Sutter Health Park to transform into the world of Cirque du Soleil's Amaluna

The iconic large blue and white striped Cirque du Soleil tent will erupt from the top of Sutter Health Park, starting on Thursday, as a team of more than 60 will work for several hours proceeding the following eight days, pounding pegs, unfurling the canvas, and pushing more than 100 supporting poles that make the intimate tent take its shape.

Readying the ballpark for the transformation, the Cirque du Soleil team brings Amaluna to West Sacramento beginning Wednesday, January 22 through Sunday, February 23, 2020.

Written and directed by Tony Award-winning director Diane Paulus, Amaluna is a celebration of love and a tribute to the work and voice of women, featuring a cast that comprises mostly women with an all-female band. The show's title is a fusion of the words ama, which refers to "mother" in many languages, and luna, which means "moon," a symbol of femininity that evokes both the mother-daughter rela-



tionship and the idea of goddess and protector of the planet.

Amaluna invites the audience to a mysterious island governed by goddesses and guided by the cycles of the moon. Their queen, Prospera, directs her daughter's coming-of-age ceremony in a rite that honors femininity, renewal, rebirth, and balance which marks the passing of these insights and values from one generation to the next. In the wake of a storm caused by Prospera, a group of young men lands on the island, triggering an epic, emotional story of love be-

tween Prospera's daughter and a brave young suitor. But theirs is a love that will be put to the test. The couple must face numerous demanding trials and overcome daunting setbacks before they can achieve mutual trust, faith, and harmony.

Paulus says: "I didn't want to build a 'women's agenda' show. I wanted to create a show with women at the center of it, something that had a hidden story that featured women as the heroines."

In an interview with the News-Ledger one of the performers, Shae Zamardi who plays an Amazon warrior protecting the island with others from the tribe. "We're a force of strong, powerful women. So, it's a really cool role to play, especially in this day and age.'

Only on tour with Amaluna for one year thus far, Zamardi said she feels empowered as a woman in and out of costume, just by working with such talent and such resilient women in and out every day.


The mostly women cast and all-female band sets the tone for a Cirque show, says Zamardi. "I think it also really shows people come and watch how powerful women are."

That said, Zamardi hopes the audience comes away feeling empowered when they leave the show, a feeling she has when she shares the stage with the female cast.

Paulus is known for productions that go beyond the boundaries of a conventional theatrical setting to involve the audience in immersive environments.

Meanwhile, Scott Pask's set creates a mysterious, verdant, enchanted island whose most important

Arson suspect custody

Sacramentan Adam Rudi, 37, was arrested on Jan. 7 at about 10:30 a.m. for arson. That morning, West Sacramento Police were dispatched to investigate a report of an arson at a gas station in the 3100 block of Jefferson Boulevard. A man was reported to have been lighting trash cans on fire and stating that he was going to blow-up the gas station. Prior to police arrival on-scene, he fled in a black Lexus sedan. West Sacramento Fire Department had also been dispatched to prior calls at the same location the night before.

While conducting the officers investigation were able to positively identify the suspect as Rudi, driving a 2002 black Lexus. Officers spotted the suspect vehicle at approximately 12:30 p.m. in the area of West Capitol Avenue and Cedar Street. As officers attempted to conduct a traffic stop on the vehicle, the suspect fled and led the officers on a pursuit.

Officers pursued the suspect toward Sacramento with assistance the California Highway Patrol and the Sacramento County Department. Sheriff's The pursuit finally ended after approximately 35 minutes on Interstate 80 in the Roseville/ Lincoln area after the suspect crashed. He was taken into custody without any further incident and booked into the Yolo County Jail on associated charges.

THIS 'n' THAT

'Pot Deal Gone Bad'

Well, it's the story many in West Sac wish would just go away. No one expects this sort of crime in Southport, let alone near the high school. It's a relief, of sorts, that only one of four involved was even from West Sac and none attended River City.

The cast of characters is as follows:

An 'older' (but juvenile) Sacramento girl (now jailed as an accessory to what police say was apparently a marijuana deal on the Clarksburg Branchline Trail, near Rec Center).

A 16-year-old Sacramento girl (who arrived at the trail in a car driven from Sacramento by the older girl), according to the younger girl's grandfather in an interview with KCRA.

A 16-year-old boy, arrested in Elk Grove later the same night that the girl was killed (police confiscated a gun at that location).

A 16-year-old boy, identified as being 'of West Sac,' police said, but adding that he did not attend RCHS.

The grandfather, who insists his granddaughter, Sam (Samantha) was not 'in the drug scene,' told KCRA the girls accused the boys of 'shorting' them on the money for the marijuana. Sam ran after the boys to confront them. Saw a gun. Both girls ran. Saman-

River City HS and the tha, 16, he said, "was shot in the back three times."

> The two boys fled. Not known, whether the older girl stayed with the dying Sam. Neighborhood people heard shots (some say five), and called 9-1-1. Police swarmed the area. They soon knew who they were looking for (perhaps from the older girl). The Elk Grove boy was arrested that same night. The West Sac boy - his photo and name, released by WSPD, all over the news - turned himself in

> early the next day. Both boys have been charged with robbery and homicide. They and the older girl spent at least one night in the Yolo County Jail. Maybe when this column publishes, they'll have bonded out. Or face stiffer charges.

> It would be nice to think of this as an 'isolated'incident, and it's likely the shooting is. But on

social media (Nextdoor, Facebook), many say it's widely known the trail is routinely used by some RCHS students for smoking pot and doing drug buys.

So here's this. California juveniles cannot legally buy marijuana. Nor should they, say experts in brain development. The **un**impaired male brain doesn't fully mature until age 25. Do you want to, let's say, walk a trail and encounter judgement-impaired teenager? With a hidden gun? Showing off for an impaired buddy, or scaring up money to for a drug deal?

Many Southport property owners chose their upscale homes because the area felt like a nice, safe place to raise their children. Some, whose homes back up to the trail, are now not so sure. One homeowner reported bullet holes in their fence after the girl was shot. Another reportedly had a window shattered. A third planned to turn over security tapes from cameras focused on the trail long before this particular drug deal happened.) One angry parent said the trail needs lighting and security.

OK, let's do that. But let's do this, too: Find out why kids self-medicate with illegal drugs. How many have pot on their person or in their lockers when they're at school? ANY school. Not just River City. A drug sniffing dog could

Now, about the shooting: How old were these four when they first got high? Where did they get it? Why did they keep using? Where did the girls get the pot they brought to West Sac? Are there shadowy adults operating in the background? Using juveniles to do the dealing? How did three juveniles from Elk Grove and Sacramento even know about the trail? How did any of the four know each other?

The Clarksburg Branchline Trail was intended, in part, to give kids a safer alternative to walk to school than braving Jefferson with its busy traffic. The added bonus: A nature-rich amenity for West Sac residents, who, when the trail's complete, can follow it all the way to Clarksburg.

While this 'bad' publicity isn't what we want, its upshot may be a safer trail for everyone. Plus here's our chance to straighten out some kids. Before they ruin their lives forever.

Carol Bogart thanks West Sac PD for its highly effective response to the reports of shots fired on the trail. Perhaps of interest to all who work with kids is a new study (https://neurosciencenews.com/fear-intimation-antisocial-behavior-15402) on childhood social interactions. Interactions, neuroscientists say, that may foreshadow later anti-social behaviors. (Note: The three teenagers implicated in the shooting are innocent until proven guilty.) Questions, comments? feature is a carefully crafted forest of bamboo-like branches that both frame and surround the action.

Taking his cues from the natural world, especially from forests and plant life, Scott has created an environment that is both immersive and open, with plenty of space for dramatic rituals and ceremonies as well as acrobatic performances.

The trees thrust upward from the circumference of the Amaluna stage and the Big Top's tent poles to form an airy canopy. Upstage, the vegetation grows closer to the ground, forming a tunnel-like grotto.

The branches and limbs of the canopy are unmistakably engineered constructions, and the visual references to bamboo are quite evident. It was important to Scott that the forest should be seen to be hand-crafted, however there was no attempt to

disguise its components as anything actually found in nature – nothing has been given a patina to look like wood, for example. Yet the feeling of being in a real forest is palpable.

The peacock feather decoration that occupies much of the middle of the Amaluna stage is a significant emblematic motif that is echoed in some of Mérédith Caron's iridescent costumes.

The peacock images in the show are inspired by the magnificent bird that accompanies Hera, the Greek goddess of women, marriage and fertility. Legend tells us that the protective "eyes" in its tail watch over women in all the stages of their lives.

Scott, who initially trained as an architect, regards the entire space as more of an art installation than a stage set, and he has used light to activate it and take the audience to other places and evoke different emotional responses. During the intense drama of the storm, for example, the lighting casts the shadows of the branchlike can-

opy onto the surface of the Big Top to create a momentary feeling of heightened danger.

The water-bowl is a piece of acrobatic equipment that doubles as a dramatic set element. It resembles a giant, clear gemstone set in a ring of stylized organic shapes that resemble a vortex captured in time. As it interacts with the lighting, this "jewel" changes its appearance and aura, much like a real precious stone.

Among her favorite scenes, Zamardi says when she first saw the water-bowl scene, she was mesmerized. "It's literally her doing her act in water. When I saw that, I was like, 'wow: I never seen anything like that before. It's not like it's a pool. It's a really small water bowl. Jumping and turning and flipping into the water

In further promoting the show, Zamardi said, "Everyone should come. It's something worth watching. If something like this was coming to my city, I would want my girls, my boys to watch the show. We have a

lot of young kids and older people come watch a show and they leave feeling feeling inspired and empowered. If we can make people feel like that, it's really beautiful. It makes all the hard work pay off. If I had a daughter or a son, I'd want to bring them to the show because it might inspire them to do something with their future."

Originally composed of 20 street performers in 1984, Cirque du Soleil Entertainment Group completely reinvented circus arts and went on to become a world leader in live entertainment. Established in Montreal, the Canadian organization has brought wonder and delight to over 200 million spectators with productions presented in close to 450 cities in 60 countries. Cirque du Soleil Entertainment Group currently has over 4,500 employees, including 1,400 artists, from nearly 70 countries.

Measures J & K

critique.

In November 2002, West Sacramento voters approved two measures that established a sales tax increase of 1/2% (1/2 cent on every taxable sales dollar) that was intended to supplement the city's general fund for general government purposes. Measure J was an advisory measure that described the City Council's conceptual plan on how the money should be spent, and Measure K was the measure that implemented the sales tax increase. The initial amount generated from the ½% increase was estimated to be \$5 million annually, of which \$2.5 million was estimated for base allocation revenues.

What Measure J Asked


If Measure K is approved, should the proceeds fund the repair and maintenance of city streets, new parks and community facilities, library services, after-school programs, childcare and senior facilities, expanded police and fire protection, and reductions in utility bills and property tax assessments?

How Measure K Works

Measure K specified that the ½% increase would consist of 1/4% that would cease after 10 years to be used for specific capital projects and 1/4% that would continue indefinitely to fund ongoing programs and activities

The Measure K spending plan was developed based on the advisory measure, Measure J. Resolution 02-58 outlines the City Council's plan for spending the one-half cent sales tax. The base allocation is broken into six categories, each with targeted funding percentages, which could be adjusted up to five percentage points from the target allocations. The categories are: water/refuse/ lighting and landscaping rate reduction, road maintenance and street sweeping, expanded West Sacramento Library, enhancement of fire and police protection, extension of regional light rail to serve West Sacramento and afterschool programs, childcare, park safety, and enhancement of other parks and recreation services. Each year, a report on the Measure K revenues and expenditures is presented to the City Council and published in the West Sacramento News Ledger.

In the information presented in the attached chart and table, Appropriations refers to the allocation of Measure K revenue in accordance with Measure J, along with revenues from other sources, while Expenditures refers to actual disbursement of those funds.





Raley's Food For Families | Woodland Child Molester Will Not Be Paroled

Convicted child molester Michael Ward will remain in state prison for at least another three years. Ward's parole hearing was heard before Board of Parole Hearings Commissioner Michelle Minor and Deputy Commissioner Cathleen Newman at the California Health Care Facility in Stockton on Jan. 8, 2020. Ward was denied parole for the fifth time.

A Yolo County Jury convicted Ward of child molestation involving two young girls in Woodland in 1996. Ward had sent pornographic Polaroid photographs through the mail to an undercover Utah Special Agent. A search warrant was obtained and other evidence was found linking Ward to two young girls

whom he had photographed and molested.

Ward has admitted molesting numerous other young children in Woodland. On Oct. 17, 1997, a Yolo County judge sentenced Ward to 15 years-to-life for Lewd or Lascivious Act upon Child Under Fourteen with More Than One Victim.

Supervising Deputy District Attorney Christopher Bulkeley prosecuted the case in 1996.

Chief Deputy Jonathan Raven appeared at the hearing.

The mother of one of the victims attended the hearing accompanied by an advocate from the District Attorney's Victim Services Division.

In denying Ward parole, Commissioner Minor stated that Ward "still poses an unreasonable risk to public safety." She continued listing the following reasons for the decision: Ward was unable to control his behavior before being incarcerated, he continues to minimize his role in the crimes, he has a lack of insight to the causative factors, he has a poor relapse prevention plan, he doesn't understand the grooming behavior he utilizes, and he has unrealistic pa-

Ward will be eligible for parole in three years. According to District Attorney Jeff Reisig, "The result of a three-year denial means that the victim and her family's wish, that Mr. Ward remain imprisoned for the safety of the children in our community, was met."

January is National Stalking Awareness Month Yolo DA is collecting cell phones for victims

A nice warm cup of coffee waits for you in the kitchen, like any other day. You get ready and head to work to begin your day. Everything seems normal until you see a familiar car parked in your work parking lot. Recognizing the vehicle, you drive to a safe place and call the police. Your stalker has found you again.

January is Stalking Awareness Month. It is a time to educate ourselves and others around you about the seriousness of stalking. Stalking is serious, often violent, and can escalate over time. Stalking is often committed by someone the victim knows, and stalking by an intimate partner is the most common and most dangerous type of stalking. According to the Center for Disease Control, "Approximately 1 in 6 women and 1 in 17 men have experienced

stalking at some point in their If you or someone you know is lives."

The first step to finding a solution to the problem is realizing that stalking can happen to anyone. Stalking is a course of conduct that can last for weeks or even years, and can take a toll on a victim's emotional health and sense of security. Stalkers use a variety of tactics that can include unwanted phone calls, texts, contact via social media, unwanted gifts, property damage, and threats.

If you feel you are being stalked, it is best to keep an ongoing journal of the incidents when they occur. Note the date, time, and location of where you are, and briefly describe the incident. If the incident escalates to where you, or someone around you, are in danger of being hurt, call 911.
