Gala Salutes Vets Day at Aerospace Museum

SACRAMENTO REGION, CA
(MPG) - Music, fine food and
one of Sacramento's big-
gest fireworks displays are a
build up to Veterans Day at
the Aerospace Museum of
California. The McClellan
Park facility will host a
USO-style gala on Friday,
November 3.

Its "Salute to Service" fund-
raiser supports the museum
with a 1940s theme. Central to
décor, flyable WW II aircraft
- a P-38 Lighting, a Navy
Corsair and a Ryan ST-A -
will be eye-popping backdrops
for dancing and photo-ops.

Entertainment includes
a tribute show celebrating
Harry James, a superstar
trumpeter whose big band
hits contributed to Allied
morale during WWII.

American River College
Professor and trumpet
virtuoso Tony Marvelli
will take center stage.
Carmichael-based singer
Susan Skinner will contrib-
ute vocals made famous by
beloved 1940s chanteuse,
Helen Forrest. Pianist Joe
Gilman, bassist Shelley
Denny and drummer Tim

Metz complete the quintet
known as Hey Day.

Hey Day offers a retrospec-
tive on James' larger-than-life
career: the one-time circus
musician discovered Frank
Sinatra, Buddy Rich and
Doris Day. He married Betty
Grable and indulged a legendar-
y Hollywood lifestyle. "With
his music, we revisit a special
time in American history,"
says museum director/curator
Tom Jones. "During tumultu-
ous times, Harry James made
America dance, sing and
believe in love."

The museum's massive
hangar will house the cele-
bration. Vintage dress
is encouraged; Rosie the
Riveter lookalikes will serve
cocktails.

Following a site tour, guests
will dine, dance and be treated
to a massive fireworks display.
One of the largest pyrotech-
nic specialists in the world,
Pyro Spectaculars company
annually provides this blow-
out to honor veterans and
support the museum. Anyone
may view this spectacle from
Freedom Park, McClellan.

Gala cost is \$150 per per-
son; \$275 per couple. Table
sponsorships are also avail-
able. Admission includes
dinner, dancing, wine, beer
and signature cocktails and
fireworks. The Aerospace

Sacramento Historical Society Gifts \$500k to Sac City College

Joan Didion Family;
College Library
Renamed For Didion

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG)
- Sacramento City College
(SCC) will be renaming the
college's library in honor of
renowned author Joan Didion.
The building will now be
known as the Joan Didion
Learning Resource Center,
in recognition of a generous
\$500,000 gift from Didion
family and the Sacramento
Historical Society (SHS). The
decision was approved by the
Los Rios Community College
Board of Trustees at their
October 18, 2023 meeting.

"What a great honor it is to
name our college's Learning
Resource Center after Joan
Didion," says Sacramento
City College President Albert
Garcia. "We're proud that she
started her college career here.
Her status as an author of inter-
national renown, as a creative
and incisive thinker, makes her
a wonderful inspiration for our
college community."

Born in Sacramento in 1934,
Didion attended Sacramento
City College briefly in the
1950s. The gift from her
family and SHS will sup-
port writing scholarships for
students as well as faculty
research programs that align
with the late author's intellec-
tual interests.

"Attending SCC was
important to Joan, and we
believe she would have been
thrilled to support the schol-
arship for promising young
writers who may not otherwise
have the opportunity to be re-
cognized," says Kelley Didion
Peters, Didion's niece. Peters
has been handling Didion's
estate with her siblings, Steve
Didion and Lori Didion Hunt.

It is the family's hope,
Peters says, that the Joan
Didion Learning Resource
Center and the programs being
funded by the gift will serve as
a "living legacy" to her aunt
that will benefit many future
generations of students to
come.

"On behalf of my siblings, I
wish to thank the Sacramento
Historical Society for not
only facilitating this gift to the

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Sacramento County Transitions to New Benefits System



SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - The County Clerk/Recorder's (CCR) office is consolidating and relocating two of its three offices by early 2024. CCR will be consolidating the downtown office (600 8th Street, Sacramento) and the East Area Service Center location (5229 Hazel Avenue, Fair Oaks) and taking over a 26,952 square foot central office located at 3636 American River Drive in the unincorporated part of the County. "We are excited for this change!" said Donna

Allred, Sacramento County Clerk/Recorder. “This new location will provide a more streamlined customer experience in an updated and more spacious facility.”

The first move will come with the closure of the eastern location in mid-November. Due to deliveries and installations needed at the new American River Drive location, an exact date has not been confirmed yet for when the East location will close. An updated SacCounty News story will be posted when that information becomes available.

CCR continuously

analyzes their structure, efficiencies, public service levels and office configurations for their programs, staff and public. Advancing technology has changed business needs, with more services now offered electronically. CCR determined that a consolidation of two locations into one singular and more centralized location is more efficient for operations.

SACRAMENTO COUNTY, CA (MPG) - On October 30, 2023, Sacramento County joins other California counties and transitions to a new public assistance benefits system, California Statewide Automated Welfare System (CalSAWS).

CalSAWS replaces the existing welfare eligibility system CalWIN. With this change, MyBenefits CalWIN (myBCW) customer web portal will be replaced with a new and improved online portal, BenefitsCal that provides one unified experience for all Californians. BenefitsCal will make it easier than ever to apply for benefits online, upload documents, report changes, renew benefits, view case details, sign up for alerts, and more.

Now customers can apply for a variety of benefits on the same website:

- Cash assistance, Food benefits, Health Care

To align with the adoption of the new technology, the Sacramento County Department of Human Assistance will replace the current

phone numbers for customers with a toll-free 1-800 number. Effective Monday, October 30, 2023 the current phone numbers (916) 874-3100 and (209) 744-0499 will be replaced by the new 1-800-560-0976 number.

To accommodate the transition, all customer service centers and phone lines will be closed on Friday, October 27. Customers may continue to use MyBCW until October 26, 5 pm. The new portal BenefitsCal becomes available on Monday, October 30 at 6 am. Households interested in applying for public assistance benefits during the downtime period can:

- Visit www.coveredca.com for Medi-Cal benefits

Customers who may have started an application in the old system should plan to finish by Thursday, October 26, or will need to begin a new application after creating an account in BenefitsCal starting Monday, October 30, 2023. Thank you for your patience as we transition to the new systems. ★

writing scholarship, but having the vision to bring other promising programs to students at Sacramento City College,” Peters says. “We also thank Sac City for its decision to rename the learning center to further her legacy as a former student and Sacramento native.”

Didion passed away in December 2021 at the age of 87. In 2022, the SHS launched an effort to honor her life and legacy, which included the establishment of the Joan Didion Scholarship for Writers at SCC in July 2022 with a gift of \$40,000.

When members of the Didion family became aware of these efforts, they decided to commit their own funding via an auction of Joan

Didion's personal effects that took place in November 2022. The Didion family generously made a major gift to SHS with the request that a specific portion of the gift be directed to Sacramento City College to support the writing scholarship as well as other programs consistent with Joan Didion's legacy.

"We are grateful for the partnership with Sacramento City College and elated to see the Joan Didion Learning Resource Center come to fruition," says SHS President Walt White. "Sacramento was Joan's childhood home and where she spent her formative years. It is so important that we recognize this woman, whose literary contributions have elevated the perspectives of all of those who have been

exposed to her work.” SHS pledged \$460,000 to augment their existing funding for a total gift of \$500,000 that will create the Endowment to Honor the Legacy of Joan Didion at Sacramento City College. SHS and SCC will also partner on academic programs and events that honor Joan Didion in the years to come. In her lifetime, Didion received national and international acclaim and numerous honors for her accomplishments as an essayist, journalist, and author of incomparable fiction. She was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Letters in 1981 and won the National Book Award for her book “The Year of Magical Thinking.” ★



Sacramento Area Museums Showcase Region’s Farm-to-Fork Roots All Year Long

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (August 28, 2023) – The Greater Sacramento region is rich with popular museums and destinations that offer diverse and enriching experiences for individuals, families, residents, and visitors alike. Given the critically important role agriculture continues to play in the region, many local museums offer special exhibits, experiences and activations that highlight ever-enduring Farm-to-Fork connections. A sampling of some of the Farm-to-Fork offerings at local museums includes the following:

California Agriculture Museum – Woodland is home to an entire museum focused on agriculture, filled with a unique collection of harvesters, wheel and crawler-type tractors, combines, trucks, art, artifacts, rotating interactive exhibits and much more. In all, the museum tells the history of Farm-to-Fork, dating back to the Gold Rush era and how the industry evolved from horse drawn to steam driven to fuel powered machines to harvest and transport California’s bounty.

California State Railroad Museum & Foundation – A Fruit

Growers Express refrigerated rail car is on permanent display inside the Museum’s Roundhouse. Museum visitors can explore this historic rail car and exhibit, “Farm to Fork: A Public History,” and learn about how refrigerated rail cars enabled California farmers, growers, and producers send farm-to-fork freshness all over the country. Visitors can step inside the historic Fruit Growers Express rail car to see how the ice-cooled rail cars transported produce and built an agricultural system that exports more wealth than the California Gold Rush. Plus, the popular weekend excursion train, Sacramento Southern Railroad – currently on pause due to an important rail repair project – runs on the historic Walnut Grove Branch Line. This rail line transported pears, asparagus, celery, seeds, and other products from the Delta communities to markets nationwide.

Sacramento Children’s Museum – Young visitors hungry to learn about fresh food have a variety of options at the Children’s Museum, including at the miniature Leo’s Market and Leo’s Food Court (a miniature market of food carts), about bees and honey with the in-house beehive, and an interactive train table highlighting Sacramento’s agricultural landscape in miniature, complete with mini livestock. Plus, the Children’s Museum will be at the Farm-to-Fork Festival (September 22-23) sharing vegetable stamp printing with visitors.

SMUD Museum of Science & Curiosity – MOSAC’s interactive exhibits bring the story of water to life, demonstrating how our region is working together to conserve this natural resource for now and future generations. The “Water Challenge” exhibit lets museum visitors actively shape a watershed’s flow, create a tune for saving water at home, and choose between local or non-local foods to buy based on how everyday decisions impact conservation efforts — all while learning about the environmental footprint along the way.

Utility Exploration Center – The City of Roseville’s Utility Exploration Center (UEC) is a testament to the region’s commitment to sustainable living and resource conservation. Nestled in the heart of a region renowned for its Farm-to-Fork movement, the UEC acts as an educational hub, encouraging residents and visitors alike to delve into the intricacies of energy and water conservation, waste reduction, and sustainable practices. By fostering an understanding

of how we use and preserve resources, the UEC underscores the importance of our agricultural roots.


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All Aboard the 45th International Railfair

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - All Aboard the 45th Annual International Railfair (IRF), coming to Cal Expo, 1600 Exposition Blvd in Sacramento, on Veteran’s Day weekend, Saturday, November 11 and Sunday, November 12. It’s the first time IRF has been in Sacramento County since its earliest when it was held at Sacramento City College. The annual International Railfair show is run by members of the Sacramento Modular Railroaders, the Sacramento chapter of the European Train Enthusiasts, Roseville Roundhouse Model Railroad Association, and the Sierra Division of the Pacific Coast Region of the National Model Railroad Association (NMRA), said IRF spokesperson Tom Campbell.

“We display operating model railroads to the public at the International Rail Fair and educate the public about model railroading, railroad history, and prototypical railroad operations,” Campbell said.

This year, IRF guests will be able to enjoy more than 28,000 square-feet of model railroad fun, explore over 100 vendor tables, and swap goods at a TrainMart consignment store as they see over 12 operating model train layouts in action ranging from Z to G.

“The two-day show is called ‘International Railfair’ because one of our sponsor clubs, European Train Enthusiasts, specializes in building and operating European model railroads,” Campbell said.

A children’s layout returns this year where children can run a scale model locomotive and earn a Junior Engineer badge.

The popular “Square Foot Challenge” also returns this year – with a holiday theme. Attendees are invited to vote for their favorite holiday diorama with the highest number of votes named a People’s Choice winner. The winning diorama builder will receive a custom trophy based on a machinist’s square and a \$50 gift card to RC Country Hobbies.


The individual model railroad layouts which are seen at the International Railfair are modular railroads. A

typical modular layout consists of transportable individual modules which are clamped together to create a single model railroad, Campbell said.

Modules are typically lightweight, and are about 30” wide and four feet long, and packed with a lot of scenic detail. Legs fold out from underneath the module and the required electrical wiring drops down at both ends of the module.

General admission, ages 13 and up, good for both days, is \$12. Admission on Sunday, November 12 is reduced to \$10 per person. Youth admission for ages 13-17 is \$5. Children ages 12 and under are free both days. Active and retired military members receive a \$2 discount on event admission at the gate.

After 30 years serving as a hospital and military chaplain, I returned to the pastorate last year where I’m rediscovering the things I missed.

I can honestly say I missed preaching, potlucks and the playful fun I share with parishioners. (See how well a pastor can force alliteration into his/her points.)

But I must say, I don’t miss the pressure clergy feel to recruit new parishioners. I was never much good at that.

However, in the Air Force I had ample opportunities to “troll for souls” because each base chaplain is assigned workplaces they must routinely visit. My assigned areas were the hospital and the Security Police station.

One day during a visit to the police station, I was warmly welcomed by a parishioner who worked as the desk sergeant. We sat down together inside his cubicle to talk about office issues.

But, a few minutes into our conversation, his boss called him away for a moment.

While he was gone, I remained in the cubicle, hidden away from the officers who just then entered the squad room.

Assuming they had an empty office, they began to talk.

Their “talk” quickly turned to the graphic nature of their dating life. As they told their can-you-top-this stories, one officer claimed his leading role as a “ladies man.”

Each of his stories centered on his prowess with several women inside his large Ford Taurus.

But when they saw their supervisor reenter the room,

they retreated to their break room.

“Do you want to have a little fun?” I whispered to my friend.

He gave me a hesitant nod, so I filled him in on the conversation I’d overheard. Then I asked him to introduce me to his fellow officers assembled around the donut box. (Apologies for the cliché.)

The sergeant and I entered the break room wearing matching grins.

Each officer gave me a hearty greeting.

I recognized the distinctive voice of the Taurus officer as I sensed his unspoken question, “How long have you been here chaplain?”

That’s when my friend and I began our recruitment drive. “The chaplain thinks some of you might want to join him for chapel service.”

Even with the police officers’ sixth sense, they still did not surmise they were in the crosshairs of an incoming practical joke. Their answers focused on their excuses.

“I’m Catholic,” one said.
