

Take Action for Flood **Preparedness**

WOODLAND, CA (MPG)

- As we begin to experience more storms, such as the one last weekend, Yolo County residents are encouraged to become better informed and prepared for potential flood events. Roughly 34% of Yolo County, totaling approximately 220,000 acres, falls within a regulated floodplain. There are over 4,500 flood insurance policies in effect within the county, which is protected by a network of 214 miles of levees maintained by 14 separate agencies.

Over the years, various measures have been implemented to reduce the risk of flood damage in Yolo County and its surrounding areas. The Yolo County Office of Emergency Services has successfully secured grant funding from the State to enhance emergency flood response plans, training, and supplies. Simultaneously, the Yolo County Flood Control and Water Conservation District collaborates with relevant authorities. This organization oversees an extensive irrigation system, which addresses erosion and storm-related canal damage, and closely monitors water flow throughout the county.

The Yolo County Community Services Department's Natural Resources Division also plays a vital role in flood mitigation, drawing on the insights gained from longterm studies. They are actively involved in significant projects, such as the Sacramento River Right Bank Levee improvements, Knights Landing Ridge Cut enhancements, and the Portuguese Bend Multi-Benefit Enhancement Area. These projects not only bolster flood control measures but also contribute to habitat restoration. Additionally, the department focuses on improving drainage infrastructure to ensure effective stormwater drainage.

The County of Yolo urges residents to be prepared for floods, whether they live in a flood zone or not. Yolo County residents can view an interactive map showing the scope, cause, and magnitude of flooding in your neighborhood at www.YoloCounty. org/FloodMapper to see the risk profile for your

Are Utilities Going Up? You Decide!

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The City of West Sacramento (referred to in this article as "the City") has begun the process of getting the community involved in a rate study for water, wastewater (sewer) and solid waste (trash, recycling, green waste) services. Due to the rising cost of inflation, the City faces an increase in the cost to provide these services while complying with the ever increasing regulatory requirements.

To date, the City has hosted a webinar and two open houses to educate the public and gather survey information. Set up as stations for each significant topic, city workers were ready and willing to explain any question the community might have while attending the Open House. First, there was a video on how rates are set under California law. From there you could speak with those in charge of Water and Wastewater Services, Solid Waste Services, Rate Modeling, Billing and Finance and Tip to Lower Your Bill.

Each station had visual aids and giveaways that were fun and useful. Information at the stations included the following:

Water and Wastewater Services

The City's Public Works Department is responsible for the city's road, water, wastewater, storm drain, facilities, fleet, and equipment maintenance. Public Works also operates and maintains the City's George Kristoff Water Treatment Plant.

Solid Waste Services

The City partners with Waste Management to provide trash, recycling, and organics services to residents, and trash and recycling to businesses. The Environmental Services and Sustainability Division promotes recycling, water conservation, and stormwater protection.

This division helps residents and businesses make sustainable decisions; and provides resources for conservation, education, and environmental stewardship.

Rate Modeling

Performed regularly, utility rate studies provide transparency into what the City can expect in the years ahead and ensure it has the financial resources to maintain the infrastructure. manage system capacity for growth, implement new technologies, address existing and new state and federal regulations, and implement the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). Rates studies evaluate the costs to provide services and determines the appropriate rates to be charged to ensure that those costs are recovered in a fair and reasonable manner. A rate design is the structure of rates charged to customers, including the types of charges (such as fixed fees or variable charges), and the levels of those charges.

Billing and Finance

The Utility Billing Division of the Finance Department provides customer account service to well over 15,000 accounts for water, wastewater, and solid waste services. For individuals and families experiencing financial hardship, ask us about payment assistance options. With the LIHWAP program, if you own and live in your home and your household income is at or below 60% of the state median income, or if your household receives CalFresh, CalWORKs or LIHEAP benefits you may be eligible for a one-time credit of up to \$15,000 credit on your water and wastewater bills. Tips to Lower Your Bill The City has a number of resources available to help

residents and businesses reduce water consumption. Here you could also receive helpful booklets

including A Homeowner's Guide to a Water Smart Landscape a Practical Plumbing Handbook and valuable information on programs to make changes at little to no cost for those who qualify.

So, why is the City doing the study? Typically a rate study is done every three to five years. The last rate study in West Sacramento was in 2017. The City gathers information on the needs and wants and the costs incurred to provide the services. The utilities (or City) is not allowed to make a profit through rates charged. Each utility is self-funded, and its expenses and revenues must be equal.

The rate study will occur over the next several months. Updated information will likely be included in your bills, but the public is encouraged to follow the rates study process and learn more about the three services and how the rates are determined. For ongoing information follow wsac.city/utility-rates. This is your chance to explain to the city how the rates may affect you. When the study is complete, a public hearing will be held, in which no less than 51% of the votes must be in favor of the rate change in order for it to pass. If it does not pass, the City will have to make choices regarding services that will be available.

Whether you live in a flood-prone area, or not,

remember these safety tips: Depending on the type of flood: Evacuate if told to do so; Move to higher ground, or a higher floor; Stay where you are if you're safe.

Never drive around closed road barricades. Local responders use them to direct traffic out of flooded areas safely;

Listen to EAS, NOAA Weather Radio or local alerting systems for current emergency information and instructions regarding flooding;

Do not walk, swim, or drive through flood waters. Turn Around. Don't

Stay inside your car if it is trapped in rapidly moving water. Get on the roof if water is rising inside the

This Flood Preparedness Week, ensure you have a plan for your household, including your pets, so that you and your family know what to do, where to go, and what you will need to protect yourselves from flooding. Learn and practice evacuation routes, shelter plans, and flash flood response. Consider the medical needs of your household, including necessary medications, and use of durable medical equipment. Gather supplies, including non-perishable foods, cleaning supplies, and water for several days, in case you must leave immediately or if services are cut off in your area. ★

Eventually, You **Become Self-Insured** Dear Dave,

My wife and I are both 36 years old, and we have two children. Our son is six, and our daughter will be four next month. We've been walking through the Baby Steps, and we should have our home paid off sometime next summer. We realized the other day the one thing missing from our financial picture is life insurance. We both work outside the home. She makes \$60,000 a year, while I make \$80,000 a year. At our age, and in our current situation, do you think we should we get 20-year or 30-year level term life insurance policies?

Dear Clay,

You guys are doing a great job of getting control of your

finances and planning for the future. Speaking of the future, do you plan on having more kids? If you do, you might want to go with 30-year policies. If you've decided two are enough, then based on your present situation I think 20-year policies would work out fine.

I recommend folks have 10 to 12 times their annual income in life insurance coverage. That means you'd need between \$800,000 and \$960,000 in coverage, while your wife needs a policy in the \$600,000 to \$720,000 range. But let's take a deeper dive into all this.

Your kids will be in their mid-twenties in 20 years. Ideally, they both should have finished college by that time, or at the very least, be working and living on their own. If you continue to follow my plan, you and your wife will have paid off your home in a few months and be completely debt-free. And, you'll have been saving 15% of your income for retirement over those 20 years. On average, that alone should give you more than a half-million dollars for retirement.

Do you see where I'm going with this, Clay? Eventually, you two will become self-insured by getting out of debt, staying out of debt and piling up cash. So, if you've got \$500,000 or more in a retirement fund, no debt and your children are grown and out of the house, even if you or your wife were to die unexpectedly at that point, the other would still be taken care of and in great shape financially.

Keep up the good work!

Supervisors Approve Assistance for Residents Affected by Property Tax Error

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - In response to a one-time property tax increase imposed to make up for taxes that were not collected in the prior fiscal year to pay for the 2004 Washington Unified School District (USD) Bond, the Yolo County Board of Supervisors approved two programs to assist West Sacramento taxpayers: the Tax Deferral Program, which allows affected property owners to request a delay of up to one year for paying the 2004 Washington USD Bond tax, and the New Buyer Tax Offset Program, which permits taxpayers who have purchased their property between July 1, 2022, and June 30, 2024, to request an offset for any taxes they would not have paid had the error not occurred. Yolo County has also implemented internal process improvements to prevent similar situations in the future.

The Department of Financial Services sent a letter to more than 16,700 West Sacramento property owners during the week of October 30, 2023, outlining both programs. To take part in the Tax Deferral Program, taxpayers must submit an application online or by mail no later than November 27, 2023. For the New Buyer Tax Offset Program, taxpayers can submit applications until July 31, 2024. Applications can be submitted in person at 625 Court St, Woodland, or by mail to the Yolo County Tax Collector at P.O. Box 1995, Woodland, CA, 95695, or online at www.YoloCounty. org/TaxAssistance. If you have any questions, please contact the Yolo County Department of Financial Services at (530) 666-8001.

"We have heard the West

Sacramento residents' concerns about the property tax error," said the Chair of the Yolo County Board of Supervisors, Oscar Villegas. "As a result, we were able to quickly respond by creating the Tax Deferral Program and New Buyer Tax Offset Program. This is a great example of how local government can be held accountable and do what it takes to remedy matters for the people."

Due to the erroneous omitting of taxes for the 2004 Washington USD Bond in the 2022-23 fiscal year, the tax rate for the 2023-24 fiscal year was raised to \$120 per \$100,000 of property's assessed value, rather than the expected rate of \$60 per \$100,000 for both years. This modification resulted in an average tax bill of \$391 for residential properties. While this adjustment was essential to avoid a default on the Washington USD bonds, it regrettably led to some confusion and frustration among homeowners.

"I am glad county staff and the board were able to find a way to reduce the immediate impact on homeowners in West Sacramento and to agree to monitor the rollout carefully over the coming year," said Yolo County Supervisor Mary

Vixie Sandy. Tax Assistance Programs The Tax Deferral Program offers taxpayers the opportunity to defer the payment of their 2023-24 taxes associated with the Washington USD 2004 Bond by one year, extending the deadline to December 10, 2024. To participate, individuals must submit their applications by November 27, 2023. Only the taxes tied to the Washington USD 2004 Bond for the specified year are eligible for deferral, while all other taxes, assessments, and charges must still be paid

as required. If approved, a revised property tax bill will be issued for the remaining non-deferred taxes, with the first installment due at least 30 days from the revised bill's issuance date and the second installment due by April 10, 2024, with potential penalties and interest for late payments. Taxpayers participating in this program will receive a separate property tax bill for the deferred bond taxes, due in full by December 10, 2024. Failure to pay by this date will result in penalties and interest and be treated as a delinquent tax as mandated by state law. Payment can be made in person, by mail, or online. Property owners whose taxes are managed by their mortgage company should consult with their mortgage provider before applying.

The New Buyer Tax Offset Program is designed for taxpayers who acquired property within the Washington USD between July 1, 2022, and June 30, 2024. This program offsets the portion of the 2023-24 tax related to the Washington USD 2004 Bond that the new buyer would not have been responsible for if a tax had been imposed in 2022-23. Applications for this program can be submitted at any time before July 31, 2024. All taxes, including the bond tax, must be paid by the respective due dates. If an applicant is approved, the tax collector will determine the offset amount and inform the taxpayer of how it will affect their tax payments. This offset amount may be applied to a future installment payment or provided as a direct reimbursement. Importantly, taxpayers who choose to participate in the New Buyer Tax Offset Program are not eligible for the Tax Deferral Program. Applications for either program can be submitted in person, by mail, or online.

To be considered for potential processing toward status as an "Identified Casual" longshore worker in the Port of West Sacramento, CA, all public applicants must complete the Online Application at http://westsacramento.casualdrawingapp.net/public. The Online Application requires that each applicant provide the applicant's first and last names, (middle name is not required but recommended if there is one), mailing address, telephone number with Area Code, month of birth, numerical day of birth and a valid email address. Incomplete applications will not be accepted. Phone calls regarding the process will not be accepted and any in-person or written applications submitted through the U.S. Postal Service will not be accepted. **Applications can** be submitted online beginning 8:00 a.m., PDT, on November 2, 2023. Applicants will be sent an email confirming submission of their application.

On or about November 30, 2023, a drawing will be held from a combination of timely received public applications and "Interest Card" applications. Improving Communities and Pathways for Academic Success In and Out of the Classroom

1. Public Hearing Regarding Blackpine 440 West, LLC Development Agreement and Consideration of Resolution 23-5PC (Yancey)

This item is a public hearing regarding the consideration of a Development Agreement between the City and BlackPine 440 LLC ("Developer"). The Developer is the owner of approximately ±7.4 gross acres of property zoned Residential (R-3) within the Washington Specific Plan area. The proposed Development Agreement would vest the Developer in the current reduced impact fee program in the Washington District that was adopted by the City Council via Resolution 22-84 on September 22, 2022, for a period of five years from the effective date of the Development Agreement with a possible two- year extension. The Developer will be committed by the Development Agreement to construct a ±0.43- acre neighborhood park within twentyfour months from the effective date of the Development Agreement. This park is referenced as the Heritage Green Pocket Park in the adopted 2018 Parks, Recreation and Open Space Master Plan. The Developer will also be entering into an Option Agreement to sell the land to the City with the park improvements for a set price in the future after the park is complete. In addition, the Developer will be obligating themselves to participate in a mechanism to fund the future operation and maintenance of the public park. On November 16, 2016, the City Council certified the General Plan 2035 Environmental Impact Report (EIR). The EIR was prepared specifically to allow maximum streamlined review of subsequent projects that are found to be consistent with General Plan 2035 in terms of land use, density, etc. Staff prepared a technical memorandum in order to fully analyze any potential impacts associated with the Four 40 West project that would be beyond what was contained in the EIR. Based on the analysis presented in the technical memorandum, the proposed project is within the scope of the EIR prepared for the General Plan 2035, and no new or substantially more adverse impacts would occur through implementation of the proposed project. As a result, no new environmental document is required, consistent with State CEQA Guidelines Section 15162 and 15168(c)(2). "THE BURIAL" REVIVES COURTROOM DRAMA AS THEATRICAL SPECTACLE

"THE BURIAL" RATED R ON AMAZON PRIME VIDEO

Based on a true story, Amazon Prime's legal drama "The Burial" is likely as any fact-based movie to take liberties with real events, but the outcome is thoroughly enjoyable even if one is familiar or not with the 1999 New Yorker article of the same name about a flamboyant Florida trial attorney.

The colorful person at the center of the story is Willie E. Gray, a personal injury lawyer who rose to legal prominence from his upbringing as a sharecropper's son. From a rags-to-riches lifestyle, Willie acquired the nickname "The Giant Killer" for slaying rapacious corporations.

Despite being sharply-dressed and sporting a diamond-covered Rolex watch and gold-framed spectacles, Willie has the persuasive courtroom demeanor of a mix of Southern Baptist preacher and circus showman that appeals to ordinary folk.

That Willie (Jamie Foxx) has become so famous and wealthy in victorious courtroom battles has even led to an interview on Robin Leach's "Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous" highlighting his excessive high life, including the pair of shiny Rolls-Royces owned by him and his wife Gloria (Amanda Warren).

Who better to portray this legal giant, who lives in a 50-room Florida mansion and owns a private airliner named "Wings of Justice," than the talented Jamie Foxx whose charisma and dramatic chops could not have been better utilized to shine in the lap of luxury and the theatrics of courtroom drama?

Meanwhile, in Biloxi, Mississippi, Tommy Lee Jones' Jeremiah "Jerry" O'Keefe is celebrating his 75th birthday with his wife Annette (Pamela Reed) and thinking about how to leave behind a legacy for his 13 children.

His funeral home business at a few locations around the state has come under pressure from state insurance regulators, and the stress causes Jerry to engage his lifelong friend and attorney Mike Allred (Alan Ruck) to look into selling some of his parlors to a Canadian conglomerate.

The Loewen Group, headed by unscrupulous Canadian billionaire Ray Loewen (Bill Camp), is gobbling up so many burial homes all across Canada and the United States that you wonder if antitrust statutes are being violated.

On board Loewen's expansive yacht, Jerry reaches a deal that should extricate him from his financial troubles, but the dodgy death industry mogul slow walks signing the contract and making the payment the Mississippi businessman so desperately needs.

While his attorney Allred is an old

school Southern patrician, Jerry is encouraged by young Black associate lawyer Hal Dockins (Mamoudou Athie), to consider a different legal tack by hiring the flashy Florida litigator who has never handled contract law.

The factor of race comes into play

because Jerry's team files a civil law-

suit in Hinds County where the jury

pool will undoubtedly consist predominantly of African-Americans and the judge assigned the case is likely to also be Black.

The strategy of the lead plaintiff attorney being a person of color becomes even more crucial when allegations are leveled

at the Canadian-owned funeral homes for taking advantage of low-income, mostly Black customers into purchasing overpriced burial services.

The Loewen Group counters by hiring as lead counsel Mame Downes (Jurnee Smollett), a driven, beautiful

and a pleasing yet perceptive courtroom demeanor that proves at the outset to be more than equal to Willie's power of persuasion.

In what can only be a strategic blunder, Jerry ends up on the witness stand only to be eviscerated on cross-examination. At

Black woman with a razor-sharp mind

be eviscerated on cross-examination. At this point, Willie and his cadre of Black colleagues are pushed aside for Allred to act as chief counsel.

A few twists and turns in the trial eventually unveil a disturbing reminder that

ancient ties in the Deep South prove duly problematic in a climate where racial sensitivities can be truly nettlesome.

In a surprise to no one, Willie gets back in the legal saddle just as things are heating up. He pushes the envelope when

manipulating the jury's antipathy to an unsympathetic defendant by exposing his unsavory practices in the funeral industry and ostentatious wealth gained on the backs of the unfortunate.

Notwithstanding courtroom scenes that occasionally feel not wholly authentic,

occasionally feel not wholly authentic, "The Burial" is a rousing crowd-pleaser that is endlessly entertaining for a dramatized real-life landmark case that resulted in a half-billion dollars judgment for the plaintiff.

Even Johnnia Cochran, for all his the

Even Johnnie Cochran, for all his theatrics in the O.J. Simpson murder trial, seems inferior to the talents of Willie Gary. The only reason to mention this is when Willie and Mame meet at a hotel bar the TV screen is noticeable for a shot of Cochran in the middle of defending the ex-football player.

The major surprise behind "The Burial" is how it took almost a quarter-century for this compelling story to come to the screen. Apparently, the project bounced around various studios over the intervening years. Fortunately, we now have a film that is most definitely worth watching.



Organic Growers in Quarantine Region Worry About Citrus Greening Threat

As an organic citrus grower and packer in Ventura County, John Wise has long recognized the threat of the Asian citrus psyllid to his business and livelihood. The threat has become greater now that part of his region is under quarantine as state agricultural officials continue to find more residential citrus trees infected with huanglongbing, or citrus greening disease, a fatal bacterial infection that the insect can transmit. For organic citrus growers, there remain few effective treatment options approved for organic production to control the psyllid.

Rebounding Harvests Test Agricultural Trucking Companies Trucking companies that have group from

Trucking companies

Trucking companies that haul crops from fields and orchards to processing facilities and transport packaged produce to ports and retailers have been especially busy over the past several weeks. After three years of drought gave way to heavy rains, tomatoes, almonds, pistachios and winegrapes were expected to outpace last year's production, according to estimates from the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Tom Barcellos, a Tulare County farmer who runs a trucking business, said his fleet of trucks has been stretched thin by the San Joaquin Valley's record-setting pistachio harvest.

Rice Commission Ceo Champions Partnerships To Protect Habitat

The CEO of the California Rice Commission says the sector is working to secure a farming future with less vulnerability to climate extremes. Addressing the California Association of Pest Control Advisors in Reno, Tim Johnson said rice producers "are starting to wrap our arms around...the impacts of climate variability." He said a key to sustaining California rice production may come from sustaining critical habitat. During the drought, \$10 million in grants were made available to rice farmers who provided some water to idled fields used by waterfowl on the Pacific Flyway.

Public Utilities Commission Mulls Changes To Net Energy Metering Program

A proposed decision under consideration by the California Public Utilities Commission would bring changes to a program implemented to encourage private investment in on-site renewable energy. The state's Net Energy Metering Aggregation program, or NEMA, has led to increased adoption of solar and other renewables by farms, ranches and other businesses. The PUC on Nov. 2 is due to consider changes that would effectively eliminate the benefit of aggregation for power used and generated by customers with more than one utility meter.

Social Security Matters

My Birthday is on the First of the Month; When Should I Claim Social Security?

Dear Rusty: I will be 62 on November first and I have chosen to take my benefits early. I know that my benefit will be less than it would be if I waited and that does not concern me, but I don't want to be without income for a long period of time. I know that if my birthday is on the first or second of the month, then I can draw that month. Does that mean that when I turn 62 on November 1st that I can receive my first check on the second Wednesday of November? And should I select November as the month I'd like my benefits to start? I also read that I would be paid the month following the month I select, hence my confusion. Signed:

Confused Senior Dear Confused: There are a few different Social Security rules which come into play in your specific circumstance which are likely creating your confusion. First, since you will be 62 on November first, you will first become eligible for Social Security

starting with the month of November. Those born on the first or second of the month are eligible for benefits for that entire month, whereas those who turn 62 later in the month wouldn't be eligible for benefits until the following month. To claim benefits, you must be 62 for the entire month and, because your birthday is on the first, your first month being 62 for the entire month will be November, and that is the month you should specify as your benefit-start month on your application.

The next thing to be aware of is that Social Security pays benefits in the month following the month those benefits are earned. That means that your November benefits will be paid in December. The exact payment date is determined by the recipients birthday born before the eleventh of the month, SS payments are made on the second Wednesday; born between the eleventh and twentieth of the month, payments are received on the third Wednesday of the month; and for those born after the twentieth of the month, payment is received on the fourth Wednesday. Thus, since you were born on the first of the month and are claiming benefits to start in November, your first Social Security payment will be deposited in your bank account on the second Wednesday of December, and all subsequent Social Security payments will be made on that same second-Wednesday schedule.

You can apply for your Social Security benefits up to 4 months prior to the month you wish them to start, and SS recommends you apply at least 2 months prior to allow time for processing your application. On the application, they will ask which month you wish your benefits to begin, and you can indicate November to get your earliest possible payment in December. Actually, you can simply select the following option on the Social Security benefit application: "I want benefits beginning with the earliest possible month and will accept an age-related reduction," which will accomplish the same thing.
