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Vietnam Trail Network renowned throughout Northeast

Non-profit purchased private land in 2003 to use for preservation, challenging trails

The Vietnam trail network, with hundreds of acres in Milford, might be better known by people around the Northeast than by Milford residents. Mountain biking trails there stand out as being feature-laden for advanced technical challenges while also supporting all biking levels and other recreational uses.

The New England Mountain Bike Association (NEMBA) fostered Vietnam's development and remains instrumental in proudly maintaining it. "People drive for hours to ride here," said Kevin Keenan, Chair of the property's Land Management Committee. "It's on their bucket list. The lore is out there."

Keenan explained how the trail network got its name.

"The name came from Vietnam vets. When they returned from the war, they would ride their dirt bikes in there. They would cut the brush down below handlebar height and the low brush reminded them of the forests in Vietnam." Today, dirt bikes and most other motorized vehicles are not allowed at Vietnam. E-bikes are allowed at the Milford areas, including the land owned by NEMBA, but not on the Holliston and Hopkinton areas.

One of the many unique aspects of Vietnam is that a 46-acre strategic parcel "was the first piece of land bought by

a non-profit mountain biking association," Keenan said. "November 2023 was the 20-year anniversary of that purchase. Everyone pulled together to secure the resources so everyone can use it. We wanted it so we could provide challenging trails and protect the land." The other landowners are the towns of Milford, Holliston, and Hopkinton, as well as businesses and private citizens.

Many people enjoy the trails for scenic walks, trail running, snowshoeing, cross-country skiing through the woods, and more moderate mountain biking.

"The north side trails on the Holliston and Hopkinton conservation land are not scary," explained Keenan. "Everything in the network is walkable, you can go around anything gnarly you don't want to try."

For safety, NEMBA encourages bikers to pay attention to who is around them. The organization also promotes respect for the land and landowners. They maintain the trails and create new ones, holding volunteer-run workdays Sunday mornings in November and at other times throughout the year.

Trails are free for the public to use. Because the Vietnam network is extensive, getting lost is very possible. A good way to help prevent that is with an app like TrailForks. Alternatively, online maps can be downloaded to a cellphone or printed to take along. By going with someone familiar with the trails, newcomers will have a better experience.

One good place to start is at the New Trail, accessible from Adams Street in Holliston, just south of Marshall Street which has a parking lot at the trailhead. There are popular beginner loops of one to two miles or more, and much more difficult trails like "Burial Bypass" and "Do You Feel Lucky."

NEMBA is comprised of 35 regional chapters, with Vietnam being part of the Blackstone Valley chapter. The chapter organizes group rides, workdays, and other events. They recently produced a thrilling video of the Vietnam experience: youtube. com/watch?v=sFTjecz8b10.

Start moving toward retirement security

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It's not as well-known as Halloween, but National Retirement Security week happens every October – the third week, to be precise — and while it doesn't involve ghosts and goblins, it does deal with something even more frightening: the risk of not being able to enjoy a comfortable retirement. Through various events, this occasion highlights ideas about building retirement security. What steps can you take?

Here are some suggestions:

- Don't underestimate your longevity. Consider this: 65-year-old men can expect to live another 20 years, while 65-year-old women can anticipate almost 22 more years, according to the Society of Actuaries. And these figures are just averages, meaning you could well exceed these ages, perhaps by many years. So, in thinking about how much money you'll need as a retiree, be aware that you could spend two, or even three, decades in retirement.
- Don't underestimate health care costs. When you retire, some of your expenses such as transportation, wardrobe and other costs associated with your career will drop. Others will not and may even increase. Health care is a prime example: Many people assume that Medicare or their Medicare Advantage plan will take care of virtually all their health care costs in retirement, but that's not
- the case. Generally speaking, you could plan on spending \$4,500 to \$6,500 per year on health care costs during retirement, excluding the large expenses connected with long-term care. Your actual costs could be higher or lower, depending on your health, prescription drugs and supplemental insurance coverage, but make sure you plan for sizable health care costs in your projected retirement budget.
- Contribute as much as you can afford to your retirement plans. Try to put in as much as you can afford to your 401(k) or other employer-sponsored retirement plan and try to increase your contributions whenever your salary goes up. You may also be eligible to contribute to a traditional or Roth IRA, which offers tax benefits and a wide variety of investment options. (Contributions to a Roth IRA may be limited based on your income.)

Once you reach retire-

- ment, you can still make some moves that could help boost your financial security:
- Maintain an appropriate investment mix.

When you retire, you might be tempted to shift most of your portfolio into highly conservative investments to "lock in" gains and avoid being over-exposed to market volatility that could cause short-term losses. Yet, even in retirement, you should still own some growth-oriented investments that can potentially help keep you ahead of inflation. In fact, it's important to periodically rebalance your investments back to your preferred mix to avoid taking too much or too little risk, so you may want to consult with a financial advisor.

• Identify a suitable withdrawal rate. You don't want to take out so much from your portfolio each year that you run the risk of outliving your money. So, you'll want to determine an annual withdrawal rate that can reduce this danger. A common withdrawal rate to start retirement is 4%, but your own rate should be based on several factors: your age, size of portfolio, other sources of income and so on.

It can be challenging to make all the moves necessary to help achieve retirement security — but it's worth the effort.



each month. "We attribute the growth to word of mouth from those who attend and increased publicity that we generate...We are seeing many repeat diners and often they bring new people with them."

Hava, who lives in Milford, says the event is open to anyone from any town. He notes that some people come from as far away as New Bedford, and nearly half of the dinner guests live in Milford.

"We have a large following from Milford, many of whom go to the Milford Senior Center on a regular basis. We also draw quite a few people from Holliston, Medway and Millis. Most of the people are senior citizens, but we have a growing number of younger families who come on a regular basis; this past month we had four or five young children and their parents."

The home-cooked meals are prepared by members of the congregation. The menu varies

monthly but always includes "all the fixings" and dessert.

Hava says the dinners are for everyone interested in a good meal. The gatherings are not religious-related and are merely hosted in the church's "fabulous space that lends itself nicely to events like this" since the hall can seat up to 160 people.

Hava says, "It is an opportunity for people to get out for an evening, enjoy a good meal and meet new friends. There are many folks out there who can use a good meal and we hope to provide that on a regular basis."

The business offers same-day service for both residential and commercial clients across eastern and central Massachusetts and northern Rhode Island. In addition to junk removal, the company rents 15-yard dump-

As a family-owned and operated company, Schadler says Affordable Junk Removal has lower overhead costs and is more accessible than national competitors. "I answer my phone 24 hours a day," he says. "I was on vacation in Italy and Portugal, and I was still answering my phone on the beach. When you call us, you get me - not an automated machine!"

Schadler says the company has an environmentally friendly approach to disposal in which it recycles items when possible, properly disposes of non-recyclables and resells many items at the Schadlers' secondhand store, Resellables. "We opened that store in Bellingham because we hated to see things thrown



away," Schadler says. "We have four kids and sustainability is extremely important to us."

During the business's early days, Schadler provided junk removal on nights and weekends when he wasn't busy working at a machine shop. Eventually, the business grew into a full-time endeavor, and the Schadlers invested back into the company with new equipment and techniques. "When I first started, for example, we didn't have any tarps. I'm driving around and things are flying out of my truck," Schadler laughs. "I'm like, 'Oh my god, I need a

Schadler says his wife Christine "was equally as involved" in getting the business off the ground. "She handled the backend while I did the heavy lifting, all while she was working at EMC," he says. "Fast forward 17 years, and we both work full time managing the company as well as other endeavors. Busi-



ness is doing great; it has grown tremendously to a fleet of trucks and dumpsters, and we've also been able to buy a pizza place, The Corner Market in Holliston."

In addition to delivering an in-demand service to the community, Schadler is appreciative that Affordable Junk Removal has helped provide a work-life balance that suits his family. "It allows me to be able to do what I like doing and spend time with my kids," he says. "I'm home to see my babies play softball and do all that stuff. We are also able to give back to the communities we serve."

As for Milford, the Schadlers have been residents for over 20 years. Their four kids have gone



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Attend an all-ages rock concert in town to benefit childhood cancer research

"We had lost touch, but when I heard about Ty's fight with cancer, I reached out to help. I've been a member of the foundation's board of directors since its inception.


"Our first Rockin' for a Reason concert was in 2013 at Nipmuc High School in Upton and we've had at least one every year since. This is our second benefit concert in Milford."

This Rockin' for a Reason band consists of 22 students from Milford, Nipmuc, Miscoe Hill, and Blackstone Valley Technical schools. On the show's lineup are classic favorites like The B-52's "Love Shack" and "I'm Shipping up to Boston" by the Dropkick Murphys.

The Joe B. band performs in the area, with a recent show at the Southwick Zoo's Winter Wonderland. Former band member Carlie Gonzalez was diagnosed with cancer in 2018, making the Rockin' for a Reason benefit especially meaningful to the group.

According to the foundation, only one in five children diagnosed with cancer will lead a healthy and full life. The Scarlet Hawks are looking to succeed with a style that is new to the program but should be familiar to longtime basketball fans.

"I coached back in the day, I played back in the day, and we want to bring back a tough, physical, old school mentality," said first-year head coach Dana Olson.

"We are going to play the game a little cleaner, a little tougher, and a little smarter," Olson said. "We are going to run good half-court sets and different stuff than they have been running. It's going to take some time, but the buy-in is good, and we will get there."

Olson takes over a Milford team that is deep and experienced. Junior swingman Andrew Rivera is an all-league player and a strong all-around talent. Milford also returns sophomore CJ Farrell, who started for the Hawks as a freshman, one of many underclassmen who will play a big role this winter.

"When you look at the makeup of our team, it's about 95% underclassmen," Olson said. "The future bodes well, but we live in a society where you need to win and win now."

Senior Jake Soares is one senior who does see significant playing time and Olson praised his play through the early part of the season. Milford will also depend on Luca Testa, a 6-foot-2 forward who Olson is looking to develop into a more complete player.

"He's always been a shooter, but we are working hard to get him to play better defense and hit the offensive and defensive boards," Olson said. "We are creating basketball players. We don't want a kid who is just a shooter or just a defender or just a rebounder. We want them to

be able to do multiple things to help us win."

Tyler Ballard and Ryan Franklin are two more players who add depth for MHS in the post and who are consistently getting better.

The Scarlet Hawks' promise was on display early in the sea-

son with wins over Foxboro and Hopkinton and a strong showing against Sharon, a top-10 team in the state.

"We outplayed [Sharon] in the third and fourth quarters and, right after the game, I said the difference is the culture," Olson said. "They have played in that system for a long time, and we are in the process of building our culture."

"We are not going to snap our fingers and beat the top teams until we are completely locked in," Olson added. "But we are heading in that direction."

"She always covers the other team's best player," Costa said. "And she can play the two through the five, depending on the matchups and what we need that day."

Costa said the Hawks are hoping to play in transition this season and get up and down the floor quickly.

"We want to get some organized chaos out there," he said. "I think it's less so about my personal style and what fits with the girls that we have. This team is long, athletic, and they can give teams some problems."

Costa said he wants to see his team continue to play with confidence and shoot the ball when it gets the opportunity.

"That should put us in a position to compete for the playoffs," Costa said.
