

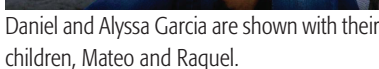

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THIS ‘n’ THAT OK, West Sac! Let’s GARDEN!

Maybe the end’s in sight on this virus thing, maybe not, but here’s what I know. Planting flowers and vegetables will cheer you up.

I grew up with avid gardeners but never had a garden of my own until I had my son. Decided my then-4-year-old would enjoy digging in the dirt with me. Applied for a space in a community garden, got one, and learned a lot. Number 1: Unless you want to bake tons of zucchini bread for family, friends and strangers: you’ll need just **one** zucchini plant. And bigger ‘fruit’ is not better unless you plan to stuff it. (You may be awed by how gigantic a zucchini can grow.) But the size you see in the store are much more tender, plus there’s lots less peeling. Wait ‘til you experience the taste of homegrown!

For a successful garden, first you need good soil. The best, again, you ‘grow’ yourself. Buy any cheap soil you want at, say, Walmart – and then dump in those zucchini peels. (Chop them up to compost faster. Any vegetable-type stuff is good. But no meat or trimmings.

I like a small, easily maneuvered, tip-proof

lightweight wheelbarrow for making compost. Start with a couple bags of cheap Walmart dirt. Add crushed eggs shells, coffee grounds, diced banana peels, crumbled up fall leaves, grass clippings. Mix it up, lightly water, and add earth worms. Voila! Vermiculture! Worms are good. They help aerate your compost pile, and also poop a lot. Natural fertilizer. Vermiculture means compost made with worm droppings.

Turn this mixture regularly to help it ‘cook’. As the contents become dark and crumbly (seasoned gardeners call compost ‘black gold’), add it to whatever ‘raw’ dirt is already in your garden as natural fertilizer.

On my folks’ farm, I used to get nightcrawlers

for fishing by going out late enough at night (say 10 p.m.), after the top soil cooled and there was a bit of dew on the grass. When I flicked on my big flashlight, I looked for worms that were far enough out of their holes that I could pin them, then gently work them out of their hole. Sometimes I could catch two at once. When earthworms mate, they’re indifferent to danger.

Even now, I’ll walk around in the rain and either rescue worms on pavement and find a nice patch of dirt to let them go, or add them to my compost. California red wigglers are kinda slimy. Might take you a couple times to catch one.

You can also buy worms at a bait shop. West Sac has a bait shop in that little shopping strip on Merkley off of Jefferson as you’re going to the library. Don’t know if it’s been deemed an ‘essential’ business. If not, it should be. It’s food-related.

Now, let’s say you’re starting from scratch and have never had a garden. Pick a space in your yard that gets lots of sun and is easy for you to water. Probably easiest (rather than buying or renting a rototiller) is to have a landscaper remove 10 feet

by 30 feet of lawn. That’s a big enough space you can even grow sweet corn if you want to.

You want **no** grass roots. Gotta get it all. Best for keeping adjacent grass from encroaching is metal edging.

Before you add the edging, have the landscaper (or a willing helper whose back is strong) deepen the bare soil to about a foot. (The deeper your loose soil, the deeper a plant’s roots can go in search of water when summer heat waves dry the topsoil.) To raise this bed, line this hole’s sides with pre-cut boards. Measure first! Not the topside perimeter of the hole. Measure the hole’s sides at the bottom.

You should be able to get your boards delivered. Ask. If the answer’s no, try somewhere else. And you *don’t* want pressure-treated wood. Arsenic can leach from the wood into soil, then into crops (especially root crops: carrots, parsnips, potatoes, etc.). Boards made of rot-resistant wood like cedar; that’s what you want.

Twelve-inch high boards should be sufficient. Six inches beneath the soil, six protruding. Leave boards low enough so you can easily step over. Always remember that from the

tiny acorn, a mighty oak does grow. A tomato in a six pack of starts will eventually get tall and wide, needing a tomato cage or staking. Space tomatoes far enough apart that they can ‘breathe’. You’ll get more tomatoes, and fewer horn worms.

A bit off topic: Do NOT feed a hornworm from your garden tomato to, say, your Bearded Dragon. A tomato-fed hornworm will kill your lizard, say reptile experts. (Tomatoes are poison to Bearded Dragons.) Too

bad, because Beardies love them. (Petco sells hornworms. Nine+ dollars for JUST ONE! Bogart Bearded Dragons do not get hornworms.)

When Carol started her garden this year, she again forgot about slugs and snails. Which ate her zucchini starts right down to the ground. ‘Sluggo’ is a snail/slug bait regarded as safe for pets and wildlife. Home Depot has it. You likely can also order it online. 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The new normal: Homeschooling during the pandemic

So many tears and a roller coaster of feelings. Coronavirus death tolls continue to rise nationwide, while people are coming together like I have never seen in my lifetime.

Same is true within the school community my daughter is a part of, despite not seeing those same friendly faces each day.

As a single mom to a second grader, named Sophie, I've had to keep my emotions in check and not let out a good cry until after she falls asleep.

The stress of her not seeing her friends or her beloved teacher on a daily basis wanes on her precious soul and on mine as a result. We miss our community. We've video-chatted with friends and have engaged in distance learning. As I am sure all of you parents out there whose children attend school outside of the home, you all agree we've had to adapt to a new normal, a new routine. With grace and serenity are always the goals, but breakdowns happen. Some assignments and video lessons are between chores or television breaks. At least that's how it's been at the Stark household. Besides editing the West Sacramento News-Ledger, I am the editor at Valley Community Newspapers in Sacramento and write lifestyle stories for the Elk Grove Citizen. So, it's full-time work on top of the tasks of homeschooling.

Sophie attends a public Waldorf school in Sacramento where technology isn't stressed, but rather engagement

in the natural world and innocent childhoods are cherished. The school's motto, found on the webpage is a well-known quote from Rudolf Steiner, the founder of Waldorf education: "Receive the children in reverence; educate them in love; let them go forth in freedom."

An anonymous Facebook post has been circulating that stresses a change in attitude toward homeschooling during this pandemic. "Our students are missing 3 months of classroom instruction. Many people are concerned about students falling behind because of this. Yes, they may fall behind when it comes to classroom education... But what if... What if instead of falling 'behind,' this group of kids are advanced because of this?" The answers, the author contends, include having more empathy for others, enjoying family connection, expression through writing, sitting in their own backyard or near a window, quietly.

While social media, namely Facebook, has been a wonderful resource for some sort of human connection and direction for me while I have been looking for answers as to how to create some sort of class schedule while trying to work full-time. So, rather than a schedule, we have a rhythm illustrated in the form of a pie chart. Sophie can spin the needle and pick an activity – whether it's math, writing, movement, art, walking the dog, helping me cook. She can spend as much time as she wants on each thing and whatever order she wants. It's something that



works for us, since she is rather self-motivated and can entertain herself. She is working on a collaborative story with one of her friends. Sophie started the story, sent it to her in the mail. Her friend wrote the next part, sent it to us in the mail. And repeat. It's been a fun way to work on her writing while having some sort of contact with her friend. She has also written letters to other friends and her teacher.

Since my daughter is only in second grade, the demands are not too taxing. Her wonderful teacher sends out math instruction videos via ClassDojo, a social media website for teachers, students and parents. They are only about 10 or 15 minutes a day, but are accompanied with worksheets that she provided to us all. Additionally, hand-work class (knitting, sewing, crocheting) is a cornerstone in Waldorf education and our wonderful hand-work teacher has created her own YouTube channel. Students are

creating quarantine quilt with each other. My daughter has worked on her square and looks forward to the fall when all the squares will come together and the beloved teacher will sew them all together.

The community of the school is what is keeping us sane.

Parents have dropped off care packages on our porch. I received a 25-pound sack of flour from one parent friend when I asked where he found flour. Another friend had her children make me hankies because my allergies have been up the wall.

I am truly grateful that we have a home to shelter in and a community that has come together to take care of its own. The homeschooling thing is just part of the new normal and it's only temporary. We will get through this stronger, wiser and more resilient.

When this is all over and a rainbow blankets the sky with her healing and serenity, we will certainly be at a point for great



change. My daughter's school community has weathered the storm thus far with courage, beauty and love. Our school family has given me strength and my daily life has become better because of this community. A ceremony has been proposed when the quarantine is lifted. Folk songs, maybe a campfire (depending on location), a sharing of our experiences...

AN UNCODIFIED ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF WEST SACRAMENTO AMENDING THE TEMPORARY MORATORIUM ON EVICTING RESIDENTIAL AND COMMERCIAL TENANTS AND DECLARING THE ORDINANCE TO BE AN EMERGENCY MEASURE TO TAKE EFFECT IMMEDIATELY UPON ADOPTION
The City Council of the City of West Sacramento does ordain as follows:
Section 1. Findings. The City Council finds and declares as follows:
A. On March 4, 2020, the Governor declared a State of Emergency in California due to the threat of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (“COVID-19”). On March 10, 2020, the Board of Supervisors of Yolo County ratified and extended the County’s Director of Emergency Services’ March 6, 2020 declaration and proclamation of a local health emergency. Due to directives from federal, state, and local health officials, residents have been advised to avoid public gatherings and stay at home to prevent the spread of this disease. On March 16, 2020, the West Sacramento Director of Emergency Operations issued a Declaration of Local Emergency related to COVID-19. On March 18, 2020, the Yolo County Public Health Officer issued a countywide health order directing individuals in Yolo County to shelter in place in response to the COVID-19 outbreak. On March 19, 2020, the Governor issued a statewide shelter in place order.
B. On March 16, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order N-28-20, suspending state statutes that restrict the authority of cities to adopt local measures limiting residential and commercial evictions.

COVID-19 Resources for the Agricultural Community

In preparation for the start of the agricultural season, Yolo County is providing agricultural employers with recommended strategies to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and resources to ensure agricultural workers have access to vital benefits.

Under the shelter in place order, agriculture is deemed an essential activity that is permitted to operate to ensure continued food production, processing and distribution. With migrant housing centers set to begin opening this April, Yolo County has been working with agricultural business partners to ensure they have the information and resources they need to protect and assist workers. For this purpose, the Yolo County Agricultural Commissioner, John Young, sent a letter to agricultural employers with recommended guidelines to prevent the spread of COVID-19 and infor-

mation on available benefits to share with their workers.

“Farm workers are essential to the food supply and economy of Yolo County. There are thousands of workers reporting to their fields, farms and ranches across the county to ensure our local agricultural industry remains robust and bountiful,” said Yolo County Agricultural Commissioner John Young. “Yolo County recognizes that these workers and businesses play a vital role in our local economy and we need to do what we can to support the local workforce and businesses. It is very important local agricultural producers do their part to implement stringent hygiene and social distancing protocols to keep the agricultural workforce healthy.”

To protect worker health, agricultural employers are encouraged to follow guidelines from the UC Davis Western

Center for Agricultural Health and Safety, located at <https://aghealth.ucdavis.edu/covid19>, which includes:

- Implementing social distancing practices at the workplace.
- Creating a plan for screening workers for COVID-19 symptoms when they arrive at work.
- Sending workers home who have symptoms and advising them to call their health care provider.
- Increasing cleaning and sanitizing of restrooms, tools, equipment and other frequently touched areas.
- Ensuring workers wash their hands when they arrive at the worksite and frequently throughout the day.
- Providing soap and water and setting aside time for this purpose.
- Sharing information about COVID-19 with workers including symptoms, method of

transmission, and how individuals can reduce their risk.

Yolo County also has resources to support the healthcare, food needs and jobs of the local workforce.

Medical: Agricultural workers in need of medical care, regardless of immigration status, can qualify for free or low-cost health insurance and see a local doctor through MediCal or the County Medical Services Program. Applications may be submitted online at www.mybenefitscalwin.org or by phone at (866) 226-5415. Those that are experiencing symptoms of COVID-19 and do not have health insurance can seek assistance, regardless of immigration status, by calling a community clinic. (See attachment for list of clinics.)

Food needs: Individuals, including mixed immigration households, in need of food support are

encouraged to apply for CalFresh or CalWORKS at www.yolocounty.org/health-human-services/ welfare or access supports through the Yolo Food Bank at www.yolofoodbank.org or by phone at (530) 668-0690. (See attachment for food needs.)

Employment: Agricultural workers in need of more employment or unemployment supports, can also contact the Yolo County Employment Services team Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at (530) 661-2641. Staff will connect them to unemployment resources or assist individuals with finding and applying for other local jobs. (See attachment for employment assistance.)

A list of the UC Davis guidelines and information on resources for agricultural workers is available on the County website at www.yolocounty.org/shelter-in-place. Employers are

encouraged to provide this information to their workers so that they are aware of COVID-19 prevention strategies and available benefits. not the ones with filters and all of that stuff. It's just whatever (Jo-Ann fabric and craft store) and Kaiser (Permanente) have put out there with the free patterns for us to use.”

While spending time in his home with his wife, Mary, Jeff Snyder said they are both catching up on their “honey do” lists – or that collection of requests for tasks, assignments or jobs to be completed by a spouse or partner, as in “Honey, do this project.”

“There’s chores, there’s gardening to be done,

etc.,” he said. “The roses need pruning, and, of course, there’s always lawn mowing and weeding the flower beds.”

Whenever Jeff and Mary go out in public, they are sure to wear face masks and gloves.

“We travel a lot, so we had masks already,” Jeff said. “But we didn’t have the gloves. We have disposable gloves that you buy cheap at the Dollar Tree, but then we also bought the (high-quality) kind at Harbor Freight (Tools).”

Mary and Jeff, who are both retired, also keep active taking long walks.

Jeff mentioned that he and his wife walk about 5 miles about twice per week.

As a result of the stay-at-home order, the Snyders canceled their European cruise.

Jeff noted that he and Mary are not very optimistic about the coronavirus pandemic coming to an end anytime soon.

“We’re expecting worse to come,” he said. “We’re going to have more (extensions of the stay-at-home order).”

Monreal’s daughter, Alyssa Garcia, who is a state worker, has been working from her home since the stay-at-home order was issued.

She told this publication that her life has changed “drastically” since she was working 40-plus hours per week in an office to now work-

ing from home while caring for her 4-year-old son, Mateo, and her 3-year-old daughter, Raquel.

“They were in day care and preschool and their school closed indefinitely, until further notice,” she said. “Not only are they home from day care, I’m home from work. So, trying to work from home with the two little ones can be challenging for sure.”

Alyssa added that she cares for her kids on her own during her working hours, since her husband, Daniel, is still working full-time outside of their home as a general manager for a soccer and rugby store. That business remains operational, but

is no longer opened to the public.

While Alyssa is working, Daniel works in a warehouse, managing the store’s website and inventory, and processing special orders.

Because her children are not currently allowed to leave their residence, Alyssa said that she recently had to explain the issue of COVID-19 to them.

“We’ve been at home with the kids (for three weeks), and they haven’t gone anywhere other than our front or backyard and occasionally to my mom’s house,” she said. “It was late last week when they started to ask, ‘Mom, why haven’t we gone to the playground?’ and ‘How come I can’t go to the store with you?’”

“We finally had to talk to them about (this coronavirus). So, we finally told them, ‘There’s a lot of germs that are out there right now, and the playgrounds are closed and kids aren’t able to go to the stores right now, because there are a lot

of germs, and kids and grownups can get sick from these germs.’”

“I told them it’s not going to be like this forever, but we do just have to stay at home, play here in our yard for a while and hopefully everyone keeps washing their hands and we’ll be able to go and play at the playground soon enough. And they accepted it. There weren’t too many questions after that.”

With the extended stay-at-home order already in place, Alyssa encouraged people in the community to do their part to be safe and work through this coronavirus situation.

“You see people going to the stores for just one or two items that might not be necessary,” she said. “If we could all just stay at home and do our part to get this coronavirus under control as soon as possible, then we can all go back to our normal day-to-day lives. No one wants our shelter-in-place to be our new normal for any longer than it has to be.”

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Matsui calls on banks to start issuing loans to local small businesses immediately

Congresswoman Doris Matsui (D-CA), a senior member of the House Energy and Commerce Committee, sent a letter to local banks and financial institutions, urging them to ensure that the small business aid funding in the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act is distributed as swiftly as possible.

The CARES Act, which allocated over \$2 trillion to help the American economy through the current COVID-19 crisis, included a \$349 billion infusion for small businesses through the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP). There have been several issues with the distribution of PPP loans preventing small businesses from receiving the support they need to pay employees and maintain operations. The PPP provides cash-flow assistance through 100 percent federally guaranteed loans to employers who maintain their payroll during this emergency. If employers maintain their payroll, the loans will be forgiven, which will help workers remain employed, as well as help affected small businesses recover quicker after the crisis.

With the depth of the current crisis, Congresswoman Matsui is calling upon the region's lenders to open up their lending criteria and immediately provide loans to small businesses affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. Full text of the letter is below:

As we work to prevent irreparable economic damage from the spread of COVID-19, it is critical that lending institutions are doing everything in their power to guarantee that the disaster response funding provided in the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act is made available to small businesses as immediately. I urge you to take immediate action to ensure your lending criteria for the paycheck protection program (PPP) loans are as open and streamlined as possible.

As part of the CARES Act, Congress provided \$349 billion in funding for forgivable loans to small businesses to help pay their employees during the COVID-19 pandemic. The broad eligible uses for these loans allow small business owners to cover employee salaries, paid sick and medical leave, mortgage interest, rent, and utility payments. These loans are a central component of the federal response to COVID-19 and are intended to be widely available and administered quickly. Unfortunately, I have heard alarming feedback from small business owners in my district who report that their applications have been denied on the basis of restrictive PPP loan criteria established by individual banks or lending institutions. In the middle of a public health crisis, this is simply unacceptable.

For the PPP loans to work as intended, they must get to small businesses as quickly as possible. When banks or lending institutions restrict these loans to existing customers and those with active lines of credit, credit cards, or business loans, they undercut the effectiveness of the PPP loans and risk exacerbating economic damage in the Sacramento region. Unnecessarily narrow lending standards will limit the amount of federal funding that flows to our community and will lead to more lay-offs and business closures. The PPP loans provided by Congress in the CARES Act are federal-backed and meant to be provided to those who need them most. In light of widespread PPP loan application rejections throughout the Sacramento region, I call on you to immediately re-evaluate your lending criteria for this crucial federal program.

Thank you for your attention to this urgent matter. I look forward to working with you to ensure all who need a PPP loan receive it as quickly as possible.

made with a Russian radio station to implement communications with the Russian community. Materials and communications in Spanish are also being developed. Further efforts in communication have been applied where there are clusters of COVID-19 cases.

A video from Interim Police Chief Strange was posted to the city's website describing the police departments activity during this emergency. In addition, the Fire and Police Chiefs prepared and released interim guidance for fire and police personnel responding to COVID-19 calls. All special events and events in city facilities have been canceled. Instructions have been posted on the utility bill website on how to cancel bill auto-pay for your utility bills, and to clarify that the city does not turn off water service for non payment.

A business resource page has been established for companies that have been affected by the COVID-19 emergency. The site will update as more information becomes available from federal, state and local resources. The city's "business" website, www.cityofwestsacramento.org/business has posted a list of restaurants that are still open for delivery or pick up.

Though the city is expected more help from the second stimulus package, Cabaldon said, "Our citizens are depending on us to make sure that our core services are protected. It's going to be a challenge to not bid each other up when it comes to spending money, so we need to be really prudent about not spending money that we don't yet have."

Council adopted a temporary moratorium on residential and commercial evictions due to nonpayment of rent resulting from the impacts of COVID-19.

D. On March 27, 2020, the Governor issued Executive Order N-37-20, extending certain eviction protections statewide for residential tenants.

E. The city and its residents and businesses continue to be impacted by the health crisis of this global pandemic. Events, concerts, plays, and conferences have been cancelled. School closures have occurred and may continue. Many employees are unable to work or required to work from home. Non-essential commercial enterprises have closed or have had their operations significantly curtailed. Restaurant and retail business have significantly declined and workers have been impacted by lost wages and layoffs. Parents have had to miss work to care for home-bound school-age children. Under the existing shelter-in-place orders, many workers have to stay home for extended periods.

F. Many residential tenants have experienced sudden income loss, and further income impacts are anticipated. The loss of wages caused by the effects of COVID-19 may impact residential tenants' ability to pay rent when due, leaving tenants vulnerable to eviction.

G. Many commercial tenants have experienced sudden loss of business, or in some case closure, and further negative economic impacts are anticipated. The loss of business caused by the effects of COVID-19 may impact commercial tenants' ability to pay rent when due, leaving tenants vulnerable to eviction.

H. Providing residential and commercial tenants with a short-term protection from eviction due to the inability to pay rent will help avoid increasing the homeless population, support our local economy, and stabilize the

rental housing market by reducing displacement.

I. During this state of emergency, and in the interests of protecting the public health and preventing transmission of the coronavirus, it is essential to avoid unnecessary displacement of residential tenants. Prohibiting evictions on a temporary basis is needed until the spread of the virus can be minimized and the emergency restrictions lifted.

J. Nothing in this ordinance waives a tenant's obligations to pay back rent owed once this ordinance is no longer effective.

Section 2. Amendments.

A. West Sacramento Ordinance 20-5 is hereby amended as follows:

1. Section 2.2.a is amended to read as follows:

"a. Notify the landlord in writing before the day rent is due, or within a reasonable time afterwards not to exceed seven (7) days, that the tenant has a covered reason for delayed payment;"

2. Section 2.3 is amended to read as follows:

"3. As used in this Ordinance, "covered reason for delayed payment" means a residential or commercial tenant's substantial loss of income due to reasons related to COVID-19, including but not limited to the following:

(a) residential tenant or commercial business owner was sick with a suspected or confirmed case of COVID-19 or caring for a household or family member who was sick with a suspected or confirmed case of COVID-19;

(b) residential tenant experienced a lay-off, loss of hours, or other substantial income reduction resulting from COVID-19 or the state of emergency;

(c) residential tenant's compliance with a recommendation from a government agency to stay home, self-quarantine, or avoid congregating with others during the state of emergency;

(d) residential tenant's need to miss work to care for a home-bound school-age child;

(e) commercial tenant's business was required to close in compliance with a recommendation from a government agency; or, (f)

commercial tenant experienced a substantial loss of business resulting from COVID-19 or the state of emergency."

B. Except as amended by subsection A above, all provisions of West Sacramento Ordinance No. 20-5 remain unchanged and in full effect.

Section 3. Effective Date and Term.

1. This Ordinance takes effect immediately upon enactment.

2. This Ordinance remains in effect until the Governor's Executive Order N-28-20 is no longer in effect, unless earlier terminated by the City Council.

Section 4. Emergency Declaration.

The City Council declares this ordinance to be an emergency measure that is needed for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety, pursuant to the authority granted to general law cities under Government Code Section 36937(b) and Government Code Section 8634. The facts constituting the emergency are as follows: The directives from health officials to contain the spread of COVID-19 has resulted in loss of business, furloughs, loss of wages, and lack of work for employees. To protect the public health, safety, and welfare, the city must act immediately to prevent eviction of tenants who are unable to pay rent due to wage losses or loss of business caused by the effects of COVID-19. An emergency measure is necessary to protect tenants from eviction for a temporary period.

Section 5. Publication.

Within fifteen (15) days after its passage, it shall be published at least once in a newspaper of general circulation published and circulated within the City of West Sacramento.

definite decisions have been made about that yet. More information on this topic will be included in finance.

So what do we do if we need help from the city? West Sac Police Department has changed their shift schedule to 12-hour shifts with minimal overlap in order to maximize reserve resources. Police are trying to enforce social distancing. The city does not write public health orders, however they are in charge of parks and parking lots. Code enforcement is in charge of this enforcement. You can report people that are not practicing social distancing and public gatherings by calling code enforcement at 916-617-4925 or on www.cityofwest-sacramento.org/services/west-sac-connect. They would like people to only call in if something is enforceable, like the same group of people meeting each day to play basketball, or a business that is open that shouldn't be. They are also looking at some social distancing issues with some construction sites and larger stores. As part of this effort police will be more aggressive about discouraging the use of playgrounds.

Cabaldon said, "When it comes to social distancing, I think the best thing that we can all do is to just follow the orders ourselves." As time passes, the police are keeping an eye on the rise in domestic violence calls by getting daily updates. The city is looking at ways to get messaging out to the public on ways to deal with stress and "cabin fe-

ver" and how to manage frustrations. The West Sac Fire Department had two recruits in the academy. They have both graduated early and are currently being trained to go to work.

The Public Works department has shifted to 40% of daily staff and 24/7 on call. Furthermore, the Public Works Maintenance Department has broken into two shifts, working every other week. This will ensure a higher number of employees will be available to be on call. Calls after 3:30 p.m. are directed to on-call staff. A call center has been set up in the Corporation Yard and all calls to the city will be routed through it. Staff is being trained on how to route the calls and have been given a list of frequently asked questions. Water treatment is under normal operations. The building division staff is running remotely and has conducted its first "virtual" inspection using remote technology. The Community Development Dept have begun to make adaption for processing permits and will be conducting limited inspections. Capital Projects and Transportation created interim measures to accept public bids (including the West Capitol Avenue Road Rehabilitation Project).

The parks division scaled back operation to only essential park maintenance. This includes upkeep of park and trash pick up. Parks staff began providing online classes through the Senior Center (like Zumba Gold), however many seniors lack the technology needed to participate.

Parks staff also began a phone tree to help seniors connect with one another. In addition, staff has begun making "sunshine calls" to regular users of the Community Center's senior lounge and programs. An average of 70 calls per day have been made. Staff have been holding on-line sewing classes for seniors. The first class taught them how to make masks. Fitness classes from the Recreation Center are being live streamed. So far about 550 people are participating.

Councilwoman Quirina Orozco said, "Perhaps the city could mirror some of the innovative ways that the West Sac community are thinking of to support each other. I think we need to watch our community for ideas."

Cabaldon said, "Our community is amazing from all city departments, school district, non profits, business owners that are repurposing to meet our needs, neighbors keeping each others spirits up and volunteers helping with food. All of West Sac is really rallying ... The virus is hitting home and heroic efforts that so many are doing, are working."

As of April 7, there are 56 cases in Yolo County with two deaths, 33 of those cases are in West Sac. Reports from the governor's office and non-profits show that the surge is expected to hit West Sacramento in 2-5 weeks. That is when we will see a real change. This is by no means a complete list of the hard work that our city staff has been doing. And remember, they have to track everything. Please do your part so that we can all get through this.
