.

An original license record for the station recognizes the late 1965 transfer of the station's license from Robert Walker Dumm and three members of his family to Jack and Alyce

Although Alyce died at the age of 45 on Dec. 10, 1968 and Jack passed away at the age of 72 on July 13, 1994, KJAY continues to be owned by the Powell family. Tiffany Powell, one of the co-owners, currently serves as the station's man-

KJAY has been located in West Sacramento since 1974, when it relocated to South River Road.

Dean Seavers, KJAY's overnight, oldies music program director, told this publication last week that although the station has been around since the 1960s, many people in the Sacramento area have never listened to it.

"It's a low-watt station, so the area of coverage is pretty much the Sacramento (letter and number-based street) grid; you know, downtown, midtown, East Sacramento, and I'm sure, probably the Pocket area picks it up," he said. "The signal, unfortunately, does not go that far, but it is streaming online."

KJAY's oldies program mostly consists of music from the days of early rock 'n' roll, around 1957, to about 1967 popular songs that were played on Sacramento area stations during the era when they were released.

The program has a wide range that includes early Beatles songs and Beach Boys tunes, and rarer Motown offerings by such artists as Mary Wells and Smokey Robinson and the Miracles. Listeners can also hear music by The Kinks and Frank Sinatra, as well as Conway Twitty, before he turned to country music. The station also plays songs by artists that are not household names, yet produced very recognizable music.

Seavers, who lives just south of Curtis Park, said that KJAY has not always offered the same programming, noting that it began as a Middle of the Road (MOR) – soft adult contemporary - station, and later became a soul station.

He added that during its early years, KJAY was rated #3 in the in the Sacramento music market.

"What kept it from really competing against KROY and KXOA was that with the FCC license, they had to sign off (at night)," he said. "So, they were on the air from like 6 a.m. to 8 p.m. It wasn't a 24-hour station, so that kind of hindered them a little bit."

Seavers, 53, mentioned that during that era, KROY purchased advertising from KJAY.

"They were the last ad for the day for KJAY, saying, 'Hey, KJAY's signing off, so move on over to KROY 1240 (AM),' that kind of a thing."

Seavers added that through his own research, he found that in about 1966, the station began introducing some top 40 music, while still remaining "soul heavy."

A KJAY "pop-soul survey" for the week ending on June 3, 1966, lists the number-one pop song as "Paint It Black," by The Rolling Stones, and the number-one soul song as "Hold On, I'm Coming," by Sam & Dave.

Research for this article revealed that by 1967, KJAY was a country music station, which presented news once per hour.

Later that decade, KJAY returned to its MOR format six days per week, and religious programs on Sundays.

During KJAY's early years, it used two slogans: "One of Sacramento's two great radio stations" and "Sounds like fun."

Seavers said that by the end of the 1970s, KJAY was presenting religious and local pro-

An article in the July 11, 1984 edition of The Bee mentions that soul music returned to Sacramento radio through KJAY. That genre of music was then played on that station from 5 to 8:30 p.m. weekdays and Saturdays.

The article notes that Hewitt Robinson, director of Hewitt & Associates entertainment and promotion agency, purchased airtime from Jack Powell for between \$300 and \$500 per month. The program was anchored by Keith LaMotte.

Robinson told The Bee, in 1984, that this programming provided airtime for new black

"I wanted to hear the new black music," he said. "All you hear on the other stations are selections by Lionel Richie and Michael Jackson, played again and again until you want to scream."

Seavers mentioned that the station underwent different variations during that decade, and then became an international station in the 1990s.

"During the day, the programming is Hmong and Russian, and then it just turns out that overnight (on weekdays), it's oldies. And then on Sundays, it's still religious programming."

Seavers commented on the station's Hmong programming, which is advertised as "the #1 Hmong radio station in Sacramento.'

"Because they stream online, apparently they've got quite a following countrywide with the Hmong people," he said. "I know The New York Times had done a story a couple years ago about them serving the Hmong community. The fact there's people all over the country in that community that listen to (KJAY), it's kind of cool."

Seavers, who is also a former resident of East Sacramento and River Park, mentioned that it was his longtime love of music that led him to his involvement with KJAY.

Growing up in a musical family, Seavers began playing the guitar when he was 12, and he has performed in various bands since the mid-1980s. His current band, The Decibels, formed in 1992 and has had the same lineup since

Seavers recalled his introduction to KJAY less than three months ago.

"Because my house was built in 1940, I kind of decorated it with the same era of stuff," he said. "I bought a 1940s Philco console radio that wasn't working. I was tinkering on it and got it working one evening and turned it on to scan

"All of a sudden I heard Little Richard and I'm thinking, 'Gosh, I haven't heard Little Richard on a Sacramento station in 40 years, since I was a kid. I kept listening, and the oldies program is really pretty good. It wasn't like the same stuff we've heard to death."

With his interest in KJAY, Seavers called the station and spoke to Tiffany Powell.

During that conversation, he learned that KJAY offered its oldies program on a regular basis, but had a small playlist.

After explaining his love for music of the 1950s and 1960s and his belief that presenting songs to radio listeners in real time was a special experience, Tiffany asked him if he would be interested in "doing the oldies programming."

"I said, 'Sure, that would be great," Seavers responded.

Since become KJAY's oldies program director on July 15, Seavers has worked to expand the playlist to include a wider range of songs - something that he noted is appreciated by many listeners.

"The enthusiasm has just been the playlist, the fact that they're not hearing the songs pounded to death and there's new discovery and

Domestic violence calls are commonly referred to as the most dangerous calls for police to go to. Will the dispatcher now be required to figure out if the actions of the people involved are due to mental illness? Will our social workers be armed, if those calls turn violent and even deadly?

Another issue that community members are concerned with is that the police will keep records of people deemed mentally ill, and therefore not respond to emergencies, or perhaps make premature assumptions. They don't want the police to "profile" someone, yet they want someone to be able to determine when a call will need the police and when a call will require a social

Currently, the West Sac PD does not store that information, according to Olson. The police, as well as city and county governments, are aware of this topic.

In fact, Yolo County is the first district attorney's office in the nation to offer life-saving de-escalation technology to first responders.

Profiling is another word that gets used often.

If dispatch gets a call that there is a man with a gun, they ask if you can describe the man. If the caller does not know the man with the gun, the quickest, most efficient way to describe them is gender, race, size, what they are wearing or driving. This is not to profile them. The problem is not that there is a person of a certain race with a gun, the problem is that someone has a gun. However, by using that description, it helps the police

to quickly eliminate others so that they can focus on who has a gun and why. There is absolutely no question that there are far, far too many incidents of use of too much force by police, nationwide!

People everywhere see that, including other police. Just remember that there are a lot of heroic acts as well. By holding grudges against all police, aren't we now profiling? There is a definite change coming, and change is good... we hope. So how is police reform taking place in West Sacramento? The city of West Sacramento released an explanation and current plan of what is to take place in our police department

These "Guiding Principles" can be read online at www. cityofwestsacramento.org/ government/departments/police/guiding-principles.

It states, in part, "The West Sacramento Police Department shares in the outrage and sorrow regarding the criminal actions of police officers that led to the death of George Floyd in Minneapolis. We understand that events like this undermine public confidence in law enforcement, and we are committed to continually building the community's trust in our department through our ongoing community engagement and adherence to the highest professional standards, and through our commitment to transparency.

"Recently, we have received many inquiries from the community about our police department and whether our policies are consistent with recommendations and advocacy being put forth by police reform initiatives. We have re-examined and will continue to evaluate our policies and approaches to policing in consideration of those initiatives. While we believe that we are heading in a good direction as a department, at this moment, we must pause to listen and understand the diverse perspectives of our community.

"We acknowledge that we are at an inflection point in which we must leverage the immense community interest in policing to better inform our mission, direction, and the tactics we employ as we strive to maintain a safe environment for everyone in West Sacramento."

It explains that WSPD is using the principles of "President's Task Force on 21st Century Policing" from the Obama-era, as a guide. It also states that "On June 3, 2020, former President Obama called on Mayors to pledge to address police use of force policies in their cities as part of an initiative known as the My Brother's Keeper Alliance. Mayor Cabaldon recently signed onto this commitment on behalf of the City of West Sacramento. Participation in the initiative includes committing to take the following actions at the local level: Review police use of force policies, engage the community by including a diverse range of input, experiences, and stories in the review, Report the findings of the review to the community and seek feedback, Reform the community's police use of force policies".

The plan lists "8 can't wait" initiatives that include: Ban chokeholds and strangleholds, Require de-escalation, Require warning before shooting, Exhaust all other means before shooting, Duty to intervene and stop excessive force by other officers, Ban shooting at moving vehicles, Require useof-force continuum, Require comprehensive reporting each

time an officer uses forces or threatens to do so. It goes on to show the use of force statistics for 2019 by the WSPD, as well as the racial demographics of the population of West Sac and of the WSPD. The document also mentions the training standards that our officers get and gives a link to the WSPD training manual, which has been available online since 2017.

As part of Mayor Chris Cabaldon's plan on police reform, he is using the money that the city had to hire 5 police officers to create a community outreach task force. This is still in the development stage, but they are confident in its ability to create better outcomes in many situations. I reached out to Mayor Cabaldon for any additional input he may want to give but got no response. In Camdon, they defunded the police by getting rid of the entire force and then rehiring those they felt should still be police officers in their town. But again, who decides

Some believe that there should be an independent police review commission for basic quality control of the actions that the WSPD takes.

Mayoral candidate and current city councilmember Martha Guerrero would like to establish this with the purpose to continue guiding the coun-

Former Police Chief Tom McDonald was forced out of his job for pushing for this very topic. However, Guererro agrees with this idea and would like to see it implemented. She is pushing for some additions to be added to the current reform plan. Guerrero would like to see, and plans on bringing this before the city council: More

training, furthering the goals of the NAACP (Latino community has been welcomed, now bring in the Black community), work with the county to have social services more involved, but within Health and Human Services, not under the police. She would also like to see "a more robust lateral police hiring process to strengthen our police force with experienced officers." Betty White, President of the local chapter of NAACP, and Guerrero both believe that police officers with 5 – 7 years on the job are still learning on the job.

Guerrero said: "After a few years of training they transfer out as lateral trained to other police departments because we cannot compete with wages and benefits in the region. It costs our city more to train and subsequently pay for their pensions when they retire."

She said, "I would like to see more diversity and recruitment among our youth for a career in the police department". In addition, she believes it would be a good idea to pair the newer police officers or those that are not from our city, with locally experienced officers. Police reform has no quick fix, but our city is currently looking for better policies, that will help our community to not only feel safe but to be safe. WSPD welcomes changes that will keep everyone safe and happy. Everyone wants to go home at the end of the night! Interim Police Chief Rob Strange states on the Guiding Principles, "We shall honor the dignity of ALL members of the community, no matter the circumstance. We shall maintain a mindset of service to ALL that exudes professional self-control and that never dehumanizes anyone in our diverse community."
