Alzheimer's Walk Raises **Huge Donations**

- For the second year at Riverwalk, the Alzheimer's Association held their fundraising and awareness walk on Saturday, September 30, 2023. Over two thousand people registered to walk this year. The park was full of people and groups of smiling faces. There was also no lack of hugs and tears. From the emotional speeches to the heart grabbing symbols of love, nothing but love

could be felt at the park. Booths were set up with giveaways and resources. Information on memory care facilities, as well as information about the different types of dementia

and Alzheimer's could be found, with volunteers ready to answer any questions. The morning started off with a few speeches, some uplifting, supportive words to hang in there and have faith and reminders that anyone dealing with Alzheimer's is not alone.

There was a motivating dance routine performed by Kaiser Permanente and the traditional Chicken Dance right before the walk started. Perhaps the most beautiful and touching display of support was the flower field on the hill of the Riverwalk lawn. During the speeches a person brought out a pin wheel flower with each color representing different aspects of dealing with the disease.

The purple flowers represented those that have lost someone to Alzheimer's. The orange flower was for general supporters that help in the fight against Alzheimer's. The yellow flowers were to represent the caretakers (in every aspect) of those with the disease. The blue flowers represented those that are battling the disease themselves. Last, but not least, there was a single white flower to represent the future of there being a cure and therefore no more people suffering from the disease.

Participants were there for many reasons. Some walked to represent a loved one, others walked because they themselves battle the disease. Some walked as a service to community like Raelyna Bowers, Young Miss Celebrity from West Coast Pageants. Her and her fellow pageant winners, Fallyn Fossum - Miss California, and Sophia Miller – also Miss California from Crowns With a Cause, who came from different cities in Northern California to walk.

Edward Jones was the national presenting sponsor of the walk. Over the years, together with the Alzheimer's Association they have helped raise more than \$39 million. The top fundraiser of this event was Tom Rush. bringing in over \$13,000. The top fundraising team was Team Snail, bringing

West **Sacramento City Council Highlights**

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Open Public Comment for Wednesday, September 27, 2023. This is the time that members of the public are invited to address the City Council with any problems, concerns, requests, pitch ideas, or any other statements or comments that community members would like to bring to the council's attention. By state law, the council is not allowed to respond to these items or to the person about the items during the meeting.

Robyn Davis - Robyn lives in her 160-square-

foot semi off-grid tiny home on wheels on her undeveloped residential land in West Sacramento. She thanked David Tilly, from the planning department, for his presentation to the planning commission requesting a public workshop about tiny homes. She stated the average home built in West Sacramento from 2018 to current is 2,656 square feet so the city continues to go in a direction with items that are not meeting the demand for tiny homes. The main question is "why the wheels"? She said to think of tiny homes as a hybrid between manufactured homes and an RV by using the best components of each, while still having set standards and qualifications and being a separate product. Because of their unique build the permit process only needs to include site improvements, since the structures are already certified just like manufactured housing. Data shows that tiny houses require less and increase in value, rather than decrease. It is an option for affordable housing and should not have the same requirements as a typical new home. She said she is very excited about the workshop this month (October) and is asking that residents be notified of the workshop so that community members can be informed before being asked to vote on a new

Record-breaking Year at The California Capital Airshow

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Capital Airshow (CCA), presented by Sacramento County in partnership with the City of Rancho Cordova, successfully wrapped its 2023 Airshow on Sunday, September 24, with more than 105,000 attendees at the two-day full-capacity event. The 17th Annual Airshow featured performances from the world's most talented pilots and thrilling aircraft, including the legendary United States Air Force Thunderbirds jet demonstration team.

To kick-off the weekend, the Airshow hosted a free community event on Friday at Village Green Park in Rancho Cordova. Attendees met airshow performers, including the USAF Thunderbirds, and enjoyed live music, food trucks, and activities provided by local STEM and sports organizations.

On Saturday and Sunday, the Sacramento skies were filled with the sound of U.S. Air Force A-10 Thunderbolt II Demonstration Team, the return of the U.S. Air Force C-17 Globemaster Demonstration, U.S. Navy F-18 Super Hornet, an awe-inspiring lineup of world-class civilian aerobatic performers, and an extraordinary selection of rare World War II aircraft.

"The feeling of bringing the Airshow back to full capacity for the first time since 2019 is indescribable," said Darcy Brewer, CCA Executive Director. "It was a perfect weekend, made even more memorable by seeing the joy and

excitement the event brought to the Sacramento region's families and aviation enthusiasts."

True to CCA's mission of nurturing young people's interest in STEM careers, the Airshow hosted a special 'Girls in Aviation Day' on Saturday, where girls ages 8-18 were invited to learn more about what their future may look like in aviation, aerospace, or related career fields. The event featured mentors from Travis Air Force Base, UPS, Beale Air Force Base, Metro Fire, Mach 5 Aviation, Aerospace Museum of California, and William Jessup University.

"The greatest thrill for us this weekend is knowing that we have inspired young people to dream big and explore the world of aviation and STEM," said Terrence McNamara, CCA Board Chairman.

At the center of the Airshow was a 'Cold War Legacy' pop-up museum, which honored Mather Air Force Base's integral role in the Cold War and efforts such as the Korean War, Cuban Missile Crisis, and Vietnam War. Attendees took in informational exhibits and were able to get up-close to Cold War-era aircraft throughout the event including Colonel Douglas MacArthur's "Connie."

"We are especially grateful to the over one thousand volunteers who work tirelessly to produce this thrilling and meaningful community event every year," said Darcy Brewer. "We simply couldn't do it without them."

Continued from page 1 community members with respect. He said that he respects them, and that the public should know that it is okay for them to come to meetings and speak their

opinion and provide input. Alfred Melbourn -Alfred spoke about the renaming of Tower Bridge Gateway and how the land acknowledgement that is read at the beginning of the meeting is not genuine, because when renaming Tower Bridge Gateway, they should have gone with something related to the first nations' of this land and that there should be some type of acknowledgement of them. He then spoke about not getting any kind of response from Council Members. He said he is the Director of Three Sisters Gardens (a 501(c)(3) that has donated last year 22,000 pounds of food, this year they are at 13,000 pounds so far, that they have given to the community.) He said he has emailed each of them, but since redistricting they haven't gotten any feedback. They are asking for support to move their program forward. They currently have 4 urban farms but would like to have fifty. He stressed how important it will soon be to have locally grown food and told the Council how glad they will be when our town won't have to struggle for food.

After Public Comments the council went onto agenda items. Highlights of agenda items are as follows: In the local cannabis industry, Gold Mountain Distribution had their required audit and were found to have many violations. Some of the violations are fixable and some are not. Items that are fixable include security and logs of who has access which must be taken care of. In addition, the business has only paid a little over \$800 of the money it is required to pay the city and has a balance in excess of \$27,000. City staff recommends terminating the Development Agreement with Gold Mountain.

The unfixable violations include the fact that Gold Mountain was operating business for a year prior to getting approval. However, Gold Mountain has a new owner that has taken on the existing problems and some City Council members wonder if an extension should be granted to allow some flexibility. The new owner got up to speak to the council but was often too emotional to speak. Public comment on this item included people on both sides of whether they should be given an extension, or whether the City should stick to the original terms of the contract with Gold Mountain. Rich Miller got up and explained a way for the city to work with businesses to make it more beneficial financially and to create more security for the businesses. The meeting went on so long that this item was held over

to the next meeting. Another item discussed was that the City has contracted Turton Commercial to be the company that will take over and develop Club Pheasant into whatever is coming there. Representatives from Turton were very excited about the project and told the council that they are working on some very exciting ideas, but they were not yet ready to divulge what those ideas are. City staff said that when choosing a company for this project, they looked for value but their primary concern in this project was experience.

Turton was that company. Another item discussed was getting lights installed for the tennis courts that are shared between the Recreation Center and River City High School. A cost share in the amount of \$30,000 from Washington Unified School District has already been approved and the contracted

company just needs the go ahead from the city. They explained that there is a short window of time that is available to do the work and if the city did not approve it now, they would have to wait for an entire year before the work could be done. Item was approved.

The plan for public improvements Rivers, Phase II was approved. This project will include an upscale hotel and one apartment complex (with the plan of building another one in the next phase) including a pool and small public accessible businesses in the space between The River and 3rd Street and between the Money Store building and Tower Bridge Gateway. A PowerPoint, including a rendition of the site was included.

Another project that will be coming up is an affordable housing apartment complex that will be for single parent college students. This program will come with wrap around services such as childcare. It will include a referral process and will be in partnership with Yolo County Housing Authority and project specific vouchers. Councilwoman Dawnté Early explained that she is on the Housing Commission and that she is very excited about this program. She explained that project specific vouchers are good because the guidelines for payment for straight vouchers are two years behind.

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Officer Arrested for DUI

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Shortly before noon on September 30, 2023, a West Sacramento Police Officer was stopped by the San Joaquin County Sheriff's Office on suspicion of DUI. After witnessing driving in the area of Highway 99 and CA 4 that alerted a San Joaquin County Sheriff's Deputy to a possible DUI, a traffic stop was conducted. The suspicion of DUI was heightened after making contact. California Highway Patrol was summoned to the scene and subsequently made an arrest for DUI.

The West Sacramento Police Officer was booked into the San Joaquin County Jail in French Camp, CA for charges

He will be placed on administrative leave by the West Sacramento Police Department, and an internal affairs investigation will begin.

In the interest of transparency with our community, this information is being released by the Department, pending the outcome of both the criminal and internal affairs investigations. "This conduct is not in alignment with our Department's Core Values," said Chief of Police, Robert Strange. "While this officer has fallen short, we will, as a Department, continue to work towards our mission to serve with honor and professionalism, in partnership with our community, to enhance the quality of life in West Sacramento," he added.

West Sacramento Man Charged in Recent Theft and Attack on Retail Employee

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) -On September 23, 2023, 44-year-old Don Rose, a transient in the city of West Sacramento, was arrested after a store employee flagged down a police officer to report an in-progress attack on a loss prevention officer who had attempted to stop a shoplifter. The Yolo County District Attorney has filed one felony charge of second-degree robbery; one charge of possession of controlled substance; and case enhancements alleging his prior felony convictions, prison terms and for being a habitual criminal. District Attorney Jeff Reisig stated that "the Yolo County District Attorney's Office is committed to the aggressive prosecution of all retail crimes, especially when any force or violence is involved."

Rose would arraigned on the charges September 27, 2023, at 1:30 pm, in Dept. 1 of the Yolo County Superior Court. If convicted as charged, Rose faces up to 15 years in state prison.

WE SUPPORT FIRST RESPONDERS



Welcome to Cline's Corner, a feature posting positive, encouraging, and valuable advice on how to not only survive a child custody battle but maintain the best relationship with the ones that need your presence, proactive efforts, and sanity the most, your kids! While not everyone's situation, complexity, or emotional toll is the same, I will offer my perspective, aided by my background in Behavior Science, 30 years in education, assisted by input from a variety of experts in the field as we explore various issues and nuances that any father dealing with the Child Court and support system needs to know. My goal is to be the best father I can be and to enlighten, empower, and empathize with others who have the same aim, by sharing tried and true

tips, tools, and tactics to help your family avoid the traps and trauma that will try and tire you throughout your custody journey. Don't give up! You are not alone. We can be the dads we need to be for our children by following these 101 gold nuggets of wisdom from someone who has been through it too!

Tip # 4 Document, **Document, Document!**

Several times over the years of a contentious custody court case, the Judge admonished my exabout purposefullyimpeding the kids from making phone calls or visits by scheduling conflicting activities, interfering, and interrupting the visits (or she would call at the designated times but hang up before I could answer so it showed in call logs she attempted a call but I didn't get to talk to the kids, then she wouldn't respond to my immediate email, text, or return calls trying to complete the connection). The Judge promised to act with stifferconsequences if the alienating behavior continued, yet that conversation wasn'treflected in the minutes, (the court record) so when the problem continued and we went back to court months later, no one couldhold thechildren's mother accountable. I then filed contempt charges against the mother for her lack of co-parenting, but the Judge refused to prosecutebecause "The orders were too vague". It only she had to make the call. It didn't explicitly say that I got to actually talk to the children. And if that seems ridiculous, even though my ex admitted she would make the attempt and if I couldn't pick up in time, she then ignoredmyattempts to connect, and (despite evidencefrom phone records which showed I was trying to answer, begging her to pick up, and waiting for months

to complete a "weekly" ordered phone call), the opposing attorney was able to use the wording in the minute order to defend her actions as adequately compliant with the court order, so the contempt charges were thrown out.

Lesson learned the hard way....documents have power!The wording means everything!

At the end of everyproceeding, (court appearance) the judge usually asks one of the attorneysor the clerk to prepare the minutes, or notes of what happened during the hearing. These are called the "Judges Orders". These are super important because even though they are not a complete record of everything that was said, theyreflect what the takeaways, or major actions, and what everyoneexpects will happen next, and whether you agree or not, everyone will refer back to them. At the next hearing, the Judge may remember some things about the case, but months, or years may pass before you are in court again and Judges rely on the minute orders to remind them what's happening in the case. If it's not in the orders, IT DOESN'T COUNT! Even if you recall an agreement or provision, only the orders, as written, will be enforced, so make sure they are absolutely clear and not vagueBE-FORE YOU LEAVE THE COURTROOM. Many court interactions are not recorded by the court stenographer so you must take you own notes and check theorder for accuracy. There are many specific examples where the judge may say something in your favor but if it is unclear or doesn't make it in the minutes, it's as if it never happened!

You must use the power of documentation to your

benefit as well! Long before you everenter a courtroom, where you may have to prove your level of contribution and involvement, you need to be in the habit of recording (writing down) every interaction, transaction, and outcome between everyone involved. This means with your children's mother, their family, any attorneys, counselors, mediators, or anyone else that you may need a record of those dealings to plead your case later. It's not for "if" it is, but "when" it is questioned, as those questions will invariably come up down the road. It is important that your notes reflect the true responses from all involved, even you, so don't just write down the negative things they do and say and leave out your part. In many cases, the significance, frequency, and impact of the role of the father is downplayed, undervalued, underrepresented, and forgotten, so it's on you to make a record of what you do to support your kids.

The minute you temporarily separate, split up, take a break, and any time you take care of your kids by yourself, you should make a brief note in a journal. This should include basic info like when (date, time, for how long), what you did, money spent or given to the mother on behalf of the kids. If you don't write everything down, thelack ofdocumentationcan haunt you! Later, it becomes a "he said, she said" conflict, and many people will forget or lie about what happened in the past, especially if it means they can get you on the hook moving forward and there is no written record. Attention: Please. Don't givecash for your obligations to your kids without some form of record, if they won't write a receipt, even a text message with a picture or an agreementvia email confirming the payment was made and a copy of your bank account withdrawal will suffice. Best case scenario, write a check if you can and list the reason on the note part of the check. The idea is to take care of thethings your children need and that there is an accurate record you're doing your part for them. You may want to avoid pushing towards more resentment, further divisiveness or triggering an angry backlash by writing anything thatis contentious. In other words, be honest but not smug, competitive, or vindictive. Please use care listing the reason on the check so rather than "my half of the bill" or "childsupport" put "kids soccer" or "medical needs" as appropriate. The point is not to brag about what you do but to have an accurate record if it comes to a Child Support issue and you are asked to provide evidence of your

contributions. Special Note: An added benefit to writing everything down that happens is the ability to reflect on how you feel about your parenting efforts, so look at the record of your actions. Are you around enough? Paying your fair share? Communicating effectively and appropriately? It will be in your notes for you to evaluate. No one wantsto look at the record and see gaps and missed opportunities, bad behavior, and irresponsible habits, so this will help keep us fathers accountable, as we step up to the plate being a great dad...even without a court order making us do so!

Continued from page 1 policy expert at UC Davis, and a Yuba Community College District trustee. He was passionate about water and environmental issues, homelessness, and mental health. Most of all, he was passionate about his community.

Gary's wife, Dr. Mary Sandy, was at the meeting to accept the award. The proclamation recognized his long-standing service for this county. It highlighted the outstanding work that he did in water conservation and work to preserve Native Habitats in the area. It told how Supervisor Sandy was a supporter in technological growth in our county, mental health resources, ag-land protection, air quality, reducing homelessness, and economic development that is compatible with the city's values and way of life.

The proclamation recognized his wisdom and dedication, along with the support that he gave his colleagues and friends. It recognized him to be thoughtful, unselfish and a good example of what to strive for in the pursuit of doing good by your community. Once the Proclamation was read,

each member of the City Council said a few words about their personal condolences and statements of love for their colleague. Dawnté Early spoke about sitting on the Yolo County Housing Authority with Sandy and spoke of him making a point to ask how her and her family were doing, saying Sandy's passing was a loss for all

Mayor Pro Tem Quirina Orozco spoke about how he led with his heart and soul. "He has left a legacy that will continue to repeat itself for generations. That's not something that everyone can say," she said. Quirina thanked Mrs. Sandy for sharing him with all of us. Councilwoman Norma Alcala spoke about how special it was that he respected their opinion and input. Councilwoman Verna Sculpizio spoke about her early memories of knowing Sandy, and how he always made her feel special. "He had the magic ability to do that

with everybody," she said. It didn't stop there. The packed house was already full of people feeling the love and admiration in the room. Many were choked up after seeing the sincerity from each speaker. City

Manager Aaron Laurel spoke about how encouraging Sandy was when he first took on his job as City Manager and that Sandy made him feel special. Laurel explained how Sandy had that impact on everybody. Mayor Guerrero mentioned how hard the loss has been for everyone. She said that Sandy didn't see things politically but saw it with his heart. "He was a true leader that taught all of us how to be the most caring and effective and inspiring leader here in our community," Mayor Guerrero

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Grasshoppers, Crickets Destroy Crops in North State

Farmers along the California-Oregon border have reported millions of dollars in losses from a torrent of grasshoppers and Mormon crickets feeding on rangeland and irrigated crops this season. Siskiyou County Agricultural Commissioner James Smith filed a request with the California Office of Emergency Services seeking a disaster declaration from the secretary of the state Department of Food and Agriculture. The preliminary damage to farmers in the county is estimated at \$8.6 million in reported crop losses of pasture, rangeland, alfalfa and small grain crops.

State Potato Farmers Boosted by Ample Water and Higher Prices


After a four-year decline in potato production nationwide, this season's crop appears poised to buck the trend, spurred by strong demand and improved water supplies. Higher processing contract prices are driving much of the increased acreage. California's mostly fresh-market growers may see prices decline once harvest starts elsewhere. California's fall and spring fresh-market potato crops typically enjoy prices two to three times those of Idaho russets because they fill specialty markets and hit a market window when other states aren't harvesting.

Lara Announces Deal With Insurers to Address California Coverage Crisis

California's top insurance regulator has announced a plan intended to halt the exodus of property insurance companies from the state and improve coverage options for people in wildfire-prone areas. The regulatory changes, announced a week after negotiations in the state Legislature on an insurance bill broke down, will allow insurance companies to incorporate forward-looking catastrophe modeling when setting insurance premium rates. In exchange, they will be required to write a guaranteed percentage of policies covering owners of properties in high-risk areas for wildfires.

Farm Technology, Robot Parade Draws Crowds in Salinas

The autonomous agriculture industry and some 1,500 visitors came to the Salinas Sports Complex last week to meet the farm robots of today and tomorrow. The Sept. 19-21 FIRA USA gathering matched agricultural technology inventors with growers and venture capitalists. It featured researchers and graduate students from around the world presenting their findings in "Lightning Talks." It drew crowds for farm technology demonstrations, including a farm robot parade. The Salinas Valley is taking a leading role in pioneering agricultural technology.

My girlfriend's parents are divorced, and they're both in their early seventies. We talked the other night, and she's thinking about buying them each life insurance policies. it anymore once he stops working. I suppose it's fine if she wants to buy them each a small policy, but it's liable to be pretty expensive at their age.

Now, she can do this, but I don't think it would be a good long-term plan. I'd tell your girlfriend she needs to start saving money and building up her own wealth. If she had just \$20,000 in savings, that'd be more than enough to bury two people. Please understand, I don't mean to sound insensitive. We're talking solely about the economics involved in this kind of situation.

The other thing your girlfriend should do is have a discussion with her mom to find out if the stepfather has the money to handle that kind of thing. When it comes right down to it, any final expenses for her mom would be his responsibility now - not her dad's. She should have a discussion with her dad about preparing for things, too. But if her dad's got insurance through work, and the stepdad is ready to pay for her mom's burial, then they're covered for the immediate future.

In short, I wouldn't do it unless they absolutely don't have this sort of thing covered. Even then, I'd prefer she just covered it with cash, because all we're talking about is enough to cover burial costs. No matter what anyone else says, Joshua, a nice funeral doesn't have to be crazy expensive.

Social Security Matters

About Federal Taxation of Social Security Benefits

Dear Rusty: Why are my Social Security benefits being taxed at all? The Social Security FICA payroll taxes taken out of my paycheck while I was working were paid with taxable income. Signed:

Disgruntled Taxpayer Dear Disgruntled Taxpayer: Many Americans share your belief that federal taxation of Social Security benefits is unfair because we pay into the program through payroll taxes on our taxable earnings. Unfortunately, Congress took a different view in 1983 when taxation of Social Security benefits was first enacted at a time Social Security was having financial issues. Congressional logic back then was that a beneficiary only personally pays 50% of the Social Security contributions made (the other half is paid by the employer) so, since your Social Security entitlement was only half paid for by you and the other half by your employer, the portion

of your benefit attributable to your employer's contributions should be taxable. So, it's that other half – the portion of your benefit which resulted from employer contributions which the 1983 Congress decided should be taxed. So, starting in 1984, if a beneficiary's overall annual income from all sources exceeded \$25,000 for a single filer or \$32,000 for those filing married-jointly, half of that person's Social Security benefits became part of their income taxable

by the IRS.

That was how it worked until 1993 when a new and different Congress added another threshold which, if exceeded, resulted in up to 85% of Social Security benefits received during the tax year becoming taxable. The logic used for the 1993 law was that beneficiaries, on average, would only personally pay for about 15% of the lifetime benefits they would eventually receive, leading that Congress to conclude that if your combined income from all sources exceeded the higher threshold (\$34,000 for single filers and \$44,000 for those filing married/jointly), up to 85% of your benefits should be taxable. Please understand that I'm not defending nor endorsing those historical Congressional views, but I have researched why Social Security benefits are taxable at all, and the above is what I've learned from that

For information, the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC), has long advocated for eliminating federal taxation of Social Security benefits or, at the very least, raising the thresholds at which benefits become taxable. The income thresholds for taxing Social Security benefits were established in 1983 and 1993, but those thresholds have never been adjusted for inflation. When taxation of Social Security started in 1984, less than 10% of beneficiaries paid income tax on their benefits, whereas today that percentage is over 50% and growing. If you want to add your voice to those who oppose federal taxation of Social Security benefits, you may wish to contact your Congressional Representative to do so. And it is worth noting that eleven U.S. states, to varying degrees, also levy income tax on Social
