

LIVE OAK, CA (MPG) - The February 21 Live Oak City Council focused on approving a temporary fix for a broken water pipe in an irrigation ditch near Archer Avenue and Live Oak Blvd. City Engineer Scott Rolls asked to use All American Contractors, currently under contract on the Pennington East project, to stabilize the collapsing walls of the 1940s era pipe rather than go to bids for permanent repair. Rolls advised waiting for a larger, upcoming federally funded project under which this one could be included, and all together being put out for bid.

Rolls said he was not able to see through the old pipe to take a clear picture of the condition along the inside walls, but it was clear sections of it had fallen in. A city crew had filled the pipe with rock to stabilize it.

No water is passing through and customers do not have water at this irrigation site outside the city limits. It is not part of its billing system, only a District facility, but the California Code of Regulations says it is Live Oak's responsibility to fix it," as it was there when the City incorporated, reported Rolls. "We will have to excavate to see damage."

Rolls explained that the site on Archer and Live Oak is eligible for federal funding. The permanent fix would involve digging up the whole road from L St. to the city limits for complete reconstruction. Mayor Ashley Hernandez asked if there were any similar projects like this, and Rolls replied there were three, but they are just outside the city limits.

Council unanimously approved a resolution to authorize the procurement of necessary equipment, services, and supplies, without giving notice for bids on this work.

Councilmember Bob Woten reported attending a Regional Waste Disposal Agency meeting in which it was emphasized that State Bill 1383 be enforced requiring that commercial food waste must be turned into compost and other things. Compliance for commercial customers in Live Oak is currently at 61%.

Councilmember Jeramy Chapdelaine reported he attended a Regional Housing Authority meeting, which is in the process of approving an annual budget.

For all of you who actually remember one or more of the dead restaurants listed above, I bring news of the most extraordinary kind. On a recent trip to Idaho, my Sister-in-law Tiffany told me there is a Grumpy Burger in Idaho. Sure enough, I searched GRUMPY BURGERS in Couer d'Alene, Idaho, and right at the top of the menu was the "famous Grumpy Burger." Grumpy's was the drive-up Burger Joint housed in a big red barn at the north end of Gridley, south of Biggs, on Hwy 99. It was one of three Grumpy's restaurants, the other being in Auburn and Señor Grumpy's Mexican Restaurant in Paradise. The Grumpy's motto was "Grumpy's - where we really fuss over your food." Grumpy's in Gridley (in the 70s) was always hopping with people and is one of the top ten best-ever restaurants in the history of Gridley (post railroad expansion). And it lives on with Nate and Denise Schmidy who started Schmidy's Burgers in 2014. They wanted to

follow in the footsteps of Denise's parents, Kathy and Bud Hodges, who ran Grumpy's in California. Denise remembers working in the restaurants when she was eight years old. This new home to the legendary Grumpy Burger - Schmidy's Burgers - has an excellent reputation among local Idahoans, is consistently rated nearly 5 out of 5 stars, and has a steady stream of not-grumpy customers at the intersection of Lakeside and 4th Street. There is no doubt that 50 years from now, people will still be positively chatting up the Grumpy Burger. Like millions of other Californians, Bud and Kathy are retired and living in Idaho; it is still disputed whether Kathy was grumpy, or Bud was grumpy, or they both just feigned being grumpy as part of the sales and marketing efforts. The famous Grumpy Hodges family is happy now, and the Grumpy Burger lives on.

GRIDLEY, CA (MPG) - On Saturday, Feb. 24, and Sunday, Feb. 25, the Gridley Museum was open to the public while participating in the fifth annual Explore Museum Weekend.

Hosted by Explore Butte County, 16 museums, galleries, and cultural centers opened their doors over the weekend with free admission. Participating museums included The Gridley Museum, Chico's Centerville-Colman,

Children's, History, Gateway Science, Northern California Art, Janet Turner Print, and the Valene Smith of Anthropology. In Oroville, Bolt's Antique Tool, Butte County Historical Society, C.F. Lott Home, Feather River Nature Center, Historic State Theatre, Chinese Temple, and the Pioneer History Museums.

When requested, attendees received a 'passport'. The passport was stamped by the staff of five different museums on the program. Then, you have until March 31st to redeem your passport to

receive special deals at local participating restaurants.

Each day at 1:00, Ruth Ann King, the director of the Gridley Museum, conducted a four to five-block walking tour around town, pointing out and describing landmarks and buildings with historical backgrounds. Pat Teague, a researcher and docent of the museum, implemented a fascinating presentation about the town of Hamilton, a mining town situated on the west side of the Feather River, that was once the county seat in 1850. Hamilton

lost the title to Oroville in August of 1853.

Quoted from the presentation, "Today, the town of Hamilton is just a memory of a rollicking time filled with gold fever dreams of becoming wealthy. There is no Hamilton ghost town, just a cemetery with a few headstones and a historical marker."

In the audience were several adults, one dog, and one exceptional child. Local resident, Henry Radley 7, sat through the 45-minute presentation without the slightest wiggle. When asked

if he visited the museum often, Henry said, "Yeah, and did you know that railroad spike over there is really, really old?" He also enthusiastically informed the group what he had learned online about the 'chicken of the woods mushroom.' "When you cook it, it tastes like chicken," he said.

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

new business, in addition to the time you spend at your current job. In my mind, you'd have a better chance of making it work if you bought an existing business with a manager already in place. That way, at least you wouldn't have to be so entrepreneurial and constantly involved in things like adjusting the business model, checking prices and dealing with customers.

Honestly? This idea isn't a lot like real estate at all. Real estate will run itself—for the most part—once you find a tenant. Also, the number of hours you'd have to put into selling real estate on the side is nothing like the time you'd spend getting a new business off the ground.

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

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Man Sentenced To Prison For Drive-By Shooting At Chico Bar

BUTTE COUNTY, CA (MPG) - A Chico man was sentenced to eight years in prison for two counts of assault with a firearm, with an additional enhancement for causing serious injury when he shot two people outside a Chico bar in March of 2023.

Heriberto Hernandez-Figueroa, 29, of Chico, was sentenced today to prison for charges stemming from a drive-by shooting that happened outside of a local Chico bar in the 900 block of East Avenue.

Butte County District Attorney Mike Ramsey said on March 11, 2023, at approximately 11 p.m., the Chico Police Department began receiving 911 calls about the shooting that had just occurred. Officers responded and located two victims who had been shot in the drive-by. One had been shot in the leg, and another through the arm. Both victims were transported to a local hospital, received emergency medical treatment, and were later released. Officers learned from multiple witnesses that Hernandez-Figueroa had driven slowly by the bar and fired multiple shots from a handgun at a group of men standing on the sidewalk. The

shots missed the intended victim but hit another man and a bar bouncer.

Surveillance from the bar showed Hernandez-Figueroa had been inside the bar with a large group of people and had been in an argument with the intended victim who was later standing on the sidewalk with others.

Ramsey said that based on who the intended victim was, and based on their knowledge of Hernandez-Figueroa, detectives believe the shooting may have been gang-related. The case was prosecuted by the District Attorney's gang unit.

The injured bouncer wrote a victim impact letter to sentencing Judge Jesus Rodriguez detailing how he had lost most of the function of his left arm and hand. The victim noted that for "safety concerns, loss of income, and debilitating stress I was forced to relocate out-of-state where I could be closer to family and attempt to recover." The judge ordered restitution to this victim in an amount over \$17,000 and reserved further restitution pending further surgery.

Hernandez-Figueroa had previously been convicted of felony drug sales and possession of a firearm by a felon in 2018 and was sentenced to prison in that case. ★

Ghag reported the Sacramento Area Council on Government (SACOG) was dealing with the issue of race equity. It found that in the past some minority applicants were allowed to buy housing together without qualifying, then created HOAs and passed regulations biasing against other ethnicities buying in.

The Flood Control Committee is planning for repair of a two-mile-long local area, Ghag said, and a local wildlife area is acquiring improvements permits to seek a \$7.7 million improvement grant. Sediment removal from Yuba Water Agency may cost \$10 million, he said. The State Capital was voting on obtaining software called SERVE for mosquito vectoring so all agencies can feed data into it and access the same information to control mosquitoes as cheaply as possible, as some of the chemicals used against them have been banned. There are a lot of restrictions on spraying mainly at night, but

mosquitoes hide at night and in the cold, Ghag said. "Artificially created" mosquitoes designed to block reproduction have been released to breed, Ghag informed, saying a breeding ground for mosquitoes are transformers underground at the side of houses.

A review of Sewer costs was requested by Vice Mayor Nancy Santana, who also expressed concern over animal control, citing a lot of animals running the streets, with cats and dogs being hit. Santana asked if perhaps Gridley's animal control officer might look at our current cost to see if an officer from there could provide assistance to Live Oak. Santana also requested a spay/neuter clinic be held locally every couple of months at the community building. The Vice Mayor also inquired if Live Oak ever received the requested sheriff's call logs.

Mayor Hernandez reminded that PG&E offers help on heating for families that need it, and that the Penny Candy is close to finishing its remodeling. ★



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SPARKY'S CORNER SMOKE DETECTORS





With Day Light Saving Time Starting on the 8th of March, it's time to change the batteries or replace that old detector. Smoke alarms save lives! Smoke spreads fast inside a home, smoke detectors will alert you early and give you time to get out. Having a working smoke detector cuts the chances of dying in a reported fire in half. Almost two-thirds of home fire deaths resulted from fires in homes with no smoke detectors or no working smoke detectors. Working smoke detectors increase the chance of surviving a home fire by 50 percent.

Here's What Sparky Wants You To Know!

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area or hallway and on every level of your home. They should be mounted on the ceiling 4 inches from the wall away from windows and vents.
- Test your smoke alarms every month.
- Smoke detectors have a life span of 10 years, make sure to inspect your detectors to make sure they are not expired.
- Never paint over a detector and keep unit clean.
- CAL FIRE/ Gridley Fire Department recommends changing the batteries in your smoke detectors twice a year when you change your clocks.

When a smoke detector sounds, get outside and stay outside. Have a planned area the whole family knows to meet outside. Check next week's Sparky's Corner for Exit Drills In The Home (EDITH) to help you plan and practice evacuating your home in the event of an emergency.

Winegrape Production Outpaces Demand

California winegrape growers may be victims of their own success after harvesting a larger than average crop last fall during a cool growing season that has experts optimistic about the quality of the vintage. The 2023 crop came in at nearly 3.7 million tons, up from 3.3 million tons in 2022. But the production increase comes as U.S. wine sales dropped 9% in 2023, the third consecutive year of decline after more than a decade of flattening growth. The weakened consumer demand and the large bulk wine inventory has made it harder for growers to sell their fruit on the spot market.

Fertilizer Prices Stabilize, But Worries Persist Over Weather, Global Factors

After sharp spikes in fertilizer prices in 2022, farmers saw some relief last year as prices stabilized. With the 2024 planting season nearing, analysts say they're watching weather issues that could disrupt spring planting and transportation of fertilizers, as well as geopolitics that could affect fertilizer trade and production. Lower prices last year increased demand for fertilizer, and usage is expected to continue growing in 2024, but only by 1% or 2%, said Veronica Nigh, senior economist at The Fertilizer Institute in Arlington, Virginia.

World Ag Expo Highlights High-Tech Solutions for Farm Challenges

The World Ag Expo, celebrated as the largest outdoor farm trade show on the planet, lured throngs of attendees last week eager to see the latest in agricultural technology. Amid field demonstrations and more than 1,200 exhibits at the Feb. 13-15 event at the International Agri-Center in Tulare, expo presenters pitched agricultural innovation as a means to address farm labor challenges. Numerous equipment manufacturers showed off autonomous or efficiency-enhancing machinery as potential answers to farmers' struggles with rising labor costs and decreasing worker availability.

USDA Approves Use of Phosphine Gas on Citrus in Quarantine Areas

California citrus growers and packers within the Redlands Oriental fruit fly quarantine area of San Bernardino and Riverside counties now have a new postharvest treatment option. The U.S. Department of Agriculture earlier this month approved the use of phosphine fumigation in combination with five days of cold treatment as a postharvest treatment. That will allow growers to move fresh fruit from noncore areas of the quarantine to areas outside the quarantine. USDA said it approved phosphine fumigation because existing postharvest treatment options are not "economically viable." ★

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
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
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

Bulldogs senior forward Shmaas Khan and guard Travus Boyd along


with Kullar told the Herald all the early workouts at 6 a.m. and the late practices when no one was looking all paid off.

Beale Security Forces Expands Tactical Response Team

BEALE AIR FORCE BASE, CA (MPG) - The 9th Security Forces Squadron (SFS) recently held tryouts for Airmen across multiple career fields to join Beale's Tactical Response Team (TRT), also known as the Beale Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) team.

"The goal is a program that gives Beale a team of highly trained individuals with diverse backgrounds, disciplines and access that are capable of responding to complex situations on short notice," said Capt. James Stocks, 9th SFS operations officer. "We had to find driven and coachable individuals we could train to a high level of tactical proficiency."

The 9th SFS's decision to train airmen from other career fields to fit their needs ties into the United States Air Force's push for multi-capable, deployment ready Airmen who can fit the Air Force's Agile Combat Employment (ACE) needs. Per Air Force Doctrine 1-21 Agile Combat Employment, Multi-Capable Airmen (MCA) is defined as "Airmen trained in expeditionary skills and capable of accomplishing tasks outside of their core Air Force specialty," while generating combat power. Beale's newest TRT Airmen fit exactly into the definition of Multi-Capable Airmen.

"As far as MCA and deployment readiness, these members are developing knowledge of higher-level tactics that directly translates to the survivability and lethality of these members and their teams in contested environments," said Stocks. "We are all in the military, we should all be capable of picking up that weapon system to handle the threat."

The Beale TRT tryouts physical fitness qualification incorporated push-ups, sit-ups, pull-ups and a timed one-mile run as part of a physical fitness test. Ninety Airmen from a wide variety of career fields and ranks tried out, with 23 moving on to a shooting qualification.

The shooting qualification portion

included stress inoculation to simulate the high stress, high speed conditions of responding to a real-world situation. Airmen were then tested on their handgun and rifle proficiency with a "nine-hole drill," Baer Solutions Drill, and a moving and shooting portion with target discrimination. The test allowed Combat Arms Training & Maintenance (CATM) instructors to evaluate firearms proficiency and ability to follow directions while making decisions under stress.

After the shooting qualification, nine Airmen were invited to undergo a 48-hour assessment in which two Airmen were selected in the final result. These Airmen will continue on to Security Forces Augmentee Training and one to two weeks of in-depth Close Quarters Battle (CQB) training before they can become fully qualified members of Beale's TRT.

The 9th SFS plans on holding tryouts again in May to extend the opportunity to additional Multi-Capable Airmen.

The Airmen who ultimately join the team will be able to join Security Forces exercises, such as Exercise DRAGON TRIDENT that recently occurred with the Navy SEALs, weapons proficiency courses, Sacramento County SWAT School and open doors to Army schools, such as Air Assault.

Beale's TRT was originally created in 2017 with the selection process adapted to meet the base's growing mission and needs. The idea to expand the team to multiple career fields came from such adaptations.

"We started by including medics on our team to improve our overall response capabilities," said Staff Sgt. Dashawn Davis, 9th SFS TRT NCO in charge. "From this, we believed that career fields have something to offer and could holistically improve the team and our capabilities."

This experiment turned a concept into reality, which showcases the ingenuity of the U.S. Air Force to consistently do more with less and practice flexibility to overcome any challenge. ★
