WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Santa Claus received a little bit of help on Saturday from the West Sacramento Trail Riders Association (WSTRA), a group of horse owners and enthusiasts in West Sacramento. At "best guess" the group said they'd been helping Santa each year for the past fifteen years with their Trot for Tots toy drive. Every year they place decorated horse barrels at a few locations a week or so before Thanksgiving to collect new, unwrapped toys to help some local families give their children the magic that the holidays should bring to everyone. This year, those businesses included Wild West Feed,

Lenise's Café and Starbucks near Lake Washington Boulevard.

On the way to meeting up, one of the horses that was going to be included in the event apparently got a little nervous about the traffic and business of what was going on and took off. They were able to catch him though, and returned him home. The rest of the group met up at Lenise's Café with their horses decorated for the holidays so that they could ride the horses down Jefferson Boulevard to West Sacramento Fire Station 45 and deliver the toys that they had collected.

The toys will stay with the fire department for a week or so until one of Santa's helpers picks them up and takes them to one of our local

organizations for distribution. "We come out every year. Each year our group buys around \$400 in toys, and each year the West Sacramento community donates at least double that in the short time we have the barrels out," Said Melanie Haage. "It would be great if next year we had more locations that would let us place barrels." Members of the WSTRA said that they wanted to thank the community for all of the donations, and that they look forward to doing it again next year. WSTRA promotes education and recreational opportunities for people interested in the preservation and protection of open space for trail corridors for equestrian use in Yolo County.

Caltrans Holds Public Meeting

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - Residents of West Sacramento and surrounding areas were invited to the public meeting hosted by Caltrans. This meeting was an information gathering event for Caltrans to find out the thoughts, feelings and questions that the public has about a possible toll lane being added to the causeway for traffic congestion relief.

The meeting was held at the West Sacramento Community Center, behind Turner Library. With 15-20 Caltrans employees, designers, project managers and more, there was someone there that could likely answer whatever question you may have about the project. The room was set up with printed poster boards in a variety of

subjects regarding the project. According to the Caltrans Fact Sheet given out at the meeting, the purpose of the project is to improve mobility on the I-80 and US 50 corridors in Yolo and Sacramento counties. During peak times traffic gets severely congested around UC Davis, on the causeway, at the Highway 80/50 interchange, at I-5 and ramps that enter that corridor. This leads to severe traffic



congestion, accidents and stop-and-go conditions.

Caltrans believes that by building this toll lane, it will relieve congestion by opening up another lane. However, they are not just adding another lane. With a toll lane, you have to pay to drive in that lane. In the Bay Area, to use the toll lanes you have to pay approximately \$50 for a transponder that you put in your car (and you still have to pay to use the lane). On that transponder you can click a little button to indicate if you are driving alone, or with multiple passengers. (Cars with three or more people can use the lane for free.) The technology along the route is able to see how many people are in your car so that it knows the correct amount to charge you. It has not been decided yet, but Yolo County may use a similar type of

system. The Caltrans Fact Sheet says that by adding this lane it will improve freight mobility and public transportation. However, it would only affect freight mobility if a significant number of people pay to use that lane, and it frees up space on the existing road. The new lane will be built on the fast-lane side of the road. Truckers have to stay in the right two lanes.

Caltrans says that there is a need to improve transit access and viability for Yolo Bus, Solano Transit and upcoming electric busses between the UCD campus and UCD Medical Center. A toll lane is not the only option. Though it is definitely the option that they are reaching for, it could possibly be decided that it could be a carpool lane.

Caltrans says that in that corridor there have been 4,971 collisions, 1,807 injuries and 39 fatalities in the last ten years. The project also calls for a new bike/ pedestrian path, as well as improving the existing path. They plan to build a new 300space transfer station and that all of this will save up to 60 minutes of time. They plan for concrete medians, changeable message signs, closed circuit TV and ramp metering.

The cost of this project is in the range of \$230,000,000 - \$465,000,000. The timeline is as follows: Environmental Study Spring 2023, Design Complete Summer 2024, Construction Begins Fall 2024, Construction Ends Fall 2027. If you missed the public meeting in West Sacramento, there will be another chance in Davis on December 13, 2023. Funding Secured for New

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) -Funding has been approved for Sacramento State to create an events center that will be home for the University's men's and women's basketball teams, women's volleyball and gymnastics teams, and intramural and club sports competitions. It also will be a venue for entertainment, arts and guest speakers.

The event center is expected to be completed and begin hosting events in fall 2024.

The facility is part of President Luke Wood's vision to better serve the campus community and to bring the Sacramento regional community onto campus.

Members of the Board of Directors for Union WELL Inc., the nonprofit organization that oversees the University Union and The WELL fitness and health facility, on Nov. 15, unanimously approved a resolution to provide up to \$5.2 million from reserves

On Nov. 9, Associated Students Inc. (ASI), the University's student governing body, passed a resolution favoring the project. That action followed ASI receiving a letter from Wood championing his plan to pursue the event center project.

"The (Union WELL) board's decision demonstrates that we are on the rise," Wood said. "Sacramento State is the only public university in the capital of the state with the fifth-largest economy in the world, and we are acting like it. I'm grateful that the Union WELL board supported our vision to position our University to better support student intercollegiate athletics, club sports, and recreation sports, and arts and culture."

The project will provide another use for existing space that holds four courts that host recreational and intramural sports. Those

courts and their recreational use will remain, but they will be flanked by seating that can be rolled out and retracted to accommodate larger anticipated crowds for NCAA competition. Seating capacity remains to be determined. New lighting, scoreboards and video boards, and public address system will be

added. The University is partnering with Otto Construction and LPAS Architecture + Design for the design and construction of the facility.

Director of Athletics Mark Orr called the Union WELL Inc. board's funding decision "a significant step toward achieving the goal of having a new events center on campus."

"We are grateful for the vision of President Wood and to collaborate with terrific campus partners in ASI and the Union WELL," Orr said. "This venue will not only benefit Hornet student-athletes, it will provide a space for all students to come together as a community and engage in events that will enhance their college experience."

YOLO REGION, CA (MPG) -Yolo Basin Foundation's Flyway Nights speaker series Thursday, December 7, 2023, highlights the work of River Partners to restore habitat for the Monarch butterfly Danaus plexippus. The program will be a Zoom presentation sharing their work in the Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area and beyond.

River Partners in collaboration with The Xerces Society and Washington State University designed a project that not only aimed breeding habitat across the state of California, but to also better understand their behavior. This presentation will discuss monarch ecology, the experimental design guidelines of the project, address the lessons learned from the project, and next steps we can take.

Halie Goeman is a Restoration and Wildlife Biologist with River Partners in Sacramento. She has been working with monarch butterflies since 2017 and is passionate about monarch ecology and conservation.

Teaching Conflict Resolution: Make a Radical Difference in Kids' Lives

SAN DIEGO, CA (MPG) - A crucial piece for the overall well-being of any kid is the quality of their peer relationships. But. what happens when a kid experiences conflict or disagreement between friends?

Helping them build the critical skills of conflict resolution will enable them to build strong bonds.

Without strong relationships, research shows that kids are more likely to engage in dangerous, risky behaviors in order to find the acceptance they crave.

Conflict is awkward. Uncomfortable. Distressing.

Overwhelming.

Vulnerable. And, on the other side of it is all the good stuff — connection, intimacy, commitment, support, and love.

We want every kid to have every opportunity to thrive in life and live a life that's rich, deep, and filled with love. So, we have to teach kids how to resolve conflict. It's not something that you just pick up. It has

to be deliberately modeled, taught, and affirmed. By us, the adults in their lives.

Here are 3 principles for conflict resolution:

1. Recognize there's conflict:

The first step to resolving conflict is actually recognizing that there's a break in the relationship. This part is subtle.

We're always tempted to act like or convince ourselves that nothing's really wrong. But, the more self-aware and honest we become, the more we're able to recognize when something's been damaged and needs repair.

2. Take accountability and own your part:

It's pretty rare for a conflict to be completely one-sided. In fact, 98% of the time it takes two to tango. For whatever reason you contributed to the disagreement, hurt feelings, or misunderstanding — own it.

3. Commit to repairing:

Once everyone has had the chance to share their feelings and perspective, talk through ways to repair the relationship and avoid repeating the same patterns.

It might be an apology and a hug. It might look like a commitment to show up on time or be more honest with each other earlier. It might even be taking some space for a while to allow yourselves some time to work through your feelings. Or, perhaps, this is the time to shift the dynamics of the friendship.

It's difficult to imagine someone going through life and building authentic, supportive relationships, the kind that everyone wants and everyone needs in order to thrive, without learning how to practice conflict resolution.

What are the other options? Shallow friendships where we avoid getting too close? Shutting down friendships and moving on when things get uncomfortable or awkward?

Resolving conflict isn't for the faint of heart. It's not easy, it's incredibly vulnerable, but on the other side of a conflict is a deeper connection, stronger commitment, and a more meaningful life.

It's worth it. We have to teach our kids how to resolve conflict.

One thousand more Yolo County children will receive a free book every month from birth through age 5 from United Way California Capital Region, which manages the Dolly Parton Imagination Library in Yolo County. According to the Yolo County Office of Education, only 5% of elementary and middle school students test at or above reading proficiency level. Nearly 45% of students are economically disadvantaged.

Sex Offenders Get Compliance Checks

Yolo County District Attorney's Office News Release

WOODLAND, CA (MPG) -On November 14th and 15th, Yolo County law enforcement conducted compliance checks and address verifications on over 300 registered sex offenders. "Operation Vigilance" is a program that started 14 years ago with the goal to protect Yolo County community members by ensuring that those who must register as sex offenders who live in the County are complying with all laws and applicable parole or probation directives.

Over 80 law enforcement personnel from the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation, Davis Police Department, Yolo County Probation Department, Woodland Parole Unit, California Department of Justice Human Trafficking and Sexual Predator Apprehension Team, Sutter County Probation, US courts Federal Probation, US Marshals Service Fugitive Task Force, West Sacramento Police Department, Yolo County District Attorney's Criminal Investigation Bureau, Yolo County Sheriff's Office, and the Woodland Police Department participated in this joint operation.

Many of the individuals who are required to register were previously convicted of rape, child molestation or possession of child pornography. Law enforcement personnel went to the residence on file of every registered sex offender with a physical address in Yolo County.

One unique aspect of

"Operation Vigilance" is that while officers are making the home visits, forensic examiners search the computers, smart phones, and other digital storage devices for potential violations. Computer forensic investigators from the Yolo County District Attorney's Office High Technology Unit and examiners from other participating agencies worked together to conduct these specialized searches. Additionally, the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation provided 11 K9 Officers with canines trained specifically to detect electronics to enhance these searches. During the operation, 80 electronic devices were searched, and an additional eight electronic items were seized for further forensic examination.

Approximately 94% of registered sex offenders within Yolo County were found to be in compliance



with their sex offender registration requirements. Additional investigation by law enforcement will be conducted for those not in compliance. Three offenders on parole were arrested during this operation for parole violations and fresh charges which included Possession of Drug Paraphernalia, Possession of a Controlled Substance, Possession of a Firearm, Possession of Ammunition, and Possession of a Large Capacity Magazine.

Operation Vigilance

followed the Yolo County District Attorney's Office and West Sacramento Police Department's participation in Operation Trick or Treat, a collaboration of regional Law Enforcement Agencies that ran separate operations to combat sex trafficking. On October 24, 2023, a one-day operation was conducted in Yolo County which targeted sex purchasers in an effort to combat human trafficking in the area. The Yolo County operation resulted in the arrest of five

individuals for solicitation of prostitution.

West Sacramento Police Department Chief Rob Strange commented; "Collaborative efforts among policing agencies are key to keeping our communities safe. Despite struggles with staffing at so many policing agencies, our region remains steadfast in its focus on known offenders — especially those who have demonstrated predatory behaviors."

District Attorney Jeff

Reisig praised the efforts of all Yolo County law enforcement agencies who continuously monitor these individuals. "We conducted a compliance check of 100% of the sex offenders that have a permanent address, and the good news is that 94% were in compliance," said Reisig. "Operation Vigilance continues to serve as an additional deterrent to those who must register as sex offenders who may be

prone to re-offend."

How you can protect yourself:

-Never purchase a prepaid card to avoid service disconnection or shutoff. Visit pge.com to learn all the authorized ways you can pay your bill.

-If a person threatens

immediate disconnection or shutoff of service without prior notification, you should hang up the phone, delete the email, or shut the

-Signing up for an online account at pge.com is another safeguard. Not only can you log in to check your balance and payment history, you can also sign up for recurring payments,

paperless billing and helpful alerts.

-If you suspect you have been the victim of fraud or feel threatened during contact with a scammer, contact local law enforcement.

Newsom Chides Ohio GOP for Trying to Change Voting Rules Yet Adopts the Same Tactics

After Ohio voters approved a state constitutional amendment to protect abortion rights last month, California Gov. Gavin Newsom chided Ohio's Republicans for trying to change voting rules to thwart the abortion measure.

GOP political figures had placed a measure on an August election ballot that would have raised the minimum vote needed to pass an abortion rights amendment from a simple majority to 60%, but it had been defeated.

What happened – or rather didn't happen – in August was pivotal to what happened three months later. The abortion rights amendment was passed with 56.6% of the votes cast. In other words, had the anti-abortion Republicans succeeded in raising the approval threshold to 60%, November's measure would have failed.

"Here's a tale of a party out of touch with the American people," Newsom declared on X, formerly Twitter. "Ohio Republicans were so desperate to block abortion access they tried to change the rules in a special election and require 60% support to pass constitutional amendments. But they failed.

"Then, they tried to block a ballot initiative to protect abortion rights. They failed again. Now, they are claiming election interference and are even saying they will strip the Courts of power to overturn the will of voters. Spoiler: You're going to fail, again. They really can't seem to take a hint."

Newsom's crowing about Republican manipulation of voting rules was particularly noteworthy because he and his fellow Democrats in the Legislature are trying to do precisely the same thing to block a business-backed ballot measure that would make it more difficult to raise state and local taxes.

The tax measure is scheduled to appear on the November ballot next year. It would require voter approval of any new taxes passed by the Legislature and two-thirds voter approval for local taxes.

The California Constitution currently says that statewide ballot measures need only a simple majority of voters to approve. However, the Legislature has placed another constitutional amendment on the same ballot that, if passed, would require any measure to increase voting thresholds for taxes to reach the same thresholds themselves.

Thus, it would raise the voting requirement for the tax measure to two-thirds, making it much more difficult, or perhaps impossible, to pass.

It's part of a multipronged drive by the tax measure's opponents - Newsom, Democratic legislative leaders and public employee unions – to block it from appearing on the ballot or gaining approval.

Newsom, et al, have also filed a lawsuit asking

the state Supreme Court to remove the business-backed tax measure from the ballot, contending that it is not merely an amendment to the state constitution but rather a "revision." The court has agreed to hear the case.

While constitutional amendments may be placed before voters either by initiative petition or legislative action, any revisions must be proposed by the Legislature through a constitutional revision commission or by calling a statewide constitutional convention.


Newsom, through a spokesperson, says he is challenging the validity of the tax measure because it would "effectively block the state's ability to quickly respond to major challenges."

Were the state Supreme Court to declare that the tax measure is a constitutional revision, it would be game over. However, the legal dividing line between a constitutional amendment and a revision is hazy, and the court might postpone the issue until after voters have spoken next November.

One can rationally debate the merits or negative aspects of making it more difficult to raise taxes, but trying to strangle such a measure before voters have their say, as occurred in Ohio and is now occurring in California, is troublesome.

Whatever happens – or doesn't – Newsom's criticism of Ohio's Republicans for trying to bend the rules mid-game is pure hypocrisy.

Dear Ramona,

I think you're a very perceptive lady. You said your husband grew up in poverty, right? So, what I'm hearing is the cards represent almost a security blanket for him—a financial security blanket. I get that, but here's the thing. If you had a fully funded emergency fund of three to six months of expenses sitting in the bank, I'm talking about hard cold cash, you'd have the security of knowing that the expense of a new air conditioning unit or transmission for the car would only be a minor inconvenience. And, you'd be able to cover it easily without going back into debt.

into debt.

Instead of actively trying to convince him of something, a better route might be to sit down together and talk through the whole thing. Explain to him you think you know why he feels the way he does, and that it's understandable. Then, ask him if there's a reasonable amount you two could have in the bank that would help him

stop worrying. Discuss it, agree on an amount and then agree to cut the cards up and close the accounts when you reach that figure. Remind him, too, you'd still have your debit cards in hand in the event of an emergency.

Above all, Ramona, make sure you work together. Be patient and understanding. If he has recognized the wisdom of getting rid of debt and taking control of your finances, he's moving in the right direction!

Social Security Matters *We're Planning to Claim at 62; What Do We Need to Know?*

Dear Rusty: My wife (born May 1962) and I (born April 1963) are retired and will soon be looking to start collecting our Social Security as we each hit 62. As this is new to us, I'm wondering what things we may need to be aware of or consider as we get closer to her 62 birthday in May. Any advice or information will be appreciated! Signed: Planning Ahead

Dear Planning: If you and your wife are both retired from working and have decided to start your (reduced) Social Security as soon as you are eligible at age 62, then there is nothing you need to do in advance of applying. The Social Security retirement benefit amount for each of you will be determined by your individual lifetime earnings record and your age when you claim. If either of you will be eligible for a spousal boost from the other, that will be automatically applied when both of you are collecting.

If your wife plans to claim her Social Security as soon as she is eligible, she should apply for her benefits about 3 months in advance and choose the option on the application which states "I

want benefits beginning with the earliest possible month and will accept an age-related reduction." For information, an applicant must be 62 for an entire month to get benefits, so your wife's first month of eligibility will be June 2024. Social Security deals only in whole months and pays benefits in the month following the month earned; so if your wife's birthday is between the 11th and 20th of the month her first Social Security payment will be received in her bank account on the third Wednesday of July. All subsequent payments will be on that same schedule. Then, when it's time for you to claim, you should follow the same process as your wife and, if either of you is entitled to a higher amount as a spouse, it will be automatically applied when your benefits later start.

Applying for benefits is a relatively simple process if done online at www. ssa.gov/apply. Note that to apply online your wife will need to first create her personal "my Social Security" account, which is easy to do at www.ssa.gov/myaccount. To prepare for applying later, you can also create your personal online account now (it's required to apply online), at which you will see what your estimated benefit will be at different ages. Of course, your wife first (and later you) can also call Social Security at 1.800.772.1213 to request an appointment to apply for SS retirement benefits in person. Applications which are not done online are usually taken over the phone vs. requiring

a visit to your local Social

Security office, but applying

online is, by far, the most efficient method (you can link to the application process from your online account).

One important thing to be aware of: By claiming at age 62, the monthly payment for each of you will be 70% of what it would be at your full retirement age (FRA) and that is a permanent reduction. If you expect at least average longevity - about 84 for you and 87 for your wife - and if it is financially feasible, then waiting longer to claim would yield a higher monthly amount as well as the most in cumulative lifetime benefits. For those with an FRA of 67, SS retirement benefits claimed at FRA are 30% higher than at 62 and, if claimed at 70 are 75% more than at 62. And, although the decision on when to claim is always personal, a married couple should also evaluate their joint needs when deciding.

One final word of caution: although you and your wife are now retired from working, be aware that if you claim SS benefits before your FRA and return to work, Social Security has an earnings test which limits how much you can earn before some benefits are taken away. "SALTBURN" CREEPY WEIRDNESS; "MONK'S LAST CASE" ON PEACOCK

A Film and TV Review by Tim Riley

"SALTBURN" RATED R

Shades of "The Talented Mr. Ripley" and "Brideshead Revisited" inform the dynamic at play in the psychological thriller "Saltburn," written and directed by Emerald Fennell, who garnered much attention with the same duties for "Promising Young Woman."

As with the films of a similar bent, "Saltburn" leans into the class divide where a character on a lower rung, fueled most likely by sociopathic tendencies, seeks to ingratiate himself with the upper class.

Set in 2006, scholarship student Oliver Quick (Barry Keoghan) arrives as a freshman at Oxford University. His humble origins set him apart from aristocratic students entitled by a sense of noblesse oblige.

Oliver's initial friendship with a nerdy math major is quickly discarded when he sets his sights on tall, handsome Felix Catton (Jacob Elordi), the big man on campus who looks like a male model at a fashion show.

Finagling his way into Felix's inner circle, the needy Oliver, who is actually rather creepy, proves to be manipulative by fabricating a story of lower-class upbringing by parents that are portraved as addicts.

For reasons that are elusive and unfathomable, Felix takes a shine to Oliver, letting him into the sanctum of entitled Oxford students that you must wonder how they have time to study given nightly forays to the local pub.

When summer rolls around, Felix invites Oliver to be his guest at their palatial home Saltburn, a massive estate that is so gorgeous that it must have once been the residence of royalty.

The Catton family proves to be eccentric. The patriarch is the oblivious Sir James Catton (Richard E. Grant), while the mother Elspeth (Rosamund Pike) is hilariously clueless and good for some choice one-liners.

Felix's unstable sister Venetia (Alison Oliver) is a train-wreck and Carey Mulligan's Pamela is a houseguest who has overstayed her welcome. American cousin Farleigh (Archie Madekwe) is suspicious of Oliver's intentions, and with

"MR. MONK'S LAST CASE: A MONK MOVIE"

Fans of Tony Shalhoub's Adrian Monk, a detective formerly with the San Francisco Police Department, should rejoice in his

return in a feature-length movie fourteen years later after the eight-season run of "Monk" on the USA Network. Peacock brings Monk back in a post-pan-

demic world in "Mr. Monk's Last Case: A

Monk Movie." To understand his character, it is important to note that the "Monk" series was about a former police detective coping with the aftermath of his wife's death in a mysterious car

During the run of the series, Monk suffered an extreme obsessive-compulsive disorder that caused him to lose his job and being unable to leave his house for years. With some help, he returned to living, of sorts, working as a private eye and consultant to the police department.

In the later years of the series, Traylor Howard's Natalie Teeger was Monk's assistant, helping him to fitfully overcome some of eccentricities. In the movie, she's in the same role, observing that Monk has a fear of "germs, needles, birds, then heights."

Actually, there's a whole lot more that induces Monk's obsessive concerns. At an opening crime scene, Monk worries about whether he turned off the stove and then speaks of the stove as "one of the longest relationships of my life and certainly one of the happiest."

Peter Falk as a detective in "Columbo" was an eccentric character with a shambling manner, but he never came close to the obsessions that plagued Monk. And yet, Monk's anxieties are part of the fun of his character who seems oblivious to his grating idiosyncrasies.

Being a germaphobe can be debilitating in his line of work, but his compulsive behavior is well-suited to grasping the finer details of a crime scene and engaging in painstaking problem-solving.

Monk's last case turns out to be the tragic death of Griffin (Austin Scott), the fiancé of his stepdaughter Molly (Caitlin McGee), in a bungee jumping accident that may be something more sinister.

In fact, Griffin's an investigate journalist who's digging around the shady dealings of Rick Eden (James Purefoy), a well-connected wealthy industrialist who has unscrupulous thugs on payroll acting like contract killers.

Of course, Monk has to overcome his wide range of phobias to solve a very personal case involving Molly, a journalist getting ready for a lifetime of happiness in her upcoming nuptials.

Several regulars from the series return, including Melora Hardin as the ghost of Trudy Monk; Ted Levine as former Homicide Captain Leland Stottlemeyer, who worked with Monk; and Hector Elizondo as Dr. Neven Bell, Monk's psychiatrist.

A mere passing acquaintance with Shalhoub's Adrian Monk is all one needs to enjoy a lovable character with a range of obsessions that are endearingly amus-"Mr. Monk's Last Case: A Monk Movie" proves that a nearly a decadeand-a-half absence of Monk's story has not diminished its appeal.

How Military Spouses Can Find Connection and Support

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA (MPG) -

Military spouses sacrifice stable careers and time with loved ones due to constant moves to new duty stations, and hold down the fort at home during their spouses' deployments. That's why the USO prioritizes providing community and support to military spouses. Here are some of the ways their programs are making an impact:

Friendship: USO Coffee Connections are monthly gatherings where military spouses can relax, craft, do yoga, swap advice and go on outings. The goal is building friendships among military spouses. When Jenna King's husband Tech Sgt. Howard King was forward deployed to Poland with less than 24 hours' notice, she says

she found a home away from home at USO Lakenheath in the U.K., which has been hosting Coffee Connections since the war in Ukraine began. Because of the warm welcome and sense of community she found there, she and her children visit the center often. "There's something for each of us here," she said. "Being overseas, friends who are like family are the biggest blessing. And you can't turn down free coffee and snacks!"

Support for New Parents: Military parents are often away from family and friends during their pregnancies and first months as new parents. USO Special Delivery presented by Johnson's are baby showers that provide a touch of home. They allow expectant parents and military spouses to connect and bond, and 72% of participants

this year have stated in feedback surveys that this is the only baby shower they will receive. More than 20,000 parents have been served through this program since its 2013 launch, including 1st Lt. Erika Pearson, an activeduty service member in the Air Force. She knew her spouse, 1st Lt. Drew Pearson, could potentially be deployed around her due date. "The USO helped me make friends that I could rely on if my husband were to miss the birth, and offered me resources I could reach out to, if needed," says 1st Lt. Pearson.

Professional Development:
Because of frequent relocations, military spouses often have trouble finding their professional footing. That's where the USO can step in. Connecting service members and military spouses to resources that focus

on employment, education, financial readiness, mentorship and veterans benefits, the USO Transition Program helps military families build a roadmap to achieve their goals and positions them for success throughout the duration of their service, as well as in their post-military life.

Support While Solo-Parenting: The burden of solo-parenting can become especially apparent during deployments, when military family members must struggle to find a new normal. For Tessa Michaelson Schmidt, connection with her husband Brett, a lieutenant colonel in the U.S. Army Reserve, became complicated when he was deployed to Kuwait where there is an eighthour time difference, unreliable Wi-Fi on base, and the added pressure of being deployed near the frontlines. Because they and their two children have an incredible passion for reading, the USO Reading Program has been a blessing. Deployed service members can record themselves reading a book to their child. Then, the recording and a copy of the book are sent to that service member's family.

"They have a real response when they hear his voice, and then we get the books in the mail, and they know they're books from daddy," says Schmidt, who explained that her children will often watch the videos of their father just before bed, so that in a way, he is present for story time.
