This week we finished creating classroom rules together, consequences for breaking those rules, and got classroom jobs. It was a busy week of collaborating and working on social studies skills.

Kindergarten focused on the letters a and o and numbers up to 10. We are really getting good at learning new letters and numbers. We are focusing and responding well. We also read some books and focused on the main idea of a book.

The first graders continue to practice numbers and letters. We are working on blending letters together to read words and review sight words. We read a few stories and focused on understanding a character's actions.

We started library this week. We will have it every Monday. Please make sure the books are returned on Monday so the kids can check out new ones!

This week has been packed with new learning materials. Our routines are starting to be concrete. We all are learning how to work together as a team and I see many positive things. I love hearing the kind encouragement and helping hands from students.

In reading, we are practicing the long "A" and "I" sound while identifying the patterns that make these letters long or short. Each grade level has been practicing writing their vocab words in their notebook. Students have loved learning new words and their meanings. This week also brought us multiple meaning words, antonyms, and a review on subject and predicates. All these things will help their reading and writing.

In math, each grade level is working through different concepts. Second grade is working on different strategies for addition and subtraction like the "make ten method." We also focused on even and odd numbers. This creates a good base from multi-digit adding and multiplication. In third grade, we have been working on creating multiplication equations with even groups. We also introduced the function table. This has been paired with separate worksheets to reinforce their understanding.



This week was about classifying animals and plants based on different traits. We practiced our note-taking skills while watching a video. Then we went outside and classified different leaves that we found on the ground in small groups. Students were able to pair these leaves together by things that they have in common. This was a fun way to get outside and spend time working with people we don't normally work with.

It is getting chillier out each day and we leave our windows open in all seasons. We also spend as much time outside as we can. Make sure students have a sweatshirt that they can have as a spare in school or wear one each day. This time of the year is always a good time to remind our children about washing their hands. This will help with illness. Thank you everyone for the constant communication, I really appreciate it!

4th & 5th Grade Elementary Teacher

The 4/5 class has been working on building their "school stamina," and are getting much better at being able to keep their academic focus well into the afternoon hours. We have also been finding that it is helpful to sometimes bring our work outside in the afternoon so we have a different environment to work in. The campsite is the perfect spot to do this!

In language arts, both grades have been working on different types of sentences and the proper punctuation that goes with those sentences. 4th grade read a nonfiction article about Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., along with some shorter books about him. 5th grade read a play, and some shorter books about how to write and produce a play. Both grades enjoyed writing short stories.

In math, 4th grade is doing a great job adding up big, multi-digit numbers. A few kids are challenging themselves to add even bigger numbers than I am asking them to! In 5th grade, students are adding and subtracting fractions and mixed fractions.

In science, students did another experiment with Skittles, and found out why Sour Skittles taste more sour than regular Skittles. If you ask them, they will be able to explain to you that the Sour Skittles have a mild acid on the coating that creates the sour taste. They used pH paper to figure this out. Later this week, they will be designing their own experiments with the steps of the scientific process that they have been learning about.

Students had their first gym class and library time of the year this week which were both successful. They were excited for both of those classes, and I am glad to have such a positive group of kids to teach this year!

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
