GALT, CA (MPG) - The Galt Parks and Recreation Commission reviewed proposed designs for Galt Skatepark and the waterslide at Gora Aquatic Center during its Jan. 10 meeting, recommending two concepts for approval by Galt City Council.

After getting feedback at an earlier public meeting, a consulting firm presented the commissioners with two potential designs for the replacement water slide at the aquatic center. The selection was narrowed down to two from four original proposals.

Both options would be

closed slides. The first proposal, called Option 2, would be 30 feet tall, and the second proposal, Option 3, would be 40 feet tall.

Winter Bird Fest Is Now a Week Long

GALT, CA (MPG) - The 17th annual Winter Bird Festival is just around the corner, with a celebration of the diverse bird species that call Galt home or visit on their seasonal migrations. And this year, the festival has expanded to a full week of activities.

The festivities will start on Jan. 29 and last through Feb. 4. The traditional event in the Chabolla Community Center, with fun family activities and keynote speakers will be held on Feb. 3. For the rest of the week, participants can choose from among a variety of bird-related programs, from virtual art workshops to a paint-and-sip evening, and from a trivia night to tours of Cosumnes River Preserve. "The festival was expanded to a weeklong event for the WBF to provide more opportunities for bird enthusiasts to engage in an array of activities, workshops, and birdwatching experiences, providing a deeper connection with nature and the birding community," city Special Events Manager Jackie Garcia told the Herald in an email. Among the new activities, Garcia highlighted the paintand-sip night, during which attendees will create their own bird-themed welcome signs with Mavery Design. The event will take place Feb. 1 at 6 p.m., at Chabolla Community Center (610 Chabolla Ave.), with wine and all supplies included in the ticket price of \$45. She also pointed to Bird Trivia Night on Jan. 31, which will start at 6 p.m. at the Barsetti Vineyards tasting room at 400 Fourth St. The event is free to attend with a suggested donation of \$10 per person. Individuals and teams of up to four people can compete in the evening of bird-related factoids. The Feb. 3 event at Chabolla will feature presentations on birds and bats from local conservation groups, as well as talks by the two keynote speakers: Kate Rutter and Michelle Dodge. Rutter is a nature journaler, urban naturalist, educator, and bird enthusiast, and she will explain how journaling black-crowned night heron, Continued on Page 2

Wreath Laid in Honor of Fallen Officer Tonn

GALT, CA (MPG) - A solemn wreath-laying ceremony outside Galt City Hall on Jan. 15 commemorated the 11th anniversary of the death of Galt police officer Kevin Tonn.

The event at the Officer Kevin Tonn Fallen Heroes Memorial was attended by Galt Police Department officers, the Tonn family and supporters from the community. Also present were Galt Mayor Paul Sandhu, Vice Mayor Rich Lozano, former Chief of Police Bill Bowen, and family members of deceased police officer Harminder Grewal. "It's a great turnout that we have here today, and it's an honor to see former employees of the organization, current members of the organization, who have made their way here today," said Galt Police Chief Brian Kalinowski.

Tonn worked with the Galt police as a K-9 handler. He was killed after $3\frac{1}{2}$ years of service on Jan. 15,

2013. While responding to a reported burglary near F and Third streets, he approached a suspect, who pulled a gun and fatally shot Tonn. The suspect also fired at other officers on scene before taking his own life. Tonn was pronounced dead at a local hospital, becoming the first Galt police officer killed

After an honor guard laid a wreath at the memorial, taps was played and Kalinowski led a moment of silence.

"I want to thank everybody again, as in previous years, for your support and your love. It's an encouragement to see you all here," Tonn's father, Will Tonn, said afterward. *

Gregg Fishman Elected SMUD Board Vice President

SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - SMUD's Board of Directors elected Gregg Fishman as Vice President of the Board, effective January 1, 2024, through December 31, 2024. Gregg was first elected to the SMUD Board of Directors in January 2015 and represents Ward 3, which includes East Sacramento, much of the Arden-Arcade area, and the Campus Commons, College Glen, and Rosemont neighborhoods, as well as parts of Carmichael, Florin, Fruitridge and Vintage Park.

Vice President Fishman has been a clean energy advocate for much of his career. As a former SMUD employee, he promoted wind and solar energy when they were in their infancy. At the California Independent System Operator, he led public engagement efforts supporting new wind energy farms in California. As President of the SMUD Board in 2018, he led the utility in passing its Integrated Resource Plan, hailed by the California Energy Commission as "... an ambitious road map for lowering greenhouse gas emissions in the Sacramento region."

In his varied career, Gregg was a news reporter and anchor at KFBK and KGO Radio, a public information officer at SMUD and the California Independent System Operator (California ISO), and communications coordinator for the California State Association of Counties. He currently works at Sacramento Regional Transit as the Sr. Community Relations Officer.

Gregg is an active volunteer with the

Sacramento Tree Foundation and has led a neighborhood effort that has planted more than 2,000 new trees since 2001. He received an award from the MLK 365 organization for helping to make it easier to remove racially restrictive clauses from local property records. He is a 25-gallon blood donor and a frequent volunteer master-of-ceremonies for Project Ride in Elk Grove.

Gregg is a graduate of California State University, Sacramento with a bachelor's degree in journalism. He and his wife live in Arden Park and are the parents of two daughters. \star

Continued from Page 1 encouraged to put colored stickers on renderings of the designs to indicate their preferences. Option 2 got a couple of green stickers, meaning full approval, but there were also several yellow stickers showing some reservations. Option 3 got five green stickers and no other colors.

RS+M Project Engineer Danny Stringer said meeting participants had liked the idea of a shade structure at the top of the slide, and linear stairs rather than spiral ones, so the firm had added those to the designs for the commission.

Stringer said RS+M opted to recommend a fully closed slide, rather than a slide that begins closed and switches to an open flume partway down, finding that manufacturing would be impractical.

The target age range for the slides was given as 8 years old and up, and Stringer said the designs can accommodate adults.

The commissioners


initially split over which design to recommend to Council. Commissioners Ernest Cason Jr. and John McNamara favored Option 2, arguing that Option 3 might be too tall. McNamara felt Option 2 would "strike a balance" between entertainment and cost. Commissioners Carrie Graham and Chris Smith favored Option 3.

"For the added value, why not provide the best that we can for them (aquatic center visitors)?" Graham said.

Cason ultimately changed his vote to support 40-foottall Option 3, and the commission voted, 3-1, to recommend that option to Council, with McNamara opposed.

The commission also voted to recommend a proposal to renovate Galt Skatepark. The modular structures at the location south of Chabolla Community Center were no longer safe to use, and based on user input, the city has decided to replace them with in-ground structures.

The design provided



Several skate park users attended the meeting, and one of them, Nathan Ebersole, spoke during public comment. He supported the in-ground design and asked that the park also have drinking fountain access.

Tom Malson, a former city council member, recalled the original process of approving the park. He noted that Galt resident Al Baldwin had been a major advocate for the park, and he suggested that the park be named after Baldwin.

The commission voted, 3-1, to recommend the in-ground design and noted support for naming the park after Baldwin. Smith's was the sole no vote.



Liberty Ranch Wrestling Begins League Season






