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How to Make Your Vote Count in 2024 Primary

GALT, CA (MPG) -Sacramento County Elections Office has started sending out mail-in ballots for the upcoming primary election, and Galt residents have multiple ways of returning the ballots or voting in person. Election Day is March 5. Here are your options:

Vote by mail, ballot drop boxes

You can send in your completed mail-in ballot by dropping it off either at the post office or at one of the drop boxes set up in Galt and the rest of Sacramento County. In order to be counted, ballots sent through the mail must be postmarked no later than Election Day and received by the Sacramento County Elections Office within seven days after Election Day. Additionally, the county has set up dozens of ballot drop boxes for voters to use. You can submit your ballot at any of the drop boxes in the county, including the three in Galt, on or before Election Day. The Galt drop-box locations are as follows: Comfort Inn & Suites, 10380 Twin Cities Road – Galt-Marian O. Lawrence Library, 1000 Caroline Ave.

GALT, CA (MPG) - With an extended, weeklong schedule, the 17th annual Winter Bird Festival had no shortage of exciting activities for avian enthusiasts, from seasoned birdwatchers to curious children.

The festival events ran from Monday, Jan. 29, to Sunday, Feb. 4, with craft nights, readalongs and tours of Cosumnes River Preserve.

On one tour, photographer Jim Dunn explained to a group of about 15 the patience and planning needed to capture images of birds in the wild.

Over 25 years of volunteering of the preserve, he has taken part in water bird surveys and led monthly photo walks. Nowadays, he focuses on monitoring wood ducks and leading occasional tours.

Dunn said he transitioned to bird photography because he "got tired of photographing weddings," which wasn't artistically stimulating. At the time, he lived above a lake with grebes and other water birds, as well as bald eagles and golden eagles, making his new direction clear.

On the tour, birds generally kept their distance from the large group, and Dunn said his main goal was to give the attendees the knowledge to locate and photograph birds by themselves, when they could potentially get closer angles.

"I only hope that gives people a chance to enjoy what they do more," Dunn said.

The festivities culminated on Feb. 3 with a *Continued on Page 3*



Erias to Return to Galt as Interim City Manager

GALT, CA (MPG) - Chris Erias, a former city of Galt department head, is likely to return in order to fill in as interim city manager.

The city announced the plan in a press release on Feb. 5, following the official departure of City Manager Lorenzo Hines Jr. on Feb. 2. The release said Galt City Council is anticipated to appoint Erias as interim city manager later this month.

Erias worked for the city for 15 years, becoming community development director in late 2016. He left in 2020 to lead the city of Manteca's Development Services Office.

"During his time in Manteca, Chris demonstrated exceptional leadership and dedication to public service while overseeing a staff of 24 in the Building Safety and Planning Divisions in the growing city," the release read.

"Chris' journey in Galt is a testament to his commitment and *Continued on Page 5*

The drop boxes are accessible during those locations' normal business hours. On Election Day, the boxes at Comfort Inn and the Galt library will be available until 8 p.m.

Before returning your mail-in ballot, remember to put it into the pink return envelope, and to sign and date the envelope. No postage is necessary.

If you want to keep tabs on your ballot, and find out when it is received and counted, the BallotTrax system is available as a free *Continued on Page 2*

Continued from page 1 service. Users register or log in using public-record information (name, birth date, ZIP code), and they can choose to receive notifications via email, text or voice call. To sign up, visit ballottrax.net.

Vote in person through Election Day

If you want to cast your ballot in person, vote centers will provide the opportunity to vote early or on Election Day. You can visit any vote center in the county. Eighteen vote centers will open on Feb. 24, including one in Galt:

— Littleton Community Center, 410 Civic Drive

The Littleton vote center will be open every day 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. On Election Day, it will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.

An additional 70 vote centers will open on March 2, with one in Galt and another in Herald:

The DHA vote center will be open every day from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., while the Herald center is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Both will be open from 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Election Day.


"I love it. I really feel touched. ... I'm just glad to be part of this community," Martin said of the recognition.



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home to be with his Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, on January 11, 2024 at the age of 87. His family was by his side until the end. Darrell is survived by his loving wife of 35 years, Mary Lancaster, as well as his children - Dan (Rita)

Lancaster, Joy (John Meyer), Pam (Dave) Wilson, David (Lupe) Lancaster and their mother Alda Lee Halsey. He also leaves behind 10 grandchildren, 20 great grandchildren, and three great great grandchildren.

Darrell was born in Hastings, Michigan on March 27, 1936 to Edwin (Ned) and Goldis Lancaster. He graduated from Nashville High School in 1954. At the age of 18, he became a Christian and turned his life over to the Lord, to whom he remained faithful until his last breath.

In 1966, he took his family to Papua New Guinea to support the work of the missionaries with Wycliff Bible Translators. He was assigned to manage the store in Ukarumpa on the base, which was a little operation offering food and supplies to the compound by ship delivery. Over the years, the store expanded to offer more supplies and home goods. Darrell grew his knowledge and expertise in purchasing, shipping and receiving and was very proud of his work. He often reminisced how much he knew about overseas procurement and getting the best deal was his ultimate goal. In 1976, he and his family returned to Southern California.

Darrell met Mary in 1988 and they were married for almost 35 years. They moved to Galt in the early 90s where they spent They loved hosting an annual 4th of July party and Christmas Eve celebration for family and friends.

Darrell had a giftware business and would go to gift shows in San Francisco and Las Vegas to get ideas for new products to

sell. After the giftware business started to wane, he joined Raley's and worked there for seven years in various roles until he retired.

Darrell and Mary enjoyed traveling and took several trips over the years, which included Hawaii, Caribbean Islands and Alaska. They also enjoyed visiting historic sites in California such as the Gold Country, Lake Tahoe and San Francisco. Darrell described Mary as a great blessing the last 35 years of his life as well as a great companion and wife. He admired Mary's drive, determination and was very proud of her fortitude.

Surrounded by family, just days before going home to be with the Lord, he shared his testimony which began in this way:

"The days that I'm here, I'd like to serve the Lord, and I'd like to be a glory to Him and not to myself...[at my funeral] I don't want to be glorified...I want to hear... 'He was my dad, and he had his shortcomings, and he needed training himself to live his life better but [dad] wanted you to hear that Jesus Christ came to the Earth to save sinners and He died on the cross because of His love for each one of us'."

The funeral service is scheduled on Friday, February 23, 2024 at 11:30 AM at Shepherd of the Valley Lutheran Church located at 604 E Street, Galt, CA 95632

Continued from Page 1 day of activities and presentations at Chabolla Community Center. Art competitions showed the work of bird photographers and of local students who submitted their drawings of birds. Representatives from conservation organizations in the region presented about the importance of animals like eagles, owls and bats in the ecosystem.

Keynote speaker Kate Rutter introduced the topic of her talk on nature journaling by discussing the festival's featured bird, the black-crowned night heron. It was an experience with the night heron that ignited her interest in bird watching.

While drawing trees in an urban nature area, she heard unfamiliar birds squawking and looked around to see three blackcrowned night herons. The birds squabbled amongst themselves and chased each other, and she noticed the birds' appearance.

"It's got a long neck, like most herons, but it keeps it tucked in, so it's got this sturdy kind of thing, and this very fierce eye," Rutter told the Herald. "And then when the ruff went up, I was done for. I'm like, what a beautiful bird."

She said nature journaling is a method of quickly sketching the wildlife, weather conditions and other sensory information in a scene, in order to remember it more clearly later on.

She handed out a quick guide to nature journaling that she had co-created. It can be downloaded at wildwonder.org/ nature-journaling-resources.

Michele Dodge, the second keynote speaker, gave a photographic tour of the Great Pacific Flyway, one of the main bird migration routes that crosses North America. The Cosumnes River wetlands have been a major stop on the flyway since time immemorial, and Dodge said more than 1 billion birds travel at least part of the flyway.

While population growth, urbanization and agriculture have encroached on the wetlands, Dodge said the farmlands can be used as artificial wetlands during the winter months to restore some of the habitat. At the same time, the birds clean and fertilize the fields.

Dodge illustrated her review of the seasons at Cosumnes River Preserve with bird photos she took in the area.

GALT, CA (MPG) - The Galt and Liberty Ranch high school theater troupe competed in the Lenaea High School Theatre Festival over the weekend of Feb. 2-4, showcasing the students' acting abilities in various musical numbers, monologues and short scenes, as well as a one-act play. A performance at Galt High on Feb. 1 gave them a chance to perform their pieces for a crowd of local supporters before the big moment came.

Liberty Ranch seniors Joseph St. Claire and Leonidas Dunfee won bronze and a respondent's award for their duo scene, "The Actors" by Gary Michael Kluger, in which two actors waiting for an audition turn out to have very different approaches to their craft. St. Claire also gave a monologue from "Les Misérables."

Maurena Emslie, a Liberty Ranch senior, sang "Maybe This Time" from "Cabaret" and performed a monologue from the play "Rather Be a Man" by Joseph Arnone. She got the chance to work with veteran Broadway actor Stephanie J. Block, an opportunity given to only 12 people.

The one-act, "Tracks" by Peter Tarsi, involved 10 students on stage and four on crew. The play tells of a group of people from across the country who suddenly find themselves in a strange subway station. After realizing that they have all recently died, the group struggle to determine whether the subway train is headed for Heaven or Hell — and whether it's worth the risk to get on and find out.

Matia Brunson performed "There Are Worse Things I Could Do" from "Grease" and a monologue from "And Turning, Stay," while Dylan Cowey delivered a monologue from Machiavelli's "Mandrake." The two also did a duo scene from "Snow White and the Seven Dwarves of the Black Forest." Finn Anderson gave a monologue from "Prodigal Son" by John Patrick Shanley.



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"How many of you remember the first time you saw a Black person?" asked my sociology professor in my freshman class at Baylor University.

Several students answered with stories about the first time they saw a Black person walking beside the road or working in their backyard.

I was shocked. But I really shouldn't have been. It was 1975 and my southern friends had enjoyed school holidays for "confederated heroes," yet not for Abraham Lincoln.

As a Californian, I was out of my element, but I counted myself lucky to be free of their racist upbringing.

Or was I?

With the beginning of Black History Month we might find how confessing our own history can provide insight into understanding racial issues.

As a boy growing up in the San Francisco Bay Area, my skin was as white as the fog that shrouded my hometown hills. But it was mostly the fog of my family's southern roots that made me "color blind" to other races and cultures.

It was from the distant listening post of my Richmond, Calif., home where I began hearing the cries of social change, muffled and off-key.

In 1967, I started fifth grade with the announcement that our school, Balboa Elementary, would soon receive our first Black students.

Few of my classmates said anything, holding our comments for the playground, where we assembled around Keith, our class troublemaker.

A Dream For All

Keith seemed to always be fighting someone on the schoolvard. It was even rumored that he was once suspended for hitting a teacher.

He persuaded us that we needn't fear these Black children - as long as "us white kids stick together."

"Don't anyone talk to them," he commanded. We agreed. We'd follow our appointed leader and stick together.

"If they cause any trouble," Keith said, slamming his fist into his palm, "we'll show them who really runs this playground."

We weren't just counting on Keith; we were counting on our geography too.

For you see, while many U.S. towns were segregated by only railroad tracks, Richmond was segregated by a freeway. And with the district out of money for bussing, we thought our school would be safe from integration.

And it would have been except for one thing.

"The tunnel," as the kids called it, was a darkened pedestrian walkway under our freeway that reeked of urine and was paved with broken soda bottles..

Located only a few hundred yards from our playground, the tunnel was forbidden territory. All of our parents warned that none of us were to ever cross through the tunnel that connected the Black community to the white one.

So, one September morning in 1967, as troop strength in Viet Nam approached 500,000, a small group of 10-year-old soldiers in the war on prejudice emerged from the tunnel. They carried the look of a scraggly group of Pop Warner football players returning to a halftime deficit - overwhelmed both by the size of the field and the stakes of the game.

Among those kids were Deborah, Agnes, Geoffrey and Gregory. I still remember their names because that was the first time I truly "saw" a Black person.

Usually my columns work toward a dramatic climax, but the most dramatic thing in today's story is that nothing happened. No drama. Nothing


Keith didn't beat anyone up. Nobody rioted or protested. We just had life happen right amongst us. Agnes stole my pencils, but Deborah stole my heart. Gregory beat me out on the history quizzes. Both he and Agnes easily beat me in the 50-yard dash.

No drama until that first Thursday in April 1968. Sometime after the evening fog returned to the Richmond hills, a friend came over to tell me he'd just heard that Martin Luther King had been assassinated in Memphis

Now, almost fifty-five years, it seems to me that in the end, our little school became part of King's dream as it was "...transformed into a situation where little Black boys and Black girls will be able to join hands with little white boys and white girls and walk together as sisters and brothers."

That's my history. What's yours?

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




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Today we celebrate one of America's all-time favorite foods. It is National Pizza Day! Whether it is thin crust, Chicago style, deep dish, or anything in between, a pizza is an American favorite.

As we chow down or "nosh," as the young people say, on our favorite pizza, explore a few pizza facts: According to "Who Invented Pizza - The History of 'Za" by Streets of New York, pizza dates back thousands of years, believe it or not, tracing its roots back to the flatbreads with toppings that were popular with ancient Egyptians, Greeks and Romans.

But modern pizza, the flatbread with tomato sauce, cheese and toppings, was born along the western coast of Italy, in the city of Naples. Naples was notorious for its masses of poor, working-class people. Those people needed to eat! That meant inexpensive food, and since much of their lives was spent outdoors, it needed to be able to be eaten quickly.

Flatbreads sold by street vendors were then topped with tomatoes, cheese, garlic, anchovies and oil; they became the food of the time, available for every meal and easily affordable for all. And thus, pizza was born! That's right, even from the beginning people have been eating pizza for breakfast! (Don't let anyone tell you otherwise!)

In the 1940s, immigrants from Naples were landing in America looking for new

opportunities. And with them came pizza, which they sold to the millions of Europeans who immigrated to the United States. One of earliest pizzerias in the United States opened in Manhattan. Lombardi's was named for its owner, Gennaro Lombardi. As of today, 116 years later, Lombardi's is still selling slices of pizza from that same oven! While they moved locations, they took the oven with them.

After that, it was only a matter of time before pizza raced across the nation, spreading with Italian Americans across the United States. After World War II, pizza took off in the United States. No longer thought of as ethnic food, it became a part of American food culture. New regional variants developed in the Midwest,

South and West: New York style, Chicago style, California style — all tasty, all unique.

My favorite is Italian garlic with original crust, white sauce, sausage, pepperoni (most popular topping), garlic, fresh chopped tomatoes and green onions. Don got a pizza baker from Santa, and he has mastered baking the perfect crispy crust and yummy toppings. I think we will be having pizza for dinner tonight. Or maybe for the Super Bowl.

Are ready for some football? I was so happy the 49ers are playing. Brock Purdy's story is almost unbelievable. A good Christian boy drafted last in the 2022 draft as Mr. Irrelevant, and now he is the starting quarterback in the Super Bowl. Yes, God has a plan.

And then on the Chiefs' side, the team has played in the Super Bowl like forever and won a few. A team of very talented men, coached by an equally talented coach. And great commercials. Now there is an added extra — the cherry on top to add a little spice for those who don't truly watch the game — the sweet romance of Taylor and Travis. Wow! Good stuff, there will be something for everyone.
