WEST SACRAMENTO (MPG) -The West Sacramento Police Department held their Annual Awards dinner to honor the outstanding work that West Sacramento's finest did in 2023. With all of the officers in their finest blues and sporting their shiniest awards, stripes, bars and stars, our distinguished Police force was able to relax for the night as they received the praise that they so often earn but are so rarely given.

The West Sacramento Police Department has been working very hard to interact with the community in a positive way, while still doing what is required to safeguard our city. Carl Crouch was MC for the evening. He started off by stating that the "hard-working law enforcement employees are the backbone of our community's safety and security. Whether patrolling the streets, investigating crimes, working behind the scenes to support department operations or engaging with the community. their efforts contribute to fostering a sense of safety and trust."

Chief of Police, Rob Strange, had some very touching words about the West Sacramento Police force. "True character is revealed in the most difficult of times... and we have experienced and endured those events and period of time both personally and professionally throughout 2023", he said. The chief spoke about the comradery and support that "serves to

soften even the sharpest pains," while talking about the force's brotherhood.

The West Sacramento Police Department Awards are as follows: Commanding Officer's Citation – Traffic Secretary Jessica Hunt. Commanding Offer's Citation - West Sacramento Police Department SWAT has been activated and deployed to an increasing number of critical incidences, which forces them to balance their primary responsibilities with their critical role as a SWAT member. West Sacramento Police Department SWAT Team: Sergeant Alexei Venikov, Sergeant Andre Kinda, SIU Detective Nate Ogden, Detective Cody Coulter, Officer Seth Killion, Officer Hector Torres, Officer Jesus Gonzalez, Officer Jonas Eiremo, Officer Curtis Adams, Former members Naziry Yakimchuk and Nick Lewis.

Commanding Officer's Citation Investigations Unit. In this past year, the Investigations Unit has worked very hard in their duties. But in addition to their own case load, they often had to assist others. Also, because of being short staffed, many of the Investigating Officers filled various shifts on patrol, while simultaneously investigating a homicide. Commanding Officer's Citation – Finance Analyst Shawnae Brooks.

Exceptional Performance Ribbon - Sgt. Jerry Watson. Sergeant Watson, in addition to patrol, is a training officer. In 2023,

he coordinated field training for four community service officers, five police officers and six police recruits. He has balanced the schedules for the officers, accommodated new recruitment ideas and worked with other agencies to support the recruit's progress, visits academies and even attending training graduations. Many times, these items are outside of his regular duties.

Exceptional Performance Ribbon - Officer Mitchell Williams is enthusiastic with a positive outlook on his job. He is a Field Training Officer who also serves on the Recruitment Team. He is known to treat everyone with respect and will always take the time to help someone with a question.

Exceptional Performance Ribbon - Officer Ricardo Ramirez, while working mandatory overtime, became aware of a call of a fight with a knife. He assigned himself to the call and responded while cover officers became available. He was quickly alerted to a victim with multiple stab wounds. Officer Ramirez administered medical care until West Sac Fire arrived. While officers were still arriving, Ramirez was able to provide crucial information that led to the suspect's arrest. This was vital because at that point, officers believed the suspect was a victim.

Exceptional Performance Ribbon - Sgt. Jason Fortier is the sergeant of the traffic unit. In addition to responding to the city's traffic complaints, he is also in charge of traffic for all big events in West Sacramento. In 2023, the city hosted multiple large-scale events and Sergeant Fortier managed this with only half the staff.

Life Saving Medal - Officer Michael Muro responded to a shooting that occurred in the area of Tradewinds Circle. Officer Muro arrived within three minutes of the call and found the victim had been shot in the leg. Officer Muro applied a tourniquet, while translating from Spanish to English, vital information to responding officers. It was later determined at UC Davis Hospital that the victim had a damaged artery in his leg and the tourniquet

applied saved his life. Life Saving Medal - Officer Hector Torres and Officer Jonas Eiremo responded to a two-vehicle accident on West Capitol Avenue and Westacre Road. Upon arrival, the two officers assessed two victims that were trapped in one of the vehicles. Officer Eiremo broke the window to gain access. While Eiremo was assessing the victim, officer Torres pulled the damaged door out of the way. The officers checked the passenger's vitals. She was unconscious with shallow breathing. The officers removed her from the car and could not feel a pulse. They administered CPR until they were relieved by West Sacramento Fire D and AMR, who continued CPR until the female's

Yolo County Fair Mall Permanently Closed

YOLO COUNTY (MPG) -

After years and years of the County Fair Mall being in business in Woodland, they have finally closed their doors for good. Located

across the street from the Yolo County Fairgrounds on Gibson Road, the mall has struggled to stay open. Stores have been in and out of that location in hopes of picking up business.

During a county

fire inspection, the Woodland Fire Department inspected the mall, as part of fire safety standards and discovered significant fire code violations. Among the violations, the most concerning problem is with the mall's fire suppression system. Officials were going to allow JC Penny's to remain open, but due to the seriousness of the repairs needed and for the safety of the occupants, the owners decided to vacate the remaining sections of the mall.

Ownership and management of the mall were notified that immediate repairs needed to be made, but no response from either, was received by the Fire Department. The mall is now closed down, and legal

litigation has begun between the tenants of the mall and the owners for violation of lease and early termination of lease.

There are no plans reported for repairs to be made in the near future, or for the mall to re-open.

Learn About the Criminal Justice System at the District Attorney's Citizens Academy

Applications are now being accepted for the annual Yolo County District Attorney Citizens Academy. The academy is sponsored by the Yolo County District Attorney's Office in cooperation with the Yolo County Sheriff's Office, the California Highway Patrol, the Davis Police Department, the UC Davis Police Department, the West Sacramento Police Department, the Winters Police Department, the Woodland Police Department, and the Yolo County Probation Department.

The Citizen's Academy is an eight-week journey designed to involve diverse communities in participating in mutual learning about the criminal justice system. The goal is to educate the public and improve relationships and communication between the many different communities in Yolo County and the criminal justice system. The academy is scheduled to be held in person at the Yolo County Administration Building in Woodland.

Topics this year will include: the role of the District Attorney; the role of law enforcement; victim services; gangs; restorative justice practices and collaborative courts addressing mental illness and addiction. In past years, participants observed a DUI trial and K-9 officer presentations. Participants will also learn about the innovative programs implemented at the District Attorneys' Office aimed at addressing racial inequity and increasing transparency.

Yolo County District Attorney Jeff Reisig stated that "The Academy provides a comprehensive look at the criminal justice system in Yolo County. Together we will explore how the system interplays with our communities from West Sacramento to the rural areas." Reisig continued, "I think participants will be educated, enlightened and entertained."

Beginning on Monday, February 5, all active registered voters in Yolo County were mailed a Vote-by-Mail ballot. All active registered voters in Yolo County can expect their ballot to arrive in their mailbox by Monday, February 12, 2024. If your ballot has not arrived by Tuesday, February 13, 2024, please contact the Yolo County Elections Office.

Voters are encouraged to sign-up for vote-by-mail ballot tracking at WheresMyBallot. sos.ca.gov. Those who sign-up will receive automated notifications about their vote-by-mail ballots by email, text, or voice call.

The Elections Office will continue to process and accept vote by mail ballots during regular business hours, and, if needed, after business hours and weekends. For the most up to date daily times for return identification envelope processing, please contact the elections office at (530) 666-8133. Return identification envelope processing will occur at the Yolo County Elections Office, 625 Court St., Suite B-05, Woodland.

"To promote transparency in elections, the

scanning and processing of ballots is open to the public," says Jesse Salinas, Yolo County Assessor/ Clerk-Recorder/Registrar of Voters. Those interested in observing should email elections@yolocounty.org.



Social Security Matters

How is my Social Security Benefit Calculated?

Dear Rusty: I appreciate vour recent article dispelling the myth that politicians have stolen Social Security money. As a CPA, I dispel this myth repeatedly to clients who falsely claim SS funds have been raided. But another thing I deal with often is how SS benefits are calculated. I know the formula for determining each person's benefit amount is complex, but I have had to explain numerous times that those who put the most into Social Security get the lowest rate of return and those who put the least in get the highest return based on the way the benefit formula is structured. I get tired of people complaining that monthly Social Security payments are higher for retired doctors and other highly paid individuals. Can you please explain how Social Security is weighted in favor of lower income workers? Signed: Tired of the Misunderstandings

Dear Tired: Please don't be frustrated. Because of the program's complexity, Social Security is prone to misunderstanding, and educating the misinformed is an important professional duty we share. Here's how each person's SS benefit is determined:

The first thing to know is that each person's SS retirement benefit is not based on their financial contributions to the program. Social Security's

purpose is to provide a benefit which replaces a portion of the person's pre-retirement income, so the SS benefit is based on actual lifetime earnings, not on the payroll taxes withheld from those earnings.

Social Security has your lifetime earnings record (obtained annually from the IRS) and that record determines your "primary insurance amount" or "PIA." Your "PIA" is initially determined in your eligibility year (usually age 62) and is the amount you will get if you claim for benefits to start exactly at your full retirement age (FRA).

To develop your PIA, Social Security first adjusts (indexes) each year of your lifetime earnings (up to the annual payroll tax cap) to account for inflation. They then select the 35 inflation-adjusted years in which you earned the most, from which they compute your average monthly earnings over your lifetime (this is called your Average Indexed Monthly Earnings, or "AIME"). They then break your AIME into three segments, the first of which includes a majority of - and possibly all of - your AIME. They then take a percentage of each segment and total those three amounts to determine your PIA. The first segment is the largest and 90% of that first segment contributes most of your PIA. Smaller percentages of the other two segments (32% and 15% respectively if your AIME is higher), are then added to the first computation to arrive at your full PIA - the amount you get if you start benefits in the month you reach your FRA. Note that since most of the PIA comes from the first large segment of each person's AIME, lower income workers get a higher percentage of their lifetime average monthly amount.

Since benefits are based on earnings, those with lower

lifetime earnings do, indeed, get a smaller benefit than those with higher average lifetime earnings, but the percentage of pre-retirement replacement income lower income workers receive is higher than for those with higher monthly average lifetime earnings. The Social Security benefit for lower income workers is typically about 40% of their pre-retirement average monthly income, while those with higher lifetime average earnings may get a benefit as little as 20% of their average monthly pre-retirement earnings. In that sense, the Social Security benefit formula is progressive and weighted in favor of lower income workers. Nevertheless, albeit a smaller replacement percentage, higher income workers receive a higher monthly SS benefit because of their higher lifetime earnings. Even so, those higher earners did, indeed, contribute more payroll taxes from their higher earnings.

So, each person's SS retirement benefit amount is a percentage of their pre-retirement income. Coincidently, those with higher pre-retirement income also contributed more to the Social Security program than did those with lower earnings. But their higher SS benefit amount is based on their higher pre-retirement earnings, not on payroll taxes paid from those higher earnings.

Will California Leaders Nurture Or Strangle The State's Economic Golden Goose?

During California's 174 years of statehood, it has undergone periodic and often dramatic changes of economic personality.

Its admission to the union in 1850 was largely driven by the gold rush, which temporarily supplanted the agriculture and cattle ranching that had been economic mainstays.

When the gold rush cooled in the late 19th century, farming and ranching resumed their central roles. It's hard to believe now, but Los Angeles County was the nation's most agriculturally productive county in the first decades of the 20th century.

The state's northern reaches developed a major timber industry, and oddly oil was first discovered in 1865 amid Humboldt County's dense forests, a historic fact perpetuated in the name of a tiny hamlet, Petrolia.

However, Southern California saw a much larger oil boom in the final years of the century, and California quickly became the nation's biggest petroleum producer. Simultaneously, the movie industry blossomed in Southern California, thanks to its scenic settings and sunny weather and the

moguls to escape from the East Coast's intolerant attitudes and legal disputes.

California's economy, still largely rooted in extracting resources from the earth, underwent a major change when the nation became embroiled in World War II. It became a staging point for the Pacific war, the site of numerous military training bases and an industrial powerhouse producing airplanes and other tools of war, such

as ships. California's central role in producing weaponry and training military personnel continued after the war because the United States soon found itself in a cold war with the Soviet Union, one aspect of which was a hot war in Korea and later another conflict in

Southeast Asia. California also saw postwar expansions in civilian industries with steel mills, petrochemical plants, auto assembly lines and multiple other factories. However, by the 1970s, California's heavy industry was shrinking as one-by-one the plants that had employed hundreds of thousands of workers shut down, with the last remaining major manufacturing industry, aerospace, drying up as the Cold War ended in the 1990s and Pentagon con-

tracts disappeared. Fortunately, military research contracts and Stanford University had spawned a new industry - digital technology - centered in the Santa Clara Valley south of San Francisco. For

desires of early movie an agricultural center. Renamed Silicon Valley, it has anchored California's economy ever since, generating immense wealth that percolated through other economic sectors.

California's economy may be undergoing another evolution. Silicon Valley's high-flying past is giving way to a more uncertain future as companies shed thousands of workers and other states see tech industry growth.

California's past, present and uncertain future deserve intense political, media and academic attention because how its economy evolves will determine how well the state as a whole manages

during the 21st century. That's why a recent announcement that the Public Policy Institute of California is creating an economic research arm is important. Hopefully, the Economic Policy Center's research will persuade political and civic leaders to stop taking the state's economy for granted and reconsider policies that are strangling the golden

However, the center's first paper – aimed at framing the existing economic picture – is not reassuring. It all but ignores the structural factors that threaten the economy, dwells on superficial effects, and shows a fondness for political mitigation of those effects rather than fixing

He's a good student, and my husband and I want to look at this as a young person's one-time mistake. Do you think we should pay off the card for him just this once?

you wanting to help him out. It means you've got a good heart, and you love him. No parent likes seeing their child in a bad situation.

There's a reality here, though, I hope you won't overlook. It's his debt, not yours. He knew what he was doing when he signed up for that credit card. He knew what it meant, what was expected, and he's the one who should make good on the repayment. There's nothing unfair about that.

Now, you're right. This is a typical young person's mistake. And like a lot of mistakes our kids make, it's one that's bad and wonderful at the same time. It's bad because if he had just listened to you and his dad, he would've avoided the whole mess. It's wonderful, though, because it gives you two the opportunity to provide him with a real world, teachable

At this point, my advice is for both of you to give him a great big hug, and lovingly explain where he

went wrong and why it was a bad idea. If you want, you can even go a step further, and help him find a parttime job if he doesn't have one right now, so he can pay off his debt and get out of this mess. It'll take some planning and discipline on his part, but leave the payments to him. Hopefully, by the time he finishes working his tail off-and scrimping and saving to pay this debt—he will have learned a lesson he'll remember for the rest of his life.

WEST SACRAMENTO, CA (MPG) - On Thursday, February 8, at approximately 4:00pm, Officers responded to a call of an assault with a deadly weapon with multiple subjects assaulting a victim in the area of 6th and F Streets. The victim had significant injuries and was transported to the hospital for medical treatment. The suspects fled the scene, and were located in the area of Kegle, Joan and Sharian Streets. Officers set up a perimeter and began searching for the suspects with a police K9 as well as air support.

Two suspects were taken into custody, and the SWAT team was able to safely search the homes and area within the perimeter and determined no other suspects were inside. Both residences in question were searched, and four handguns, including two which were found to be stolen along with extended magazines, ammunition and additional evidence related to the earlier assault were collected.

While this is still an ongoing investigation, we would like to thank our neighboring agencies for their support, as well as our community for your patience as we worked through this active investigation into the evening hours yesterday. ★



Fruit Fly Quarantines Multiply to Prevent Threats to Farms

Seven counties remain under quarantines in a battle to eradicate and stop the spread of four different species of invasive fruit flies that agricultural officials say could wreak havoc on California farms and hundreds of crops. The Oriental fruit fly triggered quarantines in parts of Santa Clara, Contra Costa, Sacramento, Riverside and San Bernardino counties. Portions of Los Angeles County have been under quarantines due to findings of the Mediterranean, Tau and Queensland fruit flies. The Queensland quarantine largely affects Ventura County centered around Thousand Oaks.

Governor Announces Strategy to Protect Salmon Populations

As California experiences hotter, drier temperatures due to climate change, Gov. Gavin Newsom has announced the state's first strategy to protect and help restore salmon species to reduce their risk of extinction. The California Salmon Strategy, released last week, is a 37-page document that outlines actions state agencies are already taking to stabilize and recover salmon populations. The strategy calls for steps including removing barriers and improving infrastructure for salmon migration, restoring habitat, protecting water flows

in key rivers and modernizing hatcheries.

Pg&E Electric Transmission Project Raises Concerns in Lodi Wine Country

Farmers and vintners in northern San Joaquin County are expressing concern about an electrical transmission project they say would bisect farm properties, restrict the ability to change crops and negatively affect property values in one of the state's top wine regions. Growers with farms in the path of the transmission system proposed by investor-owned Pacific Gas & Electric Co. and the local municipal power provider, Lodi Electric Utility, raised concerns during a virtual meeting last week of the California Public Utilities Commission

Wine Sales Slow Amid Messaging Discouraging Drinking

Winemakers in the U.S. and abroad are struggling to sell their product, and leaders in the sector are increasingly focused on anti-alcohol messaging. Shanken, a news organization that collects data on wine, beer and spirits, reports that 2023 was the third consecutive year of negative volume growth for U.S. wine sales, following more than a decade of flattening consumption. Some in the wine sector have traced the origin of negative health messaging around wine to a 2018 study published by The Lancet, which found there was "no safe level" of alcohol

consumption.




