The Veteran Homeless Crisis

California has poured billions of dollars into finding homes for unhoused veterans, but the number of former military service members living on the street has held steady for almost a decade. Today, a third of the nation's unhoused veterans are in California.

Gavin Newsom proposes a significant change in the state's strategy for ending veteran homelessness. His plan, included in a \$6.4 billion mental health bond he's sending to voters in the March primary election, would set aside funding specifically for veterans with serious behavioral health conditions.

That's a shift from California's last two major efforts to fund housing for veterans, both of which created units for a general population of former military service members.

The first effort began in the late 1990s, when the state built seven new veterans' homes over a period of 17 years. Today those veterans' homes are underused. They were built to house about 2,400 people, but only 1,575 veterans live in them. The 300unit veterans home in Barstow was so underutilized in 2020 that Newsom moved to close it as he braced for a pandemic recession, although lawmakers blocked him from shutting the site.

The second push centered on a pair of ballot measures voters approved in 2014 and in 2018 that allocated \$4.6 billion to build housing specifically for former military service members. The money created the Veterans Housing and Homelessness Prevention Program, which has supported the construction of about 3,250 housing units for veterans to date.

Veterans advocates and state officials

view the programs — along with federal efforts led by the Department of Veterans Affairs — as successful in reducing homelessness among former military service members. In the last 12 years, veteran homelessness in California has decreased by more than

But the trend in California mostly accounts for gains made during the Obama administration, when veteran homelessness peaked nationwide and the Department of Veterans Affairs moved aggressively to place former troops in housing. Since 2014, the number of homeless veterans in California has mostly plateaued around 10,000 to 12,000 people, according to annual counts released by the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

\$38 Million **Catalytic Converter Theft Conspiracy**

- Three Sacramento family members pleaded guilty October 16, 2023, to charges related to their participation in a nationwide catalytic converter theft conspiracy, U.S. Attorney Phillip A. Talbert announced.

Brothers Tou Sue Vang, 32, and Andrew Vang, 28, and their mother Monica Moua, 58, all pleaded guilty to conspiring to transport stolen catalytic converters from California to New Jersey in return for over \$38 million in wired payments. Tou Sue Vang also pleaded guilty to an additional 39 charges related to money laundering.

In October November 2022, federal, state, and local law enforcement partners from across the United States executed a nationwide, coordinated takedown of leaders and associates of a national network of thieves, dealers, and processors for their roles in conspiracies involving stolen catalytic converters sold to a metal refinery for over \$600 million dollars. Nine of 21 defendants were charged in the Eastern

District of California. Catalytic converters are part of an exhaust system that reduces toxic gas and pollutants from a vehicle's internal combustion engine. Catalytic converters use precious metals in their center, or "core," and are regularly targeted for theft due to the high value of these metals, especially the precious metals palladium, platinum, and rhodium. Some of these precious metals are more valuable per ounce than gold, and their value has been increasing in recent years. The black-market price for catalytic converters can be above \$1,000 each, depending on the type of vehicle and what state it is from. They can be stolen in less than a minute. Last year, approximately 1,600 catalytic converters were reportedly stolen in California each month, and California accounts for 37% of all catalytic converter theft claims nationwide. According to court doc-

uments, the defendants pleading guilty operated an unlicensed business from their residence in Sacramento where they bought stolen catalytic converters from local Continued on page 3

Flood Preparedness in Sacramento County

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - This is a good time to make sure residents know what to do in case we have a repeat of last January's storms.

It is important for you to know the flood risk to your home or business. After years of drought, the floods of 2023 were a stark reminder about the County's location in a floodplain. The County's Department of Water Resources has information to help residents understand the threat flooding may pose to property. Go to www. stormready.org and click Flood Zone Information to learn more about your flood risk.

If you live in a flood zone, you can reduce the potential for damage to your property by being proactive.

- 1.Before the rain falls, remember to clear storm drains of leaves and debris to ensure the water freely flows away from your home. Clogs can cause localized flooding to streets that could eventually back up to your doorway.
- 2.If you come across street flooding, call 3-1-1 to have County crews come out and clear the clogs.
- 3.Don't drive through flooded streets. Turn around, don't drown!
- 4.If you see items dumped into nearby creaks, call 3-1-1 and report it. It's important to clear those areas before the rain to avoid problems.

Even in non-disaster years, nearly 20 percent of flood insurance claims in Sacramento County come from moderate to low-risk areas. Residents can obtain flood insurance if their homes or businesses are not in the mapped floodplain. If unchecked, localized flooding can cause a lot of damage. If you live in an area prone to flooding, consider talking to a qualified insurance agent about flood insurance. It takes 30 days for flood insurance to take effect, so don't wait.

Did you know that Sacramento County takes part in a special Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) program that helps reduce the cost of flood insurance? Through FEMA, residents living in a designated Special Flood Hazard Area can save about \$446.00 per year on the full cost of a standard flood insurance policy.

Take the time to develop an evacuation plan for you and your family. This plan will be useful for any potential disasters, including fires. It's not too early to decide where you will go and what you should

What do you take if you need to leave? Remember the "five Ps" you should have ready to go if you need to evacuate:

- 1. People and pets
- 2. Papers (important documents)
- 3. Prescriptions (medication, eyeglasses, hearing aids)
- 4. Pictures (Irreplaceable memories)
- 5. Personal computer

Also, have a designated meeting place in case your family is separated. Visit Stormready.org to view evacuation maps as well as the region's flooding history.

Need sandbags? On November 1, Sacramento County will open two sandbag locations for residents in the unincorporated area. For those who live in a flood prone area, this will offer up the chance to grab sandbags prior to the rainy season. The County supplies the sand and bags, but bring a shovel. There is a 20-bag limit per

Do you live near a creek or stream? Follow the rise of nearby streams with the Water Resources Rainfall and Stream Level Information System at www.sacflood.org. This system monitors 47 different waterways in the County. If you live by one, it's one way to keep an eye on how high the

You can also receive evacuation notices during flood threats by signing up to Sacramento Alert. This Countywide system, run by the Office of Emergency Services, will keep you informed about potential flooding or other emergencies threatening your neighborhood. Be Aware. Be Prepared. Continued from page 1 ethics, and cultural diversity. Cadets also receive instruction on mental illness response and crisis intervention techniques. Training also includes vehicle patrol, crash investigation, first aid, and the apprehension of suspected violators, including those who drive under the influence of alcohol or drugs. Cadets also receive training in traffic control, report writing, recovery of stolen vehicles, assisting the motoring public, issuing citations, emergency scene management, and knowledge of various codes, including the California Vehicle Code, Penal Code and Health and Safety

A new class of more than 100 cadets will begin their 26-weeks of training at the CHP Academy that same day,

bringing the total number of cadets in training to nearly 350.

\$38 Million Catalytic Converter Theft Conspiracy

thieves and shipped them to DG Auto Parts LLC (DG Auto) in New Jersey for processing. They sold over \$38 million in stolen catalytic converters to DG Auto.

Also charged in the 2022 indictment were co-defendants Navin Khanna, aka Lovin Khanna, 40; Tinu Khanna, aka Gagan Khanna, 36; Daniel Dolan, 45; Chi Mo, aka David Mo, 37; Wright Louis Mosley, 50; and Ishu Lakra, 25, all of New Jersey who operated DG Auto in multiple locations in New Jersey. According to court documents, they knowingly purchased stolen catalytic converters and, through a "de-canning" process, extracted the precious metal powders from the catalytic core. DG Auto sold the precious metal powders it processed from California and elsewhere to a metal refinery for over \$600 million. The charges against them are only allegations; they are presumed innocent until and unless proven guilty beyond a reasonable doubt.

This case is the product of an investigation by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the Internal Revenue Service Criminal Investigation with assistance from the Sacramento County Sheriff's Department, the Sacramento Police Department, the Davis Police Department, the Auburn

Police Department, the Livermore Police Department, and the San Bernardino County Sherriff's Department. Assistant U.S. Attorney Veronica M.A. Alegría is prosecuting the case.

Tou Sue Vang, Andrew Vang, and Monica Moua are not yet scheduled to be sentenced. Andrew Vang and Monica Moua each face a maximum penalty of five years in prison. The 40 counts to which Tou Sue Vang pleaded guilty carry various maximum penalties per count ranging from 20 years in prison to five years in prison, and fines that range from \$500,000 to \$250,000 per count or twice the gross gain or loss from the crimes. The actual sentences, however, will be determined at the discretion of the court after consideration of any applicable statutory factors and the Federal Sentencing Guidelines, which take into account a number of variables.

This effort is part of an Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Forces (OCDETF) operation. OCDETF identifies, disrupts, and dismantles the highest-level criminal organizations that threaten the United States using a prosecutor-led, intelligence-driven, multiagency approach. to End Homelessness, said the high numbers of veteran homelessness result from the challenges veterans face on returning home in California's competitive housing market.

"When housing markets are unaffordable and incredibly competitive, those with the greatest needs are going to be more likely to fall out," he said.

Newsom's new strategy in the mental health bond, advocates say, should help those most in need. The California Department of Veterans Affairs estimates that half of the state's unhoused veterans suffer from some kind of behavioral health issue.

The money in the bond would go to the state's Department of Housing and Community Development, which would work with CalVet "to focus specifically on housing veterans experiencing behavioral health challenges," said Assemblymember Jacqui Irwin, the Thousand Oaks Democrat who wrote the bill that ultimately put the bond on the ballot.

Studies have shown veterans are overrepresented in the nation's homeless population. They may experience personal challenges, such as post-traumatic stress disorders or other mental health issues as well as disabilities related to their military service.

"Transitioning from that very specific culture and society to civilian life is a lifelong process," said Amy Fairweather, director of policy at the veterans advocacy group Swords to Plowshares. "If you do have any physical or mental disabilities, dealing with those and trying to re-enter civilian life can be very

California's long history of providing housing to former military service members dates to 1884, when it opened an estate in Napa County as the state's first veterans home. That site is still in operation, housing around 600 veterans on a picturesque property in wine country.

Altogether, the state now has eight veterans homes. The two largest homes are in fairly remote communities — one is in Napa County's Yountville and the second is in Barstow in the Mojave Deserts. Moving to them can mean living at a long distance from a veteran's family. That geography somewhat limits interest in the homes.

The homes account for the lion's share of CalVet's \$650 million annual budget. Some advocates have called on the state to put money into programs that would benefit people who don't necessarily want to live in a veterans home.

"The state should keep its promises to the current home residents, but as things change, the program needs to be less structured on just providing room and board for a very limited number of people and more structured on providing skilled nursing facility care for those who need it," said Ethan Rarick, executive director at Little Hoover Commission, which published a report on the veterans homes in 2017.

Outside of the veterans homes, California approved a series of bonds meant to help military service members find housing beginning in 2008. The Veterans Bond Act, passed that year, provided \$900 million to veterans through the CalVet Home Loans Program.

In 2014, California passed an initiative creating the Veterans Housing and Homelessness Program, which put \$600 million toward building multi-family homes for veterans. A second ballot initiative in 2018 gave another \$4 billion to the program.

The federal Department of Veterans Affairs, meanwhile, has kept up steady funding for housing vouchers that can provide a place to live for former troops. The Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing program, commonly known as HUD-VASH, was a centerpiece of the Bush and Obama administration's efforts to curb veterans' homelessness. It provides rental assistance to over 100,000 veterans nationally.

The number of homeless veterans in the U.S. peaked in the Great Recession, when the VA in 2007 reported some 154,000 former troops were homeless.

At that time, Fairweather of Swords to Plowshares said many of those deployed in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars were starting to come back home "to a society that wasn't prepared for it."

On top of that, they and older veterans struggled in the economic downturn, which led to more unemployment and homelessness.

"It all came together in a way that was really disadvantageous to the veterans,"

she said. Last year, the VA estimated about 33,000 veterans were homeless nationwide. According to the 2021 annual homelessness assessment report by the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development, more than half of them are over age 55. The data also shows that Black veterans are more likely to be homeless than veterans belonging to other

Advocates say veterans

can be reluctant to ask for

"When veterans ultimately fall down that hole into homelessness, what is happening along with that is that they're losing connection with friends and family, because they're ashamed that their life is falling apart and it's hard for them to ask for help," said Stephen Peck, president of the veterans support organization U.S. Vets.

Putting the money into the mental health bond comes with a tradeoff.

In advancing Newsom's mental health plan, lawmakers amended an early version of Assemblymember Irwin's veterans' housing bill that would have issued more bonds for the existing veterans' housing program. Without new funding, the program that supports construction of multi-unit veterans' housing is expected to run out of money in 2024.

Still, representatives for Newsom's ballot measure in a written statement said the bond would create more capacity to help former

"Proposition 1 adds new money for California's most vulnerable veterans without any redirection or reprioritization from the current program. Without Proposition 1, there would be zero funding for homeless veteran housing moving forward, which is why the measure is so critically needed," the statement read.

Altogether, the ballot measure going to voters includes \$6.4 billion to fund projects for behavioral health issues and those at the risk of homelessness. It also includes a proposal to adjust how the state spends money it collects for mental health services from a tax on personal income over \$1 million, aiming to direct more of the money to housing.


The \$1 billion for veterans housing will be distributed in the form of loans and grants by the Department of Housing and Community Development.

Representatives from veterans' groups say the program's success could hinge on getting the word out, and providing services that provide a path out of homelessness.

At U.S. Vets, Peck said the nonprofit strives to create a community where veterans help veterans.

"Building that community is really important," he said. "A federal veteran who's been through the process already is probably more effective than we are as social workers."



Shooting on Cornelia Way

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - Just after 1:30 a.m. on Wednesday, November 1, 2023, Sacramento County Sheriff's deputies responded to a fight at a large party at a residence on the 4100 block of Cornelia Way in North Highlands. Callers reported gunshots being fired and people running into the streets. Simultaneously, the Sheriff's Communications Center received a 9-round ShotSpotter activation from the same location.

Deputies arrived on scene quickly and located an adult male victim in the street with a wound to the head. The injury appeared to have stemmed from a physical fight. They also located a second adult male victim, with a gunshot wound to the leg. Both victims were transported to the hospital via ambulance and are expected to survive.

Crime Scene Investigators responded to the scene and gathered evidence, as deputies interviewed witnesses and attempted to locate any video near the incident. This investigation is still ongoing, and detectives are asking anyone with information about this incident to contact the

Officer-Involved Shooting on Interstate 80

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The following information is based on a preliminary and ongoing investigation, which continues to evolve as investigators interview witnesses, review physical and electronic records, and analyze forensic evidence. Understanding of the facts and circumstances may change as additional evidence is collected, processed, and analyzed.

At approximately 12:20 p.m. on Sunday, November 5, 2023, a solo motorcycle officer from the California Highway Patrol was involved in a vehicle pursuit with a silver-colored Toyota Prius near Interstate 80 and Norwood Avenue. Moments later, a Sheriff's K9 deputy joined in the pursuit to assist, along with another CHP officer. The driver, later identified as 36-year-old Zachary Wolffscott, suddenly struck an adult male riding a motorcycle with his vehicle just east of Greenback Lane on Interstate 80, also rendering his vehicle seemingly inoperable.

Wolffscott then exited his vehicle and pulled out a knife. He continued to advance toward the officers, ignoring repeated commands to stop. Two CHP officers and the Sheriff's K9 deputy fired their weapons at Wolfscott. Wolffscott was transported to a local area hospital by ambulance, where he was later pronounced deceased. The civilian motorcycle rider was also transported to a local area hospital by ambulance with serious injuries and is expected to survive.

Sheriff's Homicide Detectives, Crime Scene Investigators, and CHP Investigators responded to the scene and began their investigation. The investigation into this incident will be conducted by the Sheriff's Homicide Bureau and Professional Standards Division, which is standard practice for any officer-involved shooting that occurs in the Sheriff's Department's jurisdiction. An independent review of the incident will be conducted by the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office.

In accordance with the Sheriff's Department policies and procedures, the deputy involved in the shooting will be placed on administrative leave pending the investigation. The Sheriff's Office will publish a community briefing video that will include body camera video and other information in compliance with state law.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - At approximately 3:50 a.m., on Thursday, November 2, 2023, Sacramento County Sheriff's deputies assigned to the Central Patrol Division were conducting routine patrol when they observed a house on fire on the 5200 block of Del Norte Boulevard in South Sacramento. The Sacramento Fire Department responded and located a male victim inside the residence. They were able to pull the

victim outside and begin life-saving measures, but the victim was declared deceased at the scene.

Upon further inspection of the deceased, fire personnel discovered a gunshot wound to his torso, prompting further investigation from law enforcement. Sheriff's homicide detectives and Crime Scene Investigators responded to the scene, interviewed witnesses, and gathered evidence.

A 50-year-old California Mass Murder **Case Forever Etched in my Consciousness**

Occasionally I'm asked which event - which story – has been the most memorable of a journalistic career that's spanned more than 60 years, three-quarters of them writing about California politics.

No political story, however, occupies a bigger place in my consciousness than the execution-style murders of nine people, two entire families, in the bedroom of a rural home near Lodi 50 years ago today, which I covered for the Sacramento Union.

It was the home of Walter Parkin, owner of a small food store in Victor, his wife, Joanne, and their two children, 11-year-old Lisa and Robert, 9.

The two Parkin children were lying in the master bedroom's bed, both shot to death. Their parents and five other bodies were found in a walk-in closet, all bound and methodically murdered. They were the Parkins' neighbors, Richard and Wanda Earl, their daughter, Debbie, who had been the Parkins' babysitter, Debbie's 15-year-old brother, Ricky, and her boyfriend, Mark Lang.

Authorities had absolutely no clues as to who had killed them, although

they quickly discovered that the Parkins' store had reportedly been robbed of about \$3,000 in cash.

Nevertheless, the case was quickly solved because San Joaquin County Sheriff Mike Canlis had a hunch. He asked contacts at the FBI about fugitives roaming the countryside and was told that a warrant had just been issued for Willie Steelman, who had spent most of his life in the Lodi area, and Douglas Gretzler for killing two people in a mobile home in the Arizona desert.

Canlis released an old San Joaquin County mugshot of Steelman, who had a history of minor crimes, saying he thought it possible that Steelman was involved.

The mugshot was printed at the top of the Sacramento Union's front page the next morning, and a clerk at the Clunie Hotel in downtown Sacramento recognized Steelman as one of two young men who had checked in the day before.

Cops scooped up Gretzler when he returned to the hotel and he told them where they could find Steelman. He was visiting a masseuse that the two had met while spending some of the loot at a massage parlor. After a brief standoff at her apartment house, Steelman surrendered.


A few days later, I obtained summaries of the their interrogations, and wrote that they had killed 17 people in a 17-day spree of death that began in Arizona with the mobile home killings, moved to California, then back to Arizona and finally back to California because Steelman knew that the Parkins' store kept a lot of money to cash checks of farmworkers.

After months of legal wrangling, it was agreed that Steelman and Gretzler would be declared guilty in California and shipped to Arizona which, unlike California, had the death penalty. They were convicted of murdering a young couple whose car they were driving when arrested in California, nine others and sentenced to death. Steelman died in 1986 of cirrhosis but Gretzler sat on death row for nearly 25 years before

being executed in 1998. I wasn't done with the story, however. Jack Earl, whose aunt, uncle and two cousins had been murdered, decided to satisfy his curiosity about the case by writing a book. I helped him with accounts of court battles and documents I had preserved. He had even visited Gretzler on death row and attended his execution. Earl's book, "Where Sadness Breathes," was published in 2013. I also helped a woman who produced a documentary video about the case and who had also interviewed Gretzler.

Fifty years is a long time, but the horrific events that began on Nov. 6, 1973, will forever be etched in my consciousness

Let's say your employer will match three percent. Since the goal is 15 percent, that still leaves you with some work to do. You've got three percent of your own money already going into retirement, so then you could look at a Roth IRA. If the Roth, plus what you invested previously to get the match doesn't equal 15 percent, then you could look at a 403(b), or go back to your 401(k) to hit the 15 percent mark.

And remember, if you're going to reach your retirement goals, you can't do it alone. King Solomon, one of the wisest men who ever lived, wrote: "Where there is no counsel, the people fall; But in the multitude of

counselors there is safety" (Proverbs 11:14 NKJV). That's why you need a quality financial advisor—one with the heart of a teacher to help you navigate complicated financial issues, and guide you toward the kind of retirement you want.

Do you see what I'm saying here, Carlotta? I want you-not the company you work for-to control your financial destiny. I want you to be able to retire with dignity, and enjoy life after working hard and saving. The responsibility for making that happens falls to you!

Wet Year Helps Colorado River, but Imperial Farmers Still Conserving Water

A consensus plan agreed to last spring by states in the Colorado River's Lower Basin should keep sufficient water in the river's key reservoirs for the next three years. Despite the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation reporting an improved water outlook after 2023 rains, implementing the plan will require farmers to voluntarily use much less water over the next three years. In California, most of the water savings will come from farmers in the Imperial Valley. "We're going to be aiming for unprecedented levels of conservation," said Tina Shields, water manager for the Imperial Irrigation District.

Market Pressures May Necessitate Decline In Winegrape Acreage

The president of a leading California winegrape marketing association says growers in the state need to remove 50,000 acres of winegrapes to balance supply with decreasing market demand. Jeff Bitter, president of Fresno-based Allied Grape Growers, cited several short- and long-term factors that have combined to reduce demand for California wine. A longer-term trend is that younger adults are simply drinking less wine. "We have fragile demand, and we have a lot of headwinds," Bitter said. He said growers may be at risk of having an oversupply of winegrapes. Sacramento summit focuses on water challenges, water-rights system

Some 150 water managers, government officials, farmers, environmentalists and others gathered in Sacramento last week to collaborate on some of the state's most challenging water issues. The Water Education Foundation annual water summit came after heavy rains boosted reservoirs in 2023, following three years of drought that brought water curtailment orders and calls for modernizing the water-rights system. Eric Oppenheimer of the California State Water Resources said the water-rights system "is a challenging system to manage" and requires better data collection.

App From UC Davis Researchers Can Help Farmers Gather Crop Data

new web application could help farmers get more out of drones used to gather data on farms. The When2Fly app - developed by University of California, Davis, researchers - aims to help drone operators on farms steer clear of glare-like areas called hotspots that can tamper with the data drones collect. Creators of the app - Alireza Pourreza, an associate professor, and postdoctoral researcher Hamid Jafarbiglu - said the technology can help growers allocate their resources more efficiently in managing water use or applying nitrogen. ★



How Military Spouses Can Find Connection and Support

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) - Military spouses sacrifice stable careers and time with loved ones due to constant moves to new duty stations, and hold down the fort at home during their spouses' deployments. That's why the USO prioritizes providing community and support to military spouses. Here are some of the ways their programs are making an impact:

Friendship: USO Coffee Connections are monthly gatherings where military spouses can relax, craft, do yoga, swap advice and go on outings. The goal is building friendships among military spouses. When Jenna King's husband Tech Sgt. Howard King was forward deployed to Poland with less than 24 hours' notice, she says she found a home away from home at USO Lakenheath in the U.K., which has been hosting Coffee Connections since the war in Ukraine began. Because of the warm welcome and sense of community she found there, she and her children visit the center often. "There's something for each of us here," she said. "Being overseas, friends who are like family are the biggest blessing. And you can't turn down free coffee and snacks!"

Support for new parents: Military parents are often away from family and friends during their pregnancies and first months as new parents. USO Special Delivery presented by Johnson's are baby showers that provide a touch of home. They allow expectant parents and military spouses to connect and bond, and 72% of participants this year have stated in feedback surveys that this is the only baby shower they will receive. More than 20,000 parents have been served through this program since its 2013 launch, including 1st Lt. Erika Pearson, an activeduty service member in the Air Force. She knew her spouse, 1st Lt. Drew Pearson, could potentially be deployed around her due date. "The USO helped me make friends that I could rely on if my husband were to miss the birth, and offered me resources I could reach out to, if needed," says 1st Lt.

Professional development: Because of frequent relocations, military spouses often have trouble finding their professional footing. That's where the USO can step in. Connecting service members and military

spouses to resources that focus on employment, education, financial readiness, mentorship and veterans benefits, the USO Transition Program helps military families build a roadmap to achieve their goals and positions them for success throughout the duration of their service, as well as in their post-military life.

Support while solo-parenting: The burden of solo-parenting can become

especially apparent during deployments, when military family members must struggle to find a new normal. For Tessa Michaelson Schmidt, connection with her husband Brett, a lieutenant colonel in the U.S. Army Reserve, became complicated when he was deployed to Kuwait where there is an eighthour time difference, unreliable Wi-Fi on base, and the added pressure of being deployed near the

frontlines. Because they and their two children have an incredible passion for reading, the USO Reading Program has been a blessing. Deployed service members can record themselves reading a book to their child. Then, the recording and a copy of the book are sent to that service member's family.

"They have a real response when they hear his voice, and then we get the books in the mail, and they know they're books from daddy," says Schmidt, who explained that her children will often watch the videos of their father just before bed, so that in a way, he is present for story time.

The life of a military spouse is undeniably challenging. By the USO fostering community and providing sources of connection, military spouses can feel supported and empowered.

California Invests \$3.7 Billion Towards **Transportation Infrastructure**

Caltrans News Release

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - The California Transportation Commission (CTC) this week allocated more than \$3.7 billion for projects to rebuild the state's transportation infrastructure to enhance safety and create more convenient options for travelers.

More than \$2.3 billion is from the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act of 2021 (IIJA), the bulk of which is going to over 600 cities, counties and regional agencies to improve bridges, travel times and air quality; reduce planet-warming pollution; increase highway and rail safety; and provide transportation services. Nearly \$169 million in funding is from Senate Bill (SB) 1, the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017.

"These investments will help California maintain and build a safer, more reliable and more climate-resilient transportation system," said Caltrans Director Tony Tavares. "Commuters, bicyclists, pedestrians, and freight movers in local communities will all benefit as we continue to improve and rebuild our infrastructure."

Projects the CTC approved include: State Route 162: \$3.1 million in SB 1 funds to develop a project for pavement, drainage, curb ramp, traffic signal and signage improvements from west of Interstate 5 to Tehama Street in Willows.

State Route 162: \$2.3 million in SB 1 funds to develop a project for pavement, drainage, guardrail and signage improvements from the Feather River Bridge to Foothill Boulevard in Oroville.

State Route 49: \$31.9 million in IIJA funds to construct two roundabouts and a concrete median barrier from 0.3 mile south of Lorenson Road/Florence Lane to 0.3 mile north of Lone Star Road near Auburn.

Interstate 5: \$2.2 million to develop a project to reconstruct the northbound Maxwell Safety Roadside Rest Area in Colusa County.

Interstate 80: Nevada County: \$14.8 million to grind pavement, place polyester concrete, replace concrete slabs and striping and rehabilitate drainage systems from the Placer County line to State Route 89 in the Truckee area.

Interstate 80: Nevada County: \$13.1 million to grind pavement, place polyester concrete, replace concrete slabs and striping and rehabilitate drainage systems from State Route 267 to the Sierra County line.

Interstate 80: Nevada and Placer counties: \$8.5 million to grind pavement, place polyester concrete, replace concrete slabs and striping and rehabilitate drainage systems near the Crystal Lakes and Kingvale areas.

Interstate 80: Placer County: \$13.1 million to grind pavement, place polyester concrete, replace concrete slabs and striping and rehabilitate drainage systems near the Emigrant Gap area.

Interstate 5: Sacramento: \$18.3 million for pavement work between the American River Bridge and Arena Boulevard.

Town of Truckee: \$700,000 to purchase up to six new electric transit vehicles for the town's Microtransit fleet.


Yolo County Transit: \$1.36 million toward a project to relocate and grade the Union Pacific Railroad Martinez subdivision crossing.

City of Paradise: \$3.8 million in SB 1 funds for an active transportation project to construct new sidewalks, curbs and gutters and Class II bicycles lanes in the downtown area along Fir and Birch streets as well as portions of Foster Road, Black Olive Drive and Elliott Road.

Sacramento County: \$1.98 million in SB 1 funds for pavement, curb, gutter and sidewalk repairs and new ramps on various streets in the Arden Arcade, Vineyard and Carmichael communities.

The IIJA, also known as the "Bipartisan Infrastructure Law," is a once-in-a-generation investment in our nation's infrastructure to improve the sustainability and resiliency of our energy, water, broadband and transportation systems. California has received more than \$22.6 billion since the IIJA's passage in November 2021.

SB 1 provides \$5 billion in transportation funding annually that is shared equally between the state and local agencies. Road projects progress through construction phases more quickly based on the availability of SB 1 funds, including projects that are partially funded by SB 1.


