The Insurance Fiasco

Can this plan fix California's insurance crisis?

A week after negotiations to rescue California's floundering home insurance market stalled out in the Legislature, the state's top insurance regulator put out his own rescue plan that effectively amounts to a trade for the state's major insurers.

Under proposed regulations Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara announced this afternoon, major insurers will be required to cover a certain share of homeowners in the state's most wildfire-prone areas. In exchange, the Department of Insurance will allow companies to charge more to cover the rising costs of doing business in a fire-ravaged

Lara called the package of new proposed regulations "the largest insurance reform" since 1988, the year California voters passed a proposition requiring insurance companies to get prior approval before raising premiums.

The plan is meant to reverse what

has amounted to a slow-motion exodus of private home insurers from the state. In the last year and a half, seven of the top 12 property insurers operating in California have either placed new restrictions on where they do business or stopped selling new policies here entirely.

The biggest player of all, State Farm, announced a freeze on new policies in May, kicking off a fresh round of panic among homeowners scrambling to find affordable insurance policies and lawmakers eager to tackle the crisis.

For years, insurance companies have complained that current rates and the existing regulatory process don't allow them to recoup the cost of doing business in the state's most at-risk regions. By easing some of those restrictions, while requiring the companies to expand their coverage, "it's the department calling the bluff of insurers," said Rex Frazier, president of Personal Insurance Federation of California, a trade group.

In principle, that's trade-off insur-

though it will ultimately depend on how the specific regulations are crafted in the coming months.

Amy Bach, executive director of the consumer group United Policyholders, struck a similar note. Lara "did not sell out to the indus-

try here, in my opinion, he struck a deal," she said. "Whether it's going to manifest positively overall...the proof will be in the premiums." But Consumer Watchdog — an

dvocacy group that Lara all but called out by name during his presentation as "bombastic" and a group "materially benefiting" from the current regulatory system — came away with a difficult conclusion.

"He's basically capitulated to the industry," Jamie Court, the group's president, said of Lara. "There's not really much coming back for the consumer in here."

Despite mounting public angst and calls for action from top lawmakers, the politics of addressing the problem in the Legislature proved too thorny this year.

DA Offers Restorative Justice Volunteer Training this October

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) -The Yolo County District Attorney's Restorative Justice Partnership (RJP) Program is seeking community volunteers. Trainings are set to take place on October 21, 2023, from 10am to 4pm at the Davis Police Department located at 2600 5th Street, in Davis, CA.

RJP(formerly Neighborhood Court), has been in operation since June of 2013, and is an innovative restorative justice diversion program operated by the Yolo County District Attorney's Office. RJP also includes the RJP Case Managed (RJP-CM) program, which is geared towards justice-involved people who are experiencing challenges due to mental health and addiction issues.

RJP conferences are staffed by local community volunteers who facilitate and hear criminal cases and use the principles of restorative justice to develop agreements

with the offenders aimed at providing individualized outcomes. This process provides a voice for members of the community, and those affected by crimes, to express how they have been harmed and what they need to make things right.

Program outcomes are

designed to address the underlying issues affecting participants while prioritizing their acceptance of responsibility and reparation of harms to the community and any direct victims affected. These conferences function best by involving a diverse group of volunteers who represent their local communities. Agreements created through this process are designed to educate and address underlying issues affecting participants, while also emphasizing acceptance of responsibility by encouraging actions that focus on reparation of harms to the community and any direct victim affected, as well as self-reflection.

Service hours are flexible. Through their input, volunteers make a real difference in the lives of justice-involved individuals. Program

graduate "JL" shared the positive impact RJP had on their life: "When I found out I was facing a felony I was afraid that my life would have been over...This program navigates you toward the correct path. This got me thinking a lot more about my career and my kids, looking towards better goals and better choices. I am proud that I'm now stable enough to take care of my family. I'm not in the streets messing around. I'm doing what's best for me..."

RJP volunteers receive training in the basic principles of restorative justice and the threestep Restorative Justice Partnership conference process. The RJP panelist training course is a prerequisite for service in any of the DA's restorative justice programs. Via's Partnership with City of West Sacramento Brings You Accessibility

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - With gas prices repeatedly at record highs and public transportation sometimes unable to get people smoothly from point A to point B, microtransit has become increasingly popular in cities across the nation. As a concept, microtransit falls between private transportation like taxis and public mass transit. It allows agencies to provide rides to individuals through on-demand platforms that are flexible and not tied to fixed routes.

In West Sacramento, Via is leading the way as microtransit grows and serves more travelers every year. This global leader in microtransit began a partnership with the City of West Sacramento in 2018, and continues to be in contract with it. Through an on-demand rider app (Via West Sacramento), people are able to book a ride that takes them to either their destination or to a bus stop to continue on through public transportation.

With 600 transit and city agency partnerships around the world, Via prides itself in its West Sacramento agreement as a strong example of what quality transit tech should

"West Sacramento On Demand is one of the most popular microtransit services in the U.S. in terms of ridership - it's a fantastic example that started over 4 years ago," said Krista Glotzbach, Vice President of Western U.S. Partnerships at Via. "Microtransit programs such as this one serve as a flexible, tech-forward solution to addressing so-called transit deserts – or areas where it's inefficient for fixed-route buses to reach."

When asked how Via's different and potentially more beneficial for a community than a typical Lyft or Uber service, the benefits are clear. On-demand ride services are private services, which mean higher costs for customers. With microtransit, it's a shared version of that. You get the app, the vehicle comes to your nearby corner, and takes you to where you're going. It

might be a shared vehicle, but if there's a lot of sharing it is also affordable and convenient. How affordable exactly? Via's current price is \$3.50 for regular passengers or \$15 per week. Seniors, disabled, and students can enjoy rides as low as \$1.75. Via is currently funded by the City's share of Transportation Development Act (TDA) funding.

"If you live in West Sacramento and you want to get from point to point, you can download the on-demand service and get where you need to go," said Glotzbach.

Via is also accessible to all. Unlike Uber and Lyft, Via has three ADA accessible and equitable vehicles, which makes it truly available to everyone.

When a recent poll was conducted about Via's services, 68% said they use it because it's affordable. More importantly, 43% of them say they use it because they don't have other transit options.

Paul Hosley, Public Information Officer at the City of West Sacramento, weighed in on what a great convenience it is to West Sacramento's most vulnerable residents.

"[For] seniors who maybe can't carry that bag of groceries, and can't get on the bus there wasn't a good transit option. Same for high school students whose parents don't have a car. This isn't new anymore," says Hosley. "People know Via. They have served over 730,000 rides in West Sac since May 2018.'

Refocusing on those seniors with their groceries, thanks to Via, "the ice cream isn't going to melt anymore," he said.

As Via continues to become more established and essential to West Sacramento, the company continues

its forward-looking approach.

"The intent of Via is to increase the number of mobility options. The Via app was also recently updated to include YoloBus routes. With more options, there is less reliance on a personal vehicle," says Stephanie Chhan, Senior Transportation Planner at the City of West Sacramento. "The Via fleet is currently comprised of hybrid Toyota Siennas, but ideally, we will eventually see a fully electric fleet. We want to get more clean air vehicles on the road, and we want the services to continue to grow public transit ridership to reduce greenhouse gas emissions."

Via has already expanded into some Bay Area cities and other nearby areas already (and has plans to continue to do so), but the success of West Sacramento as among the region's first is something to be celebrated.

"I think West Sacramento was very innovative originally," says Hosley. "And we continue to push the service as a unique and efficient way to get around."

Via currently has 11 vehicles on the road, but there are 15 total. This includes the aforementioned ADA vehicles. And they continue to be community-focused - through a partnership with the city, Via offers free rides at times for flu shots, COVID-19 vaccines. The company offers rides to the polls during election times and have notably helped people get to warming centers during storms and power outages.

Seven Students Awarded PG&E Better Together STEM Scholarships

Scholarship recipients must plan to enroll in full-time undergraduate study for the entire 2023-2024 academic year and be seeking their first undergraduate degree at an accredited four-year institution in California, or an Historically Black College and University (HBCU) anywhere in the United States. HBCU eligibility was added last year in response to a trend in applications from students admitted to HBCUs, none of which are in California.

Supporting Local Scholars

Since 2012, the Better Together STEM Scholarship Program has awarded more than \$7 million to accomplished students. Charitable donations come from PG&E shareholders, not PG&E customers

In addition to the Better Together STEM Scholarship Program, PG&E's 11 employee resource groups (ERGs) and two engineering networking groups (ENGs) award scholarships to help offset the cost of higher education. 2021, a year after the program started, Governor Newsom approved \$2.75 billion to invest in buildings such as hotels, motels, vacant apartment buildings, and other small homes and properties for the program. He converted them into some 14,000 more permanent and longterm homes. In addition, he has made competitive grants available for local governments to join into the program.

Within the first year of the program 6,000 affordable housing units had been created and thousands of Californians had somewhere to live. Many of the programs that are tied in with Project Homekey focus on those with Behavioral Health issues and other issues that create an even greater challenge for people to obtain housing.

Yolo County has been very active in the program and West Sacramento is proud to be a big part of that. In addition to the conversions of so many hotels on West Capitol, they built Mercy Apartments to be a transitional apartment complex for getting families off the streets and into a home. But having the buildings isn't all that it takes. There are many other steps involved in getting the unhoused off the streets.

Yolo County Children's Alliance is one of the organizations that have been helping people to utilize the Project Homekey program. At YCCA, they have people that are easy to talk to and that know all of the steps that need to occur in order to qualify for Project Homekey. If you think that the government is just handing out free housing, you are mistaken. It often takes a lot of work for the unhoused to obtain all of the paperwork needed to apply for the program. YCCA is there to help

So, what does it take to obtain housing through Project Homekey?

1. Obtain birth cer-

tificate; 2. Once birth certificate obtained, a California ID can be obtained; 3. Once client has birth certificate and ID, Social Security card can be obtained; at this point, client has all documents necessary to obtain housing; 4. Ensure client has some kind of medical insurance and is connected to a primary care physician; 5. Work with clients to secure Social Security benefits and/or employment so that they have some form of stable income; 6. Help clients apply for any available vouchers that they might be eligible for and coordinate and attend voucher briefing appointments with them; these vouchers can be very useful in subsidizing cost of housing and provide housing options for clients that they would otherwise not be able to afford; 7. Assist clients with referrals to mental health and/or AOD services and set up appointments for assessments if they are willing to seek help; 8. Encourage clients to attend life skills groups and provide them with information or tasks such as worksheets to help them improve skills necessary for independent living; 9. Set up measurable, achievable and client-centered goals with time deadlines for clients and monitor progress made towards these goals to help assess client's readiness to live

successfully on their own; 10. Help clients address any barriers or challenges they are facing when it comes to following the rules of Project Homekey so they do not accumulate violations (points) that could lead to an exit from the program; 11. Assist clients with filling out applications and procuring application fees for housing and make sure they are turned in as quickly as possible when opportunities arise; 12. Work with YCCA Housing Prevention Team or other partner agencies to procure move-in costs such as first month's rent and security deposits; 13. Support client and accompany them to sign the lease and obtain the keys to their new residence!

YCCA is partnered with the City of West Sacramento, Yolo County Housing, Communicare. Mercy Coalition and many other partners and together, since 2020, they manage more than 150 cases through Project Homekey. As of September, YCCA has supported 20 clients in obtaining housing just this year. The purpose of the program is to provide the support needed to get people experiencing homelessness, into a permanent home and a happy and productive life.

It's a struggle to get through it, but it's nothing compared to the struggle they are already living. State Delivers \$55 Million to Sacramento **Water Agencies for Water Resilience Projects**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)

- To help combat climate change and drought impacts on regional water supplies, the California Natural Resources Agency (CNRA) and Department of Water Resources (DWR) have partnered with local water agencies to implement critical infrastructure upgrades that will improve water resilience and support environmental health in the Sacramento area.

As part of a landmark partnership agreement, the state agencies have committed \$55 million in funding to the Sacramento Regional Water Authority to advance 21 projects designed to boost local water supplies and environmental flows for the Lower American River during dry years.

Funded projects include new and improved groundwater wells, upgrades to existing wells, pumps, interties and storage facilities. These upgrades will significantly expand the regional water system, giving water providers improved capacity to move supplies between agencies, recharge groundwater aquifers during wet conditions and use available groundwater supplies more sustainability when needed during dry years.

These improvements will allow the region to better withstand intense drought and impacts from climate change, reduce reliance on surface water and distribute supplies where they are needed most to support communities and the environment.

By expanding groundwater supplies and use in the region, local water agencies will be able to reduce diversions from the Lower American River during dry years and increase instream flows

necessary to support delicate ecosystems and fish species such as salmon and steelhead. As part of the funding agreement, agencies will allocate 30,000 acre-feet of water in the river in three critical or dry years over an eightyear period once funded infrastructure upgrades are completed and in place. Completed infrastructure upgrades are anticipated within the next two years.

State representatives, water agencies and elected officials gathered today to highlight these investments, which are another step forward in developing a network of groundwater wells, pumps and pipelines that enable local water providers to withdraw and replenish groundwater reserves.

"It is gratifying for the state to invest in our decades-long vision for enhancing the role of our groundwater aquifer - our natural infrastructure - as a key strategy for adapting the Sacramento region's water system to the changing climate," said Michelle Banonis, Manager of Strategic Affairs for the Regional Water Authority. "This investment will allow us to build on proven methods for securing our water supplies while also providing water for the environment during the driest times, long into the future."

"As California prepares for a future driven by climate change, it's more important than ever that we be proactive and invest in infrastructure that helps secure a reliable water supply. This partnership agreement is a pivotal step forward in securing our water future and DWR looks forward to working with our regional partners," said DWR Director Karla Nemeth.

This funding partnership demonstrates California's commitment to working with local agencies to increase river flows, restore ecosystems and strengthen water supply reliability in the state.

"This agreement will support projects that modernize infrastructure and improve water resiliency, both of which will enhance flow and habitat for California's native fish populations," said Charlton H. Bonham, Director of the California Department of Fish and Wildlife. "We look forward to continued efforts with partners that will bring flexibility in water management and improve habitat in the Central Valley for fish and wildlife."

The Sacramento Regional Water Authority, which represents nearly two dozen water providers serving 2.2 million people in the Sacramento region, will work to implement the funded projects with nine water providers in the region including the City of Roseville, Sacramento County Water Agency, Sacramento Suburban Water District, Carmichael Water District, City of Sacramento, Golden State Water Company, Citrus Heights Water District, Fair Oaks Water District and Orange Vale Water Company.

This funding partnership is also one example of DWR's work to provide funding for local communities under the state's "Go Golden" initiative. The initiative highlights the state's partnership with local organizations and water agencies to implement projects that address water infrastructure, flooding impacts, water conservation, well rehabilitation and fish and wildlife protection as California prepares for a future driven by our changing climate.



Researchers Seek Standards to Test Smoke Taint in Winegrapes

As climate change and wildfires challenge California's wine sector, smoke taint has emerged as one of the primary threats to the state's most lucrative crop. Despite a growing body of research on smoke taint, scientists and growers say gaps in the still-evolving science mean wildfire smoke continues to cause unnecessary crop losses and financial damage even when it doesn't taint grapes. In 2020, up to 325,000 tons of winegrapes, worth hundreds of millions of dollars, went unharvested in California due to actual or potential smoke damage.

Farm Bureaus Secure Grant Funding

for Soil Projects, Water Efficiency Farm Bureaus in Butte and Solano counties were awarded \$10 million in grants through the California Department of Food and Agriculture to fund projects that support soil health and water efficiency. The two Farm Bureaus received \$5 million each from the state's Healthy Soils Program and the State Water Efficiency and Enhancement Program, or SWEEP. Grants for Butte County Farm Bureau support projects in Butte, Glenn and Tehama counties. Grant monies for Solano County Farm Bureau support projects in Solano, Alameda, Contra Costa, Sacramento and Yolo counties.

Citrus Growers on Guard in Ventura County after Pest Found in Residential Tree

Citrus growers in Ventura County remain vigilant after agricultural officials confirmed the region's first finding of an insect pest carrying the huanglongbing bacteria, which kills citrus trees. The discovery is a concern because Ventura County remains the state's top producer of lemons and grows other citrus fruits. The infected Asian citrus psyllid was found Sept. 19 in a residential citrus tree in the southwestern area of Santa Paula. It tested positive for the pathogen associated with huanglongbing, or HLB, also known as citrus greening disease.

San Joaquin Grape Growers Struggle to Get Permits to Burn Diseased Vineyards

Grape growers, facing a Jan. 1, 2025, deadline to end agricultural burning, say they're having difficulty getting burn permits from the regional San Joaquin Valley Air Pollution Control District. Under a 2003 law, open-air burning of orchards and vineyard material within the eight-county district was supposed to be phased out by 2010, provided alternate, less-polluting disposal methods were available. But several biomass plants that were expected to accept the agricultural material have closed. The California Air Resources Board approved extending the deadline to end burning. ★

At this point, you have some big decisions to make. Were you providing free housing to someone who was struggling, or were you providing a free house to someone who was struggling? I understand this young man experienced a terrible tragedy. But at the same time, I'm not hearing lots of evidence that he's putting his life back together. If after this long the guy's not back on his feet and out on his own, you may be enabling bad behavior on his part.

Now, if you want to gift him the house, that's your decision. If you want to approach him with a rental agreement or sale proposal to which all parties are amicable, that's okay, too. If neither of these ideas are in the cards, I'd make sure to sit down with this young man and have a gentle—but firm—talk. I'd let him know I had been happy to help him over the last several months, but that he needs to start moving forward with his life. I'd set a very reasonable and patient timeline for a move-out date, and let him know once that time is

up, I'll be selling the house. That's fair to everyone concerned.





Fitzgerald, Harrison, Brooks Named Triple-A All-Stars

Sacramento River Cats News Release

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - To put the finishing touches on the 2023 campaign, Minor League BaseballTM (MiLBTM) has announced the Triple-A league awards and All-Star teams. Among the list of Pacific Coast League All-Stars are a trio of Sacramento River Cats in INF Tyler Fitzgerald, LHP Kyle Harrison, and OF/1B Trenton Brooks.

Culminating a year in which he was also named Team MVP, Fitzgerald was named the PCL's All-Star shortstop by closing the 2023 season slashing .287/.358/.499 with 20 home runs and 69 RBI. In addition to his 20 dingers, Fitzgerald also swiped 29 bases making him the first River Cat since 2015 to reach the 20-20 club. Just as impressively, one of Fitzgerald's home runs was of the inside-the-park variety, the first for Sacramento since early in the 2018

The Louisville product was also the team leader in multi-hit games (33) and multi-RBI games (16), and in addition to producing eight hitting streaks of five games or more, ended the campaign with 20 doubles and four triples. This was the second Triple-A award of the season for Fitzgerald, as he was named the PCL Player of the Week for May 8-14, just his second week at Triple-A. This is the third All-Star honor in Fitzgerald's career, as he was named a NWL Post-Season All-Star in 2021 with the Eugene Emeralds (A+) while also being named an MiLB. com Organization All-Star that same

Starting the year as the top lefthanded pitching prospect in baseball according to MLB Pipeline, Harrison earned his All-Star honor after he made a total of 20 appearances for the River Cats while recording a 1-3 record, 4.66 ERA and 1.52 WHIP. A strikeout machine, the southpaw finished his first Triple-A campaign by totaling 105 strikeouts prior to his promotion to the big leagues, leading to a rate of 14.39 strikeouts per nine innings. Proving his prowess, Harrison logged 11 consecutive starts in which he fanned five or more batters, the third longest streak in Triple-A this season.

Also named to the 2023 Futures game, opposing batters managed just a .215 average against Harrison, which included left-handed batters hitting just .171 (14-for-82). His first Triple-A win came on June 15 against Sugar Land in which he allowed only two runs on three hits in 5.0 innings, striking out eight along the way. This is the fourth All-Star award in the career for Harrison, as he was named a MiLB.com Organization All-Star in each of the past two years (2021, 2022) while also being selected as a CAL Post-Season All-Star with the San Jose Giants (A) in 2021.

A mid-season addition, Brooks captured his PCL All-Star honor at designated hitter after posting a slash line of .286/.400/.516 while also swatting 22 homers and 90 RBI. Though he played just 24 contests with Sacramento, Brooks made an immediate splash by homering in his second and third games with the River Cats, ultimately going on to tally six of his homers and 19 of his RBI in a Sacramento uniform.

In his short time, Brooks was one of only two River Cats to hit home runs in consecutive games on three different occasions. Among those instances included leaving the yard in three straight games from Sept. 7-9 against the team he spent much of the season with, the Las Vegas Aviators. Overall for the season, the left-handed hitting Brooks also compiled 31 doubles, one triple, and drew 78 walks to 77 strikeouts. This is the second All-Star honor in Brooks' career, as he was named a MiLB.com Organization All-Star with the Cleveland Indians in 2021.



The Insurance Fiasco

In the final weeks of the legislative session that ended a week ago, lawmakers scrambled to bridge the demands of insurers — who called for higher premiums to cover more of their costs and for a more flexible rate-setting process — and those of consumer groups, who resisted calls to add to the financial burdens of homeowners. After negotiations floundered, Gov. Gavin Newsom hinted that his administration and Lara's Department of Insurance might be willing to act on their own.

In a statement, Sen. Bill Dodd, a Napa Democrat involved in the unsuccessful negotiations, cheered Lara's announcement. "Given that the Legislature is not in session right now, utilizing the commissioner's regulatory authority makes good sense," he said. "I know there is work that still needs to be done and I'll be supporting these efforts any way I can."

Insurance companies have pointed to three main reasons that doing business in California is increasingly a losing proposition: Escalating wildfire risk, ever-rising construction costs and the global price of reinsurance — insurance policies that insurance companies, themselves, take out.

While costs have increased, the amount the companies are allowed to charge homeowners is tightly capped and closely regulated in California, making home insurance policies relatively cheap by national standards. In order to raise rates, major insurers need a sign-off from the Department

Currently, insurance companies are not allowed to factor in the cost of reinsurance into those applications. They are also prohibited from using forward-looking models to predict future costs — something insurers say they desperately need as a warming climate and residential development encroaching into fire-prone areas results in fire seasons that are longer and more catastrophic than they have been in the past.

Lara proposed giving companies both of those tools, though companies will apparently only be allowed to itemize the cost of reinsurance as it pertains to California. It's unclear how this calculation will be made.

Bach with United Policyholders said allowing companies to use predictive models isn't inherently a bad idea — "Are these models nefarious tools of Satan? No," she said — but hopes there will be transparency about which models are used and how they work. In exchange for these new tools, compa-

nies will be required to cover homeowners in wildfire-prone parts of the state at 85% of their statewide coverage. For example, if a company provides 10% of the homeowner policies across California, they would be required to provide 8.5% of the coverage in areas deemed "at-risk."

Court, with Consumer Watchdog, said 85% is 15% too little. "It's a really sh—y deal," he said.

California homeowners currently unable to get insurance on the private market can currently turn to the FAIR Plan, a last resort issuer of fire coverage backstopped through a levy on regulated insurers. Between 2018 and 2022, the number of homeowners covered by the FAIR Plan more than doubled to roughly 3% of all homeowners.

But the FAIR Plan policies are expensive and limited. And if the FAIR Plan runs out of money, it's legally required to refill its coffers by levying a surcharge on major insurers. The prospect of the FAIR Plan running out of cash and slapping the industry with the bill has also encouraged insurance companies to scale back their coverage.

Consumer Watchdog regularly challenges the applications for higher premiums that insurance companies submit to the state, an intervention allowed for under the 1988 ballot measure. Today, Lara also said he wants to make it easier for the public to see who intervenes and how much they are compensated for doing so.

CDPH Recommends All Californians Stay Up to Date on COVID-19 Vaccine

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)

Following federal approval of the updated COVID-19 vaccine and recommendations for the upcoming winter respiratory virus season, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) is recommending all Californians stay up to date on the vaccine and get the updated shot when available.

For renewed protection against severe illness, hospitalization and death, all Californians 5 years and older should receive one dose of the updated COVID-19 vaccine, as long as it's been 2 months or more since their most recent dose. Getting vaccinated may also minimize your symptoms if you do become infected so you can return to your daily activities more quickly. Recommendations for younger children depend on the number of doses received previously.

CDPH strongly urges vaccination for individuals who are at high risk of serious illness from COVID-19 due to advanced age or underlying illness as this is the group of individuals most vulnerable to severe disease and the worst outcomes.

"Staying up to date on the COVID-19 vaccine is the best way to keep your immunity strong and

CDPH News Release protect yourself and others VACCINE: Initial supplies from severe illness, hospitalization, and death," said CDPH Director and State Public Health Officer Dr. Tomás Aragón. "As we enter the winter season, it is crucial that all individuals remain up to date with vaccinations when they're eligible, including flu, COVID-19 and RSV.'

WHO SHOULD GET VACCINATED

Everyone Age 5 and **Up:** Everyone 5 years of age and older, regardless of previous vaccination, is eligible to receive a single dose of the updated COVID-19 vaccine as long as it's been at least 2 months since the last dose.

Younger Children and Infants: Infants and younger children, 6 months through 4 years of age, who have previously been vaccinated against COVID-19 are eligible to receive one or two doses of the updated vaccine. The timing and number of doses depends on the previous COVID-19 vaccine received.

Unvaccinated Younger Children and Infants: Unvaccinated infants and younger children, 6 months through 4 years of age, are eligible to receive three doses of the updated Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine or two doses of the updated Moderna COVID-19 vaccine.

WHEN & HOW TO SCHEDULE YOUR **UPDATED COVID-19** of updated COVID-19 vaccine are expected in California in the coming weeks. For added convenience, COVID-19, flu, and RSV vaccines can all be administered in the same visit. Social Security Matters

How Do Disability Programs Affect Social Security's Budget?

Dear Rusty: I read with interest an analysis of the history, reasons, and financial costs of the SSI (Supplemental Security Income) and SSDI (Social Security Disability Insurance) programs. My question is, specifically, what portion of the Social Security budget goes toward SSI and SSDI vs. for regular SS retirement income for those who paid into the fund during their working lives? How are the costs of SSI and SSDI covered by the federal government? When did these two sections of the budget enter the law and what was the impetus behind them?

Signed: An Inquiring Mind Dear Inquiring Mind: No part of Social Security's "budget" is used to pay SSI (Supplemental Security Income). SSI is a meanstested general assistance program for disadvantaged children and needy disabled adults and aged seniors who have very little income and very few assets. Federal SSI benefits are paid from the government's General Treasury, not from Social Security Trust Funds. SSI is jointly administered by the person's state of residence and the Social

Security Administration, and the state usually provides additional benefits to supplement the financial assistance provided by the federal government under the SSI program. The Social Security Administration only administers the SSI program, it does not fund it.


By contrast, SSDI (Social Security Disability Insurance) benefits are for employed Americans who become disabled and unable to work full time. SSDI benefits are meant to provide limited income replacement for the disabled worker, and those benefits are paid from a separate Social Security "DI" (Disability Insurance) Trust Fund. The DI fund receives a portion (0.9%) of the FICA SS payroll taxes every American worker pays on their earnings and is used to pay disability benefits to eligible American workers who are unable to perform "substantial gainful activity" for a year or more. The eligibility criteria to collect SSDI are very strict, but those approved receive their benefits from this separate DI trust fund, not from Social Security's Old Age and Survivors Trust Fund. Payroll taxes collected for disability purposes are deposited in the DI Trust Fund as interest-bearing government bonds, and those DI assets are redeemed as needed to pay SSDI benefits. FYI, SSDI (disability) benefits stop when the person reaches full retirement age, at which point the beneficiary is automatically switched to regular SS retirement, and after which their benefits are paid from the regular "OASI" Trust Fund.

"Regular" Social Security retirement benefits, spousal

benefits, dependent benefits, and survivor benefits are paid from Social Security's Old Age and Survivors Insurance (0ASI) Trust Fund, which receives most (5.3%) of the 6.2% FICA Social Security tax withheld from the paychecks of American workers. As of the end of 2022, the OASI Trust Fund held about \$2.7 trillion in interest bearing government bonds. Neither SSI or SSDI affect this "regular" OASI Trust Fund - only true SS retirement benefits and benefits for dependents of the retiree are paid from the OASI Trust Fund (As an aside, Social Security reform is needed to prevent the OASI Trust Fund from being fully depleted in 2033).

To answer your last questions, the Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) Trust Fund was established in 1956, after which SSDI benefit payments to eligible disabled American workers began. Federal "Supplemental Security Income" (SSI) assistance was codified into law in 1974. And, as you likely know, Social Security retirement, spousal and dependent benefits were enacted in the 1930s, before the first monthly Social Security check was mailed in January 1940. The impetus behind these programs? Avoiding poverty for the neediest among us. Without these programs, at least 22 million more Americans would be




Middle Grade Reads to Howl About
