

Tree top ropes course now open

Adventurers have a new tree canopy to explore at Heritage Oaks Park in West Sacramento for exploring nature at great heights. The treetop adventure course consists of platforms and suspended wires and ropes designed to challenge different aspects of the body in a safe environment among 100-year-old trees nestled between new homes and the Sacramento River.

Designed for ages five to 85 the adventure course opened on Friday at Heritage Oaks Park, located off Village Parkway and Lake Washington Drive. With a highly-trained and professional staff, visitors are welcomed and set at ease from the moment of arrival. After signing a waiver, staff secure the harnesses and explain the lay of the land – showing the progression of difficulty between the various par courses, starting with a course that’s relatively low to the ground. Each course includes various challenges that test one’s balance, strength, and in some cases, problem-solving capacity, ending with a fun zipline.

From swinging and wobbly bridges to walking a tight rope, staff ensure the safety of the course and they’re around for emotional support.

Operator Kletterwald USA received a temporary occupancy permit to open the ropes course a few days per week while park site improvements are underway. Grading for the parking lot, a play area and pathways, along with

construction of a kiosk and restroom building are expected to be complete by early spring. The kiosk will feature a coffee bar, soft pretzels and hotdogs.

The founding members of Kletterwaldusa, Johana Patler, Catherine Reon, Thomas Stranner and Kale Wisnia, started their pursuit of a suitable location for a tree top adventure course in the U.S. in 2017 and are excited to have partnered with the City of West Sacramento to place Tree Top Sac in Kletterwald Heritage Oaks Park. Tree lovers, the co-owners have been working regularly with a city arborist

and will be maintaining the health of the trees with regular pruning.

In an interview with this publication, Johana explained how inspiration for a ropes course began in Austria where treetop ropes courses are commonplace. Originally from Mill Valley, Johana is an Austrian resident and is here temporarily. Her brother Kale and his wife Catherine live in Sacramento and are founders of CRKW Studio Incorporated, a local Architecture Firm. In years to come, Johana said they hope to expand the business to San Francisco and other areas in California. Regarding the course in at Heritage

Oaks Park, if successful, they hope to expand their property to include space for more adventure-type of activities.

They invite the public to visit the park during business hours to walk the grounds, ask questions. Dogs on leash are welcome.

Groups are welcome – be it for birthday parties or field trips.

A grand opening likely will occur in April. While the park is located at Lake Washington Boulevard and Village Parkway, during the soft opening, you can find the temporary entrance near the corner of Greenbrier Road and Shell Street.

During the soft opening, hours of operation are 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Thursday through Sunday.

FAQs – WHAT TO WEAR AND BRING

Wear comfortable clothing that you don’t mind getting a little dirty. You may want to bring a change of clothing for the ride home.

Closed toe, closed heel, fully enclosed shoes are required. Ankle-supporting boots are recommended, but sneakers are fine too. For your safety, do NOT wear sandals, slip-ons, or any shoe where your foot or toes are partially exposed.

Dress for the weather! Layers, hats, gloves, and rain gear are recommended depending on the weather forecast.

Gloves are recommended to enhance your comfort and experience. While

2020’s new tax scam goes online

New Years... It brings resolutions, fresh beginnings, and taxes. Where there is money, there are thieves. As sure as we can count on new tax laws and rules, we can count on new scams popping up. It’s sad that we have to be on the lookout for these scams, but the truth is, we do. It’s often difficult to recognize because scamming is what these people do for a living... so they are good at it. So why don’t they get busted?

The Yolo County District Attorney’s office follows through with every fraud re-

port, amounting to hundreds per year of all types.

Said Kevin Clark, administrative services analyst for Yolo DA: “Once in a while we are able to trace the operations to Texas, or the tip of Maine, or something. Then we’re able to contact their local law enforcement and have them investigated ... More often than not, it traces back to some other country. Now it has become international, and there is often nothing we can do at that point.”

The problem is also that many times the fraud is not reported until after the victim

has already been scammed. Once it’s happened, there is no getting that money back. “We can’t stress enough that people need to be diligent. It is much better to check to see if something is a scam and avoid it, then to find out when it’s too late,” Clark said.

For the past several years, the most common tax frauds took place over the phone. People would and still do receive phone calls and the person on the phone claims to be from the IRS. They have enough personal information that the victim believes that it is legitimate. Remember, in-depth

background checks on people are just a Google search away. The people on the phone then threaten to take people’s homes etc. Often, the scammers will target senior citizens. This is simply known, because even a basic search will give you the person’s name and birth date. The beauty is that most phones, both cell and land line, have “scam likely” capabilities. If you don’t know how to activate them and they are not automatic, seek assistance in activating them.

This year is no exception. The Yolo County District Attorney reports that the 2020 tax year

has brought a NEW tax scam. The Internal Revenue Service and the Yolo County District Attorney would like to get ahead of it. To date, there have only been a handful of reports, and the DA’s office is hoping to keep it that way.

The scammers pretend to be from “IRS ONLINE.” There is usually an attachment with some variation of a “tax transcript” or something similar, with instructions to open the attachment for further information. Once the attachment is opened, a well-known virus

Emergency Preparedness and Evacuation Report For Older Adults and Persons with Access and Functional Needs

(Woodland, CA) – The Yolo County Commission on Aging and Adult Services (YCCAAS) recently identified in a report emergency preparation and evacuation necessities for older adults and persons with access or functional needs. The report encompasses recommendations for the Yolo County Board of Supervisors and the Yolo County Commission of Aging and Adult Services, a suggested plan of action for local aging commissions, as well as background and supporting information. Recent fires, floods, and electrical outages have highlighted the urgency for Yolo County to be prepared in the next emergency. “As Chair of the Yolo County Commission on Aging and Adult Services, I am well aware of the severe risks that elderly and disabled residents face during fire, flood or other disasters,” said Yolo County Board Supervisor Jim Provenza. “This report provides a road map for Yolo County, our cities and our local aging commissions to take concrete action to protect our el-

derly and disabled population during a disaster. I am grateful to the members of the Commission and our Disaster Preparedness Subcommittee for their months of hard work on this project.” Included in the report are: recommendations for a Special Needs Alert Program (SNAP) to identify and serve those with special needs during an emergency; measures to assure that licensed care facilities have adequate evacuation plans; training on Alzheimer's Disease and dementia for emergency workers; and help for those who rely on medical equipment during power outages. After presenting these recommendations to the Yolo County Board of Supervisors, city councils, and local aging commissions in the county, YCCAAS will monitor progress in the implementation of the recommendations and provide assistance as needed. not required, you are welcome to bring your own. For your safety... long hair should be tied back, waists and thighs should be covered, and body jewelry should be removed or taped over. You may take cameras, phones, and any other device on the course as long as they are secured to you and tucked away to prevent them from getting caught or falling to the ground. We DON'T recommend bringing a bag with you into the trees because they are bulky, but if you must bring a bag, it should fit closely to your body and must not interfere with the harness or related Tree Top Sac gear. A small backpack with tight fitting straps usually works fine. Fanny packs aren't great because they sit right where your harness will be. Please leave extra bags and belongings locked in your car during your adventure. They can hold



onto keys for you in their lockers. Tree Top Sac is not responsible for lost or stolen items. Still not sure what to wear? Check out the Instagram to get an idea! PLEASE BE AWARE OF OUR SUPERVISION RATIO. For Kids under 10 years old, one adult must climb with them. (one adult per five children under 13) If not enough slots are available at your desired time, please contact them or choose another time.

THIS ‘n’ THAT SAD & Then Some!

OmiGOSH I'm so SICK of DREARY!!!! My dad would often say, “**One day** I'm going to **escape** Ohio winters!” I used to think he meant the cold and snow. I know better now!

Like here, Fall was nice. You might get a month or so of that. When winter's skies finally cleared, Spring's wildflowers: also nice – for the couple weeks they lasted. Summer weeks (that weren't scorching hot and humid)? Those were rare.

Ohio has two main seasons. Winter (dominant), and 2-3 months of Summer. That pretty much sums up our climate, too, I think. Two seasons. Dreary – or Hot-and-Miserable.

Not sure which of the two I dislike most. Right now, I'd go with dreary. It's tricky, though, our winter. On some days, the sun does peek through. Often enough to keep us planted where ‘below freezing’ is a rarity and we can garden all year ‘round.

Lest you think I'm not grateful for these pluses, I should explain that I've been officially diagnosed with Seasonal Affective Disorder. ‘SAD’ (as the acronym implies) is a type of depression that, for

some, is triggered by fall/winter's doldrums.

Back when dad was bemoaning gray skies-gray slush-gray mood, no one had ever heard of SAD. Today, research has found a genetic link to the gray-skies-blues. My brother had periods of depression, too. As did our dad's mother and both sisters.

Well, once I understood what I was up against, I found a way to fend it off. Having moved back to Ohio from sunny Denver to be closer to remaining family, the farmhouse I remodeled had multiple recessed lights with full spectrum daylight bulbs. In EVERY room. It worked!

They're not the cheapest – full spectrum daylight bulbs. The only daylight bulbs I have currently are those that light up the lizard tanks. Bearded Dragons need simulated daylight to properly digest their greens and protein (i.e. assorted bugs). Or even eat at all. If it's dark and dreary, they turn into slugabeds and even ‘brummage’ – a lizard word for hibernate.

Dad never did escape Ohio winters, despite, at one point, buying a quarter-acre or so in a place called Sunsites, Arizona. After my parents died, their financial planner told me some TV evangelists promote ‘investment opportunities’ like this one. Shortly after the Sunsites purchase, mom and dad took a road trip out west to see their desert property. They never went back. But since the property taxes were really low, they just kept it.

As far as I know, the so-called ‘planned community’ never did materialize. When my brother and I co-inherited this scam – oh wait, I mean ‘investment’ – (along with a demand

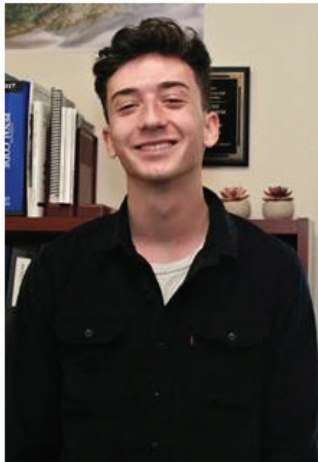
Yolo County District Attorney welcomes new interns

The Yolo County District Attorney’s Office is excited to announce the addition of eight new interns. These new members of the District Attorney’s team bring a tremendous amount of talent and a diverse array of life experiences to the table.

The DDI Program interns assist with investigations and prosecution of chronic criminal offenders by performing crime trend evaluations, social media scraping, monitoring inmate communications, and using other sources of data to determine appropriate resolutions for these targeted cases. Francheska works for the UC Davis School of Law as a student assistant to the dean. “My life’s motivations are my family, my passion to help people, and my dream to leave a lasting positive effect on individual lives,” Francheska shared.
