Yolo County Men Convicted of Burglary Spree

On Feb. 23, 26-year-old Winters man Louis Scott Campos and 28-year-old Woodland man Love Davis III plead no contest to six residential burglaries, which are strikes, and two additional felonies, vehicle theft and burglary of a trailer. The defendants also admitted enhancements alleging that at three residences the victims were inside their homes during the burglaries, according to a press release from District Attorney Jeff Reisig's office.

The burglaries were all committed between Dec. 23, 2014, and Jan. 17, 2015, in the cities of Winters, Woodland and in rural Yolo County. The spree began after the first victim, Campos' neighbor, asked him to watch their house while they were on vacation. They broke into many homes, garages and out buildings stealing a variety of possessions including vehicles, ATVs, trailers, electronics, and other valuables, according to the release.

These crimes were particularly brazen and heinous as the thieves broke into homes in broad daylight and, on three occasions, the residents were home at the time of the break in. The spree came to an end when the Yolo County Sheriff deputies apprehended Campos and Davis shortly after their attempt to get away by driving through muddy farmland on stolen ATVs.

District Attorney Jeff Reisig emphasized the importance of prison sentences in these cases. "Residential burglaries are among some of the most serious and offensive crimes our office prosecutes. Yolo County residents deserve to feel safe in their homes and residential burglaries deprive them of that right." The prosecuting attorney, Deputy District Attorney Jennifer McHugh commended the diligent investigation completed by the Yolo County Sheriff's Department. "The Deputies went above and

Floodplain experiment points to water policy solutions to support both salmon recovery and agriculture

UC Davis Center for Watershed Sciences, the California Department of Water Resources and non-profit organization California Trout have launched an expanded experiment to better understand how the Sacramento River system can support healthy salmon populations.

For the first time this year, the agricultural floodplain habitat experiment will compare food web productivity and fish growth in three different kinds of river habitat. For the course of the experiment, a group of juvenile Chinook salmon will be held in underwater pens on flooded rice fields, as in years past; a second group will be held in pens floating in an agricultural canal; and a third group will be held in floating pens nearby in the Sacramento River. The experiment began on February 19 and the fish will be released after approximately four weeks.

Born in the gravels of mountain streams, Central Valley salmon migrate to the ocean where they grow for 1-3 years before returning to rivers to spawn. Juvenile fish that are larger and healthier when they enter the ocean have better odds of returning as adults.

"Floodplain habitats are essentially a bug buffet for small fish," said Jacob Katz, PhD, Central California Director for California Trout. "Our previous results have shown that the food-rich floodplains appear to act as an important pit stop for juvenile fish, where they can fuel up on their downstream journey to the sea."

Unfortunately for hungry salmon, more than 95

West Sacramento has two off leash dog parks with separate areas for small and large dogs. While Summerfield Park is being renovated for ADA compliance, Sam Combs off leash dog park is in full swing. The visitors vary by time of day.

Ginger, Blue and Belle, Lily, Jinsi, Zeusie, Zowie, Bodie and Bazil, Brownie, Loudean, Reggie and Montgomery, Moose, Lucie and Lizzie, Tiki and Petey, Cocoa and Trixie are all regulars at the Sam Combs dog park. The dogs range from the most beautiful and well trained pedigrees to rescue dogs and just plain mutts. What distinguishes them all however, is that their owners make the effort every morning and sometimes every evening to give them proper exercise and socialization.

Dog owners Christine and Ron Gibbs told me, "Introducing Jinsi to new people and dogs helps him to socialize. It's healthy mentally and physically for the dogs."

As the dogs play, residents get to know each other and socialize. New resident, Jamie Mauhay says, "We moved to West Sacramento almost a year ago without knowing a soul, and through the dog park have met so many amazing people, even some we consider good friends! It's a great place to bring creatures together — both furry and not."

Each dog, like their owners, has a distinct personality.

Reggie, the standard poodle is a working dog and the diplomat of the dog park. Ginger, the golden retriever is the gentle beauty who has

grown from shy puppy to playful and confident playmate.

Loudean may be one of the smaller dogs (a rat terrier), but she is also one of the fastest.

Loudean and her best friend Brownie race the park together during their play dates.

Jinsi is busy learning tricks, until he spots his best friend, Ginger.

All Tiki, Belle and Lucie care about is chasing their ball. They endlessly retrieve. Belle comically hides behind trees to await the throws.

Bodie and Bazil are German short-hair pointers. The German short-hair pointer, incidentally, just won the Westminster Dog show as Best of Show. Bodie endlessly patrols the park and climbs trees in pursuit of squirrels. It is clear that she is always on the job. Her brother, Bazil is more sociable. Montgomery is a much smaller terrier, but also climbs trees in pursuit.

Every hour at the park brings new residents out. The eight o'clock hour is for nine to fivers. Commuters come even earlier. Retirees come out with the sunshine. Others come to the park for an evening romp. West Sacramentan, Mary Jane Zeemer said, "We couldn't have large dogs in the city without access to a dog park."

Prior to the dog park being built, many residents told me that Sam Combs park was an unfortunate meeting ground for unsavory characters. When the dog park was constructed, people and their animals were drawn to the park and the undesirables went elsewhere.

The park is supplied with tennis balls during the holidays by some

tennis loving benefactors. Many times, treat bags are left for the dogs. The city provides dog bags for clean ups.

Summerfield Dog Park is currently closed while the park has an Americans with Disabilities (ADA) compliance renovation. It has been closed since November. The renovation also includes a new play structure, side-walks, benches, picnic tables, and a restroom.

Unlike Sam Combs Dog Park, Summerfield Dog Park is lighted for evening use. Summerfield Park, despite the closed areas, still has plenty of grass for games and walks and a new landing for viewing the park.

Superintendent of Parks and Recreation, Sam Cooney, told the News Ledger that Summerfield will reopen on April 1. "It will have improved fencing, improved staging and gates, and accessibility. We have also removed large Poplar trees, but will replant trees on Arbor Day (April 29). We will also remove trees at Sam Combs to add more sunshine so that new turf can grow. We will also improve irrigation. Wood chips 'cause some dogs have pad problems so turf is a better option. It also makes it easier to remove dog waste for the owners. Future amenities depend on the Budget Committee."

There are 35 parks in West Sacramento, but for dog owners, the dog parks provide a necessary amenity for their doggy pals. Ginger's owner, Bert adds, "It's fun to come here!"

Summerfield Park is located at 2950 Linden Road and Sam Combs Park is located at 205 Stone Blvd.

National Distinction for West Sacramento: California Highway Patrol Academy

As only one of two academies in the nation, the California Highway Patrol Academy, located off of Reed Avenue, attracts law enforcement students from all over the nation to its 457-acre facility. Founded in 1930 and moved to the current location in 1976, for the most part, the academy focuses on training 400 cadets yearly to become highway patrol officers. The cadets are paid while they are being trained at a starting salary of \$4,442 monthly. When they graduate the Academy some 27 weeks later, they will have a starting salary beginning at \$6,225 as an officer of the CHP.

A career as an officer, however, has daily inherent risks. Dedicated to serving the people of California, the officers must risk their own lives to save others and protect Californians throughout the state. To prepare cadets for hazardous duty, the academy has a multi-pronged program to develop cadets mentally, physically and emotionally to face the rigors of the job. To begin with, the academy looks for those between the ages of twenty to thirty-five who can pass extensive pre-screening which includes examinations of physical and educational ability. (For more information, go to the CHP website (<https://www.chp.ca.gov/chp-ca-reers>)). Of the annual 27,000 applicants, 50 percent do not pass the written examination. There is a physical and psychological examination which further screens applicants. Only 2 percent of applicants are invited to the academy. The CHP also has an Explorer Program for young people to prepare them for a justice career.

All the cadets are housed at the academy during the length of their training. Along with the dormitories, the facility includes a 400-seat cafeteria, an obstacle course, classrooms, jogging track, shooting range, driving tracks, a gymnasium, an academy store and a historic museum detailing the 87-year history of the CHP. The academy is a secure location so visitors to the campus must be screened. Cadets receive 1,311 classroom hours of training in 53 different learning domains including firearms, DUI and car stops, defense skills, driving skills, water survival, mental illness response, Spanish language, enforcement tactics and physical fitness training.

The skid driving track is one of the most exciting displays of driving skill as cadets correct vehicles from a skid at high speeds. Motorcycle training at the academy attracts national attention for being “the best in the nation,” says Commander Captain Sam T. Dickson. A cadet’s day begins at dawn and ends late in the evening. By design, it is very stressful. “We need to

prepare cadets for on-the-job stresses and to make sure that they can stay focused while under stress,” he said. At the center of the academy is the “quad” with a memorial fountain which holds 225 plaques of those lost in the line of duty. It is a sacred place for the cadets as they learn about the sacrifices which officers have made. A new publication and program, “The Nobili-

ty of Policing” describes the “greatness of character and high ethical qualities to a higher calling or purpose.” The current senior class of 91 cadets will graduate in May. There are four classes each year. Every CHP officer has attended the academy, opened in 1979. The academy graduates officers to all eight CHP divisions located throughout the state. Each badge given to the officers is unique to them and indicates their seniority in the CHP. “I love working for the CHP. It’s been great for me and my family,” says officer Mike Martis, a five-year veteran of the academy. Today the CHP is the fifth largest police agency. In addition to highway duties, they guard our State Capitol and state facilities. They coordinate AMBER alerts and emergency responses. There are more than 11,000 personnel in the CHP. Along with the national prominence of the academy, it brings economic benefit to the city of West Sacramento. It employs 14 local residents, has local contracts for services and its 250 cadets and 190 employees spend at local banks, restaurants and stores. As only one of two such academies in the nation, cadets from all parts of California are brought to West Sacramento to learn valuable skills which benefit all Californians. West Sacramento is truly distinguished by the justice training received here.

Pig out at Pig Day:

Annual event celebrates Yolo County farmers, local food ... and pigs

Davis Farmers Market's 25th annual Pig Day, celebrating local farmers, local food and pigs, comes to Davis Saturday, March 5. The Market opens at 8 am, and from 9 am to 1 pm, shoppers and visitors will find baby pigs to pet, people in pig costumes to dance with, and pig-out eats to savor at Davis Farmers Market in Central Park, 4th and C streets in Davis. Market manager, Randii MacNear, says Pig Day is the Market's signature event. "Pig Day is part of the Davis culture and the only event of its kind in California. It celebrates the pig's rightful place as one of man's most intelligent and useful domesticated animals."

Sutter Davis Hospital brings their Live Cooking Station to Pig Day, to prepare and hand out free samples of pork fried rice with vegeta-

bles, made from Market ingredients—Bledsoe pork, Massa Organic Brown Rice, and vegetables from Market sellers. Hospital staff will also hand out recipes and a free kitchen tool.

Davis Farmers Market food vendors will offer a wide array of pig-themed eats, including: Fat Face's breakfast sammies (fried eggs on focaccia with bacon or pulled pork); the Hotdogger's pigs-in-a-blanket (chicken apple sausages dipped in pancake batter and deep fried; Upper Crust Bakery's piggie pops (sweet French bread in the shape of a pig's face on a stick); plus bacon-studded frozen confections from Davis Creamery and Fat Face.

The Yolo Food Bank offers its annual Pig Day Breakfast of pancakes, eggs, bacon and juice with proceeds benefitting the local community.

Visitors can pet baby piglets from Wood-



land farmer Jim Neilson's farm and kids can make free piggie crafts at booths sponsored by Davis Parent Nursery School, Davis Community Church Nursery School and University Covenant Nursery School.

Davis artist Heidi Bekebrede offers children a chance to paint their own clay piggie bank for a fee. Bekebrede fires the painted piggie banks and kids can pick up their finished work at the Market Shed a few

weeks after Pig Day.

Greenich's Acres offers pony rides and a petting zoo (both for a fee), and Ms. Piggie makes her annual appearance.

Regal Beezers will perform their Three Piggie Operetta at 10:30 a.m. at the Oak Tree, plus their eclectic mix of jazz standards and Beatles music, perfect for dancing with the Three Pigs.

percent of natural floodplain wetlands have been eliminated by the development of the Central Valley for farms and houses. In previous years, this experiment has shown that off-season agricultural fields can provide critical floodplain habitat for endangered fish.

"Fish have little opportunity to reap the benefits of floodplains because they are nearly all cut off from river channels," said Louise Conrad, PhD, of the California Department of Water Resources. "The Yolo Bypass is one of the last remaining active floodplain areas in the Central Valley. Enhancing the opportunity for salmon to access and use its floodplain areas could make a huge difference for salmon while also helping to recharge groundwater and improve flood safety."

For four consecutive winters, experiments conducted on rice fields at the Knaggs Ranch property on the Yolo Bypass documented the fastest growth of juvenile Chinook salmon ever recorded in the Central Valley. These results

suggest that through better planning and engineering, farm fields that produce agricultural crops in summer could also produce food and habitat for fish and wildlife during winter when crops are not grown.

"At this point, we feel confident that giving native fish access to the food-rich environment of the floodplain will play a critical role in recovering imperiled salmon," said Carson Jeffres, field and lab director of the UC Davis Center for Watershed Sciences. "Now we are interested in how food made on the floodplain can benefit the entire river and Delta."

The experiment suggests that floodplains on farmland can also be thought of as "surrogate wetlands" that can be managed to mimic the Sacramento River system's natural annual flooding cycle, which native fish species evolved to depend upon. Agricultural run-off water is used to flood the fields for the duration of the experiment. This recycled water fuels the floodplain food web before being flushed back into the Delta ecosystem through agricultural canals, adding to the food supply for all fish living in the system. No new water is used to conduct the experiment.

This natural process of slowing down and spreading out shallow water across the floodplain creates the conditions that lead to an abundant food web. Sunlight falling on water makes algae, algae feeds bugs, and bugs feed native fish and birds. In contrast, very little food to support aquatic life is produced when rivers are narrowly confined between levees.

"California's water supply for both people and fish will be more secure when our water policy works with natural processes, instead of against them," noted Dr. Katz. "This work leverages ecology as technology and points us toward efficient and cost effective real-world water solutions that support both fish and farms."

Members of the media are invited to visit the experiment site at Knaggs Ranch on the Yolo Bypass near Sacramento between now and approximately March 15th, when the fish will be released to continue their journey to the ocean. The site is also open for tours on Wednesday afternoons throughout the course of the experiment. On March 21, 2016, Judge Steven Mock will sentence the defendants to eight years and eight months in State Prison. At that hearing the victims will have an opportunity to address the court and the defendants about the impact the crimes have had on their lives.

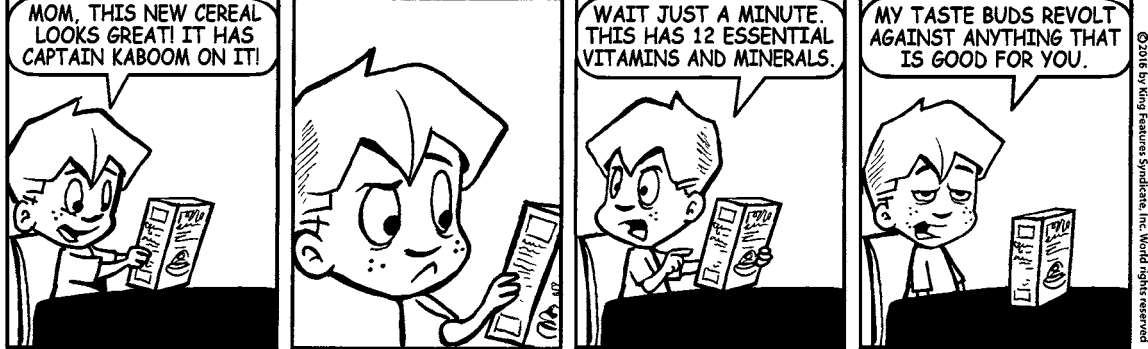

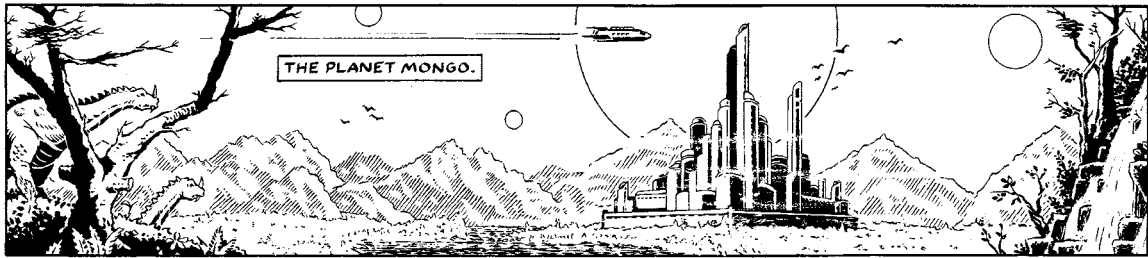

Yolo County CASA hopes to recruit additional volunteers and support through storytelling initiative

The Yolo County CASA has rolled out their new "Hearts of Yolo" initiative. Primarily a storytelling campaign, Hearts of Yolo strives to tell the stories of the many hearts involved in helping children in need. "From our CASAs, to our Board of Directors, to event sponsors, to donors and friends, we could not provide the kind of help we provide to foster children if they hadn't reached into their hearts and decided they could help," states Tracy Fauver, Executive Director of Yolo County CASA, "This initiative is a way to illustrate the work and generosity—the heart—that goes into what we do."

At the start of the New Year, many of Yolo County CASA's social media followers noticed these stories popping up. "I look forward to reading a couple of new stories each week," states Benjamin Candranel, an Active CASA who just welcomed a son of his own, "It's touching to learn what inspires people to help our children and where they decided they fit into the scope of work CASA provides." And this initiative has proven so far that perspective is everything.

"Maybe someone is considering being a foster parent but can't fit it into their lives so they become a CASA," states Fauver, "Or maybe someone doesn't have time to commit to being a CASA but wants to donate to the organization or sponsor an event to ensure that we have proper funding for trainings and recruitment. When people read these stories, light bulbs go off. They realize through the stories of others that they have the capacity to help and start to think about where they best fit into our collective efforts."

And indeed lightbulbs did go off when the Hearts of Yolo initiative was noticed by the King-White Family Foundation of Atlanta, Georgia, whose mission is to give to causes that create meaningful impacts on people's lives, particularly those that benefit youth. For this Year's Big Day of Giving on May 3, the Foundation will match all donations up to \$16,000, the goal that Yolo County CASA has set for themselves to fundraise on that day. "We are literally jumping for joy," states Fauver. "This will go a long way in helping us reach our 2020 goal of providing a CASA to every foster child in Yolo County."

Yolo County is home to nearly 400 foster children and there are currently 94 CASAs. "The number of children in the foster system continues to grow and we are increasing our numbers of trained CASAs and staff to support them to address this need," states Ginni Davis, President of the Board of Directors, "Each time we train another CASA, we take down a paper caterpillar hanging in our board room and exchange it for a paper butterfly to symbolize the opportunity, stability, and resiliency a consistent, knowledgeable adult can provide to a foster child. I can't wait until we have a board room full of butterflies. Just the other day we heard that a foster child saw the ocean for the first time because of their CASA—prior to that the foster child thought the ocean only existed in movies. This is why we do what we do."

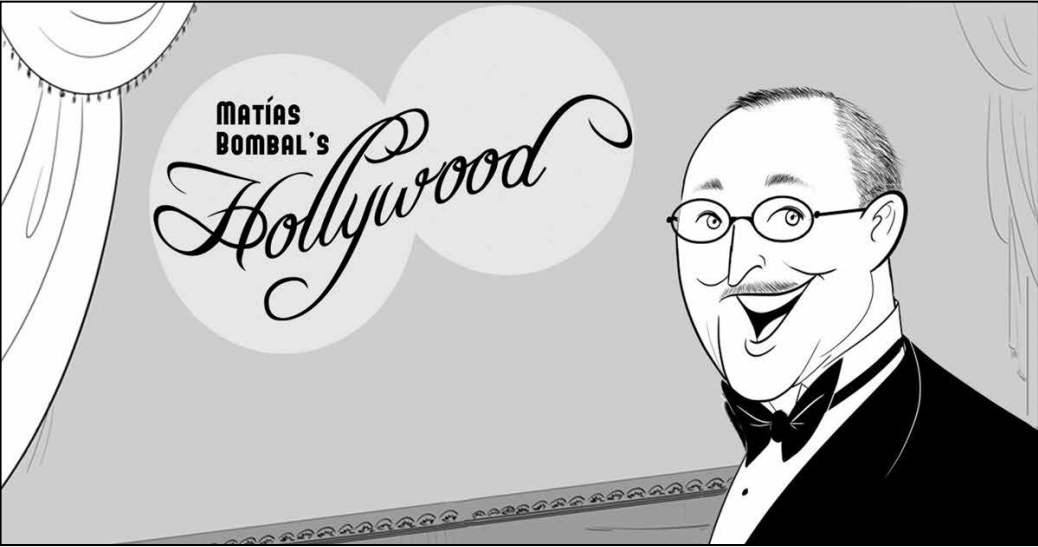

Matías Bombal's Hollywood



“Eddie the Eagle”
The MPPA has rated this PG-13

Twentieth Century Fox Film Corporation offers “Eddie the Eagle”, a great, real-life human interest story that follows the life of a determined underachiever to reach the winter Olympic games in 1988. Eddie Edwards (Taron Egerton) is seen from childhood with the most unstoppable positive attitude. Yet, he’s hampered by being a little slow, or as they used to say, touched. In childhood, he overcomes knee braces through literal determination and stick-to-itiveness. Determined to become an Olympic athlete, Eddie first wishes to become a competitive skier, but is ostracized by a snob-by Olympic team director, Target (Tim McInerny), after knocking

over a row of aligned skiers in front of the press like dominoes, spoiling a meeting to promote and raise funds for the British Olympic team. He stops sports for a while out of disappointment to help with his dad’s plastering business, but hits on the idea to become a ski jumper. His research tells him that there’s not been one from Great Britain in the Olympics since 1928. That’s it! He’ll become a ski jumper, and off he goes to Germany to practice and realize his dream. There, he encounters not only repeated falls and injury on the road to making his dreams come true, he finds the course and jump groomsmen, Bronson Peary (Hugh Jackman). Bronson never stops taking a dribble from his flask, whilst grading or plowing the

snow. He’s torn inside by a demon that haunts him and one that makes him consider helping Eddie out with some advice. Eddie later finds that Bronson was an Olympic ski jumper and then becomes eager not only to know him better but take his advice. The two work to what would seem by all accounts an impossible task. Off they go, one jump at a time, going for more distance with each leap from the chute. Notable performances are offered by Jo Hartley, playing Eddie’s “mum” and one of my favorite Brits of the screen, Jim Broadbent, as a BBC commentator, who is proud of his odd, ugly duckling-like countryman trying his best for country and crown. Christopher Walken is also in the picture as

a legendary Olympic coach that had trained Hugh Jackman’s character years before and had been disappointed by him. This really is a showcase for the film’s star, who I have long championed. Taron Egerton was fantastic in “Kingsman: The Secret Service” by the same producers of this film, as well as “Legend” and a movie seen by too few people last year, “Testament of Youth”. His nerdy performance here is as much the opposite of the young, strapping and handsome Egerton as it is possible to be. Thus, each time he awkwardly pushes his large ‘80s style eyeglasses up the bridge of his nose or grimaces uncomfortably without any sense of his appearance, he has mastered such an opposite and utterly believable person from himself that he surely shows greatness in performance. I’m not suggesting an Oscar this early in the year, but I’ll love it if he got a nod with a nomination. Movie critics are asked to write on a card following each advance press screening with thoughts about the picture which are then reported to the studio. On my card I wrote: “Hollywood! More movies like this! Movies that elevate the human spirit. Wonderful”. I meant it, too. The movies may serve to inspire and give hope. More commonly, they seek the lowest common denominator for sake of stimulation of the basest element. Here is a great story, a true story, and a joy-filled movie. Why are you still reading this? Go see it!

Triple 9
The MPPA has rated this R
 Open Road Films brings a gritty tale of bad cops doing the bidding of the Russian Ma-

fia in Atlanta, “Triple 9”. The crime drama is big ensemble movie with a cast that includes Kate Winslet, Casey Affleck, Anthony Mackie, Woody Harrelson, and Norman Reedus. In the story, written by Matt Cook, a team of professional criminals with two rouge cops included are being blackmailed by a Russian Israeli mobster; the icy Irina Vlaslov, played by Kate Winslet in her ongoing phase of roles of evil women of the screen. She wants this team to do an “impossible” job. Following their last job for her, for which they were not paid, a bank heist that opens the movie, she wants more. She’s stopping at nothing to get her husband out of an overseas high security prison, and she needs the team to obtain computer data from a maximum security federal storage complex. The movie’s director, John Hilcoat starts the intrigue when one of the rogue cops, Marcus Belmont, played by Anthony Mackie, works with the group investigating crimes the rouge group had perpetrated. Affleck and Mackie are teamed, and right from the start, Mackie’s bad cop sets up the rookie for a fall by taking him in to a gang-ridden neighborhood to arrange him up to be knocked off. Affleck’s a good cop and begins to notice things are not quite right, yet does his job. After a while, he visits his uncle, Special Detective Jeffery Allen, played in an oddball performance by Woody Harrelson. Allen is in charge of the investigation. The end of the night could not come soon enough for me after this movie started. I will gladly say that the performances are excellent from all involved, and that the movie’s gritty look, by design, is well achieved. The use

of color and noir effects that lend themselves to the underbelly of crime life were well executed. However, the whole time I did not enjoy the movie. It reminded me of everything in life that I suspect and even know about that I wish never to see in life, let alone at the movies. The movie, as described by actress Kate Winslet: “It really is brutal, horrible and really quite shocking.” Director Hillcoat wanted to base this gritty stylized and moody modern noir story in reality. A Georgia police gang unit on set advising throughout the production so that it would seem as real as the lowest gang life depicted. This, combined with international intrigue and the latest fad in the movies, the return of Russians as bad guys. Since the cold war ended the Russians were given a reprieve as bad guys and movie villains all seemed to come from the Middle East. Now, with the aggressive politics of Russia today, the movies of the present seem to return to malign all Russians as evil once more. That’s just not right. Casey Affleck continues to climb upwards from one excellent performance to the next; he’s great in this. Too bad the subject of the movie is so disagreeable and violent. We all suspect there are bad cops. In any group of people there are good and bad people. The maligned image of law enforcement in the movies is an unfortunate trend in today’s cinema, and I wish it would go away. Good acting, horrible movie.

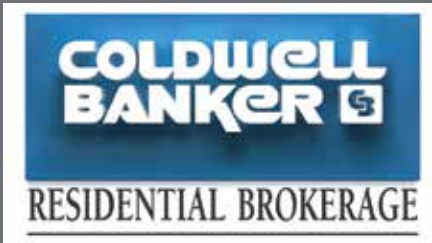
