Hopedale DEP violations at Bathhouse, Parklands

The Town of Hopeland has incurred two wetlands violations recently, one related to the placement of the new ADA-compliant ramp at the Bathhouse, and one at The Parklands.

Bathhouse

During recent renovations of the Bathhouse, a handicap ramp was installed to bring the building into compliance with the Amiercans with Disabilities Act.

At the Select Board meeting, Ruscitti said the Building Commissioner had identified the placement of the current ramp as the only place on the site that could accommodate a ramp.

"A prefabricated metal ramp was installed about two weeks ago," said Ruscitti, at the March 12 meeting. "An individual took a picture and sent it to the state. That is in violation because it is within the [wetlands] shoreline zoning."

Ruscitti said he discussed the issue with DEP and explained the need to make the Bathhouse ADA-accessible. "The state is going through a paperwork process where there will have to be a hearing at the next Select Board hearing, the board will have to vote that there was minimal impact to the structure and to the environment, if the board so chooses. That response will be sent to the state, the complaint will be closed out, and we will be in full compliance."

Parklands

During regular maintenance, an area of a peninsula within The Parklands was cleared for easier access.

"There is a peninsula that a lot of residents use for fishing and recreation and other purposes," explained Ruscitti. "In

Fire Department request to leave civil service will likely be denied

State officials expected to propose 10-year hybrid pilot program

At November 2022 fall Town Meeting, the town voted to petition the State Legislature to exempt all positions in the Hopedale Fire Department from the civil service system. Leaving the system would allow the town to hire from a more diverse pool of applicants, not just candidates who have passed a state test.

After the 2022 vote, at the town's request, State Representatives Brian Murray and Ryan Fattman filed Bill H.2615 to present the request to the Committee on Public Service to which it was referred in February 2023. A hearing was held in October 2023, and the reporting date has been extended to June 30, 2024.

At a meeting of the Select Board on March 12, Town Administrator Mitch Ruscitti said the bill is not expected to pass,



along with similar requests from several other towns in the Commonwealth. Instead, state officials are expected to propose a 10-year hybrid model under which some towns can have up to 50% of its staff outside civil service as long as it meets certain parameters, including diversity, equity, and inclusion requirements.

"There has been pushback at the state level from organized labor and veterans groups because of the benefits the civil service, rightfully, provides to those populations," said Ruscitti, noting this is not the decision the town was hoping for. "In speaking with the [Fire] Chief, we're optimistic it will be an improvement. It will be a little bit more difficult to manage but I think that we can certainly work with it and get through. It will be a 10-year pilot program. If it doesn't work out, I think the Legislature will then reassess their decision."

Select Board member Scott Savage said he was disappointed by that decision.

"It continues to disappoint me how the State Legislature refuses to identify the impacts of all these decisions in small communities with limited financial means. Prioritizing other issues, other than the best interest of the community as a whole, is really disappointing."

regular maintenance of The Parklands, there was a portion of that peninsula that, while well-intended, was accidentally cleared to make room for constituents using it. That is not supposed to have occurred. This was relayed to the Parks Commission and to our staff that maintain The Parklands. It was an accident; again, it was well-intended.'

Ruscitti spoke with DEP about the incident. He said the state is recommending the town allow the vegetation to grow back.

"They will send someone out in the fall to walk out into The Parklands to make sure that it has grown back, and we will no longer be clearing any areas in The Parklands or disturbing any of the vegetative life out there. Again, apologies to the community that occurred, it was well-intended, meant to make traversing the area a little bit easier but we're not supposed to be doing that."

Ruscitti said the town is in the process of addressing those is-

Matching grant received to purchase permanent conservation restriction at nearby Vandersluis property

Land Trust to work with Hopedale and Mendon Conservation **Commissions**

The Metacomet Land Trust received a Conservation Partnership Grant from the Commonwealth in the amount of \$175,000. It represents the match for funds designated at Mendon's November Town Meeting (\$175,000) for the purchase of a permanent conservation restriction for the property on North Avenue owned by Jim and Cheri Vandersluis.

The Trust is currently having the property surveyed and we are completing other due diligence to satisfy the terms of the grant. The purchase must be completed and the permanent restriction recorded at the Registry of Deeds by the end of June.

The 116 acres will be known as the Maple Farm Wildlife Preserve and will stretch from North Avenue on the west side to the Hopedale boundary on the east side. Muddy Brook runs through the property north to south. There is also a permanently protected conservation property on the north side of the property and conservation properties abutting the property to the east. Combined, the area provides terrific wildlife habitat for the area and the potential for environmental classrooms for nearby schools.

The land trust will work with its partners including the Mendon and Hopedale Conservation Commissions and the property owners to develop and maintain trails with potential connections to other protected properties.

To steward the property,

Metacomet Land Trust plans to form a "Friends of Maple Farm" volunteer group to help with care, protection, and ongoing trail maintenance of this special property. We will be kicking off a fundraising drive to support these efforts and we look forward to a celebration this summer when the purchase is concluded.



Senator Markey Celebrates Awarding of Congressional Gold Medal at U.S. Capitol to WWII "Ghost Army"

Senator Markey introduced legislation to honor U.S. Army unit whose efforts helped ensure an estimated 15,000 to 30,000 U.S. soldiers made it home during World War II

Senator Edward J. Markey (D-Mass.) today celebrated the awarding of the Congressional Gold Medal to the top-secret U.S. Army units that served in World War II, widely known as the "Ghost Army," including posthumously to John J. "Jack" McGlynn of Medford, Massachusetts. McGlynn was a member of 3132 Signal Company, which was a division of the Ghost Army handling sonic deception. Often operating on or near the frontlines, these army units were instrumental to Allied successes during World War II, most notably at the Battle of the Bulge and the final battles in Italy's Po Valley.

It is an honor to celebrate this long overdue recognition with the McGlynn family and all of the loved ones of these true American heroes."

In March 2016, Senator Markey and his colleagues introduced the Ghost Army Congressional Gold Medal Act. In February 2022, Senators Markey and Susan Collins (R-Maine), along with Congresswoman Annie Kuster (NH-02), celebrated President Joe Biden's signing of the bicameral legislation to award the Ghost Army a Congressional Gold Medal.

Solar eclipse community viewing party on April 8

Neighbors to gather on Community House lawn to witness event

Various town entities are joining together to sponsor an official Solar Eclipse Community Viewing Party on Monday, April 8, from 1:30 p.m. to 4 p.m., on the Hopedale Community House

The eclipse is expected to start around 2:15 p.m., reach full totality at 3:29 p.m., and end around 4:40 p.m. All times are weather permitting.

The event is sponsored by the Bancroft Memorial Library, Friends of the Hopedale Library, Hopedale Council on Aging, Hopedale Community House, and Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners.

Bancroft Memorial Library Director Tricia Perry is hoping 500 or more people gather together to witness the event. She hopes the close proximity of the Council on Aging building and the serendipitous dismissal time of nearby schools will entice people to congregate in the center of town.

"The Community House

lawn is located just across the street from the Library and has a great deal of open space that will allow for great viewing opportunities, and will allow the option of sharing the solar glasses from the SEAL [Solar Eclipse for Libraries] grant with a large group - and hopefully give everyone who attends the event an opportunity to actively participate in this amazing activity," Perry said.



ted a grant request for 500 pairs of ISO Certified Solar Eclipse Glasses. Those glasses will be available for the April eclipse. And, Perry says, if the supply runs out, people gathered on the lawn can share with their neigh-

"Without the glasses it is impossible to comprehend the magnitude of the occasion," said Perry, recalling the first time she witnessed a solar eclipse. It was 2017, and she was the director of the Westwood Public Library where she organized a similar community event. "We had over 400 participants and it was an incredible day! It was the first time I had ever viewed a solar eclipse in real life, and watching that unfold and being able to actually see what was happening in real time with the solar eclipse glasses, was truly something spectacular...And from first-hand experience, I can attest that being able to actually look at the sun is an awesome and singularly memorable experience that will last a lifetime."

In June 1897, two sons of the late George Draper offered the Hopedale Unitarian Parish a new church. It was to be based on an English design,


built of granite and oak, and finished within a year. The parish gratefully accepted and the workers broke ground quickly. But the building's construction involved razing Hopedale's original church – a church built by George Draper and his brother, Ebenezer, to honor Adin Ballou, the man who founded the town.

The construction timeframe was short, only a little over a year from the destruction of Ballou's egalitarian community church and meetinghouse to the finishing touches being put on this new "Draper Memorial Church."

As with any tale, there is a

backstory to this generous offer. Eben S. and George Albert Draper weren't George Draper's only children - he had two daughters and another son, Civil War hero and statesman General William F. Draper. The General was not involved in this project and did not attend the dedication in 1898. During much of the construction, the local newspapers seemed unimpressed as political one-upmanship and a war took the headlines. Then, to top it off, a family feud began to

Defying Physical Challenges and Uniting for Cancer Prevention

This June, three extraordinary girls will swim to raise money for breast cancer prevention at Against the Tide, an annual event hosted by Massachusetts Breast Cancer Coalition (MBCC). Despite facing physical challenges, Jordan, Jasmine, and Chloe participate in Against the Tide not only with the hope that others will join their passionate support of cancer prevention, but to honor their loved ones who have been affected by breast cancer.

Every year participants from all over New England and beyond are drawn to Against the Tide and to MBCC's unique mission. These swimmers, runners, and walkers share the belief that there are environmental links to cancer and other ill-health. Against the Tide not only raises funds for MBCC's work to prevent exposures to environmental toxins, the event also raises spirits and empowers people to unite under a common cause.

Among the participants at this year's Against the Tide are three courageous girls whose determination and unwavering spirit embody the true essence of this event.

Jordan Marquis, a thirteenyear-old from Bedford with a below-knee amputation, is challenging herself to compete in the one-mile swim. Jordan shares, "I hate being underestimated. People with disabilities can do anything! Goal setting – the full mile is the next step for me." Jordan took on the half-mile swim last year and, in an effort to honor her grandmother who is a breast cancer survivor, she wants to swim even further this year.

Jasmine "Jazzy" Gillespie, an eleven-year-old girl from Bedford with minor spastic diplegia, is participating in solidarity of the daily challenges that are faced by those with health conditions like cancer. Jazzy says: "Sometimes I feel like people who don't have conditions that

affect their daily lives don't understand what it's like. So instead of having empathy for these people, they make fun of them or make them think that they can't do anything. Doing this breaks the person down and they start to believe that they can't do anything. I could imagine that this happens to people with breast cancer, too." Jazzy is swimming in Against the Tide to honor her two grandmothers as well as her aunt, all of whom were touched by breast cancer.

Like Jordan and Jazzy, Chloe Smagula, a fourteen-year-old girl from Westford with hemiplegia, is swimming in Against the Tide to pay tribute to her aunt and to help those touched by cancer through supporting MBCC's mission. Chloe, who participated in Against the Tide last year, said, "I did the open water swim because I've never done it before and I wanted to try something new."



Your Money, Your Independence

Ready Homebuyers? Things Are About To Change.

It's been a perfect storm the last 3+ years against first and second-time homebuyers.

But a change is coming, starting with anticipation of mortgage rates falling from 7%.

Morningstar, echoing other analysts, in March shared current Fed Funds rate of 5.25-5.50% will be 4.00 to 4.25% at end of 2024. Furthermore, expect the Fed to continue to "cut through end of 2025, ultimately bringing the federal funds rate down by over 300 points".

Talk to realtors and lenders, they're seeing activity pick up.

Why?

Wait until mortgage rates fall to 5%, then homes in certain price points will have inversely increased in value. Whereas, if one can purchase now with expectation to lower ongoing expenses via refinancing later, you've capped initial co2006sts

and participated in appreciation.

Thus, first time buyers and those looking to move up, it's time to plan.

This means prioritizing your needs, wants, locations and budget for after you've moved into your new home. This last one is critical as lenders base your preapproval on this moment in time, not the fact you plan to do X a year from now which requires more money in your budget.

Due diligence should also include:

Zillow, RedFin, Realtor - Scroll beyond pictures and into details of when built, sqft, interior features, acreage, adjacent home values and price/tax history. With price history, see when last sold, amount, then account for pictures or better yet when you visit, to see what's been done since to determine value.

Tax Assessments and Property Taxes - Regardless of Realtor views on tax assessments relative to asking price, know a \$890K listing with town tax assessment of \$620K for \$9,300 property taxes, will get reassessed the following year. If bought for \$900K, town likely comes in at \$820K (or higher) for \$12,300 property taxes or \$250 extra a month on your budget.

Financing Options - Explore beyond 30-year fixed rates. Understand directional interest rate

landscape and how long you expect to stay in your home. Does a 7-year adjustable rate mortgage (ARM) make sense if the plan is to move in 5-7 years or refinance as rates come down 50-75bps?

Mortgage and Cash Flow Calculations - The more variables, the better. Same with ability compare refinancing scenarios and contrast amortization tables. With clients, I'll share calculator.net, use links to save scenarios and then run these inside eMoney cash flow analysis. Together, we see impact on their future budget, cash flow 1-3 years out as well as long-term impact.

For example, say one refinanced 600K in Sept 2020 at 2.75% on 30-year for 2,449 a month.

In April 2024, decides to move with current mortgage balance ~\$550K, using equity and additional savings, to add \$150K to a new \$700K mortgage at 7%. New monthly payment is \$4,657, or \$2,208 more. In 5 years (April 2029), outstanding balance is ~\$658K without refinancing.

Conversely, if able to pay \$4,657 a month, decide to stay put with Sept 2020 mortgage and make \$2,208 additional payments starting April 2024, the balance is \$322K by 2029. Beyond the \$336K spread after 5 years to move and borrow \$150K, the Sept 2020 is now

paid off in August 2035 and not 2050.

But wait, there's more to consider.

What if the 7% mortgage is refinanced down to 5% by April 2026? New monthly is \$3,634, or \$1,023 less. Add this as extra payment starting 2026, what do you have?

Understand money is a tool, not the only consideration.

There is great value in doing what's best for your family, educational or work opportunities and/or your personal choice of belonging to a community.

You should know this value going into a decision, not after it.



Applicant proposes two 6,600 sf warehouses



There is currently an application before the Hopedale Planning Board for two 6,600 square foot prefabricated metal warehouses at 370 S. Main Street, across from Hopedale Business Park and among several singlefamily homes.

The first hearing was held on March 18; the meeting recording was not available at press time. The hearing was continued to April 17 at 7 p.m. for additional discussion.

The Hopedale Application for Site Plan Approval lists the applicant as Pro-Painting Inc. at 366 Berlin St., Clinton, and the email address of the owner belongs to Gabriel Praxedes.

According to bit.ly/countyoffice370SouthMainHopedale, the buyer bought the multi-family residential building in 2021 as a foreclosure for \$191,000. Praxedes has several other businesses listed at his Clinton address, according to the Secretary

The Vital Role of Anesthesiologists in Eye Surgery

You should always ask "Will an anesthesiologist be present during my surgery?" and "What do you do to make me comfortable if the pill you gave me outside the surgery room is not enough"? 


