Named 2023 Citizen of the Year, Jon Colton Reflects on Decades of Service

ELK GROVE, CA (MPG) - At 86, Jon Colton remains as relevant and inspiring to Elk Grove's community as when he first picked up a dusty mitt 62 years ago to coach big-dreaming little leaguers.

Pull up a chair. Talk with him for a bit. He's pleasant and soft-spoken, a gentleman with an "aw shucks"

humility about his penchant to help, well, just about anyone. At-risk youth, veterans, seniors and unhoused people through the six decades have all benefited in some way from his involvement. It's little wonder the Elk Grove Chamber of Commerce honored Colton as its coveted Citizen of the Year for 2023, an award he still can't believe belongs to him.

"I'm humbled and appreciative. You look around our community and there are dozens of volunteers that make our town work that fly under the radar and don't really get this kind of recognition," said Colton during a Dec. 4 ceremony at the Valley Hi Country Club.

The event drew 140 admirers, including state Assemblymember Stephanie

Nguyen, Sacramento County Supervisor Pat Hume and Elk Grove City Councilmember Daren Suen. The chamber has recognized the city's most involved community members for this award since 1955, and several attended the ceremony, including 2022 Citizens of the Year John and Betty Hall.

Ex-Deputy Sentenced After EG **Arrest**

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)

- A former Sacramento County Sheriff's deputy, who was arrested in Elk Grove earlier this year on suspicion of shoplifting, has pleaded no contest to charges of illegally possessing an assault weapon and of impersonating a peace officer.

Hector Chavez entered his plea on Dec. 7 at Sacramento County Superior Court. The assault weapon charge is a felony, and the charge of impersonating a peace officer is a misdemeanor.

In a release, the Sacramento County District Attorney's Office said that on April 15 Chavez entered The Home Depot on West Stockton Boulevard and took merchandise without paying. According to public payroll records, Chavez had been a Sacramento deputy since 2013. When a loss-prevention officer confronted Chavez, he fled on foot.

He was later detained by Elk Grove police, and he was initially charged with shoplifting, according to the Elk Grove Police Department's daily logs. The Sacramento County Sheriff's Office subseuquetly suspended Chavez and revoked his law-enforcement powers, according to the DA's release.

"Over the next five months, Chavez used an old Sheriff's Office Identification Card to purchase multiple firearms, which only law enforcement officers are lawfully allowed to possess," the release continued. "On August 25, 2023, Sacramento sheriff's deputies executed a search warrant at Chavez's residence and found multiple firearms that had been converted to assault weapons." Chavez is expected to

receive a sentence of 180 days in prison and probation, the DA's office said, and the sentencing hearing is scheduled for Dec. 9, 2024, one year after the recent conviction. ★

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Longtime Rotarian Is Citizen of the Year

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Colton received proclamations from the state Assembly, county and city and a \$1,000 check from Rotary of Elk Grove to put towards a charity of his choice. He selected the Elk Grove Rotary Club Foundation, which supports local and global nonprofits.

The Colton name runs deep in Elk Grove, five generations' worth. Jon Colton's father-in-law, Carl Amundson, and his mother, Hilma, were also Citizens of the Year. Hume, a former Elk Grove city councilmember, emceed the ceremony. His family has a long history with Colton, who attended Elk Grove High School with the supervisor's mother. Hume has seen Colton's achievements through the years and remains impressed with his deeds.

"He is truly the embodiment of humility, service and leadership. This community would be hard-pressed to find a more conscientious, deserving and worthy recipient," Hume said. "He's a great example of what it takes to make a community great."

A lifetime of service

After graduating from Elk Grove High, Colton earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from College of the Pacific, now the University of the Pacific, in Stockton. Following a stint with the California National Guard, he returned to Elk Grove to run his own insurance company and was quickly recruited to be a volunteer baseball coach for the Elk Grove Babe Ruth League. He did that for 10 years and eventually served three years as the league's president.

His dedication to Elk Grove only increased since his 2004 retirement. He's contributed to the Elk Grove Regional Scholarship Foundation, volunteered for the HART Winter Sanctuary for homeless people, is a current board member of the Senior Center of Elk Grove and most recently packed meals for Rise Against Hunger, a program that provides food in times of emergencies. But his biggest marks on the community have come as a member of Rotary of Elk Grove, where he was the club's first new member in 1962 and its youngest president in 1967.

He speaks affectionately about the club, crediting it and the members with continuing to spark his fire to do good. And while the Rotary has several pet projects, Colton said the Youth Incentive Mentor Program is one of the best and his personal favorite to take part in.

Developed in 1999, the program pairs local junior high and high school students with Rotarians who hope to inspire them to reach greater heights despite family, social, financial or motivational challenges. No student in the program has ever failed to graduate from high school, Colton said, but the mentor role wasn't always easy.

"I had an articulate and brilliant kid, but there were times I would pound my head against the wall because he just wouldn't do things. His excuse was always that he was lazy," said Colton. "It took a while to get on track, but he did it. His grandparents once told me that they don't think he would have graduated high school without me. So that's my reward."

Cathy Guy, president of Elk Grove Rotary, said Colton is a vital part of the program.

"When we're sitting there with high school students talking about their grades, challenges and successes, he's the first one to mention words of encouragement and support every time," she said. "They love him for it because they know he's speaking from his heart."

It's not always easy to find the perfect volunteer, but Colton comes close. He's compassionate, patient and wants to see people thrive. Simply put, he wants to make an impact without want or need for publicity for the work he does. And the best thing? He has a darn good time doing it.

"I'm so blessed to have lived in Elk Grove all my life. It's been fun. It's just been plain fun," said Colton. "I hope I can continue to make everybody proud."

Sacramento Diocese to File for Bankruptcy Protection, Facing 250+ Sexual-Abuse Cases

- The Roman Catholic Diocese of Sacramento will seek Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection next year, Bishop Jaime Soto announced on Dec. 9, as it faces hundreds of lawsuits alleging child sexual abuse by clergy. The diocese oversees Catholic parishes in much of Northern California, including Elk Grove.

In a letter published online and distributed to parishioners at local churches, Soto said he expects to file for bankruptcy protection in March 2024.

"It is now clear to me that the only respectful, transparent, and fair way to address the substantial number of claims by those who have been abused by clergy and other members of the Church is to seek a court-supervised reorganization. This process will also allow me to sustain the sanctifying, teaching, and charitable work of the Catholic community in Northern California," the letter read.

Chapter 11 bankruptcy protection generally allows an organization to continue operating while negotiating with creditors to restructure its debts. The letter noted as much and said parishes and schools in the diocese "would continue their operations uninterrupted."

Soto said more than 250 lawsuits alleging abuse have been filed against the diocese. Without reorganization, "it is likely that not all the abuse victim-survivors would receive a fair consideration of their claim," he

said, with available funds being "depleted" in the first cases brought forward.

"Bankruptcy is a costly and lengthy process, but it also provides supervision and transparency for all the parties involved so that a fair resolution is offered to the victim-survivors of abuse," Soto continued. He expressed hope that the diocese would "emerge from this necessary, penitential exercise with greater resolve to be a humble sanctuary of holiness and healing for all the sons and daughters of God in Northern California."

A list of "credibly accused" priests published by the diocese does not appear to include any who served at Elk Grove parishes.

Law Group Decries Plan

A law firm that represents people alleging clerical abuse, including cases in the Sacramento diocese, criticized the decision.

"On behalf of the many survivors who were gravely hurt, we react with deep disappointment in the choice made by the Bishop of Sacramento to seek bankruptcy protection from accountability," Jeff Anderson and Associates said in a press release. "We know from all the work we have done with survivors across the country that bishops and dioceses have continuously utilized Chapter 11 to shamefully protect themselves."

The release said other dioceses have used bankruptcy filings to delay court cases and prevent "full disclosure."

"The Diocese might change, but their motivations for filing bankruptcy remain the same — the desire to protect their reputation and their assets, no matter the moral expense," attorney Jeff Anderson said in a statement.

The Sacramento diocese is the fourth in California to seek bankruptcy protection after a wave of sexual-abuse claims under state Assembly Bill 218. The legislation took effect in 2020 and extended the statute of limitations on childhood sexual abuse, allowing much more time for accusers to come forward after reaching adulthood.

The other dioceses filing for Chapter 11 protection are Santa Rosa, San Francisco and Oakland. ★

The Kubota facility is located in the city's Grant Line Southeast Industrial Area, and Singh-Allen said it is "the first of many new projects that will fill this area with millions of square feet of industrial and manufacturing space, attracting hundreds of millions of dollars of capital investment to the city and the region, employing thousands of people."

Event attendees went on tours of the facility and watched a performance by taiko drummers, a nod to Kubota's Japanese parent company. There were remarks by Greater Sacramento Economic Council CEO Barry Broome and V.J. Chue, a representive of Congresswoman Doris Matsui, D-Sacramento.

Also on the speaker list was Shingo Hanada, former president of Kubota North America, who was recently promoted to an executive position with the parent company.

"This facility is not just a building. It represents a key chapter in Kubota's history," Hanada said in his speech. He said Kubota is "committed to making strategic investments in infrastructure" and to expanding in the United States.

Finally, Hagen announced that Kubota would donate a utility vehicle, an RTV-X1140, to Cosumnes Fire

Department. He said it can be configured to transport crew or haul cargo, with a payload capacity of more than 1,000 pounds.

Fire Chief Felipe Rodriguez and Cosumnes Community Services District (CSD) board Chair Gil Albiani accepted the donation. Rodriguez said the vehicle would see use at CSD's largest event of the year, the Elk Grove Giant Pumpkin Festival, much of which the department's fire engines and ambulances can't access.

"This will be used to save lives (and) once again, protect this community, and for that we are grateful, very grateful," Rodriguez said.



Have you ever noticed how enterprising individuals can turn nearly anything into a marketable advent calendar by dividing the merchandise into 24 discrete pieces?

I prefer the traditional choice of chocolate, but now you can find beer, wine and even whiskey advent calendars. Sausage and cheese make for a December-long charcuterie board in 24 bite-size pieces.

For kids, there are small toys behind the little cardboard doors.

If you want to encourage your young charges toward engineering fields, you might buy the one with 24 science projects that, at the end of it all, yield an actual working radio.

Note: Be prepared to answer the question, "Mom. What's a radio?"

The point of these advent calendars is that they give us a countdown to Christmas as, each day, we find the next numbered window. Open it to discover a treat inside, and then enjoy that treat anticipating the big day.

The counting also brings us an element of certainty. We start at the beginning, and we

know when it ends. Christmas is only 24 chocolates from now

The earliest advent wreaths had the same count-down agenda. The story goes that the 19th-century German pastor and advocate for those living in poverty, Johann Hinrich Wichern, created the first wreath to help the children of his community manage their impatience as they waited for Christmas.

The original wreath featured four large white candles, one for each Sunday of Advent. He added smaller red candles for each day of the week that allowed for daily tracking.

But the wreath's shape — a circle — is significant in its own right.

Had Wichern simply been looking for a way to mark the days, a straight line (or rows) of candles would have done the trick. But the wreath opens up an entirely different story. It's a story with an as-yet-undated end.

While the Advent season marks the days until Christmas, for many of us, it also marks a season of raised awareness of the promised return of Jesus Christ at the end of all time and of death's inevitability.

Here's the thing: nobody knows when that

While each day brings us one day closer, we don't know how many little windows we'll need for that advent calendar.

The circle of Wichern's wreath evokes the cyclical nature of time, inviting us to remember that one day follows the next through a cycle of days, months and years. In a productivity culture, this cycle is one of wanting and achieving followed by the need to want and achieve all over again. The cycle seems never

Yet we know that the days of achieving will end at some point, and if all we have is achievement, we will have nothing but dust.

The Biblical texts read in many churches during Advent offer us a way through this endless cycle of days that will not be satisfied. In these readings, we hear Jesus teaching about the end of all things with images of destruction that seem bent on scaring us to death (Mark 13:24-37).

If it is true, as he says, that the most fundamental realities like mountains and the sun's shining are subject to destruction, what is


What remains is the eternal love of God coming - "adventing" - that is, coming in love for the you that is you.

Wichern's advent wreath forms an eternity of shape and it becomes your victory crown. It is the shape of love seeking you.



Jemmott Out at Fortune After Only Four Games

ELK GROVE (MPG) - The boys basketball coach at Fortune Early College School, Raphael Jemmott, was relieved of his duties, just four games into the 2023-24 season, according to the school's athletic director Derek Swafford. He told the Citizen about the decision Dec. 8 during the Panthers' game against Pleasant Grove in the Mark Macres Memorial Tournament at Monterey Trail High School.

Swafford said he couldn't talk further about the situation. Swafford hired Antonio Brown as the interim coach.

The Panthers, last year's runner-up in the Sac-Joaquin Section's Division V playoffs, dropped the game to Pleasant Grove, 69-58, to lower their record to 1-6.

On his Facebook page Jemmott, who was in his first season as head coach at Fortune School, said he was relieved of his duties on Dec. 1.

"I do not have details about the reasons of my termination for I have never had a chance to speak with the athletic director directly," he wrote on his post. "I was terminated through a letter given to me by HR. I am extremely hurt by this. After serving six years as an assistant coach of the program I wished I was

given more than four non-league games to prove myself."

Jemmott added he will remain employed at the school

Following the Pleasant Grove game Brown, a former professional basketball player with six years experience in Canada, Austrailia, the Phillipines, Brazil and Mexico, said he's coached more games in the past 10 days than practices with the Panthers.

"We've got a lot of talent and when I got thrust into the position the reason I took it was that I brought two guys personally to the school and one of them is my nephew," Brown said. "And, one of the things I wanted to do with the job switch was they had the opportunity with a coach that was

there for the team and I jumped at it when the time came."

Brown is a 2001 graduate of Cordova High School who played basketball collegiately at Cosumnes River College, Bethany University and William Jessup University.

"My challenge is ahead of me," he added. "We've got to get some practices in because there's a new system. We've had one practices and a bunch of games and we can't get to practice until (Dec. 12)."

Brown thinks he can round his group together and pull out a good season.

"We've got some talent," he said. "We've got some shooters, we've got some really quick guards, we're just trying to find it and put it all together." *



Cal Grappler has Negrete ranked 10th in the State at his weight. He's one of eight Elk Grove wrestlers ranked statewide.


