**Chando's
expanding
to West
Sacramento**

West Sacramento's tradition of fine Mexican food continues with the arrival of Chando's Tacos. Chando's Boatman Avenue building will house a restaurant and be the base for a dining dynasty. Besides the eatery itself, the location will house Chando's Enterprises, offices and ovens to serve "Chando" Madrigal's growing chain of restaurants and food trucks.

Chando's has renovated and repurposed the United Bakery building north of Industrial Boulevard. It will now prep food for the West Sacramento restaurant, as well as the Roseville, Power Inn, and Arden outlets. The individual locations, however, will still barbecue their own chicken, fish and carne asada. Looking ahead, Madrigal envisions diners in Folsom, Carmichael, and Elk Grove. Perhaps beyond.

Madrigal's family is from Michoacan, Mexico. His father owned and ran a tortilla factory there, and now things are coming full circle. The West Sacramento facility will produce 100 percent stone-ground corn tortillas. It will also bake them along with all the bread needed for each Chando's Tacos location. Food storage and vegetable preparation will also be a function of the building.

Chando's is located in a triangular area that is rapidly becoming a West Sacramento foodie district. Yolo Brewing, Bike Dog and Jack Rabbit are three craft breweries located among warehouses, corporation yards, and document storage companies. In the shadow of the Rice Farmer's Cooperative silos, new people and new energy are coming to an area that offers affordable space and room to grow. Helping that growth is everything mobile.

Three high-end food trucks make up Chando's fleet with a fourth a possibility this year. These \$100,000 kitchens on wheels are more than just taco trucks. And Chando's is also mobile in cyberspace. They've developed an app lets you call in orders before you arrive. Customers may also go mobile if Chando's plans for drive-through kiosks take off. What's on the menu?

Chando's Tacos presents their own take on Mexican food. Not entirely traditional and not yet not Americanized, the food tastes lighter than that served in most Mexican restaurants. Meatless options are presented, including mango ceviche tostadas and tacos de Papa, or potato tostadas.

Yolo Conflict Resolution Center workshop to be held on Thursday

Have you ever wondered how disputes can get resolved without the time consuming courts or expensive attorneys? The answer lies with the Yolo Conflict Resolution Center (YCRC) - a community mediation service providing quick and inexpensive options to the courts and attorneys.

YCRC offers an alternative to the courts through proven restorative justice, meditation and dispute resolution practices.

Through YCRC volunteer mediators hear a wide variety of common disputes from disagreements with merchants, customers and businesses to

disagreements between roommates, landlords, tenants and families. Mediation provides both disputants with a voice to hear each side of a complaint. Two volunteer mediators serve as facilitators and not as judges, juries or attorneys. Each session takes about three hours and the cost is \$50 per party.

The only mediation services in Yolo County had been through the City of Davis up until YCRC's inception in 2015. As a new service to Yolo County, YCRC is currently focusing on outreach to provide mediation for the entire county in areas not yet been served

including West Sacramento.

"The City of West Sacramento recognizes the work we (YCRC) do," said Orit Kalman, YCRC Executive Director. River City High School, Light-house Covenant Church, Bryte/Broderick Action Network (BBCAN), West Sacramento Police Department, Yolo County Housing and Empower Yolo have been supportive in help developing resources or providing space for YCRC.

"We want to provide opportunities to host events in West Sacramento by creating a sense of community," said Kalman. Some YCRC events

in West Sacramento will be aimed at helping neighbors understand cultures and values other than their own.

All potential volunteer YCRC mediators go through rigorous training over two full weekends. The 40-hour training identifies trainees' mediation styles, emphasizes effective listening techniques, provide issues and problems that can come up in mediation and the mechanics of a typical mediation. All students take part in role playing exercises and have the opportunity to experience

rience both the roll of me-
diators and disputants. Volunteer mediators are
not required to have aca-
demic or professional creden-
tials and come from all
walks of life.
"It's (mediation) is
about solving problems
that affect health and a
person's mental well-
being," said Kalman. Me-
diation is facilitation
with the two parties that
gets them both talking to
each other and ultimate-
ly coming up with a res-
olution that both parties
can agree.

"Our goal is when they
leave mediation to help
them move forward even
if they don't reach a res-
olution," said Kalman.
"We (YCRC) give people
the opportunity to tell
the story on their own,"
said Jennifer Creinin,
who handles case intake.
By providing a voice for
each party, mediators
hear "commonalities" in
a dispute which goes a
long way in providing
a resolution suitable to
both parties.
Crises situations that
must be resolved im-
mediately such as evic-
tions cannot be mediated
through YCRC. "If things
aren't going well, it's bet-

ter to be proactive before
the crises mode," said
Kalman.
"Bad things happen in
the world and in our com-
munity," said Kalman,
"but if we can solve prob-
lems in our own commu-
nity, that can have a ripple
effect in the larger com-
munity."

tenant/landlord rights and
responsibilities is sched-
uled for March 3 from 6
to 7:30 p.m. at the Arthur
Turner Community Li-
brary, 1212 Merkley Ave-
nue in West Sacramento.

Reminiscing days past in West Sacramento

Long-time subscriber and former West Sacramento resident John Guerrero called the News-Ledger recently to reminisce. Now living in Fargo, North Dakota, John remembers arriving with his family in 1947 in what was then considered Bryte. He was just 11 years old. The family settled in the West Acre area. He understands they were the first Mexican-American family to do so. A different time, he was able to go to work at that young age in the Eye Street Bridge Market owned by the Quan family. For 25 cents an hour. The Quans faithfully took money out of his slim paycheck for Social Security, so that John would later qualify for SS retirement when he was just 53. He also remembers the Joey Lopes Market, owned by the father of the famous West Sacramento boxer. And the Bridgeview Market as well. In those days, Guerro explained, any of the markets would extend you credit so that you could buy a loaf of bread. "You can't forget that sort of kindness." He added that grocers would stay open seven days a week year round. Getting back and forth from his home in Bryte and work in Broderick was also simple, you just took the Gibson Bus Line for a nickel. It ran past 11 p.m. The Marine Corps would take him out of West Sacramento. He applied for the National Guard at 14, hoping to get into the Korean War. They rejected him then, but the Corps did take him when he became eligible and he did

see combat. He would eventually be involved in Korea, Lebanon, and Vietnam, becoming wounded eight times and earning five Purple Hearts. Taking advantage of a college opportunity at the end of his Marine Corps career, he enrolled in North Dakota State University and has been in North Dakota ever since. Asked about the weather during our phone call, he admitted that it was three degrees outside in Fargo, with the wind chill expected to hit 30 degrees below. But he said he had a coat on and a blanket. And warm memories of a childhood spent in West Sacramento.

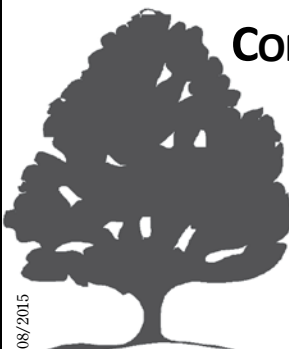

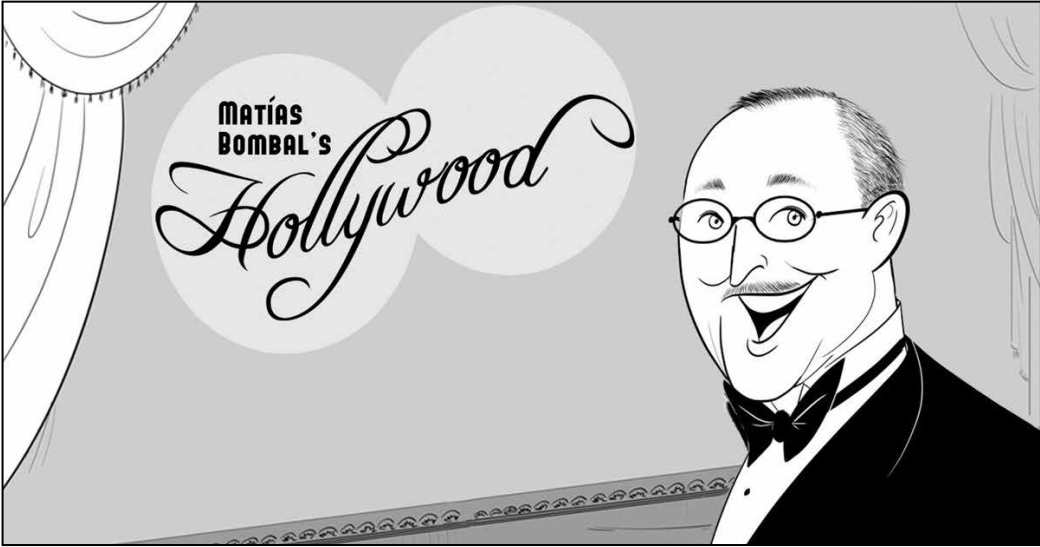

Walt Disney Studios Motion Pictures offers “Zootopia”, the latest John Lassiter style animation feature that seems much more geared for adults and teens than children. It’s the story of a bunny, Judy Hopps (voiced by Ginnifer Goodwin) who dreams of being a cop in the metropolis of Zootopia, the big city for anthropomorphic animals. She leaves her hick farmland and bunny parents (voiced by Don Lake and Bonnie Hunt) and sets off for the police academy, with the usual and well-worn underdog trying to achieve story elements.

Once graduated, she’s assigned parking meter duty by her chief (voiced by Idris Elba) and whilst in that demeaning job trails a fox, Nick Wilde (voiced by Jason Bateman) who she thought was a smooth operator, but trying to be open minded and fair, gives him the benefit of the doubt. As it turns out, he was not to be trusted and her instinct was spot on. A series of adventures ensue in which she eventually

teams up with the fox for a greater goal, to discover why the polite and tamed to civilization animals are returning to their native predator instincts. Who could be behind this? The Mayor? A Mobster?

These avenues are explored by bunny and fox as Disney goes the route of noir crime investigation with many inside jokes and visual tributes to classic movies such as “The Godfather”, “The Wizard of Oz”, and others. Other popular voices you will hear include J.K. Simmons, Octavia Spencer, Shakira, Kristen Bell, and Tommy Chong.

Sadly this movie rubbed me the wrong way in that the story line tries to force political correctness to the young viewer. When did Disney take on the responsibility of parenting? Values of life should be instilled in formative years by a parent or parents with love to children, stressing the golden rule. That Disney takes on this responsibility is insulting, especially under the guise of entertainment for children.

That said, the outstanding production values are present that one expects from Disney and the movie

has much entertainment value. Fun, but inappropriately preachy. In 3-D with some scenes that jump out at you that may be too scary for the smallest children. They scared me!

curity detail of the U.S. president, in the person of Mike Banning, played by actor Gerard Butler, but he is savvy enough to have delayed the president slightly which keeps him from being killed right of the bat. Aaron Ekhart is the US president, Benjamin Asher. Singular Angela Bassett stars as Lynn Jacobs, a presidential aid. Ms. Bassett is a fine actress, and one that radiates elegance and beauty even in such an action adventure movie

as this. She’s a neat lady, brightens up every movie she’s in. Seventy-eight-year-old Morgan Freeman is also in the movie as the U.S. vice president.

It’s non-stop action, cars rolling over and mass destruction of famous London landmarks with such punch, that you get the effect of a disaster movie and an action movie at the same time. No dull moments here. Normally I’d complain about this type of movie, but I was highly enter-

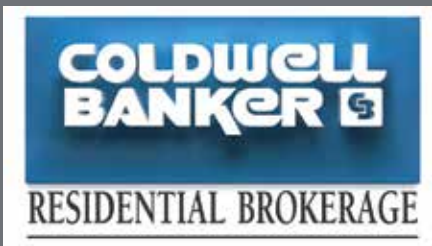
