California's poverty rate climbed in the first quarter of 2023, the latest quarter measured by the Public Policy Institute of California. Poverty increased from 11.7% in 2021 to 13.2%, the institute said, with 5 million people living in poverty.

Safety net programs played a major role in recent shifts in the state's poverty rate.

During the pandemic, the federal government expanded such social safety net programs as tax credits for families with children and emergency food assistance, which lowered poverty rates nationwide. Poverty rates jumped when those expansions expired late last year and earlier this year, said Caroline Danielson, a researcher at the institute.

"We're seeing an uptick in poverty. That's not because the economy is worse-it's actually improving- but it's because we temporarily, using federal funds mainly, had expansions of safety net programs," she said.

About 3.2 million more Californians would be in poverty without any safety net programs, Danielson said. Expanded CalFresh food assistance alone kept 1.1 million people out of poverty in the first quarter of 2023, when that expansion expired, the report said.

Latinos make up about half of Californians living in poverty, despite being 39.7% of the population. By comparison, about 10% of white Californians live in poverty.

Child poverty leaped from 9% in 2021 to about 14% in early 2023, largely due to the expiration of social safety net expansions. In 2019, the child poverty rate was about 18%.

Senior Californians also experienced a higher poverty rate at 15%, compared to about 13% for adults Continued on page 3

Dry Creek Parkway Trail Project

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The Sacramento County Department of Regional Parks is excited to announce its Dry Creek Parkway Trail project! This project is made possible thanks to a recommendation by the Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG) that was adopted as part of the California Transportation Commission's 2023 Active Transportation Program.

"We are thrilled with the Commission's decision to adopt the 2023 Active Transportation Program, which included SACOG's \$7,704,000 recommendation for Regional Parks," said Patrick Kennedy, District 2 Supervisor and SACOG Board Chair. "I look forward to seeing how our Department of Regional Parks brings this project to life."

With this funding, Regional Parks will construct a paved Class I multi-use trail - or trail that is completely separated from any street or highway that permits a variety of users, including bicyclists, walkers, joggers and wheelchair users - in the Dry Creek area.

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Vape-Trail Despoils River

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - If vaping is touted as less harmful than smoking, the habit is not healthy for waterways.

With the popularity of e-cigarettes, e-debris is new age trash in the American River. In the short distance between Sunrise Bridge (Fair Oaks) to Ancil Hoffman Park (Carmichael) riverbeds and banks have lately yielded thousands of plastic vape cartridges.

These contain lithium batteries and cocktails of nicotine, oils and flavorings inhaled by vapers.

The river not only supplies drinking water for millions of humans. Its pollution also impacts fish and a multitude of wildlife species. Pollution also impacts fish and thousands of wildlife species. "Batteries contain highly toxic chemicals and acids," explains California Department of Fish and Wildlife Fisheries Supervisor Nick Bauer. "In stagnant water, these and vaping residues can accumulate and become more concentrated. They can leech into sediment and be consumed by organisms living in the water.

"All river wildlife is potentially affected because harmful chemicals tend to bio-accumulate as they move up the food chain. The containers eventually wash downriver to add to the huge amount of plastic in the Pacific Ocean."

California Wildlife Encounters rescuer Ken Nuckolls considers e-debris "the new environmental hazard plaguing our waterways."

"Arsenic, lead, chromium and nickel in lithium batteries are known carcinogens," he says. "Ingestion of lead kills our native eagles. It only takes a particle the size of a rice grain to be fatal for them."

Notes diver Matt Spruitenburg: "Five years ago, we seldom found vaping apparatus... Now we see it everywhere. These items are disposable, so when they're finished, some rafters just toss them. Dumping trash in the American River is illegal. There are garbage cans in landing areas. Rafters can surely hold their trash till then."

Karl Bly has volunteered for river cleanup since childhood and runs a group called American River Lost and Found. "I've collected boxes and boxes of vaping cartridges," he says. "In any waterway, garbage is a problem. But garbage that contains chemicals is even worse for river quality.

"I encourage people to enjoy our river. But make an effort to pick up garbage."

"This project is so important to us because it will provide a muchneeded off-road facility that improves safety and comfort for all ages and abilities in a part of the County that has historically lacked such amenities," said Liz Bellas, Director of Regional Parks. "By extending the Dry Creek Parkway Trail, we are also closing some key gaps in the regional active transportation network."

One section of this trail project will begin where the existing Dry Creek Bikeway trail ends at the 24th and U Street intersection in Rio Linda and follow along Dry Creek north to the Placer County Line. The other section will extend the Dry Creek Parkway trail southwest to connect with the Sacramento Northern Trail near Elkhorn Blvd. It is a critical connection to the American River Parkway and brings the County much closer to the completion of a 70-mile loop trail system for the region.

Construction on this project is expected to begin in 2025.

Turkey Trots and Other Fun This Thanksgiving Week

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -The holiday season is upon us, and that means fun events in the Sacramento region are abundant. If you're looking for activities Thanksgiving week, you'll have plenty of options (in addition, of course, to all of the eating and shopping).

Thanksgiving morning the annual Run to Feed the Hungry will be celebrating its 30th anniversary and once again kicking off the largest Thanksgiving Day fun run in the country. The run starts at 8:15 on J Street right outside the Sacramento State campus, with start times varying for times or untimed running, and those choosing the 10k or 5k option. Participants - whether walking or running, going as an individual or as part of a team can enjoy the camaraderie and beautiful fall foliage as they follow the loop route through East Sacramento. For the competitive runners, the top three finishers in each age group will receive prize money ranging from \$50-\$300. Run to Feed the Hungry benefits the Sacramento Food Bank & Family Services, which has seen an 87% increase in demand for services since the 2020 pandemic. Virtual and in-person race options are available, and adult registration begins at \$35. Strollers are allowed in the untimed races, but dogs in strollers are not; all pets are asked to stay at home.

If you're willing to drive a bit farther, there is the Elk Grove Gobble Wobble. This fun event features a 5K race, a Fun Run (1/4 mile) for kids, food, music, raffles, vendor booths, and a fun zone. Virtual and in-person race options are available for the 5K. Registration is \$10 for the kids fun run, \$20 for the virtual 5k, and \$30-\$50 for the in-person 5K (depending on registration date). Registration for the in-person 5k includes a medal and shirt.

Race-day registration is available if the event has not sold out. Check-in begins at 8:00 and the fun run begins at 9:00, with the 5k starting at 9:15. Strollers and well-behaved dogs are welcome. The Gobble Wobble event benefits Chicks in Crisis located in Elk Grove, which supports parents and children by providing resources and support to help families become self-sufficient, helping all families "cross the finish line."

Folsom will also be holding its Turkey Trot on Thanksgiving Day. The race has 5K and 10K options, and participants can choose to walk or run at Rodeo Park/Lions Park at 200 Stafford Street. The 10k participants will line up at 8:50, and the 5K participants will be shortly behind at 9:00. Registration cost is \$35-\$40 and includes a race day shirt, bib, and timing chips. Dogs, along with children in strollers, can participate in the 5k assuming both are well-contained. The Folsom Turkey Trot usually sees around 4,000 participants each year. The proceeds from this year's event will benefit the Twin Lakes Food Bank, Folsom Athletic Association, and Johnny Cash Trail (which is also the trail that the run will traverse).

For those looking for something other than the typical turkey run, on November 18, the North Highlands Recreation and Park District will be hosting Turkey Day Flag Football. This inaugural event will start at 10:00 a.m. at Brock Park Sports Complex in North Highlands and last until noon. Participants must be at least 18 years old, and the cost is \$19.00 to register. Refreshments and t-shirt are included.

Lastly, if you didn't sign up for a Thanksgiving Day run but subsequently feel guilty about your overindulgence, there is the Sacramento Turkey Trot Run on Saturday November 25 with 5K, 10K, and half-marathon options. Registration is \$35-\$42, depending on race selected, and includes a swag bag that's mailed directly to you. There are three waves starting at 8:00, 8:30, and 9:00, filled on a firstcome first-filled basis. All ages and paces are welcome, but this is a very limited capacity event. The run will start at Sutters Landing Park in Sacramento. ★



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

Poverty rates also varied significantly by region, with San Diego and Los Angeles counties experiencing the highest poverty rates, about 15%, while the Central Valley and Sierra counties experienced the lowest, about 11%.

A big reason for that, Danielson said, is the high cost of living in Southern California counties and demographic differences among the regions. Los Angeles and San Diego counties have high populations of Latino and immigrant communities that experience higher rates of poverty.

The Public Policy Institute's California Poverty Measure includes such things as the value of government assistance and a region's cost of living, which the federal poverty rate does not consider.

Social safety net programs make less of a dent on poverty in counties with higher costs of living. That's because poor Californians in these counties may earn incomes too high for federal poverty thresholds and so don't qualify for as much aid.

For example, researchers found that social safety net programs reduced poverty the most in inland areas, where poverty rates are lower. Without the programs, poverty would be 14.4 points higher in the Central Valley and Sierra region, but only 4.3 points higher in the Bay Area, the report shows.

The Public Policy Institute looked closer at working Californians and found that most Californians in poverty are working and even fulltime employment didn't keep some residents from poverty.

More than 8 in 10 of California's 1.3 million working poor were employed year-round; nearly half worked full time and 37% part time. Part-time workers had higher poverty rates than full-time workers.

Workers in service

industries — janitors, landscapers, cosmetologists, housekeepers and other service jobs — and workers in agriculture tended to experience poverty at higher rates than other labor sectors. People in building and grounds maintenance, for example, have a 20% poverty rate, followed by workers in food preparation and service who endure a 16% poverty rate. The report also high-

lights how the working poor spend their money. They cohabit with family members to make ends meet; 82% of Californians in poverty live with other adult family members.

People use most of their earnings for everyday expenses and bills. On average, working poor adults make \$28,000 annually.


Danielson said this underscores the need for policies that increase wages and improve training and educational opportunities for the working poor.

Oct. 1 is the beginning of what hydrologists call the "water year."

Historically, California's reservoirs are near their lowest levels by this point after months of being drawn down, mostly to irrigate fields and orchards, during the state's precipitation-free summer.

This October is quite different.

Last winter's heavy rain and snow storms, generated by a series of atmospheric rivers, filled reservoirs even as dam managers fully opened their gates to send as much water downstream as possible.

So much rain and snow fell in the southern San Joaquin Valley that Tulare Lake, once one of the nation's largest natural lakes, was recreated, and threatened the town of Corcoran.

Virtually every reservoir in the state contains more than 100% of their historic storage levels at the beginning of the water year. The biggest ones, such as Shasta and Oroville, are close to three-quarters full even after giving farmers their full quotas of irrigation water during the growing season.

Hydrologists and meteorologists, moreover, are telling Californians that they may see a repeat in the months ahead, thanks to a phenomenon known as El Niño, and it potentially could surpass last winter's storms.

Another Wet Winter Looms. California Needs

To Get Serious About Water Management

El Niño is a warm current that often results in huge amounts of Pacific Ocean water being sucked into the atmosphere and delivered to land as rain and snow.

"The anticipated strong El Niño is the predominant climate factor driving the U.S. winter outlook this year," Jon Gottschalck, chief of the operational prediction branch at NOAA's Climate Prediction Center, told the Los Angeles Times.

He and other weather scientists predict that California and other Western states will see above-average precipitation and some believe it could surpass the 1997-98 winter when floods and mudslides killed 17 Californians and caused \$1 billion in property damage.

"It's only been seen three times previously in the historical record," Stephen Yeager, project scientist with the National Center for Atmospheric Research, told public radio station KQED. "We are looking at the potential of a major season-long event that could impact people and their livelihoods."

The prospect of another heavy precipitation winter is both uplifting to a state that had experienced several years of drought prior to last winter and a little frightening.

Mostly, it's another warning to Californians – and particularly their politicians – that it's beyond time to take the state's water situation seriously and become more proactive on both flood protection and water storage. The good news is that after years of dithering, some significant progress is being made on rationalizing water management in California. A few days ago, federal and local water officials announced the approval of a project that would expand storage in the San Luis Reservoir, a major off-stream facility in the Pacheco Pass.

San Luis absorbs water from the California Aqueduct that's not currently needed and releases it on demand. It has the capacity to store 2 million acre-feet now and the new project will add another 130,000 acre-feet of capacity.

It's one out of a flurry of storage projects now in the works, including another off-stream reservoir on the west side of the Sacramento Valley called Sites. That project has been kicking around for decades and is finally gaining political approval and serious commitments of money.

Off-stream storage avoids the environmental issues of dams that plug rivers, such as Shasta and Oroville, and adversely affect fish and other wildlife.

State water authorities believe that, with climate change, California will receive more of its precipitation as rain, rather than snow. It's critical, therefore, that we have storage, both above-ground and in aquifers, to replace the natural reservoir of the Sierra snowpack as it recedes.

The message is finally hitting home.

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




Organic Growers in Quarantine Region Worry About Citrus Greening Threat

As an organic citrus grower and packer in Ventura County, John Wise has long recognized the threat of the Asian citrus psyllid to his business and livelihood. The threat has become greater now that part of his region is under quarantine as state agricultural officials continue to find more residential citrus trees infected with huanglongbing, or citrus greening disease, a fatal bacterial infection that the insect can transmit. For organic citrus growers, there remain few effective treatment options approved for organic production to control the psyllid.

Rebounding Harvests Test Agricultural Trucking Companies

Trucking companies that haul crops from fields and orchards to processing facilities and transport packaged produce to ports and retailers have been especially busy over the past several weeks. After three years of drought gave way to heavy rains, tomatoes, almonds, pistachios and winegrapes were expected to outpace last year's production, according to estimates from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Tom Barcellos, a Tulare County farmer who runs a trucking business, said his fleet of trucks has been stretched thin by the San Joaquin Valley's record-setting pistachio harvest.

Rice Commission Ceo Champions Partnerships To Protect Habitat

The CEO of the California Rice Commission says the sector is working to secure a farming future with less vulnerability to climate extremes. Addressing the California Association of Pest Control Advisors in Reno, Tim Johnson said rice producers "are starting to wrap our arms around...the impacts of climate variability." He said a key to sustaining California rice production may come from sustaining critical habitat. During the drought, \$10 million in grants were made available to rice farmers who provided some water to idled fields used by waterfowl on the Pacific Flyway.

Public Utilities Commission Mulls Changes To Net Energy Metering Program

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A proposed decision under consideration by the California Public Utilities Commission would bring changes to a program implemented to encourage private investment in on-site renewable energy. The state's Net Energy Metering Aggregation program, or NEMA, has led to increased adoption of solar and other renewables by farms, ranches and other businesses. The PUC on Nov. 2 is due to consider changes that would effectively eliminate the benefit of aggregation for power used and generated by customers with more than one utility meter.

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This Winter PG&E Offers Gas Appliance Safety Checks and Pilot Re-Lights

OAKLAND, CA (MPG) - To help customers prepare their gas appliances for safe use during the cold weather months ahead, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) offers free in-home safety checks. During the safety checks, PG&E also will relight pilot lights for customers who have older heaters or other appliances that have been turned off during warmer months. Most modern gas heaters and appliances have electronic ignition and do not use pilot lights.

Free safety checks help ensure that gas appliances, including water heaters, furnaces and ovens, are operating safely and efficiently, reducing the risk of carbon monoxide (CO) poisoning within the home. Carbon monoxide is especially dangerous because it can't be seen, smelled or heard.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, each year more than 400 Americans die from unintentional CO poisoning not linked to fires, more than 100,000 visit the emergency room, and more than 14,000 are hospitalized. Since the start of 2023, PG&E has responded to more than 6,100 incidents where the presence of carbon monoxide is suspected, including 154 in the North Valley, 753 in the Sacramento region and 189 in PG&E's Sierra Division of Placer, El Dorado and Nevada counties.

"One of the best ways to prevent carbon monoxide from reaching dangerous levels is to ensure your appliances are in safe working order. A free safety check can help identify any issues that would interfere with their safe operation. And while our technicians are there, they will also inspect your pilot lights and relight them if needed." said Joe Forline, PG&E senior vice president of Gas Operations.

Before the colder winter months when natural gas appliances typically see the most use, PG&E encourages customers to schedule an inspection by visiting www.pge.com/ pilotlights. Scheduling your appointment online is free and easy and will help you avoid hold times on our customer service line. Customers can also call 800-743-5000 to schedule appointments.

Helpful Winter Gas Safety Tips:

Install carbon monoxide detectors to warn when concentration levels are high; All California single-family homes are required to have carbon monoxide detectors; Carbon monoxide detectors should be installed on every floor, near sleeping areas and common areas; These devices should be tested twice a year, and batteries replaced if necessary; Check the expiration date - most carbon monoxide detectors have a shelf life of five to seven years; Never use products inside the home that generate dangerous levels of carbon monoxide, such as generators, outdoor grills, or propane heaters; Never use cooking devices such as ovens or stoves for home heating purposes; When using the fireplace to stay warm, make sure the flue is open so venting can occur safely through the chimney; Make sure water heaters and other natural gas appliances have proper ventilation.

If you suspect carbon monoxide in your home, you should get out immediately and call 911. If a PG&E customer ever smells the distinctive "rotten egg" odor of natural gas in or around their home or business they should immediately evacuate and then call 911 and PG&E at 1-800-743-5000. ★

Top Election Official Addresses Future Elections

Secretary of State News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - California Secretary of State Shirley N. Weber, Ph.D. delivered the keynote at the Future of California Elections (FoCE) Conference at the Hyatt Regency in Sacramento. The conference brought together elections officials, election reform advocates, researchers, organizers, and other stakeholders to discuss key topics in voting and elections, build relationships, and together begin to imagine a future for our elections that better serves all voters.

Weber said that, while California has made significant advances increasing voter registration on a large scale and making voting easier and more accessible, more needs to be done to outreach to these new voters to help them cultivate habits of voting.

"As elections officials, we will never be satisfied not only when every eligible person is registered to vote, but when every registered voter actually shows up to vote. We must inform voters of the when, where and how of voting. But there is one thing that keeps us from being successful for the health of our democracy and to have

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sustained participation - we must remind voters of the "why" of voting."

Weber said it's imperative that elections officials convey to voters that participation in voting is an exercise of their power to take control of their lives and to help their families, neighborhoods and communities flourish. She also exhorted California to revive the spirit of the Civil Rights era's Freedom Summer, where hundreds of volunteers went to Mississippi in the summer of 1964 and risked arrest and violence to register Black voters and to educate them on how to exercise the franchise.

"There is too much at risk and too many people who died for women's right to vote. There has been so much sacrifice to let it atrophy. As elections officials and advocates, we must make sure that we undertake the necessary task of educating the public on why voting matters."

Weber made it clear that in order to translate policies for increased registration into expanded participation in an environment where democracy is under threat, lawmakers must prioritize sustained investment for voter education.

"If the state believes in it, they need to fund it." she said. \bigstar

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - At approximately 9:20 a.m. on Saturday, July 8, 2023, deputies from the Sacramento County Sheriff's Office responded to a residential neighborhood on Laurel Oak Way in Fair Oaks to the report of a shooting. Deputies arrived on scene and located an adult male shot in the stomach. The victim was transported to the hospital and ultimately survived his injuries.

Deputies and detectives from the Sheriff's Gang Suppression Unit (GSU) determined the shooting was gang-motivated and the victim was targeted. The investigation revealed four San Francisco Hells Angels Motorcycle Club members were responsible for the shooting. Detectives obtained arrest warrants for Valentino Venezia, Dominic Venezia, Ederic Llarena, and William Kibblewhite.

On Tuesday, October 24, 2023, GSU

Detectives, FBI San Francisco SWAT, FBI Sacramento SWAT, Central County SWAT, Daly City SWAT, FBI Safe-Streets, and CDCR Special Services Unit (SSU) executed a seven-location search warrant related to the shooting. All four suspects were subsequently taken into custody. The search warrants yielded 15 firearms, approximately \$112,000 in cash, and Hells Angels gang indicia and intelligence documents.

Valentino and Dominic Venezia were booked into the San Francisco County Jail: Ederic Llarena was booked into the Contra Costa County Jail; and William Kibblewhite was booked into the San Mateo County Jail. All four were charged with PC 664/187 (Attempted Murder); PC 245(a)(2) (Assault with a Deadly Weapon): PC 246 (Shooting at an Occupied Vehicle); PC 182.5 (Criminal Gang Conspiracy); and PC 186.22 (Gang Enhancement). All four suspects were scheduled to appear in court in Sacramento on October 27, 2023, at 3:00 p.m.



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The Insurance Fiasco *Can this plan fix California's insurance crisis?*

A week after negotiations to rescue California's floundering home insurance market stalled out in the Legislature, the state's top insurance regulator put out his own rescue plan that effectively amounts to a trade for the state's major insurers.

Under proposed regulations Insurance Commissioner Ricardo Lara announced this afternoon, major insurers will be required to cover a certain share of homeowners in the state's most wildfire-prone areas. In exchange, the Department of Insurance will allow companies to charge more to cover the rising costs of doing business in a fire-ravaged state.

Lara called the package of new proposed regulations "the largest insurance reform" since 1988, the year California voters passed a proposition requiring insurance companies to get prior approval before raising premiums.

The plan is meant to reverse what has amounted to a slow-motion exodus of private home insurers from the state. In the last year and a half, seven of the top 12 property insurers operating in California have either placed new restrictions on where they do business or stopped selling new policies here entirely.

The biggest player of all, State Farm, announced a freeze on new policies in May, kicking off a fresh round of panic among homeowners scrambling to find affordable insurance policies and lawmakers eager to tackle the crisis.

For years, insurance companies have complained that current rates and the existing regulatory process don't allow them to recoup the cost of doing business in the state's most at-risk regions. By easing some of those restrictions, while requiring the companies to expand their coverage, "it's the department calling the bluff of insurers," said Rex Frazier, president of Personal Insurance Federation of California, a trade group.

insurers are willing to make, he added, though it will ultimately depend on how the specific regulations are crafted in the coming months.

Amy Bach, executive director of the consumer group United Policyholders, struck a similar note.

Lara "did not sell out to the industry here, in my opinion, he struck a deal," she said. "Whether it's going to manifest positively overall...the proof will be in the premiums."

But Consumer Watchdog an advocacy group that Lara all but called out by name during his presentation as "bombastic" and a group "materially benefiting" from the current regulatory system — came away with a difficult conclusion.

"He's basically capitulated to the industry," Jamie Court, the group's president, said of Lara. "There's not really much coming back for the consumer in here."

Despite mounting public angst and calls for action from top lawmakers, the politics of addressing the problem in the Legislature proved too thorny this year. In the final weeks of the legislative session that ended a week ago, lawmakers scrambled to bridge the demands of insurers — who called for higher premiums to cover more of their costs and for a more flexible rate-setting process — and those of consumer groups, who resisted calls to add to the financial burdens of homeowners. After negotiations floundered, Gov. Gavin Newsom hinted that his administration and Lara's Department of Insurance might be willing to act on their own.

In a statement, Sen. Bill Dodd, a Napa Democrat involved in the unsuccessful negotiations, cheered Lara's announcement. "Given that the Legislature is not in session right now, utilizing the commissioner's regulatory authority makes good sense," he said. "I know there is work that still needs to be done and I'll be supporting these efforts any way I can."

Insurance companies have pointed to three main reasons that doing business in California is increasingly a losing proposition: Escalating wildfire risk, ever-rising construction costs and the global price of reinsurance — insurance policies that insurance companies, themselves, take out. regulated in California, making home insurance policies relatively cheap by national standards. In order to raise rates, major insurers need a sign-off from the Department of Insurance.

Currently, insurance companies are not allowed to factor in the cost of reinsurance into those applications. They are also prohibited from using forward-looking models to predict future costs — something insurers say they desperately need as a warming climate and residential development encroaching into fire-prone areas results in fire seasons that are longer and more catastrophic than they have been in the past.

Lara proposed giving companies both of those tools, though companies will apparently only be allowed to itemize the cost of reinsurance as it pertains to California. It's unclear how this calculation will be made.

Bach with United Policyholders said allowing companies to use predictive models isn't inherently a bad idea — "Are these models nefarious tools of Satan? No," required to cover homeowners in wildfire-prone parts of the state at 85% of their statewide coverage. For example, if a company provides 10% of the homeowner policies across California, they would be required to provide 8.5% of the coverage in areas deemed "at-risk."

Court, with Consumer Watchdog, said 85% is 15% too little. "It's a really sh—y deal," he said.

California homeowners currently unable to get insurance on the private market can currently turn to the FAIR Plan, a last resort issuer of fire coverage backstopped through a levy on regulated insurers. Between 2018 and 2022, the number of homeowners covered by the FAIR Plan more than doubled to roughly 3% of all homeowners.

But the FAIR Plan policies are expensive and limited. And if the FAIR Plan runs out of money, it's legally required to refill its coffers by levying a surcharge on major insurers. The prospect of the FAIR Plan running out of cash and slapping the industry with the bill has also encouraged insurance companies to scale back their coverage.

Consumer Watchdog regularly challenges the applications for higher premiums that insurance companies submit to the state, an intervention allowed for under the 1988 ballot measure. Today, Lara also said he wants to make it easier for the public to see who intervenes and how much they are compensated for doing so.

"One entity is involved in nearly 75% of all interventions for rate approvals, materially benefiting from a process that is meant for a broader public participation," he said, referring to the nonprofit.

Lara also said that "throwing bombs is easy and putting out bombastic statements from entrenched interest groups doesn't benefit anyone."
