## Holliston flag policy prohibits "third-party flags" from being flown on town-owned properties, including Town Hall

Such flags can be flown at Blair Square with Select **Board** approval

The Holliston Select board voted unanimously to approve a new flag policy on January 22, 2024. Under this new policy, "all town-owned flag poles and buildings are restricted to the United States, POW/MIA, State and Town flags, with the exception of the flag pole at Blair Square."

The purpose of the new policy, which can be found at www. townofholliston.us, is to provide "guidelines for the Town's flying or displaying, on Town of Holliston-owned properties, the flag of the United States of America, the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, as well as any other flags deemed appropriate by the Town for parades,



holidays, and other events and celebrations.

In December, the board met with special counsel Jay Talerman to discuss the 2022 Supreme Court decision Shurtleff, et al. v. City of Boston, et al. In that case, Shurtleff wanted to fly a religious flag on the third flagpole in front of Boston City Hall. The city refused claiming it could violate

the Establishment Clause and could constitute 'government speech.' Shurtleff said that violated the First Amendment's Free Speech Clause and sued the city.

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
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# Holliston approves HCA from Mayflower Medicinal to Onyx Grow

At its meeting on March 11, the Holliston Select Board unanimously approved the transfer of the Host Community Agreement (HCA) for the marijuana facility at 89 October Hill Road from Mayflower Medicinals to Onyx Grow LLC.

Mayflower opened the Holliston site in 2019 but stopped operating within the last year after it was purchased nationally, according to Town Administrator Travis Ahern. Onyx will take over the long-term lease.

Kobie Evans, co-owner of Pure Oasis, soon to be Onyx Grow LLC, told the board Onyx does not plan to make any changes at the site.

"We're excited for the opportunity to purchase this facility and also to work with Holliston, being a good community partner," Evans said. He noted his company currently owns two retail locations (Dorchester and Boston), and a third will open soon (Brighton).

Onyx's attorney Phil Silverman said, "This is a company that's been very successful but, to be even more successful, as a retailer you really want to be able to stock your own shelves with your own product, it's just more efficient that way."

Silverman said, once the state

approves and issues the transfer, which could take 75 days, Onyx could be up and running in five months. They plan to hire locally.

Evans said, "That was one of the attractive components of this location is that they were fully staffed with what seemed to be a lot of local individuals who knew the site so we want to potentially reach out to those people to bring them back onboard...So, yes, we are looking to ultimately hire the same people that used to work there."

Onyx will also need to meet with the Planning Board to request a transfer of the existing special permit from Mayflower.

Holliston's new policy prohibits anyone from flying a third-party flag on town property except in one location - Blair Square, the corner of Central and Railroad Streets – where a third-party individual or organization can fly a flag for a certain amount of time.

The policy applies to all town buildings but does not apply to the Holliston Public Schools. It also does not apply to utility poles which are owned by the utility companies.

At the January meeting, it was noted that Saint Patrick's Day buntings would be displayed at Town Hall in March because that request was approved before the flag policy went into place.

Before the board approved the policy in January, Chair John Cronin said, "It seems to achieve what we're trying to do which is a good balance between public comment, public expression, public speech, and government speech as the Supreme Court asked communities to consider."

After the board approved the policy, several residents contacted board members to express their dissatisfaction, signed a petition to that effect, and asked for the issue to be put on a future agenda. At its meeting on March 4, the Select Board heard from the public in person and via Zoom for 1.75 hours regarding the matter, with most comments focused specifically on the pride flag.

In her final comments before the vote, board member Tina Hein said, "I understand that this board has taken a position in the draft that we have tonight to review, and potentially take a vote on, that is unpopular with the people in the room and the people on the Zoom call."

After an oftentimes contentious discussion, the board ultimately kept the policy language approved in January and substituted eight words - related to obtaining an application form to fly a flag at Blair Square - with "for which the Select Board may publish an annual calendar with a proposed schedule for the flying of flags."

The board also approved the 2024 "Blair Square flag pole schedule" which "is intended as a communication document from the Select Board to the community for advance planning of events related to future flag raising(s); the schedule is non-binding and ultimately the Select Board may choose to fly flag(s) for the purpose of government speech on the flag pole at its discretion."

And the board voted to purchase a progress pride flag to fly at Blair Square, since the flag that has been flown in the past had been on loan from an independent organization.

The Just For Sibs Program supported Tim's brothers - Brendan, Matt, and Chris - during Tim's illness. "Tim understood the great impact of that support for his brothers and for the siblings of other sick children," says Joanne.

The Foundation also continues its financial support of a research project named for Tim at the University of Minnesota. Tim's oncologist at Children's Hospital Boston, Doctor Peter Gordon, is now at the University of Minnesota. He is studying the FLT-3 mutation that so impacted the course of Tim's

cancer. The Foundation continues to support the National Bone Marrow Donor Program, as well. Tim was the recipient of an almost perfectly matched bone marrow donation from a stranger.

The Foundation takes great pride in its Scholarship Program. To date, nearly \$160,000 has been donated to dozens of Holliston high school students who plan to study in health-related fields. "We are thrilled to help students become doctors, nurses, physical and occupational therapists, pharmacists, researchers, and other caregivers. ## Miller Tomb restoration likely this summer

The tomb of Jacob Miller (1732-1812) in South Cemetery, or "Hoppin' River Cemetery," may be repaired this summer.

In 2022, a large hole was discovered behind the brick tomb's front façade which was then falling forward. The town installed a temporary plywood brace to prevent further damage that some people suspect was caused by heavy traffic vibrations on Washington Street which sits just feet away.

The town has contracted a company to restore and preserve several gravestones in town. That company will restore the Miller Tomb once a structural engineer provides guidance on the repair, expected to happen this summer. in the amount of \$25,000, were approved for the project. In 2022, \$500,000 in CPA funds were approved for the preservation of the five historic cemeteries owned by the town.

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## Senate President Spilka Unveils Portrait of Abigail Adams; Calls for Public Input on the First Woman to be Permanently Honored in Senate Chamber

## Historic addition is latest step in boosting representation in State House art

Today, the Massachusetts Senate marked the first day of Women's History month by unveiling a portrait of former First Lady Abigail Adams and putting out a public call for nominations for an influential woman to be the first honored with a permanent bust in the Senate Chamber. The nominations will be considered by a renewed Senate Art Committee, led by Senator Julian Cyr (D-Truro).

The portrait of Adams, an early advocate for women's rights, opposer of slavery, supporter of women's education, and who advised the Founding Fathers to 'remember the ladies' as they debated the structure and governance of the fledgling United States, was unveiled by Senate President Karen E. Spilka at a public ceremony. The portrait will hang permanently in the Senate Lobby.

She is the second woman with

a permanent portrait in the Massachusetts Senate, following former Senate President Therese Murray, whose portrait hangs in the Senate Reading Room. It is the latest step in Senate President Spilka's effort to expand representation in the State House.

"Centuries after Abigail Adams told the founders to 'remember the ladies,' we still have a long way to go to reach full equality when it comes to women's representation on Beacon Hill," said Senate President Karen E. Spilka (D-Ashland). "Either by accident or design, the many contributions of women who have shaped our Commonwealth and our nation have been left out of the art here in the State House. As we celebrate their achievements-and those of the strong women who lead our government today-I am committed to ensuring that the halls of power change to reflect these women. As we unveil Adams, we are taking a meaningful step towards 'remembering the ladies' and making it clear that women belong here."

"Unveiling Abigail Adams's portrait at the Massachusetts State House marks a significant step towards expanding American history," said Dr. Catherine Allgor, President of the Massachusetts Historical Society. "Senate President Karen Spilka's commitment to recognizing influential women, like Abigail Adams, acknowledges the importance of listening to the diverse voices from the past. They deepen, challenge, complicate, and ultimately change the stories we tell."

The portrait is a reproduction of an original pastel created in 1766 by Benjamin Blyth and was gifted to the Massachusetts Senate by the Massachusetts Historical Society.

Adams was an advocate for women at a moment in history when women were prohibited from voting or holding elected office. Adams famously told her husband, a delegate in the First Continental Congress, to, 'remember the ladies.'

A native of Massachusetts' South Shore, Adams was born and raised in Weymouth, and later moved to Braintree. After several decades of advising and traveling alongside her husband, and then serving as First Lady, Abigail and her family returned to Massachusetts to live in Quincy.

The portrait is the twenty-first permanent image of a woman to be added to the State House.

It comes at a time when women hold more of Massachusetts' elected positions than ever before, including Senate President, Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Treasurer, one U.S. Senate seat, three Congresswomen, and Mayor of Boston.

#### Spilka announces revival of Senate Art Committee

During the unveiling of Adams in the Senate Lobby, Senate President Spilka announced the renewal of the Senate Art Committee and that the committee would solicit nominations from the public for a woman to be honored with a statue in the Chamber.

The Senate Art Committee, which was established in 1972 but has not done business formally in many years, will be revived to continue finding ways to make Senate art more representative of the residents of the Commonwealth.

Senator Julian Cyr (D-Truro) will lead the effort, and with an announcement about additional members forthcoming.

Within about three to five days, or at a later date the customer specifies, the lasagna is delivered to the customer, at no extra charge for Holliston and nearby towns. Membership options for recurring delivery are available, with benefits like preferred access to new varieties and price discounts. Having an exquisite meal at home couldn't be easier.

"What's truly great about lasagna is how well it freezes," Pinci said. "You can have it months later and it will be just as good as when it's fresh. When you're ready to serve it, just thaw, then reheat it for 45 minutes."

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## Ready Homebuyers? Things Are About To Change.

It's been a perfect storm the last 3+ years against first and second-time homebuyers.

But a change is coming, starting with anticipation of mortgage rates falling from 7%.

Morningstar, echoing other analysts, in March shared current Fed Funds rate of 5.25-5.50% will be 4.00 to 4.25% at end of 2024. Furthermore, expect the Fed to continue to "cut through end of 2025, ultimately bringing the federal funds rate down by over 300 points".

Talk to realtors and lenders, they're seeing activity pick up.

Wait until mortgage rates fall to 5%, then homes in certain price points will have inversely increased in value. Whereas, if one can purchase now with expectation to lower ongoing expenses via refinancing later, you've capped initial co2006sts and participated in appreciation.

Thus, first time buyers and those looking to move up, it's time to plan.

This means prioritizing your needs, wants, locations and bud-

get for after you've moved into your new home. This last one is critical as lenders base your preapproval on this moment in time, not the fact you plan to do X a year from now which requires more money in your budget.

Due diligence should also in-

Zillow, RedFin, Realtor - Scroll beyond pictures and into details of when built, sqft, interior features, acreage, adjacent home values and price/tax history. With price history, see when last sold, amount, then account for pictures or better yet when you visit, to see what's been done since to determine value.

Tax Assessments and Property Taxes - Regardless of Realtor views on tax assessments relative to asking price, know a \$890K listing with town tax assessment of \$620K for \$9,300 property taxes, will get reassessed the following year. If bought for \$900K, town likely comes in at \$820K (or higher) for \$12,300 property taxes or \$250 extra a month on your budget.

Financing Options - Explore beyond 30-year fixed rates. Understand directional interest rate landscape and how long you expect to stay in your home. Does a 7-year adjustable rate mortgage (ARM) make sense if the plan is to move in 5-7 years or refinance as rates come down 50-75bps?

Mortgage and Cash Flow Calculations - The more variables, the better. Same with ability compare refinancing scenarios and contrast amortization tables. With clients, I'll share calculator.net, use links to save

scenarios and then run these inside eMoney cash flow analysis. Together, we see impact on their future budget, cash flow 1-3 years out as well as long-term impact.

For example, say one refinanced \$600K in Sept 2020 at 2.75% on 30-year for \$2,449 a

In April 2024, decides to move with current mortgage balance ~\$550K, using equity and additional savings, to add \$150K to a new \$700K mortgage at 7%. New monthly payment is \$4,657, or \$2,208 more. In 5 years (April 2029), outstanding balance is ~\$658K without refinancing.

Conversely, if able to pay \$4,657 a month, decide to stay put with Sept 2020 mortgage and make \$2,208 additional payments starting April 2024, the balance is \$322K by 2029. Beyond the \$336K spread after 5 years to move and borrow \$150K, the Sept 2020 is now paid off in August 2035 and not 2050.

But wait, there's more to consider.

What if the 7% mortgage is

refinanced down to 5% by April 2026? New monthly is \$3,634, or \$1,023 less. Add this as extra payment starting 2026, what do you have?

Understand money is a tool, not the only consideration.

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## Children's Museum of Franklin to hold pop-up exhibit at **Holliston Town Hall**

Select Board waives rental fee

The Holliston Select Board has waived the rental fee for Upper Town Hall for the newly-

established Children's Museum of Franklin which will hold a pop-up exhibit in the space on May 18 from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.

According to the town's website, the fee is \$500 for a nonprofit organization.

At its meeting on March 11, co-founders and co-Executive Directors Erin Gallaher and Meg Hagen of Franklin explained their project, which was brought to town by Holliston's Economic Development Coordinator Melanie Hamblen, who also lives in Franklin.

According to childrensmuseumfranklin.org, the museum "is on a mission to inspire the next generation and build a community of intentional connection through play and exploration" in Franklin and the surrounding region.

At the Select Board meeting, Gallagher explained that, while CMF seeks a permanent location in Franklin, they are functioning as a mobile museum.

"So far we've had four events where we're popping up in different locations, they've all been in Franklin so far. With those four events, we are bringing in 10 different large exhibits, explained Gallagher. "Each exhibit has a different STEMbased concept that the children are working through, it's all learning through play.'

The event is designed for children aged 10 and under. They expect up to 500 people over the course of the two-timeslot event.




## **Tick Safety**

Spring is tick season, here is what you need to know to stay safe: There are two main tick seasons during the year: The first peak starts in spring (March to early April) and continues through the summer, with most activity between June and August. These are often the top months for ticks in Massachusetts as these insects thrive in warm, humid weather.

#### When it comes to protection, the most important aspect is keeping ticks from getting on to your body. When you go outside be sure to:

Spray yourself with a bug repellant containing DEET, and wear long-sleeved pants and

shirts, tucking pants into socks

or shoes. When you come in from outside, remove clothing and put in the dryer on high heat. Take a shower and perform a full body check. What to do if you find a tick on you: Once found, the tick should be removed as soon as possible. Here's how: Using fine-tipped tweezers grasp the tick as close to your skin as possible, pull upwards with steady pressure, not twisting. After the tick is removed, clean the skin with rub-

bing alcohol or soap and water.

#### Common symptoms of tickrelated illness to watch for:

- Fever
- Aches and Pains
- Headache
- $\bullet$  Fatigue  $\square$  Muscle Aches

With Lyme Disease, you may also experience joint pain and a rash; some people may develop a Bullseye rash, but not all.

## Holliston Baseball Looking To Build Upon Last Year's Success

Last spring the Holliston baseball team put together their best season in some 32 years.

The Panthers went 14-7 during the regular season capturing the Tri-Valley League Championship, their first since 1991. Unfortunately, Holliston eventually fell in the Round of 16 to Plymouth North, 4-1.

According to coach Joe Santos, last year's senior group was one that he had coached since they were 11 years old in travel ball, and they specifically told him back then that by the time they were seniors in high school they were going to be the ones to win the TVL for Holliston.

Santos has lost six seniors, all lineup bats, as the Panthers gear up for the upcoming season. Despite the big losses in the lineup, Santos returns every single pitcher that he had in his arsenal last season. This leads the Coach to believe that this year may be his deepest and potentially the best staff in Holliston history; even better than the 1987 State Championship team.

"This year's team will be a little bit different, but the pitching will allow us to come on slower. We won't have to hit the cover off the ball, until we are able to get comfortable at the plate," Coach said. "As a coach I like to be conservative and not overuse our arms. We have 13 arms on the varsity team and will use as many of them as possible."

Leading the team into battle will be two of the three senior captains in Jake Schoenberg, who has pitched in three big playoff games for the Panthers and will be pitching for Saint Anselm in New Hampshire next year, and Teddy Peters, who will be heading to Brandeis University in Waltham. The two hurlers are each competing in their fourth year on the varsity squad.

According to Santos, Schoenberg is the team's ace and throws 86-87 and possesses a good slider, while his counterpart (Peters) has fantastic command locating his pitches, can change speed and allows minimal damage

"As I said before, I worry about arms and don't want to overextend them, so Jake will pitch the last game of the week and Teddy will get the game in the middle," Santos said. "Leaving the first game to go to third year junior Arav Prajapati, who up until this year was primarily a pitcher, but this year we will be trying to get him some at-bats as well."

Prajapati will bring what the coach believes to best the best change-up that he has seen at the high school level over the past 13 years. He too will be pitching for a college team next year, but at this time is still weighing his options being only a junior.

The final of the tri-captains is another big arm in Albert Savino. The lefty comes at batters with a low arm slot and is a bull-dog on the mound, hurling an incredible fastball and a wipeout slider. He will be pitching at UCONN at Avery Point in Groton Connecticut next season.

Another lefty that will take the mound this spring for Holliston is junior Brent Kiley. Last season he was given an opportunity on a few occasions, but this spring Santos is hoping that he takes his breaking ball to the next level. Another junior who pitched some big innings for the Panthers was Evan Kuharich. The Holliston coach is looking for him to continue to pound the zone and attack hitters in his expanded role this year.

When the season opens, Santos and his staff will be looking to the strength of the team on the mound until the bats can get figures out. While that is working out, the coach knows that Schoenberg and Peters will continue to be a big part of the team's offensive identity and run production.

Brad Andreola will be moving over to centerfield from last year's left field position and is currently being penciled in as the team's leadoff hitter.

"He's a game changer with speed, one of the fastest kids in the league," Santos said. "In the outfield he'll be able to track balls down with ease and on the basepaths he will be our table setter."

Another returning junior will be Sam Schoenberg, who will vacate his second base position from a year ago and move into the shortstop role this season. According to the coach, he is a Division 1 prospect playing in the middle of the field as he is a very talented athlete with a great skill set. The younger Schoenberg is one of the team's hardest throwers and the Coach is looking at the potential of using him as a closer. Although Santos likes the possibility of having him close out games, the junior has much more value playing shortstop for the team.

Behind the plate will be yet another junior in Drew Kafka.

The Holliston catcher was responsible for spearheading the team's run down the stretch. After Holliston found themselves on a four-game losing streak, Kafka got the team moving in the right direction and the Panthers were able to put together a nine -game winning streak.

Sitting behind a three-year starter, the young catcher had to wait his turn and take his role in stride, but when given the opportunity he executed on the field behind all his hard work.

"As coaches we harp and preach this on a regular basis," the Coach said. "If you do this, the rest will take care of itself. I'd be lying if I didn't say this group of individuals is very hungry and ready to repeat."

If the Holliston arms can keep other teams at bay until the bats can come alive, the Panthers should be able to find themselves in the hunt for capturing their second straight league title and hopefully making a deep run through the State Tournament.

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
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
